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ABSTRACT

As part of a nationwide effort to highlight the well-being of children in every state, Texas Kids Count is building a comprehensive database of indicators of child well-being to be used to produce annual data books and other analyses on the status of children in Texas. This report presents, county by county, data on several child well-being indicators. Following a foreword, the report presents an overview and findings, and county indicator maps for the following indicators: (1) percent low birthweight babies; (2) infant mortality rate; (3) child death rate; (4) percent of all births that are to single teens; (5) juvenile violent crime arrest rate; (6) teen violent death rate; (7) percent teens not in school and not high school graduates; (8) percent teens not in school and not in the labor force; (9) percent children in poverty; (10) percent children in single parent families; (11) unemployment rate; and (12) median household income. The bulk of the report presents fact sheets for each county detailing the above-listed indicators. Three appendices contain county rankings, data descriptions and sources, and federal poverty guidelines. (AMC)

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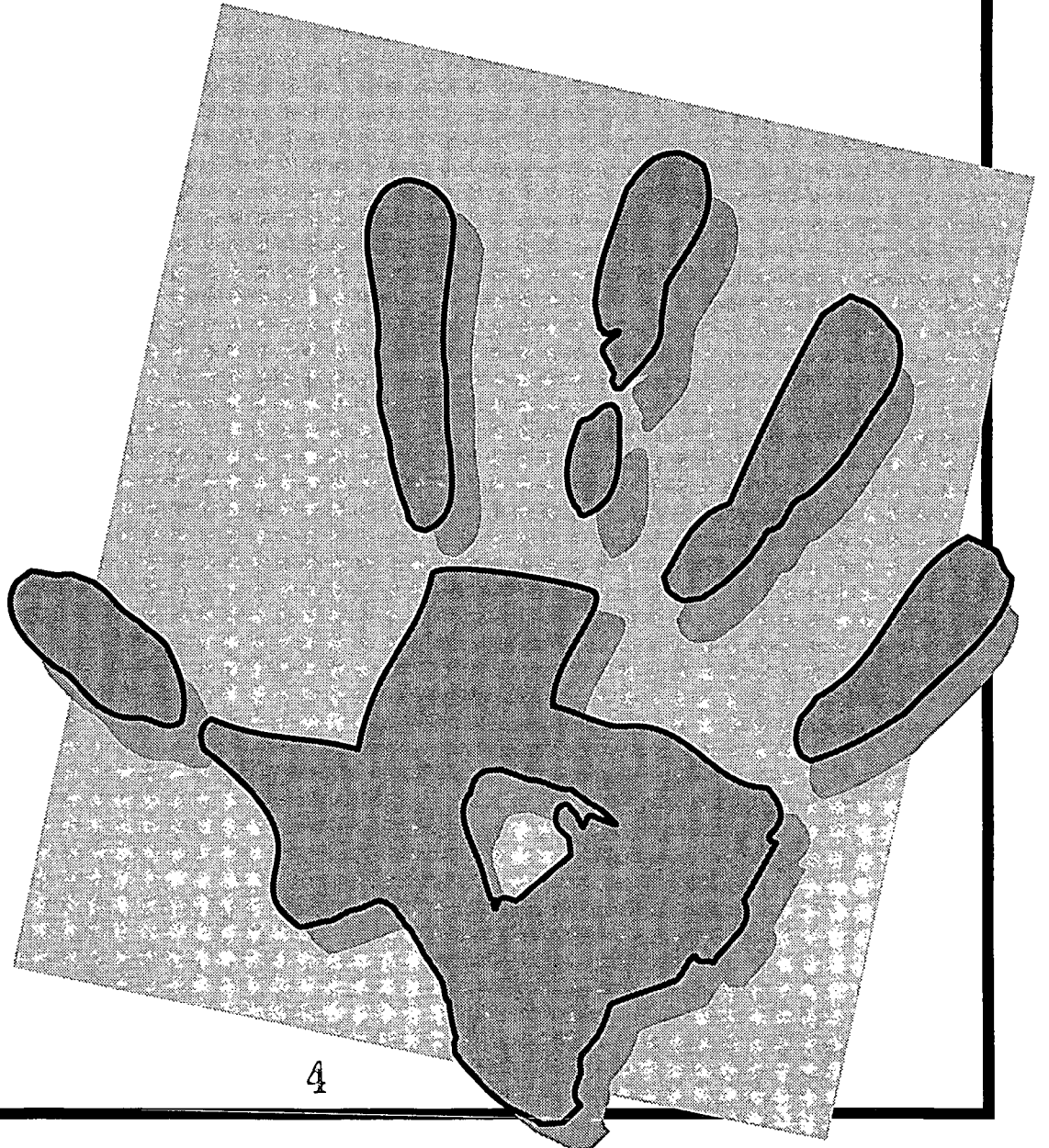

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Foreword

The State of Texas Children 1994 is the second county-by-county fact book published by the Center for Public Policy Priorities and the Children's Defense Fund-Texas (CDF-Tx). The annual publication of this fact book is now part of the Texas Kids Count Project, a joint effort of the Center and CDF-Tx. Texas Kids Count is building a database of information on the status of children for every county in Texas and is part of a national effort to provide relevant data on children for every county in the United States. The University of Texas School of Social Work in Austin is a research partner in the project and is the repository of this database. In addition to annual fact books, the project is producing special reports and selected research papers on various aspects of child well-being. The first special report, on the status of Hispanic children, is nearing completion and research is beginning for a report on African-American children, and for a report on child death rates. It is the hope of the Texas Kids Count partners that the information in these reports will be a catalyst for change on behalf of Texas' children. State policymakers, community leaders and individual citizens should view the picture of childhood presented in this fact book as a call to action. Too many of our children are living lives constrained by poverty, limited by poor education, and threatened by violence. We cannot afford to allow these trends to continue.

Overview and Findings

The data presented in this book are selected to provide an indication of the well-being of Texas children. From infant mortality to teen violent death they present a snapshot of the status of children through critical stages in their lives. The issues profiled by these statistics impact the quality of life for children, their families, and their communities. While the individual indicators are noteworthy in and of themselves, they also reflect other concerns. Increases in infant mortality or low birthweight in a particular county should be cause for a review of the accessibility and availability of prenatal care. Child poverty rates, median incomes and unemployment rates provide insight into the economic health of communities and the disparities in resources and opportunities for certain populations. Increases in teen violent deaths or juvenile violent crime arrest rates should focus attention on strategies for working with youth. Community leaders and policymakers can use this data to assess the current needs of children, and to review the positive or negative trends in particular issues. Additionally, the data provide an opportunity to compare the status of children from county to county. Taken together, these indicators are a measure not only of child well-being in Texas but of the health, safety and security of our communities.

Many children in Texas grow up in secure communities and supportive families, never finding themselves on the negative side of the indicators presented in this book. In fact, the data show a broad range of both positive and negative realities for children among Texas' 254 counties. In five out of the ten categories presented here, more counties exhibited improvements than did not. However, an equal number of indicators showed more counties worse off over the time period analyzed, and those trends were much sharper and more pronounced than the indicators that showed progress. While some improvement can be noted, the overall trends are very disturbing. Texas has the second largest population of children in the country, and, of the five most populous states, has the highest proportion of its population under 18 years of age. Thus, the impact of negative conditions for children in this state carries a social and economic cost greater than for many other states. The current status of children in Texas presents a serious challenge to the programs and policies designed to serve them and their families.

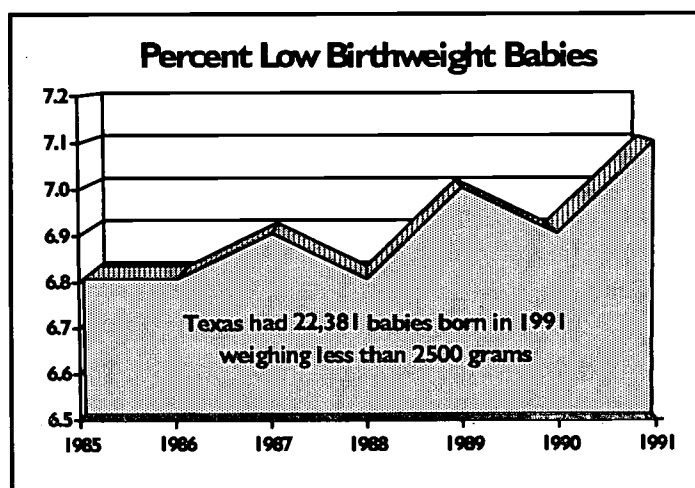
While the following sections will provide an overview of the findings in each of the ten core indicators, there are some general trends and comparisons for the entire state that must be noted. Particularly troubling is a child poverty rate that continues to worsen while the nation as a whole has shown improvement. The ramifications of this trend are serious. While the state's economy as a whole has shown a resurgence over recent years, it is clear that many young families, particularly minority families, or those who reside in counties along the Texas/Mexico border have not been carried along by renewed economic growth and expansion. Texas ranks 38th nationally in median income for families with children. Without specific initiatives to improve education and job training opportunities the state is in danger of creating families — indeed whole communities — who will be locked out of an increasingly competitive economy.

Juvenile violent crime has gained heightened attention over the past several years, and the statistics in this book bear out the cause for concern. While the national juvenile violent crime arrest rate climbed by 50%, Texas nearly doubled that rate of change with an increase of 99.7%. Only 62 counties in the entire state saw a reduction in juvenile violent crime arrests between 1985 and 1991. Nine counties saw their arrest rate more than quadruple. While this issue has garnered the deserved attention of policymakers, community leaders and the media, the rush to a punitive response to the problem should be tempered with a clear understanding of the data and equal attention to the causes of these disturbing trends.

A final point must be made about the data presented here. While many counties will find themselves with various positive and negative trends in these indicators, there are a number of counties whose data indicate children at severe risk. Even on those indicators where the state as a whole has shown some improvement, there are cohorts of counties who are four, five, or six times worse than the state median for that indicator. The communities profiled by these numbers exhibit a growing disparity of conditions for children in Texas. Increasingly this disparity is marked by its ethnicity and geography. Many African-American and Hispanic children in Texas experience much higher rates of poverty and much lower graduation rates. Counties along the Texas/Mexico border, with large percentages of Hispanic children, fall in the lower quartiles of most indicators. While some communities may take heart in the apparent well-being of their own children, the lives of their children are ultimately tied to the status of children throughout the state. Our economy, our schools, our safety, and our health are interconnected with all families and children throughout Texas.

Low Birthweight Babies

In 1991, more than 22,000 Texas babies (7.1 percent of all live births) were born weighing less than 2,500 grams (5 pounds, 8 ounces). This rate is up from 6.8 percent in 1985. In twenty-five Texas counties more than 10% of the live births fit this low weight definition. Five of those counties were more than double the state percentage. Even more alarming is the fact that 134 counties experienced an increase in low birthweight babies between 1985 and 1991. Of those counties, 16 worsened by more than 100%. The percent of low birth weight babies increased in three of the most populous counties — Dallas, El Paso and Harris. Ninety-nine counties in Texas showed decreases.



The incidence of low birthweight babies in Texas and the numerous counties with increases in these numbers between 1985 and 1991 raises serious concerns about the health of the mothers of these children and the prenatal care received, or not received, during pregnancy. In 1991, Texas ranked 49th nationally in the percent of births to women receiving early prenatal care.ⁱ It is clear that without adequate prenatal care infants are at higher risk of being premature and low birthweight. Both premature and low birthweight babies are more likely to suffer severe developmental delays or congenital anomalies.ⁱⁱ While inadequate access to health care may be one factor in this problem, the lack of health insurance certainly exacerbates the issue. As one indication of this problem, in 1991, Texas ranked last in the country in the percent of its children covered by health insurance.ⁱⁱⁱ

Infant Mortality Rate

Infant mortality is one of the few areas in which Texas saw improvement above the national trends. Between 1985 and 1991 the infant mortality rate decreased from 9.8 to 7.7 per 1,000 live births, a positive change of 21%. One hundred thirty-one counties showed improvement in this category, including all of the six most populous counties (Bexar, El Paso, Dallas, Harris, Tarrant and Travis).

The overall decrease in infant mortality may be partially attributed to new advances in the technology for treating newborns and to intensive public education on such issues as sudden infant death syndrome and other newborn risk factors. However, the chart below displays a shift in the causes of infant death that deserves attention.

Between 1985 and 1991, the rate of deaths caused by accident decreased slightly (10%), while infant homicide increased by 37.5%. These numbers correspond with

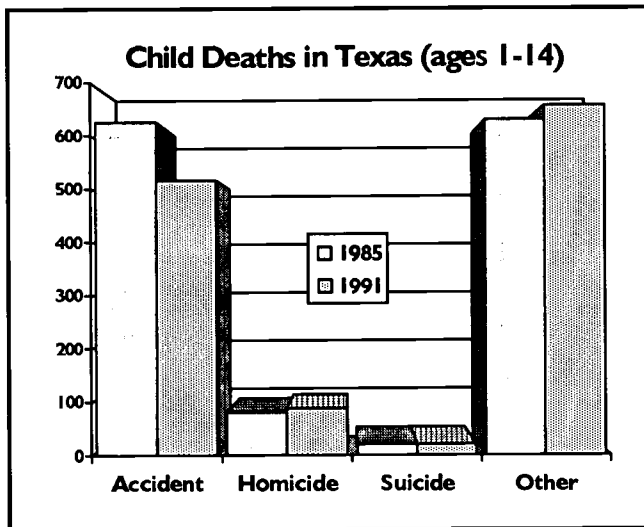
increases in the rates of child abuse and neglect and support the need for more attention to child deaths. Current efforts to initiate child death review teams throughout the state are a good beginning.

