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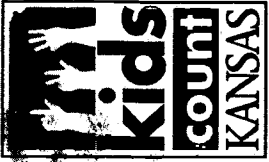
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## ABSTRACT

This Kids Count data book presents a statistical portrait of the well being of and current conditions faced by the children of Kansas, based on key indicators. Eighteen indicators are detailed in six subject areas: (1) economic well-being; (2) physical health and safety; (3) educational achievement; (4) early childhood care and education; (5) emotional well-being; and (6) social behavior and social control. Data are presented in a table format by individual indicator and by county, and include comparative information concerning current year and past years and percent change over time. A demographic description of each county and a short summary highlighting individual county findings are provided. The findings indicate both improved and worsened conditions. Areas of improvement included: (1) Head Start participation of children 3-4 living below the poverty level; (2) births to mothers with less than a high school education; (3) births that received prenatal care; (4) high school graduates pursuing post-secondary education/training; and (5) childhood deaths. Indicators with worsened findings include: (1) births to single teens; (2) out-of-home placements; (3) teen violent deaths; (4) juvenile arrests; (5) low birth weight babies; (6) infant mortality; and (7) high school graduation. The report's appendices explain selection of indicators and include data notes and sources.

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# 1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book

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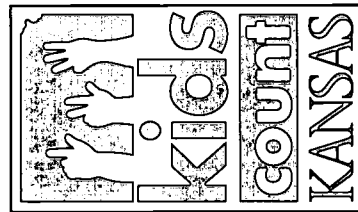
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A state's greatest future resource should also be its most precious commodity... **THE CHILDREN**. Just as seeds are planted and need the proper balance of nutrients, care and nurturing, so our children cannot prosper and achieve their greatest potential without the support, caring and acceptance necessary for solid growth.

The *1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book* continues a three-year tradition of showing the most current conditions that Kansas children are facing as they grow up in today's world. Although the 18 featured indicators cannot measure every influence to which our children will be exposed, they do show a composite of what is happening in our state. The indicators were selected to show conditions our children face from birth through age 19. The base years for each of the indicators allow for a smoother measure of trends developing in comparing the current year to the recent past. Indicators new to the *Kansas Kids Count Data Book* this year include the percent of children approved for free school meals and the rate of availability of licensed child care.

The *1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book* gives each county a look at conditions facing their children; because just like children, communities are different and unique. Many Kansas communities have committed to making positive changes in conditions facing their children and by following the indicator measurements can see

where changes may be warranted and where they are making inroads. In other counties, efforts may need to be started to address areas of concern.

**KANSAS ACTION FOR CHILDREN**, one of the three partners responsible for the *Kansas Kids Count* project, is committed to releasing the book annually over a number of years so that we may continue measuring conditions facing Kansas children. The *Kansas Kids Count* project is made possible, in part, by a grant from the Annie E. Casey Foundation, who has been producing an annual state-by-state data book for the past five years and is committed to continue a national look at conditions facing children.

As a state, Kansas has made positive changes in a few indicators.

As a whole, work still needs to be done to show that Kansas cares about its children. As in planting seeds, commitment and effort must be sustained to ensure that our most precious commodity becomes our greatest resource.

# 1995 KANSAS INDICATORS



Eighteen indicators were selected for the *1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book*. These indicators were grouped into six areas: Economic Well-Being; Physical Health and Safety; Educational Achievement; Early Childhood Care and Education; Emotional Well-Being; and Social Behavior and Social Control.

Within these six areas are two new indicators: Child Care Availability and the Percent of Children Approved For Free School Meals. The Unemployment Rate has been added to the demographic data for each of the counties.

Three indicators listed in the *1994 Kansas Kids Count Data Book* have been omitted. Because the data for the percent of children in poverty comes from the 1990 United States Census and will not be updated until the year 2000, this indicator was omitted. Figures for the percent of children in grades 5-12 who regularly use alcohol and the percent of children in grades 5-12 who have used other drugs were not available in time for this year's publication because of changes in administering the survey and therefore, had to be omitted from this year's book. However, it is anticipated they will be available for the 1996 data book and will be included.

This year, only base numbers are shown for the reported and confirmed child abuse and neglect indicators. We regret that the 1993 data were not usable because child abuse and neglect is such an important indicator of child well-being. Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services is in the process of changing the reporting procedures and anticipates more reliable data in the future.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

### AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

Current year data for the *1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book* show improvement in five areas: Percent of Head Start Participation of Children 3-4 Living Below the Poverty Level, an 18 percent improvement; Percent of Births to Mothers with Less than a High School Education, a 6 percent improvement; Percent of Births Receiving Prenatal Care, a 2 percent improvement; Percent of High School Graduates Pursuing Post-Secondary Education/Training, a 6 percent improvement; and Childhood Death Rate, a 4 percent improvement.

This has been the third year in a row that *Kansas Kids Count Data* has shown progress in the rates of Childhood Death and High School Graduates Pursuing Post-Secondary Education/Training.

