ABSTRACT

This Kids Count fact book describes services that are designed to protect the health, education, and safety of children in each county in Texas. It begins with a brief overview of each service program, describing the services, giving eligibility requirements, and analyzing regional differences in service provision across the state. The overview is followed by a profile of each county, including the rates at which children in that county receive income assistance, education enhancement, and child protection services. The indicators used in county profiles are rates of participation in: (1) Aid to Families with Dependent Children; (2) Food Stamps; (3) Medicaid; (4) Women, Infants and Children Supplemental Food Program; (5) Supplemental Security Income; (6) state-subsidized child care; (7) Head Start; (8) public pre-kindergarten programs; (9) free or reduced school lunch and breakfast; (10) bilingual programs; (11) special education; (12) confirmed cases of child abuse; (13) family violence shelters; and (14) foster care. Regional and county rates and rankings are also provided. (EV)






The Center for Public Policy Priorities



Introduction

Children in Texas need to grow up in safe, nurturing, healthy environments so they can learn and succeed in school and in life. While most children are in families who care and live in communities that support them, too many of our children are at risk of hunger, illness, and educational failure. These children and their families depend on the help of thousands of health and social service providers around the state to give them a hand up in times of need. Local, state and federal governments provide support services such as: AFDC, Food Stamps, Medicaid, WIC, SSI, child care, Head Start, Pre-kindergarten, School lunch and breakfasts, bilingual education, special education, child abuse and neglect protection, family violence shelters, and foster care. Service providers provide the helping hands that so many families turn to. This report focuses on these services and their utilization by children in Texas.

NEED FOR SOCIAL SERVICES FOR CHILDREN

The economic security of families with children has declined severely over the last two decades. This decline can be attributed to a combination of factors including a "lack of growth in high wage, high benefit jobs, the isolation of inner city residents from suburban jobs, and the inadequacy of worker skills

for technically demanding positions". As the economic security of families decreases, the risks for children increases. The utilization rates for social services varies across the state with the demand for some services increasing and others decreasing.

Social service programs help protect thousands of children across the state and give them a hand toward reaching their full potential. Early childhood enrichment programs, preventive health care, child protection services, and basic subsistence assistance all assist the children in greatest need. In many cases, families must meet certain income eligibility requirements to obtain access to these services. Others attempt to deal with a particular need. For instance, Child Protective Services and Family Violence Shelters help children at risk of abuse or neglect. While these programs are vitally important to the children they serve, they also bring lasting returns to Texas over the long run.



Helping young children can create great savings for the state. Effective services for at-risk children early in life will increase the likelihood that they are successful in school and work. Prevention of problems is the most cost-effective way to help children and families. Programs that lead to school readiness, healthy children, and stable, nurturing families can prevent astronomical future costs for special education, health care, hospitalization, foster care, crime prevention, and prisons.

While the need for services is great, many children who are eligible for services do not receive them. Depending on the program, between 25 and 75 percent of eligible children do not receive services vital to their well-being and development. Some reasons for inadequate service delivery include funding shortages, large case loads, inaccessibility to service providers, and inadequate social marketing of programs. According to the report of the Texas Commission for Children and Youth, "if services are available, they are often inaccessible, fragmented, redundant or restricted by burdensome regulations". ²

This fact book, *Helping Hands: Social Services for Children in Texas*, describes services that are designed to protect the health, education, and safety of children in each county in Texas. The programs described include those providing minimum subsistence resources, such as AFDC (now Temporary Assistance for Needy Families or TANF), Food Stamps, WIC, Medicaid, Head Start, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Free and Reduced Lunches. Programs such as Head Start, public pre-kindergarten, bilingual teaching, and special education help low-income bilingual and special needs children be more competitive in school. Children's safety and well-being is protected through services such as child abuse prevention, family violence shelters, and foster care.

What follows is a brief overview of each service program. It describes the services, gives eligibility requirements, and analyzes regional differences in service provision across the state.³ This overview will be followed by a profile of each county, including the rates at which children in that county receive income assistance, education enhancement, and child protection services.





Income Assistance for Children in Poverty

ECONOMIC STATUS OF CHILDREN

Many children living in poverty suffer from hunger, poor health, poor educational attainment, child abuse, and neglect. However, children do not have to be below the poverty line to be in need. Many children in families

that are near the poverty line also feel the impact of poverty.

Children in Poverty


Of the five most populous states, Texas has the largest proportion of its population under age 18 (5.3 million children in 1994). One in four children in Texas live in poverty. Children in poverty are the fastest growing segment of the total population, making child poverty a problem that affects a huge and growing number of children.

A disproportionately large number of those children living in poverty are minorities. While

24 percent of all Texas children were living in poverty in 1990, almost 40 percent of African American and Hispanic children were poor. As the minority child population grows, presumably so will the number of children in poverty.