While overall improvements in infant mortality are encouraging, the headway has not been consistent statewide. In fact, infant mortality experienced dramatic setbacks in individual counties. Between 1985 and 1991 infant mortality increased in sixty-eight counties. During this same period the rates in twenty-one counties worsened by more than 100%. In 1991, thirty-two counties had infant mortality rates of 15.8 or higher — more than twice the state rate.

Child Death Rate

Child death rate is another area in which Texas has shown some overall improvement — decreasing by almost 13% — which parallels the national trend. In a pattern similar to that of infant mortality, accidental deaths have declined while other causes have increased. Most notable is the increase in homicides. The numbers indicate some success in accident prevention and a need to focus attention on the causes of violent death for this age group. As with infant deaths, the shift in causes of death toward homicides implies the need for more aggressive measures to prevent child abuse and intervene when children are at risk of abuse or neglect.

Between 1985 and 1991, one hundred twenty-four counties improved their child death rates while 48 worsened. Six counties experienced a troubling three-fold increase. In 1991, forty-six counties had child death rates above 50 per 100,000 children and 28 counties had rates more than double the state average. Little comfort can be taken from overall improvements in child death when so many counties are experiencing opposite trends, and the violent deaths statewide are actually increasing.

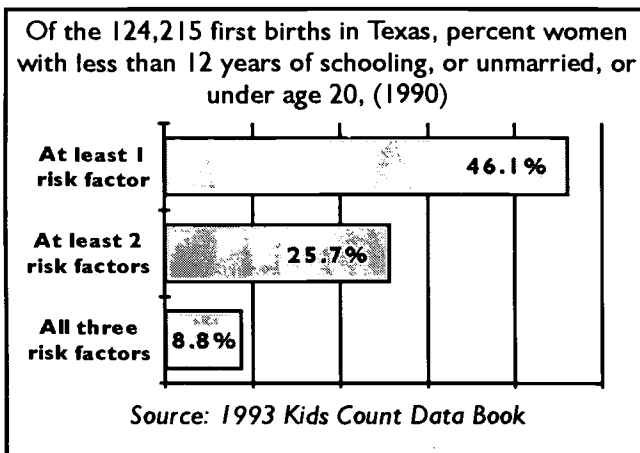
Births to Single Teens

In 1991, 6.3% of all births in Texas were to single teens between the ages of 13 and 19 (19,948 births). Births to girls less than 15 years — not yet old enough to drive — totaled 824, and 36 children were born to girls 12 and under. While the percent of births to single teens in Texas has remained relatively constant between 1985 and 1991, the nation as a whole experienced a 20% increase for the same time period. One caution about Texas specific data should be noted here. Texas is one of only five states in the country with no specific “marital status” question on its birth certificates. Therefore, marital status is inferred from other paternity information, making it difficult to compare Texas numbers directly to other states.

One hundred forty counties experienced a rise in births to single teens between 1985 and 1991. During that period 29 counties saw the teen birth rate at least double. Of those, ten increased by more than 300%. While the state percent of births to single teens stood at 6.3 in 1991, twenty-three counties saw rates higher than 10%.

Studies have shown that adolescent parents are especially prone to problems of low self-esteem and are unlikely to have learned appropriate parenting skills. In a 1991 *American Prospect* article, Princeton sociologist Kristen Luker observed:

“Two kinds of background factors influence which teens are likely to become pregnant and give birth outside of marriage. First is inherited disadvantage. Young women from families that are poor, or rural, or from a disadvantaged minority are more likely to be teen mothers than their counterparts from more privileged backgrounds. Yet young mothers are not just disadvantaged; they are also discouraged. Studies suggest that a young woman who has other troubles — who is not doing well in school, has lower ‘measured ability,’ and lacks aspirations for herself — is also at risk of becoming a teenage mother.”^{iv}

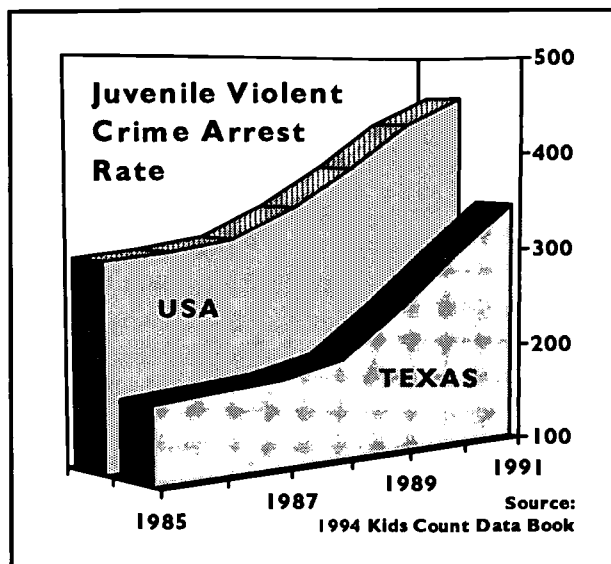


Early childbearing is associated with a number of adverse outcomes for both the mother and child. Teen mothers are more likely to be poor, isolated from peers, and undereducated. Children of adolescent mothers score lower on standardized tests of language and intellectual functioning. They are more likely to exhibit behavior problems, ranging from hyperactivity to poor impulse control.^v

The combination of these factors is a recipe for life at the margins. Many of these parents will be ill-prepared to compete in an economy that is increasingly demanding. In Texas, job training and other support services such as child care, which can help teen mothers become self-sufficient, are desperately underfunded and characterized by long waiting lists. Recent welfare reform efforts at both the national and state level have focused attention on teen pregnancy and the increasing numbers of young single mothers receiving welfare benefits. As these initiatives move forward it is imperative that they avoid harming already impoverished families and find ways to provide adequate education, job training and support services so young parents can lift themselves and their children out of poverty. Expanded and improved efforts to prevent teen pregnancy must also be part of these strategies.

Juvenile Violent Crime Arrest Rate

Juvenile violent crime has become an issue of growing significance across the nation. Texas is no exception, and the state wide statistics generally justify the increased attention. Juvenile arrest rates have risen dramatically in recent years. In 1985, there were 3,584 violent crime arrests of juveniles for a rate of 173 per 100,000 youths. In 1991, there were 7,307 arrests, a rate of 346 arrests per 100,000 youths. While the 1985 rate was much lower than the national rate of 305, by 1991 Texas arrest rates had increased by 99.7% — nearly twice the rate of change observed nationally.



Ninety-seven Texas counties followed these trends and witnessed significant increases in juvenile violent crime arrests. Fifty-seven of these counties at least doubled their arrest rates between 1985 and 1991, while nine counties — Bastrop, Comal, Gonzales, Hood, Limestone, Milam, Nueces, Ochiltree and Red River — experienced more than a 500% jump in that period. While these are alarming increases, it is important to note that some of these counties went from a single arrest in 1985 to 11 or 12 in 1991 (see Appendix A). Also of interest are the 44 counties with no reportable arrest rates in 1985 who, by 1991, were also showing increases. In 1991, thirteen counties had juvenile crime arrest rates of over 500 arrests per 100,000 youths — or more than one arrest for every 200 youths. El Paso and Dallas counties had rates of 709.3 and 711.9 respectively and Robertson county experienced nearly one arrest for every 100 youths. Not every county experienced these negative numbers. Sixty two actually saw their juvenile violent crime arrest rates decrease.

While these trends are alarming, and an indication of a dramatic expansion of violence in the lives of our children, the data should be interpreted with care. Arrest rates are not only a reflection of increased delinquent behavior, they can also be influenced by changes in public policy. Where in the past the juvenile justice

system was more likely to use suspended sentences and probationary dispositions in the rehabilitation of youths, now the juvenile justice system is more likely to use punitive

responses. Arrest statistics are, in large part, a reflection of policing practices and often confuse information about the actual amount of crime. For example, if police arrest five juveniles in connection with a drive-by killing, this will appear in arrest statistics as five homicide arrests, not one murder.^{vi} Another caution in using the county level arrest rate data in this book relates to the actual number of arrests per county. Because the trend data is taken from only two years, those counties with small youth populations can experience dramatic rate changes with only a handful of arrests. (Refer to Appendix A for more details.)

Because the topic of juvenile violence has gained so much attention it has also become fertile ground for political rhetoric. While this is not unexpected, real danger exists as policymakers rush to action without a thoughtful review of all the facts. A recent report by the National Council on Crime and Delinquency entitled, "Images and Reality: Juvenile Crime, Youth Violence and Public Policy", provides excellent perspective on the characteristics of juvenile crime:

" Much of today's 'crisis' is based on the perception that youth violence has gotten much worse in recent years. The 10-year trend for arrests for violent crimes, however, does not suggest that youth violence is any more out of control today than it was a decade ago. In 1982, juveniles represented 17.2 percent of arrests for violent crimes, and by 1992 the proportions had increased by less than half of one percent to 17.5 percent.

While many lament the crisis of violence and juvenile crime, a closer look shows that recent increases in juvenile violent arrest rates are actually below historical trends. In fact, the proportion of all property, serious and violent crimes cleared by arrest of persons under 18 continues to be below levels reported in 1972. Based on these clearance data, it would appear that juveniles are arrested disproportionately for property offenses but are arrested for violent crimes at rates below the proportion of young people in the nation's population."^{vii}

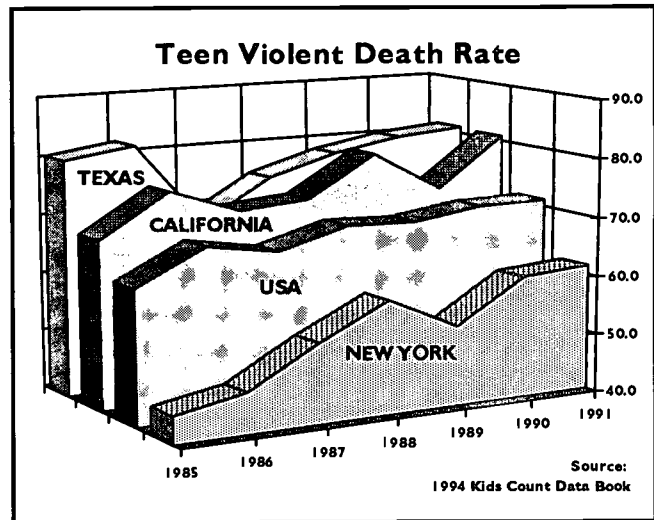
The current identification of juvenile crime as a critical social challenge is in large part related to a very real increase in violence among youth. There is no question that this is directly linked to the increased use of firearms by juveniles. In a recent survey of inner-city high schools, 22 percent of students reported that at some time in their lives they had possessed firearms. Eighty-two percent had possessed semiautomatic handguns and 27 percent had possessed military style assault rifles.^{viii}

As we struggle to come to terms with these alarming statistics it is important to remember that far more children are victims of crime than perpetrators. While the increases in juvenile violent crime arrest rates call for creative solutions, this measure should be only part of the information used to develop policies and programs to improve the safety of our children and our communities.

Teen Violent Death Rate

In 1991, more than 80 percent of all deaths to Texas teens 15-19 years were caused by suicide, homicide, or accident. From 1985 to 1991, the Texas teen violent death rate remained relatively constant. However, throughout that period, Texas rates remained slightly above California and well above both New York and the nation as a whole. While the national rate worsened by 13% to a 1991 level of 71.1 per 100,000, Texas' rate was 80.6 in that year.

Thirty two counties in Texas experienced teen violent death rates more than twice the state rate and 18 of those counties were actually more than three times the rate. Between 1985 and 1991, 49 counties saw their death rates increase while 104 improved. However, eleven counties worsened by more than 100. While the causes of these numbers must be reviewed carefully, the numbers of counties with above average death rates and the continually high statewide rates deserve attention.



It is worth noting that the increase in teen violent deaths, both in Texas and the nation, are occurring during a period when auto-related fatalities and other deaths by accident have decreased. This means that the increases are almost entirely attributable to a near doubling of teen homicides and an increase in suicides. Researchers point to handguns as an important factor in the rising teen violent death rate. According to the National Center for Health Statistics, teen boys in all racial and ethnic groups are more likely to die from gunshot wounds than from all natural causes combined. Between 1986 and 1992, the total number of children in the U.S. killed by firearms rose by 144 percent, compared to a 30 percent increase for adults.^{ix}

It is clear that these and most other causes of teen deaths are preventable. While in past decades most

adolescents died from natural causes, there has been a steady decline in the number of diseases and an increase in deaths through accident or intentional injury.^x The challenge for policymakers and communities is to catch up with these trends and begin to develop comprehensive strategies to address the array of serious risks facing teens. It is clear that these strategies must take clear aim at increased violence and access to firearms.

Percent of Teens not in School and not High School Graduates

While the national 1994 Kids Count Data Book used actual graduation rates as an indicator, it was not possible for this data book to present this for all counties in Texas. Problems with consistency in Texas' graduation statistics and changes in the collection of this data between 1985 and 1991 made it impossible to portray accurate graduation rates at a county level. The data presented here are obtained from 1990 Census statistics and indicate the number of teens 16-19 who are not in school and not high school graduates. The years that are used are 1980 and 1990. Because this number includes school-age teens it does not translate directly to actual graduation rates. However, it can provide an indication of the proportion of this age group who are either still in school or have successfully graduated. The Kids Count project is working closely with the Texas Education Agency (TEA) to collect and publish more accurate graduation rate information in future publications.

