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ABSTRACT

This annual report on the role of the federal Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) funds in improving Michigan library services presents district-by-district summaries of the state's 1996 LSCA grant program and demonstrates how federal funds have supported a wide range of projects. Grant awards are listed by library in each district, under LSCA Title I Projects: Improving Public Library Services and LSCA Title II Projects: Sharing Library Resources. Quotes from library staff and users on the benefits of various services and resources are included for each district as well. A summary of LSCA awards in 1996 is included for regional and subregional library programs, major urban resource library programs, institutional programs, discretionary grants for public library services (LSCA Title I), and for interlibrary cooperation and resource sharing (LSCA Title III). The Library of Michigan's LSCA Program Goals are outlined, and a map of Congressional Districts (1995) is also provided. (AEF)


The 1996 LSCA grant program provided funds to connect libraries to the Internet as the first step in developing libraries as electronic community information centers. Funding for libraries to provide a gateway to the national information superhighway is critical to ensuring a public voice in the new electronic democracy. LSCA has helped many libraries to begin the important transition to providing the electronic services of the future. LSCA funds were also used to expand the nine technology training centers created in public libraries throughout the state last year; and to create 47 Internet access points across Michigan.

LSCA funds were also used for programs dedicated to ensuring that library services are accessible to all individuals, including those who have difficulty in getting to a library; those needing special materials or services; and those benefiting from special outreach services, including children living below the poverty level.

LSCA support has been a key factor in bringing new technology to Michigan libraries. Projects included connectivity to the Internet, wide area networking, CD-ROM applications, and document delivery technology. LSCA projects have provided models of service that benefit the entire library community. Successful LSCA projects have allowed libraries to assume leadership roles within their communities, and to forge new partnerships. These collaborations have a lasting impact on the advancement of library service, resulting in an improved quality of life for Michigan residents.

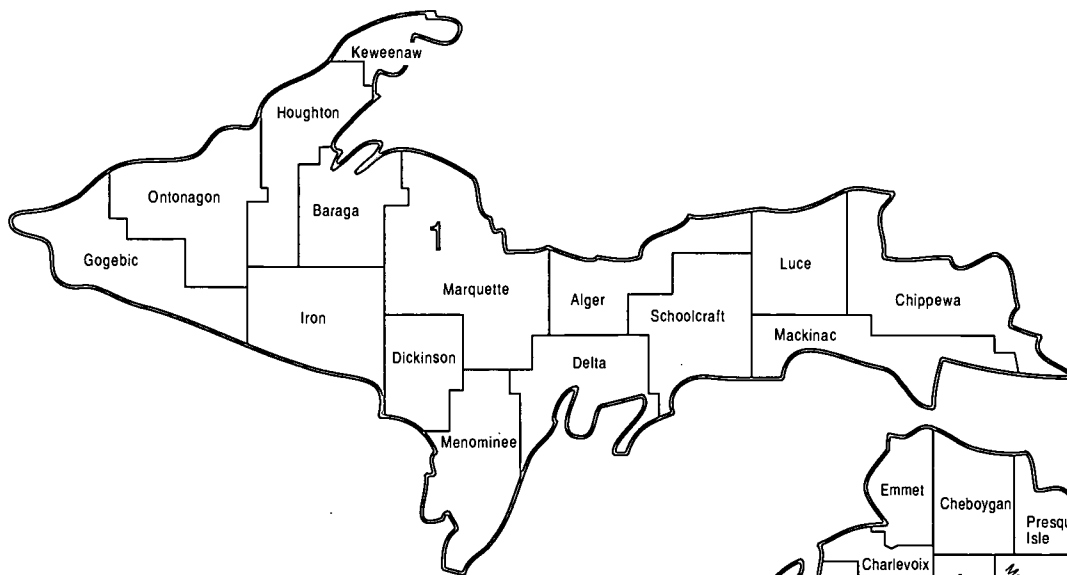

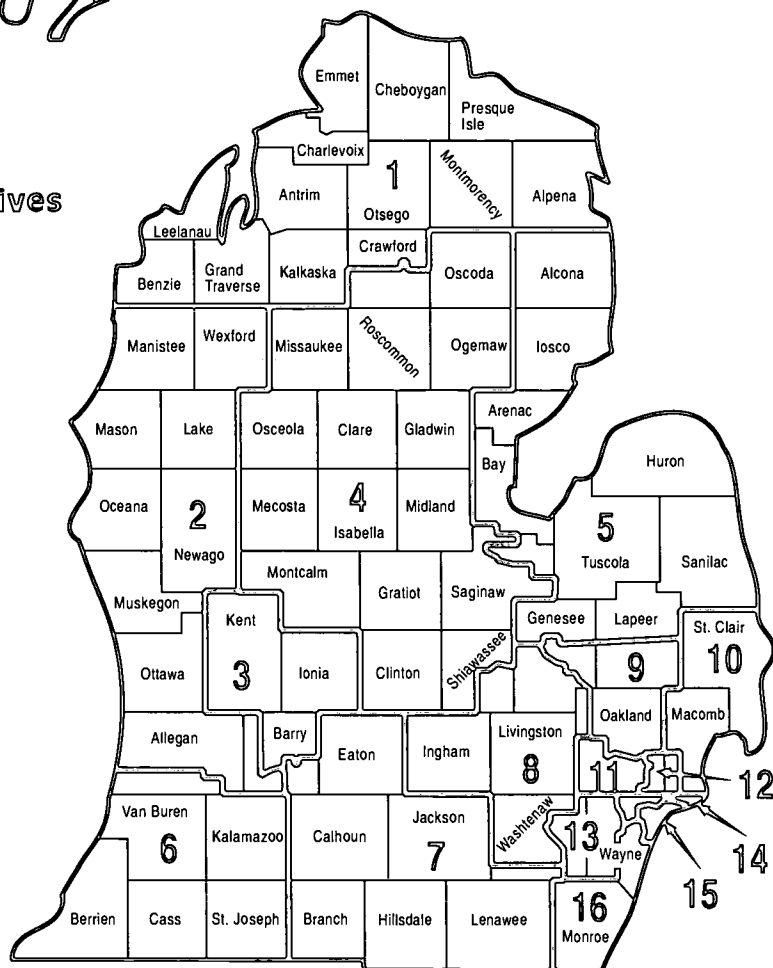

Library of Michigan's LSCA Program Goals

Michigan's LSCA program seeks to assist libraries in developing service paradigms that incorporate new technologies and models of service, while continuing to meet the service needs of traditional library users including special populations. The 1996 Library of Michigan LSCA program identifies three major goals that are designed to extend and improve library services by:

- Establishing libraries as electronic community information centers;
- Enhancing equality of access and services to special populations or special collections; and
- Supporting research and demonstration projects designed to assess the applicability of new technologies to library services.

Toward achievement of these goals, the Library of Michigan awarded \$3,186,598 in LSCA dollars for projects during this last year. Funding has focused on bringing technology and the promise of the Internet to the state's libraries as well as supporting services to special populations such as the blind and physically handicapped.
