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ABSTRACT

This KIDS COUNT report examines statewide trends in the well-being of Virginia's children. The statistical portrait is organized into six general areas of children's well-being: (1) healthy births; (2) children's health; (3) school success; (4) risky behavior; (5) families; and (6) community well-being. Key indicators in these six areas include the following: (1) prenatal care in the first trimester; (2) low birth weight babies; (3) infant mortality rate; (4) middle school physical fitness test winners; (5) child abuse and neglect victims; (6) child death rate; (7) grade 4 standardized test winners; (8) grade 6 literacy test winners; (9) high school dropout rate; (10) teenage sexually transmitted disease rate; (11) juvenile birth rate; (12) alcohol or drug possession in school; (13) weapon possession in school; (14) juvenile violent crime arrests; (15) delinquency; (16) motor vehicle death rate; (17) teen violent death rate; (18) foster care out-of-home placements; (19) divorce rate; (20) births out of wedlock rate; (21) unemployment rate; (22) average income; (23) fiscal stress level; (24) students in school lunch program; (25) students in families receiving AFDC; (26) average daily school membership; (27) instructional personnel rate; (28) child day care capacity; and (29) population per physician. Following a brief overview and discussion of the indicators, the first section of the report provides information on the Commonwealth as a whole. The second section, and bulk of the report, provides profiles for the 135 different counties studied. The report provides comparative data for 1991 through 1996 and also indicates current rank in relation to the other localities. (SD)

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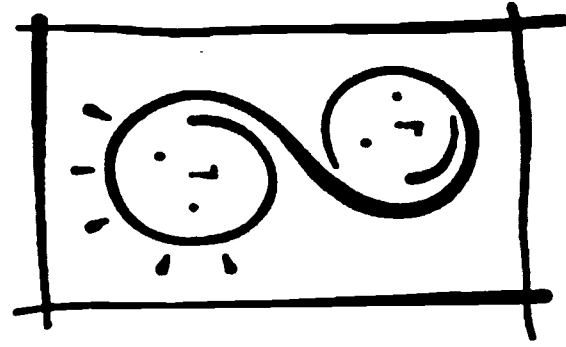

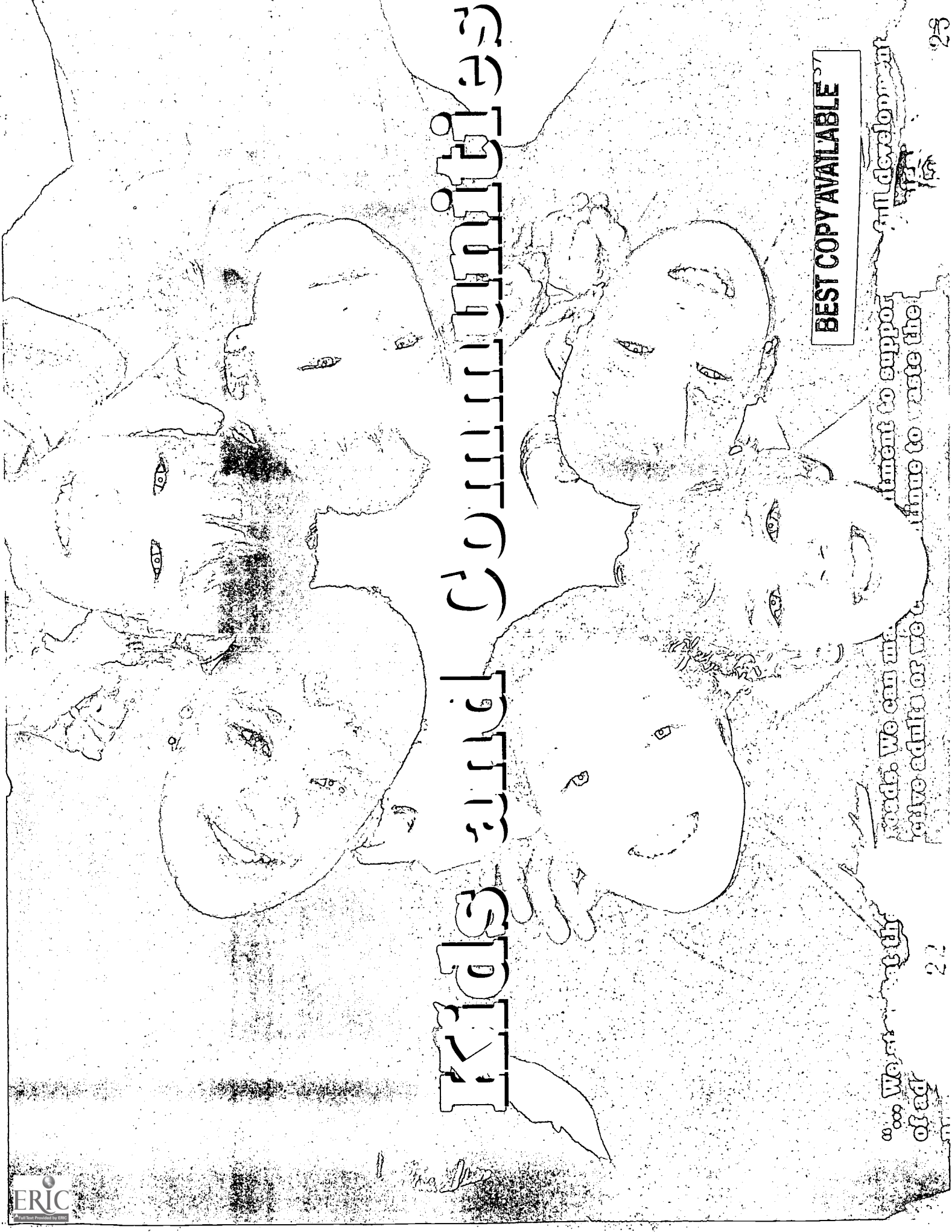

Kids and Communities

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DS COUNT in Virginia is committed to improving the quality of life for our children and youth. We believe in the value of working proactively with families, the educational system and communities to promote the health, well-being and personal success of Virginia's children. We also believe the best approach to accomplish these goals includes an emphasis on promoting competence in young people and an emphasis on helping communities build environments that enhance competence. The benchmarks presented in this Data Book will allow communities to begin to assess their strengths and weaknesses, as a step toward improving conditions for all of Virginia's children and youth.

Risky Behavior

We know there are strong links between poor adjustment in childhood and negative outcomes in adulthood. Health professionals, educators and the business community in Virginia have expressed alarm about increases in risky behavior. The National Commission on the Role of the School and Community on Improving Adolescent Health (1990) has documented the growing numbers of young people who are smoking, drinking, having sex and committing violence at increasingly younger ages. Twenty-five percent of

10-17 year olds experiment with at least one of these high-risk behaviors. Even more alarming is that another 25 percent do several high-risk behaviors at the same time (Dryfoos, 1990). As a result, young people today face greater risks to their current and future development than previous generations.

Educators have expressed concerns about disruption in the classroom and its impact on those who want to learn. Many children come to school without proper nutrition and health care to help them concentrate on their studies. Children who are dealing with violence in their homes and neighborhoods may have concerns for their physical well-being that override their attention to school activities.

The business community is concerned with employee absenteeism or less than efficient workers who are distracted by dealing with problems involving their children. Children's illnesses, unstable day care arrangements, domestic violence, brushes with the juvenile justice system, etc. not only take away an employee's time and energy, they also influence a child's ability to learn, grow and become a productive member of society. The long-term impact on the business community can be devastating.

Repairing vs. Preventing

Two approaches can be used to solve the dilemma of raising healthy, well-adjusted, productive citizens cost-effectively. We can focus on treatment services to repair the damage done, or we can focus on preventing the damage in the first place. The data indicate that we do not have the resources to provide adequate treatment services to the young people presently in need. It is not likely that the resources will be available to treat them as adults.

- Epidemiological surveys show that only one in five youth who need services currently receives the help they require.
- There is an enormous discrepancy between the available service providers and the number of children who need help (Tuma, 1989).
- Our service system relies almost exclusively on very expensive treatment, which in turn requires considerable expertise and sustained involvement for full-blown problems. Ironically, numerous outcome studies have found these treatment programs ineffective.

- Too many interventions focus only on the child and pay inadequate attention to the family, peer group, school and community settings that help to create and perpetuate children's difficulties.

The alternative is to find ways of reaching kids earlier and preventing problems before they begin. Primary prevention strategies differ from traditional treatment approaches in three important ways. Typically, primary prevention strategies are:

- concerned with promoting health, building competencies and establishing supportive systems as a protection against dysfunction;
- directed toward essentially healthy people who are not currently suffering from any current disability although they may be at increased risk for negative outcomes in the future; and
- systems and group oriented rather than targeted to individuals (Cowen, 1986).

Prevention also can maintain healthy behavior in youth who are already healthy. The 50 percent of our youth who do not engage in the risky

behavior described above also need our attention and resources. We can help to support them to avoid such involvement in the future.

Juvenile problems do not occur in a vacuum. The social, mental health, and physical problems of America's children and youth are caused, to a large extent, by changes that have occurred in families, schools, neighborhoods and the media. Major social and environmental changes include:

- dramatic alterations in family composition and stability,
- the breakdown of traditional neighborhoods and extended families,
- reduced contact between young people and positive role models,
- the proliferation of media messages that positively portray health-damaging behavior, and
- increasing numbers of economically and educationally disadvantaged young people entering school (National Commission on Children, 1991).

The writing is on the wall. To achieve truly meaningful solutions, both the individual and the community must be transformed.

How Does Prevention Work?

Medical models have shown that serious disease may be reduced by identifying and modifying risk and protective factors. An example of such a model is reducing heart disease by eating less fat and exercising more. Similarly, researchers have compared the life trajectories of young people who succeeded despite adverse conditions to the life trajectories of those who adopted unhealthy life styles, dropped out of school or committed delinquent acts.

Risk factors are personal characteristics or peer group, family, or community conditions that increase the chances that children and youth will develop health and behavior problems. Risk factors exist in all areas of life and across racial and economic dimensions. In the past thirty years, researchers have learned a great deal about the risks for low birth weight, infant mortality, child abuse and neglect, school failure, delinquency and violence. Risk factors are found at several different levels: the individual, the family, the peer group, the school and the community. Individual risks include a family his-

ry of a problem, early substance use such as cigarettes or alcohol, academic failure and early antisocial behavior. Broader risk factors include: associations with delinquent/drug using peers, poor family management practices, low school or family attachment, living in a crime-ridden neighborhood, or the availability of drugs or alcohol in a community. Key risks researchers have identified include: residence in a disadvantaged and disorganized neighborhood, poor and inconsistent family management practices, low expectations for achievement, poor peer relations and early onset of behavior at an early age (Dryfoos, 1990; Hawkins & Catalano, 1992).

Whereas exposure to one risk factor does not seal a child's fate, exposure to several risk factors increases a young person's risk exponentially. If a community is not able to eliminate all risk factors, simply *reducing or eliminating a few* can significantly decrease the likelihood of problems in young people.

Addressing multiple risk factors. Addressing a single risk factor in a particular area does not significantly reduce problem behavior. Instead, we have learned that communities need to reduce risks simultaneously across several areas such as the individual, the peer group, the family and

the community. The multiple risk behaviors in which about 25 percent of young people "are doing it all" -- including premature sexual behavior, drug use, violence, delinquency and school dropout -- are all interrelated and, more importantly, are the results of the same set of underlying causes (Jessor, Donovan & Costa, 1992). This means that advocating for early schooling and preventing school failure as high priorities reduces not only the dropout rate. It also may prevent substance abuse, teen pregnancy and juvenile delinquency.

Protective factors are ones that shield youngsters from problems. Mechanisms that reduce the likelihood of serious problems in the future include:

- a neighborhood with resources and supports,
- a cohesive family,
- ongoing contact with a caring adult,
- positive peer models,
- students bonded to school and family,
- good school performance, and
- adaptive coping skills (Cowen and Work, 1988).

Because some risk factors are very resistant and some are impossible to completely eradicate, increasing protective factors can counteract some exposure to risk. Communities can learn from an entire body of research on resiliency (Werner, 1987; Rutter, 1985; Garmezy, 1985). Many of these researchers began by asking why most children and adolescents do not develop major social/emotional problems though they have been exposed to such factors. What do these youngsters have in their favor? Research has shown that when protective factors balance risk factors, they moderate the negative effects of being exposed to multiple risks.

One implication of the interrelatedness of risk and protective factors is that community leaders who are interested in safeguarding our youth need to address as many of these common predictors as possible. We need to recognize that there is no magic bullet or simple solution that will prevent high-risk behavior among our young people (Dryfoos, 1990). Meaningful solutions will require: programs that are more comprehensive, a higher level of collaboration between both public and private sectors and programs that are more integrated into the community.

Kids and Communities

Research over the past two decades has shown that a community focus in planning prevention programs is important. Prevention efforts that failed tended to focus too narrowly on a single problem. This taught us to create programs that are far reaching in scope and that implement long-lasting solutions.

A community focus represents a blend of what we know about risk and protective factors and designing effective interventions. Risk, as well as protective factors, permeate all aspects of the community: individual, families, schools and neighborhoods. Targeting the community can positively affect the local environment by reducing aggressive behavior in juveniles. Simultaneously, it supports positive norms and values that influence our children. Multiple risk factors influence virtually all serious problems such as child abuse, school failure or delinquency. Therefore, effective prevention must combine multiple interventions applied in a variety of settings. For example, a program designed to prevent sixth graders from smoking could be combined with a parent and convenience store effort that attempts to reduce cigarette access to minors. The combined effect may be much greater than would result from each separate effort.

We also have come to understand the power of communities. Parents look for ways to prevent individual teenagers from getting into trouble. Communities can build collective strengths and truly comprehensive programs that support, nourish and nurture all young people. Instead of teaching individual children to resist negative peer pressure, we can create peer groups that promote and exert positive peer pressure.

Engaging the community is challenging, but the rewards are great. Having a wide spectrum of individuals, groups, businesses and organizations at their disposal, communities can create a strong base of support for change. The firm support of community leaders and their involvement in prevention efforts can lead to long-term change. The commitment must include an investment of resources to prevention. These resources include not only public funding, but also private sector funding, leadership and ability.

Ultimately, as communities take the initiative to create new solutions, their programs gradually become integrated into the routine services of local organizations and institutions. Children need community programs that provide appropriate information, skills and motivation. They also need social systems and agents such as

parents, teachers and peers who consistently reinforce and support the development of positive personal, social, and health behavior.

Past attempts to prevent problems operated in isolation and had limited success. There is no longer any doubt that meaningful change occurs only when multiple community forces share a common vision about prevention and health promotion. It is only when leaders coordinate these broader community circumstances that prevention efforts produce positive lasting changes in young people.

Learning From Other Communities

Communities can benefit from examining the effectiveness of prevention programs, so that they can select and apply the ones most relevant to their concerns. Today we know more than ever about prevention and health promotion. Recently, several prestigious research institutes independently evaluated nationwide interventions and arrived at a remarkable consensus about the efficacy of primary prevention programs. These evaluations offer a rich base of knowledge from which Virginia's communities can design community-based prevention initiatives.