### INDICATORS GETTING WORSE

Conditions have worsened for 9 indicators. The indicator which continues to be of greatest concern is the percent of Births to Single Teens which climbed to 10.9 percent of all births in Kansas, a 42 percent increase over the base years and a 27 percent increase over the previous year. Emotional Well-Being indicators report a worsening over time which include an Out-Of-Home Placement Rate per 1,000 children, which increased 13 percent; and Teen Violent Death Rate per 100,000 children which increased 9 percent. Juvenile Arrest Rate per 1,000 children, increased 10 percent.

Other indicators which offer a discouraging picture are the Percent of Low Birth Weight Babies, which increased by 6 percent; Infant Mortality Rate per 1,000 infants, which increased by 2 percent; and the Percent of Students Graduating from High School, a decline of 4 percent.

Two indicators, Percent of Children Receiving Economic Assistance, with a 3 percent increase, and Percent of Children Approved for Free School Meals, with a 12 percent increase, are being used as proxies for measuring childhood poverty. Therefore, increases in these indicators are considered negative. However, these same increases can also be viewed as positive in that more low-income children are receiving services they need.

Kindergartners Fully Immunized by Age 2 showed no percent change. Many state and local efforts have been made to immunize children the last couple of years. Since the immunization rates are based on retrospective surveys, more time needs to pass to be able to see benefits.

#### CONCLUSION

Commitment and sustained effort must continue to be made by the people in Kansas who care about our children's future. Many trends have developed over the years and improvements are slow in coming.

Frustrating as it is, all indicators can't be tackled at once. However, as positive results are achieved in some areas then the interrelationships among indicators may become more apparent. The *Kansas Kids Count* indicators are created to help communities determine their priorities in addressing the needs of the children of Kansas.

# BIRTHS TO SINGLE TEENS



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When "kids have kids" it can set in motion a series of negative outcomes for the teen mother and her child, which become more difficult to overcome at each stage. The teen mother is less likely to complete her education which, in turn, increases her risk of long-term welfare dependency or employment at jobs with marginal pay and benefits. The child can be exposed to greater risk of pre- and perinatal outcomes like premature birth, low birth weight, complications at birth or even infant mortality. These birth outcomes may lead to later developmental delays and behavioral problems for the child.

The percent of births to single teens continues to rise in Kansas at a rate considerably higher than the national rate. In 1993, 10.9 percent of all births in Kansas were to single teens, an increase of 27 percent from the previous year. No community in the state can be considered immune from this problem. The rate in Wyandotte County continues to increase and now nearly one in five births in the county is to a single teen. However, the highest rate in the state is found in Lyon County where more than one in five births is to a single teen.

The percent of children approved for free school meals is a new indicator of economic well-being which has been added this year. A direct measure of childhood poverty is available for individual counties in Kansas only every ten years through the census. The childhood poverty rate has been reported in the Kids Count Data Book for the past two years. Since it cannot be updated annually it was dropped from this year's book and alternative measures were sought.

The free meals program is a federally sponsored program whose history can be traced to the first government food assistance program for schools and institutions during the depression years of the 1930's. We have chosen to count children approved for the free meals program rather than those actually participating since participation can vary for reasons unrelated to the family's or child's need. With an active outreach effort to identify eligible children and relatively simple application process, it can be expected that most eligible school children are identified. However, families and children cannot be made to participate in the program.

Standards for eligibility are based on family size and income. The standards for the free meals program are set somewhat higher than federal poverty standards thus more children are eligible for free meals than are living in families with incomes below the poverty line. In Kansas, 24 percent of the school children have been approved for the free meals program in 1994. This number is up from the 22 percent approved over the base years of 1991-93 and is considerably higher than the most recent available childhood poverty figure of 14 percent in 1989.

Considerable variation in this measure exists across the counties of Kansas. This variation seems to closely parallel the childhood poverty rates previously reported in the data book. The availability of these data from the Kansas State Board of Education and the apparent commitment to make them available on an ongoing basis will make this a very useful additional measure for the Kansas Kids Count Data Book.

# CHILDREN RECEIVING ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE



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This indicator is another proxy measure for childhood poverty similar to the free meals indicator. As a measure of the use of specific services, it represents an imperfect measure of the need for such services. Its main advantage is that it is available as a measure for all counties in Kansas on an annual basis. However, when examining variations across time and across counties in the state, it is necessary to question whether these variations represent differences in the economic well-being of children and their families or whether they result from differences in administrative practices or program participation.

These data indicate, by county and for the state, the number and percent of children receiving cash assistance, medical assistance or food stamps. Each child is counted only once regardless of how many programs they may be participating in. Rates shown here are generally lower than those shown for the free meals indicator for two reasons. First, income eligibility for these economic assistance programs is generally lower than the eligibility for the free school meals program therefore fewer families qualify. In addition, this is a measure of participation rather than eligibility and not all eligible families apply and participate.

# CHILDHOOD DEATHS

The child death rate is calculated per 100,000 children ages 1 to 14 years old and includes deaths from all causes. In 1993, 155 children (ages 1-14) died in Kansas of all causes. The leading cause of these deaths is accidents.

