ABSTRACT

Many adolescents need basic health care and other services that address risky behaviors such as sexual activity, violence, alcohol and other drug abuse, and the consequences of those behaviors. This publication summarizes approximately 200 child health-related laws and resolutions passed in the 50 states, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. This publication, third in a series of adolescent health summaries, includes a new section on violence prevention in schools. The state legislation reflects health problems that largely involve preventable behavior. Brief descriptions of laws are provided pertaining to the following topics: (1) abortion; (2) abstinence/sexuality education; (3) adolescent general health; (4) community health services; (5) HIV/AIDS and sexually transmitted diseases; (6) insurance and Medicaid; (7) mental health; (8) pregnancy/parenting and contraception/family planning; (9) school health/school-based health services; (10) substance abuse; (11) tobacco; and (12) violence prevention. Appendices include a state-by-state summary of 1992-1996 legislation, resource directory, and a list of state adolescent health coordinators/directors. (KB)

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PREFACE AND ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

Adolescent Health Issues: State Actions 1996 summarizes nearly 200 laws and resolutions on adolescent health issues passed in the 50 states, Puerto Rico, American Samoa and the U.S. Virgin Islands. This publication is third in a series of adolescent health summaries and includes a new section on violence prevention in schools. To avoid duplication, certain adolescent health issues, including juvenile justice and adolescents with developmental disabilities, are not summarized in this publication. Additional information on access and reform, injury prevention, insurance and managed care, Medicaid, preventive and primary care, providers, and adolescents with special health care needs appears in *Health Care Legislation 1996*. Information on child abuse and neglect, child care and early childhood education, child mental health, child support enforcement, child welfare, family law, juvenile justice, substance abuse and control, welfare reform and public assistance, and youth-at-risk appears in *1996 State Legislative Summary: Children, Youth and Family Issues*. Both reports are available from the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL).

Appendix A provides a list of adolescent health legislation from 1992 to 1996. The information contained in the appendix is compiled from this summary and the two previous legislative summaries completed by the Prevention Projects Program at NCSL. Appendix B lists a number of issue-related organizations for reference, and Appendix C provides a list of the adolescent health coordinators of the 50 states.

In 1996, legislative sessions were not held in Arkansas, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon and Texas; therefore, adolescent health legislation from these states is not contained in this document. Legislation passed in 1996 related to adolescent health was not identified in the District of Columbia, Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands.

The National Conference of State Legislatures is indebted to many state legislative staff who identified relevant legislation and sent copies of acts. In creating this publication, NCSL staff also relied heavily on legislative summaries produced by state and national research agencies, including State Net/Information for Public Affairs. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Many adolescents need basic health care and other services that address risky behaviors such as sexual activity, violence, alcohol and other substance abuse, and the consequences of those behaviors. During the 1996 legislative session, substance abuse, tobacco use and teen pregnancy prevention were the top adolescent health issues addressed by state legislatures.

Abortion

A 1994 report on abortion by the Alan Guttmacher Institute indicates that approximately one-third of teenage pregnancies end in abortion. During the 1996 session, five states enacted legislation on abortion. Nearly all the laws passed by states outline parental consent requirements for teens. **Arizona** passed a law prohibiting health care providers from performing an abortion on an unemancipated minor without parental consent. The Prospective Minor Parents Decision Making Program was established in **Iowa**. The program gives minors an opportunity to discuss pregnancy and adoption options and also requires parental consent for abortion. **Wisconsin** passed a law expanding the requirements for a minor to obtain consent for an abortion.

Abstinence/Sexuality Education

Abstinence is increasingly being considered by states and the federal government as a method of protecting adolescents from HIV, other sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) and teen pregnancy. Approximately \$50 million has been made available through section 510 of Title V (Maternal and Child Health Block Grant) of the Social Security Act created by recent welfare reform legislation, P.L. 104-193. This section provides funds to states for education programs that meet eight criteria, including having as "its exclusive purpose" the teaching of abstinence. A pilot program in **Nebraska** funds abstinence-based programs targeting youths aged 12 to 14 and includes a curriculum focused on postponing sexual activity.

According to the Center for AIDS Prevention Studies, sexuality education that focuses on helping teens change behaviors that can put them at risk for unintended pregnancy and STDs, including HIV/AIDS, have shown signs of success. **Florida** authorized school-based AIDS education incentive grants to encourage the prevention of teen pregnancy, HIV/AIDS and other STDs. A number of states passed laws to require parental consent before students can participate in sexuality education courses. In **Massachusetts**, schools must notify parents of a sexuality education curriculum before implementation, allow parents to review the instruction materials and allow parents to exempt their children from the curriculum. **Michigan** allocated funds for a comprehensive health education curriculum that is in accordance with the state's health education goals. It also allows for student and parental examination of the sexuality instruction materials.

Community Health Services

Community-based health centers often serve as resources to adolescents for their primary and preventive health care needs. At least seven states passed laws addressing community health concerns for teens. **Louisiana** passed a resolution requesting the Department of Social Services, Department of Education and

several other departments to collaborate and establish the Adolescent Health Initiative. The Initiative's goal is to improve the adolescent health delivery system in the state. **Massachusetts** includes adolescents in its new plan to create a system of comprehensive and coordinated services for the Cambridge area.

HIV/AIDS/STDs

AIDS is the sixth leading cause of death among youths aged 15 to 24, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). An estimated one-half of all new HIV infections occur among youth under age 25 and one-fourth of all new infections occur in youth under age 21. At least five states passed HIV/AIDS and STD legislation during the 1996 session. **Connecticut** enacted legislation to fund (depending on available appropriations) a program for children and youth who experience illness or death of a family member because of HIV disease. **Florida** authorized school-based AIDS education incentive grants for comprehensive health education.

The CDC reports that teens account for 25 percent of the 12 million new STDs each year. Adolescents and young adults are at greatest risk for acquiring an STD because they are likely to have multiple sex partners, engage in unprotected sex and participate in other risky behaviors like substance abuse. **Tennessee** enacted a resolution to commission a study and make recommendations on preventing several conditions among young women, including preventing STDs.

Insurance/Medicaid

Expansions of state Medicaid programs have made youths' eligibility more uniform among states. According to a 1993 Congressional Budget Office report, the gradual increase of children on Medicaid (those born after September 30, 1983), is projected to add approximately 5.3 million youths to state Medicaid rolls by the year 2005. In **Virginia**, legislation allows young women age 13 or older to see an obstetrician or gynecologist without prior referral. Three states—**Michigan**, **New Jersey** and **New Mexico**—passed laws providing Medicaid reimbursement to school districts for health services and encourage schools to seek reimbursement.

Mental Health

According to a 1995 report from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, approximately 1 million (4.8 percent) adolescents have received outpatient treatment for mental illness. Eleven states passed laws addressing mental health for youth. In **Kansas**, social and rehabilitation service institutions that treat minors can release or exchange records without consent of the minor or the parent in order to improve coordination and provide continuous care. Commissioners of mental health and mental retardation, social and rehabilitation services, and education in **Vermont** are required to submit a joint report on the status of programs for children and adolescents with severe emotional disturbances.

Pregnancy and Parenting

Every year, 1 million teenagers become pregnant. In 1996, at least 11 states passed legislation addressing teen pregnancy, parenting and contraception. **Louisiana** created a junior commission to advise its Perinatal Care and Prevention of Infant Mortality Commission on ways to reduce adolescent pregnancy. Four states passed statutory rape laws in an attempt to decrease teen pregnancies. **California** and **Georgia** made it illegal for adults or minors who are at least three years older to engage in sexual intercourse with minors. **Florida** prohibits sexual relations between adults who are 21 or older and minors under age 16. In

Tennessee health care professionals must report allegations of pregnant minors where the father is at least four years older but is not the spouse of the minor.

In **Colorado**, young parents must work to complete a high school diploma. **Iowa** minor parents who pay child support must attend parenting classes. As part of the welfare reform initiative, minor parents who receive public assistance in **West Virginia** must complete a GED and take parenting classes.

School Health/School-Based Health Services

Every school day, 46 million young people attend more than 100,000 schools across the United States. Because schools have sustained contact with such a large population, the CDC believes that schools potentially can have a positive effect on the nation's health. As of November 1996, 914 centers nationwide provided health services in schools, according to the national school-based health center group, Making the Grade. At least 18 states passed laws in 1996 relating to school health. **Virginia** requires its departments of medical assistance and education to examine the funding components of pilot school and community health centers. The two departments must develop ways to maximize health care for poor children and look at funding possibilities, including Medicaid reimbursement. **Louisiana** passed a resolution requesting that the governor not veto any school-based health center funding appropriated during the 1996 regular session. School nurses often play an important role in providing health services in schools with and without health centers. **New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Tennessee** and **Utah** enacted legislation ranging from hiring school nurses to administering medication to students.

Substance Abuse

According to the 1995 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, teen illicit drug use doubled between 1992 and 1995. The most significant increases were in the use of marijuana and hallucinogens among youth. Marijuana use rose from 1.4 million reported users in 1991 to 2.3 million in 1994. At least 36 states and Puerto Rico enacted youth substance abuse legislation during the 1996 session. States also moved to curb use of controlled substances on school campuses.

According to a 1995 CDC survey of 10,000 high school students, eight of 10 students surveyed have had at least one alcoholic drink in their lifetime. **Alabama, Indiana, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, New York, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania** and **Tennessee** passed "zero tolerance" legislation that prohibits minors from driving if they have a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of up to 0.02 percent. Youth offenders may be subject to immediate suspension of their driver's license. **Georgia** requires the state boards of education and public safety to develop an alcohol and drug course informing youth of the dangers of drinking and driving. In **Arizona, California** and **West Virginia**, adults who drive under the influence of alcohol or commit certain controlled substance offenses in the presence of a minor are subject to stiffer penalties. **Arizona, Connecticut, Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, New York** and **Pennsylvania** suspend minors' driver's licenses for illegal possession or consumption of alcohol. **Oklahoma** goes a step further and requires minors who have had their licenses revoked or suspended to attend a drug abuse course specifically for youth. Parents in **Oklahoma** can prevent the Department of Public Safety from issuing driver's permits to their minor children or can cancel the minor child's driving privileges.

The 1995 CDC survey also detailed student abuse of other substances, including marijuana, cocaine, steroids and inhalants. Four in 10 surveyed students had used marijuana during their lifetime and two in 10 students had used glue or other inhalants to get high at least once. **Delaware** requires that parents of

students who use drugs at school be notified. **Hawaii** and **Idaho** sanction students who use drugs and provide them with intervention and counseling services. **Illinois** prevents students expelled for drug possession from attending other schools until their disciplinary period ends. **Alabama** and **Illinois** allow schools to search for drugs, weapons, or other illegal or dangerous substances. In **Illinois** neither student consent nor a search warrant is required for a school search. In **Wisconsin**, local school boards with reasonable suspicion can require a chemical breath analysis from students they reasonably suspect have been drinking and can use the results in disciplinary proceedings.

