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ABSTRACT

This KIDS COUNT report presents information on the status of Florida's children. This edition presents data in a format different from previous Florida Kids Count publications. In addition to the familiar format of individual county data on key indicators, users are provided with an overview of the state that allows for comparison among the 67 counties. Indicators are: (1) population; (2) child population; (3) poverty; (4) births; (5) births by age; (6) infant mortality; (7) child deaths; (8) death by age; (9) children of divorce; (10) maltreatment; (11) enrollment; (12) discipline; (13) education distribution; (14) non-promotion; (15) youths received (juvenile justice); (16) offense category. County profiles include information on early prenatal care and low birth weight, graduation rate, and number and percent eligible for free/reduced lunch. Data tables, terminology, and sources are appended. (EV)

*The Department of Community Mental Health* (CMH) focuses on developing, evaluating and strengthening community treatment programs for adults with severe emotional disorders. CMH designs and evaluates innovative treatment approaches and disseminates its finding through training, research and consultation. The department also operates the USF Center for HIV Education and Research to health care providers throughout Florida.

*The Department of Mental Health Law and Policy* (MHLP) develops new approaches to mental health and related services within the criminal and civil justice systems. MHLP examines the impact of law and mental health policy upon individuals with mental illness or substance abuse problems. Operating one of Florida's Children, Youth and Family Professional

Development Centers, MHLP provides specialized training for dependency/delinquency staff.

USF/FMHI is an official practicum and intern site for a growing number of university undergraduate and graduate programs. It also offers a predoctoral internship in clinical psychology and a multicultural training program to involve minority students in the mental health field.

Founded in 1956, USF opened its doors in 1960 to 2,000 students. Today the University serves over 36,000 students—with nearly 200 programs at the undergraduate, master's, speciality and doctoral levels, including the M.D. Created by Florida's state legislature in 1969 to help strengthen the state's mental health care services, FMHI became part of USF in 1984.

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## Introduction

This is the second edition of the Florida KIDS COUNT *Profile of Florida's Children Statewide and County Update*, but it is the first publication of the newly created Institute for the Study of Children's Futures. The Institute was created by the 1997 Legislature to provide a focal point for the identification of public and private data sources and the acquisition, analysis, and dissemination of available demographic and descriptive data on Florida's children. Legislative leaders, members of the Board of Regents and key legislative and executive branch staff envisioned the Institute as providing support for the ongoing development of a comprehensive array of child well-being indicators. These indicators serve as a tool for policy makers, government agencies, child advocates and concerned citizens in their work on behalf of children and families. Building on the foundation of the Florida KIDS COUNT project, the Institute will continue to make data available to help assess the impact of public policy decisions on the quality of life of our children by tracking measurable changes in critical indicators of economic, health, educational and legal status. The importance of using this growing body of knowledge to mobilize segments of the community not traditionally viewed as child advocates, such as small businesses, industry and commercial interests and municipal governments, was a key factor in motivating the leaders that created the Institute. Continuing to inform and educate Florida citizens about our children will be a primary focus of the Institute for the Study of Children's Futures.

This year's *Profile of Florida's Children Statewide and County Update* features a different presentation of data than has appeared in previous publications. In addition to the familiar format of individual county data on key indicators, users are provided with an overview of the state that allows for comparison among the 67 counties. These displays help highlight the great diversity of Florida and the unique challenges faced by policy makers in attempting to craft a statewide response to social reform efforts. As in the previous edition, the update again provides users of KIDS COUNT with indicator data which will fill in the gaps between editions of *Key Facts About the Children: The Florida KIDS COUNT Data Book*, published by the Florida Center for Children & Youth in partnership with the Institute for the Study of Children's Futures.

As is the case with all Florida KIDS COUNT publications, more detailed data and analysis is available on most of the indicators presented here. 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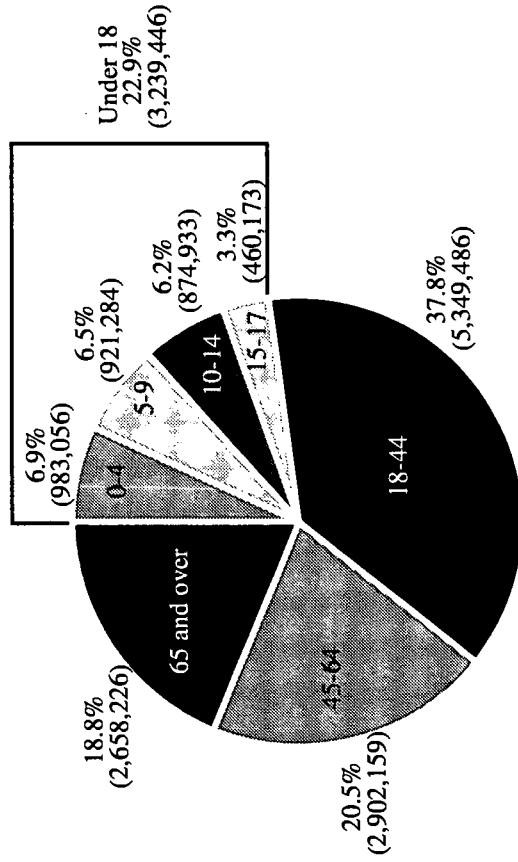

## Florida Population by Age, 1995



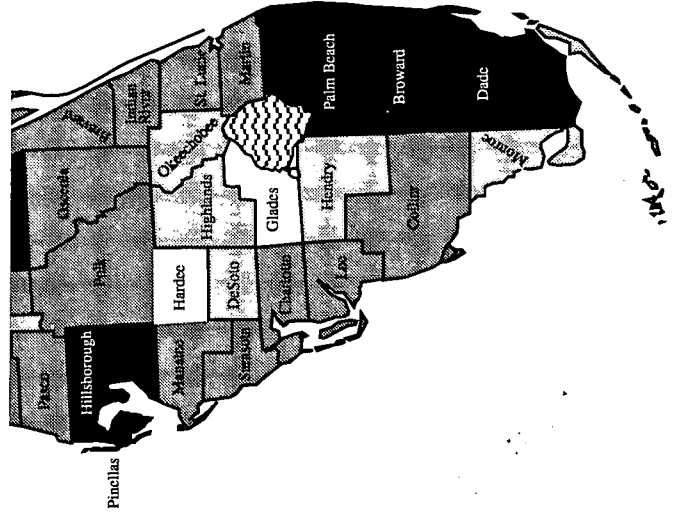
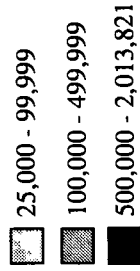
In 1995, there were 14,149,317 persons residing in Florida. This was an increase from 11,322,333 in 1985. The population increased 25 percent over the decade. There were 11,812,139 white and 2,337,461 nonwhite Floridians in 1995.

Seven counties represented over 50 percent of Florida's total population. Of all the counties in Florida, over half had less than 100,000 residents. The number of residents within each county ranged from 6,516 to over 2 million.

