### **ABSTRACT**

Consisting primarily of charts and tables, this report provides historical data on student enrollment, college staff, and the budget at California's College of the Canyons, focusing primarily on the period from 1991 to 1995. The first section provides tables on student enrollment, including total headcount; enrollment by full-/part-time status, age, gender, ethnicity, and admission status (i.e., first-time, transfer, returning, etc.); day/evening enrollment; grades awarded; degrees and certificates awarded; and transfer students by receiving institution. The second section describes college personnel, including employees by job classification, growth in full-time equivalent faculty from 1986 to 1995, the college workforce by gender and ethnicity, and new hires by ethnicity from July 1993 to May 1996. The final section provides budget data for 1994-95 and 1995-96, including the total budget, unrestricted general fund revenue, unrestricted general fund expenditures, restricted general fund revenues, and expenditures by activity for 1989-90 to 1994-95. Highlights of the report include: (1) enrollment at the end of fall 1995 was 6,340, up from 6,157 at the end of fall 1994; (2) from fall 1991 to fall 1995, Native American enrollment increased 71.1%, while Latino enrollment increased 46.4%, Asian American enrollment increased 13.3%, African American enrollment increased 8.7%, and White enrollment decreased 12.9%; (3) from fall 1991 to fall 1995 there was a 106.6% increase in the number of failing grades awarded; (4) 9 of the 17 new hires from July 1993 to May 1996 were members of ethnic minority groups; and (5) the District's 1995-96 total budget was \$36,815,457. 

# ENROLLMENT TRENDS

Overall, there was a 3.0 percent decrease in enrollment from Fall 1991 to Fall 1995. In the five-year period, Term End enrollment peaked in Fall 1992 at 6,670 students and then went down to 6,157 students in Fall 1994 after the Northridge earthquake. It should be noted that the Northridge earthquake of January 1994 and the damage it inflicted on many homes and businesses in the Santa Clarita Valley continued to effect enrollment in Fall 1994 - only seven months later. The 3.0 percent increase in enrollment from Fall 1994 to Fall 1995 shows some recovery.



# ENROLLMENT TRENDS BY FULL-TIME/PART-TIME STATUS

In the five-year period from Fall 1991 to Fall 1995, while overall enrollment decreased by 3.0 percent, enrollment of part-time students decreased 6.2 percent and full-time enrollment increased by 4.7 percent.

# ENROLLMENT TRENDS BY AGE GROUPS

In the five-year period from Fall 1991 to Fall 1995, enrollment of older students (age 25 or more) nearly mirrored the variations of the total student enrollment. The older student population peaked in Fall 1992 with 2,903 students and decreased to a low of 2,488 students in Fall 1994, after the earthquake. The major difference was in the increase in enrollment from Fall 1994 to Fall 1995. While overall enrollment increased by 3.0 percent, enrollment of older students increased by 6.8 percent. Some of this five-year variation can be attributed to the imposition of the higher fee of \$50 per unit on courses taken by students who already held a baccalaureate degree or higher in Spring 1993 and some can be attributed to the problems associated with the Northridge earthquake (January 1994).

Of particular note is the steadily increasing proportion of the student body being made up of the "Less than 20" age group. While they represented 26.3 percent of the student body in Fall 1991, the percentage grew to 29.3 percent in Fall 1995.



# ENROLLMENT TRENDS BY GENDER

In the five-year period from Fall 1991 to Fall 1995, enrollment of female students stayed about the same while male enrollment decreased. While total enrollment decreased by 3.0 percent, male enrollment decreased by 8.6 percent and female enrollment increased by 1.5 percent. This meant that females made up a larger percentage of the student body in Fall 1995 than in Fall 1991 (58.5% versus 55.9%). Statewide community college enrollment also shows a larger proportion of female enrollment.



# ENROLLMENT TRENDS BY RACIAL/ETHNIC GROUPS

In the five-year period from Fall 1991 to Fall 1995, enrollment of racial/ethnic minority students increased while White student enrollment decreased. While non-White students made up 22.7 percent of the student body in Fall 1991, the percentage increased to 30.6 in Fall 1995. Latino/ Hispanic students continued to comprise the largest minority group. The group increased by 46.4 percent from Fall 1991 to Fall 1995.

while the two categories of "first-time students" decreased. Continuing student enrollment remained about the same. Enrollment increase is evident for "returning students" (+29.5%) and for "returning transfers" (+16.8%). Enrollment decreases are evident for "first time transfers" While overall enrollment decreased by 3.0 percent from Fall 1991 to Fall 1995, the enrollment of two categories of "returning students" increased (-26.7%) and for "first time college students" (-6.6%).

# WSCH BY DAY/EVENING ENROLLMENT

Weekly Student Contact Hours (WSCH) describes student attendance during a one-week period. More specifically, it represents the total number of hours that all students spend in all classes during the first census week of the semester. It is calculated by multiplying the total number of students enrolled in a class by the number of hours the class meets per week. For example, a course with 25 students enrolled at the time of the first census which meets for one hour on Monday, Wednesday and Friday would generate a WSCH of 75 (25 students x 3 hours per week).

