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ABSTRACT

This bibliography is designed to provide Saskatchewan (Canada) teachers with steps to introduce a multi-resource approach to teaching Social Studies and History. The bibliography is designed to assist educators in choosing a variety of appropriate resources to support the Social Studies 20 and History 20 curricula. Items listed are intended to promote the philosophy of resource-based learning in which the curriculum is supported by a variety of resources rather than a single textbook. The resources include videotapes, CD-ROM programs, maps, computer software and various print resources. Each entry lists the following information: title, media designation, author, series, publisher, distributor, date collation, order number, price, and a brief annotation. Audiovisual citations include the title, media designation, series, producer, distributor, date, length, duplication order number and an annotation. A subject and unit index also provides information related to the environment, human rights, population, wealth and poverty, world governance, and history. Seventy-four distributors are identified for teachers who wish to incorporate specific materials into their social studies and history programs. (JAG)

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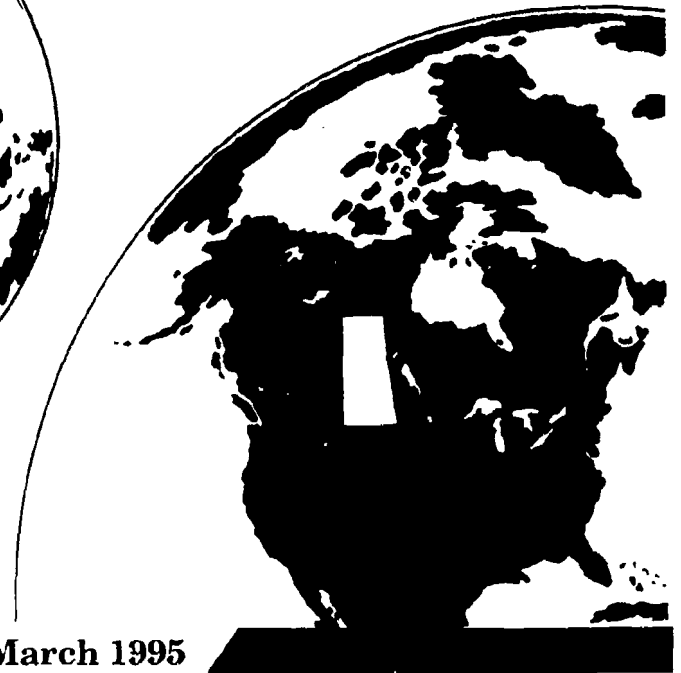

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Foreword

Steps to a Multi-Resource Approach to Teaching Social Studies and History

This bibliography is designed to assist educators in choosing a variety of appropriate resources to support the Social Studies 20 and History 20 curricula.

The items listed are intended to promote the philosophy of resource-based learning in which the curriculum is supported by a variety of resources rather than a single textbook. The

resources in this bibliography include videos, CD-ROM programs, maps, computer software and various print resources. This multi-media approach provides students with opportunities to interact with a wide range of materials in a variety of learning situations. Although human resources are not included, it is important that they be accessed as well. Every community has capable people who can enrich educational experiences.

When using this bibliography as a selection aid, the following suggestions may be helpful.

Background Review

The resources in this bibliography are recommended for support of the Social Studies 20 and History 20 curricula. However, it remains the responsibility of educators to preview and select materials that best meet the needs of their particular schools and communities. It is suggested that:

- the Curriculum Guide(s) and Activity Guide(s) be reviewed;
- the school division's selection policy be reviewed; and,
- resources on evaluating materials for bias and those on resource-based learning be consulted. For example, the Saskatchewan Education, Training and Employment publications *Diverse Voices: Selecting Equitable Resources for Indian and Métis Education* (April 1992), and *Selecting Fair and Equitable Learning Materials* (March 1991), should be reviewed. Saskatchewan Education, Training and Employment has distributed these publications to schools. Additional copies are available for purchase from the Book Bureau.