Children in poverty are the fastest growing segment of the total population, making child poverty a problem that affects a huge and growing number of children.⁶

Working Poor Families

In 1994, most young children (under 6 years) living in poverty were in families where at least one parent or relative worked part-time or full-time. Twelve percent of all Texas children grow up in families where at least one parent works full-time, but the total family income is still below the poverty line. Exeas' rate of working poor families is more than 4 percent higher than the national rate and earns Texas the low rank of 49th in the nation. Texas is second only to California in the actual number of children living in working poor families (more than 630,000 children).

On the positive side, low-income working families have a better chance of pulling themselves out of poverty than do families with no family member in the workforce. Furthermore, the children in working poor families have a positive role model in a working parent. However, children growing up in working poor families are exposed to many of the same difficulties that children in poverty with unemployed parent(s) face. They are less likely to receive adequate and preventive health care and are less likely to have health insurance than any other group of children. Children in working poor families are often not as ready to learn in school. They are faced with risk factors associated with parents' lack of time as well as a lack of quality preschool and other appropriate day care. As they grow older, these children are more likely to drop out of school, get pregnant, or become involved in criminal activities. In the long run, it is much more difficult for children from poor and working poor families to become economically successful.

Children living near poverty face many of the same risks that children in poverty face. Social services available to children near the poverty line are crucial to the development of these children.

Children Living near Poverty

Nearly half of all children in Texas live at or near poverty (less than 185% of the poverty line). A recent study by Columbia University of the twelve largest cities in the nation reports that 64 percent of children under age six in Dallas and 68 percent in San Antonio live at or near the poverty line. San Children living near poverty face many of the same risks that children in poverty face. Social services available to children near the poverty line are crucial to the development of these children. Any cut-backs in social services or income assistance put this group in danger of slipping into poverty.

Social services provide a vitally important safety net for disadvantaged children and their families. The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities recently reported that both the number and percentage of individuals removed from poverty by safety net programs reached an all-time high in 1995. Between 1983 and 1995, the number of children nationally who were removed from poverty by government benefit programs doubled. Most of the children lifted above the poverty line by safety net programs are children in working

families.¹⁷ Recent changes in these programs (for example, welfare reform) could result in more families moving into and remaining in poverty.

Social Service programs are vital for the growing number of families that are in crisis. A new study from the Annie E. Casey Foundation shows that more than 237,400 Texas children live in 'distressed neighborhoods' where high concentrations of extreme poverty, female-headed households, unemployment, and welfare dependency are all present. These neighborhoods are characterized by a degree of social disorganization that perpetuates the cycle of poverty. There is little economic activity, few public and social services, limited developmental programs for children, and high levels of crime. In this type of environment, children lose hope and opportunity. While social services alone do not solve all of these problems, they are a vital support for children at or near poverty level and can help break the cycle of poverty and despair.

The following programs are all vital components of a safety net for at-risk children and their families.



AID TO FAMILIES WITH DEPENDENT CHILDREN (AFDC)

Aid to Families with Dependent Children¹⁹ (AFDC; now Temporary Assistance for Needy Families or TANF) has been the primary financial assistance to families with children living in poverty. There are two programs for families: AFDC-Basic and AFDC-Unemployed Parent (UP). AFDC Basic is provided when one or both parents is absent from the home, deceased, or disabled. AFDC-UP provides assistance for families where one parent is temporarily unemployed.


Children in AFDC families receive monthly cash grants based on the income and resources of the family. In Texas, the average monthly cash grant per recipient in 1994 was \$58.12. The maximum grant for a mother and two children is \$188. The combination of the cash grant with other benefits is intended to furnish families with income sufficient for maintaining a standard of living that will ensure the health and safety of their children. AFDC families with children must be in very great need and have depleted virtually all other self-help resources before the safety net catches them. Their lack of resources not only puts the health and safety of children at risk, but it can make it even more difficult for them to become self-sufficient again. Texas has historically had a very low AFDC income cap. In 1994, the income cap of \$188 per month was 18.3 percent of poverty while the national average income cap was 43 percent of poverty. This means that a family of three cannot net more than about \$6 a day, just over the national minimum wage for one hour, and still be eligible for benefits.

Eligibility: The AFDC program (now Temporary Assistance for Needy Families or TANF) has undergone a great deal of change in recent months.²³ Since the data reported here are from 1994, the eligibility requirements given are those in effect at that time. AFDC benefits were based on eligibility requirements that include family composition and income guideline caps. "To qualify for AFDC, a family must include needy children, have less than \$1,000 in assets, excluding a home and one car with equity value of less than \$1,500. A family consisting of a mother and two children can have a net income of no more than \$188 a month after deductions " (1994 Annual Report, Texas Department of Human Services).



One of the most important components of AFDC is the automatic eligibility it provides to Medicaid, thus providing basic health care for the family. AFDC families are also eligible for Food Stamps. The typical AFDC family (a single female, two children, no child support) in 1994 received \$295 in Food Stamps. Typical AFDC families still live well below the poverty line even with the additional assistance of Food Stamps and Medicaid. Additionally, only 26.5 percent of AFDC families receive public housing or rent subsidies.