After steady and rather dramatic declines over the past ten years, the child death rate in Kansas now appears to be leveling off. Both the number of deaths and the rate of childhood deaths actually increased slightly in 1993 over the previous year. However, we should not lose sight of the advances made in this area. In 1985 the child death rate for Kansas was 17 percent higher than the national rate while the current rate is below the national average. Special efforts will be required to achieve further reductions in this indicator and to assure that the gains made in previous years are not lost.

Individual county data on this measure may be difficult to interpret because of the small number of deaths involved in calculating the rate. Nevertheless, we believe that the death of a child is an event of such significance that it demands our attention in the active search for methods to avoid the recurrence of future deaths or injury to children in our communities.

# INFANT MORTALITY



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In 1990, Kansas had one of the lower infant mortality rates in the country, ranking 18th among all states. Significant declines in infant mortality made in the early 1980's have now leveled off over the past five years and more recently there has even been a slight increase. Kansas' rank had slipped to 26 in 1991. Have we reached the point at which no further reductions in infant mortality are possible? Not when 17 other states and at least six other countries have rates below that of Kansas. Not when rates in some of our more populated counties are 20 to 50 percent above the state rate. Not when one of our more economically advantaged counties has a rate that is about half of the state rate. It should be possible to address these wide differences in a state like Kansas.

The infant mortality rate is a measure of the number of deaths of children prior to their first birthday. The rate is measured per 1000 live births during the same time period. As with other death rate measures provided in this book one must be cautious in working with rates based on a small number of deaths. Nevertheless, every infant death is an important event which should be examined by the community to learn if future deaths and injuries can be avoided.

In 1993, 325 infants died in Kansas. The main causes of infant death are premature births and low birth weight, respiratory distress syndrome, and complications associated with pregnancy. Many of these problems can be avoided or controlled with early prenatal care.

# BIRTHS WITH EARLY PRENATAL CARE

Early prenatal care (beginning in the first trimester) has been shown to improve birth outcomes for both the mother and child. It has been estimated that every dollar spent on prenatal care returns three dollars in reduced costs associated with complications of birth and prolonged hospital stays. Prenatal care is an investment opportunity we cannot afford to miss.

The percent of mothers reporting that they received early prenatal care continues to slowly climb in Kansas reaching 84 percent in 1993. In Greeley and Hodgeman counties, 100 percent of mothers giving birth in 1993 had received early prenatal care. Nine counties - Coffey, Ellis, Jackson, Johnson, Leavenworth, Nemaha, Osage, Saline, and Shawnee - who experienced more than 100 births in 1993, achieved rates of 90 percent or higher. Some counties, however, continue to lag far behind these impressive numbers. In six counties - Barber, Chautauqua, Kearny, Riley, Seward, and Stevens - more than one out of four mothers did not receive early prenatal care in 1993 and this condition has actually worsened compared to the previous five years in these counties.

# KINDERGARTNERS FULLY IMMUNIZED BY AGE 2

The near-eradication in the United States of familiar childhood diseases by the mid-1980's has made some people less conscientious about vaccinating their children until many are forced to complete vaccinations prior to enrolling in kindergarten. The result is a resurgence of childhood diseases. In the case of measles, which began to come back in 1989, the patients are much sicker than in previous epidemics.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that a series of basic vaccinations against such diseases as measles and whooping cough should be completed for all children by two years of age in order to best insure the protection of the child and community. In Kansas in 1993, two out of five children failed to achieve this recommended protection.

In roughly one-third of Kansas counties less than half of the two year olds have received all recommended vaccinations. In Finney, Graham, Neosho, Woodson, and Wyandotte counties, fewer than one out of every three two year olds were fully immunized. In 1993, no Kansas counties reached the national goal for the year 2000 which is to fully immunize 90 percent of all two year olds.

The state and many local communities have undertaken special efforts to immunize children in the past few years. Insufficient time has elapsed to see any benefits from these programs. Data used to calculate the immunization rates presented here are based on a retrospective survey of students as they enroll for kindergarten. It could be expected then to take three to five years for improvements in immunization of children to appear in the retrospective kindergarten data.

# LOW BIRTH WEIGHT BABIES



Being born at low birth weight (less than 5 1/2 pounds) greatly reduces the baby's ability to survive and thrive. Over one-half of the infants who die were born low birth weight. Those who survive are more likely to have illnesses, disabilities and behavioral problems in school.

The percent of low birth weight babies continues to rise in Kansas standing at 6.6 percent of births in 1993. Due to the relatively small number of births impacted by low birth weight, it is most helpful to look at counties with larger populations and more births in searching for patterns and solutions to this problem in Kansas. Several larger counties stand out with low birth weight percentages below the state rate. These include: Douglas (6.3 percent); Johnson (5.1 percent); and Reno (6.3 percent). These counties could be looked to as potential models for approaches which could be applied elsewhere in the state. Target counties for improvement would include: Geary (9.6 percent); Sedgwick (7.1 percent); Shawnee (7.5 percent); and Wyandotte (9.7 percent).

