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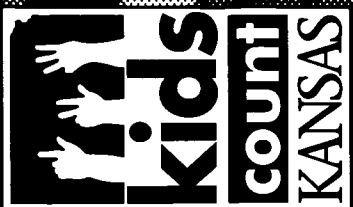
ABSTRACT

This 1996 Kids Count data book presents data on 20 indicators of child well-being in Kansas, grouped into 6 areas: economic well-being, physical health and safety, educational achievement, early childhood care and education, emotional well-being, and social behavior and social control. The data are grouped by county for each indicator, by indicator for each county, and by indicator for the state as a whole. The report indicates that data improved in eight areas: (1) high school graduates pursuing post-secondary education/training; (2) births to mothers with less than a high school degree; (3) Head Start participation; (4) births with early prenatal care; (5) childhood death rate; (6) infant mortality; (7) use of drugs by youth; and (8) availability of licensed child care. However, data worsened in six other areas: (1) births to single teens; (2) low birth weight babies; (3) students graduating high school; (4) teen violent deaths; (5) juvenile arrests; and (6) children approved for free school meals. 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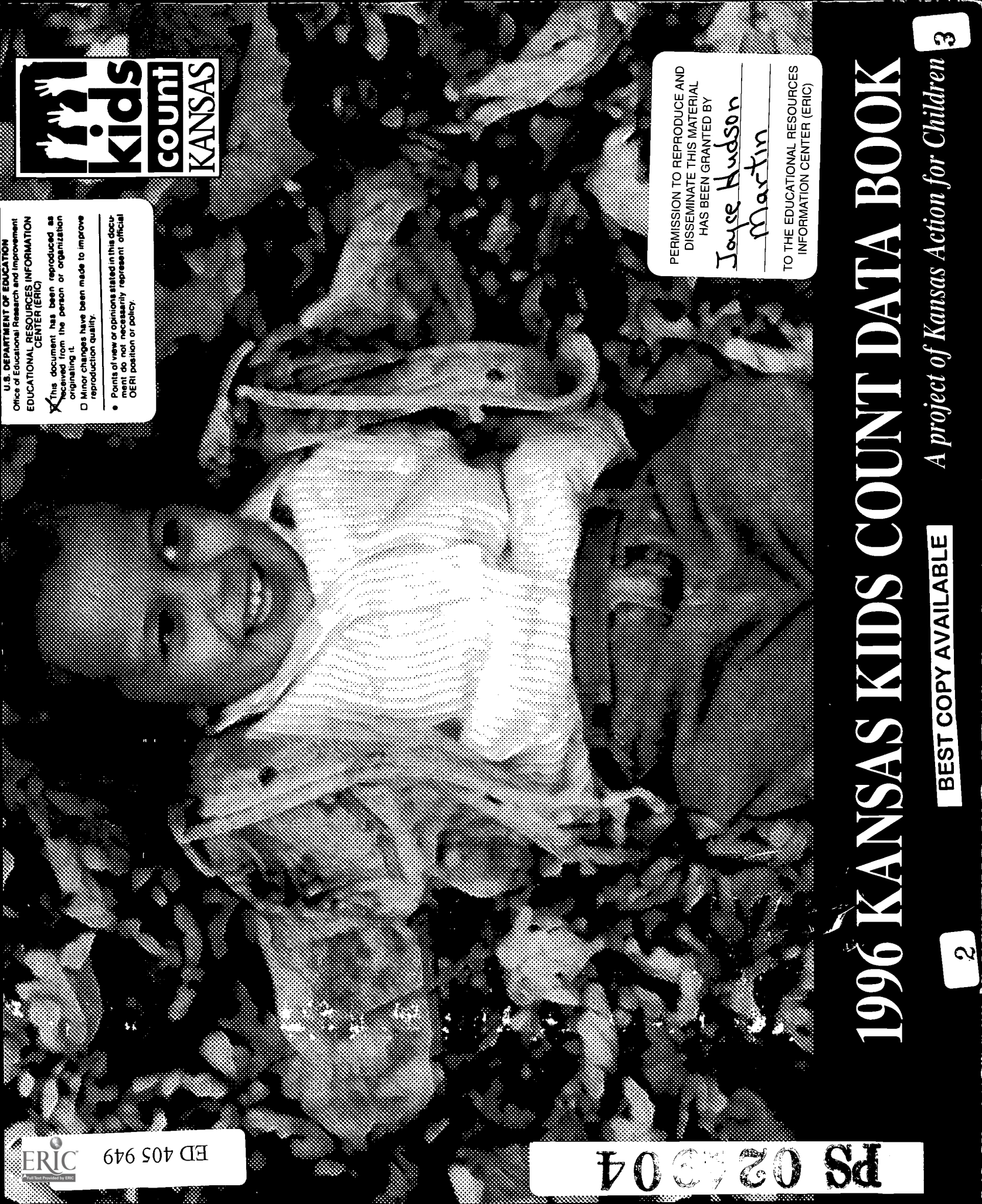

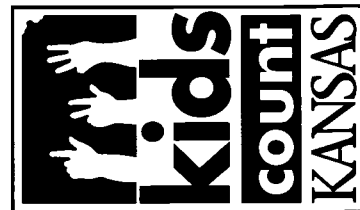
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Ideas, traditions and values are woven together as unseen threads. Patterns begin to take shape. As time moves forward, a large unseen tapestry forms different designs weaving throughout our communities.

Some of these designs are the threads which the 1996

KANSAS KIDS COUNT Data Book measures; what trends or patterns are our children of Kansas facing? The twenty indicators attempt to measure the patterns which have developed and are developing. A few of the everyday patterns our children face include teen pregnancy, drug and alcohol use, educational opportunities, educational failure, economic struggles and health issues.

Some patterns continue to weave a nice design for the children of Kansas as they have the past few years. Educational pursuits after high school graduation continue to grow as more students strive to improve their future economic opportunities. Childhood death rates for children 1-14 continue decreasing as more attention is focused on safety issues.