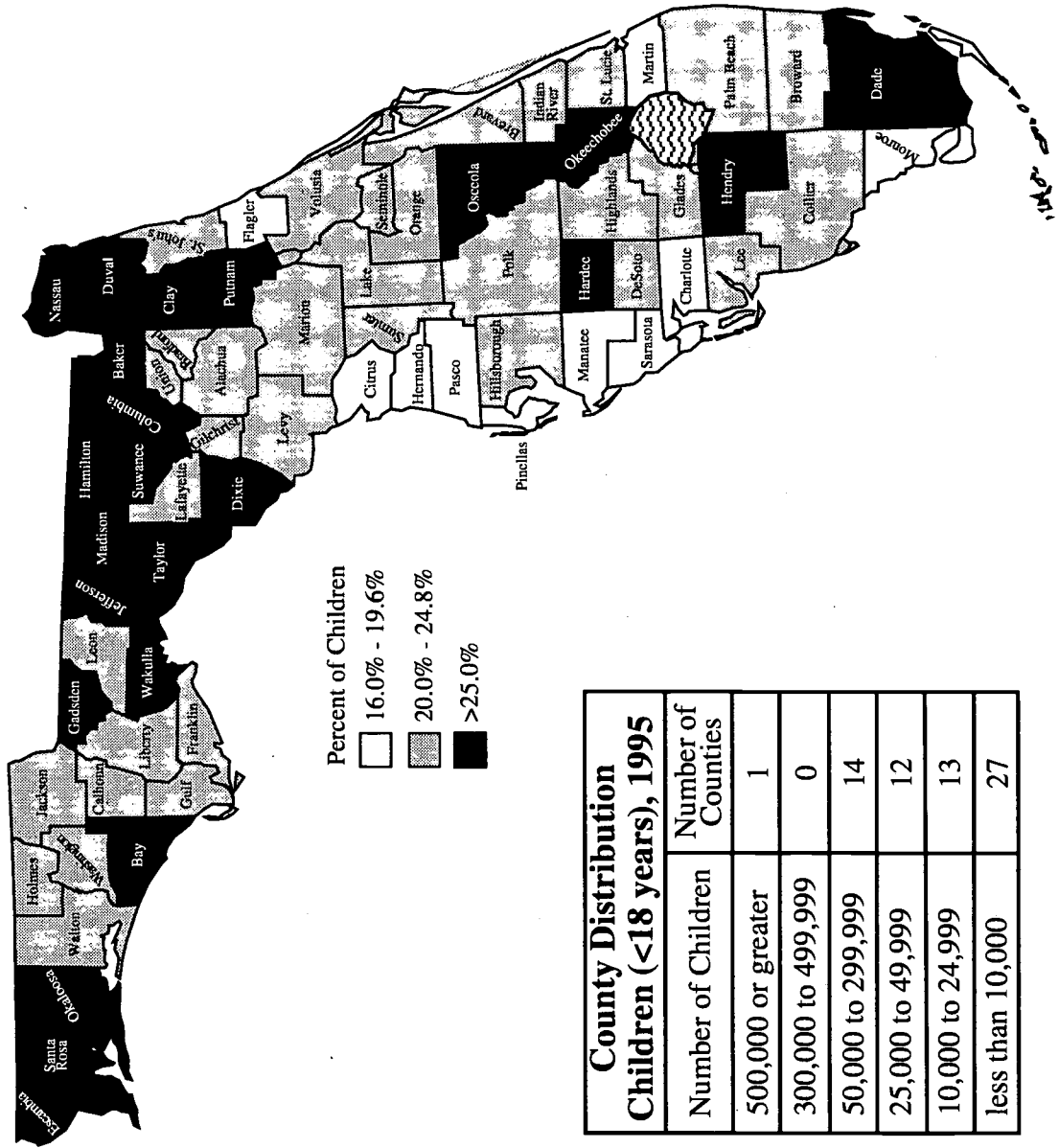


# Child Population

There were 3,239,446 children in Florida in 1995; children under 18 years of age represented 22.9 percent of the population across the state. The lowest percent of children to the total population within each county was 16 percent, while the highest was 32.5 percent.

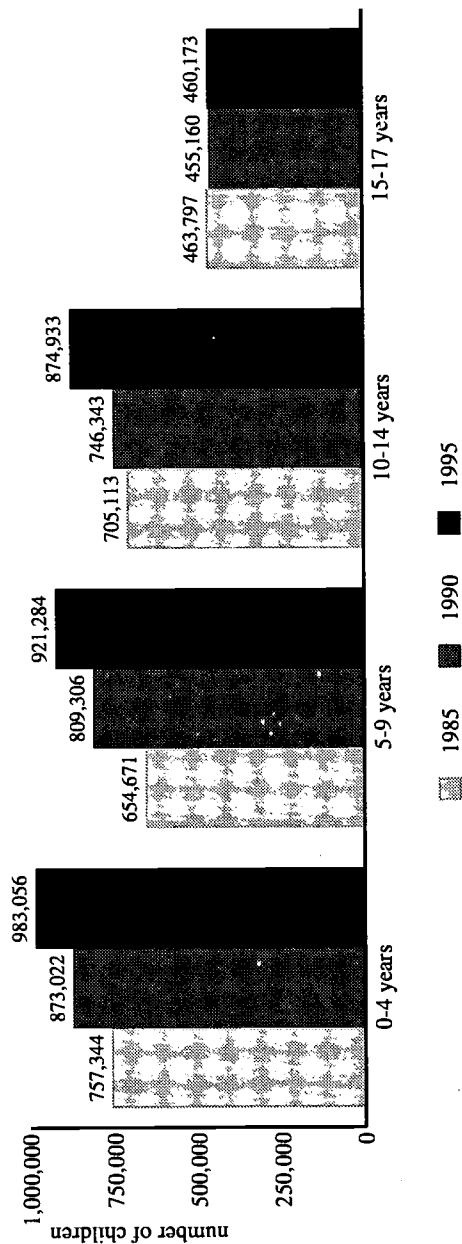
In 23 counties, more than 25 percent of the population was under 18 years of age. Over 75 percent of Florida's children lived in 16 counties. The number of children within each county ranged from 1,429 to slightly over 500,000.

There were 2,431,953 white and 807,493 nonwhite children under age 18 in Florida in 1995. There was a 25.5 percent increase in the population under age 18 over the decade. In 1985, there were 2,580,925 children under age 18; this figure rose to 2,883,831 by 1990. While the 5 to 9 year olds increased 40.7 percent from 1985 to 1995, the 15 to 17 year olds decreased 0.8 percent.

**Florida's Children by Age Categories, 1985, 1990, & 1995**



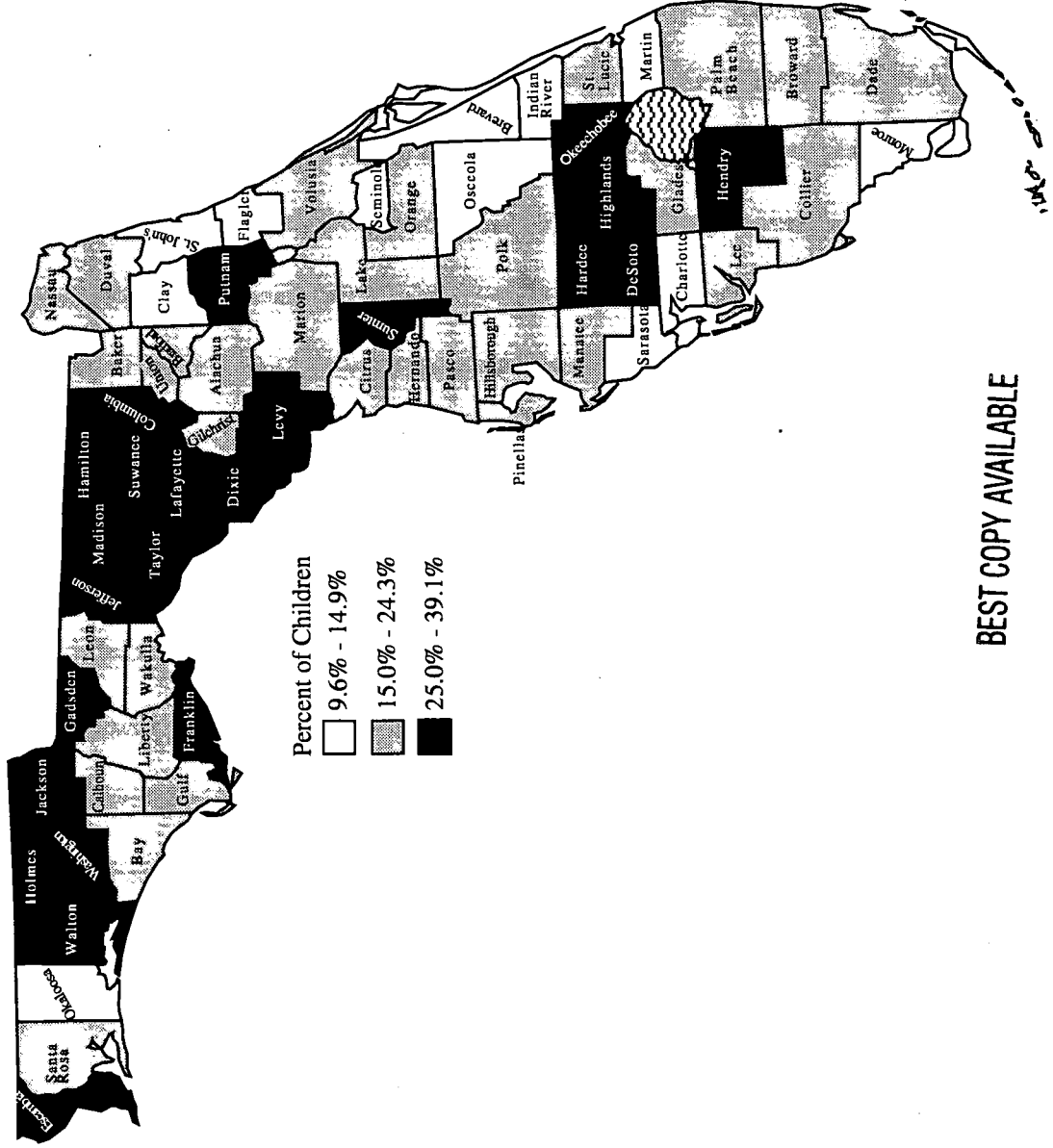
There were 525,446 (18.7 percent) Florida children under the age of 18 years living in poverty (1990 Census). Of these, over 200,000 were under the age of six. Among all of the State's children, there were 96,421 (12.9 percent) white, 94,753 (45.3 percent) African American and 32,460 (25.3 percent) Hispanic children under the age of six who lived in poverty.