1994 was a significant year for Head Start in Kansas. Spurred on by a new federal initiative, the state added 698 Head Start slots state wide, a 15 percent increase in slots. Six counties in the state created the first Head Start programs to serve children from low income families in their counties. Twenty-eight additional counties added slots.

Despite these dramatic gains, Head Start slots are now available to serve only 42 percent of the eligible children in the state. Head Start is more than custodial day care. It provides a comprehensive program which includes early childhood education, health, nutrition and social services to boost the school readiness of poor children. Through its work with the families of children served, it can also have an impact on the child's home environment and the lives of parents. The program is widely believed to be effective. Kansans should be proud of the increased availability of this program in our state and supportive of ongoing efforts to continue this trend.

Child care availability is measured as the number of licensed day care slots available for every 100 children under age 13. This is the first year for this indicator which we feel will be a useful additional measure reflecting early childhood care and education. State and county scores on this measure for Kansas can be evaluated on the basis of national experience that 25 child care slots per 100 children under 13 is sufficient to meet demand for that care. As a state, we are slightly below that benchmark with only 23 slots available for every 100 children under age 13.

Only 24 Kansas counties currently exceed the standard of 25 slots available for every 100 children. It is our hope that the identification of under served counties in this publication will serve to stimulate the expansion of existing and creation of new child care facilities in these counties. In future years we will be able to track these changes using the current 1994 data as the base year.

# HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATE POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION

The percentage of high school graduates pursuing post-secondary education or training held steady in 1992 and 1993 at 74 percent. This continues to represent a significant increase over the rate for the previous five years. It is too early to tell if this five year trend toward higher percentages is now leveling off.

Wide variations can be found across the state on this indicator. In some counties 80 to 90 percent of the high school graduates were enrolled in training or post-secondary education within six months of graduation from high school. In other counties, however, rates dip into the 50 and 60 percent range. These wide variations which cut across urban/rural boundaries seem difficult to justify on the basis of community or individual needs alone. In today's job market, some type of post-secondary training is increasingly necessary for all but the lowest paying positions.

# BIRTHS TO MOTHERS WITH LESS THAN A HIGH SCHOOL DEGREE

A child born to a mother who does not have a high school degree can be exposed to greater risk from multiple sources. The pregnant mother without a high school degree is more likely to be a teen, to smoke during pregnancy and engage in other behaviors which could be detrimental to the child in utero, and less likely to get early and complete prenatal care. She is more likely to experience complications during pregnancy and at birth which could be detrimental to her unborn child resulting in low birth weight. Due to her lack of education she is more likely to live in poverty and expose her newborn child to the added dangers of growing up in poverty. Children of mothers without a high school degree are themselves less likely to experience academic success than those whose mothers have a high school degree.

Births to mothers with less than a high school degree declined slightly in Kansas both in actual numbers and as a percent of all births. In 1993 there were 6,465 births to mothers with less than a high school degree compared to 6,695 the previous year. This represented 16 percent of all births compared to 18 percent the previous year. Of the more populated counties, Riley, Montgomery, Labette, Geary, Cherokee, and Butler saw substantial decreases in the percentage of births to mothers with less than a high school degree. On the other hand, Coffey, Lyon, Seward, and Shawnee experienced substantial increases on this indicator. Finney, Gray, Kearny and Seward counties continue to stand out with rates more than twice the state rate. Wyandotte County, with less than 8 percent of all births statewide in 1993, had more than 15 percent of the births to mothers with less than a high school degree.

# STUDENTS GRADUATING HIGH SCHOOL

In 1993, nineteen percent of the students in Kansas did not graduate on time. While the high school graduation rate in Kansas still ranks in the top quartile of states on this measure, our rate and ranking have dropped in recent years.

The economic costs of not completing high school are high. In 1992 the unemployment rate for those who dropped out was nearly twice that of those who graduated from high school but did not go on to college. Among those employed full-time, the median income of high school dropouts was only half that of high school graduates. Clearly Kansas cannot afford to lose ground on this measure.

It would appear that we are slipping on this measure in many areas of the state. Seventeen different counties recorded drops of 10 or more percent in the graduation rate in 1993 compared to the average over the previous five years. In Wyandotte County alone, with the fourth largest graduation class in the state, the graduation rate in 1993 dropped 25 percent. Of the three larger counties (Johnson, Sedgwick and Shawnee) only Johnson County recorded an improvement in the 1993 graduation rate. On the positive side, eight counties - Chase, Comanche, Graham, Jewell, Nemaha, Norton, Rawlins, and Wallace - all graduated 100 percent of their 1993 class on time. Only one of these counties (Nemaha) had over 100 students in their graduating class.

# REPORTED CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT



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This measure can be viewed as a proxy for the actual level of child maltreatment in the community. Child maltreatment is a breakdown in the normal functioning of the family that most people can agree requires special intervention to support the family and, in extreme cases which threaten the safety of the child, may require the removal of the child from the home. The child maltreatment rate can be viewed as both a demand for services and an outcome which should be directly affected by various services provided to children and families.