Analyzing Present Resources

The bibliography may be cross-referenced with the school resource centre catalogue in order to identify suitable resources already present in the school library collection.

Materials in the present collection should be assessed based on the needs of the curriculum,

the community, the students and teachers. Considerations of needs include:

- reflection of curricula philosophy;
- accuracy, currency, readability; and,
- relevance, adaptability and versatility of resources.

Points for Consideration in Acquiring New Resources

- Resource needs not met by the present collection could be identified by teachers and the teacher-librarian working together. Possibly some materials that would support several grade levels and subject areas could be ordered.
- Video programs available for duplication from Media House Productions (MHP) are high quality programs that can be acquired at a nominal cost. Schools are responsible for costs of postage, a duplication charge of \$1.00 per title, blank tape and applicable taxes. Media House Productions also offers many excellent 16 mm films for loan. For further information, please consult the current Media House Productions catalogue of audiovisual resources that is sent to each school yearly. The address, and telephone and fax numbers are listed in the Distributor Directory.
- Library wholesalers and publishers are sometimes willing to provide a display of recommended materials at the school division level to give educators the opportunity of previewing materials prior to purchase.
- Some distributors provide preview copies of materials on a trial basis or allow purchased items to be returned for a small restocking fee. For example, the Book Bureau will usually permit inappropriate items to be returned if they are in saleable condition. However, a 10% restocking fee of up to \$2.00 per item will be charged.

Educators interested in purchasing material should contact the distributors listed in the Distributor Directory at the end of this document or **place a special order for all Canadian materials (except Media House Production's materials) through the Book Bureau.** For further information please contact the Book Bureau. The address, telephone and fax numbers are listed in the Distributor Directory.

It should be noted that prices quoted do not include applicable taxes and are subject to change, but will serve as a guide to approximate costs. Book Bureau prices include shipping and handling fees. Most other distributors or publishers have an additional charge for shipping and handling.

Saskatchewan Education, Training and Employment has provided, free of charge, one copy of this bibliography to each school that offers Grade 11. Additional copies can be purchased from the Book Bureau or schools may photocopy this publication.

How to Use the Bibliography

The bibliography is organized into four sections: Titles and Descriptions, Subject and Unit Index, Media Index and Distributor Directory.

Titles and Descriptions

Titles are listed alphabetically. The citations provide bibliographic information, sources, annotations and suggested unit(s) of study. The abbreviation *hdc.* denotes hardcover edition, while *pbk.* denotes paperback edition. ISBN is an abbreviation for International Standard Book Number, which can usually be used as an order number. *Dup.* is an abbreviation for duplication which means that the video is available for duplication from Media House Productions.

Annotation

The assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand at Sarajevo brought about a series of international diplomatic maneuvers that ultimately led to World War I. This program explores the background to Sarajevo and why German mobilization precipitated European hostilities.

This resource offers an overview of Hitler's life from his childhood and inauspicious beginnings as a failed artist to his years as a soldier, revolutionary and "fuhrer," to his death and the immediate aftermath of WWII. The text is enriched by photographs and quotes from primary sources.

Africa. 5th ed. (Print-Non-Fiction). Ramsey, F. Jeffress. (Global Studies). Dushkin (NEL), 1993. 276 p. ISBN 1-56134-224-6 (\$18.99 pbk.)

In this resource, statistics and general information about each country in Africa are provided, along with an introductory essay describing the cultures of North, West, Central, East, and South Africa. Included are articles reprinted from the World Press. An index and glossary are included. As an *Annual Editions* publication, updated versions are issued regularly.

American Indian Identity: Today's Changing Perspectives. 2nd ed. (Print-Non-Fiction).

Trafzer, Clifford E., ed. Sierra Oaks (SOP), 1989. 104 p. ISBN 0-940113-19-8 (\$10.95 U.S. pbk.)

This collection of essays by various American Indian scholars discusses topics pertinent to today's Aboriginal people, including their changing ways and sense of identity.

