ABSTRACT

This study identified and classified the Association for Institutional Research (AIR) publication topics and authors since 1973 in order to provide a reference resource for institutional researchers. The study reviewed the following AIR publication collections: "Research in Higher Education"; "New Directions for Institutional Research"; "Resources in Institutional Research"; "AIR Professional File"; and the "Higher Education Handbook of Theory and Research." A matrix of topics was developed relying on the seven AIR Forum Tracks: (1) "Enrollment Management and Student Affairs"; (2) "Institutional Effectiveness, Student Learning, and Outcomes Assessment"; (3) "Academic Program and Faculty Issues"; (4) "Resource Management and Quality Improvement"; (5) "Policy Analysis, Planning, and Governance"; (6) "Theory, Practice, and Ethics of Institutional Research"; and (7) "Technology and Tools for Institutional Research." A table shows the distribution of AIR publications by track. An appendix contains descriptions of the AIR publications. (JLS)

Indispensable Resources for Institutional Researchers: An Analysis of AIR Publications Topics Since 1974

This paper identifies and classifies the AIR publication topics and authors in order to provide a valuable reference resource for institutional researchers. Beginning with the first volumes of *Research in Higher Education* (RIHE) in 1973 and *New Directions for Institutional Research* (NDIR) in 1974, the Association for Institutional Research (AIR) has supported a growing array of publications that strengthen the professional development of its members and other higher education professionals. There are now five AIR-affiliated publications that publish, review, or commission scholarship that is aimed directly at the diverse audiences represented by the members of the AIR.

In addition to the six volumes each year of RIHE, there are now four volumes each year of NDIR, the *AIR Professional File* (PFile) which is about to publish the 65th of its topic-focused papers, the monograph series *Resources in Institutional Research* (RIR) with its 11th volume in press, and the annual *Higher Education Handbook of Theory and Research* (HEH) which has published 12 volumes of commissioned scholarly analyses. NDIR is published by Jossey-Bass in San Francisco, the HEH is published by Agathon Press in New York, RIHE is published by Human Sciences Press in New York, and the PFile and RIR series are published by the AIR in Tallahassee. Appendix A contains more information about each of these five publications.

METHOD

The objects of this analysis are 100 volumes of NDIR (92 circulated and 8 in preparation), over 40 chapters in the twelve volumes of RIR (10 volumes produced and 2 in preparation), 65 issues of the PFile (63 out and 2 in press), and the 124 chapters in 12 volumes of HEH. The almost 1,000 articles contained in RIHE since 1973 proved to voluminous to be included here and will receive separate analysis. The classification of publications and topics presented here is based on the shared judgements of an institutional researcher, faculty member, and two graduate students.

We developed a matrix of topics and publications by relying upon the seven AIR Forum Tracks as the most convenient and widely recognized schemata for classification. Each AIR Forum is organized into seven tracks that focus on the major functions of institutions (teaching and learning by faculty and students), the management and support of these functions (administrative services, policy analysis, planning, resource allocation, and governance), and the role of institutional research (theory, practice, technology, tools). The seven tracks are described in various AIR materials as follows:

Track 1 -- Enrollment Management and Student Affairs

This track focuses on undergraduate and graduate participants in postsecondary education. Topics include enrollment planning and projections, recruitment and retention, student needs assessments, student profiles, and student financial aid.

Track 2 -- Institutional Effectiveness, Student Learning, and Outcomes Assessment

This track concerns the assessment of institutional effectiveness and student outcomes. Related topics include the assessment of general education, the academic major, affective student learning, retention, and other aspects of student life related to teaching and learning. Measurement issues and effective data collection techniques related to these topics are especially relevant.

Track 3 -- Academic Program and Faculty Issues

This track addresses issues related to curriculum; research and scholarly productivity; public service; tenure policies; program review; faculty recruitment, development, and retention; faculty flow models; collective bargaining; salary models; faculty evaluation; and decision making regarding faculty and academic programs.

Track 4 -- Resource Management and Quality Improvement

This track involves resource allocation, budget and finance issues, quality improvement and cost containment initiatives, human resources/personnel issues, allocation and expansion of capital facilities and equipment, and institutional advancement.

Track 5 -- Policy Analysis, Planning, and Governance

This track emphasizes the major governance and executive functions of an institution. Issues include policy and management analyses, strategic and tactical planning processes, institutional mission development, operations research, and decision support.

Track 6 -- Theory, Practice, and Ethics of Institutional Research

This track describes the role, scope, and evolution of institutional research within and across institutions. It includes surveys of institutional research practice, evaluation models for assessing the research function, techniques for managing the institutional research office, and the ethical and political dimensions of practicing institutional research. Theoretical discussions of research design and statistical applications - but not computer demonstrations, which are part of Track 7 - are also appropriate.