Of Florida's 67 counties, only 11 had less than 1,000 children living in poverty. In 13 counties, over 30 percent of children under the age of 18 lived in poverty.

in Poverty in Each County, 1990 Census**



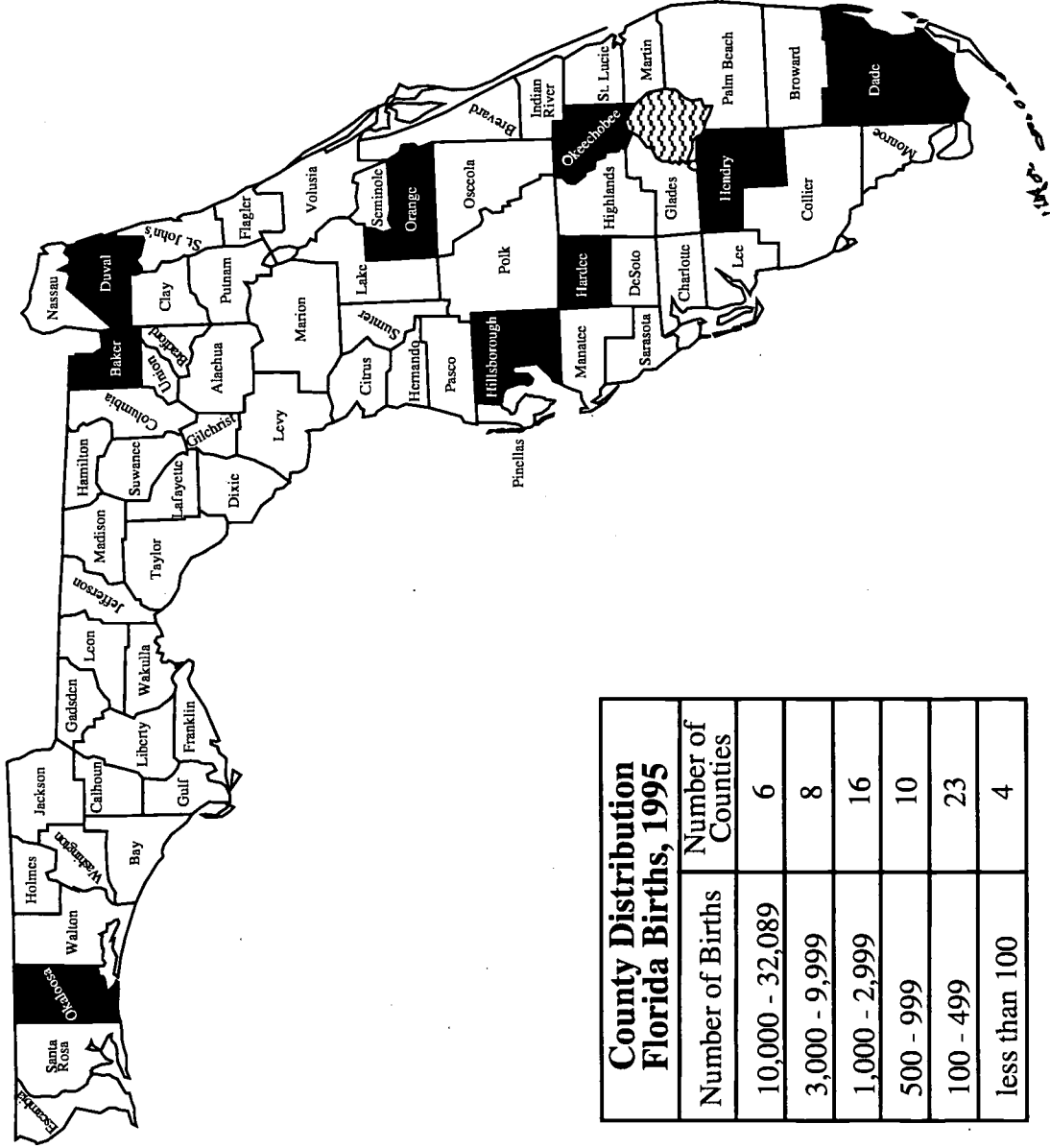

# Health And Well-Being Profile

## Florida Birth Rates 15.0 or Greater (per 1,000 residents), 1995



In 1995, there were 188,535 births in Florida. This represented an increase in number from 163,732 births in 1985. In contrast, this was a reduction of 10,611 births from 199,146 Florida births in 1990. There was, however, a slight decrease in birth rate from 14.4 (per 1,000 population) in 1985 to 13.3 in 1995. There were 141,848 births to white mothers and 46,555 births to nonwhite mothers in 1995.

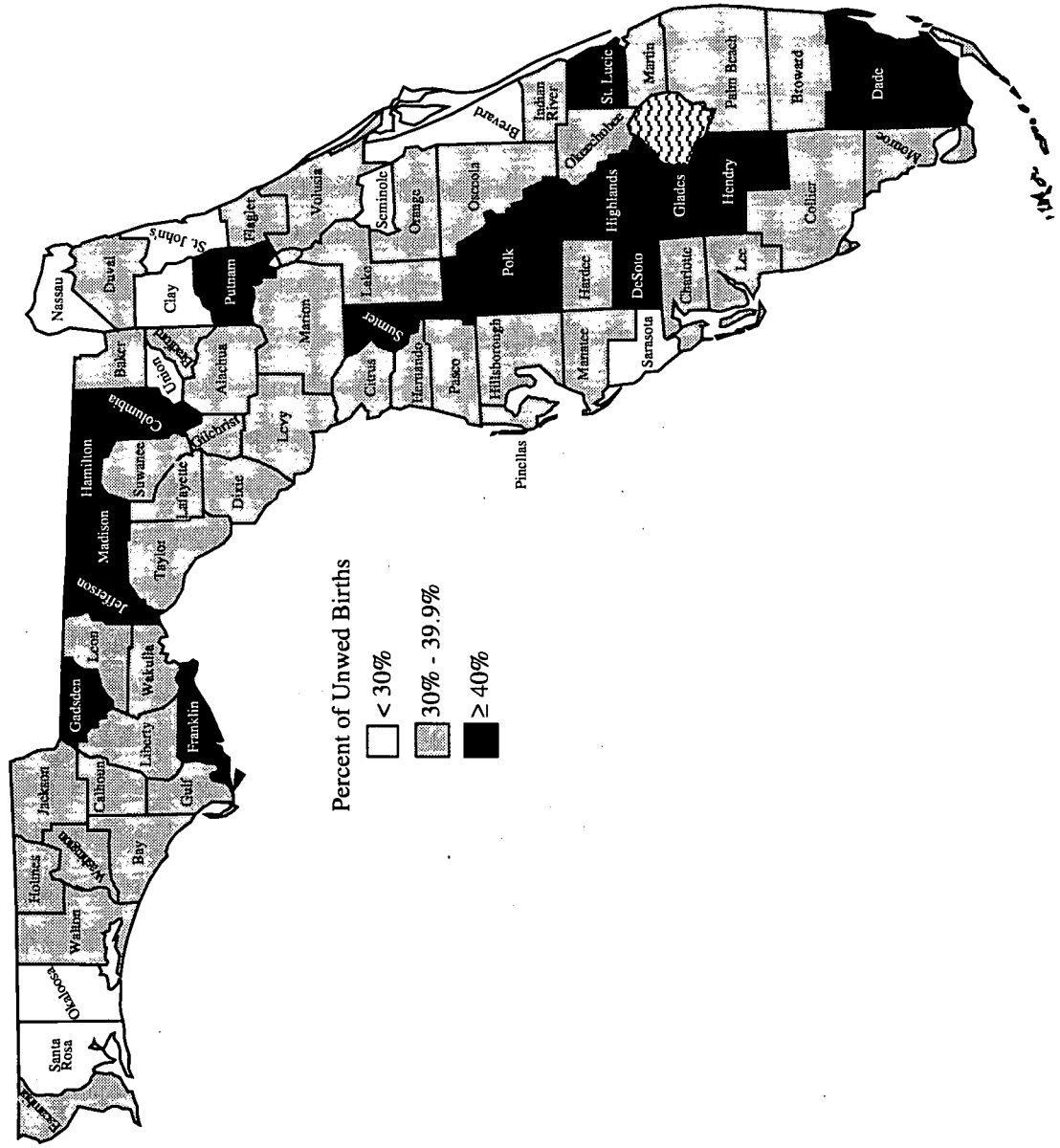
Although the majority (82.6 percent) of birth mothers in Florida received prenatal care during the first trimester of pregnancy, 32,540 (17.3 percent) did not. Despite improved access to medical care over the decade, in 1995, almost 2,000 mothers received no prenatal care. In 19 counties more than 20 percent of birth mothers did not receive care in the first trimester of pregnancy. Comparatively, in 1990, 72.5 percent of mothers received early prenatal care.

There were 14,505 births under 2,500 grams (5 lbs.8oz.) in Florida in 1995. Of all births that year, 7.7 percent were low birthweight. Only six counties had more than 10 percent low birthweight births. For the years 1985 and 1990, 7.5 and 7.4 percent of all births, respectively, were under 2,500 grams.