The value of welfare benefits continues to fall, creating even greater hardship for our poorest families. Nationally, the purchasing power of benefits under the AFDC program for a family of four with no other income fell by 47 percent between 1970 and 1993. Texas' AFDC and Food Stamp benefits have fallen in value 67 percent between 1970 and 1993, placing Texas worst in the nation in percent change in benefit value.

In 1994, the state and federal government spent \$544.9 million on AFDC payments in Texas – up from \$533.5 million in 1993. The average number of AFDC recipients in Texas each month increased from 688,000 in 1991 to 786,000 in 1994. However, in 1995 the average number of recipients dropped to 748,000. Projections for the next several years show continuing decline.

In 1994 more AFDC dollars were spent on single-parent families than on two-parent families. Many children from two-parent families in poverty did not receive AFDC assistance.²⁹ In fact, only 10 percent of all children 0-18 years of age received AFDC assistance in 1994 (while 24 percent of all children are living in poverty). Many of the children in two-parent working families do not receive AFDC.

About 73 percent (549,276) of all AFDC recipients are children between the ages of 0 and 18. The other 27 percent of recipients are relatives with whom the children are living. Regions 10 and 11 had the highest percentages of children in families receiving AFDC (12% and 15.5%, respectively) while Region 2 had the lowest percent (7.1%).



FOOD STAMPS


One in nine children under age 12 in Texas suffers from hunger.³⁰ Hungry children have more health problems and are absent from school more often. Furthermore, hungry children are likely to have more difficulty concentrating when they are in school.³¹ Lack of nutritious food is a barrier to children's development and success in school.

The federally funded Food Stamp program provides food resources for low-income people. Food Stamps have traditionally been coupons issued through the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which could be used for groceries. However, Texas has implemented a new system providing food benefits through an electronic debit card called the Lone Star Card. This new electronic benefits transfer (EBT) system has streamlined the delivery of food assistance. Eligibility is determined by federal guidelines and is based on income. The average monthly allotment of Food Stamps in 1994 was \$69.29 per person, compared to \$68.98 the year before. The amount of the Food Stamp allotment is based on the 'Thrifty Food Plan', "a hypothetical market basket of foods for a nutritious diet, the cost of which is derived from a survey of actual food prices". Although Food Stamps serve as an important economic stabilizer, they are often not a sufficient resource to feed a family for a whole month. The number of Texas children receiving Food Stamps between 1989 and 1993 increased 68 percent (compared to 51% for the nation as a whole). In 1994, \$2.3 billion were spent on Food Stamps to 2.8 million Texans. Close to half of all Food Stamp recipients are children and many are in families with at least one family member who is working. The number of Food Stamp recipients has declined since 1994 and is projected to decline further. New welfare reform legislation is projected to result in a 20% cut Food Stamp benefits by the year 2002. The legislation made several changes in the way income eligibility is calculated and Food Stamp levels are determined.

Eligibility: In 1994, "to be eligible for Food Stamps, the people living in a household must have combined incomes of less than 130 percent of federally established limits for poverty, and countable resources of less than \$2,000. Households with a member age 60 or older can have countable resources of up to \$3,000. The value of a home and up to \$4,550 of the value of a vehicle are not counted as household resources. Households in which all members receive AFDC or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are eligible regardless of their incomes or resources" (1994 Annual Report, Texas Department of Human Services).






Although Food

In Texas, 24 percent of all children received Food Stamps in 1994 (1.3 million children). However, around the state, the percentage of children receiving Food Stamps varied widely. Forty-three percent of children in Region 11 received Food Stamps and 17.2 percent received Food Stamps in Region 3.

MEDICAID

Medicaid is a health insurance program, primarily for the poor, and is jointly funded by the state and federal governments. In 1994, 2.9 million families, children, aged and disabled Texans were enrolled in the Medicaid program. However, 2.5 million actually used Medicaid services.³⁶



In 1994, Texas ranked 18th in the nation in Medicaid recipients as a percentage of the population (12.8%).³⁷ The number of Medicaid recipients tripled between 1986 and 1995, largely due to federally mandated eligibility expansions. Although the rising costs of the Medicaid program seem to have leveled off in the mid 1990s, health costs are still a significant portion of the state's health and human services budget.³⁸

Access to Medicaid services is a problem for many clients. Many primary care physicians are not taking new Medicaid patients in part because Medicaid reimbursement to physicians is very low. For both Texas and nationally, Medicaid fees average 47 percent of private sector fees. Additionally, provider shortages severely impact rural areas of Texas, affecting the provision of primary and preventive care for many low-income Texans.