Tobacco

Smoking rates for high school students are up dramatically, although adult smoking has declined over the past four years. Every day, according to the CDC, 3,000 young people begin smoking. In addition to smoking, some youths also use smokeless tobacco. Approximately 11 percent of 10,000 students polled by the CDC in 1995 reported using smokeless tobacco in the month before they were surveyed. Seventeen states enacted laws in 1996 that prevent youth access to tobacco. These laws address the placement of tobacco product vending machines, tobacco taxes for the prevention and reduction of tobacco use through education, sales of single cigarettes and the sale or distribution of cigarettes near school campuses. **Kentucky** passed a resolution opposing the federal regulation of cigarettes and urged the president to work with states to implement the federal Synar amendment as well as other state regulations to prevent underage smoking. **California, Delaware, Georgia, Hawaii** and **Virginia** passed laws prohibiting tobacco product sales to minors. **Oklahoma's** Prevention of Youth Access to Tobacco Act requires suspension of the driver's license of anyone who sells or distributes to minors if that person fails to pay the fine for the violation.

Violence Prevention

In 1995 the Maternal and Child Health Bureau cited homicide as the second leading cause of death for adolescents aged 15 to 19 and the third leading cause of death for adolescents aged 10 to 14. Violence in public schools is a growing problem. About 3 million crimes occur on or near school property each year and nearly one in four students has been a victim of violence. The concern is reflected in state legislation from 13 states and the U.S. Virgin Islands that enacted youth violence prevention legislation in 1996. **California, Delaware, Hawaii, Illinois, Oklahoma** and **Tennessee** passed laws to help keep kids safe in school. Three states—**Illinois, Missouri** and **Virginia**—authorize schools to expel those who use drugs, alcohol or weapons. **Alabama** and **Illinois** allow schools to search for weapons, illegal drugs or alcohol.

ABORTION

- AZ** 1996 Ariz. Sess. Laws, Chap. 90 prohibits anyone from knowingly performing an abortion on an unemancipated minor without written **consent from the minor's parent, guardian or conservator**. The act provides exceptions and penalties.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 1011 establishes a **Prospective Minor Parents Decision Making Program** for teens to discuss pregnancy and adoption options. The act includes requirements for **notifying the pregnant minor's parent prior to the performance of an abortion** on a minor. The act provides an **alternative notification method** for emergency abortions. The act also creates an advisory committee for the program. This act is amended by Chapter 1174, below.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 1174 removes **parental notification** requirements for adoption of a minor's child in Chapter 1011. Instead, the act requires that notice of the minor's parental rights termination hearing be given to a custodial parent or legal guardian.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 352, Sec. 1302 outlines criteria for state agencies that receive funds for adolescent health care services. These services include establishing a local advisory committee before planning an adolescent health care clinic intended to deliver services within the school district, prohibiting clinics from offering abortion **services or referrals** and developing a written policy on **parental consent** for clinic services.
- MS** 1996 Miss. Laws, Chap. 442 requires that abortion **facilities** that begin operation after June 30, 1996, not be **located** within 1,500 feet of a property on which any church, school or kindergarten is located.
- WI** 1996 Wis. Laws, Act 309 requires the voluntary informed **written consent** of a pregnant **minor and her parent**, or another specified adult, before performing abortion.

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ABSTINENCE/SEXUALITY EDUCATION

- AK** 1996 Alaska Sess. Laws, HCR 27 supports the continued use of the **Sugar Baby Project** in school districts throughout Alaska as a method to **promote abstinence** and help prevent unplanned teenage pregnancies.
- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 307 authorizes **school-based AIDS education incentive grants for comprehensive health education** and substance abuse prevention. Priority will be given to HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted disease and teenage pregnancy programs in the geographic area to be served.
- MA** 1996 Mass. Acts, Chap. 291 adopts a policy that ensures **notification**, in writing, **to parents about a curriculum** that primarily involves human sexual education or human sexuality issues before implementation and maintenance. The policy allows parents or guardians to inspect and review program instruction materials and allows parents to exempt their children from any portion of the curriculum by notifying the principal in writing. An exempted child will not be penalized for not participating in the class.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 352, Sec. 1038 requires the Community Health Department to maintain **comprehensive health care programs** to communicate to preteens the importance of **delaying sexual activity** and to address teen sexual activity and sexually transmitted diseases.
- NE** 1996 Neb. Laws, L.B. 849 creates a pilot program to which local communities can apply for money to **fund abstinence-based programs** to reduce teen pregnancy for boys and girls 12 to 14 years old. The act provides that the teen pregnancy pilot program be implemented in the same county where welfare reform is first implemented. The act also requires each program to include a **curriculum** focused on **postponing sexual activity**, and requires local organization, family involvement and a **media campaign** that encourages and supports young people in **postponing sexual activity**.
- The act requires the Department of Health, in consultation with the commissioner of education to plan, develop and make available a curriculum to be used in the pilot program.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 1045 opposes and does not permit the National Education Associations' **celebration of a Lesbian and Gay History Month**. The act also states that homosexuality, lesbianism and bisexuality should not be promoted in public schools.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, Chap. 400 permits a **pupil** 18 years of age or older **or a parent** or legal guardian of a pupil younger than 18, to request, in writing, permission to **examine the curriculum** program instruction materials **on AIDS**. A child may be exempted from the instruction and cannot be penalized academically for not attending.

ADOLESCENT HEALTH (MISCELLANEOUS)

- CT** 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 226 requires the Office of Policy Management to make 75 percent of its grants for the **neighborhood youth center program** providing on-site athletic or recreational programs to cities and nonprofit agencies. The programs must involve parents and youth and may offer mentoring, prevention and intervention services, job training and cultural opportunities for youth. The act requires evidence of collaboration and coordination with other children's service providers in the neighborhood as part of the selection criteria for grant applications.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 798 makes it unlawful for any person to **pierce the body**, with the exception of the ear lobes, of any person under the age of 18 without obtaining prior **written consent** from the minor's custodial parent or guardian. This act applies unless the person receives proper proof of majority or reasonably believes the minor to be 18 years of age or older.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, HCR 18 urges and requests that the departments of social services, education, public safety and corrections, and the Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice support and cooperate with the Department of Health and Hospitals and the Office of Public Health in establishing the **Adolescent Health Initiative** to **improve the health support service delivery system** currently administered for Louisiana adolescents.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 223 prohibits performing a **tattoo, brand or body-piercing** on an unemancipated minor without written **consent from** and in the presence of the minor's **parent** or legal guardian. The act also provides certain penalties.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 228 requires that before an unemancipated minor uses a **tanning device** in a tanning facility, they must show the owner a signed **consent statement by their parent** or legal guardian and must agree to use protective eyewear. The act requires **minors under the age of 14** to also be **accompanied** by a parent or legal guardian.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 304 allows a **noncustodial parent** to **access a minor's records** unless barred by a protective order. This information includes medical, dental, and school records and notification of meetings regarding the child's education.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 412, Sec. 4d and 4e adds **consent to medical care** to the circumstances under which minors can **apply for emancipation**.
- NY** 1996 N.Y. Laws, Chap. 16 updates safety requirements for **in-line skates** to include a **brake** on at least one skate. The act requires a manufacturer's warning to the consumer about the risk of injury. The act requires that skates without brakes for more experienced skaters be clearly labeled with a warning, and prohibits the retail sale or distribution of in-line skates that do not conform to these requirements. The act defers, retroactive to January 6, 1996, the effective date of restrictions on the manufacture and retail sales of such skates for one year until January 1, 1997.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, Chap. 163 requires that the physician who signs a death certificate of **anyone under the age of 18 report the death** to the state medical examiner's office within 24 hours of the death.
- TN** 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 1079 emphasizes family preservation and requires the newly created Department of Children's Services to strive to **ensure that health care needs**, both preventive and practical, **are met**. The act also provides for appropriate and effective behavioral and mental health treatment.

WI 1996 Wis. Laws, Act 169 permits **parents** or guardians of minors to **limit access** of the minor's treatment and patient health care **records** in specified circumstances.

COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES

- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, SR 5, HCR 24, and HR 28 requests that the Department of Education work in conjunction with the first representative district and community agencies in the area to develop **community-based youth programs**. The programs are designed to **promote leadership** building, team spirit, high **self-esteem** and reinforce **values** that result in positive contributions to the community.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 204 highlights the adolescent **pregnancy prevention** component of **community-based programs** that fund family planning services. The act requests that the Legislative Council establish a committee during the 1996 interim to evaluate the effectiveness of current and proposed adolescent pregnancy prevention programs.
- LA** 1996 La. The system would be committed to include the multicultural and multilingual composition and the needs of specific populations, including adolescents and people at high risk for health problems. Community health centers would be one of the partners to provide the needed services. The act also creates the Cambridge Public Health Commission.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 352, Sec. 1038 requires the **Community Health Department** to maintain comprehensive health care **programs to communicate** to preteens the importance of delaying sexual activity and to address teen sexual activity and **sexually transmitted diseases**.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 399, Sec. 1177 requires that each school administrator make a yearly report to the Director of Community Health on the **immunization** of each pupil in kindergarten through grade 12 who has enrolled in school for the first time.
- MN** 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 412 provides \$5 million for **after-school programs** in neighborhoods with especially high rates of poverty, teen pregnancy and juvenile crime. The act expands the current law to allow districts to pay for gang-resistance education and efforts such as the D.A.R.E program.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 781 requires that the Board of Health consider teen pregnancy rates, among other things, when developing a required **needs-based allocation formula** to calculate the local share of state funds to be appropriated.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 864 requires that the Department of Medical Assistance, in cooperation with the Department of Education, **examine the funding components of the pilot school/community health centers**. The act provides **guidelines for revisions** that must be designed to maximize access to health care for poor children, and to improve funding by making use of every possible cost-effective means, Medicaid reimbursement or program.

