SUMMARY: Explores methods of helping children become aware of various forms of sexism and counter pressures for sex role conformity. Discusses research findings on differing adult treatment of girls and boys, conscious and unconscious ways in which adults mould children to fit societal sex roles, the harm of sex roles in children's development and the special harm of "masculine" behaviours to society. Presents ten anti-sexist strategies.

**SUMMARY:** Recalls the activity of a third grade teacher, Jane Elliot, who, in 1970 in Riceville, Iowa, divided the class into brown-eyed students and blue-eyed students to illustrate discrimination. This experiment was documented on a film entitled *The Eye of the storm*. Now 14 years later, at a school reunion, the students, now adults, are shown the film. They discuss how they felt at that time and what they learned. Jane Elliot is also shown conducting a similar activity at a workshop for Iowa State corrections personnel.

**CONTENTS:** *Styles of communication -- Planning a presentation -- Making a presentation*

**SUMMARY:** Shows students how to make more effective formal and informal presentations and how to use language more flexibly. In segment 1, three young people learn to use language that is appropriate to the situation in their lunch delivery service. They also learn that a polite specific complaint is much more effective than angry accusations. Segment 2 emphasizes planning. When their dog is bitten by what may be a rabid fox, Brenda and Steve join a campaign to get pets vaccinated. After deciding whom to warn, what to say and how, they present their case with success. In segment 3, viewers learn about the techniques that can make an oral presentation more interesting as Shannon polishes her oral presentation skills in preparation for the school speech contest. She subsequently wins the contest with a speech on her proud Navajo Indian heritage and, in so doing, is able to shame the school bigots who have made fun of her.

Such questions are answered and ways are suggested on how to eliminate discrimination. The Canadian Human Rights Commission is introduced and one learns from which groups they receive the greatest number of complaints regarding human rights violations.

Although the company has a monopoly on the fur trade in Canada, the Métis, at this time, begin trading with the Americans who pay them far more for their furs. Madeleine feels loyalty for her

brother Joseph who is known to trade with the Americans as well as with her husband. However, circumstances force her to choose and she returns with her children to the Métis camp of her brother. Contains some Cree and French dialogue with English subtitles.

**SUMMARY:** A dramatic portrayal of life in a Métis community in Northern Alberta in 1985. The story focuses on Donna, the 15-year-old daughter of an alcoholic and diabetic mother, and Joan, a relative and single parent. The kinds of tensions that exist between the Métis community and the town are illustrated. Donna's grandmother, with her wisdom, brings an atmosphere of calm into their otherwise turbulent lives. The story ends with the tragic death of four teenaged Métis. Contains some Cree dialogue with English subtitles.
