ABSTRACT

This guide to services in South Carolina for people with severe disabilities is divided into seven sections. Section 1 covers the South Carolina Department of Disabilities and Special Needs (DSN) and includes information on how to access services, services offered by DSN boards, addresses of DSN board members, services and offices of the autism division, prevention and genetic services, and developmental evaluations. Section 2 is on other state government agencies that provide services to people with disabilities and special needs. Among these are school districts, county mental health offices, the Governor's office, and assistive technology services. Section 3 provides an alphabetical list of services and organizations by service need and includes addresses, phone numbers and fax numbers. Section 4 offers an alphabetical list of South Carolina support group organizations, their addresses, phone numbers, and fax numbers. Section 5 lists additional resources such as toll-free telephone numbers, publications for consumers, foundations and fund-raising organizations, and organizations for professionals. Section 6 is an index by subject and Section 7 an index by title. (DB)

SECTION I

SC Department of Disabilities and Special Needs

The SC Department of Disabilities and Special Needs (DDSN) was created July 1, 1993 by combining the SC Department of Mental Retardation with programs for individuals with autism. New responsibilities also were added to provide services for survivors of brain and spinal cord injuries. Now DDSN provides services to people with autism; brain injuries, spinal cord injuries and similar disabilities; and mental retardation and related disabilities.

The needs of people with disabilities mirror the needs of people in the general community. People with disabilities routinely need many of the services that other state agencies provide to people without disabilities. While DDSN provides services that address disability issues, the state recognizes that people with disabilities may need the same services that all South Carolinians have a right to receive, such as educational services, medical services, mental health services, social services, public health services, housing and other services.

Additionally, people with disabilities usually have needs that go beyond the services normally provided by other state agencies. They may need unique, specialized services provided by various disability experts. The specialized disability services supplement and enhance, not replace, services provided by other agencies.

A person with disabilities receiving services from DDSN and other agencies may need help coordinating services among the agencies. Responsively, DDSN advocates on behalf of all citizens with disabilities and special needs to ensure that their needs are addressed by appropriate state, federal and local agencies. The agency works with other agencies to tailor a comprehensive and practical service plan for every person served. Each disabilities and special needs (DSN) board employs service coordinators to establish and monitor the service plan. The service coordinator arranges and combines an array of disability services in concert with services provided by other agencies. More importantly, the service coordinator also serves consumers and families as the single point of entry into the disabilities system and as a continuing contact person and advocate.

Organization

DDSN is governed by a seven-member commission appointed by the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate. A commission member is appointed from each of the six Congressional districts and one member is appointed from the state at-large. The commission is the agency's governing body and provides general policy direction and guidance.

The state director is the agency's chief executive. Appointed by the commission, the director has jurisdiction over the central administrative office as well as each of the agency's three divisions, four regional centers and all services provided through contracts with local DSN boards (see page 13).

DDSN's central office is in Columbia. Deputy state directors oversee four key areas: Services and Supports, Regional Centers, Fiscal Management and Administrative Services.

Services and Supports

Three divisions comprise the Services and Supports area: Autism, Head and Spinal Cord Injury, and Mental Retardation (see pages 30, 32 and 7, respectively).

Regional Centers

Four regional residential centers provide 24-hour residential care in an Intermediate Care Facility for the Mentally Retarded (ICF/MR). Each regional center is managed by a facility director (see page 10).

Local Disabilities and Special Needs Boards

The Disabilities and Special Needs (DSN) board in each county (or multiple-county cluster) serves as the single planning and service coordination point for all local services funded by DDSN.

The DSN board is responsible for developing a local service plan and supervising service coordination. Although most DSN boards deliver services directly, some arrange for specific services to be delivered by other community organizations. Just as DDSN is responsible for promoting and coordinating other state agency efforts on behalf of people with disabilities and special needs, local DSN boards are responsible for developing and coordinating services and funds from local agencies. This system permits people with disabilities and special needs to remain in their own homes or, if this is not possible, to live in a family-like setting in their communities (see page 7).

Service Coordination

Under contract with DDSN, each DSN board operates a service coordination program. Service coordination is the single entry point into DDSN's service system for people with disabilities and special needs. Service coordinators work with individuals and/or their families to identify needs and develop a plan of services to meet those needs. DDSN services are coordinated with those of other agencies, such as local education, health and social service agencies, and community mental health centers.

Service coordinators do everything possible to provide and coordinate services for citizens who need them. While citizens may receive services from more than one agency and may move from one type of service to another as needs change, service coordinators ensure that services are adequately provided to each person (see page 7).

Funding

Programs for people with disabilities and special needs are funded through state, federal and local governments. State funding is a key to both federal and local resources. DDSN makes every effort to ensure that government leaders are well-informed about needs of people with disabilities and special needs at every level.

