ABSTRACT

This fact sheet provides statistical information about Project Head Start. Data are presented for the following categories: (1) budget--actual for fiscal year 1994 and the 1995 appropriation; (2) enrollment; (3) number of sites; (4) average cost per child; (5) number of staff and volunteers; and (6) enrollment and congressional appropriates from the summer of 1965 through 1994. The document also provides facts concerning program administration, grant awards, handicapped children served, teacher qualifications, home-based services, parent participation, medical screening, enrollment in the Medicaid/Early Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment program, and participating families' need for social services. Allocations and enrollment for 1994 are reported by state, district, territory, program and project. (HTH)

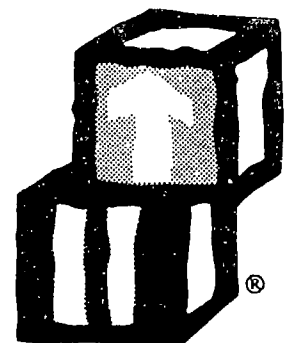

A total of 14,594,000 children have been served by the program since it began in 1965.

OTHER FACTS

The program is administered by the Administration on Children, Youth and Families (ACYF), Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS).

Grants are awarded by the DHHS Regional Offices and the ACYF Native American and Migrant Programs Branches to local public agencies, private non-profit organizations and school systems for the purpose of operating Head Start programs at the community level.

During the 1993-1994 operating period, Head Start programs report that:

- o 13 percent of the Head Start enrollment consisted of children with disabilities, (mental retardation, health impairments, visual handicaps, hearing impairments, emotional disturbance, speech and language impairments, orthopedic handicaps and learning disabilities).
- o 79 percent of the Head Start teachers had degrees in early childhood education or had obtained the Child Development Associate (CDA) credential.
- o 616 programs operated a home based program. Home based services were provided to over 48,000 children by 4,360 home visitors.
- o 30.5 percent of the staff were parents of current or former Head Start children. Over 731,000 parents volunteered in their local Head Start program.
- o 94.1 percent of Head Start families needing social services received social services from Head Start and/or through referrals to other agencies.
- o 66 percent of Head Start families have incomes of less than \$9,000 per year and 83 percent have yearly incomes of less than \$12,000.
- o Head Start programs are encouraged to use non-Head Start resources in their communities for Head Start children and their families. Recent data show that 69 percent of the Head Start children are enrolled in the Medicaid/Early Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) program which pays for their medical and dental services.

- o The 1994 Head Start Reauthorization Act established a new Early Head Start program for low income families with infants and toddlers. Beginning in Fiscal Year 1995, grants will be made to projects which provide, either directly or through referral, early, continuous, intensive and comprehensive child development and family support services to low income families with children under age three. Included in this effort will be the current Parent and Child Centers and the current Comprehensive Child Development Programs. Three percent of Head Start's appropriation, or \$106 million, will be dedicated to providing comprehensive child and family development services to these families.
- o Transition Project grants, awarded to Head Start grantees and public school systems, are designed to demonstrate effective strategies for supporting children and families as they make the transition from the Head Start program through kindergarten and the first three grades of public school. These projects are testing whether providing continuous comprehensive services to Head Start children will maintain and enhance the early benefits attained by the children and their families.