Unfortunately, the reported abuse/neglect rate is subject to fluctuations that are not tied directly to incidence of abuse/neglect in the community. National studies have indicated that less than half of the abused and neglected children in a community are known to child protective services. In Kansas, further problems exist with this measure as a result of faulty data collection at the state level. Problems with these data were noted in the 1994 *Kansas Kids Count Data Book*. In our judgment these problems have not been remedied in time for the 1995 book. We have therefore reluctantly decided not to print current data in this year's book for reported abuse/neglect. Because of the importance of this measure as an indicator of child well-being, we have reproduced in this book base data for the four most recent years for which we felt fairly reliable and valid data were available. It is our understanding and hope that new data systems being implemented by the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services will result in accurate and reliable recording of reports and confirmations of abuse and neglect in time for the next publication of the *Kansas Kids Count Data Book*.

# CONFIRMED CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT



To gain a more complete picture of the incidence of child abuse and neglect in Kansas, the *Kids Count Data Book* has in the past obtained data for both reports and confirmations of abuse and neglect from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. All reports of abuse and neglect are not true. At the same time, the failure to confirm a report upon investigation does not necessarily mean that there has been no abuse or neglect or that there is not a risk that abuse or neglect will occur. Nationwide, around 40 percent of reports are confirmed. In Kansas this number is much smaller with only about 12 percent of reports being confirmed historically. Many cases not confirmed, both in Kansas and in other states, are referred for family services.

As described under the indicator "Reported Child Abuse/Neglect," problems have existed in the statewide reporting system for child abuse/neglect for several years. In our view, these problems were too severe with the 1993 data to warrant publishing current rates for the state or individual counties. Because of the importance of these indicators in judging the well-being of children in Kansas, we have included data reported in previous years for base years which we believe to be fairly accurate. It is our expectation that we will be able to provide accurate data on reports and confirmations of abuse/neglect in future editions of the *Kansas Kids Count Data Book*.

The out-of-home placement rate is the number of children living apart from their parents and in the custody of the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services per 1000 children age 18 and under. Both the number of children and the state rate for 1993 held steady compared to the previous year. However, over the past six years this rate has increased substantially. It is too early to tell if this year's findings represent a trend towards steady or declining placement rates.

While comparisons across states on this measure can be difficult and subject to different interpretations, there is concern about possible overuse of this intervention and its impact on children, families and the state budget. Certainly it is hard to justify the wide variation that appears within our state on this measure. The placement rate in Wyandotte County is almost three times the state rate and more than twice the rate of Sedgwick County. Sumner County has a rate almost twice that of the state rate. If the placement rate in Wyandotte County alone could be reduced in the next year to the current state rate, the rate for the entire state would drop 13 percent!

Five counties have been excluded from this year's reports because it was discovered that children in placement were incorrectly allocated among these counties. It is our intent to assign children to the county of their family's residence. Careful review of these data provided by the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services has revealed that this may not always be how the data are recorded. Users of these data are advised to review data for their county with care and to contact the Kansas Kids Count project if they have any questions. Steps have been taken to remedy this problem for next year's out-of-home placement data.

# TEEN VIOLENT DEATH

The teen violent death rate measures deaths from homicide, suicide, and accidents among youth ages 15 to 19. It would probably surprise many people to know that in 1991 the teen violent death rate in Kansas was higher than the rates of two-thirds of the states.

In 1993, the teen violent death rate actually declined somewhat from the previous year. However, the 1993 rate is still considerably higher than the average rate for the state over the previous five years.

There were 127 violent deaths of teens in 1993 for a rate of 78.9 per 100,000 teens ages 15 to 19. Because of the relatively low incidence of violent teen deaths and the small teen populations in many of the Kansas counties, data for individual counties should be interpreted with caution. Only four Kansas counties - Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee and Wyandotte - had ten or more violent teen deaths in 1993. Of these four counties, only Wyandotte experienced a decline in the teen violent death rate relative to the previous five years. In smaller counties it is more helpful to look at the actual number of teen violent deaths rather than the rate. In our view, even a single teen violent death in a county which has not experienced any deaths for five years should be examined carefully to determine its causes and what steps can be taken to prevent future deaths and injuries to teens in the community.

Juvenile arrest rates are calculated for all types of offenses per 1,000 children and youths under the age of 18. This rate has been reported in previous books as rising steadily from 1990 through 1992. In 1993, the rate remained steady at 38 arrests per 1000 children and youth.

While being arrested is certainly a negative outcome for a young person, and juvenile crime is a concern for many citizens, caution must be exercised in interpreting this measure. Differences in these rates over time and across counties may reflect changes in police activity or public policy rather than differences in juvenile behaviors. This is why we have labeled the domain under which this indicator falls both "social behavior and social control."

Rates continue to vary widely across Kansas and trends are hard to identify. Wyandotte County experienced a 16 percent decline in the arrest rate in 1993 and dropped below the state rate. More than offsetting this decrease, Johnson, Shawnee and Sedgwick counties saw a 16 percent increase. All of these counties now have rates well above the state rate. Saline County saw a huge 62 percent increase in its arrest rate which skyrocketed to 124 arrests per 1000 children and youths in the county. However, this rate, at over three times the state rate, is not the highest in the state. That distinction goes to Finney County who, with a 34 percent increase in 1993, had 130 arrests for every 1000 children and youth in the county.