## Percent of Births to Unwed Mothers in Each Florida County, 1995

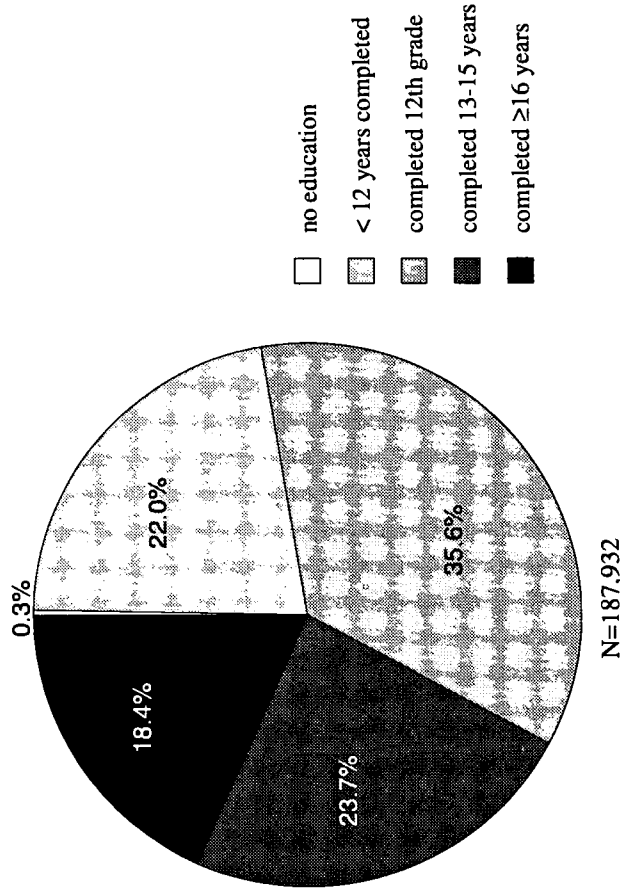


In 1995, 35.8 percent (67,422) of all births were to unmarried mothers; this was an increase from 26.2 percent in 1985 and 31.7 percent in 1990. Of all Florida births in 1995, 15.8 percent were to nonwhite unwed mothers and 20 percent were to white unwed mothers.

In 44 Florida counties, over one-third of babies born were to unwed mothers. In 15 counties, over 40 percent of babies were born to unwed mothers.

**Percent of Birth Mothers by Years of Education Completed, 1995**

There were 145,986 mothers, in 1995, who completed 12 years or more of education; this represented 77.7 percent of the birth mothers in Florida. In 18 counties, less than 70 percent of the mothers achieved 12 years of school.



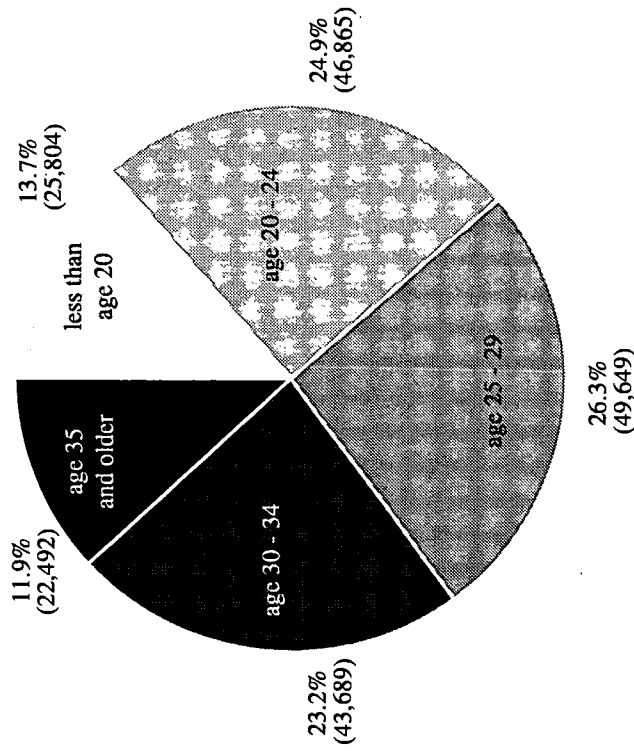

## Births by Age

In 1995, there were 25,804 births to mothers under the age of 20, representing 13.7 percent of all births in Florida. Births to mothers age 30 and older represented more than 35 percent of all births; this was an increase from 22.9 percent in 1985 and 28.9 percent in 1990.

Of all 188,535 Florida births in 1995, less than 11 percent were to unwed mothers age under 20; almost 25 percent were to unwed mothers age 20 and over. While the percent of births to unwed mothers under age 20 remained relatively stable over the decade, the percent of births to unwed mothers age 20 and older increased from 17.4 percent in 1985 and 21.7 percent in 1990.

### Births by Age of Mother, 1995





In 22 Florida counties, over one-fifth of the births were to mothers under 20 years of age. In only one county, less than 10 percent of the births were to mothers in this age group.

Of mothers age 15 to 19 years, 78.7 percent were unwed, 9.6 percent gave birth to infants under 2500 grams, 22.1 percent had one or more previous live births, and 6.4 percent had third trimester or no prenatal care in 1995.

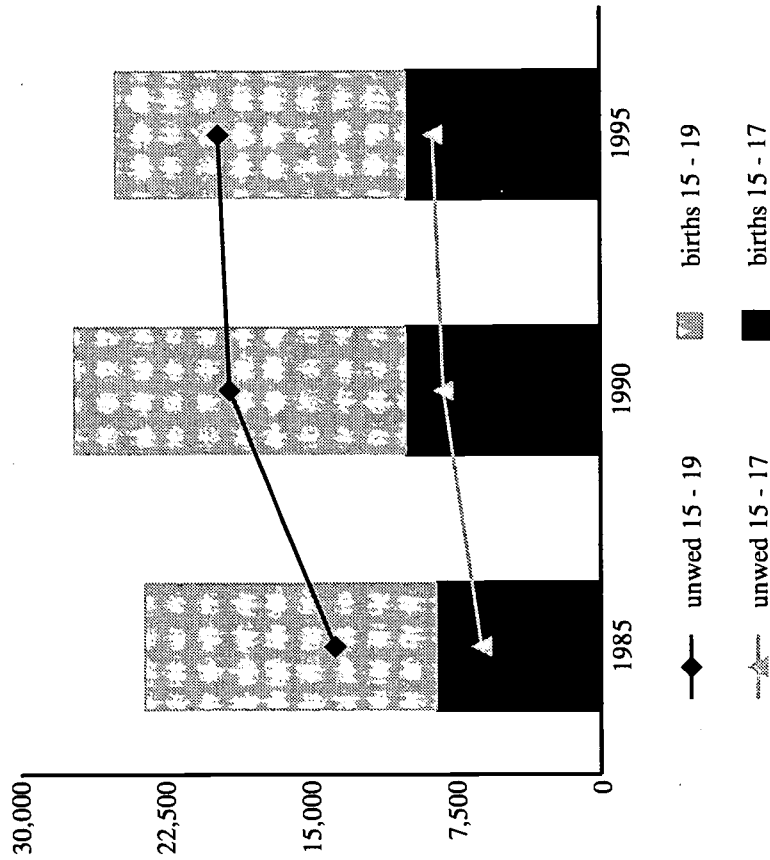

Florida's teen birth rate in 1995 was 44.4 per 1,000 female teens age 15 to 17 and 63.1 per 1,000 female teens age 15 to 19 years. Births to teens age 15 to 19 have remained relatively stable for the past decade, peaking in 1990 with 69.6 births per 1,000 females of the same age. In 1995, birth rates ranged from 15.6 to 97.9 per 1,000 females age 15 to 17 across the counties.

