ABSTRACT

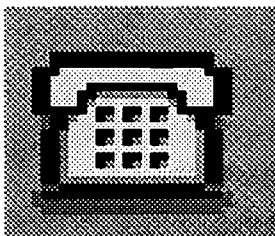