Local county and municipal governments benefit from jobs and dollars spent in communities for DDSN programs through economic activity and local revenue. DDSN encourages local governments to share financial responsibility for providing services to local citizens, and at the same time assures services are equally available statewide.

Local DSN boards are encouraged to develop foundations and other organizations, solicit donations and provide volunteer services (see page 13).

Families

Consumers and family members play a critical role in the service delivery system and in evaluating the effectiveness of that system. Each DSN board and regional residential center is required to have a consumer/family organization and to have a process for consumers and families to participate as advocates for service recipients and to review and monitor programs (see page 13).

Accessing Services

Applying for Services

To apply for services, families of people with disabilities and special needs should contact their DSN board (see page 13). The individual will be assigned a service coordinator, who will arrange evaluation and planning for services.

The evaluation and planning process determines if a person is eligible for services, which services are needed and how they will be provided.

If the applicant is eligible, the service coordinator will help arrange appropriate services. If the person is not eligible for services, the service coordinator will refer them to other resources.

Advocacy

The interest and welfare of people with autism, brain or spinal cord injuries, and mental retardation or related disabilities is the mutual responsibility of individuals, their families, local DSN boards, service providers and DDSN. The agency encourages consumers and families to advocate for people with disabilities to ensure that they have access to appropriate services from all public agencies and that the services they receive meet acceptable standards of quality.

The agency also encourages consumer and family involvement in all aspects of each individual's service plan. The consumer and family are invited to participate in developing and implementing the individual service plan.

DDSN's consumer affairs advocate ensures that individuals served by the agency receive quality care and treatment. The consumer affairs advocate also helps solve immediate concerns within the service delivery system, prevents problems from occurring in similar situations and acts as liaison to other advocacy agencies and organizations.

Health Insurance

Group Policies

Many people with autism, mental retardation, or brain or spinal cord injuries are included in group health insurance policies. Each of these policies is a contract between a group (usually a family member's employer) and an insurance company.

People with disabilities can't be excluded from group policies as a class or category, but they may have pre-existing conditions that can be excluded from the policy's coverage. Pre-existing conditions are health conditions known to applicants 12 months before enrolling in an insurance plan. These conditions may be excluded from coverage for one year, but should be covered after that time period.

Group policies may also limit coverage for certain health care services, but limits must be the same for all individuals in the group. For example, policies may or may not cover payment for speech therapy, but they must pay speech therapy claims for all eligible individuals if the service is covered.

Group policies can't "drop" people with disabilities from coverage due to claims experience, but their claims can affect those paid to other family members if policies have family limits.

Families should contact their insurance provider (employer) or insurance company if they have questions about group policies (see Section III, page 57).

Individual Policies

People with disabilities may also be covered under individual health insurance policies. Rates for these policies can't be raised because of claims history. Rates are based on a broad range of activities for a particular type of coverage, and increases must be approved by the SC Department of Insurance.

The Department of Insurance answers questions and files complaints about individual policies. Questions are handled through the forms and rates office (803-737-6240), and complaints are handled through the consumer assistance office (803-737-6160).

Services provided by DDSN are subsidized by payment from private health insurance companies and federal funds.


If individuals have private health insurance, DDSN will bill their insurance company for the following services:

- Residential care in regional centers or community residential homes;
- Services provided by DDSN physicians and those under contract with the agency;
- Hospital stays, supplies and procedures; and
- Psychological testing and evaluations included in the diagnostic and evaluation process.

Some individuals with disabilities also may have health coverage through the Medicaid program. If the individual's private insurance company does not pay a bill or a portion of a bill, DDSN will bill Medicaid for the unpaid amount. The agency will not bill individuals or their families for unpaid portions of insurance bills.

Medicaid provides half of DDSN's funding for services and supports. The agency will jeopardize this source of funding if health care services are not billed first to private health insurance companies.

Insurance payments are kept by DDSN and budgeted to expand services and supports. Physicians and other individuals who provide health care services are paid by salary or contractual agreement and do not receive additional compensation as a result of billing.



If families have questions about unpaid insurance bills, they should contact claims and collections officers at DDSN regional centers (see page 10). For information about additional insurance options, see Section III, Health Insurance and Financial Assistance on page 108.

Consumer/Family Organizations

In an effort to strengthen the involvement and self-sufficiency of consumers and their families, the SC Commission on Disabilities and Special Needs adopted a policy for each county DSN board to have an affiliated consumer/family organization.

Consumer/family organizations are essential elements of any delivery system. The role of local consumer/family organizations is one of communication. They provide a forum for education and information exchange among consumers, parents, family members, interested citizens, service providers and state and local officials.

