ABSTRACT

This report provides data on New York State's Aid for Part-Time Study (APTS) Program for the 1995-96 academic year. First authorized by the state legislature in 1984, the APTS program provides tuition awards to part-time students enrolled in a program leading to an undergraduate degree or certificate. Twelve tables provide data by institution type in regard to allocations, award amounts, actual expenditures for reimbursement of awards, aid as a percentage of allocations, recipients who did not maintain a cumulative passing average, and amounts not reimbursed by schools for academic years beginning in 1991 through 1995. During 1995-96 APTS awards were made by 186 schools to 23,675 students. The \$13,405,700 in state-reimbursed APTS awards was 92 percent of the \$14,599,900 allocated, slightly higher than the 90 percent used in 1994-95. The average award for 1994-95 was \$566, up from \$543 in the previous year. An appendix lists allocations, state reimbursed award dollars, number of recipients, and average awards by institution. 

Aid For Part-Time Study (APTS) Program Progress Report 1994-95

Introduction

The Aid for Part-Time Study (APTS) Program was first authorized by Chapter 110 of the Laws of 1984. That Chapter added a new section, Section 666 of the Education Law, providing tuition awards to part-time students (now defined as taking fewer than twelve but at least three credit hours per semester). The students must be enrolled in a program leading to an approved undergraduate degree or certificate at a degree-granting institution.

The program is not an entitlement. Awards are limited by the amounts appropriated each year. Each participating institution receives an allocation from the appropriation equal to the percent its part-time undergraduate population is of the total for all participating institutions. The institutions then make awards to eligible students. The number and amount of student awards are determined by the institutions, using both State and institutional criteria. Students selected by their institutions can receive an annual award of up to \$2,000 (or actual tuition, whichever is less).

Eligibility - To be eligible, the student must:

- Be a U.S. citizen or a qualifying non-citizen and a resident of New York State.
- o If claimed (or eligible to be claimed) by parents as a tax dependent, have a New York State family (student, spouse, if married, and parents) Net Taxable Income not in excess of \$50,550.
- o If not eligible to be claimed as a tax dependent by parents, have a combined (student's and, if married, spouse's) Net Taxable Income not in excess of \$34,250; students who are eligible to claim their own dependents for tax purposes are eligible for an award if Net Taxable Income does not exceed \$50,550.
- Have not used all eligible terms of study for the State's Tuition Assistance Program.
- Be matriculated in an approved undergraduate degree or certificate program at a participating institution.
- Be enrolled for at least three but less than twelve credits per semester, or at least four but less than eight credits per quarter, or the equivalent.
- Retain good academic standing.
- Have tuition of at least \$100 per year.
- Have no debt from a previously defaulted student loan or State grant refund or have established a satisfactory repayment plan.

Section 666 requires the New York State Higher Education Services Corporation to prepare a report before November 1 each year for the Board of Regents evaluating the program's administration, and analyzing the reports submitted by participating institutions. The report which follows fulfills that requirement.



Discussion

Recipients of awards under New York State's Aid for Part-Time Study Program are older and have lower family incomes than full-time students. In 1995-96, 75.9 percent of recipients were at least 25 years of age and over 87 percent were financially independent. Fifty-one and seven-tenths percent of award recipients have NYS Net Taxable Income (NTI) of \$10,000 or less. In 1995-96, about 15 percent of recipients had NTI income above \$25,000.

In 1995-96, HESC distributed to colleges, high schools, libraries, banks, and community-based organizations fact sheets and other publications describing the APTS Program. These materials are used by counselors and advisors to respond to requests from students and families for financial aid information; they are handed out at college fairs and other events.

The 1995-96 academic year was the 12th year of operation for New York State's Aid for Part-Time Study Program. The appropriation for 1995-96 was \$14.6 million. Total expenditures for 1995-96 were \$13.5 million or 91.9 percent of the amount appropriated.

Summary

No major changes were made to the APTS Program. There were continued similarities in the age and financial dependency status characteristics of the students served in the APTS program in 1994-95 and 1995-96. However, there was a small increase in average income among APTS recipients in 1995-96.

Between 1994-95 and 1995-96, the overall number of recipients decreased by about 2.6 percent or 611 students.

Specific highlights of the APTS Program for the 1995-96 academic year follow:

- 1. Aid for Part-Time Study Program awards were made by 186 schools to 23,675 students (compared to 24,286 students in the prior year). APTS recipients totaled 6,456 when the program began in 1984-85. The number of annual recipients has thus almost quadrupled over the program's 12-year history.
- 2. The \$13,405,700 in State-reimbursed APTS awards was 92 percent of the \$14,599,900 allocated, slightly higher than the 90 percent used in 1994-95. Public-sector schools used 94 percent of their allocations (down from 95 percent last year), and other degree-granting institutions used 84 percent of their allocations (compared to 79 percent of the year before).
- 3. The average State-reimbursed APTS award for the 1994-95 academic year was \$566, up \$23 from the previous year's average award of \$543.
- 4. In 1995-96, colleges had to use their own funds to cover \$112,085 in APTS awards. This represented their liability for the \$841,529 awarded to students who failed. This was a slight reduction from the previous year.

- 5. The percentage of award recipients who did not maintain a cumulative passing average was 8.9 percent in 1995-96. The percentage of total award dollars for students who did not maintain a cumulative passing average decreased to 6.3 percent during 1995-96.
- 6. In 1995-96, 51.7 percent of APTS recipients had Net Taxable Incomes of \$10,000 or less; 24.9 percent had zero Net Taxable Incomes. The average Net Taxable Income of recipients increased from \$11,591 in 1994-95 to \$11,940 in 1995-96.
- 7. In 1995-96, APTS recipients averaged 31 years of age and 87.3 percent were financially independent of their parents.

- o For the first two years of the APTS program, institutions were not reimbursed for an award term. This provision was changed to allow institutions to receive reimbursement for awards made to students who did not achieve a cumulative passing average in an amount of up to 10 percent of the value of all awards made for the term. As a result, after 1985-86 academic year, it became impossible to equate a recipient count to the amount reimbursed to the colleges.

In December 1990, the Governor and the Legislature amended the program statute to make the following changes:

- The requirement that students must have already accrued six credits in order to be eligible for an APTS award was eliminated.
- The requirement that the student apply for a Federal Pell Grant was dropped.
- Students enrolled in participating institutions operating on a semester academic calendar can be selected for an APTS award if, for the term in question, they are enrolled for at least three, but less than twelve credits. Previously, students at semester-based institutions were required to enroll for a minimum of six credits. (At trimester schools, students must still enroll for at least four, but less than eight credits in order to be eligible for APTS).
- Income limits were revised. For applicants who are claimed or are eligible to be claimed by their parents for tax purposes, the Net Taxable Income cannot exceed \$50,550. Previously the limit for these students was \$22,000 Net Taxable Income. Students who are eligible for an award if their Net Taxable Income does not exceed \$50,550. For students not eligible to be claimed as a dependent by parents, Net Taxable Income cannot exceed \$34,250. The previous limit for these students was \$15,000 Net Taxable Income.
- The deadline for selecting APTS recipients was changed from 21 to 45 days after the end of the add/drop period.