**Teen Births and Births to Unwed Teen Mothers, 1985, 1990, and 1995**



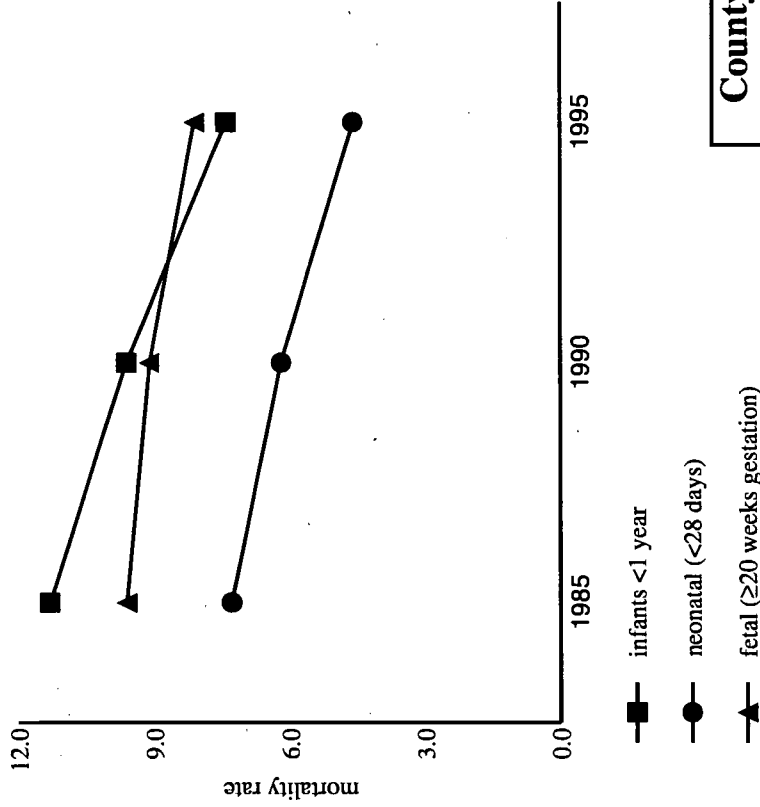

There were 1,402 infant deaths in Florida in 1995. The majority of these, 62.3 percent, occurred within 28 days of birth. There were 840 white infant deaths and 562 nonwhite infant deaths. The infant mortality rate declined to 7.4 per 1,000 live births in 1995, continuing the downward trend of the last decade.

Only four counties had more than 100 infant deaths (age under one year). Infant mortality rates were greater than 10 per 100 births in 18 counties, however, two of these counties had less than 100 births.

In 1995 778 children ages 1 to 14 died in Florida; 492 were white and 286 were nonwhite. A total of 349 of these deaths were children ages 1 to 4. Of these deaths, 162 were due to external causes, 37 were due to congenital anomalies, 31 were identified as human immunodeficiency virus, and 19 were from malignant neoplasms (cancer). In 1985 and in 1990 there were 392 and 394 deaths, respectively, to children 1 to 4 years old.

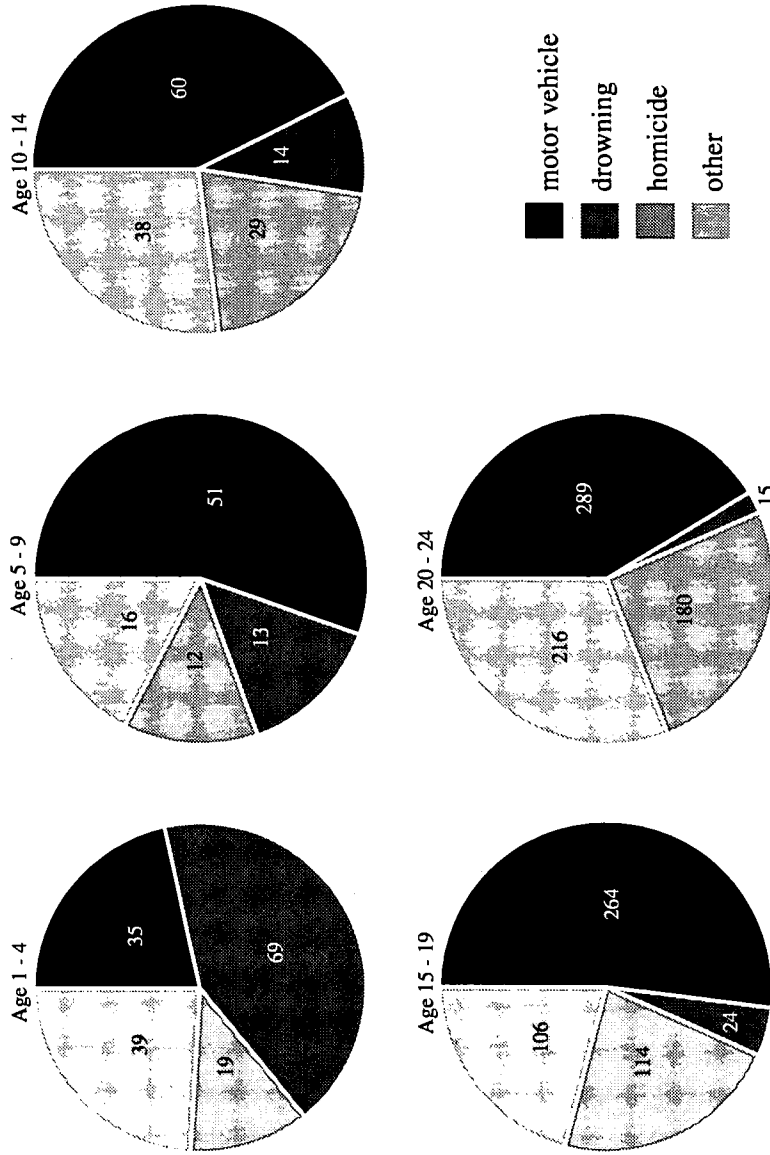

Violent deaths accounted for 505 (77.3 percent) of the 653 deaths of Florida teens age 15 to 19 years in 1995. Of these, there were 324 unintentional injuries (motor and non-motor vehicle accidents), 114 homicides, and 67 suicides. The teen violent death rate was 6.2 per 10,000 15 to 19 year olds in 1995 and 7.5 in 1990.

The rate of marriages and dissolutions (per 1,000 population) continued to decrease from 11.0 and 6.8 in 1985 to 10.2 and 5.5 in 1995. There were 78,416 dissolutions of marriage that affected 54,666 children under the age of 18 in 1995; there were 36,749 dissolutions that reported no children were affected. In 16 Florida counties, over 1,000 children were affected. And, there were 40 counties in which less than 500 children were reported as affected by divorce, illustrating the diversity of the State.

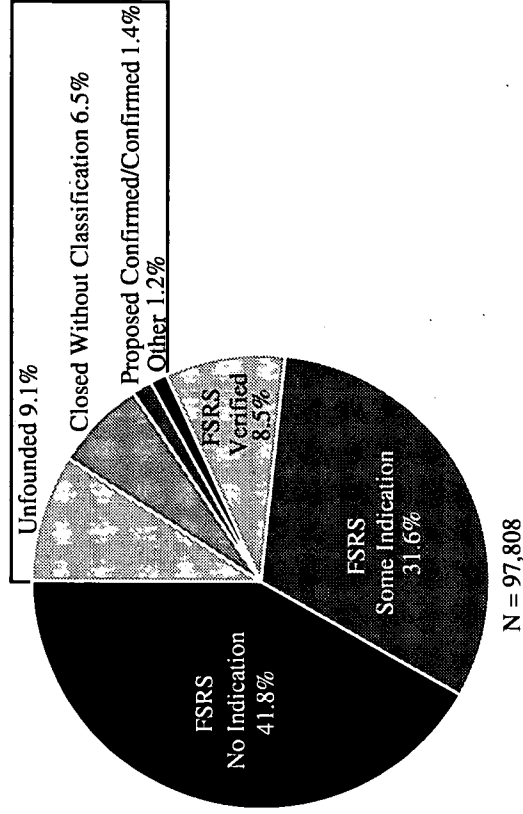

Of the 97,808 initial reports closed in 1995/96, 41.5 percent were closed with some indication or confirmation that a maltreatment occurred. As of October 1, 1995, all reports have been handled as Family Services Response System (FSRS) cases.

### Classification/Closure of Initial Reports Closed, 1995/96

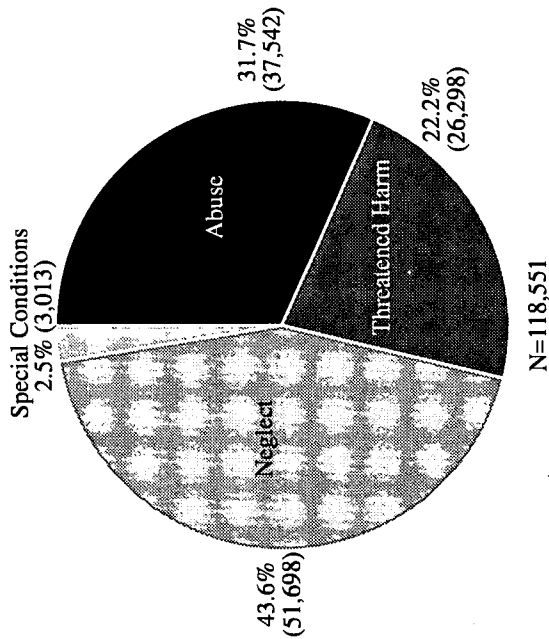




The number of reports of child abuse or neglect to protective services serves as another indicator of child safety and well-being. A report made to the protective services hotline indicates an alleged maltreatment of a child by a parent, adult household member, or persons responsible for the child's welfare.

In 1995/96, there were 312,671 alleged maltreatments of Florida's children; of these, 118,551 were closed as verified (or some indication) indicating that neglect, abuse or threat of harm took place.