Track 7 -- Technology and Tools for Institutional Research

This track highlights the development and usage of technologies and tools in computer applications, information processing and reporting, and telecommunications which can influence institutional research demonstrations and presentations of database design and management electronic communications, and information analysis and reporting that affect the efficiency and effectiveness of institutional research are especially sought for this track.

In conducting this study, we had to overcome two obstacles. First, these seven categories are not neatly separable and many overlap. Studies of *retention* are listed in the descriptions both for Track 1 (*enrollment management & student affairs*) and for Track 2 (*effectiveness & outcomes assessment*). Many topics lodged elsewhere (such as *TQM*) could properly be

described as falling within Track 2 and its emphasis on *institutional effectiveness*. Nevertheless, we compartmentalized the topics within each track as best we could and stuck to consistent judgements about each publication. For example, all attrition/retention studies are grouped with student tracking and appear under enrollment management.

A second problem is that many studies contain portions that fall into more than one topic (e.g., a policy analysis of student financial aid and loan default, or a study of diversity and gender issues that impact faculty turnover or student satisfaction). This is particularly true in the RIR and NDIR volumes where a single topic is examined from multiple perspectives. We resolve these problems by listing such publications under multiple topics.

In reviewing approximately 350 publications, chapters, and articles for this exercise, we aggregated them into almost five-dozen sub-topics which account for nearly all the diversity of coverage and seem to have face validity from the shared judgements of the institutional researcher and graduate students involved in the process.

RESULTS

The results of our analysis are shown in Table 1. The five dozen AIR Tracks and sub-topics are listed in the first column of the table. The second column displays how we classify the 100 volumes of *New Directions for Institutional Research* (NDIR) that are published and planned. The middle column shows our analysis of the 65 *Professional Files*. The *Resources in Institutional Research* (RIR) column indicates where we slotted its various volumes and chapters. In the final column, we display the relevant chapters from the *Higher Education Handbook of Theory and Research* (HEH) by topic area. The cells within the columns for NDIR, PFile, RIR, and HEH contain the volume numbers and authors for each publication related to that topic. In *Italics* are the manuscripts under development.

For **Track 1**, we see 35 publications related to enrollment management and student affairs topics. Not surprisingly, the most attention is given to analyses of student retention and persistence, with three NDIR volumes, six Pfiles, two RIR chapters, and two HEH chapters. While student affairs issues *per se* have not received a great deal of attention in AIR publications, NDIR and HEH are providing good coverage to financial aid issues.

Track 2, on institutional effectiveness and outcomes, constitutes perhaps the most diverse and prolific publications area for these AIR works. We found over 55 publications that address important topics within the dozen sub-areas in this track. NDIR in particular is giving solid coverage to topics dealing with accountability, program review, alumni studies, and graduate education. Receiving the greatest publications attention is outcomes assessment, with 14 publications across all four sources.

About 30 of these publications are aimed at the faculty and academic issues represented in **Track 3**. HEH gives this area solid coverage (15 chapters), followed by NDIR with seven volumes. RIR devotion to these topics is limited to one chapter each in the Primer and the Bibliography.

The resource management and quality improvement areas of **Track 4** are addressed by over 50 AIR publications, spread rather evenly across all four sources and nine sub-topics. The most thorough coverage is offered by NDIR's 22 volumes.

Track 5 is the most diverse aggregation of subjects, and we divided it into 12 sub-areas. 32 HEH chapters and 22 NDIR volumes account for most of the 64 publications directed at these various administrative issues related to policy, planning, and governance. Planning and strategic planning have received the most attention from NDIR, while HEH has given most of its attention to leadership, campus/government relations, and campus issues related to culture/climate/diversity/gender. RIR and PFile contributions to Track 5 topics are relatively light.

Institutional Research studies itself in **Track 6**, and the 16 or so publications here are limited to NDIR, PFile, and RIR. HEH is more oriented toward higher education in general and less to IR in particular.

Track 7 covers research methods, tools, and technology. This is an important skills area for researchers, and we divided it into ten sub-topics that have received reasonably even coverage by these four publication sources. NDIR has aimed 23 volumes at Track 7 topics, and 17 of them examine one aspect or another of information systems and data management. There are seventeen PFile issues in Track 7, and a growing collection of RIR volumes. The majority of HEH chapters focus upon statistics and research methods.

Looking holistically at the results, we conclude that the profession has made progress toward developing a growing array of publications resources to support research practitioners. While complete and current coverage will be a continuing challenge, these AIR-affiliated publications are collectively supplying important coverage that appears to be growing at a healthy rate. We need to bring analyses such as this to the attention of our colleagues in the field in order to increase their awareness and professional development.

RIHE is the official journal of the AIR and is published six times a year by Human Sciences Press, Inc., a subsidiary of Plenum Publishing Corporation. Founded in 1973, RIHE contains research papers that generally, but not exclusively, stress empirical studies of colleges and universities. The journal describes its purpose as publishing scholarly works that contribute to our collective understanding of one or more institutions of higher education in order to aid faculty and administrators make informed decisions, and to improve efficiency or effectiveness. RIHE has established itself as higher education's most selective journal with a manuscript acceptance rate ranging between 10% and 15%. John Smart works with 30 consulting editors.

