#### ABSTRACT

With teacher assistance and computer availability, composition students may use the World Wide Web as a valuable learning tool in the networked composition classroom and during personal studying time. The paper offers a list of six online providers and the number of subscribers for each. The paper then presents 118 selected web sites, including: (1) online textbooks, readers, and handbooks; (2) literature resources; (3) rhetoric; (4) research, reference sources, and libraries; (5) journals, magazines, and news; (6) online writing labs; (7) online classes, syllabi, and student writing; (8) Cheaters!; and (9) online support for online teachers. #### Telling Stories without Textbooks: World Wide Web as Classroom Text

With teacher assistance and computer availability, composition students may use the WWW as a valuable learning tool in the networked composition classroom and during personal studying time. With web sites such as Eric Crump's Online Writery, the growing number of university Online Writing Labs (OWLs), online research sources such as First Search and CARL, and online handbooks, dictionaries, and thesauruses, students are no longer limited to print texts. From their computers, students can ask OWL cybertutors for assistance with their grammar, essay development and organization, and documentation. Furthermore, students can research libraries around the world, and they read magazines and journals online. Students can also visit other composition class web sites in order to use other students' writings as models. Furthermore, students can publish their own writing, creating a sense of hypertext-ownership for the student and focusing their attention on audience.

By using the WWW as a text, students are no longer limited by time and space; for example, commuting students can visit their writing labs and libraries from home. Furthermore, students are introduced to more diverse voices than those which are restricted in a print textbook. However, the WWW is limiting in many ways. Many students cannot afford to own computers, and many students need personal contact in order to achieve successful learning. Therefore, teachers must provide tools that enable more than one learning style. Instead of allowing the WWW to overtake the classroom, teachers should take implement its advantages as a supplemental tool for our students of the

Technological Age.