Consumer/family organizations also advocate for appropriate services to be provided to citizens with disabilities by all SC agencies and help ensure access to these services.

Consumer/family organizations do the following:

- · monitor community residences and regional center residential programs;
- assist foundations to provide private funds;
- assist volunteer organizations;
- provide self-help groups, advocacy, information and public education; and
- cooperate with statewide coalitions.

For more information about these organizations, please contact your local DSN board or regional center (see page 13, 10 respectively).

DDSN has a statewide consumer/family council that advises the agency on programs, services and needs of people with disabilities and special needs. Membership includes a representative from each county DSN board consumer/family organization, presidents of the regional center consumer/family organizations and representatives from other statewide consumer/family organizations. For more information about the council, contact your county DSN board or regional center (see pages 13, 10).

State and national organizations also provide leadership for consumers and families. *Practical Guide to Services* contains information about support groups that may be helpful to consumers and families. South Carolina support groups are listed by category (see Section III, page 57).



Services Provided through Local Disabilities and Special Needs Boards

DDSN strives to serve all who need services and to ensure that services meet acceptable standards.

The agency recognizes existing programs or services may not always meet the needs of individuals with unique or multiple disabilities. DSN boards are encouraged to be creative in developing supports and services to meet the needs of those people, especially those with a disability complicated by medical or behavioral needs. For a complete list of services offered by each DSN board, see page 13.

Currently, DSN boards provide three categories of services: family support, intervention and prevention. Following are examples of some services:

Individual/Family Support

Individual/family support enables people with disabilities to remain in their own homes.

Early intervention is a family-focused, in-home service for children up to age 6. An early interventionist helps families understand their child's development. Service coordination is provided in accordance with an individualized family service plan. DDSN's early intervention program serves children and families eligible for BabyNet, South Carolina's statewide early intervention program (see page 39).

Extended day services provide care within select time frames, such as before or after school.

Genetic evaluation, treatment and counseling services are available to families in which a disability has occurred and to families at risk of having a child with a disability or special need. Emphasis is on preventing disabilities, when possible.

Respite services provide temporary care to individuals, allowing families or caregivers to handle emergencies, personal situations or take a break. Respite may be provided in the individual/family home, a qualified caregiver's home, regional center or other locations.

Stipends are available to help individuals/families afford the cost of care for an individual in their own home. Funds are available for transportation, specialized equipment, day care, recreation and other needs.

Summer camps provide supervised recreational activities. Day camps and residential camps are available.

Summer day services provide summer care on weekdays for school-age children who have working parents.

Individualized summer services provide financial assistance for families whose children attend activities selected by the parents. Children attend various types of summer activities, from traditional camps to highly individualized services and activities.



Other family support services include: physical and occupational therapies, personal care services, homemaker services, audiological and speech services, private duty and home health nursing, and environmental modifications.

Day Services for Adults

Planning for transition from school to adult day services is a support available from local DSN boards. The boards also provide supported employment and center-based work programs in local communities.

Supported employment provides assistance in sustaining employment. This service provides wages and opportunities to interact with other workers. Supported employment includes job coach, enclave and mobile work crew opportunities.

Job coach services are funded through DDSN. Job coaches develop employment opportunities and work with participants on a one-to-one basis to teach them the skills necessary to perform and maintain a particular job. Assistance is also provided to help individuals develop job-related skills such as money management, use of transportation and interpersonal skill development.

Enclaves provide work for groups of adults at a local industry or business. Participants work at typical job sites and are often hired by the employer.

Mobile work crews train groups of adults as they work in their community and perform services such as lawn-care, janitorial or landscaping services.

Center-based services provide a safe and healthy environment for people to develop social and personal care skills for more independent and productive lives. Participants may receive competitive wages for work.

Day Services for Children

Integrated day-care programs provide financial assistance to enable children to be served in typical community day-care centers. Kiddie coaches help families of school-age children find suitable community day-care programs.

Child development programs provide day care and developmental activities for children. DSN boards may offer the service before or after school, during parents' work hours or during summer months.

Public schools provide education and related services for children beginning at age 3. Families should contact their local DSN board for information on local developmental and educational programs.

Residential Services

Supervised living programs serve adults capable of independence. Adults may live in apartments, duplexes or other housing. Supervision and support services are provided with regard to individual needs.



Community training homes offer individuals the opportunity to live in a homelike environment under the supervision of a qualified and trained caregiver. Personalized care, supervision and individualized training are provided for no more than three individuals living in a home. Caregivers are either trained private citizens who provide care in their own homes (CTH I), or employees who provide care in a home that is owned or rented by the provider organization (CTH II).