Anne Frank's Diary (Print-Non-Fiction). Frank, Anne. Cornerstone (DOU), 1989. 312 p. ISBN 0-385-04019-9 (\$24.95 hdc.)

This renowned diary relates the day to day thoughts of a teenage Jewish girl in hiding with her family from the Nazis in occupied Holland. An "Afterword" gives a short history of the Nazi movement and the war. It also briefly describes the tragic events that follow the Frank's discovery by the Gestapo, and how her diary came to be published after her death.

At the Brink (Video). (War and Peace in the Nuclear Age). The Annenberg/CPB Project (MHP), 1988. 60 min. Dup. order no. V2913

This documentary of the Cuban missile crisis of 1962 details the ways in which the United States and the Soviet Union came close to nuclear war.

Atlas of the Environment (Print-Non-Fiction). Lean, Geoffrey and Don Hinrichsen. Helicon (OUP), 1992. 192 p. ISBN 0-09-177433-0 (\$35.95 pbk.)

The present state of the environment and related issues are depicted through objective information intended to help students come to their own conclusions. Topics include population growth, distribution of wealth, energy resources, wetlands, education, health and global warming. Each coloured map spread concentrates on one major issue. The 1990 edition was *W.W.F. Atlas of the Environment*, sponsored by the World Wildlife Fund.

Before Columbus Series (Video). Central Productions and National Film Board (NFB), 1992. Set of 3 videos. 51 min. each. Order no. 19192161 (\$79.95 set)

A series of three videos portrays the Indian experience in the Americas during the past 500 years, from their point of view. Each video is divided into two parts of approximately 25 min. each. It includes the following titles:

Part One: Invasion. Order no. 19192136 (\$26.95)
This is an accurate portrayal of Columbus's "discovery" of the Americas which describes the European seizure of Aboriginal territory throughout the two continents.

Part Two: Conversion. Order no. 19192137 (\$26.95)

Part Two presents the history of the European religious orders' attempts to undermine Native spirituality and to convert the people of the Americas to Christianity. It also shows that, in spite of this, Indian spirituality has survived.

Part Three: Rebellion. Order no. 19192138 (\$26.95)

This description of historic wars against American Indians explains how entire peoples were exterminated. It details Indian peoples' continuing struggle for their rights.

This resource explores the concept of conflict by examining the history and evolution of the Soviet Union. Contemporary life and the recent collapse of the political system are portrayed up to the early 1990s.

This guide discusses various environmental dangers. It also suggests practical ways in which consumers can help the environment, from choosing certain products over others to reducing household refuse.

In addition to detailed Canadian coverage, this atlas provides maps of other countries of the world. The large maps are supplemented with small locator maps and graphic material, plus information such as climate, urban and rural land use, and statistics. It includes a table of contents and gazetteers.

The Canadian World Almanac (Print-Non-Fiction). Filion, John, ed. Global Press, 1989. 691 p. ISBN 0-7715-3983-5 (\$Out of print)

This comprehensive almanac of statistics includes varied lists such as award winners, major world conflicts and sports scores. It includes details about political figures and countries as well as historical and current events pertinent to Canada.

Although out of print, this or a similar almanac may be available in schools or libraries.

The Car Economy Book: How to Buy, Drive and Maintain Your Car to Save Money and Energy. 5th ed. (Print-Non-Fiction). Energy, Mines and Resources Canada. Minister of Supply and Services Canada (CCG), 1991. 69 p. ISBN 0-662-18245-6 (\$Free pbk.)

This pamphlet offers up-to-date information on buying, driving and maintaining a fuel-efficient car. It includes a section on fuel alternatives and the environment.

Central America (Print-Non-Fiction). Wekesser, Carol, ed. (Opposing Viewpoints). Greenhaven (BB/NEL), 1990. 264 p. Order no. BB 1379 (\$14.65 pbk.), ISBN 0-89908-484-2 (\$26.50 hdc.)

