ABSTRACT

Focusing on the service area of New Jersey's Hudson County Community College (HCCC), this report presents data on the demographic and educational characteristics of the residents of Hudson County. The first section reviews the demographics of the County, focusing on the area in square miles and population of the County's 12 municipalities in 1970, 1980, and 1990; changes in population by municipality from 1980 to 1990; and age, race, and gender by municipality. The second section describes the educational attainment of County residents, including a comparison of Hispanic and non-Hispanic residents 25 years or older, and 1993 high school graduates' college attendance plans. The third section presents data on the primary language spoken at home and the country of birth of County residents. The fourth section provides data on enrollment rates at HCCC by municipality for fall 1990 to fall 1994 and by ethnicity, gender, and age for fall 1994. The final section reviews enrollment trends at HCCC's North Hudson Center from fall 1990 to fall 1995 and the part-/full-time status, gender, age, race, and city of residence of Center enrollees for fall 1994. I. DEMOGRAPHICS OF HUDSON COUNTY (TABLES 1 - 6)

The data in these tables describe the population of the county and its 12 municipalities in terms of size, recent changes, age, race/ethnicity, and gender.

(Note: Persons not counted in the census do not appear in these analyses. This may have some impact on the population size and characteristics of a number of the municipalities).

Table 1 Area and Population (1970, 1980, and 1990) of Municipalities in Hudson County

We have collapsed the twelve municipalities in the county into three areas: South Hudson, West Hudson, and North Hudson. The North Hudson area comprises six municipalities: Guttenberg, North Bergen, Secaucus, Union City, Weehawken, and West New York. Approximately one-third (N=179,265) of the 553,099 Hudson residents live in North Hudson. The 1990 population of the North Hudson area is identical to the 1970 population figure. However, during this period the county lost 56,000 residents; almost all from South Hudson.

Approximately 60 percent of the county population is in South Hudson (N=323,378), and Jersey City itself accounts for 41 (N=228,537) percent of the county population.

Table 2 Population Change, Hudson County, 1980 and 1990 Census by Municipality

For the 1980 - 1990 period, the county population remained stable; the change was a decline of less then 1 percent. Hoboken (N=-9,063) experienced the greatest loss and Jersey City (N=5,005) experienced the greatest gain. In North Hudson, Guttenberg, North Bergen, Secaucus and Union City increased in population, and Weehawken and West New York decreased in population. There was a net increase of 3,232 (5,084-1,852) for the North Hudson area.

Table 3 Age of Population of Hudson County by Municipality

With the exception of Union City, the median age of the populations in North Hudson communities exceeds that of the county (33.1). However, if one examines the age group that is most likely to enroll at HCCC, 18-59, there is very minor variation among the municipalities in the percentage in this age group. The two deviant cases are Bayonne (56%) and Hoboken (69%). All other municipalities are within three percentage points of the county figure (61%).

In light of the connection between ESL/Bilingual education and the North Hudson Center, and between the Hispanic population in the county and ESL/Bilingual education, we have limited our analysis here to the distribution of Hispanics among the municipalities. However, data are presented for all racial/ethnic groups and for all municipalities.

Hispanics account for one-third (N=183,465) of the county population. Sixty-nine percent of Hispanics reside in three municipalities: 30 percent (N=55,395) in Jersey City, 24 percent (N=43,869) in Union City, and 15 percent (N=27,930) in West New York. The North Hudson area accounts for 55 percent (N=101,576) of Hispanics in the county.

Although Hispanics account for one-third of the county population, they account for three-quarters of the populations of Union City and West New York.

Table 6 Gender of Hudson County Residents Eighteen Years Old and Over by Municipality

Females account for slightly over one-half of the county. This contribution does not vary along geographical lines.

Population Projections

Population projections through 2010 have been presented by the Hudson County Improvement Authority [Overall Economic Development Program, Hudson County, N.J. pp.13-15 (June 1994)]. The data presented are N.J. Department of Community Affairs "baseline" and "optimistic" forecasts. These projections for 2010 range from the baseline low of 590,822 (6.8% increase) to the optimistic high of 610,653 (10.4% increase).

In terms of municipalities, the baseline projects decreases in Jersey City (3.3%; N=-7,644), Union City (2.9%; N=-1,687) and West New York (7.5%; N=-2,869). Projected increases range from 1.7 percent (N=37) for East Newark to 42.1 percent (N=3,481) for Guttenberg. The pattern for the optimistic projections is quite similar. However, in this case Jersey City will lose only 124 persons, West New York will lose 1,335, and there is anticipated a very slight increase in Union City.

II. EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT AND PLANS OF RESIDENTS OF HUDSON COUNTY (TABLES 7 - 10)

The data in these tables describe the educational attainment of county residents eighteen and over, the educational attainment of Hispanic and Non-Hispanic residents twenty-five and over, and the college attendance plans of recent graduates of public high schools in the county.