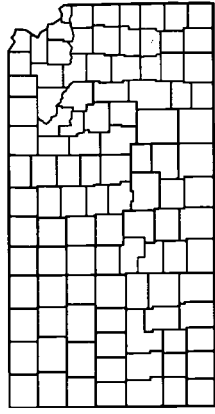

**ALLEN COUNTY**, located in southeast Kansas, has a median family income significantly below the state average and an unemployment rate of 5.8%. The state rate is 4.2%. Citizens in Allen County can be proud of the decrease in low birth weight babies, which declined by 30% from the base years and is well below the state average. Other areas in which the situation for children has improved in Allen County include the high school graduation rate and the juvenile arrest rate. Attention should be drawn to the immunization rate for 2 year olds in Allen County which has declined and is one of the worst in the state. The out-of-home placement rate is also extremely high, close to twice as high as the state rate. Of further concern is the infant mortality rate which increased 18% from the base years.

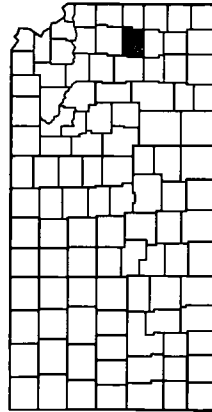

**ANDERSON COUNTY** has a small, homogeneous population in which approximately 1 out of 4 people are under age 18. Anderson County has a remarkably low rate of births to single teens. At 4.4%, it is less than half the state rate. The percentage of students graduating from high school improved from the base years and exceeds the state rate. Of particular concern to young families in Allen County is the lack of availability of licensed child care coupled with the lack of a Head Start program. Although improving, less than half the two year olds in Anderson County are fully immunized, according to the most recent data available.

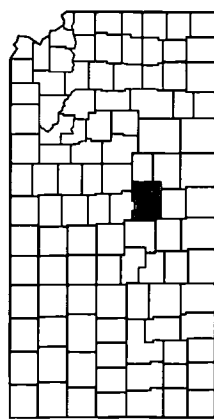

**WOODSON COUNTY** showed significant improvement in the percent of births to mothers with less than a high school education. The percent of students graduating is above the state average. Of concern is the decline in the percent of kindergartners fully immunized by age 2, experiencing almost a 40% drop in the current year which places this indicator below the state average.

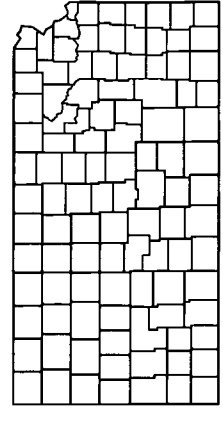

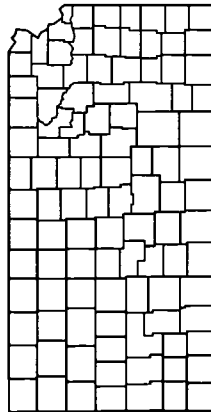

**K**ANSAS has increased the percent of Head Start participation by 18%. There have been moderate gains in the percent of high school graduates pursuing post-secondary education/training. The Economic Well-Being indicators experienced a continuing decline which is not good news for the children in Kansas. Of particular concern is the continued increases in the percent of births to single teens. The indicators under Emotional Well-Being continue deteriorating in the out-of-home placements, teen violent death rate and the juvenile arrest rate.

# APPENDIX

The selection of data for the annual *Kansas Kids Count Data Book* is an on-going process. It is impacted by the decisions of the project's funder, the Annie E. Casey Foundation; the *Kansas Kids Count* Steering Committee; and the projects' three partners, Kansas Action for Children, the University of Kansas School of Social Welfare and FryeAllen Advertising, Inc.

The Casey Foundation produces an annual national *Kids Count Data Book* and asks that each state project replicate the same indicators on a county-by-county basis in their state data books.

The *Kansas Kids Count* Steering Committee and the three *Kansas Kids Count* partners make their indicator decisions based in part on the following criteria:

- availability of data for a significant number of the state's 105 counties
- pertinence of the data to policy making concerning children's issues
- direct outcome measures versus indirect measures  
(for example, does the indicator measure the actual high school graduation rate or the availability of high school dropout prevention programs for at-risk children?)

Data resource persons within each of the state agencies which provide data for construction of the indicators assist the Steering Committee and partners in their review of potential indicators. In addition to providing access to the data, these resource persons help determine the quality and availability of data and suggest new ways of presenting the data.

The 1995 *Kansas Kids Count* indicators were determined after a great deal of discussion and research. Central to the discussion was the desire to obtain quality data reflecting current conditions and trends for children in Kansas communities. These considerations have led to the adoption of some new indicators, omission of other indicators and some modifications in the calculation of indicator scores and trends.