Eligibility: AFDC (now TANF) recipients automatically become eligible for Medicaid. Additionally, Medicaid coverage is available to "infants and pregnant women who live in households with incomes up to 185 percent of the federal poverty level" (1994 Annual Report, Texas Department of Human Services). Children ages 1-6 are eligible up to 133% of poverty and children ages 6-13 (Born after 9-30-83) are eligible up to 100% of poverty. Caregivers and children who are eligible through the Medically Needy program can receive Medicaid services. "This program allows families with incomes above the Medicaid limit to become eligible for Medicaid when their incurred medical expenses exhaust – or spend down – their excess income to below the eligible limit" (1994 Annual Report, Texas Department of Human Services).

BEST COPY AVAILABLE



New policies regarding health care delivery systems are causing significant changes in the way health care is provided. The new health care system, called managed care, could cause changes in the number of people receiving Medicaid services. However, currently it is unclear how the numbers served under managed care will be tracked so changes will be difficult to determine.

Medicaid programs provided health care coverage for a monthly average of 2,022,593 people per month in 1994, up from 1,946,454 in 1993. Of those eligible for Medicaid in 1994, more than 60 percent were children. Nearly 22 percent (1.2 million) of all children in Texas were enrolled in the Medicaid program in 1994. This number reflects the children who are eligible for Medicaid and not the number who have actually used Medicaid services. Regions 10 and 11 had the highest proportions of children enrolled in Medicaid (29.6% and 36%, respectively). Region 3 had the lowest portion of children enrolled in Medicaid with 16.3 percent.



WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN'S SUPPLEMENTAL FOOD PROGRAM (WIC)

The Women, Infants, and Children's Supplemental Food Program (WIC) is an important nutrition program for low-income mothers and their infants. It provides vouchers for specific food products that can be redeemed at food stores by low-income women who are pregnant, breast feeding or post-partum. They are also available to eligible infants and children up to age 5. The WIC vouchers are used to obtain nutritious foods. In addition to the vouchers, the WIC program provides nutrition education and access to other health services.

Women who participate in the WIC program during pregnancy incur lower Medicaid costs for their babies and themselves.

According to a report released in 1995, women who participate in the WIC program during pregnancy incur lower Medicaid costs for their babies and themselves. However, not all of those families

who are eligible to receive WIC are actually participating in the program. Many of these families may not know they can receive this assistance. ⁴⁴ Funding for the WIC program is limited, so the services are available on a first come first served basis.

In Texas, 608,400 women and children received WIC services in 1994. Persons receiving WIC are broken into two age categories (0-4 years and 15-44 years). Data were only available for both of these age groups together. Therefore, we could not calculate a percent of children only receiving WIC.

Eligibility: In 1994, women who were pregnant, breast feeding or post-partum and had incomes less than 185 percent of poverty and nutritional risk as determined by a health professional were eligible for WIC. WIC was also available to eligible infants and children up to age 5 (The Texas Childhood Hunger Identification Project Report, March 1995, Center for Public Policy Priorities).



SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME (SSI)

Supplemental Security Income provides income assistance to low-income families with a child under 18 who is disabled, deaf, or blind. A child can receive benefits until age 19 if still a full-time student in elementary or high school. 45 In Texas, Medicaid comes automatically with SSI eligibility. People who receive SSI are usually eligible for Food Stamps as well.

Recent welfare reform legislation changed the definition of disability for children. "The new law states that a child's impairment — or combination of impairments — will be considered disabling if it causes "marked and severe functional limitations."46 Reviews of eligibility are underway for thousands of children and it is unclear how many children will lose SSI benefits. Most of those children who are at risk for losing benefits are those with multiple disabilities. Children with these types of disorders need expensive special care and services such as child care, special education, and mental health treatment. Reductions in SSI benefits could mean that many families will not have resources for these crucial special services.

In Texas, 52,885 children received SSI benefits in 1994.⁴⁷ Of all children 0-19 years of age, 9 per 1,000 received SSI benefits. Five regions had SSI rates above the state average of 9: Region 2 (9.3), Region 4 (11.1), Region 5 (13.1), Region 8 (10.9), and Region 11 (11.6). Region 3 had the lowest rate with 7.1.

Eligibility: An adult receiving SSI must have "a physical or mental impairment that is expected to keep him or her from doing any substantial work for at least a year" (Social Security Administration. 1996). In 1994, a child is considered disabled if "he or she is not working and has an impairment that is as severe as one that would disable an adult. This means the condition must limit the child's ability to function like other children of the same age so much that the impairment is comparable to one which would make an adult disabled" (Social Security Administration). Disability categories that generally received immediate approval for benefits include:

HIV infection

Blindness Deafness

Down Syndrome

Cerebral Palsy

Muscular Dystrophy

Significant mental deficiency

Diabetes (with amputation)

Amputation of two limbs

Amputation of leg 48



CHILD CARE

Child care was once seen as either a luxury for the wealthy, or an intervention for families unfit to care for their children. Today, with more parents working outside of the home, child care is accepted as an essential service. Particularly for those parents receiving welfare, publicly-funded child care is a vital economic necessity that enables them to engage in activities such as looking for work and training for future work. Quality child care can also provide a valuable developmental environment for children. The Commission on Children and Youth (1994) noted "[t]hese services are essential both for the parent's movement toward self-sufficiency and for the children's ultimate personal independence, positive citizenship, and entry into the workforce."