**Verified and Some Indication Maltreatments of Victims in Reports Closed, 1995/96**

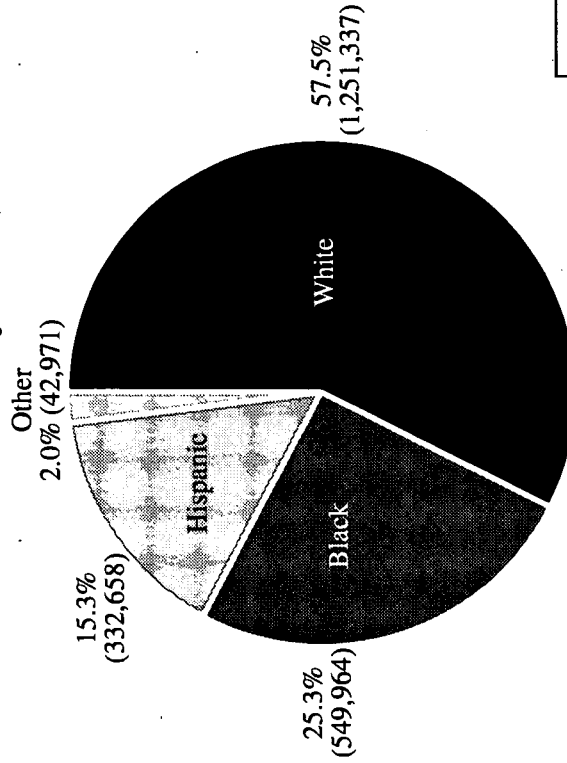

Total Enrollment = 2,176,930

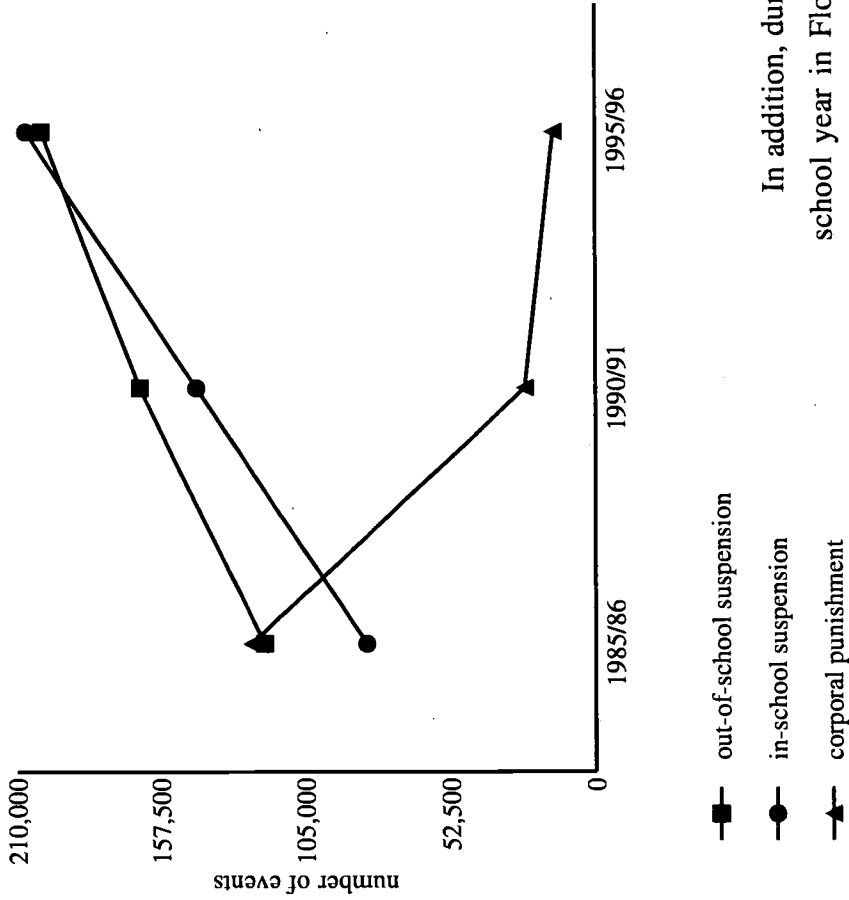
Over the decade, student enrollment in the public school system has increased by over one half million children. The Fall membership was 1,562,283 in 1985 and increased by 614,647 students in the Fall of 1995.

In 32 Florida counties, there were less than 10,000 students enrolled in public schools during the 1995/96 school year. However, there were 12 counties that had to provide for over 50,000 students.

# Discipline

**Disciplinary Actions, 1985/86, 1990/91, 1995/96**



There were dramatic changes in the number of disciplinary actions reported over the last 10 years. In 1995/96, Florida students received 206,548 in-school suspensions and 200,726 out-of-school suspensions. The number of students reported as dropouts decreased from over 40,000 in 1985/86 to 28,235 in 1995/96. However, the number of students served in dropout prevention programs for disciplinary reasons was 66,810 and for non-disciplinary reasons was 193,257.

In addition, during the 1995/96 school year in Florida, there were 369,788 memberships in exceptional student programs (83,576 gifted), 21,123 students reported as truant, 1,358 students expelled, and 1,152 students referred to courts or juvenile authorities.

# Education Distribution

In over half of Florida's counties, less than 75 percent of the student membership from four years earlier completed high school in 1995/96. The Florida graduation rate was 73.2 percent in 1995/96. This figure represented 103,413 graduates; of these, 89,242 students received a standard diploma.

