## ABSTRACT

This document is intended to present, in tables and graphs, a diversity of information on Washington State, its people, economy, and government. The information was obtained from state and federal agencies and from private businesses. The data are organized into 11 major chapters which cover the following topics (sample subtopics in parentheses): (1) population (population by age, sex, and racial categories and the federal census population from 1880 to the present); (2) economy (personal income, inflation indicators, and labor market indicators); (3) state government finance (state government organization and state employment); (4) human services (community social services, health care facilities, and veterans); (5) criminal justice (crimes and arrests and juvenile); (6) education (public and private K-12 schools, four-year universities, community and technical colleges, and vocational-technical institutes); (7) natural resources (forest products, state lands, and agriculture); (8) environment (state and federal parks, hunting, and fishing); (9) energy (energy consumption and fuel prices); (10) transportation (vehicles and drivers, airport traffic, and transit system); and (11) local government and special districts (county profiles, revenues and expenditures, and cities and towns). A listing of the agencies contributing data is also provided. (Contains an index.) (DB)

## PREFACE

The purpose of the Washington State Data Book is to present, in one reference document, a diversity of information on Washington, its people, economy, and government. The information is obtained from state and federal agencies as well as private business.

The Data Book contains eleven major chapters: Population, Economy, State Government Finance, Human Services, Criminal Justice, Education, Natural Resources, Environment, Energy, Transportation, and Local Government and Special Districts. These sections represent the type of information most frequently requested by a broad range of users.

It would be impossible to compile and publish the Data Book without the cooperation of the contributing agencies. Therefore, we thank those agencies and their research staff, professional and clerical. Agency names, addresses, general information telephone numbers, and reference publications are listed in the Contributing Agencies section starting on page 289.

Every effort is made to ensure the accuracy of the data presented in the Data Book. Because the Data Book is only published every two years, much of the material is subject to frequent updates and changes and these data should not be cited as the most recent official agency information.

State Capital: Olympia  
Governor: Mike Lowry

1579: Sir Francis Drake sailed up the Pacific Northwest Coast and named the entire region New Albion.

1775: Spain laid claim to the area.

1792: Many of our state landmarks named by Captain George Vancouver. Captain Robert Gray explored the lower reaches of the Columbia River.

1805-06: Lewis and Clark expedition explored the Northwest and reached the Pacific Ocean at the mouth of the Columbia River.

1818: Fort Walla Walla built by the North West Company. This enabled the United States to claim joint occupancy of the Oregon Territory with England.

1819: Spain gave the United States any and all rights claimed by Spain to the Oregon country.

1846: Oregon Territory became a part of the United States when the United States and Great Britain agreed to the 49th parallel as the northern U.S. boundary.

1848: Oregon Territory was established with Washington as the northern part of the territory.

1853: Washington Territory, separate from Oregon, was created. Isaac Stevens was the first territorial governor.

1863: Idaho Territory was created from part of the Washington Territory.

1889: Washington admitted to the United States on November 11 as the forty-second state. Elisha Ferry was the first elected governor of Washington State.

1941: Grand Coulee Dam completed.

1980: Mount St. Helens erupted in May.

1989: Washington celebrated 100 years of statehood on November 11.

## DATA NOTES

Many data series published in the Data Book are available in separate publications released by the contributing agencies. These source documents generally provide updated data on a more frequent and detailed basis than the Data Book. The source documents also provide data definitions and user information not included in the Data Book due to lack of space.

Please contact the contributing agency for additional data, explanations, or updated information. The contributing agencies, their addresses, telephone numbers, and some available publications are listed starting on page 289.

A County Sources and Footnotes page for the county profiles is located on page 266.

Unless otherwise noted, the time periods in this publication are either calendar year or fiscal year. The following types of fiscal year are used in the tables:

- State Fiscal Year - July 1 through the following June 30;
- Federal Fiscal Year - October 1 through the following September 30
- School Fiscal Year - September 1 through the following August 31.

Real or constant dollars are dollars that have been adjusted to account for the effect of inflation. This adjustment is made in relation to a base year. For example, the base year for the implicit price deflator (IPD) is 1987. Statistics from years after 1987 are adjusted down by inflation, those before are adjusted up. This allows actual (or real) changes to be observed.

Current or nominal dollars have not been adjusted in any way.

Financial data are in current dollars unless otherwise noted.









MA: Metropolitan Area - A large population nucleus, together with adjacent communities that have a high degree of economic and social integration with that nucleus

MSA: Metropolitan Statistical Area - Relatively freestanding MA's and are not closely associated with other MA's. These areas typically are surrounded by nonmetropolitan counties.

PMSA: Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area - A large urbanized county or cluster of counties that demonstrates very strong internal economic and social links, in addition to close ties to other portions of the larger area.

CMSA: Consolidated Metropolitan Statistical Area - When PMSA's are established, the larger area of which they are component parts is designated a consolidated metropolitan statistical area.

Note: Metropolitan statistical area boundaries as of 1993. The boundaries of all the metropolitan statistical areas are county boundaries. Population, age, race, employment, public school, public assistance, transportation, county revenues, marriages, divorces, and components of change statistics are found in the Local Government section by county.





## TOTAL PERSONAL INCOME



























## UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE PROGRAM


### Total Benefits Paid and Fund Balance






















## PERCENT DROPOUTS BY GRADE PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOLS

### PUBLIC FOUR-YEAR COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITIES
















## FOREST FIRES TOTAL ACRES BURNED



## LICENSED FISHING BOATS BY VESSEL SIZE


### Under 5 Tons




## DEER AND ELK HUNTING ANIMALS HARVESTED






## END-USE ENERGY CONSUMPTION BY SECTOR




## PETROLEUM EXPENDITURES BY SECTOR






## NATURAL GAS CONSUMPTION BY SECTOR






### Vehicle Miles Travelled



## SEA-TAC INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT TRAFFIC


### Passengers



### Air Freight by Trade Route








