ABSTRACT

The Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) system encompasses the world's largest and most frequently used education database as well as a network of 16 subject-specific clearinghouses and supporting services. ERIC is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Educational Research and Improvement, and is administered by the National Library of Education. For 30 years, ERIC has been an important component of the national education dissemination system, ensuring that education information reaches those who need it. The ERIC database now contains nearly 900,000 records of education documents and journal articles, including abstracts of 6,000 published books. This annual report highlights many recent achievements in the ERIC system. ERIC is accessible from virtually anywhere in the world. In 1995, ERIC Clearinghouses distributed more than 1.5 million copies of their publications, many of them at no cost. ERIC works cooperatively to reduce duplication of effort and ensure cost-effective service. More than 625,000 copies of ERIC-produced publications were distributed by other organizations in 1995. Highlights, with illustrations, include the ERIC Database; ERIC publications; ERIC's accessibility; ERIC World Wide Web sites; ERIC Digests; ERIC Partnerships; ERIC-sponsored listservs; the ERIC budget; the ERIC system directory; and what's ahead from ERIC. 

ERIC offers rich education resources.

- The ERIC database now contains nearly 900,000 records of education documents and
 journal articles, including abstracts of 6,000 published books.
- More than 900 journals are indexed in the ERIC database, some cover to cover and others
 on a more selective basis.
- ERIC ensures the timely addition of high-quality materials through acquisition arrangements with 1,900 universities, research centers, professional organizations, and federal and state agencies.
- Each year, ERIC Clearinghouses produce more than 250 high-quality publications on such important topics as assessment, reading instruction, and education technology.

ERIC is accessible from virtually anywhere in the world.

- Four private online database vendors and six CD-ROM vendors ofter the ERIC database.
 The ERIC database is also accessible via the Internet at several library online public access catalogs and the AskERIC World Wide Web site (http://ericir.syr.edu).
- More than 1,000 institutions in 27 countries provide access to the ERIC database, ERIC documents on microtiche, and other ERIC resources.
- The ERIC system maintains a network of award-winning Internet sites, including AskERIC, an electronic question-answering service and virtual library begun in 1992, all linked through one systemwide site (http://www.aspensys.com/eric).

- ERIC staff answer more than 50,000 toll-free calls, 80,000 letters, and 500,000 e-mail questions per year.
- More than 300,000 individuals use ERIC's continually updated Internet sites each week.
- ERIC fosters communication on such topics as parenting, early childhood education, independent schools, and school library and media services through 27 listservs hosted by 7 ERIC Clearinghouses, with a total subscriber base of 16,414.
- ERIC Clearinghouses distributed more than 1.5 million copies of their publications in 1995, many of them at no cost.

ERIC works cooperatively to reduce duplication of effort and ensure cost-effective service.

- Four hundred partner organizations promote ERIC, disseminate ERIC information through their newsletters and journal articles, help build the database, and undertake joint projects. In return, partners receive VIP handling of information requests, advance notification and discounts on publications, and technical assistance and support.

In literally a few minutes, I can do a careful search of the journal and document abstracts and review them to see which are most likely to be relevant. Then, I can drive over to one of the universities with ERIC fiche collections to read literature that would often not be available to us otherwise.

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
The ERIC Database

The ERIC database is the world's largest education database. Created in 1966 to capture and make available difficult-to-find education research, the

database now includes nearly a million records. The ERIC database consists of two files: Resources in Education (RIE), which covers research reports, curriculum guides, conference papers, program descriptions, and other documents, and Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), which covers articles from more than 900 education-related journals. Overall, the ERIC database contains 888,059 bibliographic records. Of these, 378,625 are document records and 509,434 are journal article records. Each year, approximately 13,000 document records and 20,000 article records are added to the database.

The database is available in print, online (Internet, commercial services, and locally mounted systems), and on CD-ROM. Its popularity can be gauged by how many new vendors create their own versions of ERIC database products. There are now four online and six CD-ROM vendors offering access to the entire ERIC database or to certain portions of it. A number of organizations purchase the ERIC database, including many universities that offer it on their online public access catalogs. In addition, many of these organizations allow public access to the database on their systems via the Internet.

Because access to the database is provided by more than 1,000 institutions and commercial online services that are not obligated to report their sales and usage figures to the Department of Education, it is impossible to know how many people search the ERIC database each day, but feedback from librarians like the one below is an indication of its vast usage.



66 In Florida we've loaded the entire ERIC bibliographic database into our State University System online information system called LUIS. This database is freely accessible to all the faculty and students of the State University System as well as to anyone else in the state (or anyone with Internet connectivity). Our annual usage level is about 1.5 million searches.