Lessons Learned

Prevention programs have produced positive behavioral effects that cut across many important areas. These include family support programs, early childhood education, school-based life skills programs and interventions specifically designed to prevent adolescent pregnancy, school failure, substance abuse and juvenile delinquency. Below are some important lessons that have been learned from successful programs.

- **Early identification and intervention is necessary.** Successful programs begin intervention early, that is, before the onset of problematic or high risk behavior.
- **Continuity of efforts must be maintained.** "One-shot interventions" do not have lasting effects. Sustained interventions are required to ensure

that positive changes are maintained.

High-risk behaviors are inter-related. Teens at risk for school failure are also at increased risk for substance abuse, teen pregnancy, and violence. Successful prevention programs adopt broad and more holistic goals rather than focus on individual problems.

Efforts must target multiple risk and protective factors. Successful programs target the individual, the family, the peer group, school and the community.

There is no single component or "magic bullet." No single effort alters outcomes for children at risk of delinquency, substance abuse, teen pregnancy, school failure or violent behavior.

Community-wide, multi-agency, collaborative approaches hold the most promise. Comprehensive programs must offer a "package" of services that can only come about when multiple agencies and organizations collaborate.

Efforts should promote competence. Rather than focus on

defects, successful programs promote health, build competencies and establish supportive systems.

• **Efforts should be guided by scientific theory.** The most successful prevention programs are guided by a scientific understanding of the complex interrelation of factors associated with each target area.

How Can You Support Positive Growth in Your Community?

The guide that follows provides one strategy for supporting the positive development of children and youth at the community level.

1. Gather and involve key leaders in the community to establish a Community Prevention Board to oversee a prevention planning effort.
2. Create a broad-based community task force to assess community risks and resources. KIDS COUNT can be a primary data source.
3. Identify risk and protective factors that are salient to your community. Begin to develop a plan of action to match promising prevention strategies to areas of concern. Programs and activities selected should derive

from a research-based understanding of the problem and rely on interventions with an empirically validated track record. The goal is to develop a prevention effort seen as a long-term solution rather than a quick-fix approach to serious problems.

4. Develop a plan that is compatible with resources, groups and programs already operating in your community. Use comprehensive, integrated and collaborative strategies to address the social and environmental, as well as the family and individual factors, that put children and families at risk.

5. Develop a plan that not only monitors the initial implementation of the plan, but also attempts to build in ownership to sustain the long-term commitment necessary for its ultimate success.

6. Develop evaluation criteria so that the Board can collectively monitor progress, make judgments about the success of the program and plan mid-course corrections, as required.

These steps are presented as a very general blueprint. They do not begin to describe the very complex and detailed processes involved in each step. Leaders who are interested in learning more about successful community development processes

should obtain a copy of David Hawkins and Richard Catalano's book, *Communities That Care* (Jossey-Bass Publications, 1992). Another recent article, "Empowering Communities to Prevent Adolescent Substance Abuse" (Harachi, R., Ayer, C., Hawkins, D., Catalano, R., & Cushing, 1996), describes successful efforts in mobilizing 35 communities to conduct community risk factor and protective resource assessments, develop comprehensive prevention plans, and implement their plans. After four years, 31 communities are still active.

Using This Book

A major goal of KIDS COUNT is to provide information to help communities assess the current health and well-being of their youth. Annual KIDS COUNT publications can provide ongoing benchmarks to help community leaders target areas of concern and evaluate efforts to improve the well-being of their children. By referring to KIDS COUNT, leaders, researchers, program planners, advocates, funders and concerned citizens can see whether their communities have advanced or regressed over time. They also can compare the well-being of their children to those in other communities and to Virginia as a whole.

While 29 benchmark measures do not cover all of the conditions that shape the lives of children, the measures included in this book possess four important attributes.

- They reflect a broad range of influences affecting the well-being of children: health, income, educational attainment and the likelihood of being arrested for violent crime.
- They reflect experiences across developmental stages from birth to adulthood.

- They reflect influences at multiple levels: the individual, the family, peers, school and the community.

- They are consistent across Virginia's communities over time. This allows legitimate comparisons.

The indicators are grouped into six clusters: Healthy Births, Children's Health, School Success, Risky Behavior, Families and Community Well-Being. Individual indicators in each cluster are described below.

HEALTHY BIRTHS

Prenatal care beginning in the first trimester



Birth-weight babies

Infant mortality rate (per 1,000 live births)

These three indicators address the question: "Are the children in our community getting off to a healthy start?" A lack of or a delay in prenatal care can lead to increased risk for both fetus and mother. They are clearly correlated with both low birth weight and infant mortality. Low birth weight is associated with a host of physical, developmental and learning disabilities. It may reflect risk factors in the mother such as poor health, substance abuse or teen pregnancy. Infant mortality is the most dramatic consequence. Communities with problems on multiple indicators such as poverty, unemployment, and illiteracy, tend to have higher infant mortality rates.

CHILDREN'S HEALTH

Middle schoolers passing all four Spring physical fitness tests

Victims of child abuse or neglect

Child death rate, ages 1-14 (per 100,000)

Children's health indicators reflect not only their health and overall fitness but also the quality of adult supervision they receive and the dan-

gers to which they are exposed in their homes and communities. These indicators show whether youth are on track in terms of good nutrition and fitness. Rates of abuse and neglect reflect a host of family problems. They also predict many very severe physical and mental health problems (such as poor academic performance and the potential for domestic and criminal violence as adults). There are enormous social and economic consequences for these outcomes. Outside of the home, motor vehicle accidents are the most frequent cause of death to children in this age group.

SCHOOL SUCCESS

4th graders with composite standardized scores above the 25th percentile

6th graders who passed all three Literary Passport tests

9th - 12th graders 9-12 who dropped out of school

Success in school and graduation from high school are important indicators of a community's success in educating its children and important predictors of the child's adult success. The fourth and sixth grade indicators show how well resources are working to educate children. They are also important predictors of later problems and can help identify high-

risk groups to target for intervention. For example, fourth grade children reading in the lowest fifth of their grade level are at much greater risk for teen pregnancy and dropping out of school than those in the highest 20 percent. Teens who drop out of school face enormous odds. They will earn significantly less than high school or college graduates earn. It is highly likely that they will not be adequately prepared to contribute productively to the workforce.

RISKY BEHAVIOR

Sexually transmitted diseases, ages 12-17 (per 1,000)

Births to girls (per 1,000 ages 15-17)

Incidents of students possessing alcohol or drugs in school

Incidents of students possessing weapons in school

The benchmarks in the risky behavior cluster describe teens engaging

in behavior that has severe and life-altering consequences. Births to teenagers, for example, increase the likelihood of a host of negative consequences to the child and the mother. Some Virginia estimates suggest that teen childbearing costs the taxpayer close to \$20,000 per child. A child born to an unmarried teenage high school dropout is ten times as likely to continue to live in poverty. A high incidence of drugs and weapons in school and juvenile arrests should be a cause of great concern for any community. Such indicators may reflect poverty, lack of parental nurturing, poor parental monitoring, alcohol and substance abuse and few educational opportunities. They predict the potential for delinquency and violent criminal acts such as rape, robbery and aggravated assault by these juveniles. Many researchers point to the increased availability of hand guns as an important factor in the rise of teen violent deaths. These indicators may signal the need for speedy action and support from families and community organizations.

This cluster highlights the importance of a family's contribution to a child's development. Foster care signals that families are having major problems and suggests the number of children living under major stress. Foster care also is an extremely costly intervention that communities would prefer to avoid. Divorce, which frequently occurs with parental conflict, is a major transition for children. It can lead to negative behavior such as acting out, withdrawal or poor school performance. Out-of-wedlock births are highly correlated with single, female parenting and families that live below the poverty line. This can increase the percentage of children living in poverty, which is an important negative predictor for the child's future well-being.

The strengths and resources of the community make important contributions to the health and well-being of our children. Many indicators in this category can help communities gauge their economic well-being. Poverty, more than any other single variable, places children at risk for infant mortality, poor health, school failure and a host of other problems. Poverty not only costs families and children, but also Virginia's taxpayers. Everyone pays for treatment of chronic health conditions and disabilities, special education, foster care and welfare. Indicators such as the unemployment rate and child day care capacity reflect community resources that are important to the health of families. These resources must be available for people to break the cycle of poverty. The absence of day care, jobs and medical assistance reinforces social inequalities and perpetuates undesirable outcomes for kids.

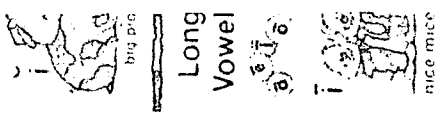
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Cities and Counties in Virginia

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DATA NOTES

The following sections contain data at the statewide level, followed by data for each city and county in Virginia. The notes below should help you interpret the numbers reported.

PERCENT CHANGE. The percent change shows how much a number has increased or decreased from the most recent year data are available (usually FY1996 or 1995) to the earliest year for which data are available for most localities. The percent change is calculated as: $(\text{most recent year} - \text{earliest year}) / \text{earliest year} * 100$.

EARLIEST RANK. Ranking shows how one city or county compares with the other cities and counties. Virginia has 135 cities and counties. (These data reflect the recent combining of South Boston into Halifax county.) The earliest rank numerically ranks the scores of cities and counties on a particular indicator. It uses the first year for which most localities reported data. When more than one locality reports the same value on an indicator, the rank will be shared. This often is denoted by a .5 following a whole number.

CURRENT RANK. The current rank numerically ranks the scores of cities and counties on a particular indicator. It uses the last year for which most localities reported data. Comparing the earliest rank to the current rank shows how a city or county is changing on an indicator, in relation to the other cities and counties.

N/A. The "n/a" symbol indicates that data were not available or were not reported during the time period.

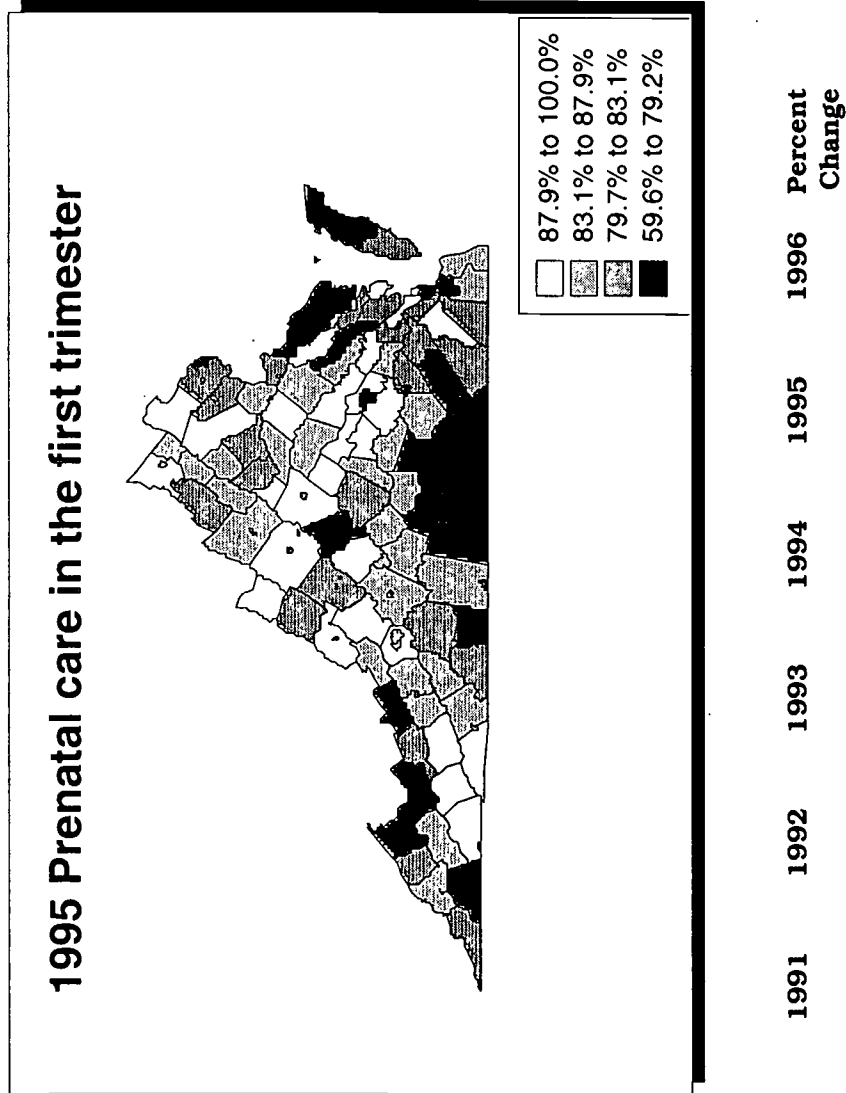
FISCAL YEAR (FY). The fiscal year is the Virginia fiscal year, which runs from July 1 through June 30. (Example: FY 1996 means July 1, 1995 through June 30, 1996.) For school related data, the school year roughly corresponds with the Virginia fiscal year. Depending on locality, it generally begins in August or September and runs through June. (Example: FY1996 means September 1, 1995 through June 30, 1996.)

MAP RANGES. Ranges for the maps are quartiles. Roughly one-quarter of the cities and counties will be included in each range.

POPULATION ESTIMATES. Population estimates were provided upon request through electronic data transfer from the U. S. Department of Commerce, Economic and Statistics Administration, Bureau of the Census, Washington, DC, 1996.

Prenatal care beginning in the first trimester



Prenatal care beginning in the first trimester. The percent of mothers having early prenatal care increased 2.6 percent from 1991 to 1995. Early prenatal care is defined as seeing a physician during the first three months of pregnancy. These data are based on a calendar year. The percentage is calculated as: the number receiving early care/total number of live births. (Terminations are excluded.) Locality is the mother's reported residence.