Community residences resemble single-family homes in local neighborhoods. They provide 24-hour care, supervision, counseling, recreation and other activities.

Regional residential centers provide 24-hour care and treatment to individuals. Generally, regional center care is recommended only when all other appropriate community services are not available. Regional centers are located in Ladson (near Charleston), Clinton, Columbia and Florence (see page 10).

Additional Supports





The Autism Division offers the following services:

Consultative Services assist DSN boards, public schools and other state agencies in serving people with autism. Regional consultants and staff work with other service providers to ensure quality programs are provided.

Early Intervention services include diagnostic services for preschoolers, family training and consultation.

Evaluations help determine appropriate placement for education and provide information for service planning.

Summer Programs include day camps which provide supervised recreational activities and structured guidance to children with autism. Camper-to-counselor ratio is 1-to-1. Trained counselors accompany children to other camps such as church camps and 4-H camp.

Family Support Services encourage families to care for their family member at home by providing home- and community-based services tailored to meet the needs of the individual and family. Services and supports are responsive, flexible, culturally sensitive and well-coordinated. Family support services include seminars, consultation, referral, training and respite care for families.

Specialized Training is provided to professionals who serve individuals with autism. Teachers, job coaches, community living staff, aides, volunteers and other professionals may request this training.

Model/Demonstration Programs for education are provided through contracts with certain school districts that enable those districts to use the most current approaches in the classroom through specialized training and consultation.

The Head and Spinal Cord Injury Division was created by the 1993 General Assembly's government restructuring. The 1994 General Assembly appropriated limited funds to begin providing services.

Services include, but are not limited to, individual and family services coordination, information about community resources, educational material, emergency and outreach services, and other individual and family-centered services such as:

- respite care;
- personal care assistance with activities of daily living;
- child care for parents with severe disabilities;
- minor environmental modifications (such as ramps) to homes and work sites;
- assistive devices and specialized equipment and repair, including vehicular modifications;
- specialized nutrition, clothing and supplies;
- transportation to needed services;
- home- and community-based nursing and health services;
- individual and family counseling, training and support groups; and
- services in emergency situations where usual supports and services are not available.

Priorities for services include basic care, such as personal assistance for essential activities of daily living.

Subsequent priorities include providing:

- home modifications to allow a person to fully access his or her own home;
- assistive aids, devices and equipment needed to live more independently; and
- services and devices for individual health, safety and security.

Eligibility

By law, a person is eligible for services when he or she has a severe chronic limitation that:

- is attributed to a physical impairment, including brain injury, spinal cord injury or a similar disability, regardless of the age of onset but not associated with or related to the process of aging;
- is likely to continue indefinitely without intervention;



- results in substantial functional limitations in at least two of these life activities:
 - a. self-care,
 - b. receptive and expressive communication,
 - c. learning,
 - d. mobility,
 - e. self-direction,
 - f. capacity for independent living,
 - g. economic self-sufficiency; and
- reflects the person's need for services that are of lifelong or extended duration and are individually planned and coordinated.

Applying for Services

DDSN's service delivery network consists of 39 DSN boards in 46 counties. If you or your family member have a disability, contact the board nearest you. A service coordinator will arrange an evaluation to determine eligibility, which services are needed and how they will be provided.

If eligibility requirements are not met, the service coordinator will refer you to other available resources.

The following DSN boards employ a specialized brain and spinal cord injury services coordinator. If your county does not have a service coordinator, call the county DSN board nearest you (see page 13).

Prevention and Genetic Services

DDSN established the Office of Prevention to reduce the incidence of autism, mental retardation, brain and spinal cord injuries, and related conditions and to promote the quality of life for people with disabilities. The office offers programs for people with disabilities, conducts public awareness and professional education activities, collects data, coordinates prevention activities and genetic services, and provides printed material and videotapes concerning prevention.

STEPS Prevention Program

DDSN's STEPS program teaches adults with mental retardation about family planning and health issues. DDSN contracts with local DSN boards to provide STEPS programs statewide.

The STEPS program is designed to prevent unwanted pregnancies, sexually transmitted diseases and sexual victimization; promote healthy lifestyles and teach parenting skills. Through a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, STEPS staff have also been able to evaluate the cognitive abilities of children whose parents have mental retardation. Neural Tube Defects Prevention

Neural tube birth defects are among the most common of all serious birth defects. In South Carolina they occur once in every 1,000 births — a frequency that is twice the national average.

Recent studies show women can greatly reduce the risk of neural tube defects by taking the B vitamin, folic acid. The vitamin, however, must be taken for several months before pregnancy and during the first two months of pregnancy.

DDSN's Office of Prevention received a five-year grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to prevent neural tube defects in South Carolina. The \$1.25 million project is one of only two such prevention programs in the United States funded by the CDC, and is being carried out by Greenwood Genetic Center in cooperation with local health departments.

Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Prevention

The Interagency Office of Disability Prevention (IODP) has developed a surveillance system to collect and study data about brain and spinal cord injuries.

Preliminary studies are based upon past hospital discharge data. This data indicates automobile accidents and violence are the most common causes of brain injuries in South Carolina. The number of severe brain injuries is also increasing slightly. Overall, automobile accidents are the most common causes of spinal cord injuries, although falls are a common cause of severe spinal cord injuries for preschool and elderly age groups.

IODP has established a Head and Spinal Cord Injury Information System to register and track individuals with brain and spinal cord injuries. The project is funded by a grant from the CDC and will be directed by the SC Head and Spinal Cord Injury Information System Council.

Greenwood Genetic Center

DDSN has a special working relationship with Greenwood Genetic Center. The center provides genetic services to families with disabilities.

Genetic disease affects one of every eight children born in South Carolina and causes a range of birth defects including mental retardation and other disabilities. Genetic services reduce the risk of children having disabilities caused by genetic factors, whenever possible.

Greenwood Genetic Center is a unique model of cooperation between public and private sectors in South Carolina. The center began in 1974 with support from DDSN and the Self Foundation. It provides a complete range of genetic services.

Families of people with genetically linked disabilities may receive services from Greenwood Genetic Center without charge. Services emphasize prevention programs, which reduce the risk of having children with mental or physical disabilities.

Genetic case workers coordinate services at the regional level. Services are provided through a central clinic and laboratory in Greenwood and a network of satellite clinics. Services also are available through local disabilities and special needs boards (see page 13).

Greenwood Genetic Center collaborates with the University of South Carolina School of Medicine and the Medical University of South Carolina. Genetic center faculty members have joint appointments at the medical schools to facilitate this collaboration.

South Carolina's new Self Research Institute will build on accomplishments of Greenwood Genetic Center and is located beside the center. The institute is a state and national resource with a goal of having every baby born with sound mind and body. Research of the institute focuses on prevention of birth defects and mental retardation.

Developmental Evaluations

DDSN offers developmental evaluations for children. Evaluations are conducted by DDSN developmental clinics and in cooperation with the child's parents. Evaluations help define a child's strengths and weaknesses, and help professionals determine needed services and supports. Results of evaluations may suggest further evaluation and/or intervention.

Evaluations may be performed in the family's home region, or the child may be referred to a center for testing. Complex situations may require the services of highly trained specialists. Evaluations may include the following:

- developmental medical;
- social history;
- psychological/behavioral;
- educational;
- speech/language;
- physical therapy;
- occupational therapy.

Other health care professionals, such as orthopedic physicians, ophthalmologists and geneticists, may be consulted on an individual basis. Also, hearing tests may be performed by ENT (ear, nose and throat) physicians.

Evaluations are followed by a staffing conference. Both parents and professionals attend the conference to discuss the child's strengths and needs. DDSN provides the needed services or arranges for the child to receive services from appropriate agencies.

Other State Government Agencies

People with disabilities have the right to receive the same services from public agencies and other organizations that benefit all South Carolina citizens, and to have those services coordinated with the special services needed because of their disabilities. Examples include education, health, Medicaid, mental health and social services. Only when these services cannot meet the needs of individuals with disabilities will DDSN provide the "special" services to supplement the "regular" services offered by the SC Department of Health and Environmental Control, SC Department of Health and Human Services, SC Department of Mental Health, SC Vocational Rehabilitation Department, SC Department of Education and the SC Department of Social Services.

Provider organizations offer specific services under the direction of, or under contract with, DSN boards (see page 13). Contract services are monitored by the local DSN board and/or regional office quality assurance teams.

 DHEC administers health and environmental control programs for all counties in South Carolina and is the lead agency for early intervention services for children from birth to age three. BabyNet, South Carolina's early intervention network, coordinates, supports and services for families of children with disabilities or developmental delays. DHEC provides a broad range of preventive, clinical and educational services through local health departments.

DHEC's BabyNet program is responsible for the administration of PL 102-119 (formerly PL 99-457). Working cooperatively with other agencies, DHEC is responsible for the administration and implementation of the program, which provides services to infants and toddlers with developmental delays and diagnosed disabilities. The Bureau of Maternal and Child Health has developed a strong public care system that complements the private health system across the state:



The Division of Women and Children's Services provides clinical services through local health departments that include: prenatal care in under served areas, routine health screens (EPSDT), immunizations, laboratory tests, lead tests, developmental assessments, vision and hearing testing, health education (anticipatory guidance), dental screening, injury prevention activities, nutrition and social work assessment and interventions, parenting classes and counseling, and other activities that promote health development. Health departments also provide primary family support services to women, children and families when risk factors are identified which require assessment, treatment and follow up. The Division of WIC Services administers the Women, Infant and Children (WIC) supplemental food program.