The table shows that the WSCH generated by all classes as of first census slightly increased from 53,015.3 in Fall 1991 to 54,580.2 in Fall 1995, an increase of 3.0 percent. Evening WSCH decreased from 18,276.2 in Fall 1991 to 17,884.6 in Fall 1995, a decrease of 2.1 percent. WSCH generated by day classes increased by 4.7 percent during this time period and, in Fall 1995, represented 2/3 of the total WSCH.

At the same time, there was a 106.6 percent increase in the number of failing grades awarded and a 28.6 percent decrease in the number of From Fall 1991 to Fall 1995 there was a 2.0 percent increase in the number of passing grades awarded (grades of "A", "B", "C", "D", and Credit). withdrawals. The most dramatic changes are evident after the drop deadline was changed to an earlier date in the semester. The new drop deadline was first in effect in Fall 1993. The number of withdrawals decreased and the number of failing grades increased with the earlier drop deadline. In comparing Fall 1992 to Fall 1993, there was a 45.8 percent increase in the number of failing grades and 32.0 percent decrease in withdrawals. There was also a small 2.1 percent increase in the number of passing grades.






# DISTRICT EMPLOYEES BY JOB CLASSIFICATION FALL 1985 TO FALL 1995

The total number of employees has increased steadily since the college opened in 1969. From its initial student body of 735 and a full-time staff of about 30, the college has increased to a student body of 6,200 and a full-time staff of 171 in Fall 1995.

With one exception, the chart and table show the steady increase in positions by category since Fall 1985. One new category appears, that of classified managers, which now accounts for 11 full-time employees. By combining the two classified categories, full-time classified staff show a 27.4 percent increase since Fall 1985. Full-time faculty show a slightly larger increase at 34.6 percent, while the administration remains at the same level as Fall 1985. The largest increase is evident in the number of adjunct or part-time faculty

positions, an increase of 144.9 percent.





# GROWTH IN FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT FACULTY

Full-Time Equivalent Faculty (FTEF) - Each course taught at College of the Canyons is assigned a teaching load depending on the number of hours the class meets and whether it is lecture and/or laboratory. A faculty member's teaching load is determined by adding all the loads for each class s/he teaches. One example of a full-time teaching load for one semester is 15 lecture hours. Full-Time Equivalent Faculty (FTEF) is the number of faculty that would be needed to teach all the classes for a given semester if each faculty member were assigned a full load.

This chart and table show that the FTEF generated by full-time faculty grew from 42.2410 in Fall 1986 to 50.7239 in Fall 1995, an increase of 20.1 percent. At the same time, the FTEF generated by adjunct faculty increased by 101.1 percent. While no overtime FTEF was reported in Fall 1986, by Fall 1995 it had grown to 17.9881 -- nearly 14 percent of the total FTEF.



### WORKFORCE BY GENDER

Females made up 56 percent of the District staff in Fall 1995, accounting for 201 of the 362 total employees. Within each job category, females were well represented, with the exception of administration, where only two of eight, or 25%, were female. The highest percentage of females (67%) is found in the classified staff. This is partially due to the number of traditionally female positions in the clerical category; however, females were also well-represented in the technical and paraprofessional categories. Only maintenance and operations had low female representation. Half of the full-time faculty were female, which is particularly noteworthy since the State average is in the mid to high 30's.

# WORKFORCE BY ETHNICITY

Fifty of the 362 members of the college workforce, or 14.8 percent, were ethnic minorities, with Latinos/ Hispanics accounting for over half of this group. Full-time and part-time faculty had the smallest minority representations (92.9% and 88.5% White, respectively). Full-time classified staff had the largest portion of minorities among their staff of 82 (24.4%).

### College of the Canyons Workforce by Ethnicity Fall 1995



# NEW HIRES BY ETHNICITY

Seventeen (17) full-time employees were hired by the college from July 1993 to May 1996, a 35-month period. Of those, 12 were classified staff, 2 were full-time faculty, 2 were administrators, and one was a classified manager. Nine of the 17 "new hires" were members of ethnic minority groups (1 American Indian, 1 African American, and 7 Latino/Hispanics) while the rest were White.

# TOTAL BUDGET

The income for the construction of the library and fine/applied arts buildings account for the major increase in the total college budget adopted for 1995-96. A drop in federal revenue and a lower Beginning Fund Balance accounted for the decrease in unrestricted general fund revenue from 1994-95.

# EXPENDITURES BY ACTIVITY

Each year, the Business Office provides a report to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office about college expenditures by major categories. Included within each category are expenditures for salaries and benefits, operating expenses and capital outlay. The major categories are defined below:

- Instruction includes credit instructional activities and course and curriculum development
- Instructional Support Services includes expenditures for the learning center, library and media operation
- Student Services includes expenditures for admissions and records, counseling and guidance, financial aid, health services, job placement, student personnel administration and other student services
- Maintenance and Operations includes building and maintenance repairs, custodial services, grounds maintenance and repairs utilities and other M&O expenses
- Institutional Support Services includes expenditures for fiscal operations, general administrative services, logistical services, staff services and non-instructional staff retirees' benefits and retirement incentives
- Other includes expenditures for planning and policy-making, community services, ancillary services (bookstore, student and cocurricular activities) and auxiliary operations