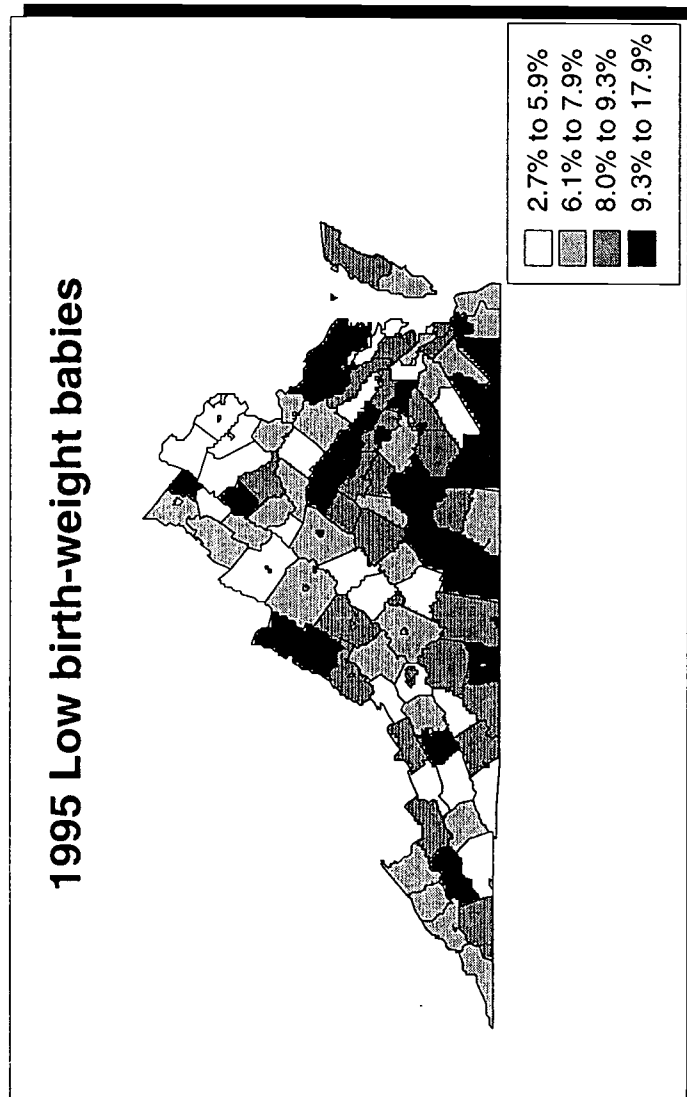
Significance: Lack of or delayed prenatal care can increase risks to both fetus and mother. Early and adequate prenatal care often results in earlier education for proper nutrition, exercise and avoidance of alcohol and drugs. It also may allow earlier detection of and intervention for pregnancy related problems. Lack of prenatal care has been shown to be related to low birth weight and infant mortality (disability and death) and poorer developmental outcomes. Increase access by providing care that is culturally sensitive, convenient, useful and at low or no cost. Poverty and the lack of health insurance reduce the likelihood that women will seek and obtain prenatal care. The goal behind this benchmark is to minimize the risk of morbidity and mortality and reduce the financial costs associated with unhealthy infants by increasing early prenatal care.

Limitations: In 1992 there were six cases of prenatal care in the first trimester in which the residence was unknown. In 1994 there was one case of prenatal care in the first trimester in which the residence was unknown.

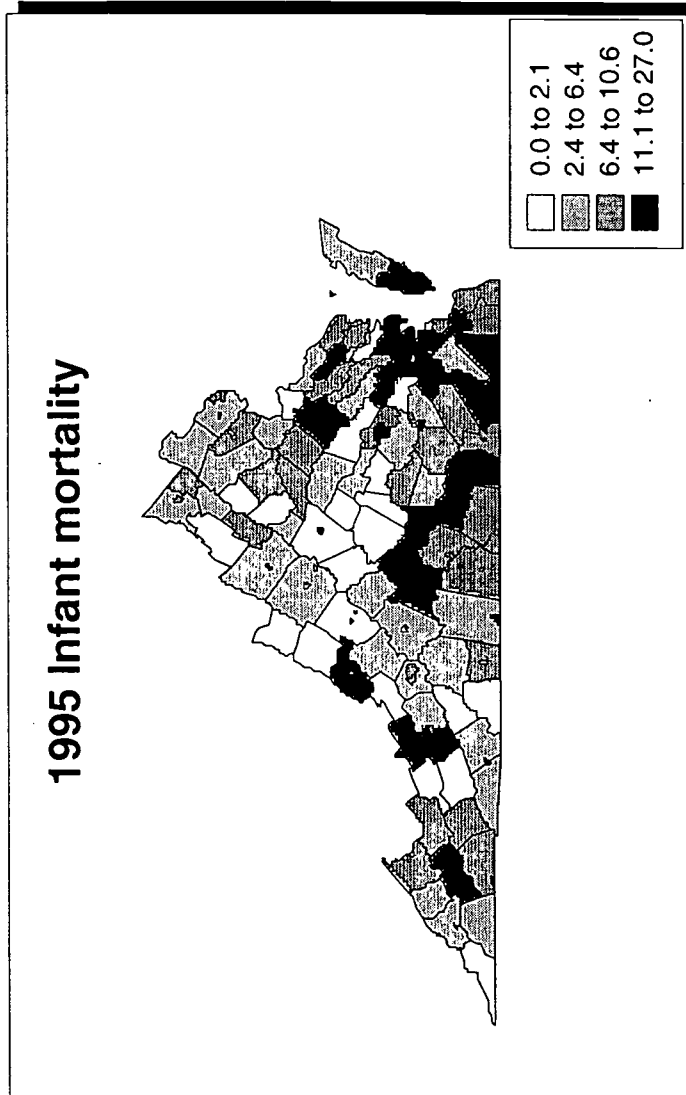
Low birth-weight babies. The percent of babies born with low birth weight increased 6.5 percent from 1991 to 1995. A baby has a low weight birth if it is under 2,500 grams (5 pounds 8 ounces) at birth, regardless of the period of gestation. These data are based on a calendar year. The percentage is calculated as: the number of low weight births/total number of live births.

Significance: Low birth-weight is associated with infant death, respiratory problems, sensory impairment and developmental and learning disabilities. Low birth weight infants who survive are about three times more likely than other babies to experience mental retardation, sight and hearing deficiencies, growth and developmental problems, chronic lung and respiratory problems and learning difficulties. A large percentage of all infant deaths are also related to low birth weight. Research has shown that women without early and adequate prenatal care are more likely to give birth to a low-weight baby.

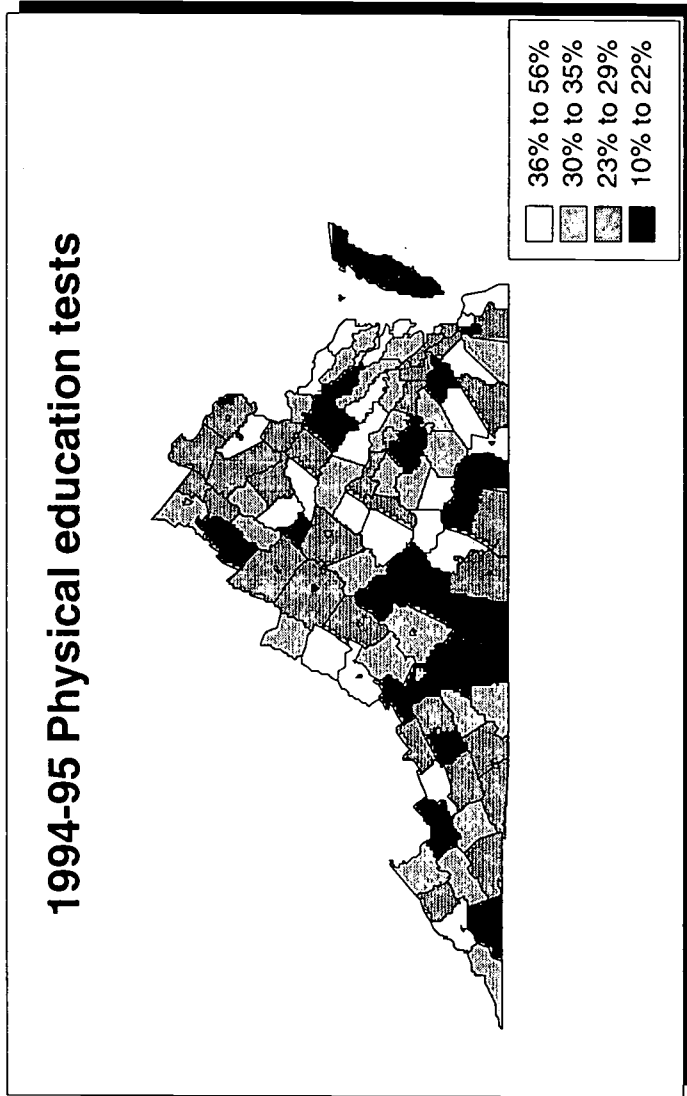
Infant mortality rate (per 1,000 live births). This includes deaths of all children who were under one year of age. These data are based on a calendar year. The rate is calculated as: the number of deaths in the first year of life/total number of live births.

Significance: Since the first year of life is the most precarious, negative social conditions can have a big impact on this vulnerable group. The infant mortality rate reflects the health of pregnant women and infants, the conditions in which they live and the parenting that infants receive. It is often regarded as an indicator of a community's overall quality of life. Children born to poor families or into distressed neighborhoods, remain at greater risk of infant death. Communities where there is a convergence of problems such as poverty, unemployment and illiteracy, tend to have higher infant mortality rates than more advantaged communities. One reason is that families in poor neighborhoods are less likely to receive neonatal intensive care.

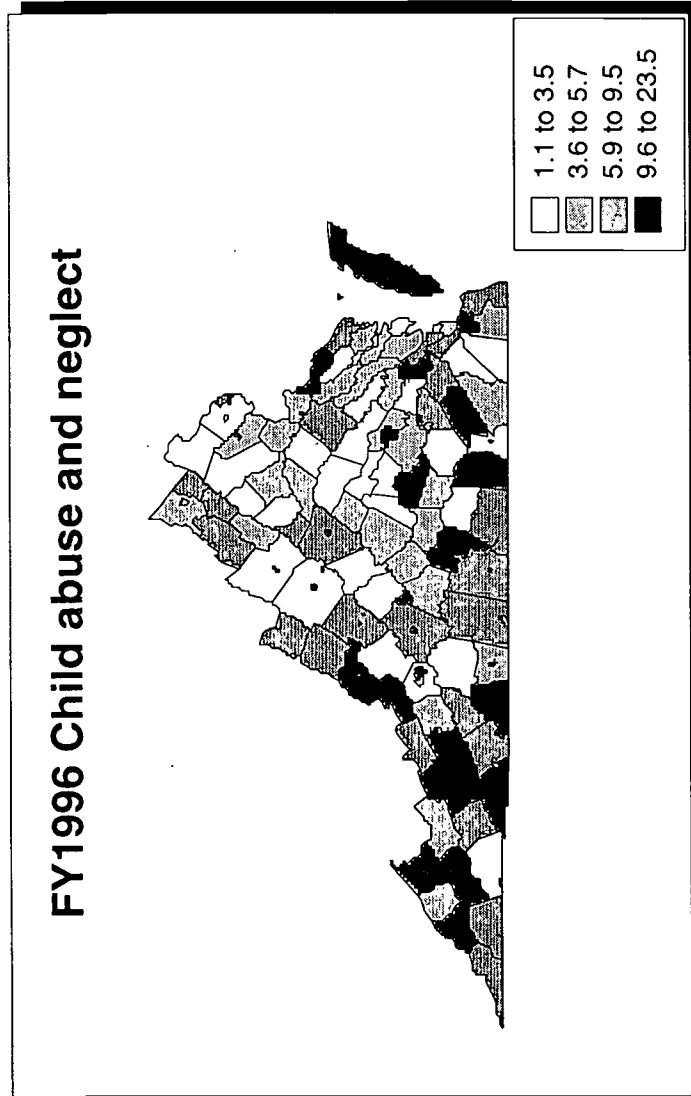
Significance: These tests show whether children and youth are achieving well-rounded fitness. Children need to receive proper nutrition and exercise to grow into healthy citizens. This is also an important indicator of whether young people are developing healthy behaviors and a lifelong commitment to illness prevention and health promotion. To be healthy adults, youth must learn behaviors for taking care of their bodies and their minds.

Victims of child abuse or neglect, ages 0-17 (per 1,000 children). Section 63.1-248.2 of the Code of Virginia defines child abuse and neglect to mean any child less than 18 years of age:

1. whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates or inflicts, or threatens to create or inflict, or allows to be created or inflicted upon such child a physical or mental injury by other than accidental means, or creates a substantial risk of death, disfigurement, impairment of bodily or mental function;
2. whose parents or other person responsible for his care neglects or refuses to provide care necessary for his health, provided, however, that no child who in good faith is under treatment solely by spiritual means through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a recognized church, or religious denomination shall for that reason alone be considered a neglected child;
3. whose parents or other person responsible for his care abandons such child;
4. whose parents or other person responsible for his care commits or allows to be committed any act of sexual exploitation or any sexual act upon a child in violation of the law; or
5. who is without parental care or guardianship caused by the unreasonable absence or mental or physical incapacity of the child's parent, legal guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco parentis. (p.1)

The rate of victims of child abuse or neglect increased eight percent from FY1991 to FY1996. A local department of social services determines whether or not a case is founded after investigating a complaint. A review of the facts must show *clear and convincing evidence* that child abuse or neglect occurred. The rate is calculated as: (the number of children/population, age 0 - 17)*1,000. These data are based on a fiscal year.

Limitation: If there are multiple investigations within a reporting period, these will include multiple counts of children -- that is to say this is not an unduplicated count of children. The rates for FY1995 and FY1996 are computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available.

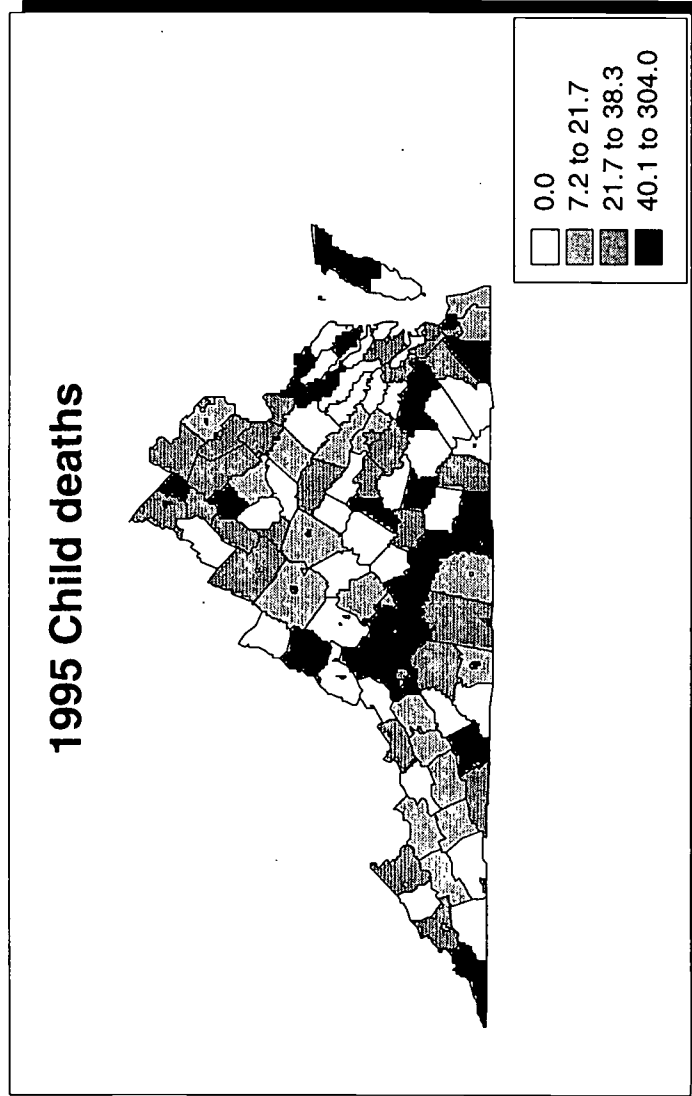
Significance: Child abuse and neglect increase the incidence of physical and mental health problems in children and families such as mental and behavioral disorders, delayed development, permanent disability, poor academic performance, delinquency, depression, alcoholism, substance abuse, deviant sexual behavior, suicide, teen pregnancy, and domestic and criminal violence. There also are enormous economic consequences of child abuse and neglect. Increasingly, Virginia's communities are developing prevention programs to address this important social concern. Child abuse and neglect can reflect a host of family, community, and social factors.

