This manual specifies content standards for health education and lists performance standards for each. It includes guidelines for family life and human sexuality, environmental health, substance use and abuse, disease prevention and control, personal health development, nutrition, and personal safety. The section on human sexuality includes physiology, physical changes during adolescence, interpersonal relations, health risks, the reproductive cycle, consequences of sexual activity, and abstinence. The performance standards for each topic are keyed with the abbreviations: K, 1 to 5, MS, and HS; presumably for kindergarten, grades 1 to 5, middle school, and high school. The higher grade levels have more performance standards for each topic represented.

This video was produced by high school students who are peer leaders in the Postponing Sexual Involvement program (an abstinence-based program for preteens and for junior high school students developed by the Emory/Grady Teen Services Program at Grady Memorial Hospital, Atlanta, GA) at the High School for the Communications Professions in Cincinnati, Ohio. These students and others act out vignettes portraying situations in which decisions about sexual behavior are made, such as dealing with an unintended pregnancy, informing partners about sexually transmitted infections, and having sex when you don't want to. Although the actual vignettes are not as realistic as they might be, the messages clearly describe the consequences of adolescent sexual risk taking. A brief session of a Postponing Sexual Involvement class is depicted.

The survey sought information on the content, when the course information should be introduced, acceptable sexual behavior, school health services, and acceptable resolutions to adolescent pregnancies. The report includes a description of the methodology and survey tool and an analysis of the demographic profile of the survey group; it then presents and discusses the results of the survey. The guide uses exercises and activities that rely on the experiences of the participants to reinforce the lesson. Chapters cover these topics: self perception and self image; personal, family, and community values; communication; relationships; sexuality; community participation; goal setting; decision making; gender roles; parenting; responding to violence; health care; reducing sexual risks, and employment. It provides an overview of the world in which adolescents are growing up; examines trends in adolescent sexual activity and adolescents' efforts to protect themselves and their partners from the negative consequences of sex; and describes the incidence and outcomes of sexually transmitted diseases and adolescent pregnancy. It also looks at the effects of programmatic and policy interventions that have tried to influence adolescent sexual behavior and ameliorate its negative effects, and discusses how adults individually and society in general can more effectively help young people become healthy, responsible, and competent adults.

The manual is organized into 12 self-contained modules and provides basic information on topics including growth and development, sex/family life education, contraceptive options, adolescent pregnancy prevention strategies, adolescent pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and dating violence. The course was developed to address adolescent issues such as physical and emotional changes of puberty, sexual attraction, dating, decision-making, pregnancy and birth, and sexual responsibility. The preview kit contains a curriculum description outlining the adolescent and parent lesson plans and learning activities; field test results; student's thought book, curriculum companion; a copy of Source, a quarterly information resource newsletter, an order form; and a 18-minute VHS videotape presentation. The curriculum is designed to be integrated into comprehensive family life or health education programs. It emphasizes that high school students should avoid unprotected sex through abstinence or consistent and effective use of contraception. There are 17 interactive class sessions outlined with detailed steps for leading each activity, student worksheets and handouts, role play scripts, teacher references, and homework assignments.

It was developed to help readers evaluate sources of information, separate fact from opinion, identify stereotypes, and recognize ethnocentrism. It includes diverse materials taken from magazines, journals, books, and newspapers, as well as statements and position papers from a wide range of individuals, organizations, and governments. Opposing views are placed back to back to create a running debate, and each view is preceded by a short quotation that best expresses the author's main points.

This teaching guide provides lessons for teaching safer sex. The lessons are designed to highlight active participation by students. The objectives are to teach adolescents the possible consequences of sexual intimacy, and how to reduce the risks involved. The authors stress that this guide is not a curriculum, rather it is a supplement to curriculum. There are twenty lessons each with objectives, items teachers will need for the lesson, and step-by-step instructions on conducting the lesson. Topics covered are: mixed messages about sex that adolescents receive from society; examinations of attitudes and values; outercourse versus intercourse; sexually transmitted diseases (STDs); AIDS and HIV; condoms; homosexual sex; talking during sex; and an opinion survey on adolescent sex.

One set of lessons are designed for preteen and young teens, ages 9-14, and the other are for older teens, ages 14-19. The guide defines high-risk youth, discusses how to use the teaching guide, profiles high-risk populations, presents the basic principles underlying the guide, and describes ways to create conducive settings for group learning, and contains the two series of lessons. The behavior for which statistics were gathered includes: participation in physical education; attempted suicide; tobacco, alcohol, marijuana, and cocaine use; carrying weapons; body-weight perceptions and weight management goals and practices; sexual behavior; vigorous physical activity; physical fighting; safety belt and helmet use; and behavior that increases risk for HIV infection. All of these data are for high school students in the U.S. in 1991.