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Within individual communities, designs have formed which are unique to their children. The patterns may or may not

look like the state's. Communities should ask if the weave of their patterns are forming the design they want for their children. If so, then continuation of the pattern should be applauded. If a community does not like the design forming, then the pattern needs to be altered.

As the tapestry of the state continues to be woven, this is the first time a *KANSAS KIDS COUNT Data Book* has shown an equal number of conditions worsening as the number of conditions getting better. In the past books, the number of worsening trends always exceeded the number of improving trends. It is hoped that this is the beginning of a new design for the children of Kansas.

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1996 KANSAS INDICATORS

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OVERVIEW OF INDICATORS AND SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Twenty indicators were selected for the 1996 *KANSAS KIDS COUNT Data Book*. These indicators were grouped into six areas: Economic Well-Being, Physical Health and Safety, Educational Achievement, Early Childhood Care and Education, Emotional Well-Being, and Social Behavior and Social Control.

Two indicators have returned to the 1996 data book: Youth Who Have Ever Used Drugs Other Than Alcohol and Use of Alcohol by Youth. This information is important to Kansas communities in order to be aware of the extent of this illegal and serious risk taking behavior by youth. The Use of Alcohol by Youth helps show the number of youth who are drinking alcohol beyond an initial experimental time.

Reported and confirmed child abuse and neglect figures were not reported in the 1995 *KANSAS KIDS COUNT Data Book* for the 1993 year due to under-recording of cases. This appears to happen more often in smaller counties. The decision was made to provide child abuse data on the indicator pages in the 1996 *KANSAS KIDS COUNT Data Book*. The data is not presented on the county pages because it appears that reporting problems still exist in many counties. However, the reporting of data is improving and more reliability is in the overall state figure and the more populated counties.

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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

Current year data for the 1996 *KANSAS KIDS COUNT Data Book* show improvement in eight areas: High School Graduates Pursuing Post-Secondary Education/Training, a 6 percent improvement; Births to Mothers with Less Than a High School Degree, a 3 percent improvement; Head Start Participation, a 4 percent improvement; Births with Early Prenatal Care, a 4 percent improvement; Childhood Death Rate, a 9 percent improvement; Infant Mortality, a 12 percent improvement; Use of Drugs by Youth, a 17 percent improvement; and the Availability of Licensed Child Care, a 6 percent improvement.

This has been the fourth year in a row that the *KANSAS KIDS COUNT Data Book* has shown progress in the rates of Childhood Death and the percent of High School Graduates Pursuing a Post-Secondary Education/Training.

INDICATORS GETTING WORSE

Conditions have worsened for 8 indicators. Births to Single Teens showed a 12 percent increase over the base years; although the percent of teen births was 9.2 percent — a bit lower than the previous year — the actual number of births were slightly higher. Low Birth Weight Babies increased by 3 percent over the base years. Students Graduating High School in time has

decreased by 5 percent. Two emotional Well-Being indicators worsened over time, the Teen Violent Death Rate per 100,000 Children, which increased 57 percent and the Juvenile Arrest Rate per 1000 Children, which increased 11 percent. The percent of Children Approved for Free School Meals, with an 8 percent increase, can be viewed as a negative with respect to measuring childhood poverty. However, in measuring the percent of children receiving services needed, increases may be viewed as a positive.

Even though problems still exist in the processing of data from some counties, the state figure shows the reported and confirmed child abuse and neglect figures continue to rise and should be interpreted as a continuing problem for Kansas. The out-of-home placement data has changed in collection methods and cannot be compared with base year data. Two indicators, Percent of Children Receiving Economic Assistance and Kindergartners Fully Immunized by Age 2 showed no percent change. The measurement of Youth Using Alcohol has no base years to use as a comparison, however, almost 27 percent of students responding report using alcohol more than 10 times. This can be interpreted as a serious problem area for our youth.

The sustained and concentrated effort to address the needs of our children must be continued by the communities of Kansas. Progress is being made in different areas for our children and working on making conditions better will take time, commitment, sustained efforts and energy directed at tackling these areas. In analyzing these indicators, local communities can determine where these concentrated efforts should be directed.

BIRTHS TO SINGLE TEENS



Communities able to reduce the number of unmarried young women having children may reap a number of benefits for their citizens. Births to single teens can result in many negative outcomes for both mother and child. An unmarried teen mother may have less educational and training opportunities, reducing her earning potential and increasing her likelihood of becoming dependent on welfare. Children of these young mothers are more likely to be born prematurely or at a low birth weight, both events that may lead to complications in later life. Children born to unmarried teens are much more likely to be living in poverty by ages 8 to 12.

In 1994, 9.2 percent of all births in Kansas were to unmarried women under the age of 20. While the percentage of teen births in 1994 decreased slightly from the 1993 rate, this drop is attributed to an overall increase in the birth rate rather than a real change in teen births. The number of single teens having babies in Kansas continued to increase this year. In fact, more unmarried teen women had babies in 1994 than in any prior year included in our data. Wyandotte County reported a decrease in the actual number of teen births, however this county continues to have the highest rate in Kansas. Nearly one in five births in Wyandotte County are to unmarried women under age 20.

CHILDREN APPROVED FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS

Although free school meal eligibility standards are slightly above the poverty line, the percentage of children eligible for federally sponsored free school meals is an indicator of the level of poverty in each county. Children are determined eligible for free school meals on the basis of family income and size. Because these data are available annually they allow for yearly appraisal of changes in eligibility, and the level of poverty.

The percentage of Kansas children approved for free meals continued to increase this year, 24 percent of Kansas school children are eligible. In four counties, Chautauqua, Elk, Seward, and Wyandotte over forty percent of the school children meet the eligibility requirements. Johnson County had the lowest rate of eligibility, only six percent of its school children met requirements.

CHILDREN RECEIVING ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE

This indicator represents an additional effort to describe the level of poverty among Kansas children. These data report the number and percentage of children receiving cash assistance, medical assistance, or food stamps, counting each child only one time regardless of the number of programs in which they may be enrolled. When examining results for each county the reader should consider the following: These data represent only those persons who seek assistance. Because some eligible persons may decline to seek assistance the data provided here probably underestimate the number of children in poverty. When evaluating these data the reader must consider to what extent differences may be attributed to the level of poverty versus agency practices or other local phenomena that may impact the likelihood of participation.