Child death rate ages 1-14, (per 100,000 children). The child death rate decreased 10.2 percent from 1991 to 1995. This includes deaths of children, age 1 through 14 years, resulting from all causes. These data are based on a calendar year. The rate is calculated as: (the number of deaths/population, ages 1 to 14)*100,000.

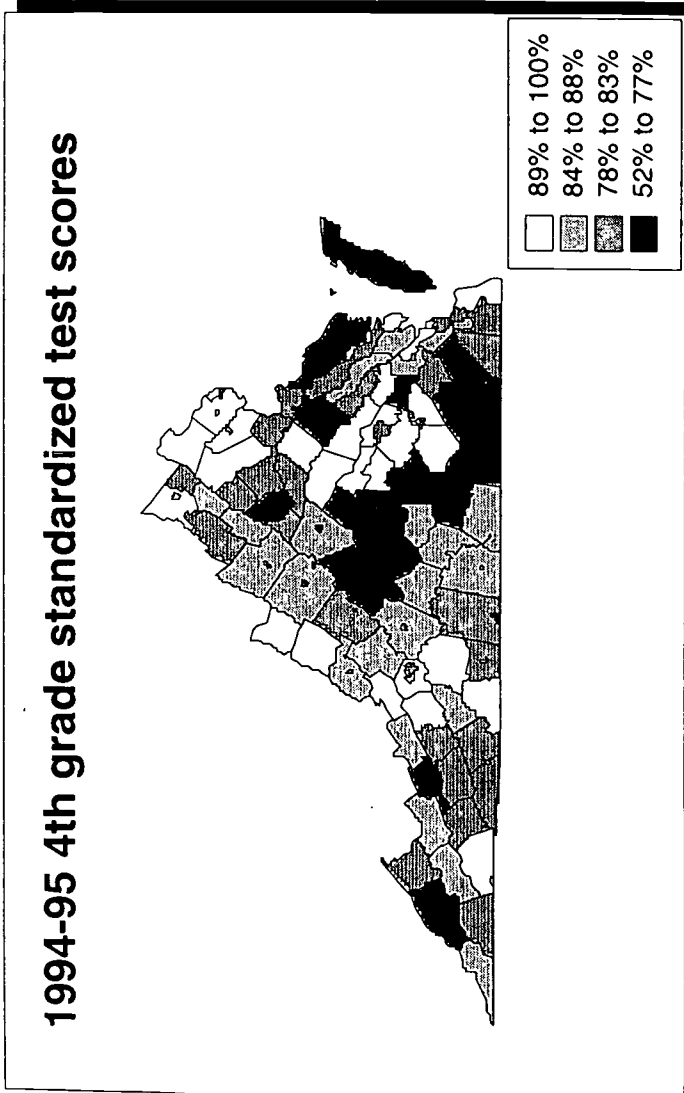
Significance: The child death rate reflects the health of children, the level of adult supervision they receive, and the dangers to which children are exposed in their homes and communities. Advances in the prevention and treatment of childhood illnesses during the past two decades means that injuries, many preventable, cause a large proportion of the deaths of young children. Motor vehicle accidents are the most frequent cause of death to children in this age group.

Limitations: The rate for 1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available.

4th graders whose composite standardized test scores were above the 25th percentile. The number of 4th grade students whose composite standardized test scores were above the 25th percentile increased 1.2 percent from FY1991 to FY1995. This represents the percent of students who took the Virginia State Assessment Program (VSAP) standardized tests under standard conditions whose composite scores were above the national 25th percentile. VASP standardized tests are multiple choice in format and assess students in the basic academic skill areas. These data are based on a fiscal year. (Interpretation note: 75% of students should be above the 25th percentile to meet the national average.)

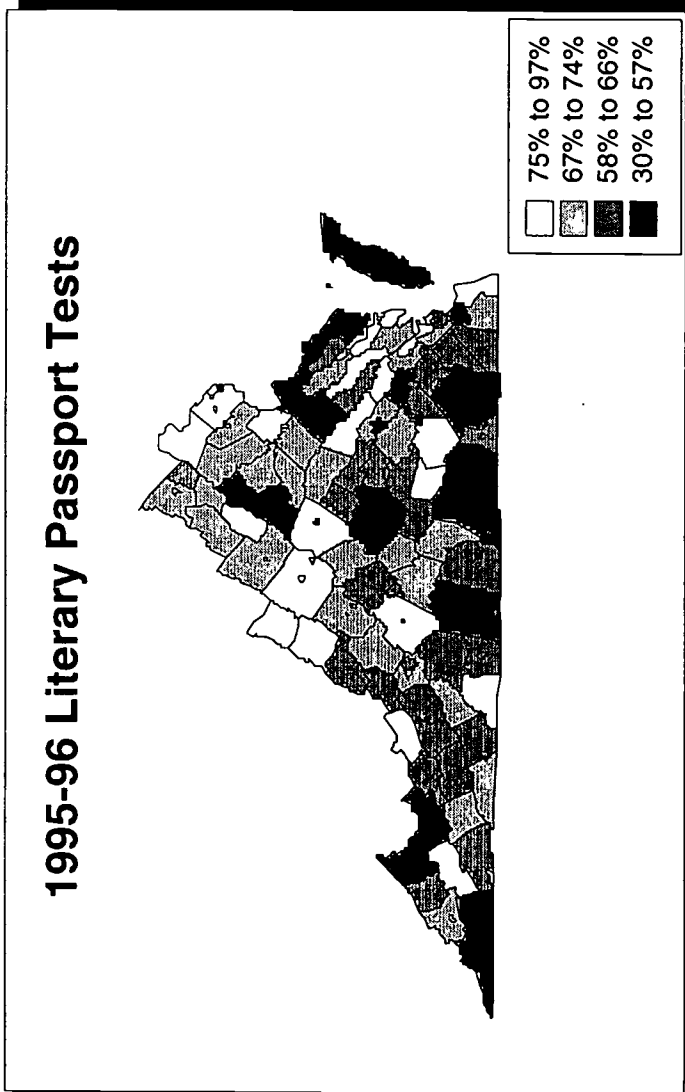
Significance: Failing academically in the early elementary school grades, being retained a grade and being in the bottom quartile in basic reading and math skills are important predictors of later school failure. Being retained even one year reduces the likelihood that children will complete high school. Fourth grade children reading in the lowest fifth of their grade level are at much greater risk for teen pregnancy and school dropout than those in the highest 20%. This indicator can serve as an early warning signal that our children are not learning and that families, communities, and schools must respond.

6th graders who passed all three Literacy Passport Tests. The percent of 6th grade students who passed all three Literacy Passport Tests (LPT) decreased 2.8 percent from FY1991 to FY1995. The LPT assesses how well students have mastered 6th grade level skills in mathematics, reading and writing. These data are based on a fiscal year.

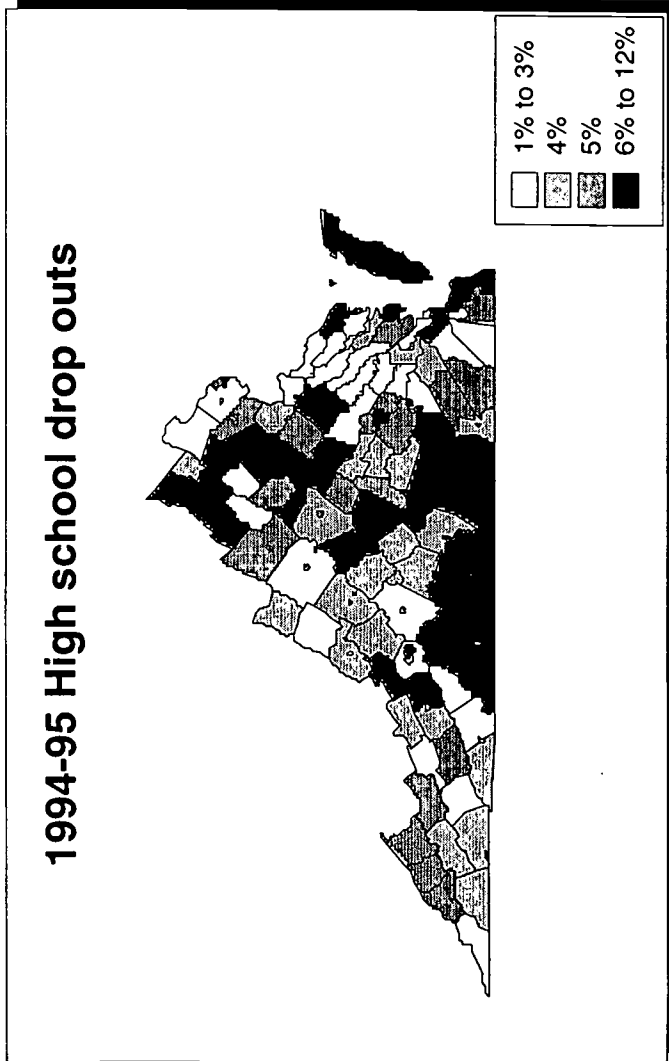
Significance: The results of criterion-referenced tests such as the Literacy Passport test in 6th grade show how well children are learning, based on 6th grade standards. Many factors including parental support, parent's level of education, class size, teacher skills, school climate, and home-school connections are linked to this benchmark. This is an important predictor of high school graduation and the ability to perform well in middle and high school.

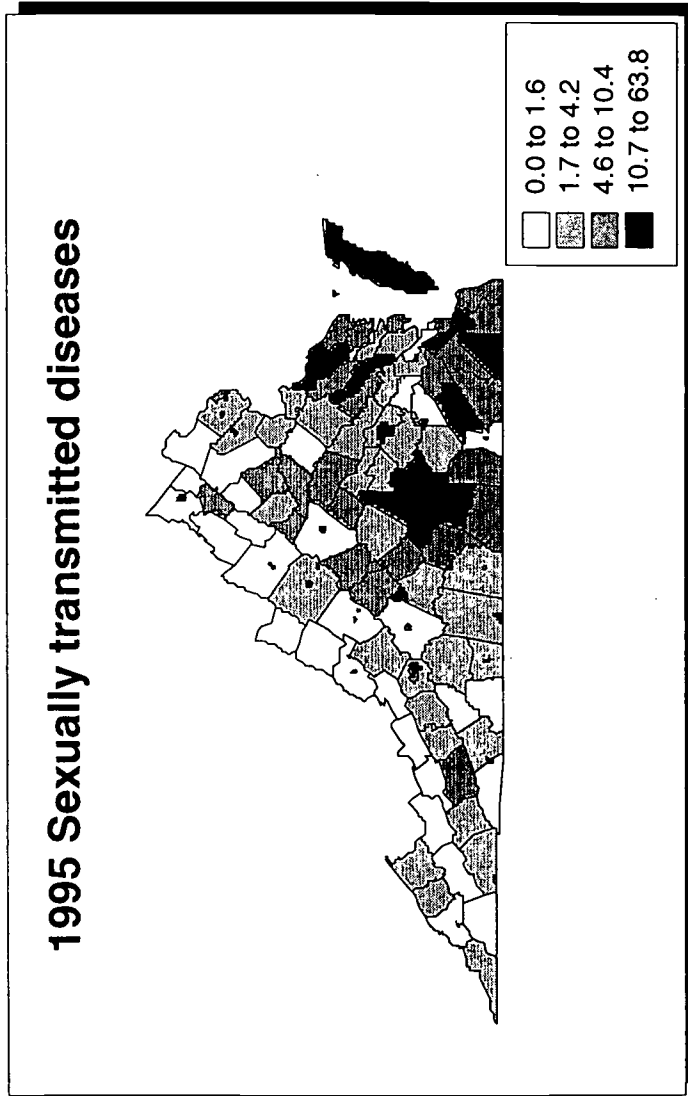
Significance: Graduating from high school is an important indicator of a community's success in educating its children. It also is an important predictor of adult success. Children who drop out of school are not well prepared to enter the labor market. They will earn significantly less than high school graduates and less than half of what college graduates earn. Factors such as school performance, poverty, alcohol or substance abuse and teen pregnancy contribute to dropping out of school. Teens who drop out of school face enormous odds. They often lose adult role models that contribute to later success. The social costs can include increased likelihood of criminal behavior, dependence on social services, unemployment, forgone income tax revenue, and poorer health.

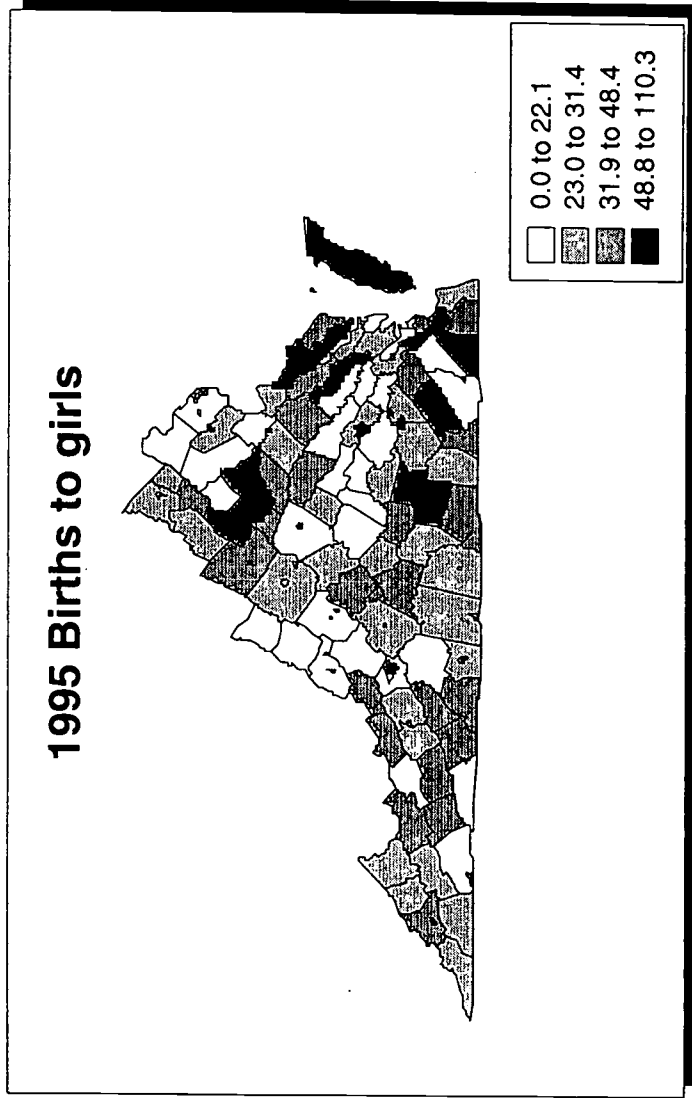
Significance: Sexually transmitted diseases indicate risky sexual behavior among teenagers. Disease is most likely to spread when sex is unprotected. Unprotected sex can lead not only to disease, but also to pregnancy. Sexually transmitted diseases, especially AIDS, can have life long and life threatening consequences.