The Division of Children's Rehabilitative Services provides comprehensive evaluations and referrals for children with physical disabilities through local health departments. Services include: subspecialty physician services, speech, physical, occupational and recreational therapy, payment for medical care services that are medically necessary but not covered by health insurance, summer camp at Camp Burnt Gin, medical supplies and special formulas, nutrition and health education.  DHHS administers the Medicaid program for South Carolina. Medicaid is a health program that pays for some medical bills for eligible people with low incomes. Medicaid options available for people meeting eligibility criteria in South Carolina include the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA), extended Medicaid benefits for children with disabilities.

One component of Medicaid is the Community Long Term Care program. The CLTC focuses on home- and community-based health care for adults with disabilities and people with HIV/AIDS. People age 18 and older may obtain CLTC services if they meet medical and financial criteria and are Medicaid-eligible. Services include personal care aides, home-delivered meals, medical social services, therapy services, medical day care and respite care.

DHHS also administers the Home- and Community-Based Waiver, which assists people with disabilities who require nursing home care but who choose to receive home- or community-based services. Waiver services may include nursing care, respite, and homemaker and personal care aide services.

DHHS is the lead agency for the ABC Child Care Voucher system. This program provides financial assistance to eligible families who need child care. Funds may be available to families whose children are under 13 years old and have income levels at or below 125% of poverty. A family will become ineligible when their income exceeds 175% of poverty. Parents must be working or attending an educational or training program in order to be eligible for child care assistance. Parents must also share in the cost of child care.

• DMH provides a full range of community and inpatient services to citizens of all ages who are emotionally disturbed or psychiatrically disabled. Through a network of 17 community mental health centers that serve all of the state's 46 counties, psychiatric emergency, day treatment, psychosocial rehabilitation, housing, employment, medical psychiatric, case management, crisis intervention and management, counseling, group therapy, activity therapy and local psychiatric inpatient services are provided. Inpatient services also are provided through two acute care and two long-term care psychiatric hospitals. Specialized programs are provided through a training and research facility, three standard nursing homes and a nursing care facility for elderly people who have a major mental illness complicating their nursing care needs. In addition, the department operates an inpatient and community-based program for hearing-impaired persons with mental illness and an ICF/MR for individuals with mental retardation who also have a psychiatric disability.

- administers Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), Early Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT), food stamp program and Medicaid program. AFDC provides money for food, clothing, shelter and incidental expense needs of families with children. To receive benefits, families must meet eligibility criteria:
 - Children must be deprived of parental support by death, disability, continued absence of one or both parents or unemployment of the parent who was the principal wage earner.
 - Children must be under age 18, enrolled in a secondary school full time, and be

reasonably expected to complete the program before reaching age 19.

- Children must be living with a parent or other specified relative related by blood or marriage.
- Income and resources cannot exceed agency standards.
- Individuals must reside in South Carolina at the time of application.
- Individuals must register and participate in the Work Support Program, unless exempt.
- Individuals must furnish Social Security numbers or proof of application.
- All support rights of children for whom aid is being requested or received must be assigned to the DSS by the responsible parent or relative.
- The responsible parent or relative must cooperate with the agency to obtain child support on behalf of children for whom aid is being requested or received, unless this action would be against the best interest of the child.

EPSDT provides free health checkups to children under 21 who are eligible for Medicaid. The checkups include a physical examination, hearing and vision tests, immunizations and a direct dental referral, if the child is over age 3. Health and nutrition education and counseling are also available to both parents and children. EPSDT services help identify preventable health problems and provide proper medical care for children in low-income families.

The *food stamp program* provides nutrition to people of low-income households. To receive benefits, families must meet eligibility criteria:

- Household income and resources must not exceed established limits.
- All household members must be United States citizens. Aliens must meet special criteria.
- With certain exceptions, able-bodied household members between the ages of 18 and 60 must register for work.
- All household members, including children, must have a Social Security number.
- Households must be certified by the DSS office in their county.

