

#### **ABSTRACT**

This brochure presents facts about public and private schools in Maryland. The average daily membership in the state in school year 1994-95 was 784,569.4 students. Statistics are presented on fall public and private school enrollment, the number of schools, and the number of staff employed. Other tables describe student characteristics such as race, language minority status, and economic status as indicated by participation in food service programs. Numbers of dropouts and graduates are detailed, and information is given about educational finance, such as per pupil costs and major state aid programs. Participation figures are provided for special programs, such as special education, adult education, vocational education, and correctional education. Some statistics about other services, such as school media centers, are included. Maryland ranks thirteenth among the states in current expenditures per student in both average daily attendance and per pupil in fall enrollment, but is sixth in per capita personal income. Public school teacher salaries in Maryland rank twelfth in the country. (Contains 33 tables, 4 graphs, and 2 maps.) (SLD)







- More than 227,000 Maryland residents have been awarded high school diplomathrough GED testing since 1941.
- Fifty-seven percent of Maryland's 1994 GED examinees were under 25 years age. Of this population, 68% passed the GED test and earned a high school diploma.
- In the most recent study, only 66% of graduating high school seniors national were able to meet Maryland's minimum score requirements on the GED test Maryland is one of 17 states which require higher minimum passing scores on the GED tests than the other 33 states.
- One out of every 20 GED recipients pursues a college education.
- GED graduates account for approximately 14% of Maryland's high scho graduates.



#### Did You Know . . .

- Public school enrollment reached an all-time high of 922,091 students in 1972, dropped 37% to 671,560 in 1985, and has been rising steadily since. Over the past ten years, enrollment has increased by almost 20% with the largest increase occurring over the previous five years (12.6%).
- Sailor, a project supported by the library community of Maryland and MSDE, provides electronic access via Internet to state, national, and international resources through a local telephone connection.
- Between 1993 and 1995, the percent of students scoring at satisfactory levels on the Maryland School Performance Assessment Program tests has increased in every area except 5th grade reading and 8th grade writing.
- Yearly attendance rates for Maryland's secondary students have risen more than one percent since the inception of the School for Success reform plan.
- Maryland's Tomorrow is a multi-year, year-round dropout prevention initiative of school systems and the local employment training system funded by federal and state aid. Evaluation data shows that students enrolled in the program have improved their graduation rates and scores on Maryland Functional Tests which assess their mastery of basic skills in math, reading, writing, and citizenship.
- There were 3,774 new teachers hired for the 1994-95 school year. Of these, 64% had no prior teaching experience, 20% had prior Maryland teaching experience, and 16% had prior teaching experience outside Maryland. Twenty-two percent of the new hires were ethnic minorities.
- The areas of the greatest projected shortage of qualified teachers for the 1995-96 year are computer science, ESOL, chemistry, general science, physical science, and special education for the severely handicapped and visually impaired.
- Maryland public school systems spent \$99.5 million in FY 95 for heating, cooling, and power at an average cost of \$125 per student and \$0.86 per square foot.
- The average energy usage by Maryland public school systems was lower in the 1995 school year than in any year on record.