Limitations: The rate for 1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available. Fewer than three cases are not reported by locality to enhance confidentiality.

A live birth is defined as the complete expulsion or extraction from its mother of a product of human conception, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy, which, after such expulsion or extraction, breaths or shows any other evidence of life such as beating of the heart, pulsation of the umbilical cord, or definite movement of voluntary muscles, whether or not the umbilical cord has been cut or the placenta is attached. (*Vital Statistics Laws of Virginia*, Chapter 7, Section 32.1-249.7) These data are based on a calendar year. The rate is calculated as: (all live births to girls, age 17 or younger/total population of women age 15-17)*1,000.

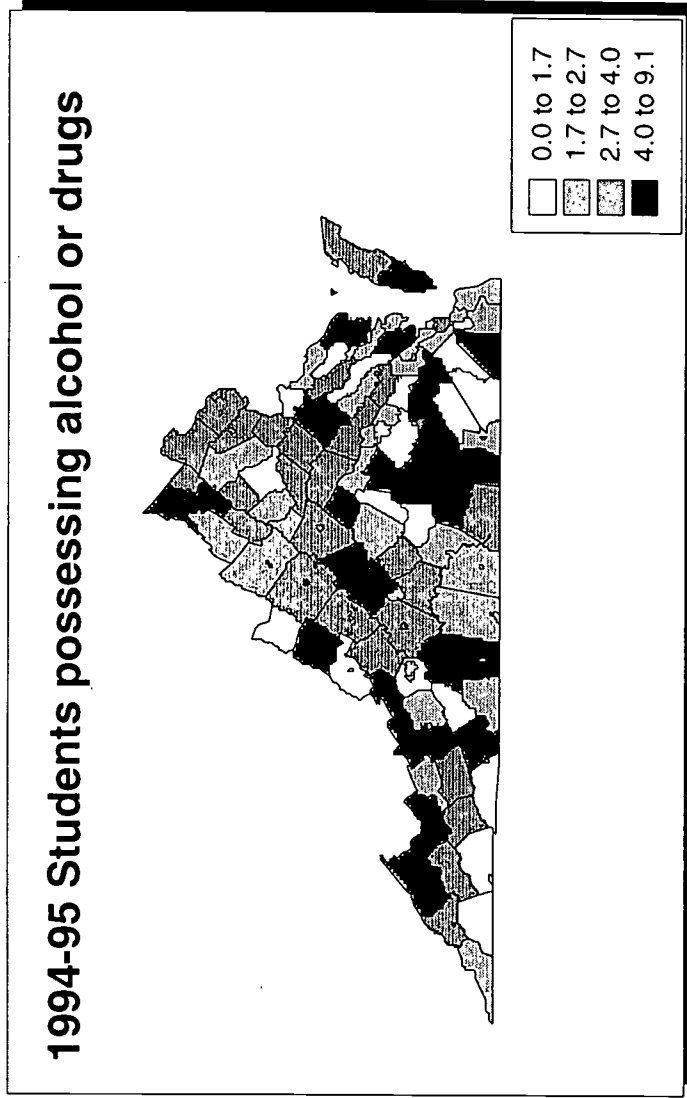
Significance: The teen birth rate is an indicator of the well-being of both babies and mothers. Babies are more likely to suffer health, economic, social and educational problems during childhood, ranging from prematurity and low birth weight to poverty and the increased chance of becoming teen parents themselves. Teen mothers experience poorer health and nutrition, more unemployment, and poverty at higher rates than women who delay motherhood. Teen mothers and their children are more likely to drop out of school, to give birth out of wedlock, to divorce or separate, and to be dependent on welfare. Factors that contribute to teen childbearing include community acceptance of teen childbearing, hopelessness, poor school performance, sexual abuse, and having been born to a teenage mother.

Limitations: Because the majority of births are to older girls, the population used in computing the rate is for girls aged 15 through 17. This rate will slightly over-estimate the actual rate since some births are to girls below the age of 15. The rate for 1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available. In 1991 there was one birth to a teenager in which the residence was unknown.

This includes the number of incidents of students found to have alcohol or a mind-altering drug, illicit drugs, illegal possession or use of prescription drugs, synthetic drugs, or anabolic steroids on their person or located within the scope of the person's control, on school property (e.g., locker, handbag, gym bag, car on school property). These data are based on a fiscal year. KIDS COUNT calculated this rate as: (the number of incidents/average daily school membership)*1,000.

Significance: Regular use of alcohol and drugs increases the likelihood of other serious negative outcomes, including juvenile delinquency, motor vehicle accidents, homicides, and suicides. Many violent behaviors and deaths involve the use of alcohol and drugs. Children using alcohol and drugs are more likely to be sexually active, become pregnant or contract sexually transmitted disease. This indicator may reflect availability of alcohol and drugs to minors and community norms that do not strongly discourage use.

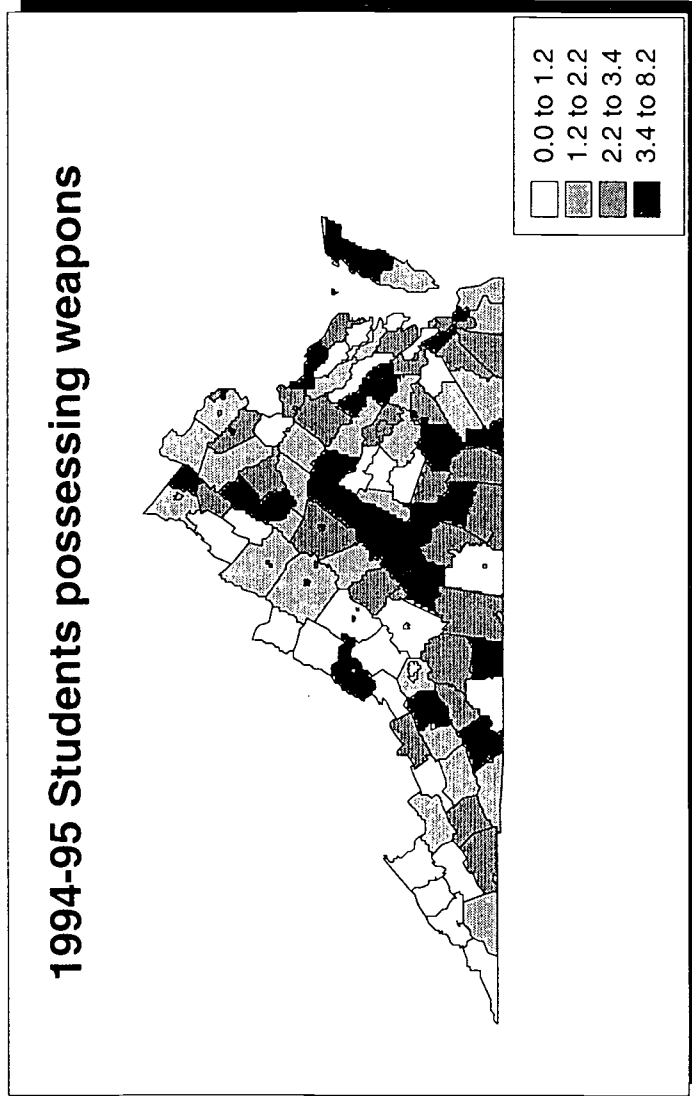

The rate of incidents of students possessing weapons in school decreased nine percent from FY1991 to FY1995. This includes the number of incidents of students found to have weapons (i.e., guns, knives, etc.) on their person or located within the scope of the person's control, on school property (e.g., locker, handbag, gym bag, car on school property). These data are based on a fiscal year. KIDS COUNT calculated this rate as: (the number of incidents/average daily school membership)*1,000.

Significance: Possessing weapons represents a serious failure by parents, schools and communities to teach youth non-violent attitudes, to restrict the availability of weapons and to promote a feeling of personal safety. An increase in guns may reflect criminal behavior, drug traffic, gangs, lack of parental supervision and norms that favor violence. Increased availability and access to guns is associated with destructive and anti-social behavior and higher violent death rates.

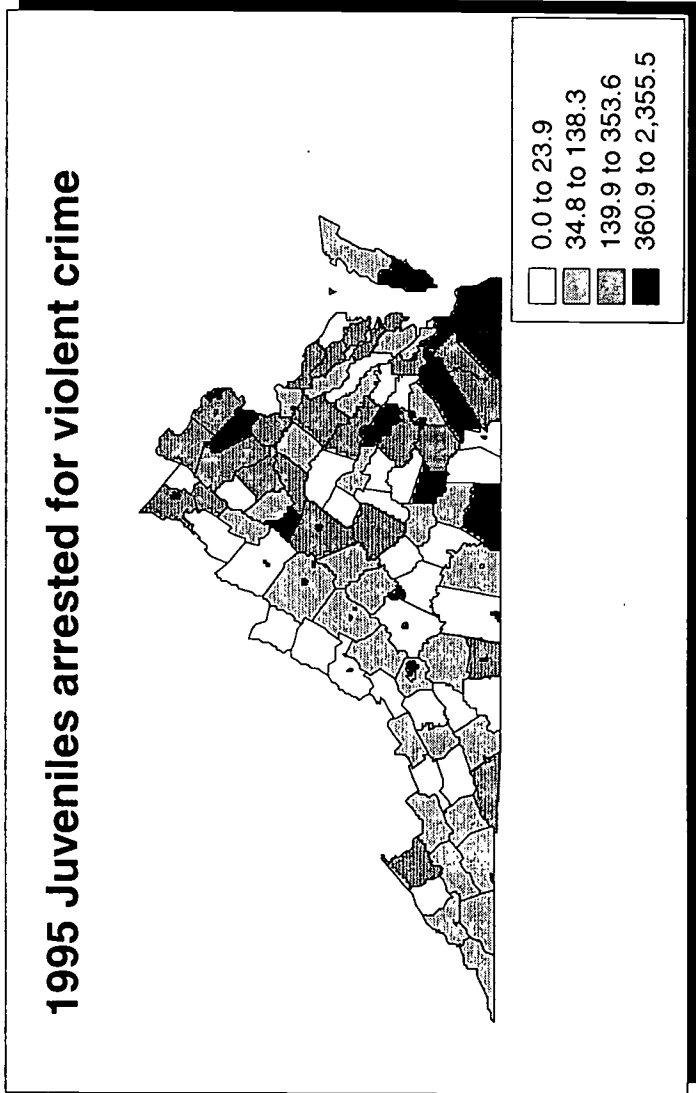

Juveniles arrested for violent crime (per 100,000, ages 12-17). The rate of juveniles arrested for violent crime increased 21.9 percent from 1991 to 1995. This item includes the total number of arrests of juveniles for murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Included are arrests of juveniles less than 18 years of age. Arrest statistics are collected monthly from contributing law enforcement agencies. Arrest figures represent the total number of arrests. One person may be arrested several times for the same or different crimes or offenses. Arrest figures cannot be compared with offense figures because several persons could be arrested for the same offense, or the arrest of one person may solve several offenses. Although law enforcement arrest policies vary, particularly with respect to juveniles, law enforcement agencies have been instructed to count one arrest each time juveniles are taken into custody for committing an offense. Juveniles are counted when arrested for an offense when the circumstances are such that if the offender were an adult, an arrest would be made. (*Crime in Virginia*, pp.68, 110-133.) These data are based on a calendar year. The rate is computed as (the number of arrests/population, ages 12-17)*100,000.

Significance: This indicator is a good measure of juveniles at high risk for continued serious delinquency and criminal behavior. Juvenile violent crime is related to the use of alcohol, drugs, and weapons by children and teenagers. The arrest rate varies as a function of criminal activity in the community. It also may reflect different levels of community tolerance and police activity. Punishment alone is not effective in reducing juvenile delinquency. There are a host of risk factors that can be influenced to reduce juvenile crime. These include school problems, anti-social peer group and neighborhood influences, family dysfunction, and individual characteristics (e.g. lack of self-regulatory abilities, substance abuse problems, etc.). These factors can be used as important early markers that more support is needed.

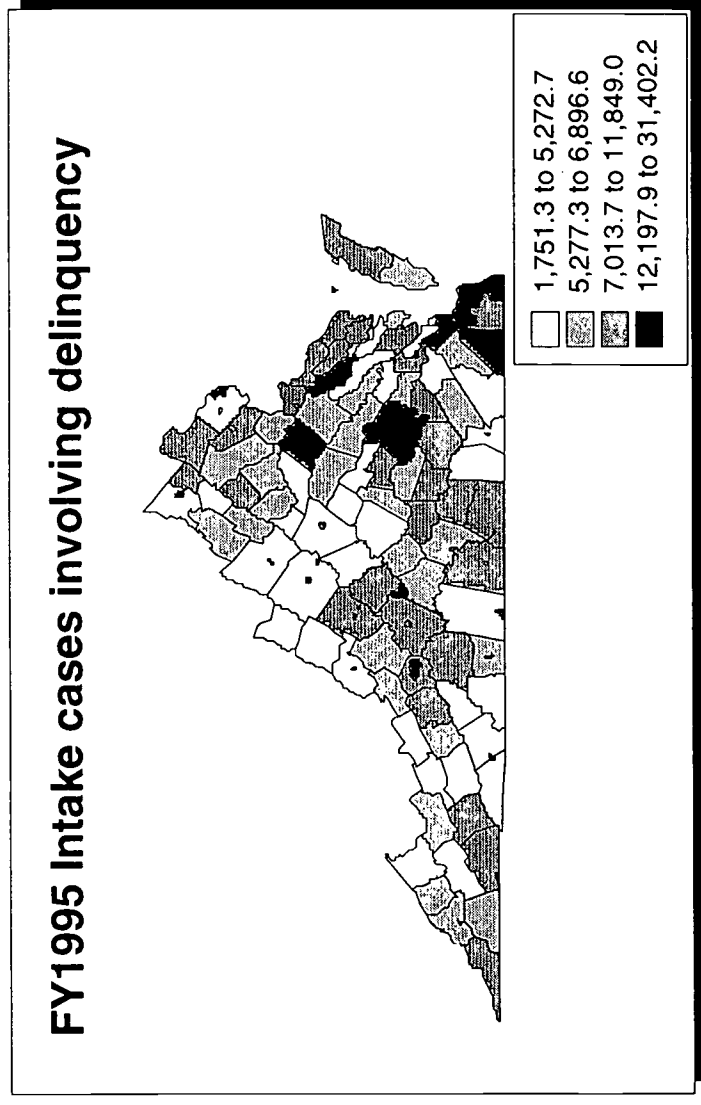
Limitations: Please note that these are *arrests*. The number of *convictions* may be substantially lower. The rate for 1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available. Arrest data include juveniles of all ages. Population data are for juveniles ages 12 - 17. Therefore the rate may be slightly over-estimated.

Total intake cases involving delinquency (per 100,000, ages 12-17). The rate of intake cases involving delinquency increased 14.2 percent from FY1991 to FY1995. This item includes the total number of cases referred to intake in a Court Service Unit for an alleged delinquency complaint. These cases may then be deemed unfounded, diverted or petitioned to court by the Court Service Intake Staff. These data are based on a fiscal year. The rate is calculated as: (the number of cases/population, ages 12-17)*100,000.