A key factor in the increased demand for child care is the growing number of mothers who are in the workforce. Publicly-funded child care provides full-day substitute care so low-income parents can work or attend training. In 1990, 58 percent of Texas women whose youngest child was under age 6 were in the workforce and seventy-two percent of women whose youngest child was between 6 and 17 were in the workforce.⁵¹

Child care is vital to maintaining a job when there is only one parent in the home. Twenty-three (23) percent of all Texas children are living in single-parent families, most of which are female-headed (78% of all single -parent families in 1990 were headed by women). With more women in the workforce, quality child care has become an important necessity for many Texas families.

Child care support for welfare and working poor families is an important way to help parents get and keep jobs. Child care can provide safe and reliable support, which enables parents to engage in work or training without neglecting their children. Children living in poor and single parent families are particularly at-risk for neglect when their parents work, since these families often cannot afford child care. Without child care, many parents would be forced to either leave their jobs to care for their children or leave the children unattended. Unfortunately, quality child care can be very expensive. Often, "these parents cannot afford to pay for the kind of child care that will fully address their children's developmental needs...". 52

Current reforms in education and welfare are likely to result in even more low-income parents needing full-day child care so they can participate in training and employment programs. New federal welfare reform legislation eliminates the federal guarantee of child care for AFDC (TANF) recipients while they participate in the mandated JOBS program. At the same time,



work requirements for families receiving assistance are increasing. Fortunately, Texas has a federal waiver in place until 2001 that will continue to guarantee child care for those in training and will provide up to 12 months of transitional care for those who find work.

In 1994, 56,400 children received subsidized child care in Texas. That is, 14.4 per 1,000 children 0-12 years of age received child care subsidized by the Texas Department of Human Services. Regions 8 and 10 had the highest rate of DHS purchased child care per 1000 children with 19.4 and 21.1, respectively. Region 6 had the lowest rate of 11.6.



Education-related Services for Children

HEAD START

Head Start is designed to help small children develop social competence and readiness for school. In addition to building the child's self-confidence, curiosity, and conceptual and communication skills, Head Start improves the child's health and physical abilities. Parental involvement is an important element of the Head Start program. Research studies conclude that Head Start has immediate positive effects on children's cognitive ability. The long-term impact on children appears to be in reducing school failure and developing a positive relationship between child and school. ⁵⁴

Head Start provides comprehensive services beginning in pre-school years. Although most children in Head Start are four-years-old, some three- and five-year-olds are also served. Head Start serves an estimated 25 percent of the eligible children. ⁵⁵

Goals of the Head Start program include:

- extensive coordination between Head Start and elementary schools.
- specific component plans in education, health, parent involvement, and social services,
- continuity of a developmentally appropriate curriculum,
- individual transition plans for each child and family between Head Start and kindergarten, and each grade through third grade,
- individual family support plans,
- supportive services teams of family service coordinators assigned in a 1:35 ratio.
- training and other assistance for families,
- periodic home visits by both teachers and social service team members with each family.
- family outreach program, including a plan for involving families in the management of the program,
- maintenance of a Governing Board with a voting parent membership of at least 51 percent, with the review, approval of all matters of the demonstration, including personnel, program design, and budget,
- culturally appropriate activities, and
- mainstreaming of children with disabilities.



In 1994, 51,521 Texas children participated in the Head Start program in Texas, That is, 5.5 percent of all children between ages 3 and 5 were participants in Head Start. The participation rate varied widely by county and region. Twenty-nine Texas counties had no children in Head Start while two counties had virtually every child in the county eligible for and served by Head Start (Hudspeth 100% and Presidio 98.7%). Region 11 had 9.5 percent of all 3-5 year olds in Head Start and Region 3 had only 3.2 percent.

PUBLIC PRE-KINDERGARTEN

The public school Pre-kindergarten program attempts to provide low-income children and children with low-English proficiency tools that will enhance their performance in school. The Pre-kindergarten program provides at-risk three- and four-year-olds an early start on their formal school education in an effort to reduce the probability of later academic failure. ⁵⁶

The Pre-kindergarten program considers three dimensions in planning the teaching techniques and curriculum to be used in the classroom. First, age appropriateness involves using current understanding of child development to "identify a range of meaningful behaviors, activities, and materials" for three-and four-year-olds. The second dimension is individual appropriateness. An effort is made to consider each child's "individual interests, strengths, and experience" when planning classroom materials and activities. The third dimension involves the use of culturally and linguistically appropriate education. Language and cultural appropriateness is important in Texas because of the diverse ethnic backgrounds of the children. The child's primary language is used in the classroom.