Almost one in five Kansas children receive some form of economic assistance. This year's state rate of participation declined approximately five percent from the June 1994 data. Participation rates ranged from a low of four percent in Gove and Sheridan counties to a high in Wyandotte county where one in three children receives some form of economic assistance.

CHILDHOOD DEATHS

This indicator reports the number of deaths per 100,000 children ages 1 to 14 years old. In 1994, 149 Kansas children died. Motor vehicle accidents are the most frequent cause of death to children in this age group.

The 1994 state death rate of 27.0 per 100,000 children represents over a four percent decline from last year's figure and a continuing decline from the base year average. A similar trend exists on the national level. The most recent available figures for childhood death indicated 28.8 deaths per 100,000 children.

The infrequent incidence of childhood deaths in many Kansas counties may make interpretation of county level rates difficult. Percent change rates, for example, vary dramatically on the basis of changes of just a few deaths each year. Despite the relative small number of childhood deaths, we feel it is important to call attention to the death of every child and continue efforts to obtain even greater reduction of this indicator.

INFANT MORTALITY



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The infant mortality rate reports deaths among children before their first birthday. In 1994, our state saw 285 infants die. This represents a reduction of 40 deaths since 1993 and is indicative of a decline from both the prior year and the five year average. Nationally the rate of infant deaths reached an all time low of 7.9 per 1,000 in 1994.

State figures also declined this year to a low of 7.6 deaths per 1,000 live births. While this decline is good news, room exists for continued improvement. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has established an infant mortality goal of 7.0 per 1,000 live births. We have work to do in Kansas to meet this goal.

The most prevalent causes of infant death are premature births and low birth weight, respiratory problems and other pregnancy complications. Early prenatal care represents an effective strategy for reducing these contributors to infant mortality.

There is an additional concern. The national trend toward declining infant mortality is not uniform across socio-economic or racial lines. The infant mortality rate among Black and Native American infants is not declining at near the rate of white children. There has also been a substantial increase in the gap in infant deaths rates between the most and least socially disadvantaged.

BIRTHS WITH EARLY PRENATAL CARE

It is recommended that pregnant women begin prenatal care in the first trimester of their pregnancy. This contact early in the pregnancy with a health care provider can help to assure that the woman is screened and informed regarding any special conditions or behaviors such as diabetes, high blood pressure, smoking, or use of alcohol which may place she or her baby at risk. When risks are identified early in the pregnancy, alternative interventions are available that have been proven effective. It has been estimated that every dollar spent on prenatal care returns three dollars in reduced costs associated with complications of birth and prolonged hospital stays.

Kansas has typically scored well on this indicator in comparison to other states and the percentage of mothers reporting that they received early prenatal care has been steadily increasing for the state. This trend has continued in the statistics reported this year. For the state as a whole, 85 percent of the mothers giving birth in 1994 reported that they received early prenatal care. Decatur County showed the most dramatic improvement in this measure, jumping to 91 percent in 1994 after averaging only 74 percent over the previous five years.

The success of many counties in reaching pregnant mothers with early prenatal care makes it even more difficult to understand how more than half the women giving birth in 1994 in Seward County did not receive early prenatal care. Three other counties, Stafford, Wichita, and Haskell, which have historically lagged behind the rest of the state on this measure, also showed substantial declines in the percentage of mothers receiving early prenatal care in 1994.

KINDERGARTNERS FULLY IMMUNIZED BY AGE 2

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends completion of a number of vaccinations against childhood diseases by age 2. These data report on immunization coverage at the following level by age two: 4 doses of Diphtheria, Pertussis, and Tetanus, 3 doses of Oral Polio Vaccine and one dose of Measles, Mumps and Rubella.

The state immunization rate was, within sampling error, similar to prior years. In four Kansas counties, Atchinson, Neosho, Wilson and Wyandotte less than one in three children were fully immunized by age two. Only Kiowa County currently meets the year 2000 goal of 90 percent immunization.

These data are collected by sampling records of currently enrolled kindergarten students to determine the percent who were fully immunized by age two. As such, these data report on the states performance three years earlier. Benefits of the considerable efforts made to improve immunization rates should become apparent in the next few years as anticipated increases in immunization of two year olds are demonstrated in samples of kindergarten children.

Expectations for continuing improvement may be borne out by findings of a recent telephone survey of 309 Kansas children between the ages of 19 and 35 months. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control found a state wide immunization rate of 82 percent. Although the sample size prevents making county level estimates, these figures suggest recent immunization efforts are making a difference.

LOW BIRTH WEIGHT BABIES



Low birth weight is defined as any baby weighing less than 2,500 grams (about 5.5 pounds). These babies have a much greater likelihood of dying within the first year after their birth and of experiencing developmental problems as they move through the growth stages.

The percentage of low birth weight babies born in this country has been increasing over the last decade. The Kansas rate, while below the national rate, has also been on the rise. While the rate for 1994 at 6.5 percent is higher than the average percentage over the preceding five years, it does mark a slight decline from the 1993 rate of 6.6 percent. It is too early to tell if this represents a trend toward better birth outcomes for children in Kansas.

The small percentages involved here combined with the small number of births in less populated counties can make interpretation of rates in these counties difficult but still meaningful. For example, the percentages of low birth weight babies in Cloud and Rice counties more than doubled in 1994. While these changes only involve 10 or 12 babies they are noteworthy and demand further examination in these counties to determine if something could be done to keep this from recurring.

Among the more populous counties, a significant improvement should be noted for Wyandotte County which had a 10 percent decline in its percentage of low birth weight babies for 1994. Opposite trends can be noted, however, for Shawnee and Johnson counties which experienced increases of 20 and 23 percent respectively.

HEAD START PARTICIPATION

Head Start is more than custodial day care. It provides a comprehensive program which includes early childhood education, health, nutrition, and social services to boost the school readiness of poor children. Through its work with the families of children served, it can also have an impact on the child's home environment and the lives of parents. While the effectiveness of the program has recently been questioned by some, empirical evidence still points to its benefits particularly when the quality of the program is maintained and children are enrolled for a sufficient time.