## NEW INDICATORS

We have added one new indicator of economic well-being. This new indicator is the percent of school age children approved for free school lunch or breakfast. Since eligibility for the free meals program is based solely on family income, this indicator can serve as a proxy for childhood poverty. By using the percent

approved rather than the percent participating in the program, we avoid, to a greater extent, variations which might result from different administrative practices or community norms. Reliable data are available on this measure on an annual basis and by county. The second new indicator measures the availability of licensed child care for children under 13 years of age. This indicator has been combined with an existing indicator of the availability of Head Start for preschool children who live in families with incomes below the poverty level to form a new indicator group which has been labeled "Early Childhood Care and Education."

## OMITTED INDICATORS

Drug and alcohol use by school age children is a major concern in most Kansas communities and was identified early in the *Kids Count* project by members of the Steering Committee as an area of concern. Last year we were able for the first time to obtain data to construct two new indicators of regular use of alcohol and use of other drugs: Percent Children in Grades 5-12 Who Regularly Use Alcohol; and Percent Children in Grades 5-12 Who Have Used Other Drugs. Data for the construction of these indicators were not available in time for this year's publication because of changes in administering the survey.

A direct measure of childhood poverty for all counties in Kansas is only available from the census every ten years. County data on childhood poverty rates have been published for 1980 and 1990 in the past two *Kansas Kids Count Data Books*. Rather than continue to rely on these dated figures for the 1995 book, we have identified and reported other proxy measures under "Economic Well-Being."

## CURRENT AND BASE YEARS

Current year data are provided for the most recent available year. Because of time required for agencies which serve as our primary data sources to collect the data used to construct the indicators and the time required to produce the book, the 1995 data reports 1993 data for many indicators as the "current year." For some indicators the "current year" is 1994. The reader is cautioned to check each indicator to determine the exact time period being reported. When available data permit, the base year rate will be the average rate for the five years preceding the current year. Data for all indicators is not available for five prior years and again the reader is

advised to check to determine the exact time period covered for a specific indicator of interest.

#### POPULATION ESTIMATES

Data used in the 1995 book range from 1987 to 1994. Many of the indicators reported here rely on census data for a population count which is used as the denominator in calculating a rate. For example, Child Death Rate is the number of deaths divided by the number of children ages 1 to 14. Actual counts of the number of children by age group in each county can only be obtained in the decennial census. Estimates of the current population were obtained using a standard mathematical extrapolation procedure. Data from the 1980 and 1990 census were used to compute an average annual growth rate. This rate was then employed to derive the current population estimates.

#### DATA ANALYSIS

Rates are not reported for each indicator in each year for some counties. These missing data result from several sources. Sometimes data were simply not available for certain counties. On several occasions, available data were judged to be of poor quality and were not reported. For some indicators a county rate might not be calculated because it was judged to not be "meaningful." The last situation arises primarily in counties with small populations and with indicators which have low incidence rates in the general population. Any county which experiences at least one occurrence of an indicator event (e.g., an infant death) has a rate calculated. To judge whether a zero occurrence was meaningful, we first calculated the expected frequency of the event in a given county based on the rate for the state as a whole. If the expected frequency is less than one, we do not report the rate and, thus, list only a "0". In this case, we are saying that there are simply too few occurrences of the event (e.g., births) due to small population numbers to have any expectation of the event in a single year. If the expected frequency is less than one and the county experiences one or more occurrences of the event, we calculate and report a rate. In this case, we are saying that the event would be unlikely to occur in this county due to the small numbers of people and the fact that it did occur is noteworthy.

Nevertheless, many of these rates are based on very low occurrences of the under-

lying event and, as a result, may experience dramatic swings from year to year.

#### INTERPRETING INDICATOR RATES

This report provides several ways to judge the indicator score for a particular county.

- Decile ranks provide a comparison of the county relative to all other counties in the state. For all indicators, low decile scores indicate that the county does well compared to others while high decile scores indicate that the county does relatively poorly. A decile score of "1" indicates that the county is in the top 10 percent while a decile score of "10" indicates that the county is in the bottom 10 percent. An unusual situation can occur when many counties show the same rate. When this occurs the decile rankings have to be adjusted. For example, since thirty percent of the counties had no juvenile arrests, there were no ranks of 1 or 2 given, and all of the counties with 0 arrests are ranked "3." This indicates that the county ranked in the top thirty percent of the state.
- A county's indicator score can also be compared with the state average or mean score. In this way, one can see if the county score is better or worse than the average for the state as a whole. Given the wide diversity in demographics across the 105 Kansas counties, it may also be helpful to compare your county with other specific counties that you judge to be similar with respect to important variables such as size, income or geographic area.
- It is also important to compare current county indicator scores with past base year data to determine whether the situation is improving or getting worse for a specific indicator. Percent change over time is presented for all indicators with base year and current year data. On the county pages a bar graph is presented where these percent change scores have been converted to indicate "better" or "worse" trends over time.

As always, we invite your feedback about the *1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book* and input regarding future productions of the book.

## ECONOMIC WELL-BEING

**Births to Single Teens** is the percentage of live births that occur to unmarried women under age 20. Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

**Children Approved for Free School Meals** is the percentage of children enrolled in school who have been approved for free school meals. Data are from Kansas State Board of Education.