HIV/AIDS AND SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASES

- CT** 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 238, Sec. 24 annually funds, if appropriations are available, a program of **services for children and youth who experience illness or death of one or more family members due to HIV disease**. The act includes support groups, mental health services and transportation in the program. Eligibility is limited to poor children without insurance to cover these services. The act also provides for training and outreach to educate professionals who work with children affected by HIV/AIDS.
- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 307 authorizes school-based **AIDS education incentive grants** for comprehensive health education and substance abuse prevention. The act requires priority be given to HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted disease (STD) and teenage pregnancy programs in the geographic area to be served.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 352, Sec. 1038 requires the Community Health Department to maintain **comprehensive health care programs** to communicate to preteens the importance of delaying sexual activity and **to address teen sexual activity and STDs**.
- NH** 1996 N.H. Laws, Chap. 277 authorizes **school nurses to administer epinephrine** for the emergency treatment of anaphylaxis and sets forth the **duties of school nurses in the control and prevention of communicable diseases**. The act clarifies duties of school nurses with regard to physical examinations of students.
- PA** 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 15 creates the **Hepatitis B Prevention Act**. The act requires the Department of Health to establish a statewide **prevention program through immunization** as recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The act also requires placement of hepatitis B on the list of diseases that require immunization for school after August 1, 1997.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, Chap. 400 permits a **pupil 18 years of age or older or a parent or legal guardian of a pupil younger than age 18, to request, in writing, permission to examine the curriculum program instruction materials on AIDS**. A child may be exempted from the instruction and cannot not be penalized academically for not attending.
- TN** 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, HJR 431 requires further **study and recommendations** on women's health. The study will include the **high rate of suicide for young women and other mental health needs, HIV/AIDS, prevention of STDs and addictive disorders**.

INSURANCE AND MEDICAID

- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 197 establishes a three-year **State-Only Family Planning Program** under the **Medi-Cal Program**. The program will provide family planning services, as described, to all persons with family incomes at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level, who have no other health care coverage, except as described, and who are not otherwise eligible for Medi-Cal services without a share of cost.
- CT 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 187 moves back the date—from July 1, 1995, to December 31, 1994—on which a child, age birth to 17 years, must have been enrolled in the **Healthy Steps Program** to be included in an extension of the **subsidized health insurance**. Moving back the enrollment date reinstates coverage for eligible children whose coverage expired between December 31, 1994, and July 1, 1995.
- CT 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 238, Sec. 24 annually funds, if appropriations are available, a program of **services for children and youth who experience illness or death of one or more family members** due to HIV disease. The act includes support groups, mental health services and transportation in the program and limits eligibility to poor children without insurance to cover these services. The act also provides for training and outreach to educate professionals who work with children affected by HIV/AIDS.
- MA 1996 Mass. Acts, Chap. 203 allows MassHealth to provide **programs to adolescents** aged 13 through 18 whose determined financial eligibility does not exceed 133 percent of the federal poverty level and who would not otherwise qualify for **Medicaid** within the definition of traditional beneficiaries.
- MI 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 352, Sec. 1651 authorizes the Department of Community Health to pursue **reimbursement for eligible services provided in Michigan schools** from the federal **Medigrant** programs. The act allows the Department of Community Health and the Department of Management and Budget to negotiate agreements with the Department of Education and with school districts regarding the sharing of federal Medigrant service funds received for the services. The act also allows the Community Health Department to receive and disburse funds to participating school districts.
- MI 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 352, Sec. 1302 outlines criteria for state agencies that receive funds for adolescent health care services. These include establishing a local advisory committee before planning an **adolescent health care clinic** intended to deliver services within the school district, prohibiting clinics from offering abortion services or referrals and developing a written policy on parental consent for clinic services.
- MN 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 451 prohibits **Medicaid reimbursement for personal care services** if the personal care assistant is the spouse or legal guardian of the recipient or the parent of a recipient under age 18.
- NE 1996 Neb. Laws, L.B. 1344 provides that anyone between 17 and 19 years of age who **leaves home voluntarily, is no longer considered a minor**.

- NJ **1996 N.J. Laws, Chap. 42** provides for each local **school district** that **participates in the Special Education Medicaid Initiative** to receive a **percentage of the federal revenue** the district's participation yields for current year claims.

- NM **1996 N.M. Laws, HJM 2** requests the Department of Education to encourage all **public school districts** to become eligible **Medicaid providers**. The department is also required to provide a district-by-district assessment of the reasons public school districts are unable to become eligible providers under the state Medicaid program.

- VA **1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 864** requires the Board of Health to consider teen pregnancy rates, among other things, when developing a required needs-based allocation formula to calculate the **local share of state funds** to be appropriated.

- VA **1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 864** requires the Department of Medical Assistance, in cooperation with the Department of Education, to **examine the funding** components of the **pilot school/community health centers**. The act provides **guidelines for revisions** that must be designed to maximize access to health care for poor children, and to improve the funding by making use of every **possible cost-effective means, Medicaid reimbursement or program**.

- VA **1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 967** requires health insurers providing obstetrical and gynecological services under their policies or plans to permit females, age 13 or older, to have **direct access to obstetricians and gynecologists without the necessity of prior referral**.

MENTAL HEALTH

- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 654 establishes **procedures** governing the **referral** of children with disabilities to county mental health departments. The act specifies that, beginning July 1, 1997, counties shall be responsible for **placement costs** currently paid by school districts for children placed in other states. The act also creates a State Mandates Claim Fund that can reimburse local agencies and school districts if the bill contains costs mandated by the state.
- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 733 authorizes an Assessment, Orientation, and Volunteer **Mentor Pilot Program** in San Diego County. The act provides screening, drug and alcohol education, intervention, and assistance from volunteer mentors for minors who are wards of the court because of certain drug or alcohol violations. The act also requires an evaluation of the pilot program and submission of the results to the Legislature and to state alcohol and drug programs.
- CT 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 155, Sec. 1, **subdivision 34** proclaims the second Wednesday of February as **Youth to Work Day** so adults can provide youth with exposure to the workplace.
- CT 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 238, Sec. 15 includes **deaf and hearing impaired** children who are mentally ill in the Department of Public Health's comprehensive and integrated state-wide program for children and youth whose behavior does not conform to the law or to acceptable community standards or who are mentally ill. The act also adds children with complicated or multiple disabilities to the comprehensive mental health plan required as part of the department's five-year master plan.
- DE Vol. 70 Del. Laws, HR 18 declares April 27 as "**Take Your Child to Work Day.**"
- HI 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, SR 5, HCR 24, and HR 28 requests the Department of Education to work in conjunction with the first representative district and community agencies in the area to develop **community-based youth programs**. The programs are designed to **promote leadership** building, team spirit, high **self-esteem** and reinforce **values** that result in positive contributions to the community.
- HI 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 125 assigns to the Department of Health the responsibility for the **coordination** of mental health services for children and adolescents.
- ID 1996 Idaho Sess. Laws, Chap. 377 limits a teacher's or school district's **duty to warn** of a **student's suicidal tendencies** or of the possible injury of a student by another student.
- IN 1996 Ind. Acts, SCR 39 honors the unselfish efforts of those who **encourage youth** in Indianapolis to become the leaders of tomorrow.
- KS 1996 Kan. Sess. Laws, Chap. 60 allows social and rehabilitation service institutions treating minors to **release records** or exchange information **without a patient's or parent's consent** in order to provide continuity of care.
- TN 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, HJR 431 requires further **study and recommendations** on women's health. The study will include the high rate of **suicide** for young women and other mental health needs, HIV/AIDS, prevention of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) and addictive disorders.
- TN 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 1079 emphasizes family preservation and requires the newly created Department of Children's Services to ensure that health care needs, both preventive and practical, are met and to **provide appropriate and effective** behavioral and mental health **treatment**.

Mental Health

- UT** **1996 Utah Laws, Chap. 234** relates to **commitment and treatment** of children under age 18 in the mental health system. The act provides due process commitment proceedings and rules.
- VT** **1996 Vt. Acts, Act 137** requires the commissioners of mental health and mental retardation, social and rehabilitation services, and education to jointly submit a **report** to the legislature with the general appropriations bill on the **status of programs** for children and adolescents with severe emotional disturbances and their families.
- WA** **1996 Wash. Laws, Chap. 133 Sec. 5-6, 34** outlines **parental consent** requirements for minor chemical dependency and mental health **treatment**. The act also requires school districts to notify a minor's parents for certain mental health and chemical dependency treatment services.

PREGNANCY/PARENTING AND CONTRACEPTION/FAMILY PLANNING

- AK 1996 Alaska Sess. Laws, HCR 27 supports the continued use of the **Sugar Baby Project** in school districts throughout Alaska as a method to promote abstinence and help **prevent unplanned teenage pregnancies**.
- AK 1996 Alaska Sess. Laws, Chap. 70 requires **minors** receiving **AFDC assistance** to **reside with a parent**, legal guardian or other adult relative. The act provides for exceptions.
- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., SCR 48 designates April 1996 as **Unwed Teenage Pregnancy Prevention Month**.
- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 197 establishes a **three-year State-Only Family Planning Program under the Medi-Cal Program**. The program will provide family planning services, as described, to all those with family incomes at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level, who have no other health care coverage, except as described, and who are not otherwise eligible for Medi-Cal services without a share of cost.
- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 789 imposes penalties for any **minor** or adult who engages in **unlawful sexual intercourse** with a minor who is not a spouse and who is at least three years younger than the offender.
- CO 1996 Colo. Sess. Laws, Chap. 216 requires **JOBS program participants** who are parents under 20 years of age to participate in **educational activities** directed at the attainment of a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- DE Vol. 70 Del. Laws, Chap. 600 increases penalties for **statutory rape** when an adult is 10 or more years older than a minor under age 14. If the unlawful sexual intercourse results in the birth of a child, the adult must pay any child support ordered by the Family Court. The act requires the attorney general's office and other departments to work together to enforce laws governing unlawful sexual intercourse with minors and to report to the governor and the General Assembly on enforcement efforts.
- FL 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 215 makes a level 7 felony the **impregnation of a child** under 16 years of age **by anyone over 21 years of age**. Neither the victim's lack of chastity nor the victim's consent can be used as a defense. The act requires immediate notification to the county sheriff or other appropriate law enforcement agency in certain circumstances.
- FL 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 307 authorizes **school-based AIDS education incentive grants for comprehensive health education** and substance abuse prevention. Priority will be given to HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted disease and teenage pregnancy programs in the geographic area to be served.
- FL 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 402 establishes the Commission on **Responsible Fatherhood**. The act outlines purpose, principles and responsibilities.
- FL 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 409 defines **statutory rape** offenses and provides criminal penalties. The act provides increased penalties for commission of sexual intercourse with a person who is 15 years of age or younger by a person 18 years of age or older and increased penalties when the victim was

under the influence of alcohol or any specified substances. The act also creates the **Teen Pregnancy Prevention Act of 1996**.

- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, HR 9163 and SR 3090 declares April 23 through May 1, 1996, as **Teen Pregnancy Prevention Awareness Week**.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 876, Sec. 3 provides for separate penalties for those over 21 and for minors who commit **statutory rape**. The act makes it a misdemeanor for a minor who commits this crime, provided he is not more than three years older than a victim of 14 or 15 years of age.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, SR 83 requests the Department of Health to consult with the State Council on Developmental Disabilities, the Protection and Advocacy Agency, the Hawaii Chapter of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology, the Reproductive Rights Protection Committee, the Hawaii Health Care Association, the judiciary, and the Hawaii Medical Association to develop **standards and procedures** to govern decisions to **sterilize incapacitated minors**.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 109, Sec. 18 requires minor parents ordered to pay child support to attend **parenting classes** approved either by the Department of Human Services or by the court.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 204, Sec. 41-47 highlights the adolescent pregnancy prevention component of **community-based programs that fund family planning services**. The act requests the Legislative Council to establish a committee during the 1996 interim to evaluate the **effectiveness** of current and proposed adolescent pregnancy prevention programs.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 1011 establishes a **Prospective Minor Parents Decision Making Program** to discuss **pregnancy and adoption options**. The act includes requirements relating to notification of a pregnant minor's parent before the performance of an abortion on a minor. The act requires physicians to provide prior written notification to the pregnant minor's parent before performing an emergency abortion or within 12 hours following the abortion except under specified conditions. The act also creates an advisory committee. This act is amended by Chapter 1174, below.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 1174 removes parental **notification requirements for adoption** of a minor's child in Chapter 1011. The act instead requires that notice of the minor's parental rights termination hearing be given to a custodial parent or legal guardian.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, SCR 23 requests the Commission on Perinatal Care and Prevention of Infant Mortality to create a "**Junior Commission**" to advise the commission on ways to **reduce** adolescent pregnancy.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 352, Sec. 1038 requires the Community Health Department to **maintain comprehensive health care programs** to communicate to preteens the importance of delaying sexual activity and to **address teen sexual activity** and sexually transmitted diseases.
- MN** 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 412 provides \$5 million for **after-school programs** in neighborhoods with especially high rates of poverty, teen pregnancy and juvenile crime.
- NE** 1996 Neb. Laws, L.B. 849 creates a pilot program to which local communities can apply for money to fund **abstinence-based programs** to reduce teen pregnancy for boys and girls 12 to 14 years old. The act provides that the teen pregnancy pilot program be implemented in the same county that welfare reform is first implemented. The act also requires each program to include a **curriculum** focused on **postponing sexual activity** and requires local organizations and family involvement and a **media campaign that encourages and supports** young people in **postponing sexual activity**.
- The Department of Health, in consultation with the commissioner of education shall plan, develop and make available a curriculum to be used in the pilot program.
- NY** 1996 N.Y. Laws, Chap. 974 appropriates \$7.7 million to the Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention and Services Act to provide grants to **community-based programs** aimed at preventing teenage pregnancy and improving the delivery of comprehensive **services to at-risk, pregnant and parenting adolescents** in areas that have high rates of teenage pregnancy and infant mortality.

- PA 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 35 specifies **residence requirements** for minor parents who receive AFDC.
- PA 1996 Pa. Laws, SR 103 recognizes the week of March 18 through March 24, 1996, as **Teen Pregnancy Prevention Week**.
- TN 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 842 requires that a written report be made to the appropriate authorities if, during treatment or examination of a **child** who is at least 13 but **less than 18** years of age, it is determined she is **pregnant** and the **father** is at least four years older but is **not the legal spouse**.
- UT 1996 Utah Laws, Chap. 185 requires **information on adoption** to be presented in special public schools for students who are pregnant or who are parenting.
- VA 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 781 requires the Board of Health to consider teen pregnancy rates, among other things, when developing a required **needs-based allocation formula** to calculate the **local share of state funds** to be appropriated.
- WV 1996 W. Va. Acts, Chap. 9 creates the West Virginia Works Act, a pilot program for welfare assistance to **at-risk families** to replace the traditional welfare assistance and to promote **self-sufficiency**. The act requires teenage parent recipients to obtain a high school diploma, GED or obtain vocational training; attend **parenting classes**; participate in a mentoring program; and **live at home with their parent** or under other adult supervision.
- WY 1996 Wyo. Sess. Laws, Chap. 111 requires unmarried parents under the age of 18 and the dependent child of the **minor parent** to **reside in** the household of a parent, adult relative or court appointed guardian or custodian in order to qualify for welfare assistance. **Assistance is to be paid to the parent**, relative or court appointed guardian or custodian **on behalf of the minor parent** and the dependent child. The income and resources of the parents shall be considered in determining eligibility.

- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 307 authorizes school-based AIDS education incentive grants for comprehensive health education and substance abuse prevention. Priority will be given to HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted disease and teenage pregnancy programs in the geographic area to be served.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 1038 establishes an alcohol and drug course to inform young people of the dangers involved in consuming alcohol or certain drugs while driving. The act requires that the course be offered periodically but at least once a year in public schools to students in grades nine through 12.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 287 requires the Department of Education, the Department of Health, and the Department of Human Services to submit certified reports that include the nature of the working agreements pertaining to special education and school-based health services between departments, services provided by each department, personnel to be used to provide services, standards and procedures contained in the agreements, and a listing of current services and funding provided for children receiving services.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 618, Sec. 27-5 extends to grades five through 10 those that can include a required health education course in the physical education and training course.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, HCR 18 urges and requests that the departments of social services, education, public safety and corrections, and the Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice support and cooperate with the Department of Health and Hospitals, Office of Public Health, in establishing the Adolescent Health Initiative to improve the health support service delivery system currently administered for Louisiana adolescents.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, P.A. 37, First Extraordinary Session changes the termination date for the In-School Intervention Pilot Program from June 30, 1996, to June 30, 1997.

- PA** 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 15 creates the **Hepatitis B Prevention Act**. The act requires the Department of Health to establish a statewide prevention program through immunization as recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The act also requires placement of hepatitis B on the list of diseases that **require immunization** for school after August 1, 1997.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, Chap. 324 provides a procedure whereby a **student may expressly authorize the school to administer epinephrine** in case of an allergic reaction and ensures that it be kept in a conspicuous place, readily available to be properly used by school personnel. The act provides immunity for those administering epinephrine.

- TN** 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 979 outlines circumstances under which a school employee or person under contract to the board may **assist a student in self-administering of medication**. The act requires an **annual report** be provided to the governor and legislature, including recommendations for meeting the needs of **comprehensive school health**.

- UT **1996 Utah Laws, Chap. 4** requires school boards to implement **rules for abnormal spinal curvature examinations**, with certain exemptions.

- UT **1996 Utah Laws, Chap. 229** establishes the “**School Nursing Services Program**” to encourage **collaboration** between school districts, local health departments and private medical providers.

- VA **1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 410** requires the director of the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy to **suspend mining** under elementary and secondary schools, colleges and universities if he finds the mining presents an **imminent danger** to the school occupants.

- VA **1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 864** requires the Department of Medical Assistance, in cooperation with the Department of Education, to **examine the funding components of the pilot school/community health centers**. The act provides **guidelines for revisions** that must be designed to maximize access to health care for poor children, and to improve the funding by making use of every possible cost-effective means, Medicaid reimbursement or program.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Blood Alcohol Concentration

- AK** 1996 Alaska Sess. Laws, Chap. 143 allows a peace officer who has **probable cause** to believe a minor between the ages of 14 and 21 has operated a **vehicle, aircraft or watercraft** after **consuming any quantity** of alcohol, to arrest or request they submit to a breath test. Minors may not operate a vehicle, aircraft or watercraft for 24-hours after receiving a citation. The act provides penalties and fines for refusal to submit to a chemical test and violating a 24-hour citation. The act also requires the court to order a convicted person to an alcohol safety action program or public treatment facility.
- AL** 1996 Ala. Acts, Act 705 prohibits the **operation of a motor vehicle** by anyone under the age of 21 who has **0.02 percent or more** by weight of alcohol in his or her blood. The act provides penalties.
- IN** 1996 Ind. Acts, P.L. 92 makes it a **class C infraction** for anyone who is under the age of 21 to operate a vehicle with **at least 0.02 percent** by weight of alcohol in his or her blood **but less than 0.10 percent** by weight of alcohol in the blood. The act provides penalties.
- KS** 1996 Kan. Sess. Laws, Chap. 216 makes it unlawful for anyone under the age of 21 with a breath or blood alcohol content of **0.02 percent or greater** to operate or attempt to **operate a vehicle**. The act requires that law enforcement officers provide oral and written notice that driving privileges will be **suspended** for at least 30 days for a first occurrence and for at least 90 days for a second or subsequent occurrence. The act provides **exceptions**. Any suspension and restriction of driving privileges is in addition to any disqualification from driving a commercial motor vehicle. The act also requires that first offenses not be considered by any automobile insurance company for liability or used to cancel a policy.
- ME** 1995 Me. Laws, Chap. 679 includes anyone under 21 years of age under the penalties for **hunting or operating watercraft, snowmobiles or all-terrain vehicles** under the influence of **any amount** of intoxicating liquor or drugs.
- MN** 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 442 makes it a misdemeanor for anyone under the age of 21 to operate a motor vehicle **while consuming alcoholic beverages or after having consumed** alcoholic beverages.
- MO** 1996 Mo. Laws, p. 126 provides procedures for **suspending and revoking** a minor's driver's license when they are stopped for **driving with a BAC of 0.02 percent or more**. The act requires successful **completion of a substance abuse traffic offender program prior to reinstatement**.
- MS** 1996 Miss. Laws, Chap. 527, Sec. 2, 10 and 12 makes it unlawful for a minor to **drive** while under the influence of alcohol or other intoxicating drug or who has a BAC of **0.08 percent or more**. The act adds suspension of driving privileges to penalties for refusal of chemical testing. The act allows the court to **substitute attendance** at a victim impact panel for **imprisonment** upon conviction of driving under the influence. The act also permits the court to grant hardship driving privileges in certain circumstances during license suspension for a first offense.
- NY** 1996 N.Y. Laws, Chap. 196 prohibits anyone under the age of 21 from **operating** a motor vehicle after consuming alcohol. Provides for an administrative license suspension for a minor found to have a BAC of **0.02 percent to 0.07 percent**.