Any school district may offer Pre-kindergarten classes, but a district is required to offer a pre-kindergarten class if there are 15 or more eligible four-year-olds. Children attend pre-kindergarten classes for half a day, engaging in activities to promote communication, cognition, and motor development. The ultimate goal of the pre-kindergarten program is to "develop the skills necessary for success in the regular school curriculum". 60

Eligibility: A child is eligible for the Pre-kindergarten program if he or she is unable to speak and understand English, educationally disadvantaged, or homeless (Education Code, 29.153, Pre-kindergarten, p 124).

Only an estimated 64 percent of all children eligible for Pre-kindergarten services were included in the program during the 1992-3 school year. ⁶¹ There were 103,357 children in Texas Pre-kindergarten programs in the 1993-4 school year (16.3% of all 3 to 4-year-olds in the state). The percentages of 3-4 year olds participating in Pre-kindergarten programs by region ranged from 11.4 percent in Region 3 to 26.2 percent in Region 11.

FREE AND REDUCED BREAKFAST AND LUNCH PROGRAM

Thousands of children in Texas are hungry. Hungry children cannot learn effectively because they are more irritable and less able to concentrate. ⁶² Participation in meal programs is linked to higher test scores, reduced tardiness, and fewer absences. ⁶³ Unfortunately, many children go to school each day without breakfast or lunch. The free and reduced-price lunch program, a federally funded meal program, attempts to provide eligible public school children with nutritious meals.

Children who qualify for the reduced lunch program pay 40 cents for lunch. 64 Schools that have 10 percent or more of their students eligible for the free and reduced-price lunch program also provide breakfast. 65 Over 96 percent of schools that participate in the school lunch program also have a breakfast program. Schools may also extend their free and reduced breakfast and lunch programs during the summer for their students who attend summer school. 66

As is the case with all federally funded programs, no eligible child can be denied the free and reduced lunch program because of race, color, sex, handicap, age, or national origin.⁶⁷ Rules are in place to try to prevent any embarrassment on the part of an eligible child because he or she participates in the lunch program. The names of children must not be published, posted, or announced in any manner or used for any purpose other than determining and verifying eligibility for free and reduced-price meals.⁶⁸

In the 1993-94 school year, more than 1.6 million children in Texas were eligible for free or reduced lunches and breakfasts. This is more than 44 percent of all enrolled students in the state. Regions 10 and 11 had very high meal eligibility (61.1% and 69.5%, respectively). Region 3 had the lowest percent with 35.6 percent.

Eligibility: A child is eligible for a reduced lunch if his or her family income does not exceed 185% of the poverty line (USDA). To be eligible for a free lunch the family income cannot exceed 130% of the poverty line (USDA).



BILINGUAL EDUCATION

Nearly a third of all children between 5 and 17 years do not speak English at home (28%).⁶⁹ The Texas Education Agency provides bilingual education programs in the elementary grades when district enrollment exceeds 20 students with limited English proficiency (of the same language background) in any grade. These programs include content area instruction in the native language and special instruction in English as a second language. Children at the secondary level, where bilingual programs are not required, are at a distinct disadvantage because they may not receive needed bilingual instruction. Only a few districts provide a bilingual program for their secondary-level bilingual students.⁷⁰

While Spanish is the language most frequently spoken in homes where English is not the predominant language, more than 100 other languages are spoken in the homes of Texas families with school age children. The number of students with limited English proficiency has increased from 308,410 in 1989-90 to 421,742 in 1993-4. The Texas Education Agency reports that 371,102 students participated in bilingual programs in 1993-4. More than 113,000 students who needed bilingual education in 1993-4 did not receive it. The Texas Education in 1993-4 did not receive it.

In 1994, 10.3 percent of all children enrolled in public school participated in the bilingual program. As expected, there were far more children in the regions along the border and in the valley participating in bilingual education than in other parts of the state. Regions 10 and 11 had 23.2 and 28.1 percent in bilingual education programs while Region 2 had 2.0 percent and Region 4 had 2.3 percent.



SPECIAL EDUCATION

Children placed in special education programs have been determined to suffer from a "handicapping condition" that entitles them to special education services.⁷⁵ These services include not only special developmental and corrective teaching, but also include related services such as transportation.⁷⁶

In 1994, 396,202 children were in public school special education programs in the 1993-4 school year (10.7% of all enrolled children). The proportions of students in special education programs were fairly evenly distributed throughout the state. Interestingly, Regions 10 and 11 had the lowest participation in special education (8.2% and 9.6%, respectively), as opposed to Region 2 with 14.8%.


Eligibility: Eligible students for special education have one or more of the following conditions: "learning disabilities, speech impairments, physical handicaps, mental retardation, emotional disturbance, autism, multiple handicaps, traumatic brain injury, visual handicaps, or hearing impairments. Children with visual or hearing handicaps may receive special education services from birth through age 21. Children who have other conditions may begin receiving help at age 3 through age 21 (Special Education: Parent and Student Rights, 1991, p 3).