After a major expansion in the Head Start program in Kansas in 1994, a much more moderate increase was seen for 1995. The 15 percent growth in 1994 was followed by only a 4 percent increase in 1995. For Kansas in 1995 there were 44 available Head Start slots for every 100 children age 3-4 living in families with incomes below the U.S. poverty threshold. Given that less than half of the children eligible for Head Start in the state could be accommodated in existing programs, there would appear to be room for improvement in this measure. No Head Start program exists at all in 34 out of 105 counties in Kansas.

CHILDCARE FACILITY CAPACITIES

The availability of child care can affect parent's economic opportunities, limit children's chances to experience high-quality environments in their early childhood years and reinforce economic and social inequality. In the United States there is a recognized chronic, and worsening shortage of affordable, safe child care. The availability of child care is central to plans for welfare reform but people of every economic level can fall victim to the lack of availability of adequate child care.

Child care availability is measured as the number of licensed day care slots available for every 100 children under age 13. Scores for the state on this measure rose slightly in 1995 and now meet the national standard of 25 child care slots per 100 children under 13, which is felt to be sufficient to meet demand for child care. Still, only 32 Kansas counties meet or exceed this standard.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATE POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION

Some type of training or education beyond high school, whether it is a four year college or university, a two year college, vocational school or other non-college institution, is increasingly important for today's young adults to successfully compete in the job market. The majority of youth in Kansas go on to some type of post-secondary education within six months of high school graduation. This indicator continued to rise in 1994 to reach the benchmark of three-fourths of our high school graduates pursuing post-secondary education or training.

Counties continue to show wide variations on this measure with the lower decile rankings falling into the 50 to 60 percent range and the top ten percent of counties averaging 80 to 90 percent in post-secondary education in 1994. Anderson, Elk, and Hamilton counties all experienced improvements in this rate of over 20 percent. On the other hand, the rate in Coffey dropped by 25 percent and the county's decile rank dropped from 1 to 10. If further gains are to be made on this indicator, top counties will need to sustain their current levels and those counties with consistently lower rates will need to search for ways to make post-secondary education desirable and available to their high school graduates.

BIRTHS TO MOTHERS WITHOUT A HIGH SCHOOL DEGREE

This indicator is calculated as the percent of all live births where the mother has not received a high school degree prior to the birth of the child. Being born to a mother who does not have a high school degree exposes the child to multiple risks. The pregnant mother without a high school degree is more likely to be a teen, to smoke during pregnancy and engage in other behaviors which could be detrimental to the child in utero, and less likely to get early and complete prenatal care. She is more likely to experience complications during pregnancy and at birth which could be detrimental to her unborn child resulting in low birth weight. Due to her lack of education she is more likely to live in poverty and expose her newborn child to the added dangers of growing up in poverty. Children of mothers without a high school degree are themselves less likely to experience academic success than those whose mothers have a high school degree.

The percentage of births to mothers without a high school degree in Kansas appears to be steady at around 17 percent. The actual number of births to mothers without a high school degree continued to decline from 6,465 in 1993 to 6,256 in 1994. County rates vary widely across the state from a high of 47 percent in Seward County to 5 percent in Johnson County. Among the more populated counties in the state, noticeable declines can be seen this year in Cherokee, Cowley, Crawford, Douglas, Geary, and Johnson counties while Ford, Lyon and Seward counties showed substantial increases. While only involving 11 births to mothers without a high school degree, the percentage of these births more than doubled in Republic County in 1994

The percentage of students graduating high school on time is calculated by comparing the number of students graduating in the most recent class with the ninth grade enrollment four years earlier. We are unable at this time to adjust this percentage for transfers of students into and out of the district as statewide data on this migration of students is not available. Therefore, it should be recognized that counties experiencing growth in the high school age population in their communities are likely to have inflated graduation percentages while schools experiencing declining numbers in this age group may have lower than expected graduation rates.

Historically, Kansas has ranked high on this and related indicators. In the most recent report of national Kids Count data, only five states had lower dropout rates. However, the graduation rate in Kansas has been declining in recent years and this trend has continued. In 1994 the rate dropped below 80 percent for the first time in five years that the Kansas Kids Count project has been in operation. While graduation rates of 90 percent and higher are still common across counties in Kansas, there have been significant drops in rates for some of the more populated counties in the state. Wyandotte County registered an alarming drop of 31 percent in its graduation rate for 1994 compared to the average for the previous four years.

Child abuse and neglect involves situations where the child's family or community have failed to protect and nurture its children. This failure can arise from many causes. It can involve brutal acts of momentary violence or the more subtle long-term omissions of neglect. In all cases it involves serious harm to the child which can affect both their emotional and physical well-being for the rest of their lives. In many ways it represents the ultimate failure to fulfill our responsibilities to children and families.

Reports of abuse and neglect represent a call for help. For many families and in many communities the abuse/neglect hotline may represent the only available or visible source of help. Not all reports of abuse or neglect are true. However, based on national data, it can be estimated that at least half of the reports involve situations where the child may be at risk or the family could benefit by some form of external help. At the same time, we know that less than half of the abused and neglected children in a community are reported to child protective services.

In Kansas, reports of child abuse and neglect have increased by almost 50 percent over the past five years. We can be confident that this reported change represents a real increase in calls for help. Several factors, however, make it difficult to know whether this is an accurate measure of the increase in abuse and neglect in our state. Some of these difficulties go beyond the general problems associated with the lack of reporting and false reports and arise from data processing problems within the state of Kansas. In our judgment, data on reports of child abuse and neglect provided by the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services could not be trusted for the years 1992 and 1993. The 1994 *Kansas Kids Court Data Book* provided only baseline data and no new rates. This year we have decided to provide figures for 1994 but only on the indicator pages. Abuse/neglect data for individual counties is not presented on the county pages because we believe that problems still exist in the processing of these data from some counties. Overall we believe that the data have improved and that the problems may be limited to some of the smaller counties in the state making state figures and figures for some larger counties more reliable. We would urge caution in interpreting any data presented here on reports of abuse and neglect. In particular, any trends indicating a decrease in reporting rates should be viewed with skepticism in that such a trend runs counter to experiences across the country and the direct experiences of those working in the child welfare field.