**Children Receiving Economic Assistance** is the number of children receiving any form of cash assistance (adoption, AFDC regular, AFDC unemployed parent, foster care, general assistance or refugee), medical assistance (child in state institution, extended medical, pregnant women and children, medically needy, disabled medically needy families, SSI disabled, special pregnant women and children or work transition) or food stamps per hundred children under the age of 18. Each child receiving one or more forms of assistance is counted only once. The count is obtained from a single month (June, 1994) and is, therefore, not indicative of the total number of children receiving assistance during the entire year.

## PHYSICAL HEALTH & SAFETY

**Childhood Death, Ages 1-14 (per 100,000 children)** is the number of deaths from all causes to children between the ages 1 and 14, per 100,000 children of those ages. Data regarding childhood deaths are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. Total number of children is based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

**Infant Mortality** (per 1,000 live births) is the number of deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births. The data were provided by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

**Births with Early Prenatal Care** is the percentage of births that are to women who started prenatal care in the first three months of their pregnancy. Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

**Kindergartners Fully Immunized by Age 2** is the percentage of children in kindergarten who were adequately immunized by age 2, based on a retrospective survey of immunization certificates at the time of enrollment in kindergarten.

Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

**Low Birth Weight Babies** is the percentage of live births recorded as low birth weight. Babies of low birth weight are those who weigh under 2,500 grams (5.5 pounds) at birth. The data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

## EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE & EDUCATION

**Head Start Participation** is the number of Head Start enrollment slots divided by the estimated number of children age 3-4 living in families with incomes below the U.S. poverty threshold. Rates are expressed as percentages. Data on Head Start enrollment slots are from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Region VII. Data on children in poverty are based on projections from the U.S. Census, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 3. These poverty data are reported for children age 5 and under and not for 3-4 years of age. The proportion of children 3-4 was calculated from the total population of children age 5 and under. This proportion was used to calculate the number of 3-4 year old children in poverty.

**Child Care Availability** is the capacity of registered day care homes, licensed day care homes, group day care homes, child care centers and preschools per hundred children age 13 and under. The Child Care data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. Population data are extrapolated from the U.S. Census.

## EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT

**High School Graduate Post-Secondary Education/Training** is the percentage of the last year's high school graduating class which is enrolled in post-secondary education or training (four year college or university, two year college, other type of college or other non-college institution) five to six months after graduation. Data are from school districts' annual survey of graduates compiled by the Kansas Department of Education.

**Births to Mothers with Less than a High School Degree** is the percent of live births that occur to women who have not received a high school degree as indicated on the birth certificate. Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

**Students Graduating High School** is the percentage of ninth grade public school students who graduated four years later. It is computed by taking the ninth grade enrollment, subtracting the number of dropouts in each of the next four years and then dividing that by ninth grade enrollment. Data are from the Kansas State Board of Education.

#### EMOTIONAL WELL-BEING

**Reported Child Abuse/Neglect (per 1,000)** is the number of child abuse/neglect reports per 1,000 children under age 18. Data on child abuse/neglect reports are from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Data on total population under 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

**Confirmed Child Abuse/Neglect (per 1,000 children)** is the number of confirmed cases of child abuse/neglect per 1,000 children and youth under age 18. Data on child abuse/neglect cases are from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Data on total population under age 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

**Out-of-Home Placement** is the number of children and youth who are in SRS custody and in placement outside their family of origin per 1,000 children and youth age 18 and under. Data are from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Data on total population under 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

**Teen Violent Deaths, Ages 15-19 (per 100,000 teens)** is the number of deaths from homicides, suicides and accidents to teens between the ages of 15 and 19 per 100,000 teens of those ages. The data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

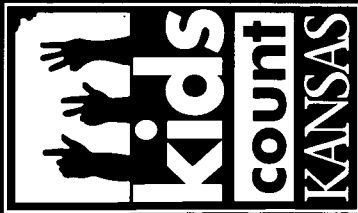
#### SOCIAL BEHAVIOR & SOCIAL CONTROL

**Juvenile Arrests (per 1,000 children)** is the number of juvenile arrests (all offenses) per 1,000 children and youths under the age of 18. Arrest data are from the Kansas Bureau of Investigation. Data on total population under 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

#### DEMOGRAPHICS

**Median Family Income** is the median annual income for families. Families are two or more persons who are related by birth, marriage or adoption and who live together as one household. The median is the figure at which half the families have an income less than that amount and half have an income more than that amount. 1979 dollars are adjusted for inflation to reflect 1989 dollars. Data are from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1980 and 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 3.

**Unemployment** is the percent of the civilian labor force estimated to be unemployed. Estimates are provided by Kansas Department of Human Resources, Labor Market Information Services.



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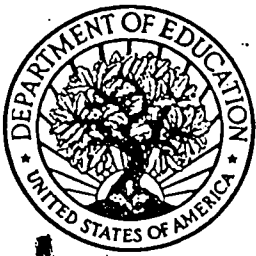
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