Child Protection

CHILD ABUSE PROTECTION

Thousands of Texas children become victims of child abuse or neglect each year. Child abuse has long-term effects on the abused child and society at large. According to the publication *Child Protection Leader*, adolescents or adults who were abused or neglected during their childhood are more likely than other adults to be "arrested for delinquent behavior, adult criminality, and crimes of violence ". Recent research suggests that victims of child abuse may have "poor educational performance, health problems, and low levels of achievement in adult life." Children in violent homes face the threat of witnessing traumatic events as well as the threat of physical assault. "Neglected and abused children tend to become more violent juveniles and adults". 79




According to a national study on child abuse, there have been significant increases in the number and severity of child abuse cases since 1986.80 "The total number of children seriously injured and the total number endangered both quadrupled" between 1986 and 1993.81 Only 28 percent of reports of abuse for children who had been abused in the past were investigated, down from 44 percent in 1986.

Child abuse is a term used to describe a variety of forms of maltreatment including "neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, medical neglect, and emotional or psychological abuse". ⁸² The Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (DPRS) is the primary governmental agency that "protects the physical safety and emotional well-being of the children of Texas. ⁸³



DPRS has several options when risk of maltreatment is determined. The child can be left in the home, temporarily taken out of the home, placed for adoption, or placed in long-term substitute (including foster) care. When a child is allowed to remain in his or her own home, DPRS has determined that the child will be safe and that the family situation can improve with the provision of ongoing services. If children are removed from the home they are placed with relatives, foster parents, or in substitute care. DPRS' goal is to help the child's family learn how to provide a safe environment for the child so that the child can return home. If the child is unable to return home, then adoption or long-term substitute care are options. According to DPRS, 16.2 percent of Texas' children are at risk of abuse and/or neglect (about 860,000 children in 1994).

Reports of abuse and neglect have increased more than twice as fast as the child population itself between 1990 and 1994 (31% vs. 12%). However, the number of investigations of child abuse and neglect has not kept pace with the increase in the number of reports. In fact, investigations of abuse have grown at half the rate of reports. Confirmations of abuse have grown much more slowly (2% between 1990 and 1994).⁸⁶

Services to protect our children from abuse are vital. However, 40 percent of all confirmed cases of child abuse do not receive needed follow-up services beyond investigation. Although expenditures for child protective services between 1991 and 1994 increased significantly, from \$238.6 million to \$375.5 million, expenditures have not been able to keep pace with the increasing number and severity of child abuse cases in Texas. 88




In 1994, 10.5 of every 1000 Texas children (55,607 children) were confirmed victims of child abuse. Region 1 had the highest rate of child abuse (16.3 per 1,000 children). Region 10 had the lowest rate with 8.3 per 1,000 children

FAMILY VIOLENCE SHELTERS

Family Violence Shelters provide refuge for family members who have been placed in danger of physical harm by a member of their family and have had to seek shelter. The number of residents in family violence shelters has risen steadily between 1991 and 1995 (from 26,000 to 40,000). Unfortunately, not every county has a shelter, leaving many children without reasonable access to a safe haven. In 1996, only 54 counties had Family Violence Shelters.

In 1994, 169,911 victims of family violence were reported to the Department of Public Safety. The actual number of victims is presumably much higher.



Seventy-nine percent of the reported victims were female and 83 percent of the perpetrators were male. Most of the family violence offenses are categorized as assaults (98%). Injuries are most commonly inflicted through physical force with hands, feet, and fists. The use of threats and intimidation represent II percent of all reports. Many of the victims of family violence are children. Children exposed to family violence are at risk of great physical and emotional harm.



Many victims of abuse seeking shelter across Texas had to be turned away in 1994: approximately 5,000 victims were turned away because there was no space for them. These individuals were given referrals. However, 659 victims were turned away with no referral. Approximately 4,000 people were not given shelter because the shelter was determined not to be an appropriate refuge. ⁸⁹

In 1994, 16,904 children found refuge from abuse in family violence shelters (3.2 out of every 1,000 children). The rates were highest in Regions 1 and 9 (6.4 and 6.3 per 1,000 children, respectively). The lowest rates were in Regions 3 and 6 (2.2 and 2.1, respectively).

Eligibility: To be eligible for services, a client must be physically, emotionally or sexually abused by their partner or former partner, or another family member.

FOSTER CARE

When the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (DPRS) determines that a child is not safe with the family because of abuse or neglect, the child enters the substitute care system. When children enter substitute care, they can either be placed with relatives, in foster homes, or in residential child care facilities until it is safe to return home. This substitute care population represents 10 percent of all the children served by DPRS. DPRS staff provide family preservation services that are intended to ultimately increase the potential for a family to safely care for and manage their children.

Children who enter the foster care system are at "high risk for educational failure, unemployment, emotional disturbances, and other negative outcomes". These children have been emotionally traumatized by abusive or neglectful families and the trauma is often enlarged when the child must be separated from the family and placed in foster care. Studies have shown that children in foster care are even less likely than other low-income youth to complete high school or hold jobs.


