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ABSTRACT

The Community Profiles Project uses data from the 1990 U.S. Census to describe some of the population characteristics of Asian Pacific Americans in selected Massachusetts cities and towns. The profiles include basic statistics relating to income, employment, education, and housing. This information can assist policy makers and practitioners in developing programs and policies affecting Asian Pacific Americans that are appropriate, sensitive, and effective. This profile focuses on Boston. The 1980s saw the number of Asian Pacific Americans in Boston double, until the 30,457 Asian Pacific Americans recorded as living in Boston accounted for about 5% of the city's residents. Household incomes of Asian Pacific Americans in Boston reflected wide disparities, but the per capita income of Asian Pacific Americans in Boston was less than half that of Whites. There were dramatic differences in the English language proficiency of older and younger Asian Pacific Americans in Boston. Nearly 50% of all Asian Pacific Americans in Boston were enrolled in school. This was the highest percentage of school enrollment of any racial and ethnic group. The proportion enrolled in college was particularly high, at 26.4%. The educational attainment of Asian Pacific Americans over age 25 differed from that of the total population in that a considerably higher percentage of Asian Pacific Americans had less than a ninth-grade education. However, a slightly higher percentage of Asian Pacific Americans had secured graduate or professional degrees compared with the total population. (Contains nine figures and eight tables.) (SLD)





- The decade of the 1980s saw the number of Asian Pacific Americans living in Boston double.
- The 30,457 Asian Pacific Americans recorded in the 1990 census as living in Boston (Table 1) accounted for approximately 5% of the city's residents (Figure 1).
- Chinese accounted for over one-half of the Asian Pacific American population (Table 2). Recently the most rapid growth has been recorded by Southeast Asians. The number of Vietnamese in Boston, for example, grew by nearly 500% during the 1980s.

- The Asian Pacific
 American population was nearly
 equally divided between females
 and males overall and in virtually
 every age group. It was also relatively young with less than 20%
 older than 45 years of age (Figure
 2).
- Dramatic differences were found in the English language proficiency of older and younger Asian Pacific Americans (Figure 3). Among those 65 years old and over, for example, approximately 70% were not proficient in English. For individuals 5 to 17 years old, about 22% were not proficient.






- Household incomes of Asian Pacific Americans reflected some wide disparities (Table 3). For example, the percentage of Asian Pacific Americans in the lowest income category (those making less than \$5,000) was the largest of any racial and ethnic group. On the other hand, the percentage of Asian Pacific Americans in the highest category (those making over \$100,000), was the largest by a small margin of any non-white group, although trailing the percentage for whites by a considerable margin.
- The distribution of Asian Pacific American household incomes compared with the total population was considerably larger in the lower income categories (less than \$25,000) and smaller in the higher categories (above \$35,000) (Figure 4).
- The per capita income of Asian Pacific Americans was less than one-half that of whites (Figure 5).
- A larger portion of Asian Pacific Americans in poverty was less than 18 years old compared with whites (Table 4). Older Asian Pacific Americans, in contrast, constituted a smaller percentage of those in poverty compared with whites (Table 4).



III. Employment



- Asian Pacific Americans had the lowest labor force participation rate of any racial and ethnic group (Table 5).
- Male and female unemployment rates were greater than those for whites and closely reflected those for the total population (Figure 6).







- Nearly 50% of all Asian Pacific Americans were enrolled in school (Table 6). This was the highest percentage of school enrollment of any racial and ethnic group.
- The proportion of the group enrolled in college was particularly high, 26.4% for Asian Pacific Americans compared with 17% for whites and 15.3% for the total population (Table 6).
- The educational attainment of Asian Pacific Americans over 25 years old departed from those of the total population at several levels (Table 7 and Figure 7). For example, a considerably higher percentage of Asian Pacific Americans had less than a 9th grade education. A slightly higher proportion of Asian Pacific Americans had secured graduate or professional degrees compared with the total population and a significantly higher proportion compared with other nonwhites.



- The owner-occupancy rate for Asian Pacific Americans like those of other nonwhites trailed rates for whites and the total population by a considerable margin (Figure 8).
- The proportion of rents paid by Asian Pacific Americans at different levels mirrored rather closely those of whites (Figure 9).



LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA

The 1990 U.S. Census data allow for the examination of the situation of Asian Pacific Americans and provide the most comprehensive available information on this group. The data, however, do have some limitations. Linguistic, cultural, and other barriers contributed to an undercounting of **Asian Pacific Americans** in the 1990 Census. Furthermore, by aggregating Asian Pacific Americans together, differences between nationalities were often muted. Errors in coding also limited the reliability of some data on Asian Pacific Americans.