Educational attainment is an important indication of the preparation of youth for adulthood. While the state wide rate for this indicator has improved, as have a majority of individual counties, there are a number of counties whose rates indicate that a troubling portion of youth are not graduating on time, if at all. Forty-three counties experienced an increase in the number of youths 16-19 either not in school or not high school graduates. Of them, 8 worsened by more than 50%. While the state rate was 12.9% in 1990, 5 counties were more than double that percentage. It is apparent from the data that those counties with poor rates of high school graduates are also characterized by higher childhood poverty rates and higher unemployment. The disparity between affluent communities and impoverished ones reflects a trend that has serious implications for the ability of the state to prepare its citizens for an increasingly competitive economy. Meaningful job prospects are directly tied to education level and the acquiring of advanced skills and technical training.

Percent of Teens not in School and not in the Labor Force

According to the 1990 Census, 7.8 percent of 16 to 19-year-olds in Texas were not in school, not in the military and not in the labor force. This is a significant improvement from a decade earlier but still above the national average. One hundred ninety-two Texas counties improved in this category between 1980 and 1990. Fifty-six worsened. Of those that experienced a rise in the percentage of "idle teens", 16 counties more than doubled their 1980 percentage. This indicator often correlates with the general economic health of a community and many of these counties also experienced growth in poverty and high general unemployment during the same period.

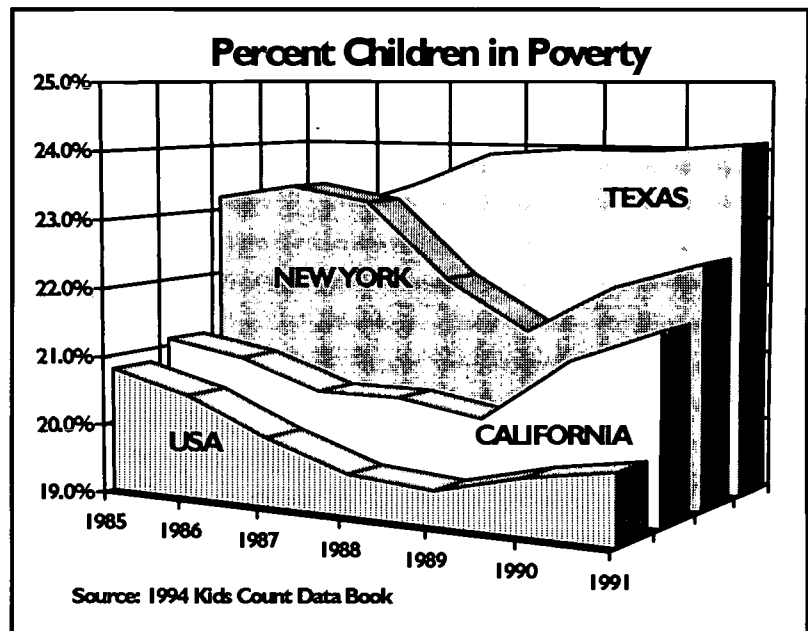
Though improvements in this indicator are encouraging, the numbers remain high and a large number of counties have not improved. The fact that large numbers of teens in Texas have no established employment or other productive role in their community is

cause for concern. Delinquency, economic instability and other risks for this group of teens are the obvious implications of these statistics. As the youth of Texas make the critical transition to adulthood and economic independence, communities must find ways to provide meaningful opportunities, ongoing education and other work experience to help them build for the future.

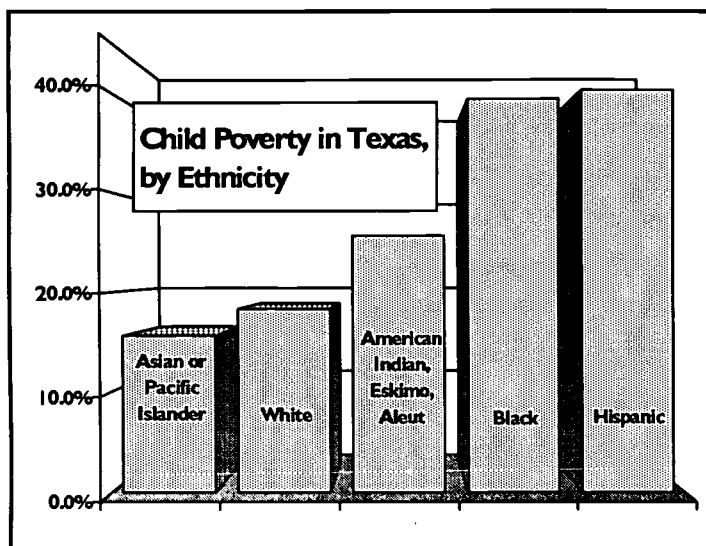
Percent Children in Poverty

Of all the statistics in this year's data book, those of child poverty are the most alarming. While the nation as a whole has experienced modest improvements in child poverty rates, Texas has continued to worsen. In 1990, 1.14 million Texas children lived in poverty. Between 1980 and 1990 child poverty in Texas rose from 18.7 percent to 24.0 percent, an increase of 28.3%. Between 1985 and 1991, while the national rate decreased by 4%, Texas child poverty increased 6%.

The implications of this continuing trend are serious and far-reaching. Childhood poverty is perhaps the single most important indicator of child well-being. Children raised in poverty are more likely to experience poor outcomes in health, emotional development, educational attainment and future economic security. A recent study noted that "poor children are more likely to be low height-for-age, low weight-for-height,



and to score poorly on indicators of cognitive and socioemotional development than middle- and upper-income children. Long term economic disadvantage is also associated with deficits in rates of growth in height."^{xi} The scale of this problem in Texas is startling. Nationally, Texas ranks 42nd among the states in childhood poverty and of its 254 counties, two hundred twenty-three experienced rising child poverty rates over the past decade. Fifteen counties more than doubled child poverty between 1980 and 1990. While the state rate shows nearly one in four children in poverty, many counties are considerably worse off. Fifty-seven counties have more than 1 in 3 of their children living in poverty and 11 counties have an astonishing one out of every two children poor. In 1990, four counties — Starr, Zavala, Dimmit and Maverick — had *median* household incomes actually below the poverty threshold for a family of four.

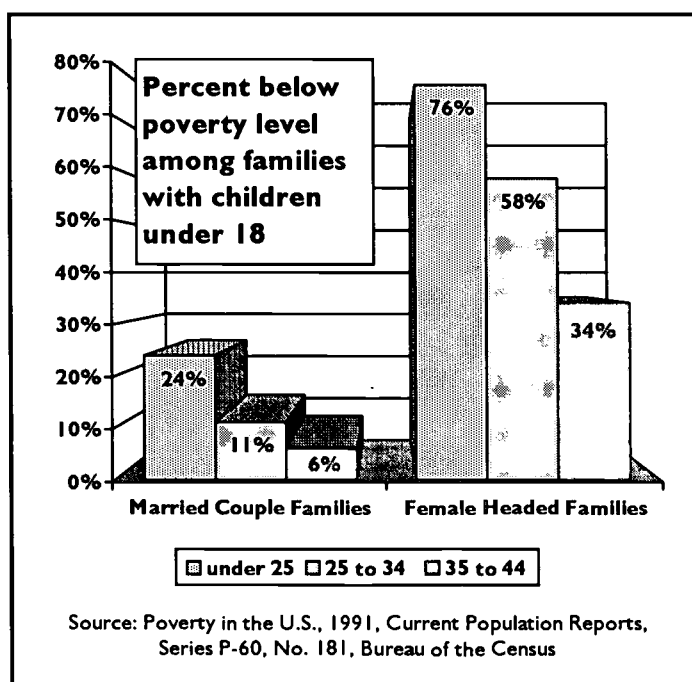


Other characteristics of child poverty in Texas deserve attention. Of all Hispanic children, fully 40% live in poverty. African-American children in Texas suffer a similar rate of 39%. Children of single-parent households are another group at risk, particularly those headed by women. One in two children in female-headed households live in poverty. Texas also experienced a disparity in poverty based on geography. Counties along the Texas-Mexico

border stand out as an entire region burdened by poverty. Of all border counties, only two do not fall in the lowest quartile of child poverty rates. Similar stratification is experienced in both median household income and unemployment (see: County Indicator Maps). Among all U.S. counties, Starr County has the fourth highest child poverty rate and Zavala ranks 13th.

Without a reversal of these trends, Texas' economic future stands at risk. Historic policies of neglect for poor families are in danger of leaving an entire segment of the population behind as the state races to catch the current economic wave of high tech industries and information age opportunities. In the midst of a growing national debate over welfare reform and the proper balance of support, incentives and limitations, Texas stands nearly alone at the bottom.

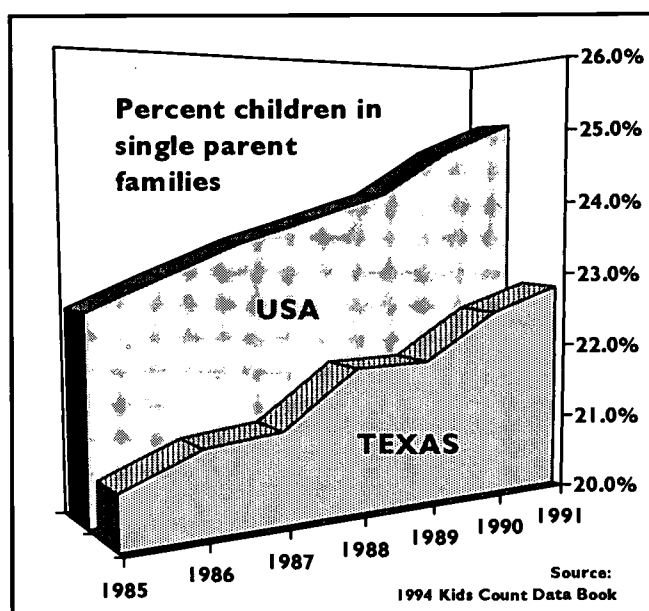
Our payments for the basic income support program, Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), rank 48th nationally. The combined value of AFDC and Food Stamps in Texas remains below 50% of the poverty level and the only state funded job training and education program for low-income families has been reduced to a level that threatens its effectiveness. If Texas is to reverse its rates of childhood poverty, and the concomitant economic and social costs, it must begin by investing more in its basic income supports and adequately supporting effective programs to build self-sufficiency.



Percent children in single parent families

Texas closely followed the national trend toward growing numbers of single parent families. The percentage of children in single parent families in Texas increased from 17.7 percent in 1980, to 18.3 percent in 1990. However, thirty-five counties had more than 20% — one in five — of their children in single parent homes. Five out of six of the major metropolitan counties — Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Harris, and Travis — had rates above the state average. Tarrant County had slightly less. Statewide, more than 885,000 children were living in homes with only one parent. Between 1980 and 1990 one hundred seventy-six counties experienced increases in the percentage of children in single parent homes. Of them, fifteen increased by more than 50%. Seventy-six counties saw reduced numbers.

These increases have real implications for child well-being, particularly for those households headed by women. Studies have shown that the incidence of poverty among female-headed families is approximately 7-8 times higher than poverty among married couple families.^{xii} Children in these households generally have fewer economic resources, often exacerbated by inadequate or non-existent child support. In 1991, only 29.7% of mother-headed families in Texas received child support or alimony.^{xiii}



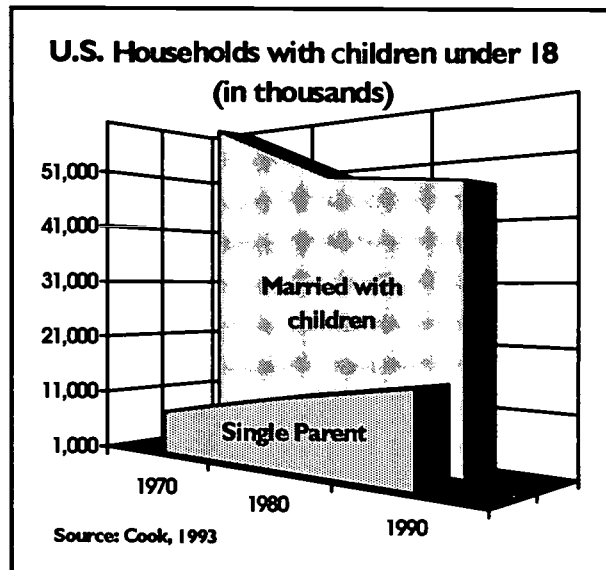
The increase in single-parent households is a result of both the rise in divorce rates and an increase in out-of-wedlock births. The expansion of out-of-wedlock childbearing has gained increased attention recently at both the national and state levels. While overall trends in out-of-wedlock childbearing are similar among all socioeconomic and ethnic groups, the recent public policy focus has been on these trends among poor women. The national welfare reform debate has broadened in recent months from a debate primarily about how best to move people from welfare to work to one that also includes discussion about the large numbers of children born outside of marriage. In recent testimony before the Subcommittee on Human Resources of the House Ways and means Committee, Robert Greenstein, executive director of the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities in Washington, D.C. made the following observations:

“Some would argue that welfare is the primary cause of the rise in births outside marriage, and propose eliminating all support for single-parent

families with children (or, in some cases, for families in which the children are born out-of-wedlock). Like the bulk of researchers in the field, however, I believe the research indicates that the story is far more complex — and in some ways quite different — than [they] portray it. Anyone concerned about the well-being of children must be deeply troubled by the increasing numbers of children born outside of marriage. And in dealing with this difficult question we must weigh the research in the area carefully. We must understand what it shows and be careful not to rush to embrace conclusions and policy prescriptions that are not supported by the weight of evidence.