In 1994, 20,587 children were in foster care (3.2 out of every 1,000 children). Regions 1 and 2 had the highest rates (both 4.5 per 1,000 children). Region 10 had the lowest rate with 1.8 per 1,000 children.



Conclusion


Social services are vital community support mechanisms for helping children develop physically, emotionally, and intellectually into successful, productive adults. While Texas has invested resources in its health and human services, it still ranks among the lowest in the nation in the amount of money it spends on the future of its children. We all must recognize the long-term potential of investing in the future of children and devote more resources to improving the coordination and delivery of children's services.

There is strong evidence that decreases in vital programs for children will increase poverty rates and other negative outcomes for children. Texas cannot let the safety net for children weaken during the coming decade. Recent policy changes, such as welfare reform, threaten to diminish social support programs and push even more children into at-risk situations. The long-term social costs could be enormous. Individuals, communities, and governments all share the responsibility to ensure that our children can grow up to be productive members of the community.

Understanding the Data

There are several important characteristics of the data in this book to be considered. This fact book reports data for 1992 and 1994 (except for the school data, which are for 1992-93 and 1993-94). We chose to report 1994 data so we could calculate percentages and rates with the most recent population estimates available.

The data at the top of each county page are the number and percent of children by age and ethnic group in 1994. This fact book reports for each county the number of children as well as the county and state rates for each of fourteen social service indicators. The bar graph on the right side of the page shows the difference between the county rate and the state rate for 1994.

The indicators reported here are a mixture of 'percentages' and 'rates'. Percentages reflect the proportion of the children in a particular county that receive the services or have a certain characteristic. For instance, the percent of children in poverty reflects the proportion of children in each county living below the federal poverty income guidelines. This indicator is calculated directly from the actual numbers of children meeting the criteria of this indicator.

A similar issue arises in the 'rate' indicators. Those indicators that present 'rates' do so in relation to a constant denominator. In the case of Children Receiving SSI, the rates indicate the number of children per 1,000 0-19 year olds who received SSI. Data from counties with small populations must be used with caution since small fluctuations in the data can cause large differences in the calculated rates.

COUNTY RANKINGS

Appendix A provides ranking information for each county and region of the state. While these charts rank every county from highest to lowest on each indicator, caution must be used with this information. Texas has 254 counties with great variations in demographic characteristics. For example, the county populations at the time of the last census (1990) ranged from a total of only 107 people in Loving county to 2,818,199 people in Harris county. The differences between counties, along with the sheer number of counties, make county to county comparisons complicated at best. Thus the reader is asked to view the ranking charts with caution. Comparisons between counties with similar populations or other shared characteristics will be a more meaningful exercise.

CAUTION TO SMALL COUNTIES

Several counties in Texas have very small child populations. Reporting percentages and rates becomes problematic for these smaller counties. Rates and percentages are not reliable if, for example, small changes in the number of cases produce large changes in the rate. Changes in the number of cases in small counties can result in very different rates from one year to the next. Therefore, caution is urged in interpreting all rates and percentages for counties with very small child populations.

FEDERAL POVERTY GUIDELINES AND SELECTED PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

The federal poverty income guidelines are issued annually by the federal Department of Health and Human Services. Central to the guidelines is the "economy food plan", the least costly of four nutritionally adequate food plans designed by the Department of Agriculture. It was determined from the Department of Agriculture's 1955 survey of food consumption that families spent approximately one-third of their income on food. Each year the "economy food plan" is tripled to set the poverty level for families, based on the assumption that a family earning at least three times the economy food plan should have sufficient income. There are critics who believe that the poverty guidelines are inadequate measures of poverty, because spending patterns have changed substantially since the 1950s and 1960s when the guidelines were developed. However, these guidelines continue to be the ruler by which this country measures poverty among its citizens. The poverty guidelines are also the basis of eligibility determination for a number of public assistance programs that serve children and their families.








Texas Indicator Maps




Health and Human Services Regions






Children in Families Receiving AFDC (percent 0-18 year olds)






Children in Families Receiving Food Stamps in 1994 (percent 0-17 year olds)






Children Enrolled in Medicaid in 1994 (percent 0-18 year olds)






Children Receiving SSI in 1994 (rate per 1,000 0-19 year olds)






Children in Public Pre-Kindergarten Programs in 1994 (percent 3-4 year olds)






Children Receiving Free or Reduced Lunch and Breakfast in 1994 (percent total enrollment)






Children in State Subsidized Child Care in 1994 (rate per 1,000 0-12 year olds)






Children in Head Start Program in 1994 (percent 3-5 year olds)






Students in Bilingual Programs in 1994

(percent total enrollment)






Special Education Students in 1994 (percent total enrollment)






Confirmed Cases of Child Abuse or Neglect in 1994 (rate per 1,000 0-17 year olds)




Children in Family Violence Shelters in 1994 (rate per 1,000 0-17 year olds)






Children in Foster Care in 1994 (rate per 1,000 0-17 year olds)