Medicaid is a health insurance program that pays for medical services on behalf of certain people with low incomes. Within limits, Medicaid will pay for services that are medically necessary. There are strict limits on the types of care covered by Medicaid. Some services are limited by the number of visits during the fiscal year. (The fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30 of each year.) Medicaid may pay for the services listed:

Mandatory:

- Inpatient hospital services
- Outpatient hospital services
- Physician visits
- Inpatient physician visits
- Early and periodic screening, diagnosis and treatment



- Vision care
- Dental services
- Rural health clinic services
- Laboratory and X-ray
- Ambulance transportation
- Medical transportation
- Podiatrists' services
- Skilled nursing facility services
- Therapy
- Inpatient hospital services for individuals age 65 or older in institutions for tuberculosis or mental disease
- Mental health clinic services

Optional:

- Durable medical equipment
- Prescription drugs
- Intermediate Care Facility services
- Inpatient psychiatric services for individuals under age 22

TEFRA

Some children with disabilities may receive benefits under the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA). TEFRA is an amendment to the South Carolina state Medicaid program. To receive benefits, children must meet the following requirements:

- be 18 years old or younger;
- meet SSI disability criteria;
- be eligible for Medicaid as if in an institution. This means eligibility is based on the child's income alone, excluding parent's income;
- need to receive services in a hospital, intermediate care facility for persons with mental retardation (ICF/MR), or nursing facility environment;
- be able to receive appropriate services at home; and
- be served at home for a lower cost than being served in a facility. All usual Medicaid services will be covered, including:
- hospital and physician services;
- EPSDT program;
- vision and dental care;
- family planning;
- laboratory and X-ray;



- durable medical equipment;
- prescription drugs;
- ambulance and medical transportation;
- podiatrist, home health, therapy and inpatient psychiatric services; and
- service coordination.

Home- and Community-Based Waiver

The Home- and Community-Based (HCB) Waiver is yet another program under which people with disabilities may become eligible for Medicaid services. It is an optional program and must have federal approval of the waiver application. Individuals with developmental disabilities may be served through the waiver if they would otherwise require ICF/MR services funded by Medicaid, as long as Medicaid costs are less than those that would have been incurred without the waiver. Services commonly covered by the HCB Waiver include:

- adaptive equipment and repair;
- adult day programs;
- behavior analyst services and assessment;
- child day programs;
- consumable medical supplies;
- environmental modifications;
- habilitation;
- homemaker;
- occupation/physical/speech therapy and assessment;
- personal care assistance;
- private duty nursing;
- psychological assessment;
- respite;
- service coordination;
- skilled nursing;
- supported living coaching;
- transportation; and
- wheelchairs with related adaptations and repair.

Services include assessment for determining eligibility and vocational rehabilitation needs; counseling, guidance and referral; physical and mental restoration services; vocational and other training services; placement in suitable employment and follow-up; and other goods and services that can help an individual with a disability become gainfully employed.

The Workshop Production Program provides individuals with disabilities actual work experience in industrial-type settings established in the department's local rehabilitation centers throughout the state. These centers provide complete vocational evaluations as well as personal, social and work adjustment training programs that help people make the transition to competitive employment.

The department operates a network of statewide facilities designed to provide specialized services to individuals with various types of severe disabilities. This includes facilities and services in settings operated by the departments of Mental Health, Corrections and Juvenile Justice, the Workers' Compensation Program, Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School, Charleston VA Hospital, Roger C. Peace Hospital in Greenville, Medical University of South Carolina, as well as the two residential rehabilitation centers for substance abusers operated by the Vocational Rehabilitation Department.

The department also has service staff located in some of South Carolina's 90 school districts and serves students with disabilities from its area offices in the other districts.

The Vocational Rehabilitation Evaluation Center is a multidisciplinary program for individuals with severe disabilities. This facility is a 30-bed residential facility that offers medical services (including a chronic pain program); occupational therapy; personal and social adjustment; and industrial rehabilitation, including workhardening, psychological services, speech therapy and vocational evaluation.

The Muscular Development Center offers aquatic, physical recreational and exercise therapies.

Other programs include the Computer Training Program and the Rehabilitation Engineering Program. The Center for Rehabilitation Technology Services (CRTS) is a rehabilitation engineering center funded to develop service delivery models for assistive technology in the vocational rehabilitation process.

Devices may be acquired commercially, or may be modified or custom-made. They may be as simple as a modified drawing handle or as complex as a breath-controlled switch to operate a personal computer.

Social Security benefits can also be paid to disabled widows at age 50 and unmarried adult children who become disabled before age 22 if certain other requirements are met. In order to receive supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability benefits, the applicant must also have limited income and resources. Both types of benefits (Social Security and SSI) also carry the requirement that the applicant be either a US citizen or an alien lawfully admitted under one of certain specific categories. The district office also processes and approves PASS (Plans for Achieving Self-Support). PASS allows people with disabilities to establish a working plan to become more self-sufficient.

The Department also has service staff located in some of South Carolina's 90 school districts and serves students with disabilities from its area offices in the other districts.