In 1994, Kansas confirmed just over 10 percent of the reported cases of child abuse and neglect in the state. This confirmation rate is substantially lower than other states which generally range between 30 and 50 percent. The national rate is about 40 percent. Furthermore, the confirmation rate in Kansas for 1994 is considerably lower than the already low 12 percent rate observed in the base years (1987-89, and 1991).

Given these low confirmation rates, and the fact that an estimated 50 percent of cases of abuse/neglect go unreported, the number of confirmed cases of abuse and neglect in Kansas counties must be viewed as an extremely conservative estimate of the incidence of abuse and neglect in our state.

As noted in the previous table for reported child abuse/neglect, there is concern that data collection on reported and confirmed cases of child abuse/neglect are not reliable in Kansas. Data provided by the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services for 1990, 1992 and 1993 were not used because of apparent under-recording of cases in 30 to 40 percent of the counties. This under-recording appears to be most prevalent in smaller counties and therefore has somewhat less of an effect on overall state numbers.

While we feel that the data for 1994 have improved, evidence of continuing problems have led us to exclude abuse/neglect data from the county pages of the 1996 *Kansas Kids Count Data Book*. We are providing county and state data on the indicator data tables but urge that it be used with caution when viewing individual county data. In our view, any county reporting declining or even constant levels of confirmed cases of child abuse and neglect should be regarded with skepticism.

Both the failure to properly record reports and confirmations and the decreasing confirmation rate for reported cases of child abuse and neglect lead to lowered numbers of confirmed cases. Despite this problem, the state has experienced a 25 percent increase in the number of confirmed cases of child

The out-of-home placement rate reported here is the number of children living apart from their parents and in the custody of the state or local tribal councils per 1000 children age 18 and under. While this indicator has been used in the last three Kansas Kids Count Data Books, this year there were significant changes in how the data were collected and processed by the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. We believe that the new data will provide a more accurate and more current picture of the placement of children from specific counties in Kansas. However, the new data were difficult to reconcile with the old and were likely to create inaccurate representations of trends within the counties. For this reason we have restricted data on out-of-home placement of children to include only data from the two most recent years for which the new data source was available - 1994 and 1995. The resulting limitation is that longer trends in placement data are not available from this report. We believe that this sacrifice is worth the more accurate picture that these data will provide of the current situation and of future trends.

The out-of-home placement data reported this year reflect one additional change in the data sources. This year we were able to obtain data on placement of Native American children outside their family of origin but under the jurisdiction of their tribes. Only five counties - Brown, Doniphan, Jackson, Shawnee, and Jefferson - are affected by these additional counts and the number of children involved is small (total of 28 children). Nevertheless, we believe that it is important to include all Kansas children in Kids Count and are pleased to be able to incorporate these data into our book this year.

Statewide data on out-of-home placement should be comparable with past reports and appear to indicate a leveling off or slight decrease in rates for the past two years. It appears that rates may have peaked in 1993. Rates vary tremendously across our state even in our most populated counties, ranging from a high of 20 in Wyandotte county to half that in Sedgwick county.

Teen violent deaths include death from homicide, suicide, and accidents among youth ages 15 to 19. The teen violent death rate has been steadily climbing in this country and Kansas has consistently had higher rates than most other states. In 1992, the most recent year for which national Kids Count data are available, Kansas had the 12th highest teen violent death rate in the country.

While these historical data are certainly cause for concern, the Kansas data for 1994 are absolutely alarming. For the five years preceding 1994 the state averaged 125 deaths. In 1993 there were 127 deaths. In 1994 the number of violent teen deaths in the state jumped to 183. The rate of teen violent deaths jumped from 74 per 100,000 teens to 116 per 100,000 teens age 15 to 19. This represents an increase of 57 percent in the rate of teen violent deaths for the state in a single year. This increase occurred in many counties across the state but was most pronounced in Sedgwick, Shawnee and Wyandotte counties.

After appearing to level off in 1992 and 1993 at 38 arrests per 1000 children and youth, the juvenile arrest rate for the state of Kansas climbed to 40 arrests per 1000 children and youth in 1994. This indicator counts all types of juvenile offenses. An arrest rate varies not only as a function of crime activity in the community but may also reflect different levels of community tolerance and police activity. As a result we view this indicator as a measure of both social behavior and social control in the community.

Regardless of whether the indicator reflects community tolerance or deviant activity, an arrest must be viewed as a negative outcome for a child or youth. The statewide increase should be viewed with concern as should the wide variation in this rate across Kansas counties. The rate in Finney County has been much higher than the rest of the state and is growing at a faster rate. In 1994 the rate in Finney County was more than four times the state rate and grew 58 percent. The rate in Sedgwick County continues to climb steadily while Wyandotte County continues to show a decline. Most of our medium sized counties are showing moderate increases in the juvenile arrest rates of 15 to 25 percent. However, Douglas County experienced an enormous increase of 85 percent. Because these increases and differences across counties can be interpreted in many ways, it is critical that interested persons in each county come together to examine trends in their counties and similar counties across the state and to devise strategies to address the problem of juvenile arrests at the local level.

The KBI instituted a new reporting system this year. Some counties may not have fully reported using the new system. Substantial current year decreases in juvenile arrests may be attributed to inaccurate reporting by counties.

USE OF ALCOHOL BY YOUTH

Alcohol remains the most prevalent drug used by youth. Youth who regularly use alcohol increase the likelihood of many negative outcomes. The leading causes of violent death among teens are motor vehicle accidents, homicides, suicides, and drowning. Many of these deaths involve the use of alcohol.

Unfortunately, we were unable to obtain data for this year in a form that would allow comparison to alcohol use data reported in our 1994 book. Our data this year describe the number of children responding to a survey who reported having used alcohol on more than ten occasions. This serves as some indicator of the number of youth who may be moving beyond experimental use of alcohol.