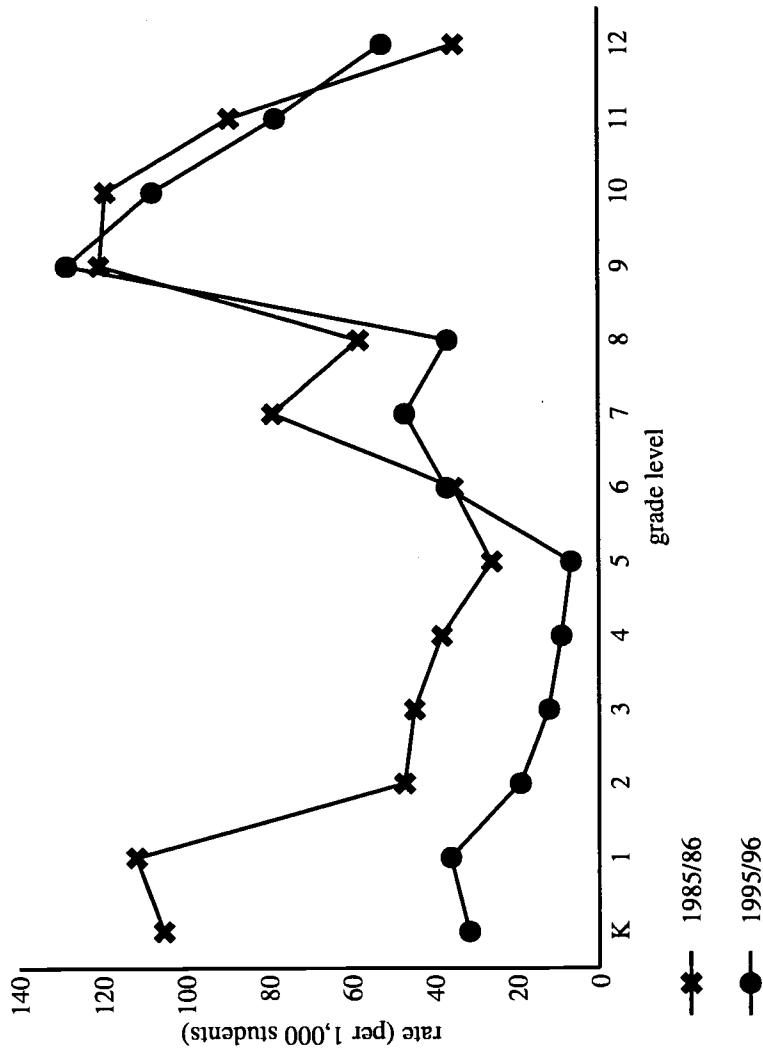

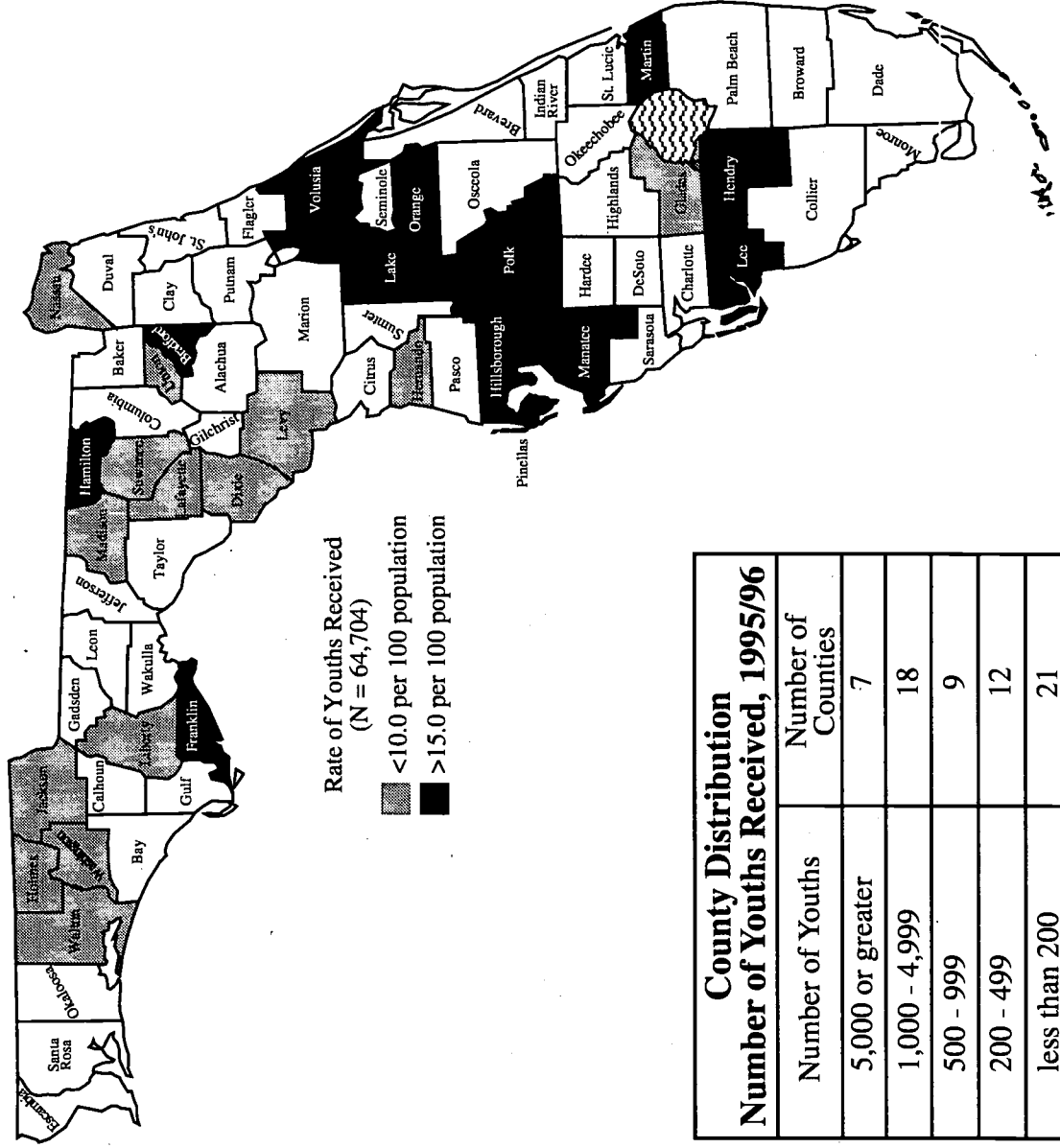
# Juvenile Justice Profile

## Youths Received

There were 105,370 youths referred for delinquency in Florida during the 1995/96 fiscal year; this was a 35.8 percent increase in number from 77,577 youths in 1990/91. Of these, 63,931 youths were white and 40,147 were African American. Comparatively, the number of delinquency cases received during 1995/96 totaled 171,101.

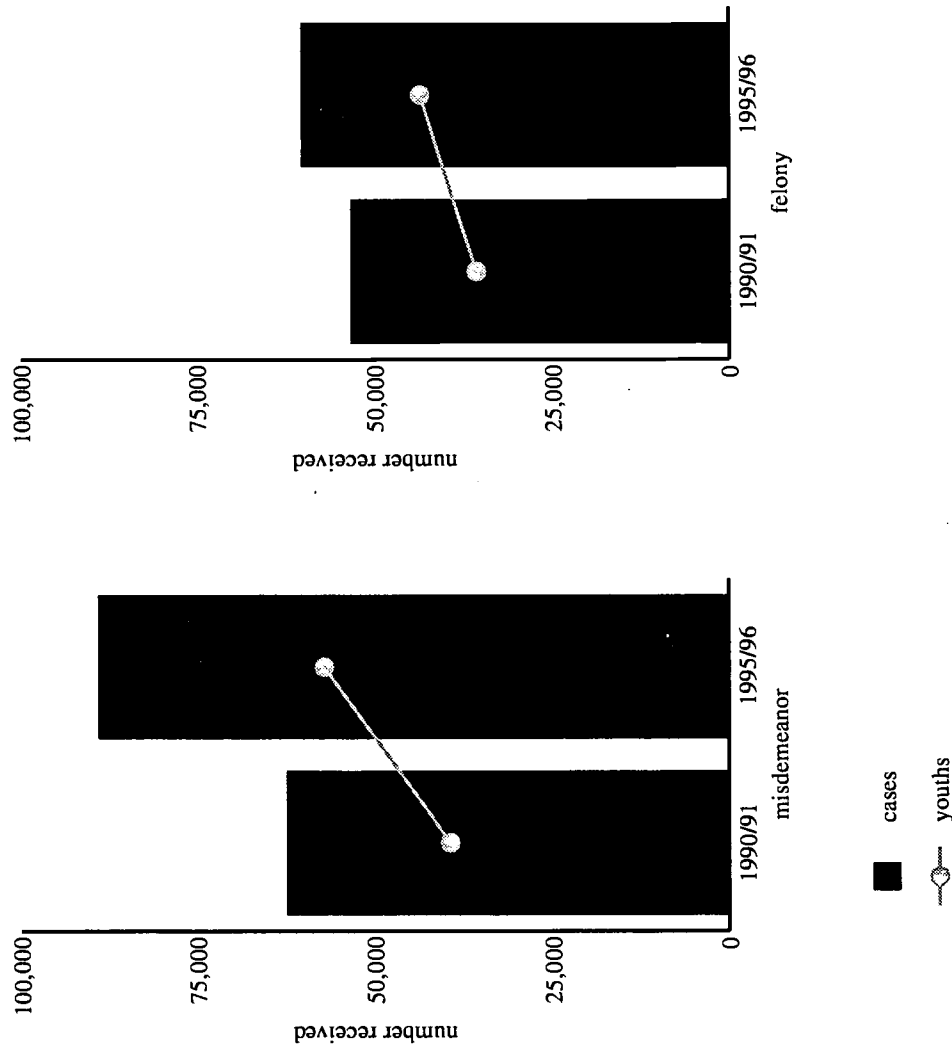
Although the number of teens may vary among Florida counties, 33 counties had less than 500 youths referred for delinquency, while 25 counties had more than 1,000 youths referred to the juvenile justice system.

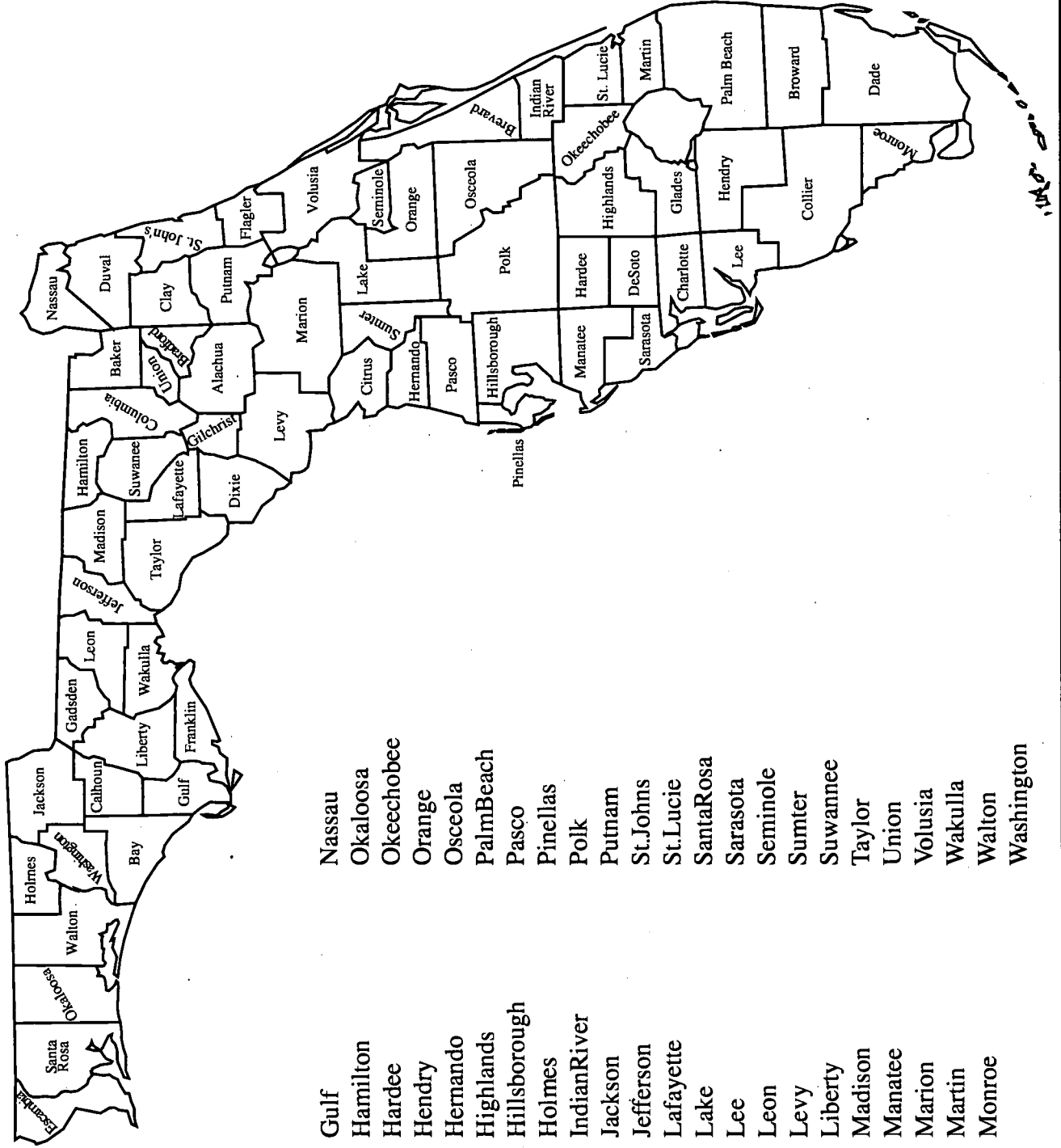
**Delinquency Cases Received and Youths Referred by Offense Category, 1990/91, 1995/96**



