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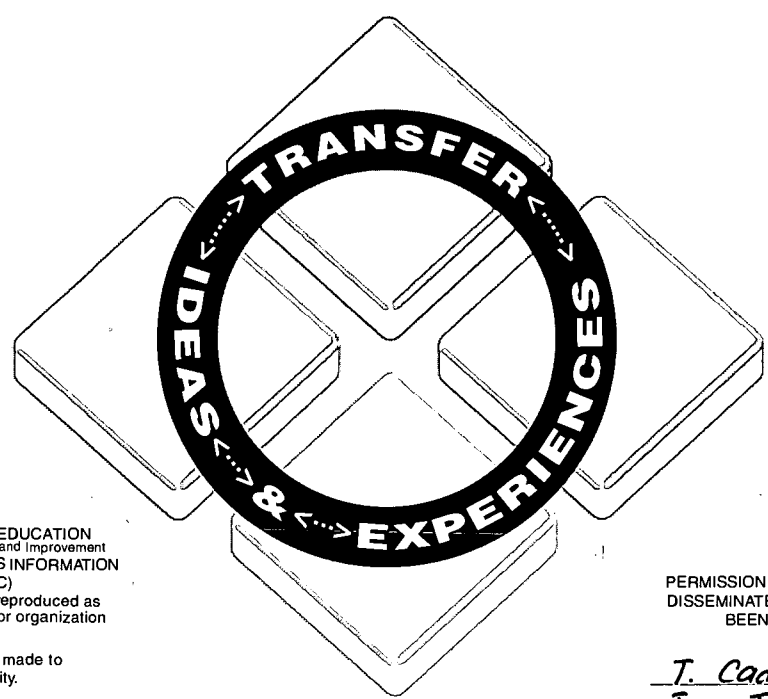
ABSTRACT

The technical assistance guide is divided into three categories: United States government, private sector, and civic organizations. The organizations listed in this guide provide technical assistance to help communities across the country reduce substance abuse through prevention, treatment, law enforcement, and economic development strategies. The section on U.S. government resources lists 39 public organizations and agencies that provide technical assistance to help fight substance abuse and other problems. These include the Safe and Drug Free Schools Program of the Office of Elementary and Secondary Education of the U.S. Department of Education. In the private sector, 23 agencies are listed that are not funded by the government. The section on civic organizations lists 13 community organizations that do not have substance abuse as their primary mission, but do support initiatives that often go hand in hand with those of substance abuse prevention groups. Many of these initiatives are educational in nature. A "Request for Services" form is included to assist communities in identifying their needs when asking for technical assistance. (SLD)

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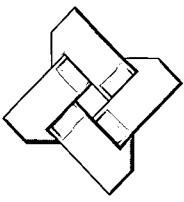

This Technical Assistance Guide is a second edition of information on public, private and civic organizations available to assist you with prevention, treatment, law enforcement, and economic development strategies in your communities. The resources listed can help individuals and communities to collaborate, and to develop new alliances and find creative solutions to address substance abuse and its associated problems.

The Join Together Technical Assistance Guide is designed to help you navigate through the maze of national resources available to strengthen community-wide strategies targeting substance abuse.

Technical Assistance can be provided by telephone, on-site, on-line, by private and peer to peer consultation, and by written material and training.

Obtaining Technical Assistance

Use this guide to help determine the type of assistance you need. Once you have located the provider or entity that seems appropriate to help you, question their experience in working with communities whose demographics and goals are similar to yours. Remember, it is just as important that technical assistance build upon your strengths as it is to address weaknesses.

Preparation is important before requesting technical assistance. Begin with your goals in mind. Here are some questions to consider:

- What are your objectives?
- What is the timeline?
- What is the process for requesting technical assistance? Is there any cost ?
- Do you have any input in determining who will fill your request?
- What tasks or obligations are required of the recipient?

Some points to discuss when requesting technical assistance:

- Your target population (age, economic status, education status, employment, size, etc.)
- Your total community (city or county demographics, major employers, number of school districts, etc.)
- Your technical assistance priorities, three is a good number
- Partners or allies
- Your funding source(s)
- Major resources in your community - private and public sector
- Barriers to your success - private and public sector