The question of whether welfare is a major cause of the increase in out-of-wedlock births is not a new one. It has been studied extensively. Most studies find little relationship between welfare benefits and out-of-wedlock births. Robert Moffitt, a Brown University economist whose work is widely regarded by researchers of all viewpoints, last year published the results of an exhaustive review of the research on this issue. In a 1993 *Yale Law & Policy Review* article, Moffitt concluded: 'The research on this issue shows little relationship between illegitimacy or marriage and receipt of welfare benefits.'^{xiv}

Moffitt was joined recently by a group of 76 prominent researchers who work in the field of poverty, the labor market, and family structure. They issued a joint statement refuting the connection between welfare and out-of-wedlock births. In a state such as Texas, whose public benefits are so meager, the connection seems even less plausible. A more constructive response to this trend would be a closer examination of efforts to provide economic security for poor children in single parent families and for adequate enforcement and collection of child support payments.



Conclusion

It is easy to be discouraged by the information presented in these pages. Each number represents a child; each negative trend a story of young lives facing tough odds. It would be easy to despair and move on. The challenge is to use this information as a call to action and a tool for change. For far too long Texas has neglected the most vulnerable of its citizens. It is no accident that our children fare poorly in comparison to other states. While it is true that there are success stories in every community, they have occurred in the face of inadequate funding and a social safety net stretched beyond capacity. We live in a state that seems to value highways over education and prisons over a secure future for our children. Whether we act to change these priorities or not, the life of each child ripples outward and touches us all. The future of our state will only be as successful as the poorest child, only as bright as the least educated student, only as healthy as the tiniest infant...

Understanding the Data

While the technical descriptions and sources for the indicators used in this fact book are provided in Appendix B, there are some general clarifications and cautions to keep in mind when using the data from this publication.

Indicators

There are ten core indicators in this year's book. They are:

- Percent low birthweight babies, 1985/1991
- Infant mortality rate (per 1,000 live births), 1985/1991
- Child death rate, Ages 1-14 (per 100,000 children), 1985/1991
- Percent of all births to single teens, 1985,1991
- Juvenile violent crime arrest rate, Ages 15-19 (per 100,000 youths), 1985/1991
- Teen violent death rate, Ages 15-19 (per 100,000 teens), 1985/1991
- Percent teens not in school and not high school graduates, Ages 16-19, 1980/1990
- Percent teens not in school and not in the labor force, Ages 16-19, 1980/1990
- Percent children in poverty, 1980/1990
- Percent children in single parent families, 1980/1990

The data for these indicators is displayed in the 'Trend Data' columns on each county fact sheet. The data is provided for both of the comparison years and accompanied by the state data for each indicator. Calculations of the rate of change between the two years are presented in the chart titled 'Percent Change Over Time'. Again, state rates are also provided for comparison.

Additional data for each county is provided at the top of the fact sheet. They are;

- 1990 Total population
- 1990 Child population
- 1990 Child poverty rate (which corresponds to the percent of children in poverty in the charts mentioned above)
- 1990 Child poverty rates by ethnicity
- 1990 Unemployment rate
- 1990 Median household income

Comparison to the 1994 Kids Count Data Book

The data in this year's fact book have been selected to parallel the 1994 national Kids Count Data Book as closely as possible. The same ten core indicators are used in both books and similar trend analysis has been provided. The decision to present the data in this manner allows for the national book and this fact book to be used as companion pieces. In many cases it will be possible to compare individual counties, not only to each other, but to other states. Trend analysis is presented for the first time in this book. Data for each indicator is presented for two different years. In the case of

indicators that are based on Census data the years are 1980 and 1990, which differs from the national data book. All other indicators are analyzed from 1985 and 1991 data as does the 1994 Kids Count Data Book. This analysis allows county indicators to be viewed not only as single points in time but also the degree to which the indicators have improved or worsened over time. In some cases the statewide data calculated for this fact book differs from that published by the 1994 Kids Count Data Book. In most instances this is the result of differences in the years used, averaging of multiple years, different population estimates or different data sources.

General issues

There are several important characteristics of the data in this book that must be considered. The ten core indicators are a mixture of 'percentages' and 'rates'. Percentages reflect the proportion of the children in a particular county that meet the specifics of the individual indicator. For instance, the percent of children in poverty reflects the proportion of children in each county living below the federal poverty income guidelines. This indicator is calculated directly from the actual numbers of children meeting the criteria of this indicator. However, 'percent' indicators for small counties can sometimes be misleading. In the case of low birthweights, the project partners decided not to calculate percentages if the total number of live births in a county was less than 20 because the resulting percentages would be disproportionately high and fluctuations across time would not be representative of trends.

A similar issue arises in the 'rate' indicators. Those indicators that present 'rates' do so in relation to a constant denominator. In the case of juvenile violent crime arrest rates the data indicates the number of arrests per 100,000 youths. Data from counties with small populations must be used with caution since small fluctuations in the data can cause large differences in the calculated rates. Also, because the trend analysis presented in this fact book uses only two years, anomalies in either of the two comparison years can skew the rate of change calculations. While those counties with large populations are not as susceptible to this problem, small counties can be impacted dramatically by small fluctuations. For example, a small county with an average of one or two child deaths each year can experience a single automobile accident that kills five children and witness its child death rate skyrocket.

County rankings

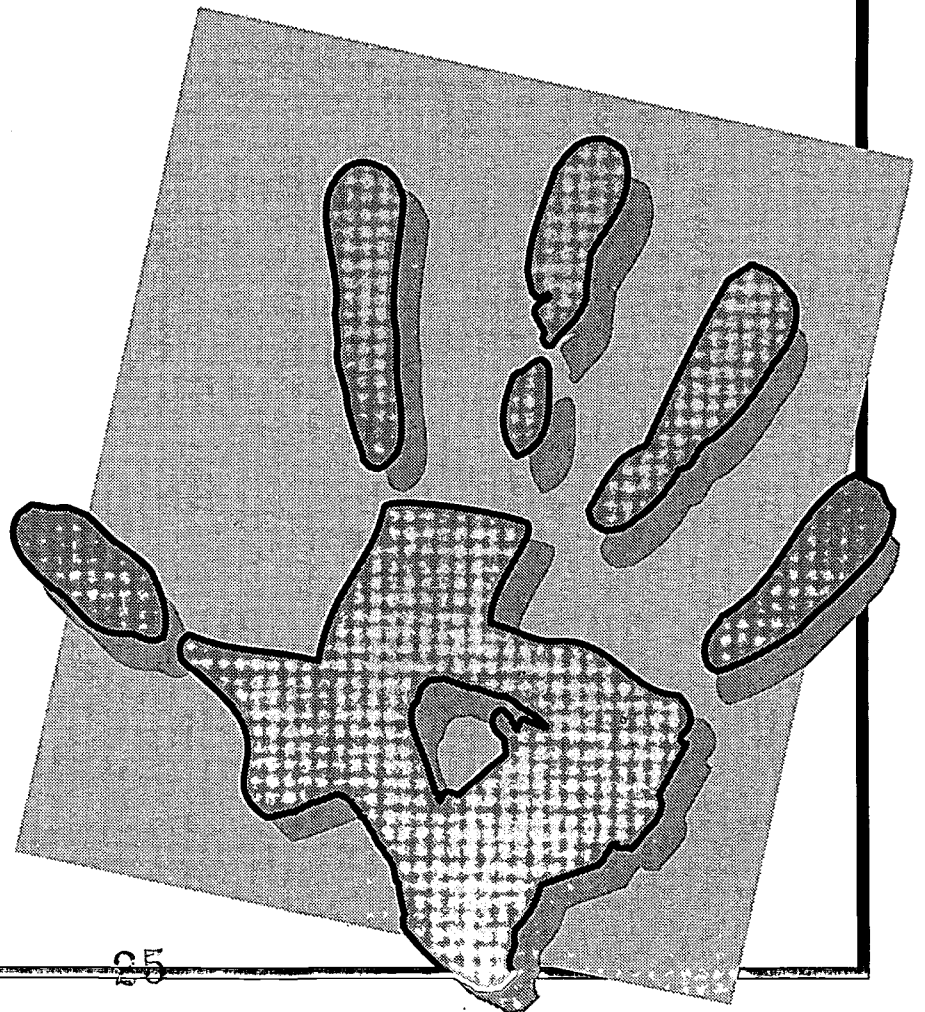
Appendix A provides ranking information for each indicator. While these charts rank every county from best to worst on each indicator, caution must be used with this information. Texas has 254 counties with great variations in demographic characteristics. For example, the county populations at the time of the last census (1990) ranged from a total of only 107 people in Loving county to 2,818,199 people in Harris county. The differences between counties, along with the sheer number of counties, make county to county comparisons complicated at best. Thus the reader is asked to view the ranking charts with caution. Comparisons between counties with similar populations or other shared characteristics will be a more meaningful exercise.

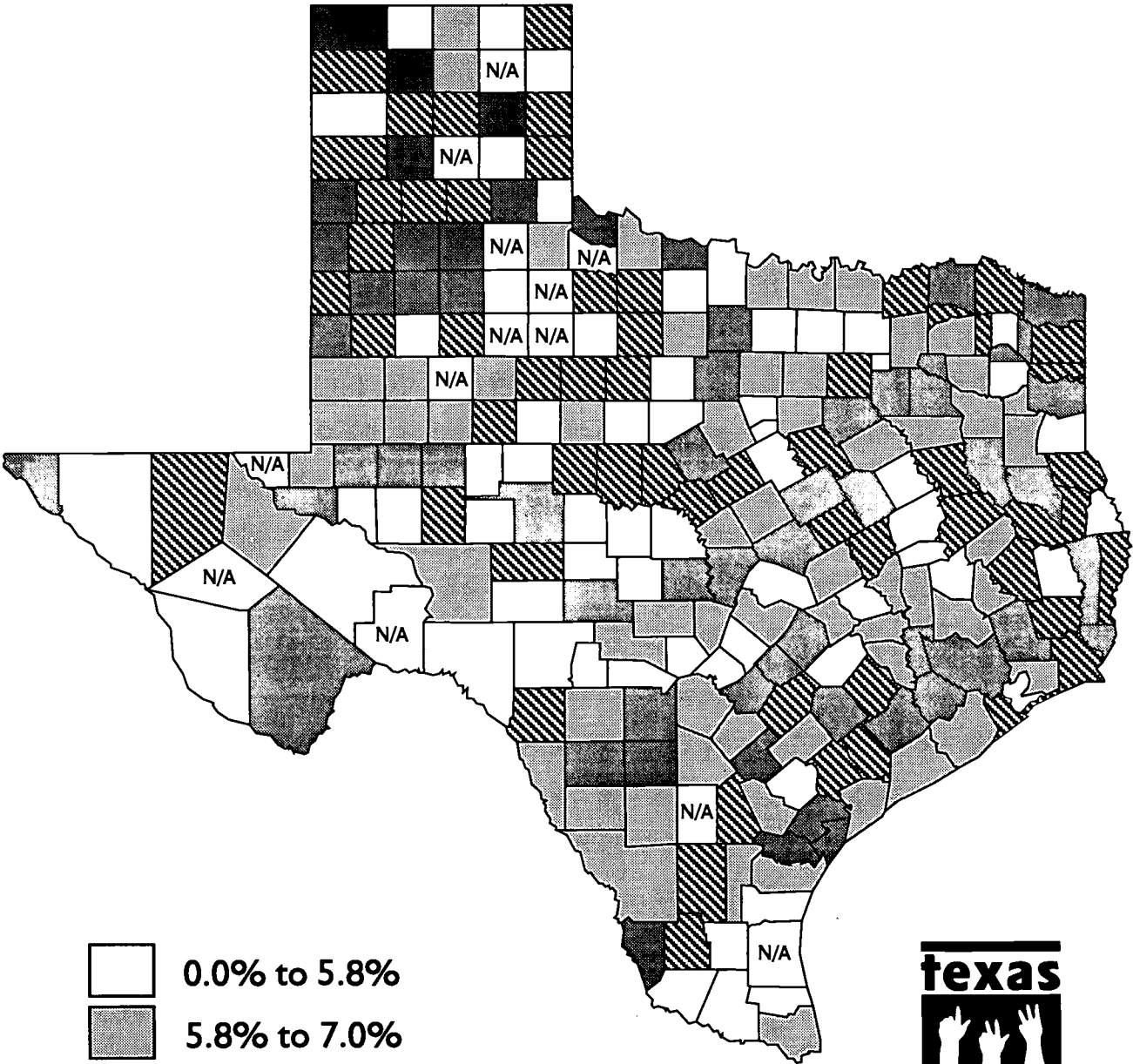







County Indicator Maps



Percent low birthweight babies (1991)