Table 7 Educational Attainment of Hudson County Residents Eighteen Years of Age and Over by Municipality

Residents of North Hudson who are at least 18 years old are slightly more likely than are their counterparts in the rest of the county to lack a high school diploma: 40 percent North Hudson, 34 percent West Hudson, 32 percent South Hudson. However, there is great variation within the area, e.g., the range is from 24 percent in Secaucus to 48 percent in West New York.

Fifty-seven percent (N=71,325) of the county residents who possess a high school diploma but have no college experience live in South Hudson, and 31 percent (N=38,594) live in North Hudson.

Table 8 Educational Attainment of Hispanic Residents of Hudson County Who are Twenty-Five Years of Age or Older by Municipality

Thirty-six percent of the Hispanic residents of the county who are at least 25 years old possess a high school diploma but have not graduated from college. The percent ranges from 35 for North Hudson to 39 for South Hudson to 41 for West Hudson.

Table 9 Educational Attainment of Non-Hispanic Residents of Hudson County Who are Twenty-Five Years of Age or Older by Municipality

Forty-two percent of the Non-Hispanic residents of the county who are at least 25 years old possess a high school diploma but have not graduated from college. The percent ranges from 41 and 42 for North and South Hudson to 48 for West Hudson.

Table 10 College Attendance Plans of 1993 Graduates of Hudson County Public High Schools

The total number of public school seniors in the county in 1993 was 3,655. Approximately 50 percent of the graduates in June 1993 indicated that they intended to attend a four-year college and 15 percent indicated that they intended to attend a two-year college. North Hudson accounted for 40 percent (N= 1,479) of the seniors. College attendance plans of graduates differ among the schools in the area: students at North Bergen, Secaucus, and Emerson (Union City) are more likely than are



students throughout the county to plan to attend a four-year college and are less likely to plan to attend a two-year college; students at Union Hill (Union City) and Weehawken are slightly less likely to plan to attend a four-year college and more likely to plan to attend a two-year college; students in West New York are more likely to plan to attend a four-year college and also more likely to plan to attend a two-year college.

Comparable data for parochial schools are not available.

III. PRIMARY LANGUAGE SPOKEN AT HOME AND COUNTRY OF BIRTH OF RESIDENTS OF HUDSON COUNTY (TABLES 11 - 12)

The data in these tables describe the primary language (English, Spanish, Other) spoken at homes in the county, and the country of birth of Hudson residents.

Table 11 Language Spoken at Home by Residents of Hudson County Who are Five Years Old and Over by Municipality

Approximately one-half (47%) of the residents of the county speak a language other than English at home. The percentage by area ranges from 37 for South Hudson to 67 for North Hudson.

Over 80 percent of the residents of West New York and Union City are in this category. Secaucus (19%) is the only North Hudson municipality in which less than one-half of the residents do not speak a language other than English at home. As one might expect, the percentage of North Hudson residents (with the exception of Secaucus) who "Do not speak English very well" exceeds the percentage for the county as a whole (38% vs. 24%).

In terms of absolute numbers, an equal number of North Hudson (N=112,264) and South Hudson (N=113,033) residents speak a language other than English at home. Although the number who "Do not speak English very well" is larger in North Hudson (N=63,418), there is a large population in South Hudson (N=51,291) in this category.

Two-thirds of the county residents who speak a language other than English at home, speak Spanish (164,064 of 245,367). The comparable percentages for the areas range from 41 for West Hudson to 54 for South Hudson to 84 for North Hudson.

In terms of Spanish speaking populations, 17 percent (N=90,351) throughout the county indicated that they "Do not speak English very well." Sixty-two percent (N=56,257) of these persons reside in North Hudson. At the same time, 30 percent (N=29,529) of the Spanish speaking persons who "Do not speak English very well" reside in South Hudson.

Table 12 Nativity of Residents of Hudson County by Municipality

Thirty-one percent (N=169,434) of the residents of the county were born in another country. This percent ranges from 21 for South Hudson to 47 for North Hudson. Once again, all municipalities in North Hudson, with the exception of Secaucus (13%), exceed the county average in terms of percent born in another country.

Although North Hudson accounts for one-half (N=84,045) of county residents who were born in another country, South Hudson accounts for 41 percent (N=69,327) of all such residents.



In terms of years in the United States, 45 percent (N=35,285) of those who arrived between 1980 and 1990 (N=79,003) reside in North Hudson and 46 percent (N=36,555) reside in South Hudson (mainly in Jersey City).

IV. "SERVICE RATES" (TABLES 13 - 14)

In order to make comparisons concerning the extent to which the college is serving various population groups, we have computed a "service rate." This rate is derived by dividing the enrollment by residents 18 or older in the group and then multiplying by 10,000. For instance, in the fall of 1994 the service rate was 87 [3,755 (enrollment)/430,695 (population 18 or over) x 10,000].