Collected articles and essays expressing opposing views answer the questions in the following five chapter titles: "Why is Central America a Conflict Area?", "Is U.S. Involvement in Central America Justified?", "What Policies Would Strengthen Central American Economies?", "What Role Does Christianity Play in Central America?", "Is Peace Possible in Central America?" The essays are supplemented by activities that promote critical thinking, a periodical bibliography, a list of organizations to contact, and a chronology of events from 1509-1990.

The essays are supplemented by activities that promote critical thinking, a list of organizations, a bibliography of periodicals, and a chronology of events in China from 1839 to 1988.

Essays and articles in this resource offer opposing views on what constitutes liberty and how civil liberties should be protected.

Included are historical debates as well as discussions about separation of church and state, limits on free speech, the right to privacy, and government responsibility for securing minority rights. Activities that promote critical thinking supplement the articles.

The origins of the cold war between the end of the Second World War and the death of Stalin are examined. A final chapter discusses the cold war of the fifties and sixties. The book includes black-and-white photographs of historical figures, as well as their political biographies, and a chronological date list.

The Cold War (Print-Non-Fiction). Heater, Derek. (*Witness History*). Wayland (NEL), 1989. 63 p. ISBN 1-85210-656-5 (\$28.65 hdc.)

This book gives an overview of the main events that caused and prolonged the Cold War, from 1945 to the late eighties. It concludes with a section of short paragraphs describing the

backgrounds of the various leading figures involved. Maps, numerous photographs and a list of important dates are included.

The Cold War/Europe and The Third World (Video). (*The Western Tradition*). Magic Lantern (MHP), 1989. 55 min. Dup. order no. V3833

This two-part, university-level lecture by Eugene Weber is supplemented by visuals of the time period (e.g., newspaper clippings, footage). *The Cold War* describes the domination of Europe by the U.S.A. and U.S.S.R., and subsequently its division into Western and Eastern spheres of influence.

Europe and the Third World looks at the legacy of colonial imperialism in the Third World. The video describes the influence of superpower rivalries and competition from industrialized nations.

Constructing a Life Philosophy is a collection of essays that expounds opposing beliefs about moral, religious and ethical questions concerning the meaning of life and one's own role in it.

The devastating impact of contact with the outside world on isolated Indigenous people is depicted. Because of mining operations which destroy their ecosystem and diseases for which they have no resistance, these people are fighting for both physical and cultural survival.

Contemporary World: Conflict or Co-operation? Canadian. 2nd ed. (Print-Non-Fiction). Cannon, Jim, et al. Harcourt Brace Jovanovich (HBJ), 1986. 190 p. ISBN 0-7747-1248-1 (\$16.50 pbk.)

Based on a resource prepared for British students, this Canadian edition is designed to help students understand the reasons for conflicts and the need for co-operation in international relations. It includes reference to the place of Canada in the post-war international order and offers student questions, illustrations, photographs and case studies.

Contours in the 20th Century (Print-Non-Fiction). Davis, M. Dale. Oxford (BB), 1989. 448 p. Order no. BB 1361 (\$43.10 hdc.). Teacher's Guide - Order no. BB 1362 (\$69.90 hdc.)

Each chapter of this analytical overview of twentieth century history offers information leading to the development of an issue that is then expressed as a problem. Students are invited to examine the primary sources provided and to reflect upon the author's suggestions for alternate actions or responses to the problems. Topics include the nature of imperialism, the two world wars, the global village, the Middle East, nuclear strategy and the cold war, and South Africa.

A detailed teacher's guide provides a course rationale and description, lesson plans, assignments, answers and tests, plus student assignment sheets for duplication.

It includes facts about subjects such as cloud formation, the history of writing and the growth of cities. The print is very small. Little Canadian or Indian/Métis content is included.

Described as "A portrait of everything significant in the world today," this book contains statistics with short but informative introductions covering 14 sections on various topics. It provides comparative statistics on a variety of countries around the world. Subjects such as population, transport, employment, health and the environment are addressed.