ERIC Documents

Approximately 13,000 new documents are added to the ERIC database each year. Of the more than 378,000 ERIC document (ED) records in the database, 97 percent are research/technical reports, conference papers/speeches, project/program descriptions, opinion papers/essays, and teaching guides. More than 6,000 published books are abstracted in ERIC. Approximately 95 percent of abstracted documents are available in paper copy or microfiche from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS). Documents announced by ERIC as of January 1996 will soon be available in full text on the Internet and through document faxback. ERIC has arrangements with more than 1,900 organizations to receive their publications for the database as they are produced. These organizations include universities, research centers, state departments of education, professional associations, and commercial publishers, as well as Congress and more than 25 federal departments and agencies, including the U.S. Department of Education, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and the National Science Foundation. ERIC document resumes appear in monthly issues of *Resources in Education*, available from the Government Printing Office, and in online and CD-ROM versions of the database.



This report on California's Healthy Start Initiative was presented by Lynn Newman at an annual meeting of the American Educational Research Association. ERIC has a standing acquisitions arrangement to receive publications from SRI International, the organization that produced the report. Approximately 30 percent of the documents in ERIC are research/technical reports like this one.

ERIC document resumes provide a wealth of information. The EA number indicates that the document was indexed and abstracted by the ERIC Clearinghouse on Educational Management. ERIC's indexing system of descriptors and identifiers is well respected and used by a number of other databases. The resume shows that the report is available from the producer, SRI International, as well as from EDRS in microfiche or paper. Microfiche copies are also available at more than 1,000 locations around the world. In this way, copies will be available long after SRI no longer distributes the report.

ERIC Journal Articles

Journal articles constitute about 60 percent of the ERIC database. Approximately 20,000 journal (EJ) records are added each year to the database, which contained more than 509,000 at the end of 1995. ERIC indexes more than 900 journals, some cover to cover and others on a more selective basis. ERIC Clearinghouses subscribe to the journals within their scope of interest areas, select the articles to be announced in ERIC, catalog and index them, and write brief annotations. ERIC journal resumes appear in the monthly

issues of Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), published by The Oryx Press, and in online and CD-ROM versions of the database.

More than 1,000 articles from TEACHING Exceptional Children have been indexed in the ERIC Jatabase.


ERIC Publications

Clearinghouse Publications

The ERIC Clearinghouses analyze and synthesize literature in their areas of expertise and create research reviews, bibliographies, state-of-the-art studies, interpretive studies of high-interest topics, digests, and other publications that meet the information needs of a wide spectrum of ERIC users.

Each year, the clearinghouses produce approximately 250 publications. These publications are noteworthy for the collabo-

rative ways in which they are produced, the extensive net-




Cooperative distribution efforts have expanded ERIC's outreach significantly. Clearinghouse publications are often reprinted entirely or in part for use in other education, teacher education, and research publications. The double benefit of these printings and reprintings by professional organizations is that they greatly boost dissemination at no extra cost to the clearinghouse. In 1995, other organizations distributed 627,489 copies of clearinghouse publications.

Systemwide Products

The ERIC Review

This free journal reports critical trends and issues in education as well as new ERIC developments. Recent issues covered school-to-work transition, K-12 computer networking, systemic education reform, professional development, and performance-based assessment. Future issues are scheduled to include inclusive schools and education dissemination (ERIC's special 30th anniversary issue). The ERIC

Review is distributed to nearly 20,000 subscribers as well as to targeted audiences interested in each issue's theme. Copies are also distributed at conferences, shipped in bulk for training purposes, and mailed to individuals and groups requesting copies.



Parent Brochures

ERIC is keeping pace with the increasing emphasis on the role of parents in their children's education. ACCESS ERIC collaborates with the clearinghouses and their network of experts to produce a popular series of brochures for parents. These easy-to-read brochures always refer parents to organizations and publications that provide further information on the topics. New titles are announced to a mailing list of more than 8,000 parents, parent educators, counselors, and other interested audiences. In 1995, more than 80,000 Parent Brochures were distributed. They are also available in full text on computer networks, including ERIC's National Parent Information Network, America Online, and CompuServe.



Products About ERIC

ERIC produces a wide array of brochures, newsletters, booklets, and indexes that introduce individuals and organizations to the resources of the ERIC system and assist them in their search for education information. More than 194,000 systemwide products were distributed in 1995. These products include:

 All About ERIC—a 40-page booklet that introduces users to the ERIC system. It includes an ERIC system directory of addresses and phone numbers and a section that instructs libraries and resource center staff on how their patrons can access ERIC.