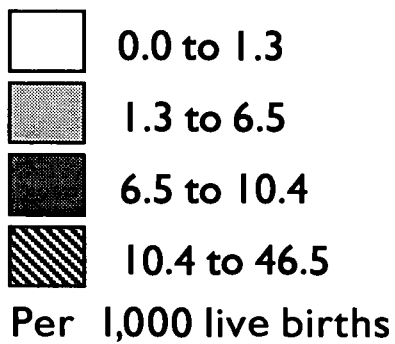
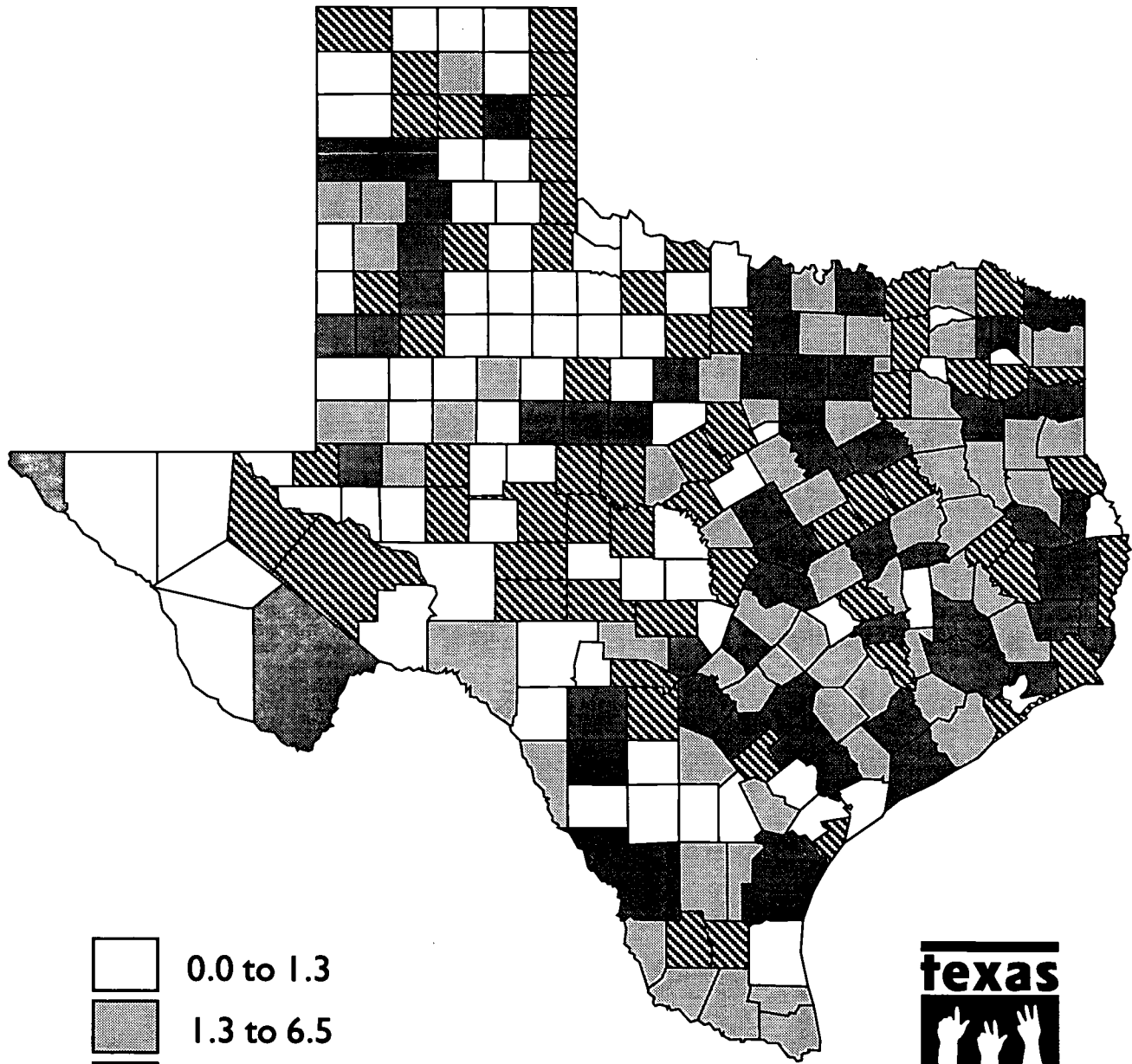

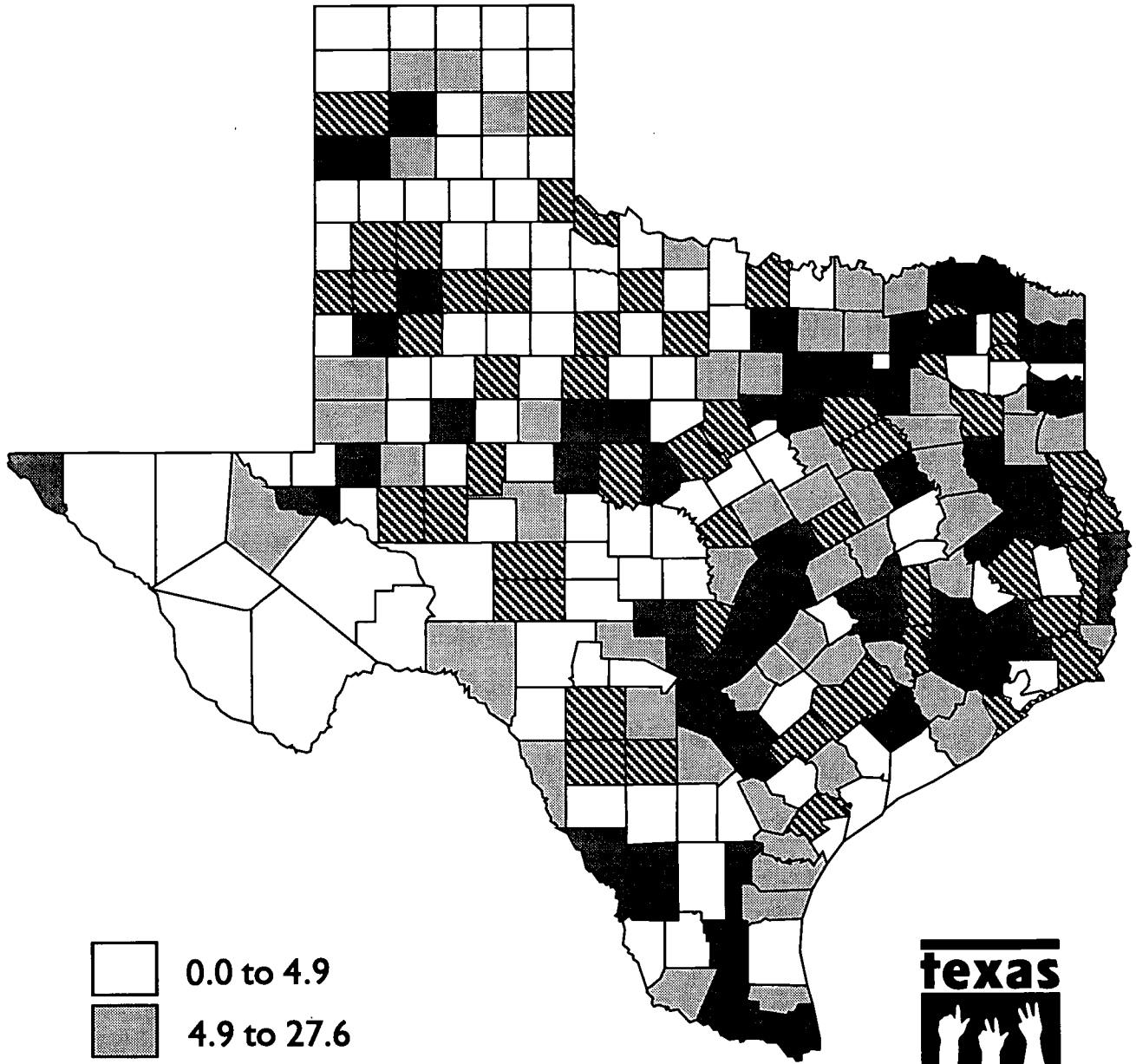


County Indicator Map

Child death rate, Ages 1-14 (1991)