- ND** 1995 N.D. Sess. Laws, Chap. 299 refers to **implied consent** to chemical testing for alcohol or drugs. The act requires law enforcement officers to give **written notice to parents of a minor** who is tested for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs after being taken into custody for chemical testing and provides for up to three years' license revocation for refusing chemical testing. The act also prohibits parental notification as a condition for chemical testing of the minor.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 309 establishes a **zero-tolerance** alcohol level for drivers under the age of 21. The act provides penalties—including the possible cancellation or revocation of a driving license—for anyone who has a measurable amount of alcohol in their blood or breath while driving.
- PA** 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 93 and Act 115 prohibits minors from operating a motor vehicle with **0.02 percent of alcohol** in their blood or urine. The act provides a \$100 fine.
- PA** 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 149, Sec. 3731 a.1ii provides a separate and stricter definition of driving under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance for minors. The definition includes minors having a **BAC of 0.02 percent or more** at the time a chemical test is performed on a sample of a minor's **breath, blood or urine**.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 631 prohibits anyone under the age of 21 to operate a **watercraft or motorboat** with a **BAC of 0.02 to 0.98 percent** (zero tolerance). A violation shall result in the denial of the privilege to operate a watercraft or motorboat for six months.

License Revocation/Suspension

- AZ** 1996 Ariz. Sess. Laws, Chap. 313 requires suspension of a minor's driver's license/privilege or identification card for **selling or giving** liquor to an underage person. The act also requires suspension of a person's right to qualify for a driver's license/privilege or identification card in specified circumstances.
- CT** 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 199 increases from 30 to 90 days the suspension of vehicle operating licenses for minors under 21 years of age who **use their licenses to obtain** liquor. The act includes minors who misrepresent their age, use another's license or make false statements to purchase or attempt to purchase liquor. The suspension also applies to nonresident operating privileges.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 626, Sec. 6-205d provides for the revocation of the license of a minor convicted of driving under the influence. The act allows the secretary of state to **reevaluate** the status of the minor's application at **one year increments** and either issue a license or extend the restricted driving until the applicant attains 21 years of age. The act also **delays eligibility** to apply for a license until at least age 21 for minors with two or more convictions.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 38 suspends for one year the license or operating privilege of a delinquent minor for **possession, purchase or attempt to purchase** alcoholic beverages. The act allows the minor to receive a temporary restricted license or permit.
- KS** 1996 Kan. Sess. Laws, Chap. 216 makes it unlawful for anyone under 21 years of age with a breath or blood alcohol content of **0.02 percent or greater** to operate or attempt to **operate a vehicle**. The act requires that law enforcement officers provide oral and written notice that driving privileges will be **suspended** for at least 30 days for a first occurrence and for at least 90 days for a second or subsequent occurrence. The act provides **exceptions**. Any suspension and restriction of driving privileges is in addition to any disqualification from driving a commercial motor vehicle. The act also requires that first offenses not be considered by any automobile insurance company for liability or used to cancel a policy.
- KS** 1996 Kan. Sess. Laws, Chap. 219 makes it a felony for anyone under age 21 to **display or possess a fraudulent driver's license to purchase** alcoholic beverages.

- MD** 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 372 prohibits anyone under age 21 from possessing a card or document that falsely identifies their age to obtain alcoholic beverages from a licensed seller.
- MD** 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 610 makes it mandatory for a juvenile court to order the Motor Vehicle Administration to suspend the driving privilege of a child if the court finds violations of **drinking or possessing intoxicating beverages on school property**.
- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 176 provides sanctions against minors (under the age of 21) who **purchase or attempt to purchase, consume or attempt to consume** alcohol, or who use a **fake identification card** to obtain alcohol. Sanctions include suspension of a minor's operator's or chauffeur's license and screening and assessment for substance abuse at the minor's expense. The act allows a peace officer who has reasonable cause require that a minor submit to a preliminary chemical breath analysis and requires notification of a parent or guardian for a minor under age 18 who violates this section. The act outlines various exceptions.
- MN** 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 396 establishes the Child Boating Safety Act prohibiting children under age 12 from **operating boats** with a motor larger than 40 horsepower. The act also requires that children between the ages of 12 and 17 operate such watercraft only with a permit or when someone **18 or older is within immediate reach of the motor controls**. The act includes the person over 18, as well as the actual operator, as the one in control of the boat for purposes of alcohol and drug use or other impairments.
- MN** 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 442 makes it a misdemeanor for anyone under the age of 21 to operate a motor vehicle while consuming alcoholic beverages or after having consumed alcoholic beverages. Allows the court to **suspend the driver's license or operating privileges for 30 days or 180 days** if they have a **previous offense**.
- MO** 1996 Mo. Laws, p. 126 provides **procedures for suspending and revoking a minor's driver's license** when they are stopped for driving with a BAC of 0.02 percent or more. The act requires successful **completion of a substance abuse traffic offender program prior to reinstatement**.
- ND** 1995 N.D. Sess. Laws, Chap. 299 refers to implied consent to chemical testing for alcohol or drugs. The act requires law enforcement officers to give **written notice** to parents of a minor who is tested for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs after being taken into custody for chemical testing and provides for up to three years license revocation for **refusing chemical testing**. The act also prohibits parental notification as a condition for chemical testing of the minor.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 254 gives **parents** the ability to **prohibit** the Department of Public Safety from **issuing a driver's license permit** to their minor child. The parent can also file an objection requiring the department to **cancel a minor's current driving privilege**, which can be reinstated only after three months.
- UT** 1996 Utah Laws, Chap. 188 provides for suspension or delay of driving privileges of anyone under age 21 who **purchases, attempts to purchase, possess, or consumes** any alcoholic beverage or product.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 509 allows a **judge** discretion to suspend or impose a curfew on a minor's driver's license for a third violation of **purchasing tobacco products**.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 626 clarifies that the use of a restricted driver's license, for anyone found guilty of violating the unlawful **purchase or possession** of alcohol, applies to juveniles and nonjuveniles.

Education

- AZ** 1996 Ariz. Sess. Laws, Chap. 284 amends current Board of Education and Department of Health Services practices on **chemical abuse prevention education programs**. The act removes

- recommendations for education criteria, adoption of rules, requirements for in-service training of school employees, program types, program evaluation and implementation materials.
- CO** 1996 Colo. Sess. Laws, Chap. 278 allows the designation of funds on **state tax returns** to the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) fund. The act provides appropriations and specifies how distribution shall be done.
- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 307 authorizes **school-based AIDS education incentive grants** for **comprehensive health education** and substance abuse prevention. Priority will be given to HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted disease and teenage pregnancy programs in the geographic area to be served.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 1038 requires the **Board of Education** and the **Board of Public Safety** to jointly develop an alcohol and drug course **informing young people of the dangers** involved in consuming alcohol or certain drugs while driving. The act requires the course to be offered at least once a year in public schools to students in grades nine through 12.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 621, Sec. 3-631 **distributes proceeds from** the special registration D.A.R.E. license plate to the Illinois State Police. The act allows the police to make grants to county and municipal D.A.R.E. programs.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 1216 requires that the money collected from the **D.A.R.E. surcharge** be appropriated for the **D.A.R.E. program**.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, P.A. 48 requires that the \$1.25 tax collected on cigarette papers by the state or any other taxing authority be distributed in Washington Parish and St. Tammany Parish. In Washington Parish, 50 cents of the tax on each pack of cigarette papers will be dedicated to the sheriff to be used solely for **developing or continuing** the D.A.R.E. program. The remaining 75 cents will go to the general fund. In St. Tammany Parish, 50 cents is dedicated to the D.A.R.E. program and the remainder to recreation purposes.
- MN** 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 412 allows districts to **pay for** gang-resistance education and efforts such as the D.A.R.E. program.
- MS** 1996 Miss. Laws, Chap. 905 authorizes Lee County to impose additional court costs to **fund D.A.R.E.**
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 162 requires that anyone under 21 years of age who has had a license revoked or suspended for alcohol- or drug-related reasons to attend and successfully **complete** an **alcohol and drug abuse course**. The course must be developed specifically to address the needs of young people and must be offered by an institution or organization certified by the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 309 requires the Department of Education to develop and administer **driver education programs in all schools to increase awareness** of the **dangers** of drinking and driving.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, SCR 31 encourages Congress to fully **fund** the D.A.R.E. program.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, SCR 60 proclaims April 11, 1996, to be **D.A.R.E. Day**.

Other Misused Legal Substances

- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 846 classifies the depressant **flunitrazepam (rohypnol)** as a Schedule IV controlled substance. The Legislature reserves the right to reclassify rohypnol as a Schedule I controlled substance in the future. By expanding the scope of and increasing the penalty for the crime, the act imposes a state-mandated program upon local government.

- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 652, Sec. 8 increases the fines and penalties for distributing or possessing with intent to distribute **nitrous oxide** to anyone under 18 years of age for any use other than for a medical treatment.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 632 establishes the new crime of drug-induced infliction of aggravated battery of a child athlete. The act makes it unlawful to give a minor under age 18 a **drug to produce quick weight gain or loss** for an athletic event or to encourage such use.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 161 makes it unlawful to possess, sell, distribute or make available **ephedrine** if the seller knows, or should know, that the product may be used as a precursor to any illegal substance or an intermediary to any controlled substance.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, HCR 118 directs the secretary of the Department of Health and Hospitals to study the drug **rohypnol**. The study is to determine whether the drug should be added to the list of Schedule I controlled substances, to report findings of the study to the speaker of the House and the president of the Senate, and to add the drug to Schedule I if it is determined that the drug has a high potential for abuse.
- MD** 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 22 adds **nitrous oxide** to the list of noxious substances it is unlawful to smell or inhale. The act clarifies that the prohibition pertains to any chemical or substance that contains, wholly or in part, certain substances.
- WA** 1996 Wash. Laws, Chap. 205 provides penalties for anyone who possesses **ephedrine or pseudoephedrine** with the intent to **manufacture methamphetamine**. The act increases the penalties that may be imposed on those who manufacture, deliver or possess methamphetamine.

Penalties/School Policy

- AL** 1996 Ala. Acts, SJR 65 urges school officials to conduct **random locker searches** to discourage the presence of weapons, drug use and abuse and violence by using drug dogs, metal detectors and uniformed police officers in schools when the local board of education determines such action to be necessary, justified and appropriate.
- AS** 1996 American Samoa, P. L. 24-20 increases the penalty for **delivering, dispensing, distributing, producing or manufacturing** or attempting to deliver, dispense, distribute, produce or manufacture a controlled substance in any school or on any school campus without prior authorization.
- AZ** 1996 Ariz. Sess. Laws, Chap. 76 makes it a Class 6 felony for a person convicted of driving under the influence to **have a person under the age of 15 in the vehicle** when the offense occurs.
- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 846 classifies the depressant flunitrazepam (rohypnol) as a Schedule IV controlled substance. The legislature reserves the right to **reclassify rohypnol** as a Schedule I controlled substance in the future. By expanding the scope of and **increasing the penalty** for the crime, the act imposes a **state-mandated program upon local government**.
- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 871 provides that anyone convicted of manufacturing or possessing certain controlled substances while **in the presence of a child or that causes injury or the death to a child under age 16** to receive additional punishment.
- DE** Vol. 70 Del. Laws, Chap. 519 requires a **parent** or legal guardian of a pupil to be **notified** if the pupil is the victim of criminal conduct, or the pupil is found to **possess** a controlled **substance**, a dangerous instrument or a deadly weapon on school property.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 652, Sec. 8 increases the fines and penalties for **distributing or possessing** with intent to distribute **nitrous oxide** to anyone under 18 years of age for any use other than for a medical treatment.

