ABSTRACT

Drug Data Sources

Under the Drug Use Forecasting program of the National Institute of Justice, cofunded by the Bureau of Justice Assistance, NCJRS coordinates the collection of recent drug use information. The program collects data and measures drug use among arrestees primarily charged with nondrug offenses in 24 cities across the country. Arrestees are charted by age, sex, race, type of drug use, frequency of use, and other diagnostic/demographic factors. Quarterly and annual reports are issued.

The CDC National AIDS Clearinghouse Funding Database

The Clearinghouse collects funding information relating to HIV infection and AIDS from a broad spectrum of organizations that serve different populations affected by the disease. This information is organized in the Funding Database, which provides detailed information on public and private sources of funding for HIV programs. The data base is intended to be used as a starting point for people seeking funds or support for HIV/AIDS education, prevention, social/support services, and information dissemination.

U.S. Department of Education

The Department supports a comprehensive range of discretionary grant programs for drug education and prevention. Program priorities and eligible applicants, which vary for each competition, are given in the Combined Application Notice published in the *Federal Register* each year, usually in the fall. Federal Activities Grants

Supports the development, implementation, dissemination, and evaluation of educational strategies and programs for drug and alcohol abuse education and prevention.

Emergency Grants

Provides funds to local educational agencies that demonstrate a special need for additional assistance

in combatting drug and alcohol abuse. Local educational agencies compete for funding to support a single program which will pull together a comprehensive range of services, including counseling programs, after-school programs, programs for parents, and community outreach efforts.

School Personnel Training Grants

Two discretionary grant competitions provide funds to establish, expand, or enhance programs to train the wide variety of school personnel in the area of drug prevention.

Grants for Institutions of Higher Education

Six discretionary grant programs are operated by the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education to support drug prevention efforts at institutions of higher education for students on campus.

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

Public and Indian Housing Drug Elimination Program (PHDEP)

U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs

The U.S. Department of Justice funds research and evaluation studies in specified priority areas established annually. The National Criminal Justice Reference Service maintains the Federal Criminal Justice Data Base which contains descriptions of inprogress or recently completed Federal criminal justice research. The data base contains specific information, regularly updated, on approximately 1,800 individual research projects sponsored by the National Institute of Justice and other Department of Justice agencies. It also contains a limited number of related projects sponsored by other Federal agencies.

Each data base entry includes the nature of the research, the sponsoring agency, recipient organization, project begin and end dates, and citations of final reports, and other literature resulting from the project.

Additionally, each of the five Office of Justice Programs agencies (the National Institute of Justice, the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the Office for Victims of Crime, and the Bureau of Justice Assistance) produces an annual program plan outlining the Agency's research and evaluation priorities for the coming year. These priorities are responsive to the objectives and goals of the National Drug Control Strategy and the needs of State and local criminal justice agencies.