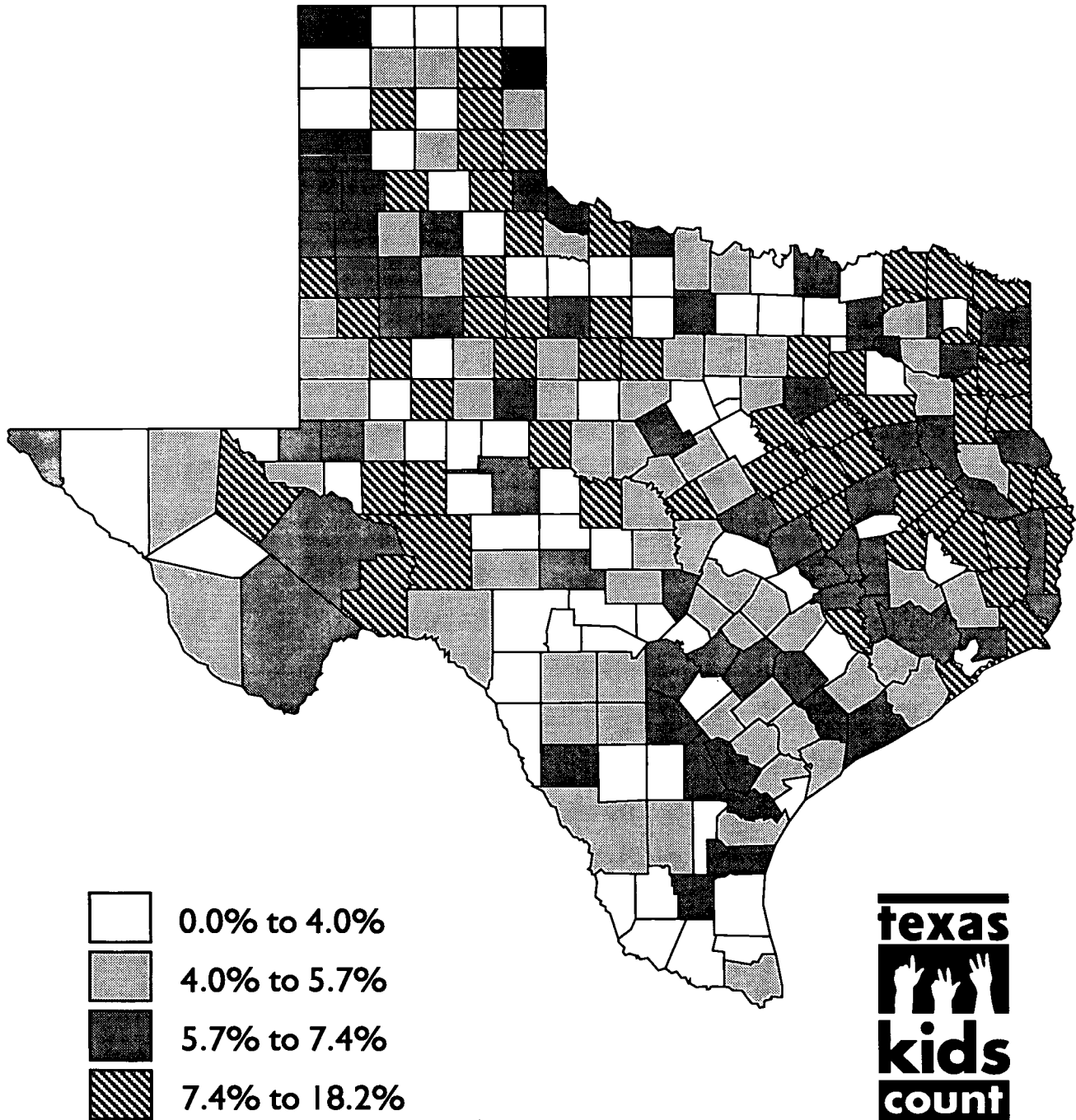

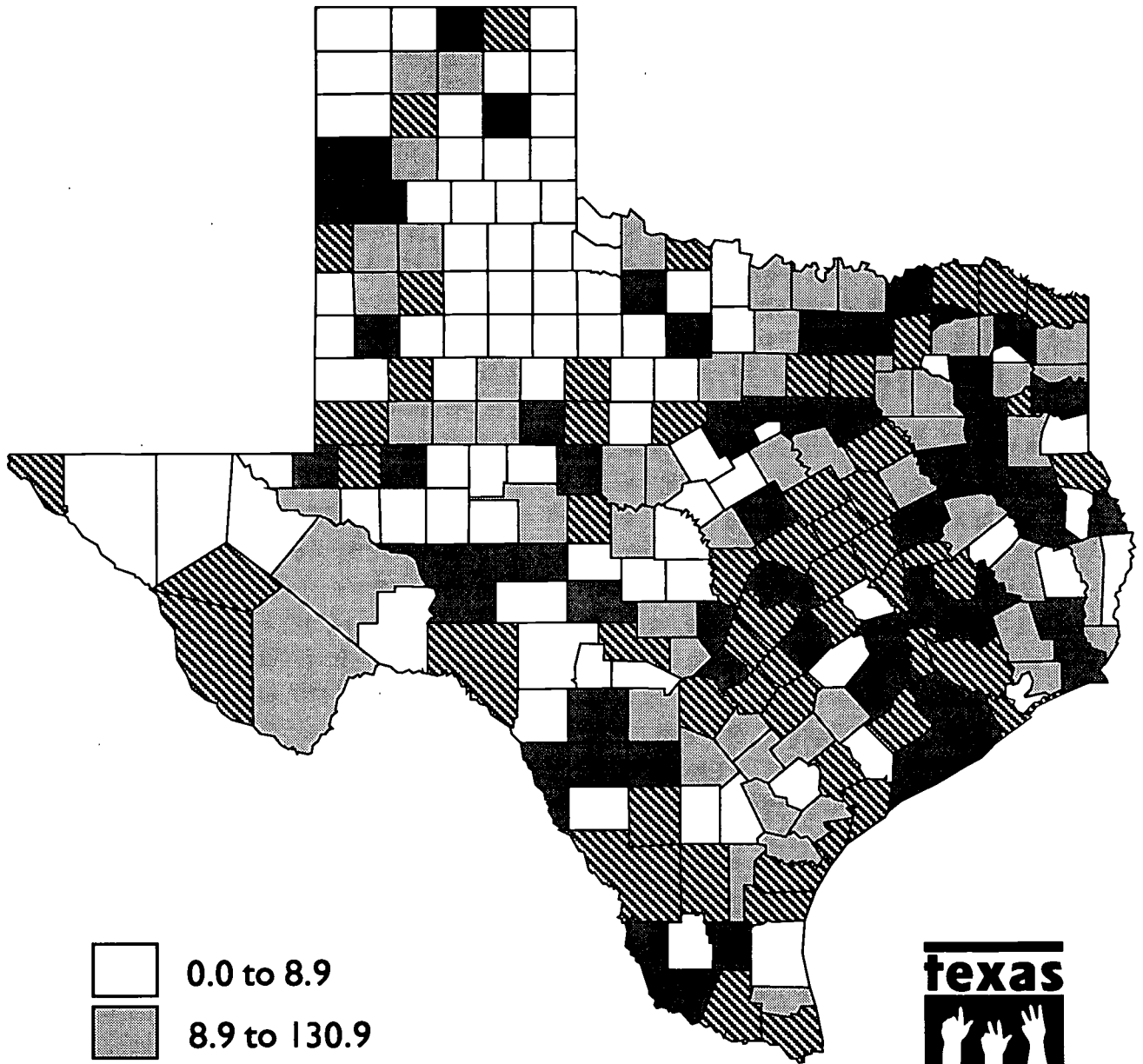






County Indicator Map

Ages 10-17 (1991)**



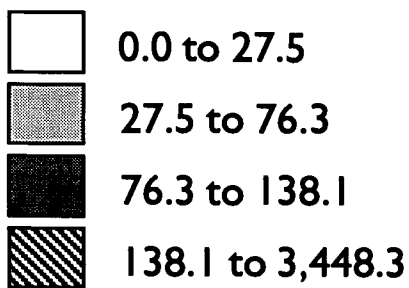
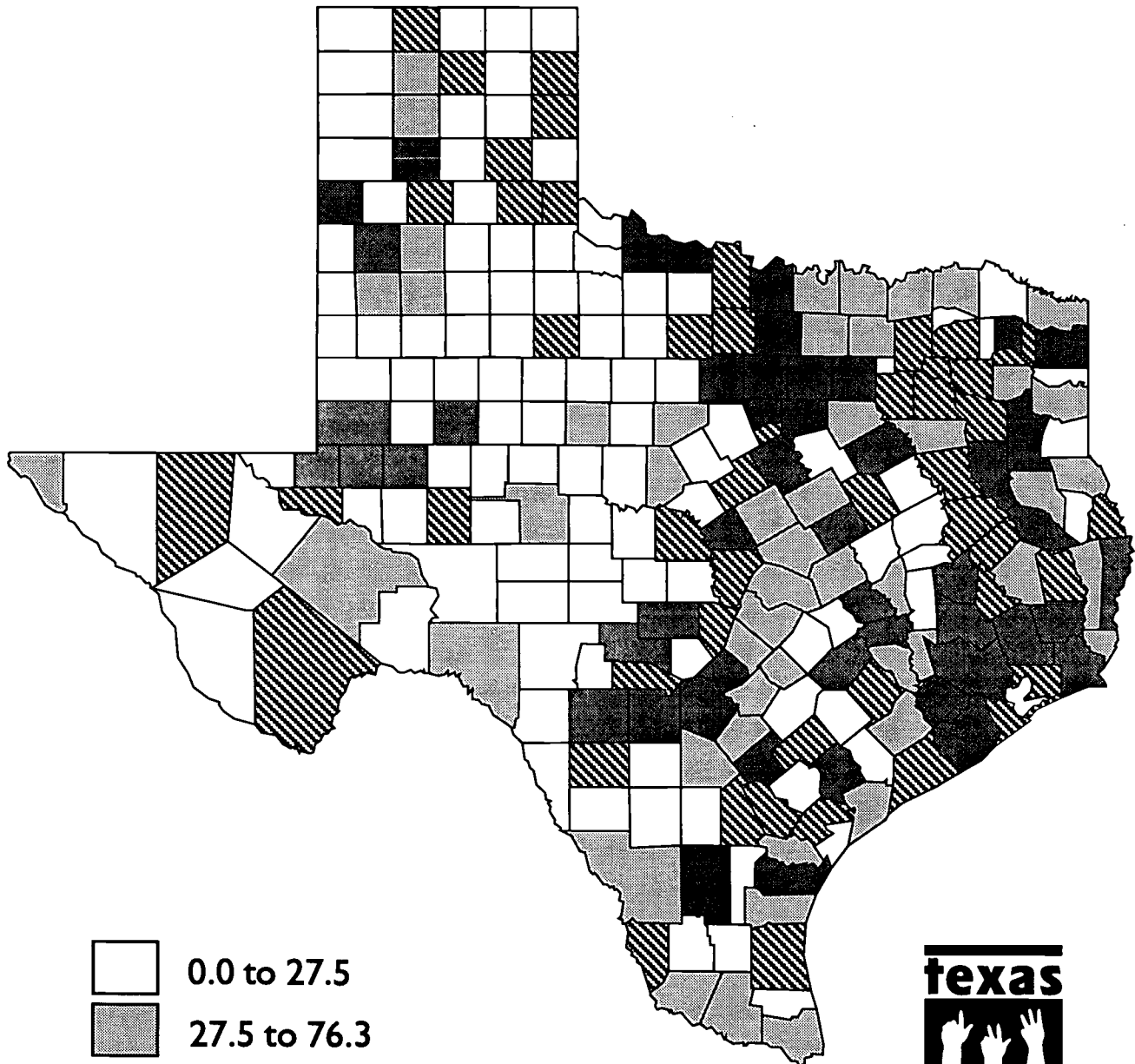

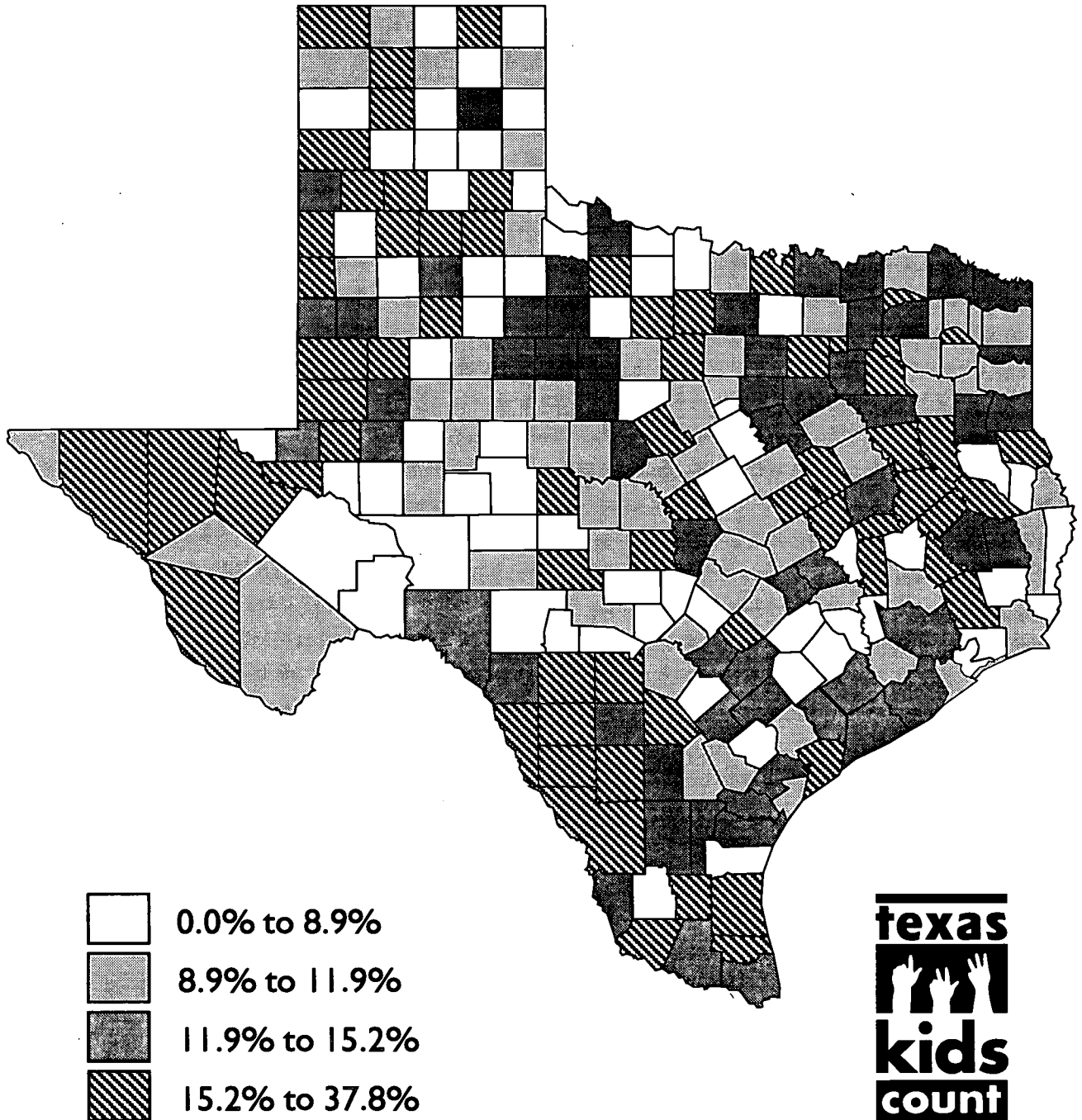
Teen violent death rate, Ages 15-19 (1991)

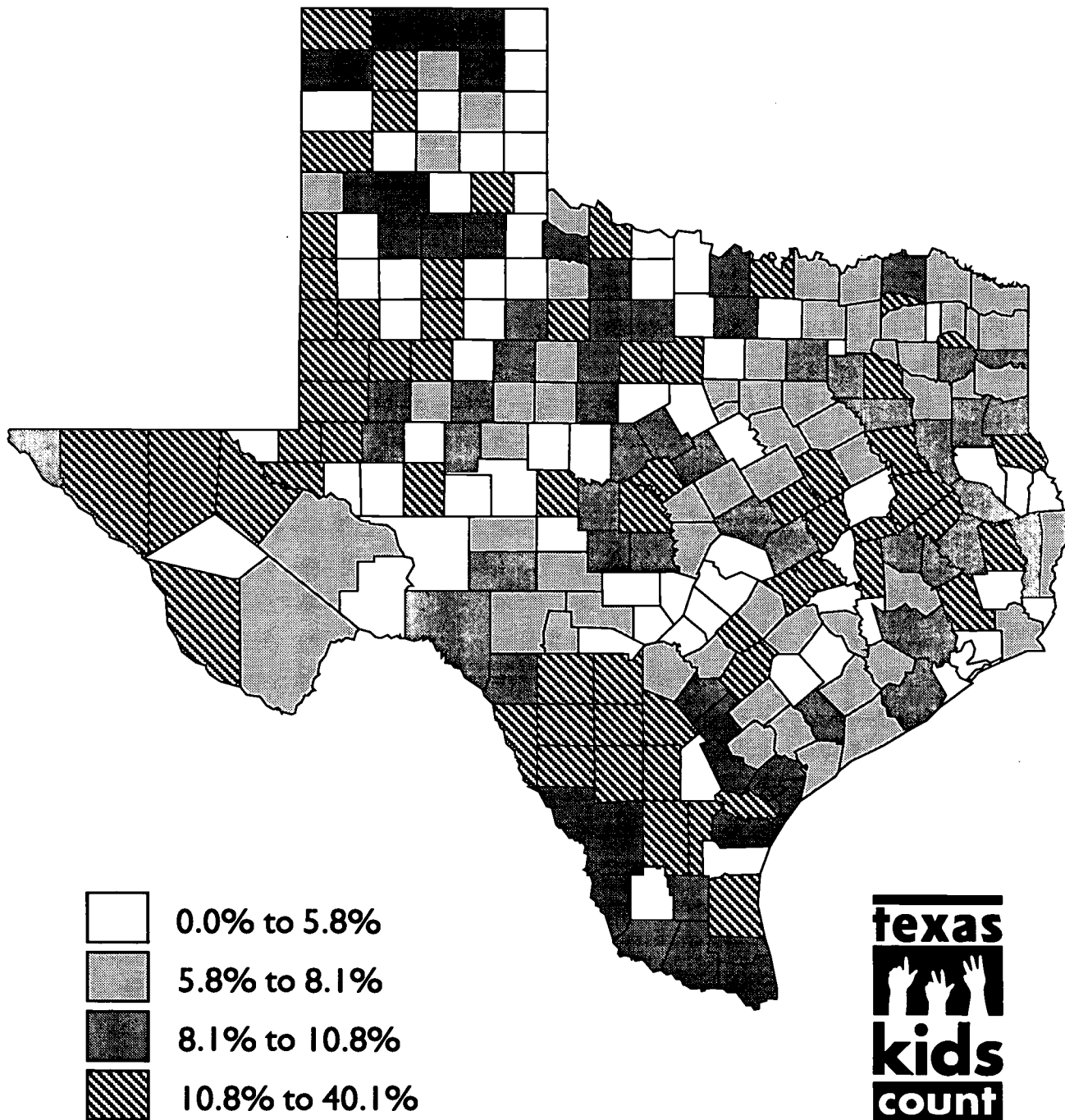


Percent teens not in school and not high school graduates, Ages 16-19 (1990)