More than one in four Kansas children report having used alcohol on more than 10 occasions in their lifetime. This suggests that a substantial number of Kansas children believe that using alcohol is an acceptable practice. Although no directly comparable national data are available, we know that rates of alcohol usage by youth are holding steady. Nationally, 22 percent of youth age 12 to 17 reported using alcohol during the past month.

The use of drugs is associated with many potential consequences for children. Drug use is associated with many of the causes of teen death. Children using drugs are more likely to be sexually active, become pregnant or be exposed to sexually transmitted disease. One survey found that a third of all high school drop outs were using illicit drugs at an early age.

After a one year hiatus, we are again able to provide data on drug use by Kansas youth.

These data report the responses of children in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12 to inquiries regarding any use of marijuana, cocaine, inhalants, LSD, or steroids. More than one in five Kansas children responding to our survey report having used at least one of these drugs on one occasion.

After steadily declining for 13 years, illicit drug use rates among youth have begun to rise on a national level. A 1994 national survey found that 9.5 percent of children age 12-17 had used an illicit drug during the past month, up from 6.6 percent in the prior year. Nationally 48 percent of all high school seniors report using an illicit drug prior to graduation.

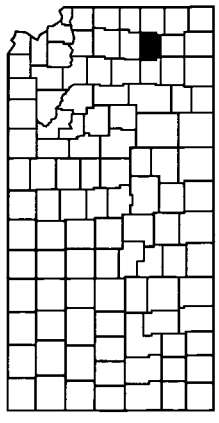

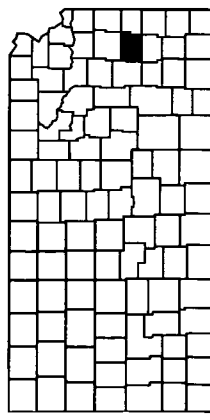


ALLEN COUNTY has had improvement in the **PHYSICAL HEALTH & SAFETY** area for its children. The percent of low birth-weight babies showed significant positive change which placed Allen County in the top 20% of all the counties in the state. The percent of Head Start participation has increased which allowed more children ages 3 and 4 that live below the poverty line to have this educational advantage. An area of concern for Allen County is the fact that 13% of all the county births were to single teens, for a total of 21 live births. Of further concern is the high percent of county youth reporting that they have used alcohol more than 10 times, putting the county rate higher than the state rate.

An indicator of concern which ranks in the bottom 10% of the state is the percent of all births to single teens. Also of concern is the lack of a Head Start program in the county. Licensed child care availability is significantly lower than the state's figure of 24.5 slots per 100 children under age 13.

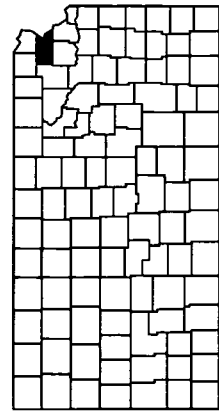

The county can celebrate that the teen violent death rate declined by over 40%. There was only one teen violent death in Lyon County in 1994. The low percent of youth who have ever used drugs (17%) is encouraging. Especially troubling is the percent of births to mothers without a high school degree. For 1994, over 27% of all births in Lyon County were to mothers without a high school degree. In addition, the percent of high school graduates pursuing post-secondary education and training fell to only 57% compared to the state level of nearly 75%.

SEDGWICK COUNTY'S population exceeds 400,000 and its median family income of \$36,194 is one of the highest in the state. Its urban center and county seat is Wichita. Sedgwick County has shown improvement in its infant mortality rate and in the percent of births with early prenatal care. However, many of the indicators for children in Sedgwick County are not very positive. Particularly alarming are the high school graduation rate and the juvenile arrest rate, both of which are among the worst in the state. Thirty-five teens died a violent death in 1994. In general, indicators related to adolescents in Sedgwick County appear to paint a disheartening picture.

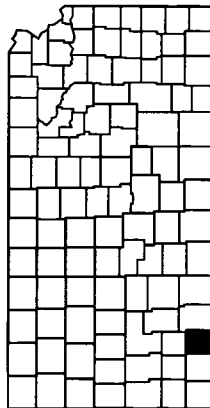

Unfortunately, on many other indicators of child well-being, Seward County ranks in the bottom 10% of counties. Of particular concern are a graduation rate of 67%, an immunization rate of only 36%, and a rate of births with early prenatal care under 50%.

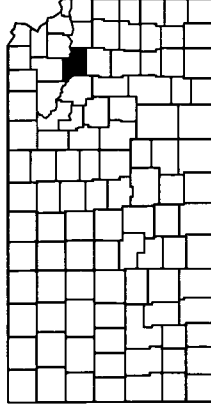

SHAWNEE COUNTY, whose county seat is Topeka, has a diverse population in excess of 160,000. Its median family income of \$35,987 is one of the highest in the state. Shawnee County does well in providing early prenatal care, immunizations, and child care availability. The infant mortality rate improved 43%. Areas for potential improvement in Shawnee County include the graduation rate, which has dropped to under 72% and the out-of-home placement rate which is one of the highest in the state. Over 2,000 juveniles under the age of 18 were arrested in Shawnee County in 1994.

In addition, it appears that 30% of youth report using alcohol more than 10 times, a rate in excess of the state rate.

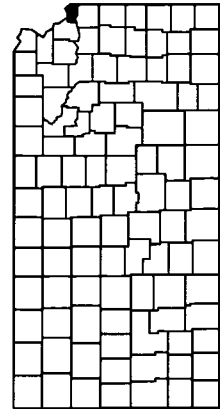

WYANDOTTE COUNTY

Wyandotte County, whose county seat is Kansas City, has a highly diverse population of over 161,000. The county's unemployment rate for 1994 is 8.3%, one of the highest in the state. Economic indicators for children in Wyandotte County are troubling. Over 46% of school age children qualify for free school meals. Nearly one-third of all children receive some form of economic assistance such as food stamps or Medicaid. Less than one-third of young children are immunized on time. In short, many children in Wyandotte County are experiencing a very hard time. On a positive note, the availability of the Head Start program is good and the percent of youth who have used alcohol more than 10 times is less than the state rate. However, nearly one in three youth report they have tried drugs (other than alcohol).