The Vocational Rehabilitation Evaluation Center is a multidisciplinary program for individuals with severe disabilities. This facility is a 30-bed residential facility that offers medical services (including a chronic pain program); occupational therapy; personal and social adjustment; and industrial rehabilitation, including work-hardening, psychological services, speech therapy and vocational evaluation. The Muscular Development Center offers aquatic, physical recreational and exercise therapies.



A spouse or child of a deceased active member may quality if all of the following requirements are met:
- the person has not reached age 21;
- the person was receiving assistance under the Program for the Handicapped at the time of the member's death; and
- the member died after Jan. 1, 1967, while eligible for hostile-fire pay or from a disease or illness incurred while eligible for such pay.

- Medicaid is a grant-in-aid program in which the federal and state governments share the cost of medical care for people in need who have low income. The rules for Medicaid coverage vary from state to state. A person who is eligible for Medicaid in South Carolina is not necessarily eligible for coverage in another state.
- A person applying for Medicaid as an SSI recipient must apply at the local Social Security office. Generally, an individual who is approved for SSI will automatically receive Medicaid. Applications for all other coverage groups are made at the county DSS office in the county in which the person lives.
- Individuals who are approved for Medicaid receive a Medicaid card at the beginning of each month. They must take the card with them when they receive medical services.
- If a person has private health insurance that pays for a medical service, the insurance is the primary payer. Medicaid does not pay for services that the private health insurance company is legally obligated to pay.

 Within limits, Medicaid will pay for services that are medically necessary.

Some services are limited by the number of visits during the fiscal year. (The fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30 of each year.) Medicaid may pay for the services listed: Mandatory

A person can have both Medicaid and Medicare. For a person who has both, Medicaid will pay the monthly Medicare premium, coinsurance and deductible plus other Medicaid services that are not covered by Medicare.

- People unable to get private health insurance coverage now have the opportunity through the SC Health Insurance Pool. The Pool was created by the General Assembly to help people who couldn't get health insurance coverage from any other source, including people with certain disabilities. Blue Cross and Blue Shield of South Carolina administers the Pool. Coverage is available to people who have been state residents for at least six months and meet the following criteria:
- they were turned down for private health insurance coverage for health reasons; or
- they were accepted for private health insurance, but have existing illnesses or conditions excluded from coverage, and have had these conditions for more than 12 months; or
- they are paying other health insurance premiums that are costlier than the premium levels established when the Pool was created. Other eligibility requirements may also apply. Pool benefits are comparable to many private insurance company plans. The Pool pays 80 percent of allowed charges for covered hospital inpatient and outpatient treatment, physician services and some

other medical care.

Persons covered by the Pool pay the remaining 20 percent and must meet a \$500 deductible each year, before Pool coverage begins to pay. Prescription drugs are covered at 50 percent after this deductible is met.

Monthly premiums are determined by the person's age and gender. There is no family coverage under the Pool. Each policy is for individual coverage.

As administrator, Blue Cross and Blue Shield processes claims, determines eligibility and handles all services required to operate the Pool.


There are two parts to the Medicare program. Hospital insurance (Part A) helps pay for inpatient hospital care, some inpatient care in a skilled nursing facility, home health care and hospice. Medical insurance (Part B) helps pay for doctor's services, outpatient hospital services and a number of other medical services and supplies.

Both types of coverage have amounts that must be paid out-of-pocket by the beneficiary (premiums, deductible, etc.). To apply for Medicare, contact the Social Security office.

Medicare is administered directly by the Health Care Financing Administration and contracted with private insurance agencies such as Blue Cross and Blue Shield.

Peace Hospital in Greenville, Medical University of South Carolina, as well as the two residential rehabilitation centers for substance abusers operated by the Vocational Rehabilitation Department.

This includes facilities and services in settings operated by the departments of Mental Health, Corrections and Juvenile Justice, the Workers' Compensation Program, Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School, Charleston VA Hospital, Roger C. Peace Rehabilitation Institute in Greenville, Medical University of South Carolina, as well as the two residential rehabilitation centers for substance abusers operated by the Vocational Rehabilitation Department. The Department also has service staff located in some of South Carolina's 90 school districts and serves students with disabilities from its area offices in the other districts.


The Vocational Rehabilitation Evaluation Center is a multidisciplinary program for individuals with severe disabilities. This facility is a 30-bed residential facility that offers medical services (including a chronic pain program); occupational therapy; personal and social adjustment; and industrial rehabilitation, including work-hardening, psychological services, speech therapy and vocational evaluation. The Muscular Development Center offers aquatic, physical recreational and exercise therapies.

Other programs include the Computer Training Program and the Rehabilitation Engineering Program. The Center for Rehabilitation Technology Services (CRTS) is a rehabilitation engineering center funded to develop service delivery models for assistance technology in the vocational rehabilitation process.
