ABSTRACT

The Community Profiles Project uses data from the 1990 U.S. Census to describe some of the population characteristics of Asian Pacific Americans in selected Massachusetts cities and towns. The profiles include basic statistics relating to income, employment, education, and housing. This information can assist policy makers and practitioners in developing programs and policies affecting Asian Pacific Americans that are appropriate, sensitive, and effective. This profile focuses on Lynn. The 3,203 Asian Pacific Americans living in Lynn accounted for 4% of the city's residents, and this represented an increase of over 15 times from the Asian Pacific American population in 1980. Most of the city's Asian Pacific Americans were Cambodians. English language proficiency reflected interesting differences in various age groups, with those over 65 having the highest proportion identified as speaking English very well, as well as the highest proportion of those speaking English "not well or not at all." Household incomes of Asian Pacific Americans in Lynn reflected wide disparities, but the per capita income was less than one-half that of Whites, less than that of Blacks, and comparable to that of Latinos. The unemployment rates of Asian Pacific Americans males and females were less than those for all groups and the total population, but labor force participation rates were also less than those for all groups. More than 40% of the Asian Pacific Americans in Lynn were enrolled in school, which was the highest proportion of any ethnic group in the city. A substantially higher percentage of Asian Pacific Americans over age 25 had at least a ninth-grade education when compared with other groups, and a much smaller proportion of Asian Pacific Americans were high school graduates. 

• The 3,203 Asian Pacific
Americans recorded in the 1990
census as living in Lynn (Table 1)
accounted for 4% of the city's residents (Figure 1). During the 1980s, the number of Asian Pacific
Americans in Lynn increased by


over fifteen times.

• Cambodians accounted for two-thirds of the Asian Pacific American population (Table 2). Laotians, Vietnamese, and Chinese were also well represented in Lynn.



- The Asian Pacific American population was relatively young (Figure 2). The sex distribution was unusually varied in certain age groups (Figure 2).
- English language proficiency reflected some interesting differences in various age groups (Figure 3). Proficiency levels were similar between the 5 to 17 and 18 to 64 age groups. The 65 and over group had the highest proportion identified as speaking English "very well" and the highest proportion identified as speaking English "not well or not at all."








 Household incomes of Asian Pacific Americans reflected some wide disparities (Table 3 and Figure 4). For example, the proportion of Asian Pacific Americans in the lowest income category (those making less than \$5,000) was larger than that of whites and the total population. The percentage of Asian Pacific Americans in the two highest categories (those making over \$75,000) was much less than that of whites and the total population.



• Approximately 55% of Asian Pacific Americans in poverty were less than 18 years of age (Table 4).





- More than 40% of all Asian Pacific Americans were enrolled in school which was the highest proportion of any group (Table 6).
- The educational attainments of Asian Pacific Americans over 25 years old departed dramatically from those of whites and the total population at several levels (Figure 7 and Table 7). A substantially higher percentage of Asian Pacific Americans had less than a 9th grade education compared with other groups. A much smaller proportion of Asian Pacific Americans were high school graduates compared with other groups and the total population.




V. Housing

- The owner-occupancy rate for Asian Pacific Americans was considerably less than that of whites and the total population (Figure 8).
- Of Asian Pacific Americans who paid rents nearly 90% paid more than \$499 (Table 8 and Figure 9).

LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA

The 1990 U.S. Census data allows for the examination of the situation of Asian Pacific Americans and provides the most comprehensive available information on this group. The data, however, does have some limitations. Linquistic, cultural, and other barriers contributed to an undercounting of **Asian Pacific Americans** in the 1990 Census. Furthermore, by aggregating Asian Pacific Americans together, differences between nationalities were often muted. Errors in coding also limited the reliability of some data on Asian Pacific Americans.