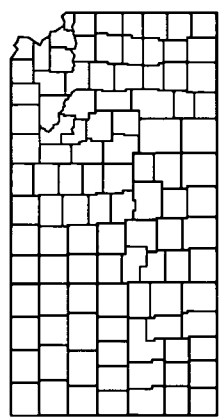

KANSAS has increased the percent of Head Start participation. There have been moderate gains in the percent of high school graduates pursuing a post-secondary education/training. Two Economic Well-Being indicators experienced a continuing decline which was not good news for the children in Kansas. Of particular concern is the continued increase in the percent of births to single teens. Indicators which continue deteriorating are the teen violent death rate and the juvenile arrest rate.

APPENDIX

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The selection of data for the annual *Kansas Kids Count Data Book* is an on-going process. It is impacted by the decisions of the project's funder, the Annie E. Casey Foundation; the *Kansas Kids Count* Steering Committee; and the projects' two partners, Kansas Action for Children, and the University of Kansas School of Social Welfare.

The Casey Foundation produces an annual national Kids Count Data Book and asks that each state project replicate the same indicators on a county-by-county basis in their state data books.

The *Kansas Kids Count* Steering Committee and the Kansas Kids Count partners make their indicator decisions based in part on the following criteria:

- availability of data for a significant number of the state's 105 counties
- pertinence of the data to policy making concerning children's issues
- direct outcome measures versus indirect measures (for example, does the indicator measure the actual high school graduation rate or the availability of high school dropout prevention programs for at-risk children?)

Data resource persons within each of the state agencies which provide data for construction of the indicators assist the Steering Committee and partners in their review of potential indicators. In addition to providing access to the data, these resource persons help determine the quality and availability of data and suggest new ways of presenting the data.

The 1996 *Kansas Kids Count* indicators were determined after a great deal of discussion and research. Central to the discussion was the desire to obtain quality data reflecting current conditions and trends for children in Kansas communities. These considerations have led to the adoption of some new indicators, omission of other indicators and some modifications in the calculation of indicator scores and trends.

RETURNING INDICATORS

Absent from last year's book due to data unavailability, we provide again this year data on alcohol use and other drug use by Kansas youth: *Youth Who Have Ever Used Drugs Other Than Alcohol* and *Use of Alcohol by Youth*. We derive both indicators from a data set consisting of a sample of close to 50,000 Kansas school children in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12. The questions pertaining to drug use were identical to those comprising the drug data we presented two years ago. As a result we are able to provide feedback on baseline data. Unfortunately the phrasing of the questions pertaining to alcohol use do not allow a baseline comparison. The use of alcohol and other drugs pose serious threats to the well-being of our youth. We hope to provide Kansas communities continuing knowledge of the magnitude of these problems.

CURRENT AND BASE YEARS

Current year data are provided for the most recent available year. Because of time required for agencies which serve as our primary data sources to collect the data used to construct the indicators and the time required to produce the book, the 1996 data reports 1994 data for many indicators as the "current year." For some indicators the "current year" is 1995. The reader is cautioned to check each indicator to determine the exact time period being reported. When available data permit, the base year rate will be the average rate for the five years preceding the current year. Data for all indicators is not available for five prior years and again the reader is advised to check to determine the exact time period covered for a specific indicator of interest.

POPULATION ESTIMATES

Data used in the 1996 book range from 1988 to 1995. Many of the indicators reported here rely on census data for a population count which is used as the denominator in calculating a rate. For example, Child Death Rate is the number of

deaths divided by the number of children ages 1 to 14. Actual counts of the number of children by age group in each county can only be obtained in the decennial census. Estimates of the current population were obtained using a standard mathematical extrapolation procedure. Data from the 1980 and 1990 census were used to compute an average annual growth rate. This rate was then employed to derive the current population estimates.

DATA ANALYSIS

Rates are not reported for each indicator in each year for some counties. These missing data result from several sources. Sometimes data were simply not available for certain counties. On several occasions, available data were judged to be of poor quality and were not reported. For some indicators a county rate might not be calculated because it was judged to not be "meaningful." The last situation arises primarily in counties with small populations and with indicators which have low incidence rates in the general population. Any county which experiences at least one occurrence of an indicator event (e.g., an infant death) has a rate calculated. To judge where a zero occurrence was meaningful, we first calculated the expected frequency of the event in a given county based on the rate for the state as a whole. If the expected frequency is less than one, we do not report the rate and, thus, list only a "0." In this case, we are saying that there are simply too few occurrences of the event (e.g., births) due to small population numbers to have any expectation of the event in a single year. If the expected frequency is less than one and the county experiences one or more occurrences of the event, we calculate and report a rate. In this case, we are saying that the event would be unlikely to occur in this county due to the small numbers of people and the fact that it did occur is noteworthy.

Nevertheless, many of these rates are based on very low occurrences of the underlying event and, as a result, may experience dramatic swings from year to year.

INTERPRETING INDICATOR RATES

This report provides several ways to judge the indicator score for a particular county.

- Decile ranks provide a comparison of the county relative to all other counties in the state. For all indicators, low decile scores indicate that the county does well compared to others while high decile scores indicate that the county does relatively poorly. A decile score of "1" indicates that the county is in the top 10 percent while a decile score of "10" indicates that the county is the bottom 10 percent. An unusual situation can occur when many counties show the same rate. When this occurs the decile rankings have to be adjusted. For example, since thirty percent of the counties had no juvenile arrests, there were no ranks of 1 or 2 given, and all of the counties with 0 arrests are ranked "3". This indicates that the county ranked in the top thirty percent of the state.
- A county's indicator score can also be compared with the state average or mean score. In this way, one can see if the county score is better or worse than the average for the state as a whole. Given the wide diversity in demographics across the 105 Kansas counties, it may also be helpful to compare your county with other specific counties that you judge to be similar with respect to important variables such as size, income or geographic area.
- It is also important to compare current county indicator scores with past base year data to determine whether the situation is improving or getting worse for a specific indicator. Percent change over time is presented for all indicators with base year and current year data. On the county pages a bar graph is presented where these percent change scores have been converted to indicate "better" or "worse" trends over time.

