ABSTRACT

Key resources are listed that provide statistical information on youth, mental health, education, and related fields. Many of the references are to Web sites with current statistical reports. The advantage to this form of reporting is that the most recent information is available quickly. The topics covered give a broad perspective on youth, their problems, and systems designed to assist them. Nearly all of the Web sites listed have links to other sites with a similar focus. 