Significance: This indicator is a measure of both social behavior and social control in the community. A small proportion of juveniles commit the majority of crimes committed by juveniles. Adolescents arrested for committing a violent crime have usually been on a problematic path for sometime. Their chances for smooth transitions to productive adulthood are jeopardized. Communities must identify problems early and intervene. Juveniles at higher risk for criminal behavior can be identified using objective criteria such as: school performance, self-regulatory and problem solving skills, child abuse and/or domestic violence history, involvement with alcohol and drugs, involvement with fire arms, relatives with criminal histories, and poor family functioning.

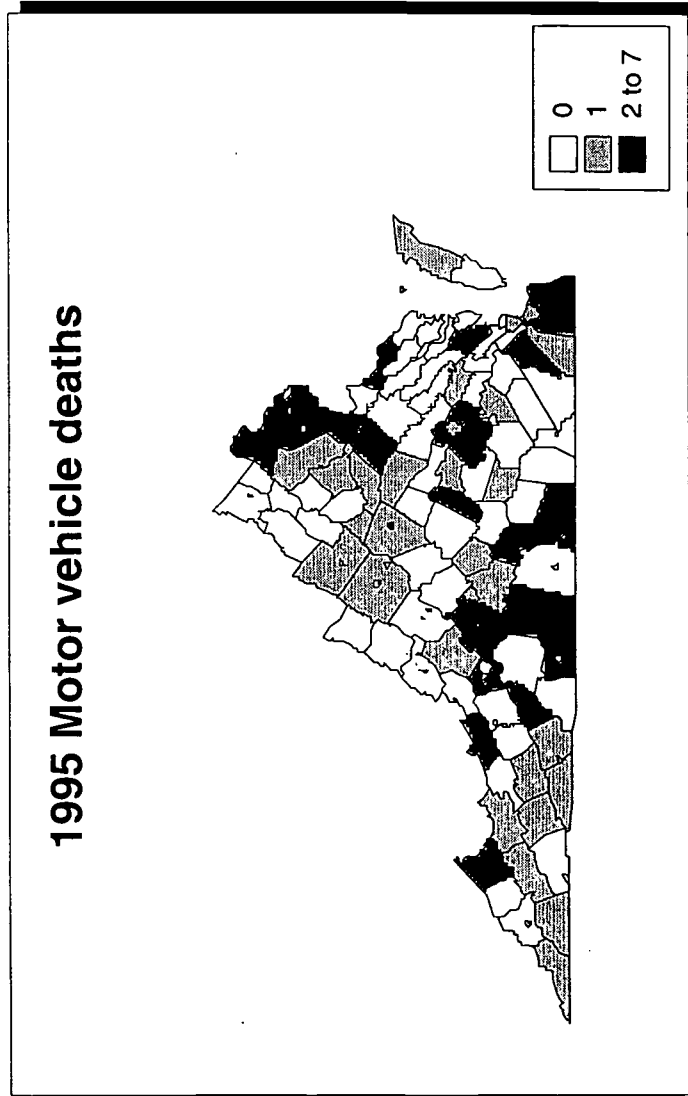
Limitations: The rate for FY1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available. Arrest data include juveniles of all ages. Population data are for juveniles ages 12 - 17. Therefore the rate may be slightly over-estimated.

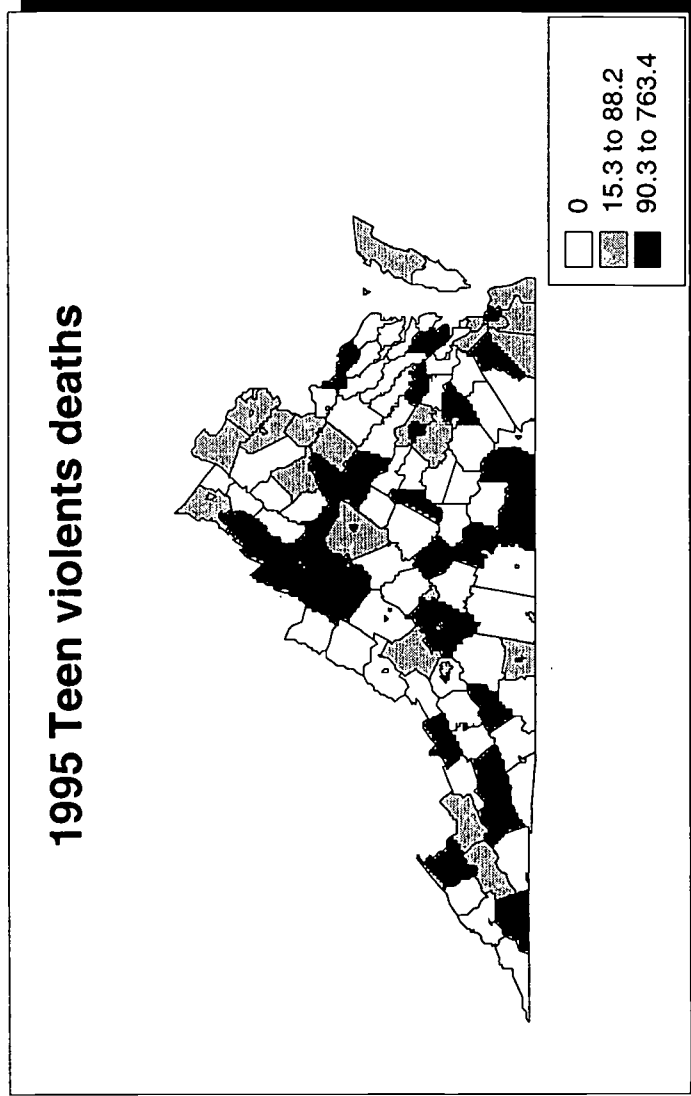
Motor vehicle deaths, ages 0-17. The number of motor vehicle deaths varies widely from year to year. This includes deaths resulting from motor vehicle traffic accidents, vehicle nontraffic accidents involving collisions with moving objects, vehicle nontraffic accidents involving collisions with stationary objects, vehicle nontraffic accidents while boarding and alighting and other unspecified vehicle nontraffic accidents.

Significance: This indicator reflects one of the largest and most significant contributors to premature death and preventable accidents for children and adolescents. It may reflect a lack of parental supervision, a general tendency for youth to engage in risky behavior, and adolescent norms that favor drinking and driving. These data are based on a calendar year. Because many localities have no motor vehicle deaths in a particular year, these data are not adjusted.

This includes deaths resulting from homicide, suicide, accident or legal intervention. (Motor vehicle deaths are included.) These data are based on calendar year. The rate is calculated as: (the number of deaths/population, ages 15 to 17)*100,000.

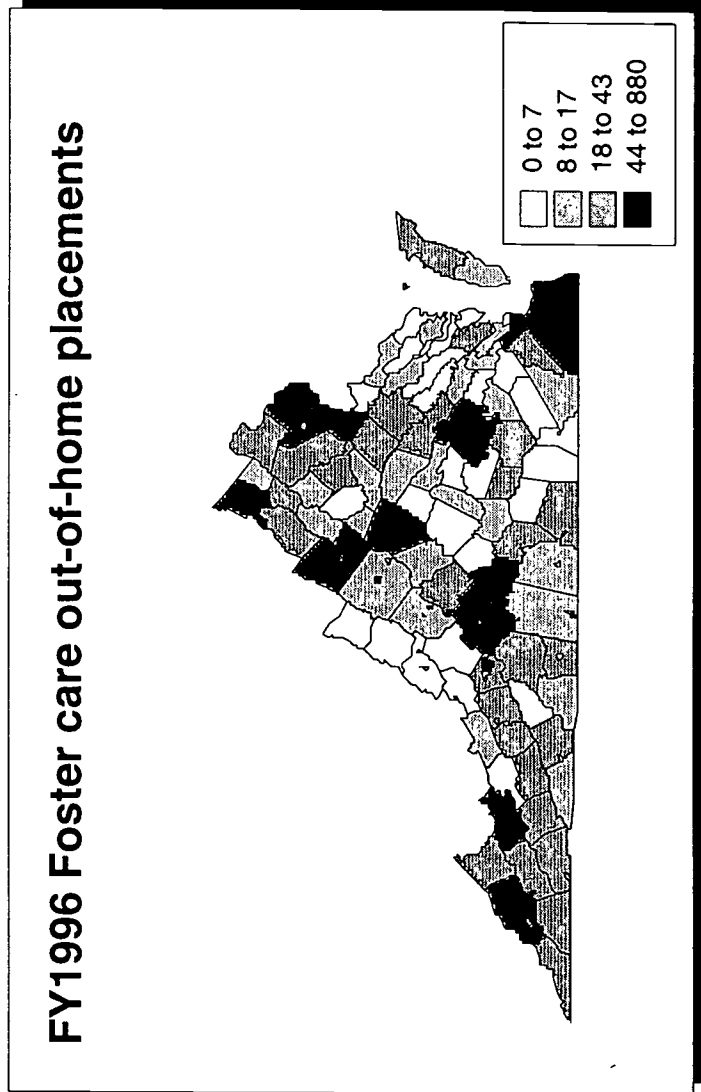
Significance: Many teens face important risks to their health and safety. Contributing factors include feelings of immortality or anger, desire to rebel, poor communication and nurturance in families, alcohol and substance abuse, access to handguns, poor education, and few educational opportunities. High violent death rates indicate the need for action and support from families and communities to minimize these risks. In addition to minimizing risk, communities also may develop programs to enhance protective factors which reduce the risk for homicide, suicide and preventable accidents.

Limitations: The rate for 1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available.

Foster care out-of-home placements. The Code of Virginia defines foster care as the provision of services or substitute care/supervision for a child:

1. who has been identified as needing services to prevent or eliminate the need for foster care placement;
2. who has been committed or entrusted to a local board of public welfare agency; or
3. placed with a local board of public welfare or public agency designated by a Community Planning and Management Team (CPMT); or
4. for whom the board of a public welfare agency has accepted supervision, in a temporary living situation, until the child can return to his or her family or be placed in a permanent foster care placement or in an adoptive home.

The number of foster care out-of-home placements increased 14.3 percent from FY1991 to FY1996. Prevention services, as defined in section one above, are not included in these data as a child is not actually removed from the home in these services. These data are based on a fiscal year.

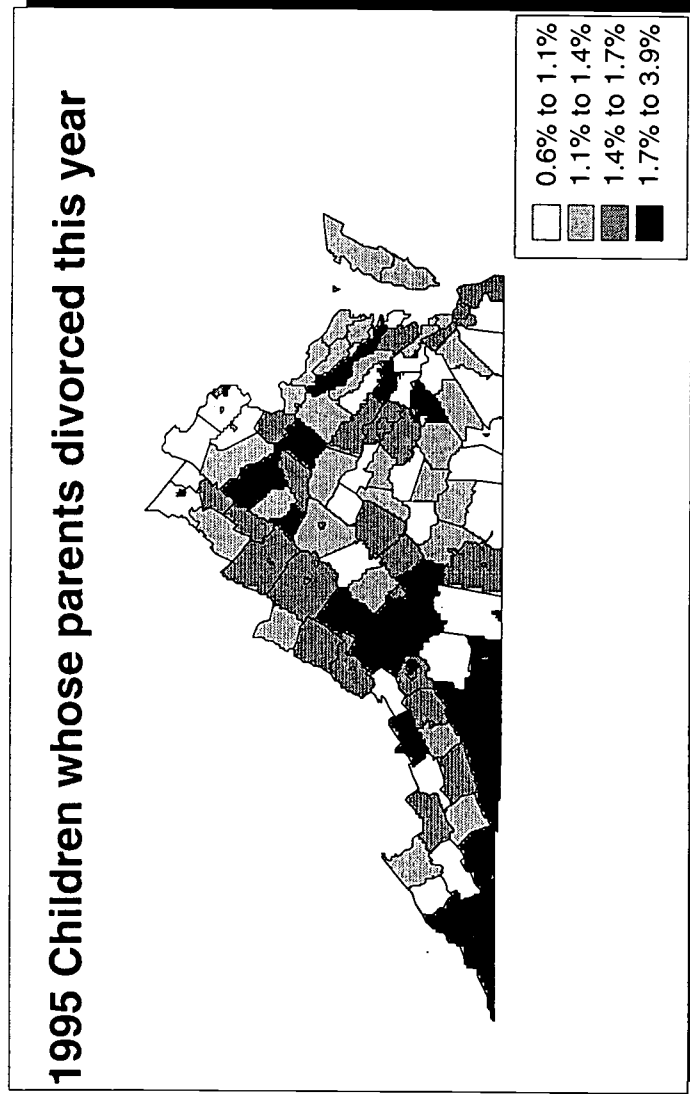
Significance: The number of children removed from their homes and placed in foster care often reflects children living under extreme stress. Family instability, poverty, crime, violence, homelessness, substance abuse, and serious illness contribute to the need to find out-of-home placements. This major life disruption and the massive adjustments it often requires (e.g. new home, new school, new friends, etc.) can be followed by depression, disruptive behavior and school adjustment problems.

(This slight increase is not apparent in the numbers below because of rounding.) This includes the number of children involved in divorces and annulments on the grounds of separation for more than one year or desertion. (Separations pending final divorce are excluded.) Locality is the reported place of divorce. These data are based on a calendar year. The percentage is calculated as: (the number of children/population, ages 0-17)*100.

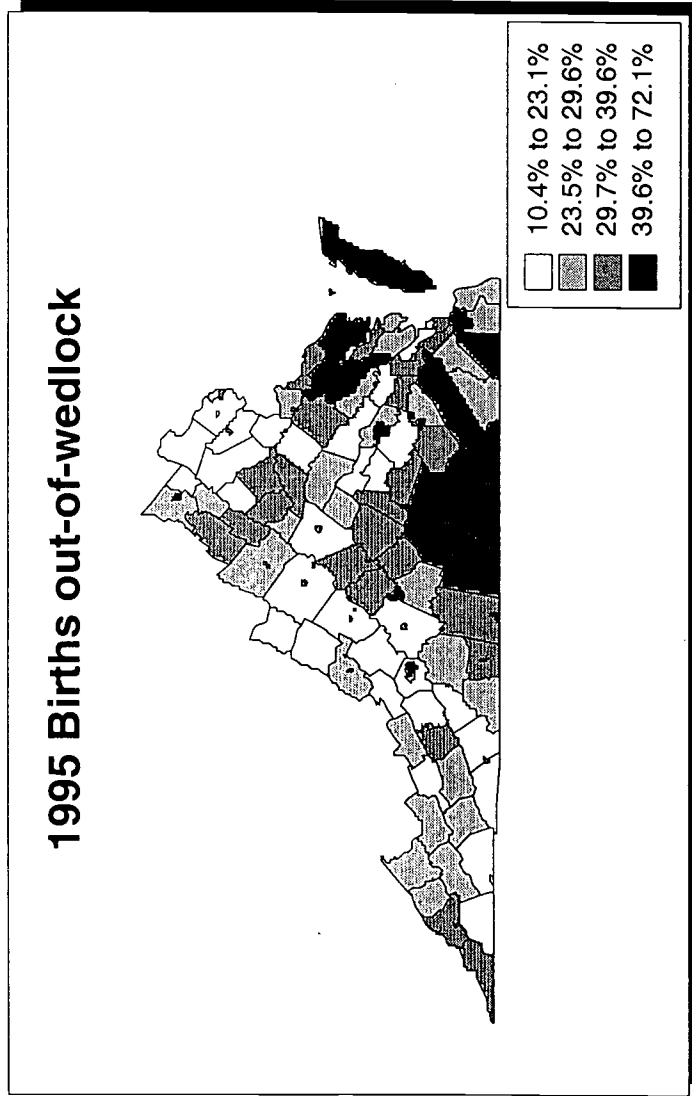
Significance: These children can develop poor self concept, have behavior problems in school, have poor interpersonal skills or develop stress induced illness. Contributing factors to these problems include lack of communication between parent and child, lack of social support for the child (outside the family), and parenting style. Parental conflict and ongoing hostility are the strongest influences on children's poor adjustment. Programs designed to provide social support can improve coping skills, increase interpersonal skills and reduce emotional withdrawal.