As always, we invite your feedback about the 1996 Kansas Kids Count Data Book and input regarding future productions of the book.

ECONOMIC WELL BEING

Births to Single Teens is the percentage of live births that occur to unmarried women under age 20. Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

Children Approved for Free School Meals is the percentage of children enrolled in school who have been approved for free school meals. Data are from the Kansas State Board of Education.

Children Receiving Economic Assistance is the number of children receiving any form of cash assistance (adoption, AFDC regular, AFDC unemployed parent, foster care, general assistance or refugee), medical assistance (child in state institution, extended medical, pregnant women and children, medically needy, disabled medically needy families, SSI disabled, special pregnant women and children or work transition) or food stamps per hundred children under the age of 18. Each child receiving one or more forms of assistance is counted only once. The count is obtained from a single month (June, 1995) and is, therefore, not indicative of the total number of children receiving assistance during the entire year. Data are from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services.

PHYSICAL HEALTH & SAFETY

Childhood Death, Ages 1-14 (per 100,000 children) is the number of deaths from all causes to children between the ages 1 and 14, per 100,000 children of those ages. Data regarding childhood deaths are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. Total number of children is based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

Infant Mortality (per 1,000 live births) is the number of deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births. The data were provided by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

Births with Early Prenatal Care is the percentage of births that are to women who started prenatal care in the first three months of their pregnancy. Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

Kindergartners Fully Immunized by Age 2 is the percentage of children in kindergarten who were adequately immunized by age 2, based on a retrospective survey of immunization certificates at the time of enrollment in kindergarten. Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

Low Birth Weight Babies is the percentage of live births recorded as low birth weight. Babies of low birth weight are those who weigh under 2,500 grams (5.5 pounds) at birth. The data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE & EDUCATION

Head Start Participation is the number of Head Start enrollment slots divided by the estimated number of children age 3-4 living in families with incomes below the U.S. poverty threshold. Rates are expressed as percentages. Data on Head Start enrollment slots are from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Region VII. Data on children in poverty are based on projections from the U.S. Census, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 3. These poverty data are reported for children age 5 and under and not for 3-4 years of age. The proportion of children 3-4 was calculated from the total population of children age 5 and under. This proportion was used to calculate the number of 3-4 year old children in poverty.

Child Care Availability is the capacity of registered day care homes, licensed day care homes, group day care homes, child care centers and preschools per hundred children age 13 and under. The Child Care data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. Population data are extrapolated from the U.S. Census.

EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT

High School Graduate Post-Secondary Education/Training is the percentage of the last year's high school graduating class which is enrolled in post-secondary education or training (four year college or university, two year college, other type of college or other non-college institution) five to six months after graduation. Data are from school districts' annual survey of graduates compiled by the Kansas Department of Education.

Births to Mothers with Less than a High School Degree is the percent of live births that occur to women who have not received a high school degree as indicated on the birth certificate. Data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

Students Graduating High School is the percentage of ninth grade public school students who graduated four years later. It is computed by taking the ninth grade enrollment, subtracting the number of dropouts in each of the next four years and then dividing that by ninth grade enrollment. Data are from the Kansas State Board of Education.

EMOTIONAL WELL-BEING

Reported Child Abuse/Neglect (per 1,000) is the number of child abuse/neglect reports per 1,000 children under age 18. Data on child abuse/neglect reports are from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Data on total population under 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

Confirmed Child Abuse/Neglect (per 1,000 children) is the number of confirmed cases of child abuse/neglect per 1,000 children and youth under age 18. Data on child abuse/neglect cases are from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Data on total population under age 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

Out-of-Home Placement is the number of children and youth who are in SRS custody and in placement outside their family of origin per 1,000 children and youth age 18 and under. Data are from the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Data on total population under 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

Teen Violent Deaths, Ages 15-19 (per 100,000 teens) is the number of deaths from homicides, suicides and accidents to teens between the ages of 15 and 19 per 100,000 teens of those ages. The data are from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

SOCIAL BEHAVIOR & SOCIAL CONTROL

Juvenile Arrests (per 1,000 children) is the number of juvenile arrests (all offenses) per 1,000 children and youths under the age of 18. Arrest data are from the Kansas Bureau of Investigation. Data on total population under 18 are based on projections from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 1.

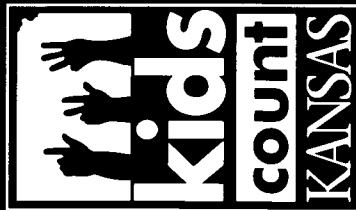
Youth Having Used Alcohol More Than 10 Times is the number of youth in grades 6, 8, 10 and 12 who indicated having used alcohol on more than ten occasions. The percentage of children in each county completing the survey varied. To aid in estimating the survey coverage for each county, the indicator sheet provides data on the number of respondents. Data are from the Southeast Kansas Education Service Center.

Youth Who Have Ever Used Other Drugs is the number of youth in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12 who report having ever used any of the following substances: marijuana, cocaine, inhalants, LSD, or steroids. The percentage of children in each county completing the survey varied. To aid in estimating the survey coverage for each county, the indicator sheet provides data on the number of respondents. The baseline data represent responses to the same questions from a similar survey conducted in 1992. Because the coverage rate of the two surveys varies, comparisons of percent change data should be viewed with caution and consideration given to the number of respondents. Data are from the Southeast Kansas Education Service Center.

DEMOGRAPHICS

Median Family Income is the median annual income for families. Families are two or more persons who are related by birth, marriage or adoption and who live together as one household. The median is the figure at which half the families have an income less than that amount and half have an income more than that amount. 1979 dollars are adjusted for inflation to reflect 1989 dollars. Data are from the U.S. Census Bureau, 1980 and 1990 Census of the Population, Summary Tape File 3.

Unemployment is the percent of the civilian labor force estimated to be unemployed. Estimates are provided by Kansas Department of Human Resources, Labor Market Information Services.



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
