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ABSTRACT

The Community Profiles Project uses data from the 1990 U.S. Census to describe some of the population characteristics of Asian Pacific Americans in selected Massachusetts cities and towns. The profiles include basic statistics relating to income, employment, education, and housing. This information can assist policy makers and practitioners in developing programs and policies affecting Asian Pacific Americans that are appropriate, sensitive, and effective. This profile focuses on Cambridge. The 8,176 Asian Pacific Americans recorded as living in Cambridge represented 8.5% of the city's residents, an increase of 25% from the 1980 Census. Chinese accounted for nearly one-half of this group. nearly one-half of the Asian Pacific Americans over 65 years of age were not proficient in English, but only about 20% of those aged 5 to 17 years were not proficient. Household incomes of Asian Pacific Americans in Cambridge reflected wide disparities. The percentage of Asian Pacific Americans in the lowest income category was nearly two and one-half times that of Whites and nearly twice as large as Blacks and Latinos, and the percentage of Asian Pacific Americans in the highest income categories was much less than one-half that of Whites and comparable to that of Blacks and Latinos. Employment figures were consistent with income figures. About 60% of the Asian Pacific Americans in Cambridge were enrolled in school. This was, by a considerable margin, the highest percentage of school enrollment of any racial and ethnic group in the city. The proportion of the group enrolled in elementary through college was particularly high. When Asian Pacific Americans over 25 were considered, a considerably lower percentage than that of Whites had a ninth-grade education, while a significantly higher percentage had secured graduate or professional degrees compared with all other groups and the total population. 



- The 8,176 Asian Pacific Americans recorded in the 1990 U.S. Census as living in Cambridge (Table 1) accounted for 8.5% of the city's residents (Figure 1). This figure represents an increase of 225% since the 1980 U.S. Census.
- Chinese accounted for nearly one-half of the Asian Pacific American population (Table 2). Koreans, Asian Indians, and Japanese were also well represented in Cambridge.


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- The Asian Pacific American population was nearly equally divided between females and males overall and in most age groups (Figure 2).
- The Asian Pacific American population was relatively young, and the college-age population was particularly large (Figure 2).
- Dramatic differences were found in the English language proficiency of older and younger Asian Pacific Americans (Figure 3). Among those 65 years old and over, for example, nearly one-half were not proficient in English. For individuals 5 to 17 years old, slightly over 20% were not proficient.






- Household incomes of Asian Pacific Americans reflected some wide disparities (Table 3). For example, the percentage of Asian Pacific Americans in the lowest income category (those making less than \$5,000) was nearly two and one-half times larger than that of whites and nearly twice as large as that of Blacks and Latinos. The percentage of Asian Pacific Americans in the two highest categories (those making over \$75,000) was much less than onehalf that of whites and comparable to that of Blacks and Latinos.
- The percentage of Asian Pacific American household incomes in the lowest income category (less than \$5,000) was over twice as large as that of the total population. In every income group beyond \$35,000, the percentage of Asian Pacific Americans trailed the total population (Figure 4).
- The per capita income of Asian Pacific Americans was less than one-half that of whites (Figure 5), and was slightly higher than that of Blacks and Latinos.



III. Employment



- A larger percentage of Asian Pacific
 Americans less than 18
 years old lived in poverty compared with whites in the same age group
 (Table 4). Asian Pacific
 Americans over 65 years old, in contrast, constituted a much smaller percentage of those in poverty compared with whites (Table 4).
- Asian Pacific American unemployment rates were less than those for whites and the total population (Figure 6).
- Asian Pacific Americans had lower labor force participation rates than whites, Blacks, Latinos, Native Americans, and the total population (Table 5).



- About 60% of all Asian Pacific Americans were enrolled in school (Table 6). By a considerable margin, this was the highest percentage of school enrollment of any racial and ethnic group.
- The proportion of the group enrolled in elementary through college was particularly high, 59% for Asian Pacific Americans compared with 31% for whites and 36% for the total population (Table 6).
- The educational attainments of Asian Pacific Americans over 25 years old departed from those of the total population at several levels (Table 7 and Figure 7). For example, a considerably lower percentage of Asian Pacific Americans had less than a 9th grade education. A significantly higher proportion of Asian **Pacific Americans** had secured graduate or professional degrees compared with all other groups and the total population.




V. Housing

- The owner-occupancy rate for Asian Pacific Americans like those of other non-whites trailed rates for whites and the total population (Figure 8).
- The proportion of Asian Pacific Americans who paid rents \$300 and over is the highest of any group (Table 8 and Figure 9).



The 1990 U.S. Census data allows for the examination of the situation of Asian Pacific Americans and provides the most comprehensive available information on this group. The data, however, does have some limitations. Linguistic, cultural, and other barriers contributed to an undercounting of Asian Pacific Americans in the 1990 Census. Furthermore, by aggregating Asian Pacific Americans together, differences between nationalities were often muted. Errors in coding also limited the reliability of some data on Asian Pacific Americans.