Limitations: The rate for 1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available.

Births out-of-wedlock. The number of births out-of wedlock increased 4.9 percent from 1991 to 1995. An out-of-wedlock birth is one which occurred to a woman who was not married to the father of the child at the time of the event and had not been married to him at any time during the preceding 10 months. These data are based on a calendar year. The percentage is calculated as: (the number of out-of-wedlock births/total number of births)*100.

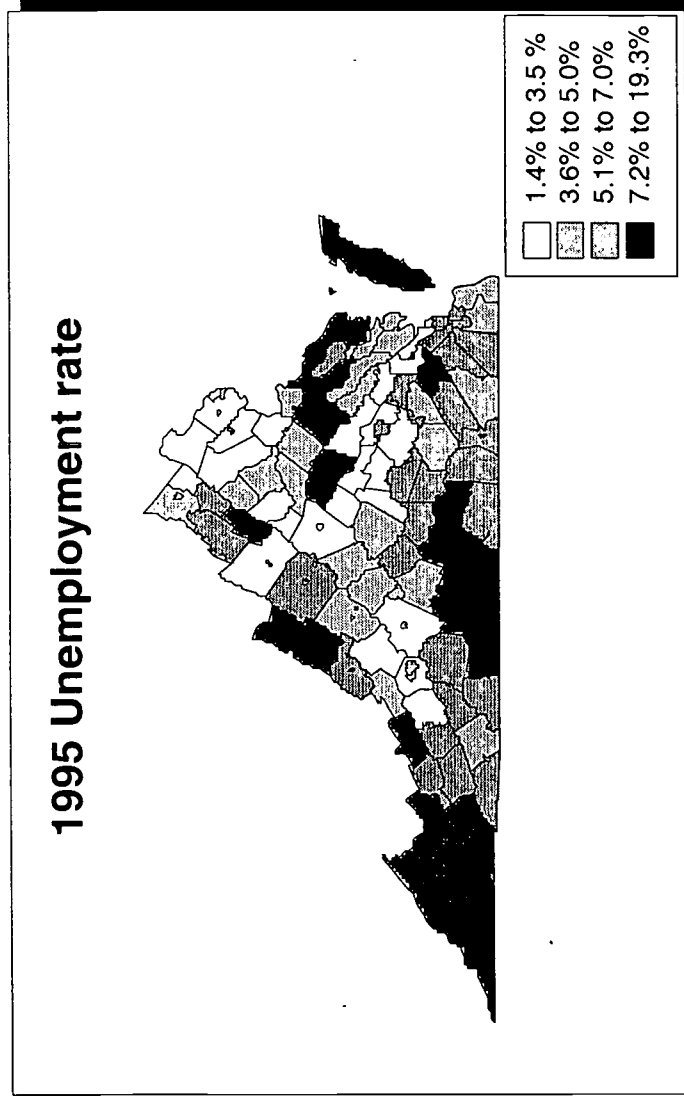
Significance: Single female parent families are much more likely to live below the poverty line than other families. Many of these families remain below the poverty line even with public assistance. Factors that can contribute to out-of-wedlock births include: a lack of information about parenting and birth control, hopelessness for the future (high incidence of teen pregnancy in a community and lack of options for the future in the community), and previous family problems. Previous family problems include a family's poor communication skills, alcohol or drug use, history of early pregnancy, single parent families and academic failure. All are often passed on generationally.

Limitations: The rate for 1995 is computed using 1994 population estimates because more recent age appropriate data are not available. In 1992 there was one birth out-of-wedlock in which the residence was unknown.

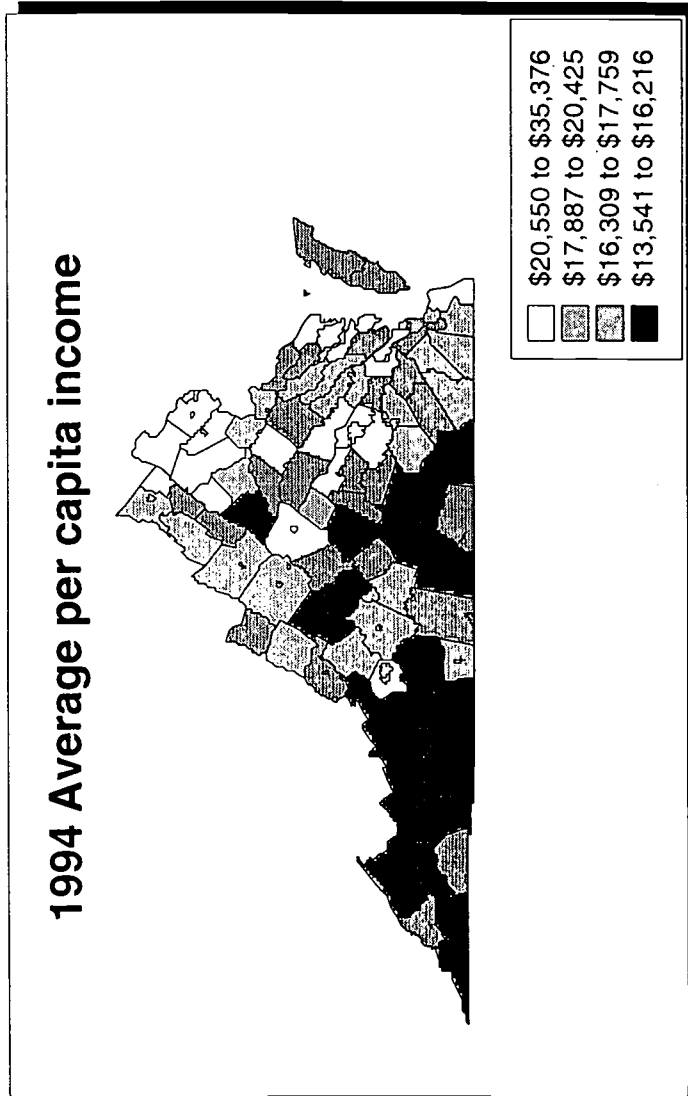
Significance: The unemployment rate is one indicator of a community's health and the opportunities available to families. High unemployment rates increase the risk for family instability, child abuse and neglect, and parental depression and conflict. It is of special significance for youth because young people who spend a large part of their young adult years unemployed have a difficult time finding and keeping a job later in life.

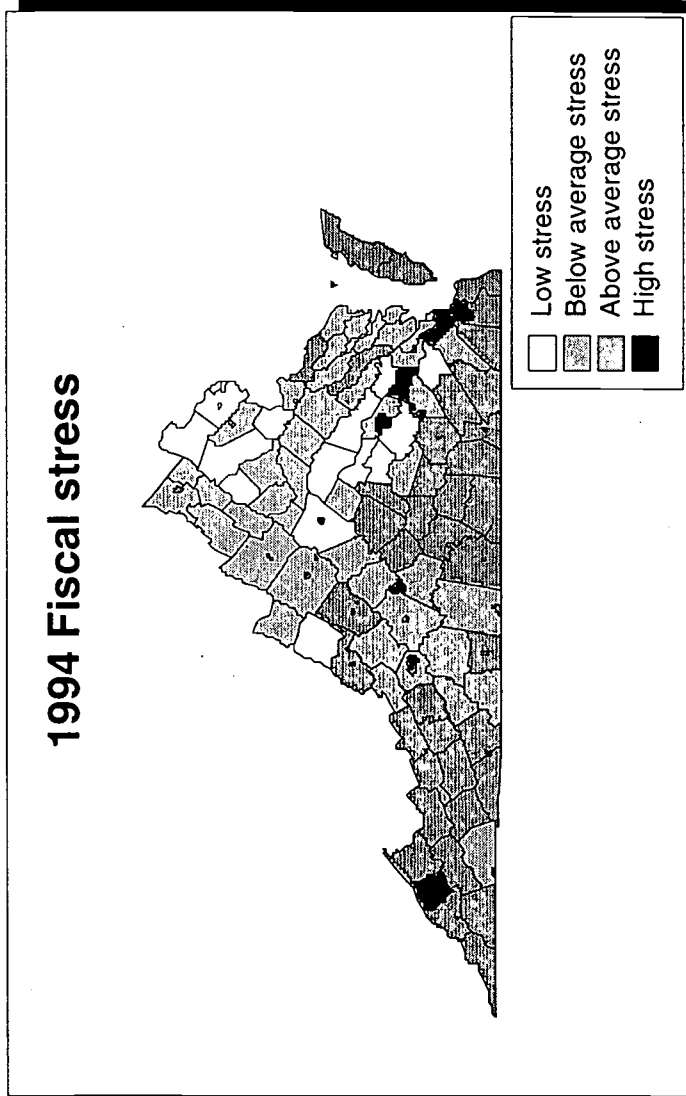
Significance: Adequate income is essential to the well-being, stability, and self-sufficiency of families. Because the family creates the fundamental environment for children, adequate family income also is essential to the well-being and development of children. Child abuse and neglect, domestic violence, alcohol and drug abuse, poor health care, poor educational attainment, inadequate housing, homelessness and crisis-filled, marginal existence threaten children who grow up in poverty. Not all poor families experience these outcomes, but poverty greatly increases the likelihood of such devastating experiences. Ending family poverty will require a balance of individual, community, and government responsibility and action.

Limitation: A weighted average was computed to estimate the average per capita income for the merger of South Boston into Halifax.

Fiscal stress level is not computed on a statewide basis.

Fiscal stress level. The Virginia Commission on Local Government computes an annual fiscal stress index of Virginia's cities and counties. Variables used in its formulas include per capita revenue capacity, revenue effort and median adjusted gross income. These variables, and their associated rankings, characterize the overall fiscal well-being of a locality. The revenue capacity addresses a locality's ability to generate revenue through taxes and other levies. It is a measure of the locality's affluence. Revenue effort is the ratio of the locality's potential revenue (capacity) to its actual collections. The formulas produce a fiscal stress score, which is then ranked. For 1994, localities were considered to be in high stress with scores of 174.70 to 184.67, in above average stress with scores of 165.00 to 174.69, in below average stress with scores of 155.30 to 164.99, and in low stress with scores of 126.79 to 155.29. These indicators and the fiscal stress index not only can describe a locality. They also are used in various state funding allocation formulas. These data are based on a calendar year.

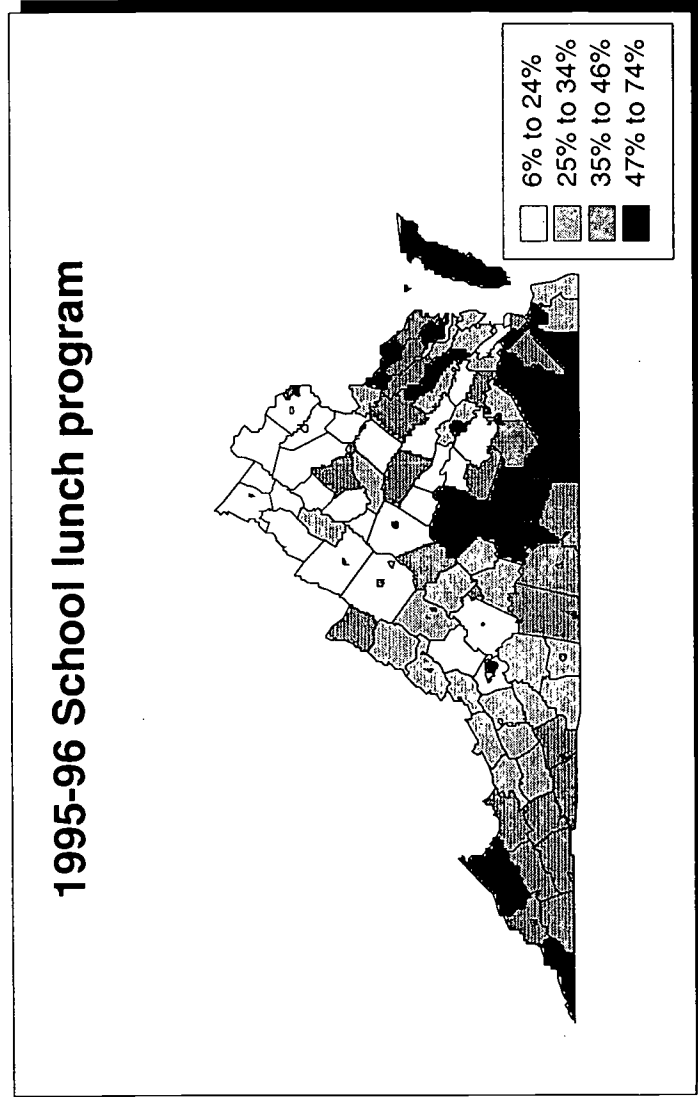
Significance: When a locality is under fiscal stress, it is less likely to have the resources to provide programs and supports that many children and families need. Ironically, since the median adjusted gross income is part of its formula, it also may indicate a higher need for services and supports because of lower incomes.

Limitation: A weighted average was computed to estimate the fiscal stress level for the merger of South Boston into Halifax.