The service rate for the college increased from 62 in 1990 to 87 in 1994. During that period, the rates for both North and South Hudson also increased. However, the rate for West Hudson (33), the area with the lowest rate, has not changed. In the fall of 1994, the rate ranged from West Hudson (33) to North Hudson (88) to South Hudson (95). The municipalities with the highest rates are: Jersey City (113), Union City/Weehawken (100), and Guttenberg/West New York (99). The municipalities with the lowest rates are: Kearny (35), East Newark/Harrison (28), and Secaucus (22).

In terms of race/ethnicity, rates for African-Americans (137), Asians (176), and Hispanics (136) exceed the total rate (87), and the rate for whites (30) is far below the total.

In terms of gender, the rate for women (101) is above the total and the rate for men (72) is below the total.

In terms of age, as one would expect, as age increases the rate decreases. The rate for residents between the ages 18 and 24 is over 300.

V. HCCC ENROLLMENTS WITH SPECIAL ATTENTION TO NORTH HUDSON (Tables 15 - 21)

The data in these tables describe the recent enrollment trends at the North Hudson Center and the characteristics of the student population (part/full-time, gender, age, race/ethnicity, residence).

(Note: For the purposes of these analyses, all students enrolled in ESL/Bilingual courses, regardless of where the courses are offered, are included in the North Hudson count).

Table 15 Fall 1990 through 1995 Enrollment According to Location

Enrollment at HCCC for the period 1991 - 95 (preliminary data) has increased each fall. With the exception of 1990 - 91 period, the same pattern has occurred at the North Center. The percent increases for the 1991 - 95 period are: total college 48, North Hudson Center 31, other locations 53. The percent of all HCCC students accounted for by students at North Hudson has remained quite constant since 1991: 1991-24, 1992-23, 1993-21, 1994-20, 1995-21.

In light of the fact that fall 1995 data are preliminary, the characteristics of students are based on fall 1994 data. Ninety-three percent (721 of 774) of the North Hudson students are enrolled in ESL/Bilingual courses. Within the group of ESL/Bilingual students, one-third (N=236) take day classes and two-thirds (N=485) take evening classes.

Although 62 percent of all HCCC students are enrolled on a full-time basis, 87 percent of the North Hudson students are full-time students. Within the North Hudson Center population, the full-time percent of students enrolled in courses taught in English (62%) is identical to the percent for all students. However, 94 percent of the day and 86 percent of the evening ESL/Bilingual students are enrolled on a full-time basis.

The full-time percentages above can be contrasted with the following 1994 full-time percentages for community college students: Nationwide-36, Middle States Region-45, New Jersey-40.

Table 17 Fall 1994 Enrollment According to Gender

Sixty-three percent of North Hudson students and 59 percent of other students are female. The most deviant case is that of day ESL/Bilingual students (68% female).

North Hudson students are more likely to be older than other HCCC students (percent 25 and older - 63 vs. 46). Once again, the North Hudson Ceneter non-ESL/Bilingual students (41%) resemble other HCCC students.

Table 19 Fall 1994 Enrollment According to Race/Ethnicity

As one would expect, given the history and present focus of offerings at the North Hudson Center (ESL/Bilingual), students at the Center are more likely to be Hispanic (80%) than are students at other college locations (40%). In contrast, although students identified as African-American and white account each for 22 percent of students at other locations, they account for only 3 percent and 6 percent respectively of students at the North Hudson Center.

Although 80 percent (616 of 774) of the North Hudson Center students are Hispanic, only 33 percent (616 of 1,880) of the Hispanic students at HCCC are enrolled in North Hudson Center classes.

Thirty-two percent (N=1,250) of all students reside in the North Hudson area. Sixty percent (N=466) of the students at the North Hudson Center reside in the area, and 25 percent (N=784) of the students at other college locations reside in the North Hudson area. Another way of looking at these data is to point out that 37 percent (466 of 1,250) of the students who live in the North Hudson area take courses at the North Hudson Center and that 63 percent (784 of 1,250) of such students take courses at other college locations.

Five municipalities account for 82 percent (N=633) of the students at the North Hudson Center: Jersey City (33%, N=257), Union City/Weehawken (28%, N=215), and Guttenberg/West New York (21%, N=161). There is no municipality from which a majority of the students take courses at the North Hudson Center.

These data indicate a significant flow of students from the North Hudson area to college locations in other areas and from other areas to the North Hudson Center. A total of 308 students (8%) travel to the North Hudson Center from municipalities outside of North Hudson, and 784 North Hudson area students (20%) travel to college locations outside of the North Hudson area. That is, 28 percent (N=1,092) of the students travel to attend class.