The February issue each year contains the outstanding papers from the previous AIR Forum; and the final issue in each volume contains an index by author and subject. The six volumes of RIHE in 1996 average 126 pages and contain 31 articles and one "AIR Between Forums." Almost 1000 studies have been published in RIHE since 1973. This number is too large to have included them in the topic matrix contained in this paper, but they deserve separate analysis. A study of the first 15 years of RIHE scholarship concluded that the top five topics covered in RIHE were faculty issues, administration/management/governance, research issues/methods, student issues/services, and curriculum/instruction. 2. NDIR (cont'd)

New Directions for Institutional Research is a quarterly sourcebook published by Jossey-Bass under the sponsorship and policies of the Association for Institutional Research. Each *NDIR* issue focuses in detail on a specific topic relating to institutional research, planning, or higher education management in general. The Editor-in-Chief and Associate Editor select the topics and issue editors in consultation with the Publications Board of the AIR. The issue editors are recognized authorities who assume responsibility for developing the volume and selecting appropriate individuals to write each chapter. The Editor-in-Chief is responsible for planning, coordination and quality control, and with the Associate Editor, exercises this responsibility by assisting each issue editor plan the volume, select appropriate chapter authors, and then review their work to ensure that they meet publication standards. Manuscripts from each author must survive a two-level review (volume editor and *NDIR* editor) and meet standards for both content and style before they are published.

NDIR volumes normally contain five to ten chapters that examine the various dimensions of each topic, summarize the latest information, and point to future directions. Volumes run 95 to 120 pages in length and have an annotated table of contents, explanatory headnotes, an index, and a list of sources for additional information. *NDIR* has been one of the most successful in the Jossey-Bass series, and 1998 marks its Silver Anniversary with the production of Volumes 97-100.

3. The AIR Professional File (PFile), 1978.

The Professional File began in 1978 as a commissioned publication of the Association for Institutional Research. Averaging three per year, each issue contains a single article of 10 to 16 pages and is distributed to that year's AIR members as a benefit of membership. The PFile's purpose is to enhance the practice of institutional research by providing a continuing collection of selected writings which examine institutional research operations and exemplary practice, and which synthesize and interpret relevant issues and research. In the early years, there was no advisory committee to work with the Editor, but the publication decisions now are increasingly carried out through The PFile's Advisory Committee which has recently grown from ten to fourteen institutional researchers. They review submitted manuscripts and make recommendations for publication to the Editor. Approximately one out of three manuscripts are selected for Publication.

4. Resources in Institutional Research (RIR)

The RIR Series was created in 1992 as a product of strategic discussions between the AIR Executive Director and the Publications Committee. The purpose of this series is to produce for the membership and give greater visibility to the growing number of important AIR monographs. Starting with the now classic *Functions of Institutional Research* by Joe L. Saupe (first published in 1981), the

series includes the *Primer for Institutional Research* (now in its second edition by Whiteley, Porter, and Fenske), the *Bibliography of Reference Sources* (edited by Fendley & Seeloff), the best-selling *Questionnaire Survey Research* (now in its second edition by Suskie), *Strategies for the Practice of Institutional Research* (by Middaugh, Trusheim & Bauer), and *Statistical Applications in IR* (by Coughlin & Pagano). These last three are publications based upon AIR Institute Workshops, and at least two others are expected from the Institute series.

Started in 1985, the *Higher Education Handbook* publishes one annual volume (Agathon Press) and is jointly sponsored by AIR and the Association for the Study of Higher Education (ASHE). The *Handbook* is organized around twelve higher education topic areas, each with its own Associate Editor. These twelve areas reflect the richness and diversity of the field in terms of subject matter interests and methodological perspectives. The Associate Editors provide general leadership and direction for each topic area and they work with the contributing author(s) for each chapter. While the typical pattern is to have one chapter per research area in each volume, there are volumes in which an area is not represented, or is represented by more than one chapter. With some of the annual volumes running to 500 pages, each chapter is a major work.

As described in the first edition, the *Handbook* was established on the belief that the further maturation of higher education as an area of scholarly inquiry is contingent upon our ability to bring order and understanding to our increasingly rich, diverse, and fragmented research findings. The HEH thus provides an annual compendium of exhaustive and integrative literature reviews on a diverse array of topics. Each annual volume seeks to strike a balance between comprehensiveness and depth of coverage. Contributing authors are selected for their recognized expertise in the specific specialty areas. The charge to each author is threefold: to provide an integrative review of extant research on the selected topic, to critique that research in terms of its conceptual and methodological rigor, and to set forth an agenda for future research.



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