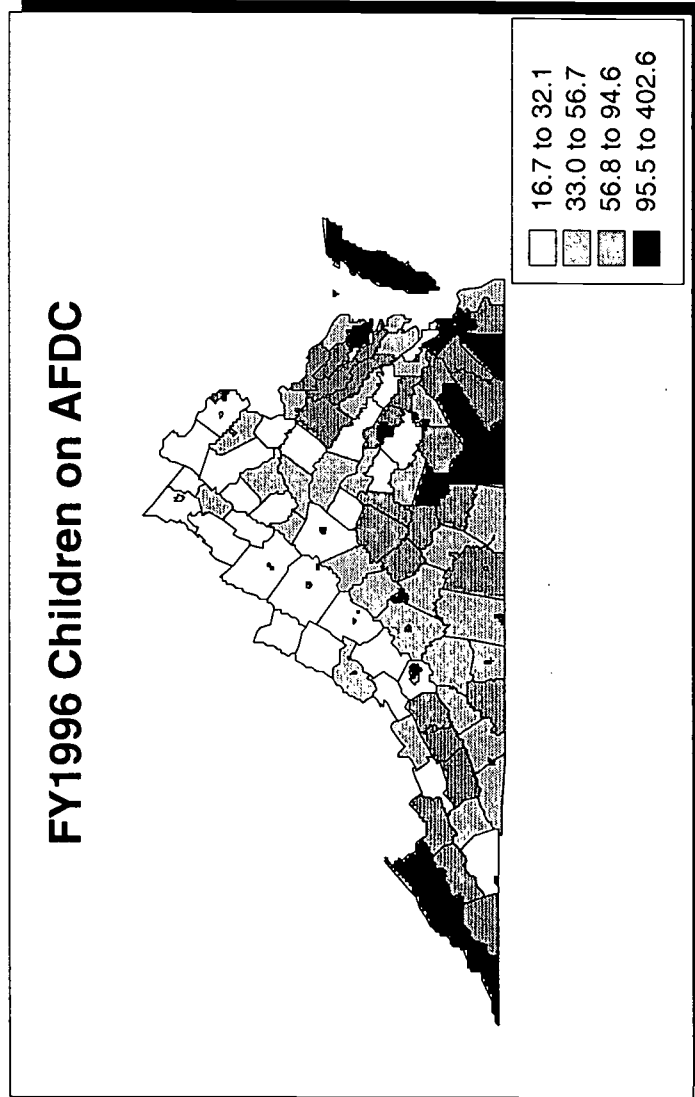
Significance: Although free or reduced school meal eligibility standards are slightly above the poverty line, this is one of the best indicators for the percent of children in poverty. Poverty is linked to almost every major problem that children face. The children who qualify for this program are more likely to live in families where there is not enough money to purchase a balanced diet that ensures proper nutrition for growing children.

Children receiving AFDC, ages 0-17 (per 1,000 children). The rate of children receiving AFDC increased 2.1 percent from FY1991 to FY1996. This indicator shows the rate of the monthly average number of children receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) payments. AFDC is a federally mandated program authorized under Title IVA of the US Social Security Act and Title 63.1 of the Code of Virginia. Its purpose is to provide cash assistance to needy families with children, who are deprived of the support and care of at least one parent, to cover the costs of food, shelter, clothing and other daily living needs recognized as necessary by the State. People requesting assistance may apply to local social services departments and may receive support until they no longer meet the eligibility requirements of the State.

Both Virginia's Welfare Reform Initiative (Virginia Independence Program), which began phased-in implementation in July 1995, and Federal Welfare Reform, which will be implemented in 1997, will significantly modify the AFDC program eligibility requirement. Most notable changes include stringent work requirements, a cap prohibiting additional assistance for children born after the family begins assistance and a two-year eligibility time limitation.

These data are based on a fiscal year. The rate is calculated as: (children receiving AFDC/population, ages 0-17)*1,000.

Significance: Children receiving AFDC are the poorest of poor children. Although poverty is a risk factor for many problems, children who live in extreme poverty are more likely to have health problems at birth, lack health care as they grow, have limited educational opportunities and live in inadequate housing or dangerous neighborhoods.

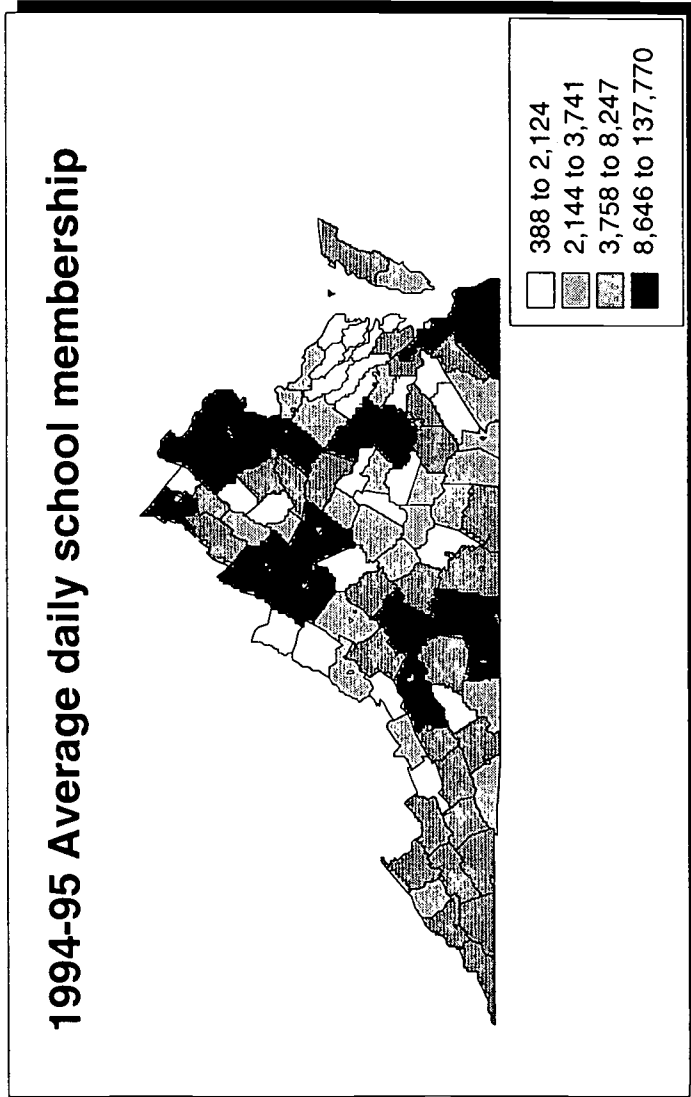

This includes all students whose educational services are paid by the school district, even if the students are in alternative education, special education, or other placements physically outside of the school district. The average daily membership is determined by dividing the sum of the days present and absent of all pupils when school is in session during a given period by the number of days school is in session during this period. These data are based on a fiscal year.

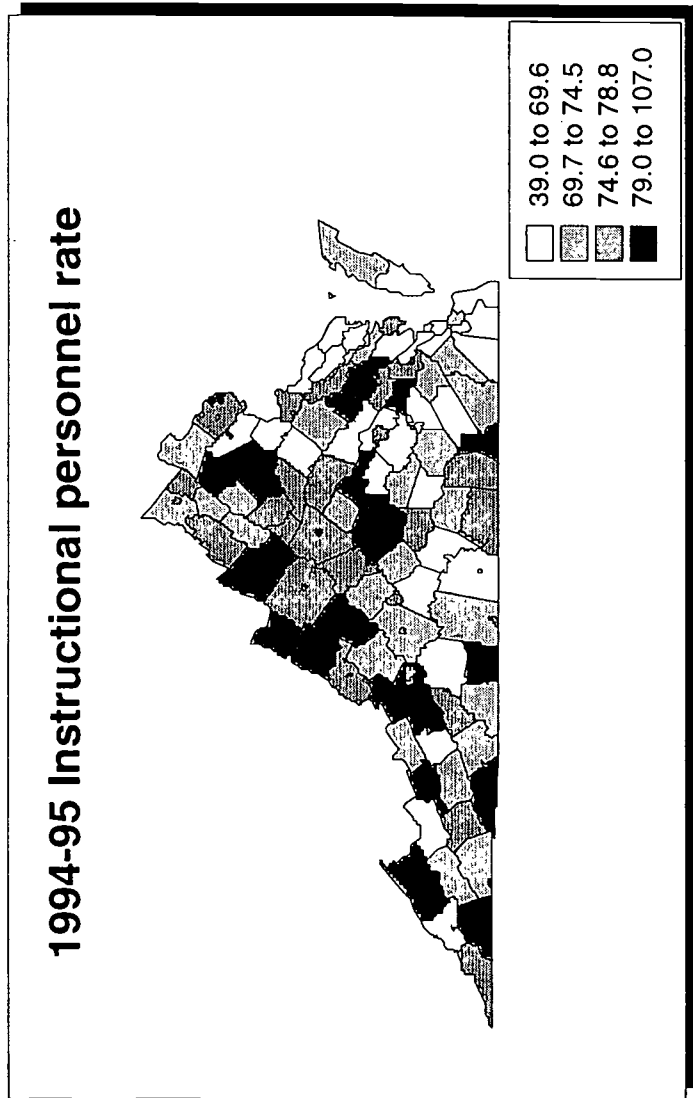
Significance: This measure shows the number of children in a community who attend public school or receive services paid for with public funding. The Virginia Council for Private Education estimates that around 70,000 students in Virginia attend private schools.

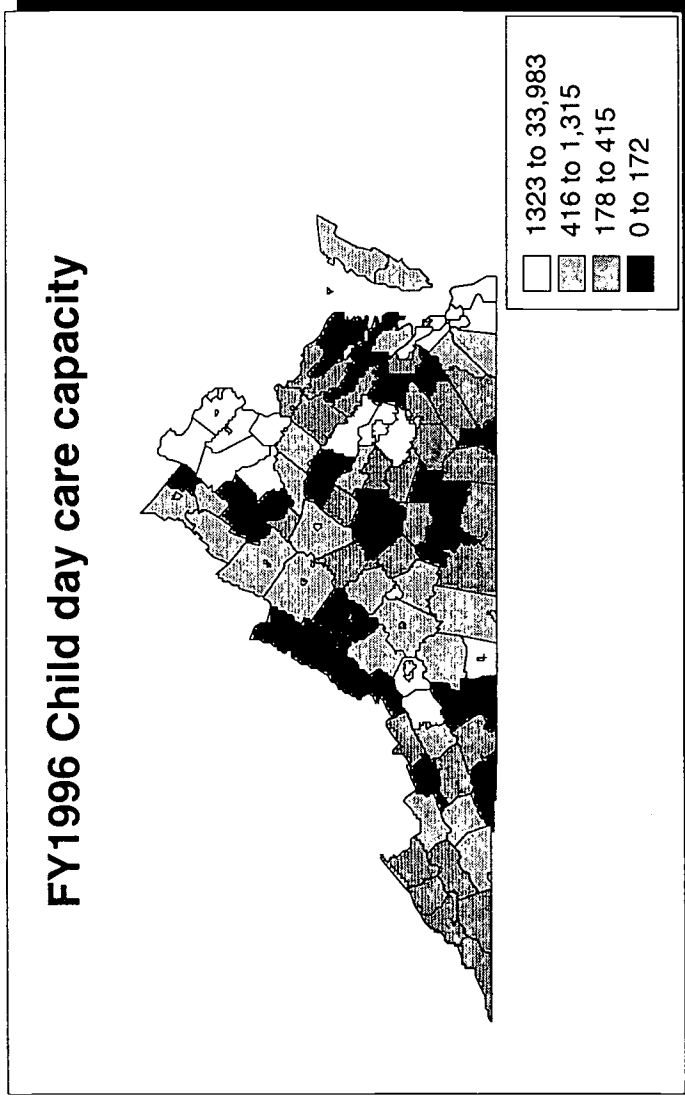

Child day care capacity. Licensed day care slots increased eight percent from 1995 to 1996. This item represents the total number of slots available in all four categories of day care licensed by the Virginia Department of Social Services. These types of day care are:

- Child day center capacity. The total number of slots available in licensed day centers or those that have applied for and are awaiting approval.
- Family day home capacity. The total number of slots available in family homes or those that have applied for and are awaiting approval. Family day homes include private homes in which one through twelve children under the age of 13 are provided care (exclusive of the providers own children and any children who reside in the home).
- Exempt child care capacity. The total number of slots available in religious exempt day care facilities.
- Short-term child day center capacity. The total number of slots available in licensed short-term child day centers or those that have applied for and are awaiting approval. These programs, which include after school programs, may not operate year round.

Effective July 1, 1996 licenses are required for family day home providers who supervise six through twelve children. Providers who care for more than four children under the age of two they must be licensed or voluntarily registered. From July 1, 1993 through June 30, 1996, licenses were required for family day home providers who supervised nine through twelve children. In addition to state licensed day care, Alexandria, Arlington, Fairfax City and County require permits under local ordinance for providers who supervise fewer than five children. The table below shows the number of permitted providers in the Alexandria and Fairfax localities. It is important to note that all localities have day care available that is not licensed or permitted. These data are point-in-time data.

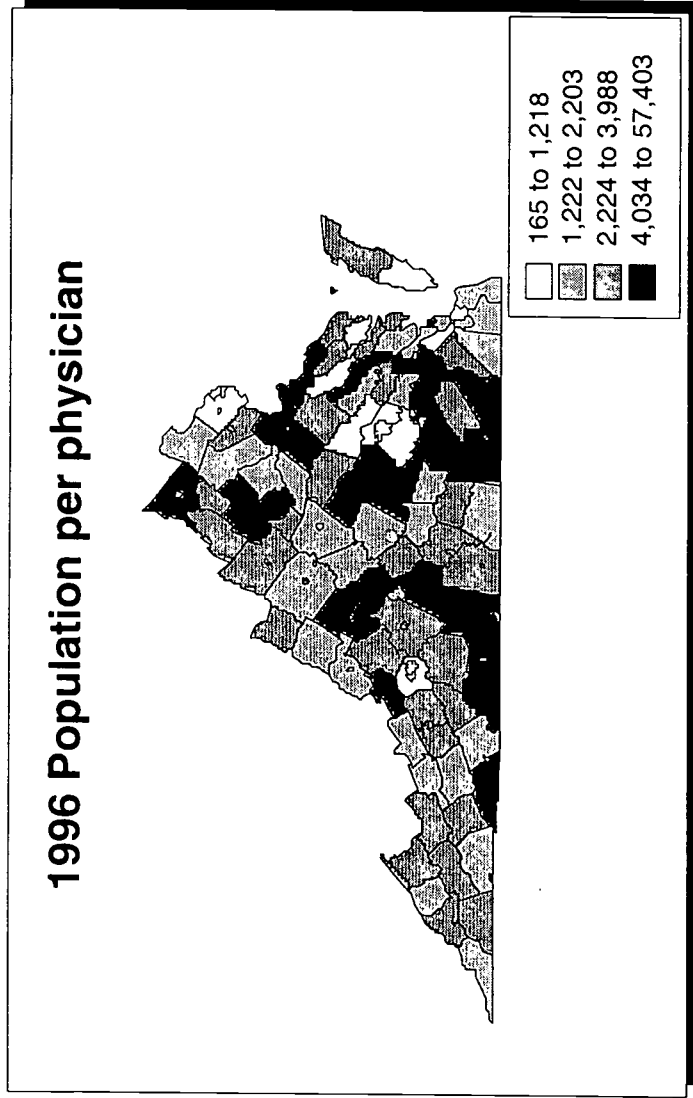
Significance: The United States is suffering from a shortage of affordable child care. Families living at the poverty level often spend up to 25% of their income on child care. This compares with a national average of six percent. A lack of affordable day care affects a parent's job opportunities. It limits a child's chance of being in an environment that is conducive to learning in their early childhood years. This correlates with later school achievement. Economic and social inequalities are reinforced by an absence of day care and the parent's employment.

Population per physician. This shows the number of physicians per person based on the population in a given county or independent city. These data are based on a calendar year.

Significance: All citizens need medical services. Medical services are critically important for expectant mothers and for children throughout their development. Difficulty obtaining a physician may lead to decreased emphasis on important preventative care such as prenatal care and immunizations. It also may result in an over-reliance on expensive emergency room services. Low ratios become particularly problematic when they are combined with a lack of transportation and long distances to travel.

Limitations: Data are best estimates.