 A Pocket Guide to ERIC—an 18-page, pocket-size booklet that briefly describes the ERIC system, its services, and products.

 ERIC Users' Interchange—a semiannual newsletter for librarians and ERIC Resource Collection providers.

The ERIC Processing and Reference Facility produces systemwide support products such as processing manuals, bibliographies, indexes, directories, and ready references. ERIC Ready References are brief handouts—usually one page—on database-related information users need. Other helpful Facility publications include ERIC Clearinghouse Publications 1995;

The Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC): An Annotated Bibliography of Documents and Journal Articles About ERIC; and ERIC Acquisitions Arrangements.



ACCESS ERIC also produces reference and referral publications. Copies are requested each year by libraries, academic institutions, state and local departments of education, and other groups and individuals. In addition, they will soon be searchable on the Internet and commercial computer networks.

ERIC is accessible from virtually anywhere in the world.

Anyone with Internet access can search the ERIC database, send e-mail to ERIC Clearinghouses, and receive specialized

resources from information-rich ERIC Web and Gopher sites. Access to ERIC does not require computers and modems, however. Every ERIC component has a toll-free phone number, and ERIC staff answer more than 50,000 calls and 80,000 letters each year.

Four online database vendors and six CD-ROM producers offer electronic access to ERIC. Listed on this page are some of the more than 1,000 libraries and information centers in 27 countries around the world that make ERIC available to millions of users. At these locations anyone interested in education can search the ERIC database and find complete copies of ERIC documents in the ERIC microfiche collection. Tom Robinson, an education librarian from the University of Windsor in Canada, expressed it this way: "ERIC is a most valuable resource, not only to the education community worldwide, but to other disciplines within the academic community. ERIC has done an excellent job of bringing current research information from a wide spectrum to an international audience."

The ERIC Mission Statement on the inside cover of this report conveys the broad and diverse audience of ERIC

users and the goal of providing easy and affordable access to ERIC resources for this global audience. The Internet has been an ideal vehicle for expanding ERIC's availability to busy students, parents, and professionals.

ERIC first appeared on the Internet in 1992 when the ERIC Clearinghouse on Information & Technology introduced AskERIC—an electronic question-answering service and virtual library. Today there are 30 ERIC Internet sites, all linked by one systemwide site run by ACCESS ERIC (http://www.aspensys.com/eric).

Users now turn to ERIC Internet sites more than 300,000 times each week to access resources including:

- · full-text materials for parents from a variety of organizations




ERIC Digests






The ERIC Budget

The ERIC system was reauthorized in 1994 as part of the Educational Research, Development, Dissemination, and Improvement Act.

The ERIC budget for fiscal year 1996 is \$9 million. These funds are allocated as follows:


- 80% to the 16 ERIC Clearinghouses
- 17% to the support components (ACCESS ERIC, the ERIC Processing and Reference Facility, and the ERIC Document Reproduction Service)
- 3% for printing of ERIC publications by the Government Printing Office, toll-free FTS phone lines, and computer systems



- Database Development 29% acquiring, selecting, cataloging, abstracting, and indexing documents and articles for the ERIC database
- Clearinghouse Management 18% covering day-to-day operating costs including salaries, supplies, and overhead
- Publications 16%
 producing ERIC Digests, major publications, bibliographies,
 newsletters, and journal columns
- User Services 12%
 responding to e-mail, phone calls, letters, and visitors who request information
- System Improvements and Enhancements 11% incorporating into the ERIC system advances in computers, telecommunications, storage and retrieval technology, and information policies; and assessing the use and quality of ERIC products and services
- Outreach and Training 10% giving workshops, exhibits, and presentations on ERIC
- Travel and Per Diem 4% traveling to ERIC system meetings for directors and technical staff and outreach and training events

The ERIC budget is only a small part of the network of funding that ultimately makes ERIC accessible to millions of users. This network also includes:

- ERIC components' host organizations, which traditionally contribute in-kind resources amounting to approximately 12 percent of the total ERIC budget.
- Private companies and nonprofits that produce and sell the ERIC Thesaurus, Current Index to Journals in Education, ERIC documents on microfiche, and the ERIC database on CD-ROM. They provide funding for the Adjunct ERIC Clearinghouses and contribute high-tech equipment to support ERIC system enhancements.
- University and public libraries that purchase the ERIC indexes. They pay for access to
 the ERIC database on magnetic tape, on CD-ROM, and from online vendors. They also
 purchase the ERIC microfiche collections and pay for computers, microfiche cabinets, and
 staff to bring ERIC to their customers.