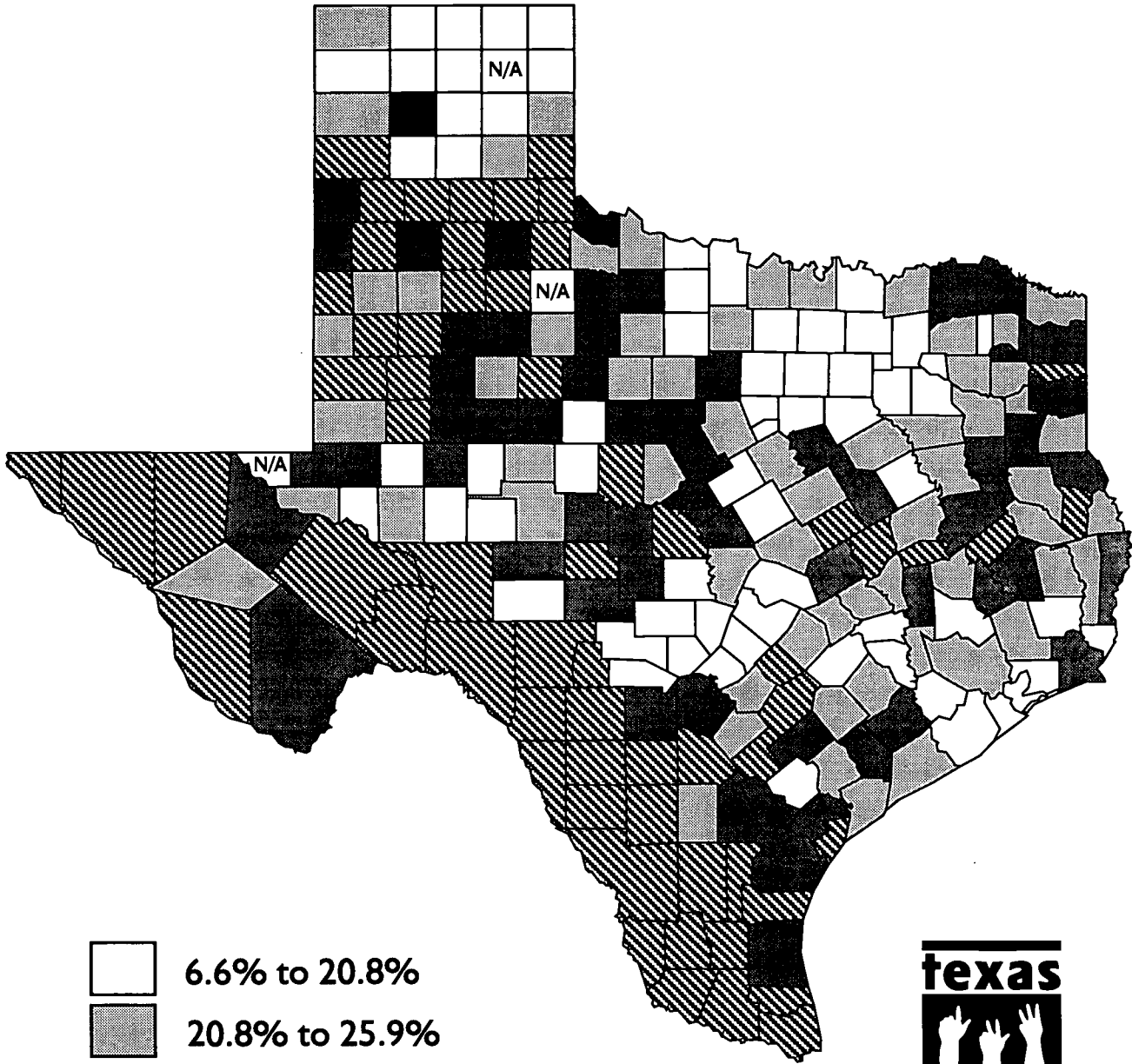







County Indicator Map

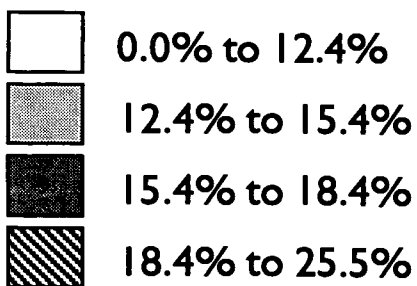
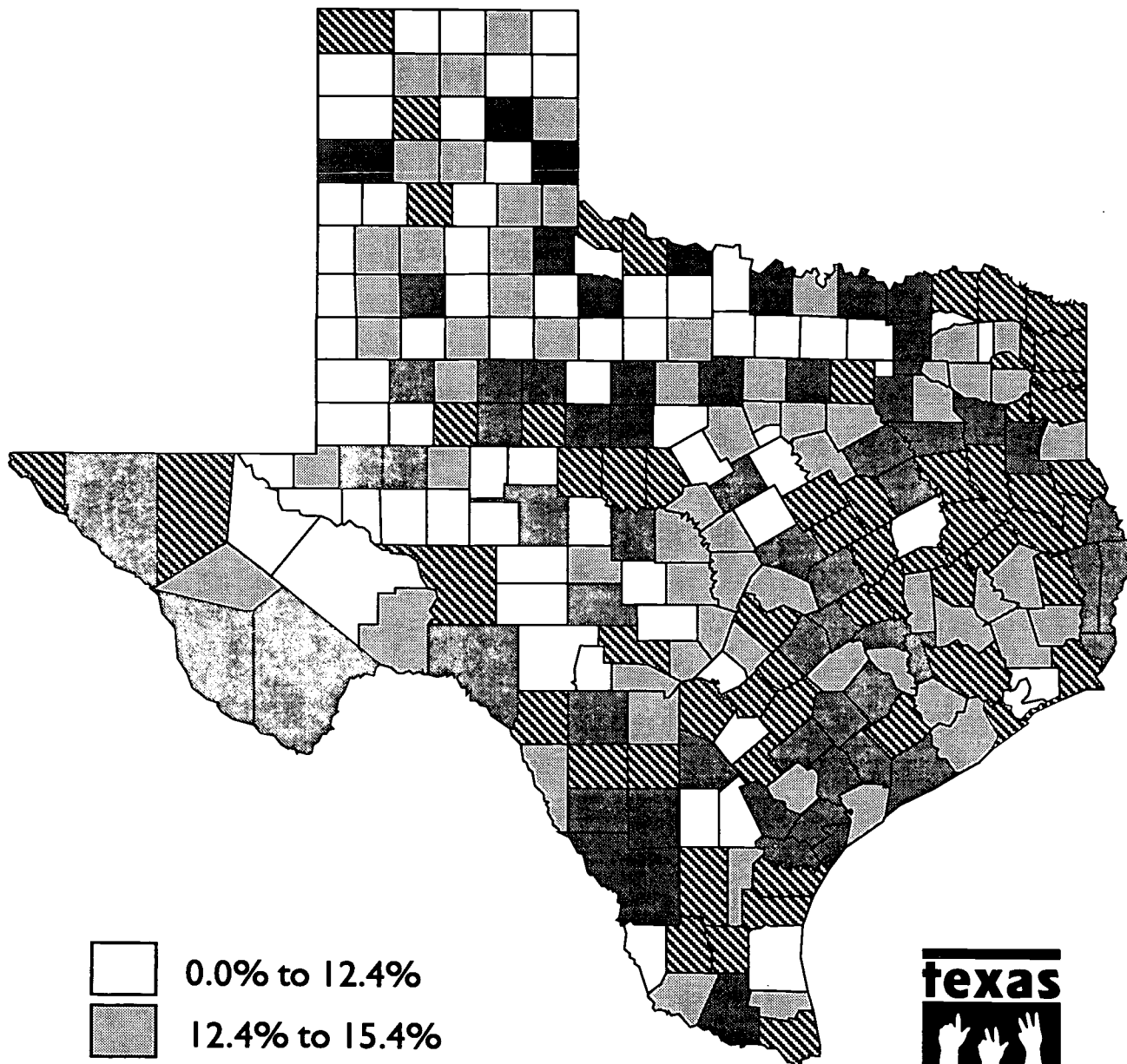

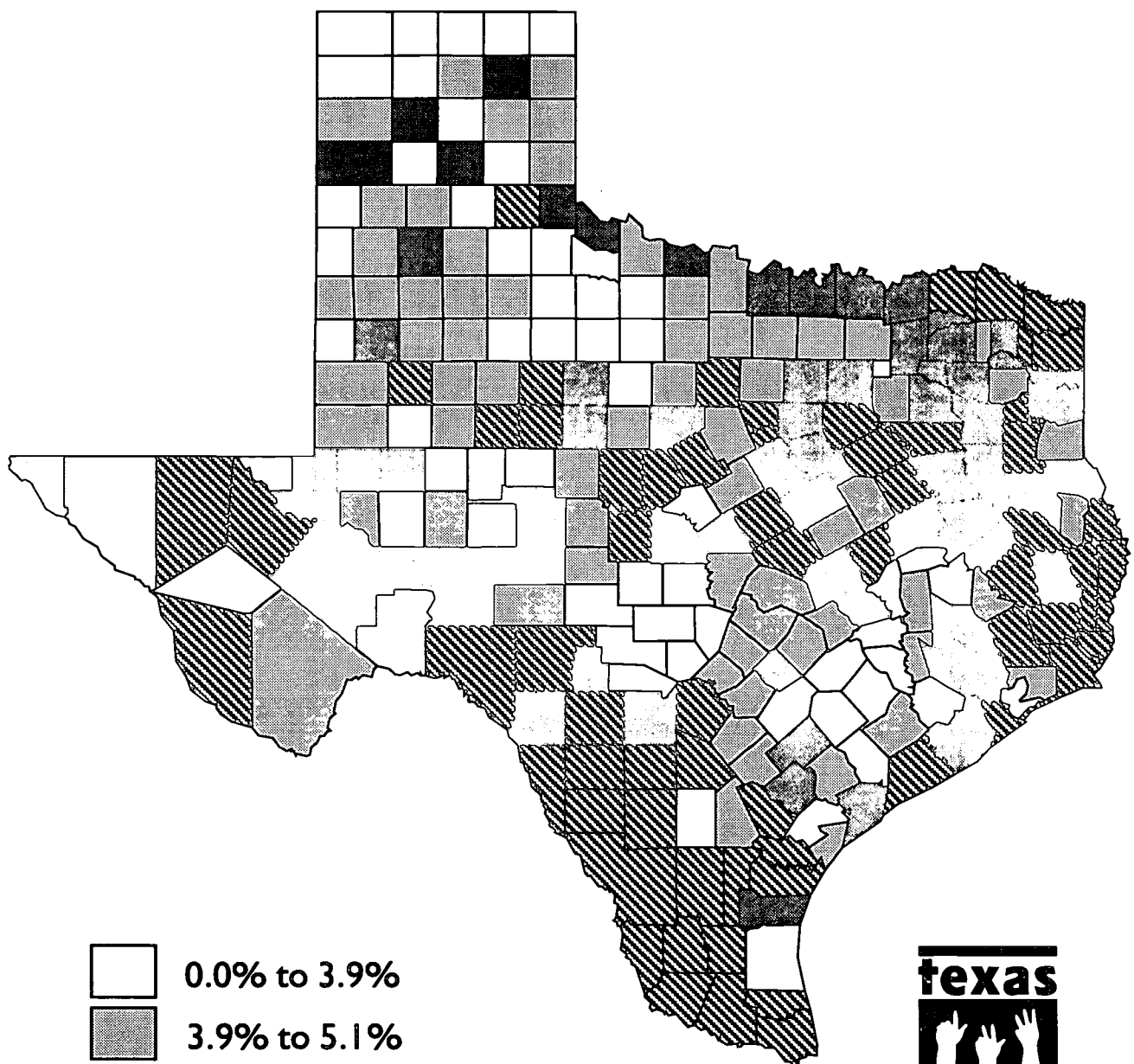






County Indicator Map

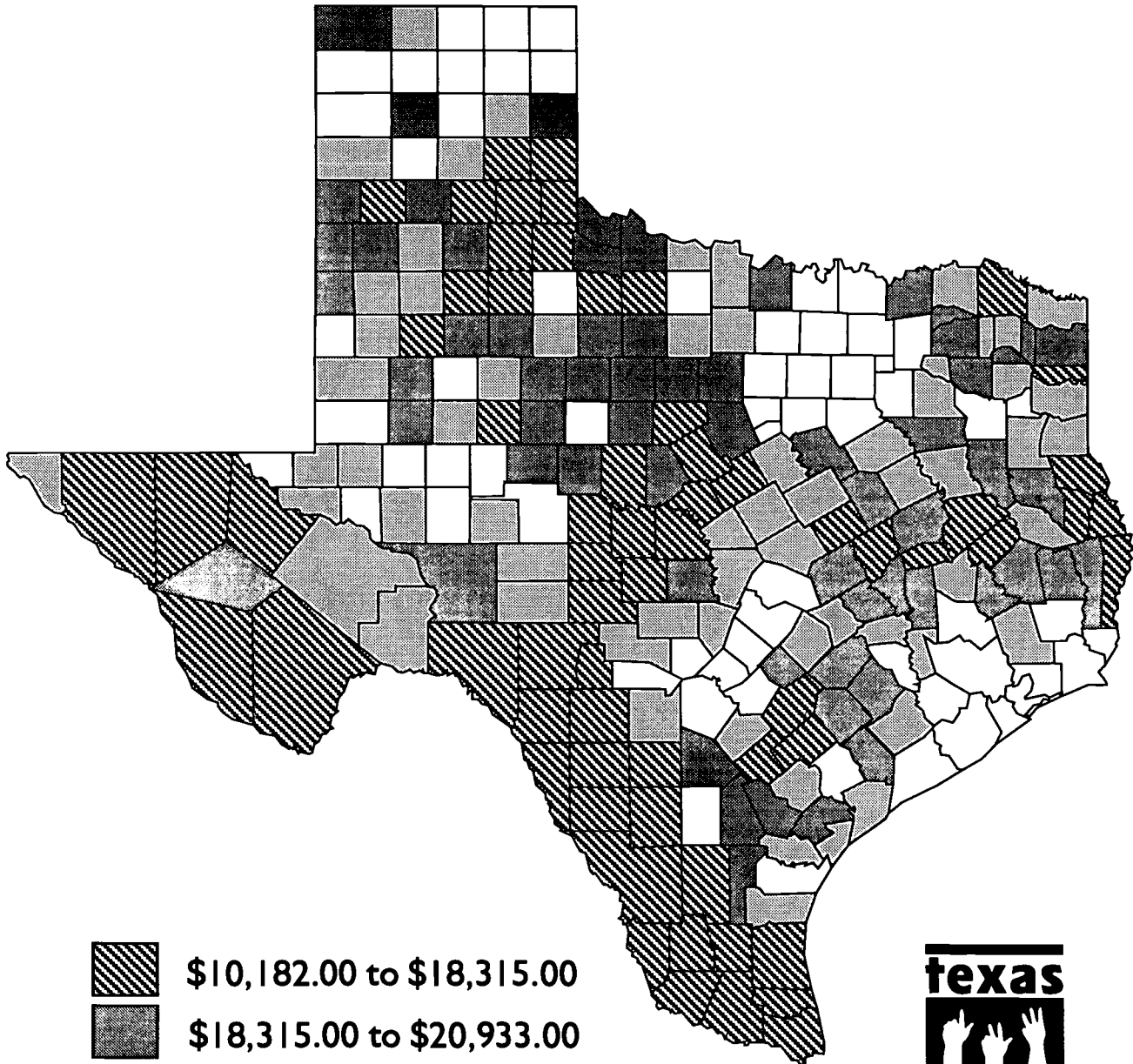






Median household income (1990)