In 1995/96, there were 43,586 youth referrals for a felony offense and 56,999 referrals for a misdemeanor offense. Of the felony offenses, 15,172 were for burglary, 6,388 for aggravated assault, and 3,396 were for auto theft. Shoplifting was the most frequent misdemeanor offense cited, comprising 20,830 youth referrals.

Also, of the 171,101 delinquency cases received in 1995/96, slightly more than 60,000 cases were identified as a felony offense. In the same year, there were 19,658 cases received for burglary, representing over 30 percent of felony cases. There were 88,827 misdemeanor cases received; of these, 19,462 were for assault/battery and 26,925 cases were for shoplifting.

## Terminology and Sources

### Population & Economics

Total Population - the combination of the white and nonwhite population.

White - includes persons who indicated their race as "White" or reported entries on the U.S. Census, such as Canadian, German, Italian, Lebanese, Near Eastern, Arab, or Polish.

Nonwhite - includes persons who indicated their race as "Black or Negro" or reported entries on the U.S. Census, 1980 or

1990, such as African-American, Afro-American, Black Puerto Rican, Jamaican, Nigerian, West Indian, or Haitian; or persons who classified themselves as American Indian, Eskimo, Aleut; or persons who reported in one of the Asian or Pacific Islander groups; or those persons classified as "Other Race", including multiracial, multiethnic, or a Spanish/Hispanic origin group.

Poverty - the figures cover 1989, the year in which the U.S. Bureau of Census measured poverty. In 1989, a family of three was considered to be poor if its total income was less than \$9,885. A family of four was poor if its total income was less than \$12,675.

Children Living Below the Poverty Level - the data represent the number and percent of children in families with incomes below the U.S. poverty threshold, as defined by the U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1990. For data by race and ethnic group, children are defined as all persons younger than 18.

### Births, Deaths, and Child Well-Being

Vital Statistics - all data were reported by the parents' usual place of residence (regardless of where the birth occurred). The mother's residence is used when it differs from the father's residence. Race was counted as it was stated on birth and death certificates, with such designations as "Hispanic" counted as white. The race of the child was determined as follows: white, if both parents are white or if one is white and the other is unknown or not stated; nonwhite, in all other cases where the race of at least one parent is known; or unknown, only when the race of both parents is unknown or not stated. The 1995 data was based on the race of the mother.

Birth Rate - defined as the number of births per 1,000 resident population. Birth rates were obtained from Florida Vital Statistics. Midyear population estimates were furnished by the Office of Planning & Budgeting, Executive Office of the Governor.

Fertility Rates - the number of births to age specific females per 1,000 female population of the same race and age group.

Teen Births - the number of births to females under age 20.

Low Birth Weight - infants who weighed less than 2,500 grams (5 lbs.8 oz.) at birth.

Early Prenatal Care - births to mothers of all ages by race, and total who received prenatal care in the first three months of pregnancy.

Fetal Mortality Rate - number of fetal deaths, 20 weeks or more gestation, per 1,000 live births (fetal death ratio).

Neonatal Mortality Rate - the number of deaths to individuals less than 28 days of age per 1,000 live births.

Infant Mortality Rate - the number of deaths to individuals less than one year of age per 1,000 live births.

External Causes of Death - deaths due to unintentional injury, suicide, homicide and legal intervention.

Violent Teen Death Rate - the number of deaths from homicides, suicides, and accidents to teens 15 to 19 years old, per 10,000 teens of the same race and age group. Rates should be interpreted with caution in some counties due to low numbers of teens and deaths.

Initial Report - the initial report made to the hotline alleging maltreatment of a child by a parent, adult household member, or a person responsible for the child's welfare. An abuse report always requires the commencement of a new investigation.

Verified and Some Indication Maltreatment - the investigation determined that the specific injury or harm was the result of abuse, neglect, or threatened harm, or the investigation determined that there were some indicators that abuse, neglect, or threatened harm occurred.

Family Services Response System - a non-adversarial response to reports of child abuse and neglect, through a process of assessing the risk to the child and family and, when appropriate, delivering services to remove the risk to the child and support the integrity of the family.

Children Affected by Dissolution of Marriage - the minimum number of children under age 18 who were affected by the collective number of dissolution's of marriage. In Florida, there were 8,491 dissolution's of marriage with an unknown number of children and 36,749 with no minor children affected in 1995.

### Education

Total Enrollment - the number of students of any race or ethnicity enrolled in the Florida public school system. The student membership count is conducted in the Fall of each school year.

Hispanic - the Florida Department of Education has defined Hispanic as a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin regardless of race.

High School Competency Test (HSCT) - an untimed, multiple-choice test of a student's ability to apply basic mathematics and communication skills to real-world situations. It is administered to eleventh grade students and is a statewide graduation requirement. Data reflect the percent of eleventh grade students passing each section on the first attempt.

Disciplinary Actions - the number of disciplinary actions, including in-school suspensions, out-of-school suspensions, corporal punishments, expulsions and other alternative placements. More than one disciplinary action per student may have occurred during the year.

Non-Promotion - the retention of a public school student in the same grade rather than advancing the student to the next appropriate grade level.

Dropout - the number of students during the year who were age 16 or over and withdrew or voluntarily removed self from school before graduation for reasons including marriage, entrance into the military, failed HSCT, hardship, court action, expulsion, or pregnancy and did not receive any of the certificates of completion; did not meet the attendance requirements; did not transfer to any other school at any level (including vocational or adult) in or out of Florida; or, exceeded the maximum age for a disabled student in accordance with the district's policy.

Graduation Rate - the percentage is calculated by dividing the number of first time ninth graders into the number of students who receive, four years later, a high school diploma, a certificate of completion, a special certificate of completion, and students 19 years of age or younger who receive a general equivalency diploma.

## Terminology and Sources

### Education, continued

Free and Reduced School Lunch Program - the National School Lunch Program of the Child Nutrition Program is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and administered through the Florida Department of Education. Schools and Residential Child Care Institutions are eligible to participate in the programs if they are non-profit and serve children less than 21 years old. Eligibility is based on reported income. \*Percent is of the total number qualifying as eligible.

### Youth and the Law

Cases - if the same juvenile was referred, for example, for several offenses on the same date, these were counted as one case. If the youth was referred on another date for one or more charges, that would be counted as another case, always selecting the most serious offense for tracking purposes.

Youths - the measurement of Youths was developed to measure the number of delinquents in Florida rather than the number of times they get in trouble with the law. If the same youth is referred for several offenses during that year these would not be counted, using only the most serious offense charged during that period.

Received or Referred- the number of delinquency referrals reported to the Client Information System (CIS). The number of cases is counted by unduplicating the number of referrals reported received on the CIS by client identifier and the date the referral was received. The number of youths referred is determined by counting only the most serious offense for which a youth is charged during any fiscal year.

Reported Detentions - the number of delinquency cases or youths with a placement in detention during the interim between arrest and case disposition.

Transfers to Adult Court - the number of juvenile cases or youths reported on the CIS as having jurisdiction transferred for disposition in the state's adult courts. Transfers for processing in adult court can occur by direct filing of a bill of information by a state attorney, a waiver of jurisdiction by a juvenile court judge, or an indictment by a grand jury.

Rate of Youths Received - the number of delinquent youths received/referred, age 15-17, per 100 population of the same age group. Age specific population estimate data were updated July, 1997.