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- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 1014 gives certain **probate courts additional powers** to conduct trials, receive guilty pleas and impose sentences upon defendants for furnishing alcoholic beverages to or purchasing or possessing alcoholic beverages for use by minors under 21 years old.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 1020 adds **glue, aerosol or other toxic vapors** to the definition of driving **under the influence** of alcohol or drugs.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 90 establishes that a child found in possession of a dangerous weapon, switchblade knife, intoxicating liquor or illicit drugs while attending school may be **excluded from attending school** for up to 92 days. Requires the superintendent to ensure that **substitute educational activities** or other appropriate assistance is provided and that the child is **referred** for appropriate **intervention and treatment** services.
- ID** 1996 Idaho Sess. Laws, Chap. 379 adds to existing sanctions for students **illegally using drugs in the public schools** and provides for intervention by trained teachers and counselors.
- ID** 1996 Idaho Sess. Laws, Chap. 718 provides \$250,000 annually to the Department of Law Enforcement to **increase toxicology laboratory capacity** in the Bureau of Forensic Sciences **for drug testing of juveniles**. Any excess money will be returned to the public school income fund for substance abuse programs in the public school system. The act provides additional penalties for minors who use controlled substances.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 610, Sec. 10-22.6e **allows school authorities to inspect and search** for illegal drugs, weapons or other illegal or dangerous substances or materials. Provides for searches of school property, equipment owned or controlled by the school and students' personal effects left in these areas. A search warrant or student consent is not required.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 622 **prevents students** who are **suspended or expelled** for possession of a weapon or for possession, sale or delivery of a controlled substance on school property or for battering a staff member **from attending another school** in another district **until** the period of **suspension or expulsion expires**.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 632 establishes the new crime of **drug-induced infliction** of aggravated battery of a child athlete. The act makes it unlawful to give a minor under age 18 a drug to produce quick weight gain or loss for an athletic event or to encourage such use.
- IN** 1996 Ind. Acts, P.L. 65 raises the penalties for dealing or **possessing certain controlled substances** if the offense is committed in, on or **within 1,000 feet of a family housing complex**.
- IA** 1996 Iowa Acts, Chap. 161 makes it unlawful to **possess, sell, distribute** or make available **ephedrine** if the seller knows, or should know, that the product may be used as a precursor to any illegal substance or an intermediary to any controlled substance.
- MD** 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 22 adds **nitrous oxide to the list** of noxious substances it is **unlawful to smell or inhale**. The act clarifies that the prohibition pertains to any chemical or substance that contains, wholly or in part, certain substances.
- MD** 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 441 prohibits an adult from knowingly and willfully allowing anyone under age 21 to **possess or consume** an alcoholic beverage **at the adult's owned or leased residence**.
- NC** 1996 N. C. Sess. Laws, Chap. 18 **increases** the penalty for anyone over age 18 who **sells or delivers** a controlled substance **to anyone under age 16 or a pregnant female**.
- OH** 1996 Ohio Laws, H. 162 prohibits **knowingly dispensing or distributing** a harmful intoxicant to anyone under age 18.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 252 requires every school to establish a **Safe School Committee** to make recommendations to the principal for student safety and possible strategies for students to

avoid harm, crime prevention, school violence and other issues that prohibit maintenance of a safe school.

- PR** 1996 Puerto Rico Laws, PC 1603 makes it a crime to **possess or sell** illegal drugs **on school or recreational property**.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, Chap. 282 adds a public **park or playground** to the list of places for distributing or manufacturing a controlled substance for which a person can be fined or imprisoned.
- SC** 1996 S.C. Acts, Act 290 makes it a **felony and outlines punishment** for anyone to **knowingly and intentionally use**, solicit, direct, hire, persuade, induce, entice, coerce or employ **anyone under age 18** for the purpose of **distributing** cocaine, crack cocaine, heroin, marijuana or LSD.
- SD** 1996 S.D. Sess. Laws, Chap. 120 provides **notice to school officials** of certain drug and alcohol **violations** by students.
- TN** 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 888 requires local and county boards of education to adopt **written policies** and procedures to ensure **safe and secure learning environments that are free of drugs, drug paraphernalia**, violence and dangerous weapons, and to improve swift, certain and severe disciplinary sanctions on students. The act also encourages a **zero tolerance** policy toward students who engage in **specified misconduct**, requires prompt law enforcement notification, requires written notification of policies and procedures to parents and students and requires that the policies and procedures be posted within each school.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 190 allows local school boards to **exclude from attendance** for 365 calendar days those **students** who have been **expelled** by a school in **Virginia or another state** for violations of school board policies related to the destruction of property or possession of weapons, alcohol or drugs.
- WA** 1996 Wash. Laws, Chap. 205 provides penalties for anyone who **possesses ephedrine or pseudoephedrine** with the intent to manufacture methamphetamine. The act increases the penalties that may be imposed on those who **manufacture, deliver or possess methamphetamine**.
- WV** 1996 W. Va. Acts, Chap. 17 creates a criminal offense for driving under the influence of alcohol, a controlled substance or other drug while **unemancipated minors are on or in the vehicle**.
- WI** 1996 Wis. Laws, Act 327 allows the **school board**, after adopting written policies regarding disciplines or treatments of students found to be under the influence of alcohol, to require a student to take a **chemical breath analysis** if there is **reasonable suspicion**. The school board may use results for hearings or proceedings for discipline, suspension or expulsion.

Prevention

- AZ** 1996 Ariz. Sess. Laws, Chap. 189 requires the Arizona Drug and Gang Prevention Resource Center to include in its annual inventory of Arizona education, prevention and treatment programs **information** relating to adolescent participation in **criminal street gangs**.
- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., ACR 94 proclaims October 23 through 31, 1996, as **Red Ribbon Week** and encourages all Californians to help build **drug-free communities**.
- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 733 authorizes an Assessment, Orientation, and Volunteer **Mentor Pilot Program** in San Diego County. The act provides screening, drug and alcohol education and intervention, and assistance from volunteer mentors **for minors who are wards of the court** by reason of certain drug or alcohol violations. The act also requires an evaluation of the pilot program and submission of the results to the Legislature and to state alcohol and drug programs.
- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 104 **recreates** the Children and Adolescents Substance Abuse **Trust Fund** within the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, without modification.

- HI 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 90 establishes that a child found in possession of a dangerous weapon, switchblade knife, intoxicating liquor or illicit drugs while attending school may be **excluded from attending school** for up to 92 days. Requires the superintendent to ensure that **substitute educational activity** or other appropriate assistance is provided and that the child is **referred for appropriate intervention and treatment services**.
- ID 1996 Idaho Sess. Laws, Chap. 379 adds to existing sanctions for students illegally **using drugs in the public schools** and provides for **intervention by trained teachers and counselors**.
- ID 1996 Idaho Sess. Laws, Chap. 718 provides \$250,000 annually to the Department of Law Enforcement to **increase toxicology laboratory capacity** in the Bureau of Forensic Sciences for **drug testing of juveniles**. Any excess money will be returned to the public school income fund for substance abuse programs in the public school system. Provides additional penalties for minors who use controlled substances.
- KS 1996 Kan. Sess. Laws, Chap. 229 requires the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, in cooperation with the Kansas Youth Authority, to **coordinate all state efforts** to prevent juvenile alcohol and drug abuse. They shall develop a **comprehensive strategy for prevention and early intervention**, including a program to assist each community in performing a **comprehensive risk assessment**.
- LA 1996 La. Act, P.A. 78 increases the minimum **age from 18 to 21** for the sale; service or possession of alcoholic beverages. Provides exceptions and penalties.
- LA 1996 La. Act, HCR 118 directs the secretary of the Department of Health and Hospitals to **study** the drug **Rohypnol**. The study will determine whether the drug should be added to the list of Schedule I controlled substances, report findings of the study to the speaker of the House and the president of the Senate, and add the drug to Schedule I if it is determined that the drug has a high potential for abuse.
- MO 1996 Mo. Laws, p. 72 **extends the drug-free-school zones** from a 1,000 foot radius to a 2,000 foot radius. The act also **makes school buses drug-free zones**.
- NY 1996 N.Y. Laws, Chap. 356 allows political subdivisions to erect **highway signs indicating a drug-free school zone** if it has jurisdiction over a highway within school grounds and if school authorities permit the signs.
- NY 1996 N.Y. Laws, Chap. 478 makes it unlawful to allow a minor under the age of 16 to **enter or remain in certain facilities** where alcoholic beverages are sold or given away.
- OK 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 252 requires every school to establish a **Safe School Committee** to make recommendations to the principal for student safety and possible strategies for students to avoid harm, crime prevention, school violence and other issues that prohibit the maintenance of a safe school.
- PA 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 199, Sec. 495 c-f places **restrictions on** alcoholic beverage and malt beverage **advertising**. The act prohibits print advertising within 300 feet of a church, school or public playground; advertising directed towards minors promoting alcohol consumption; advertising in publications published by, or on behalf of any educational institution; and advertising that is inconsistent with the spirit of safety or safe driving programs.
- TN 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, HJR 431 requires further **study and recommendations** on women's health to include the high rate of suicide for young women and other mental health needs, HIV/AIDS, prevention of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) and **addictive disorders**.
- TN 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 888 requires local and county boards of education to adopt **written policies** and procedures to ensure **safe and secure learning environments that are free of drugs, drug paraphernalia**, violence and dangerous weapons, and to improve swift, certain and severe

disciplinary sanctions on students. The act also encourages a **zero tolerance** policy toward students who engage in **specified misconduct**, requires prompt law enforcement notification, requires written notification of policies and procedures to parents and students, and requires the policies and procedures be posted within each school.

- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., ACR 94 proclaims October 23-31, 1996, as Red Ribbon Week and encourages all Californians to help build **drug-free communities**.
- HI 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, HR 45 honors February 1996 as **Drug-Free Hawaii Awareness Month**.
- HI 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, SR 185 and HCR 324 urges youth **athletic leagues** to voluntarily adopt a policy **discouraging tobacco and alcohol use** by coaches, parents and family members at games, practices or other occasions where youth are present.
- MI 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, HCR 247 commemorates May 1996 as **Inhalant Awareness Month**.
- MS 1996 Miss. Laws, SCR 566 designates April 1996 as **Alcohol Awareness Month** and invites citizens to participate in an **alcohol-free weekend**, April 5-7, 1996.
- PA 1996 Pa. Laws, SR 29 and HR 90 recognizes March 19-25, 1995, as **Butane and Inhalants Awareness Week** in Pennsylvania.
- PA 1996 Pa. Laws, SR 149 and HR 444 proclaims October 23-31, 1996, as Red Ribbon Week, and encourages all citizens to participate in drug education and prevention activities to make a visible show of support for our strong commitment to a **drug-free community**.
- RI 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, SCR 31 encourages Congress to fully fund the **D.A.R.E.** program.
- RI 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, SCR 60 proclaims April 11, 1996, to be **D.A.R.E. Day**.

Retail

- CO 1996 Colo. Sess. Laws, Chap. 68 allows a people **under age 21 to sell or dispense** alcoholic beverages if they are **supervised by a retail employee** at least 21 years of age or older.
- HI 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 101 prohibits anyone from **serving** a minor or allowing the **consumption or possession** of any liquor by a minor. The act provides an exception for being misled by the minor's appearance and the attending circumstances.
- MD 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 128 alters from 16 to 14 the minimum age at which an alcoholic beverages licensee in Frederick County may employ a person **to perform any task other than to sell, serve or deliver** alcoholic beverages.
- MD 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 158 lowers from 21 years to 18 the minimum age for allowing anyone to **serve and sell** alcoholic beverages **with meals** in restaurants in Carroll County. The act authorizes Class A licensees to employ people who are at least 18 years of age to **stock** alcoholic beverages and **prohibits** anyone who is under 21 years of age from **acting as a bartender or barmaid** or in any solely bar-related capacity.
- MD 1996 Md. Laws, Chap. 217 reduces from 21 to 18 the minimum age under which a person is prohibited from **handling** alcoholic beverages in Garrett County.

- PA 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 199, Sec. 495 c-f allows the agent or licensee of a state liquor store to require a **signed statement** from anyone whose age may be in question **before selling** them liquor. The act requires the store or its licensee to maintain the forms for inspection by the enforcement bureau. The act also permits admission of the signed card as a defense in prosecutions for serving a minor.

Treatment

- AZ 1996 Ariz. Sess. Laws, Chap. 189 requires the Arizona Drug and Gang Prevention Resource Center to include **information** relating to adolescent **participation in criminal street gangs** in its annual inventory of Arizona education, prevention and treatment programs.
- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 656 allows a **parent** or legal guardian to **seek medical care and counseling** for a minor's (12 years old or older) drug- or alcohol-related problem **if the child does not consent** to care. The act permits those seeking care to receive medical information about the minor's care without the minor's consent and without liability to the physician.
- CA 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 733 authorizes an **Assessment, Orientation, and Volunteer Mentor Pilot Program** in San Diego County. The act provides screening, drug and alcohol education and intervention, and assistance from volunteer mentors for minors who are **wards of the court** by reason of certain drug or alcohol violations. The act also requires an evaluation of the pilot program and submission of the results to the Legislature and to state alcohol and drug programs.
- CT 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 238, Sec. 15 requires the Department of Public Health to develop a **comprehensive plan** in **conjunction** with the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services for children and youth who are substance abusers.
- FL 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 104 recreates the Children and Adolescents Substance Abuse **Trust Fund** within the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, which aims to reduce and eliminate substance abuse among children and adolescents. The act carries forward its current balances and continues its **current sources and uses**.
- HI 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 90 establishes that a child found in possession of a dangerous weapon, switchblade knife, intoxicating liquor or illicit drugs while attending **school** may be excluded from attending school for up to 92 days. The act requires the superintendent to ensure that substitute educational activity or other appropriate assistance is provided and that the child is **referred** for appropriate **intervention and treatment services**.
- ID 1996 Idaho Sess. Laws, Chap. 379 adds to existing sanctions for students illegally using drugs in the public schools and provides for **intervention by trained teachers and counselors**.
- TN 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 1079 emphasizes family preservation and requires the Department of Children's Services to strive to **ensure that health care needs**, both preventive and practical, **are met** and to provide **appropriate** and effective **behavioral** and mental health **treatment**.
- WA 1996 Wash. Laws, Chap. 133, Sec. 5-6, 34 outlines **parental consent** requirements for minor chemical dependency and mental health treatment. The act requires school districts to notify a minor's parents for certain mental health and **chemical dependency treatment services**.

TOBACCO

Education

- DE** Vol. 70 Del. Laws, SJR 19 requires the Department of Public Instruction and the Department of Health and Social Services to submit a plan to analyze the existing capacity to educate citizens about cancer and related chronic diseases and their risk factors. The act requires that the plan include how existing **school health curricula** are being implemented at local and district levels. The plan should make recommendations on a **public awareness campaign** about the **risks of tobacco use** targeted at youth and how to incorporate skill-building activities for **healthier alternative behaviors in comprehensive school health education programs at all levels**. The plan, which must be submitted to the General Assembly by January 1, 1997, should provide an explanation of how the departments intend to **coordinate future efforts** that include school-based health centers in developing expanded comprehensive health education.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. HR 104 welcomes **young people** representing the **Coalition Against Tobacco**.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, P.A. 48 requires the \$1.25 collected in **tax on cigarette papers** by the state or any other taxing authority be distributed in Washington Parish and St. Tammany Parish. In Washington Parish, 50 cents of the tax on each pack of cigarette papers shall be dedicated to the sheriff to be used solely to develop or continue the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (**D.A.R.E.**) program; the remaining 75 cents goes to the general fund. In St. Tammany Parish, 50 cents is dedicated to the D.A.R.E. program and the remaining money is to be used for recreation.
- SC** 1996 S.C. Acts, Act 45 provides that local school boards may make school district **facilities smoke-free** and provides an exception for governmental entities that had a nonsmoking policy in effect before August 1, 1990.

Prevention

- CT** 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 240 requires the commissioner of revenue to make a **report** to the General Assembly of enforcement efforts, including assessing penalties on **minors** who purchase cigarettes or tobacco products.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, SR 185 and HCR 324 urges youth **athletic leagues** to voluntarily adopt a policy **discouraging tobacco and alcohol use** by coaches, parents and family members at games, practices or other occasions where youth are present.
- KY** 1996 Ky. Acts, Chap. 38 requires that one-tenth of one cent of the **revenue** collected by the Revenue Cabinet from the state excise tax on the sale of cigarettes be given to the **Department of Agriculture** to enforce penalties against **minors** who purchase tobacco products.
- KY** 1996 Ky. Acts, SR 137 opposes regulation of cigarettes by the Food and Drug Administration and urges the president to work with the various states to implement the federal **Synar Amendment** and the state's **regulation relating to underage smoking**.
- LA** 1996 La. Act, P.A. 48 requires that the \$1.25 collected in **tax on cigarette papers** by the state or any other taxing authority be distributed in Washington Parish and St. Tammany Parish. In Washington Parish, 50 cents of the tax on each pack of cigarette papers shall be dedicated to the sheriff to be used solely to develop or continue the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (**D.A.R.E.**) program; the remaining 75 cents goes to the general fund. In St. Tammany Parish, 50 cents is dedicated to the D.A.R.E. program and the remaining money is to be used for recreation.

- MI** 1996 Mich. Pub. Acts, Act 0352, Sec. 1209 allocates 2.5 percent of smoking prevention program funds to adolescent health care clinics that currently provide smoking prevention programs.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 144 creates the Prevention of Youth Access to Tobacco Act. The act also allows cities and municipalities to enact and enforce municipal ordinances relating to youth access to tobacco as long as the penalties are not more stringent than state law.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, Chap. 321 requires the Department of Health to monitor and aggressively enforce health rules and regulations pertaining to stopping the illegal sale of tobacco products to those individuals under age 18.

Retail/Penalties

- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 823 prohibits the sale or distribution of tobacco products from vending machines or other similar devices unless the machines are located at least 15 feet inside the entrance of a licensed establishment.
- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 1166 provides that everyone under the age of 18 who purchases, receives or possesses any tobacco product or any such paraphernalia, upon conviction, receive a \$75 fine or 30 hours of community service work.
- CT** 1996 Conn. Acts, P.A. 240 authorizes a dealer or distributor to offer cigarettes or tobacco products in connection with a promotion or advertisement but makes them liable for gifts or deliveries to minors on the premises during the promotion or advertisement. The act allows the commissioner of revenue to assess penalties on minors who purchase cigarettes or tobacco products and establishes penalties for dealers who sell a tobacco product to anyone under the age of 18 and on dealers, distributors or employees who sell, give or deliver to minors who are not acting in an employee capacity. The act adds restricted cigarette vending machines to the list of points of sale where distributors and dealers must post notices prohibiting sales of cigarette and tobacco products to minors and adds restricted cigarette vending machines to the list of storage facilities for unstamped cigarettes that cannot be placed in an area frequented by minors. The act gives dealers and distributors until July 1, 1998, to completely comply with location limits for cigarette vending machines. The act also adds to the list of prohibited sales cigarettes that are not in an unopened manufacturer's package bearing the health warning.
- DE** Vol. 70 Del. Laws, Chap. 318 prohibits selling or distributing tobacco products, samples or coupons for free or discounted tobacco products and the sale of single cigarettes to minors. The act restricts the location of cigarette vending machines to taprooms, taverns, tobacco shops and adult-only establishments and requires them to be 25 feet from the entrance and directly visible to the owner or supervisor of the establishment.
- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 217 prohibits smoking on, in or near school property. The act authorizes citations for violations and provides a civil penalty.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 106 regulates the sale of tobacco to comply with federal law. The act requires random unannounced inspections at locations where tobacco products are sold to ensure compliance with the prohibition against sales to youth. The act allows a law enforcement agency to engage a person under 18 years of age to purchase tobacco products as part of an enforcement action and makes it unlawful for a minor under age 18 to possess tobacco. The act also prohibits a tobacco business from being operated and billboards advertising tobacco from being located within 2,000 feet of a public or private elementary or secondary school.
- GA** 1996 Ga. Laws, p. 750 provides stricter regulations for the sale of cigarettes and tobacco-related objects to minors.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 53 prohibits the sale of single cigarettes or packages of less than 20 to reduce tobacco access to minors.

- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 313 prohibits the **sale or free distribution** of cigarettes **from a lunch wagon** within 1,000 feet of any public or private elementary or secondary school.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 709 reduces the **size requirements of signs** about the illegal sale of tobacco products to minors so they can be more easily posted.
- KS** 1996 Kan. Sess. Laws, Chap. 214 creates the Cigarette and Tobacco Products Act. The act prohibits the sale of cigarettes and tobacco from **vending machines** unless they are in an establishment or portion of the establishment not open to minors and provides exceptions. The act extends prohibitions against minors purchasing cigarettes and tobacco products to the act of **possession or attempting to purchase or possess** those products which are subject to confiscation and provides a \$25 fine, plus court costs. The act also makes it illegal to distribute **samples** within 500 feet of any school building being used primarily by those under 18 years of age and provides exceptions. The act provides violators, including **mail distributors**, who furnish or distribute to minors with a **“reasonable cause to believe”** defense. The act also requires retailers to **post a notice** saying, “By law, cigarettes and tobacco products may only be sold to persons 18 years of age and older.”
- KY** 1996 Ky. Acts, Chap. 38 requires anyone selling or distributing tobacco products to require **proof of age** if there is reason to believe that the buyer is under 18. The act prohibits anyone under age 18 from purchasing or receiving a tobacco product, or from using fraudulent proof of age for the purpose of purchasing any tobacco product. The act requires that one-tenth of one cent of the revenue collected by the Revenue Cabinet from the state excise tax on the sale of cigarettes be given to the Department of Agriculture for enforcement and establishes and increases various fines. The act allows an exception to the prohibition against those under age 18 purchasing tobacco products for violation enforcement.
- ME** 1995 Me. Laws, Chap. 593 adds an affirmative **defense** to prosecution for “distribution” of cigarettes, cigarette paper or any other tobacco product to anyone under 18 years of age who furnishes **fraudulent identification**.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 144 requires the suspension or nonissuance of drivers licenses to persons who **sell or distribute** tobacco to minors if the person **fails to pay an assessed fine**. The act prohibits the use of minors under age 18 to test compliance laws related to the sale or distribution of tobacco to minors or possession of tobacco by minors.
- PA** 1996 Pa. Laws, Act 145 prohibits the **use or possession** of tobacco in a **school building**, a school bus or on school property. The act provides fines and definitions.
- RI** 1996 R.I. Pub. Laws, Chap. 321 requires the Department of Health to **monitor and aggressively enforce** health rules and regulations pertaining to stopping the **illegal sale** of tobacco products to anyone under age 18.
- SC** 1996 S.C. Acts, Act 321 makes it unlawful to distribute a **sample** tobacco product to anyone under 18 years of age. The act requires **proof of age** be obtained by a sample distributor for people appearing underage and provides fines and revises penalties for the sale of tobacco to minors.
- SC** 1996 S.C. Acts, Act 445 provides that local school boards may make **school district facilities smoke-free** and provides an exception for governmental entities that had a nonsmoking policy in effect before August 1, 1990. The act revises **sentencing guidelines** for the misdemeanor of tobacco product sales to minors.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 509 allows a judge, at his discretion, to suspend or impose a curfew on a minor’s **driver’s license** for a third violation of **purchasing tobacco products**.

The act prohibits the sale of tobacco products from **vending machines** unless the machine is located in a place not open to the general public and not normally accessible to minors. If the vending machine is in a place open to the general public, it must be within normal line of sight of the proprietor or employee, unless it is more than 10 feet from the entrance or requires a token for operation. The act also provides penalties.

- VA **1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 517** prohibits the sale of tobacco products without a governmentally issued **photo identification** establishing the buyer is at least 18 years of age, unless the seller knows or has reason to believe otherwise. The act allows consideration of the general appearance, facial characteristics, behavior and manner of the buyer by the seller in determining whether her or she is 18 years of age or older. The act also provides penalties.

School Policy

- CA **1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 199** extends to July 1, 1997, the date by which school districts must have a **tobacco-free policy** in order to apply for grants for projects to prevent tobacco-related diseases.
- FL **1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 217** prohibits smoking on, in or near school property and authorizes citations for violations and civil penalty.
- GA **1996 Ga. Laws, p. 106** regulates the sale of tobacco to comply with federal law. The act requires random unannounced inspections at locations where tobacco products are sold to ensure compliance with the prohibition against sales to youth. The act allows a law enforcement agency to engage a person under 18 years of age to purchase tobacco. The act also prohibits a tobacco **business** from being operated and **billboards advertising** tobacco from being located **within 2,000 feet of a public or private elementary or secondary school**.
- HI **1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, HR 243** urges negotiations to be conducted so that smoking may be **prohibited on public school campuses**.
- HI **1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 313** prohibits the **sale or free distribution** of cigarettes from a **lunch wagon** within 1,000 feet of any public or private elementary or secondary school.
- KS **1996 Kan. Sess. Laws, Chap. 214** makes it illegal to distribute **samples** within 500 feet of any school building being used primarily by those under 18 years of age. The act also provides exceptions.
- PA **1996 Pa. Laws, Act 145** prohibits the **use or possession** of tobacco in a school **building**, a school **bus** or on **school property**. The act also provides fines and definitions.
- SC **1996 S.C. Acts, Act 445** provides that local school boards may make **school district facilities smoke-free** and provides an exception for governmental entities that had a **nonsmoking policy** in effect before August 1, 1990. The act revises sentencing guidelines for the misdemeanor of tobacco product sales to minors.

VIOLENCE PREVENTION

- AL** 1996 Ala. Acts, SJR 65 urges school officials to conduct **random locker searches** to discourage the presence of weapons, drug use and abuse and violence by using drug dogs, metal detectors and uniformed police officers in schools when the local board of education determines such action to be necessary, justified and appropriate.
- AZ** 1996 Ariz. Sess. Laws, Chap. 189 requires the Arizona Drug and Gang Prevention Resource Center to include in its annual inventory of Arizona education, prevention and treatment programs **information relating to adolescent participation in criminal street gangs.**
- CA** 1996 Cal. Stats., Chap. 200 establishes the **School Violence Reduction Program** and provides grants to schools and school districts. The act provides funding for disseminating information regarding successful school violence reduction programs. The act further establishes a **Target Truancy and Public Safety Grant Demonstration Program** to address the escalating pattern of truancy, anti-social behavior and delinquency for high-risk youth who participate in the program.
- DE** Vol. 70 Del. Laws, Chap. 519 requires that a **parent** or legal guardian of a pupil be **notified** if the **pupil is the victim of criminal conduct, or the pupil is found to possess a controlled substance, a dangerous instrument or a deadly weapon on school property.**
- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 225 adds **Student Crime-Watch Programs** to the list of programs that may receive state matching grants under current law. The act **amends the powers and duties of school boards by stating that implementing a student crime-watch program is a child-welfare obligation of the boards.**
- FL** 1996 Fla. Laws, Chap. 276 authorizes **mutual aid agreements** between school boards that employ school safety officers and law enforcement agencies.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, Act 90 establishes that a child found in **possession** of a dangerous weapon, switchblade knife, intoxicating liquor or illicit drugs while attending school may be **excluded from attending school** for up to 92 days. The act requires the superintendent to ensure that substitute educational activity or other appropriate assistance is provided and that the child is referred for appropriate intervention and treatment services.
- HI** 1996 Hawaii Sess. Laws, SR 144 requests that the Department of Education, together with other public and private sector agencies and organizations, **develop programs** to prevent and eliminate violence in Hawaii's public schools.
- ID** 1996 Idaho Sess. Laws, Chap. 377 limits a teacher's or school district's **duty to warn** of a student's **suicidal tendencies** or of the possible injury of a student by another student.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 498 requires a school superintendent to **report verified incidents** involving a **firearm** to the local and state police within 24 hours of learning of the incident.
- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 610 authorizes the state board of education, within available appropriations, to fund a **School Safety and Educational Block Grant Program** for students from kindergarten through grade 12. The act provides funding for school safety, textbooks and software, teacher training and curriculum development, school improvements and remediation programs. The act also allows school authorities to inspect and search for illegal drugs, weapons or other illegal or dangerous substances or materials and provides for **searches** of school property, equipment owned or controlled by the school and students' personal effects left in these areas. Search warrants or student consent is not required to conduct the search.

- IL** 1996 Ill. Laws, P.A. 622 prevents **students** who are **suspended or expelled** for possession of a weapon or possession, sale or delivery of a controlled substance on school property or for battering a staff member **from attending another school** in another district until the period of suspension or expulsion expires.
- MN** 1996 Minn. Laws, Chap. 412 allows districts to pay for **gang-resistance education and efforts** such as the D.A.R.E. program.
- MO** 1996 Mo. Laws, p. 72 **establishes the crime of assault** while on school property. The act requires **reporting** by school officials and juvenile officers and provides for suspensions. The act also requires implementation of **educational instruction** regarding violence prevention that communicates the **negative consequences** of criminal gang activity to pupils.
- OK** 1996 Okla. Sess. Laws, Chap. 252 requires every school to establish a **Safe School Committee** to make **recommendations** to the principal for student safety and possible **strategies** for students to avoid harm, crime prevention, school violence and other issues that prohibit maintenance of a safe school.
- TN** 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 888 requires local and county boards of education to adopt written policies and procedures to **ensure safe and securing learning environments** that are free of drugs, drug paraphernalia, violence and dangerous weapons, and to improve swift, certain and severe disciplinary sanctions to students.
- The act also encourages a **zero tolerance policy** toward students who engage in **specified misconduct**, and requires prompt law enforcement notification, requires written notification of policies and procedures to parents and students, and requires the policies and procedures be posted within each school.
- TN** 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 891 requires that the commissioner of education, in consultation with the commissioner of safety, develop advisory guidelines for local education agencies to use in developing **safe and secure learning environments** in schools by January 1, 1997.
- TN** 1996 Tenn. Pub. Acts, Chap. 988 enacts the **Student and Employee Safe Environment Act**. The act requires that each local education agency be responsible for formulating a code of **acceptable behavior and discipline** to apply to the students in each school operated by such local education agency. The act provides for code contents, civil liability, and distribution and posting of the code.
- VA** 1996 Va. Acts, Chap. 190 allows local school boards to **exclude from attendance** for 365 calendar days those students who have been expelled by a school in Virginia or another state for **violations of school board policies related to destruction of property, weapons, alcohol or drugs**.
- VI** 1996 V.I. Laws, Act 6108 makes it **unlawful** for anyone who is **not a student** to gain entry onto school grounds by wearing an official school uniform. The act also provides penalties.