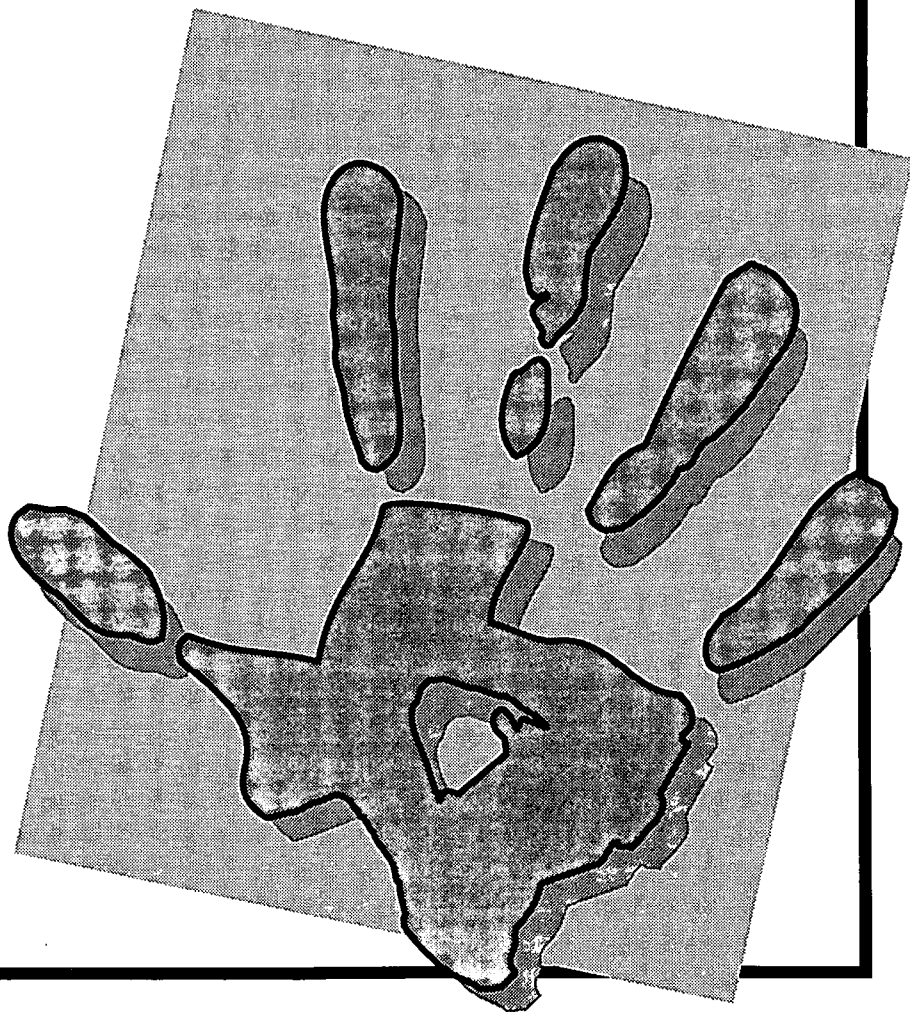

Appendix B

Indicator Definitions and Sources

Population estimates:

Source: (1991) population estimates provided by the State of Texas Comptroller's Office. The comptroller's office adjusted 1990 U.S. Census figures according to a combination of migration and economic factors to forecast 1991 population.

Source: (1985) population estimates were compiled using intercensal data from the U.S. Bureau of the Census. The intercensal population estimates from the U.S. Census are given in 5-year age groupings. In order to determine individual age populations for intercensal years, a method was developed to use the proportions of individual years of age in 1980 and 1990 to estimate intercensal single year of age populations. The method calculates the proportions of a certain age group in the 1980 census and the 1990 census. The intercensal data for individual years (1981-1989) is calculated by weighting the 1980 proportion more heavily for years closer to 1980 and the proportion for 1990 more heavily for years closer to 1990. A further adjustment was made for the fact that there was a 15 month time period between the 1980 census and the first intercensal estimate.

Intercensal data from the Bureau of the Census- Population Division are revised estimates of the population. The estimates were adjusted to be consistent with 1) revised intercensal estimates of the population of the nation by age, sex and race; 2) intercensal estimates of the population of states by age and sex, and 3) intercensal estimates of the total population of counties.

The age and race data in the 1980 and 1990 Census data files, which were used as anchor points in this methodology were modified to be consistent with other data sets. The 1980 census data were further modified to be consistent with the 1990 definition of counties and the race modification procedures developed for 1990. Race modifications were also made but do not affect this file.

The age statistics for 1990 were modified to correspond with the April 1, 1990 census data. A review of the detailed 1990 census information indicated that respondents tended to provide their age as of the date of completion of the questionnaire, not their age as of April 1, 1990. In addition, there may have been a tendency for respondents to round up their age if they were close to having a birthday. The age data were modified to correspond to the April 1, 1990 date.

The interpolations between the 1980 and 1990 modified census data were adjusted to be consistent with: 1) the intercensal estimates of the population of the nation by age, sex, and race; 2) the intercensal estimates of the population of states by age and sex; and 3) the intercensal estimates for the population of the nation by age, sex, and race, each state by age and sex and total population of each county are consistent with both the 1980 and 1990 censuses as enumerated. All intercensal State estimates are adjusted

to be consistent with the independent national intercensal estimates of population. All intercensal county estimates are adjusted to be consistent with the corresponding state estimates. The original data tape contained unrounded data.

Percent change over time analysis between the two comparison years was calculated by subtracting the second year rate from the first year, multiplying by 100 and then dividing by the first year rate. For example, if the Low birth weight rate for a particular county was 6.3 in 1985 and 6.6 in 1991, the percent change was calculated:

$$(6.6-6.3) * 100/6.3 = 4.8\%$$

If the rate in the first year was zero, no percent change was calculated. If the rate in both years was zero, no percent change was calculated.

In the case of low birth weight rates, if the number of live births in a county was 20 or less, no rate and no percent change were calculated.

Percent Low Birthweight Babies is the percentage of live births weighing under 2,500 grams (5.5 pounds). The percent was not computed if the total number of live births in a county was less than or equal to 20. The percent was not computed if the number of low birthweight babies in a county was equal to zero. **Source:** Texas Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Infant Mortality Rate (per 1,000 live births) is the number of deaths occurring to infants under 1 year of age per 1,000 live births. **Source:** Texas Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Child Death Rate, Ages 1-14 (per 100,000 children) is the number of deaths from all causes to children between the ages 1 and 14, per 100,000 children in this age range for 1985 and 1991. **Sources:** **Death statistics:** Texas Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Percent of all Births to Single Teens is the percentage of live births to mothers (13-19 years of age) considered to be 'single' by the Texas Department of Health. In 1985, a mother was asked if she was married or not. If yes, then information about the father's was included on the birth certificate and the mother was considered 'married'. If the mother answered that she was not married, then the father's information was automatically excluded from the birth certificate and the mother was considered 'single'. In 1989, a looser interpretation of 'married' was adopted. Father's information was included if the father signed the birth certificate, signed a paternity statement, or was married to the mother. Under this interpretation, more birth certificates included the father's information and thus more mothers were considered 'married'. In Texas, since 1989, if the father's information (name) is on the birth certificate, the parents are considered married. If the father's information is not on the birth certificate, they are not considered married.

Juvenile Violent Crime Arrest Rate, Ages 10-17 (per 100,000 youths) is the number of arrests of persons under age 18 for violent offenses (murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. **Source:** Texas Department of Public Safety.

Teen Violent Death Rate, Ages 15-19 (per 100,000 teens) is the number of deaths by homicide, suicide, and accidents to teens between the ages of 15 and 19, per 100,000 teens in this age group.

Source: Texas Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Percent Teens Not in School and Not High School Graduates are all 16- to 19-year-old civilians (not in the military) who were not enrolled in school and not high school graduates.

Percent Teens Not in School and Not in the Labor Force are all 16- to 19-year-old civilians (not in the military) who were not enrolled in school and not part of the labor force. Those 16- to 19-year-olds who were unemployed but looking for work were considered part of the labor force and thus were not included in this count.

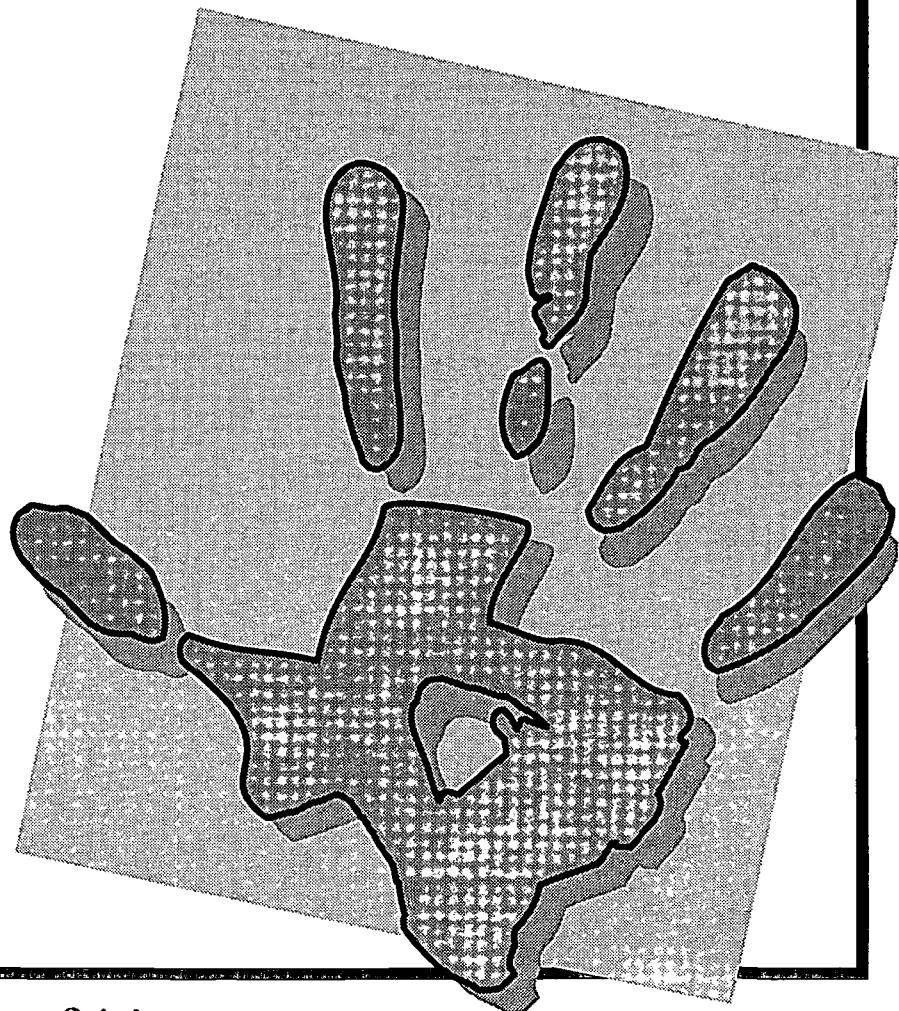

Appendix C

Federal Poverty Guidelines and Selected Program Eligibility

The federal poverty income guidelines are issued annually by the federal Department of Health and Human Services. Central to the guidelines is the "economy food plan", the least costly of four nutritionally adequate food plans designed by the Department of Agriculture. It was determined from the Department of Agriculture's 1955 survey of food consumption that families spent approximately one-third of their income on food. Each year the "economy food plan" is tripled to set the poverty level for families, based on the assumption that a family earning at least three times the economy food plan should have sufficient income. There are critics who believe that the poverty guidelines are woefully inadequate measures of poverty, because spending patterns have changed substantially since the 1950s and 1960s when the guidelines were developed. However, these guidelines continue to be the ruler by which this country measures poverty among its citizens. The poverty guidelines are also the basis of eligibility determination for a number of public assistance programs that serve children and their families.
