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ABSTRACT

Louisiana's School-Based Health Center (SBHC) Program, the Adolescent School Health Initiative, has reached its fifth year of full program implementation. This report aims to educate community leaders, service providers, and the general public on the variety of roles SBHCs perform and the contribution they make to the health and well-being of the state's youth. Section 1, "Program Highlights & Overview," details the history of the program and how it has expanded from 5 sites in 1993 to 30 sites that serve 65 schools in 14 parishes. In addition, this section discusses the collaborative efforts that have emphasized coordinated school health programs, continuous quality improvement, and intergovernmental cooperation. 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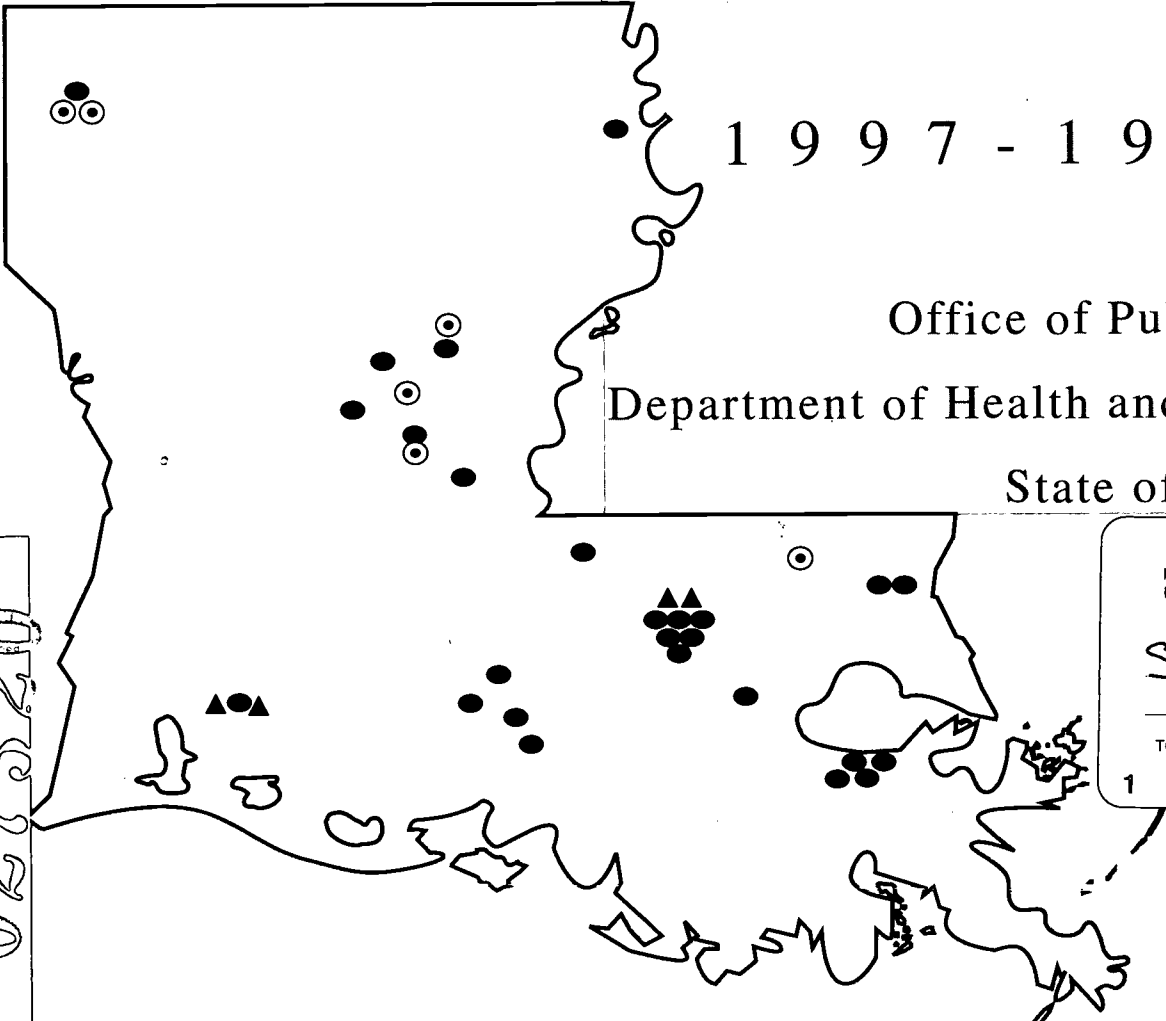

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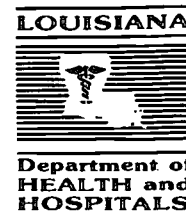

Dear Citizens of Louisiana:

Since passage of the law fostering the establishment of school-based health centers in Louisiana in 1991, we have seen this program grow from four to over thirty sites around the state. We have also seen a shift from serving primarily urban students to serving those in rural areas where access to health services may be more difficult. We have seen an expansion from middle and high school locations to elementary school sites. Many centers now serve more than one school. Creative transportation arrangements and mobile services give health care access to more children.

A turning point for the program occurred in 1997 when the Governor established a Task Force on School Based Health Centers to determine whether such facilities were needed and whether they were adhering to the law. After much deliberation, it became clear these centers were meeting comprehensive health needs for underserved children and youth and were in compliance with the law. Lawmakers visited sites in their districts and saw for themselves that this program is a benefit for the preventive health care system, the education system and the citizens of Louisiana.

In the recently concluded Regular Session of the Legislature, when a \$600,000 state general fund appropriation was added to existing state funding, it became clear that school-based health centers are widely supported in the State of Louisiana. They are a proven way to effectively provide primary and preventive, physical and mental health care and they will help us to achieve improvement in both health and learning for our children and youth.

We congratulate the Office of Public Health and its many state and local partner agencies. Furthermore, we look forward to the involvement of school-based health centers in helping to expand access to health care coverage for uninsured children through the Louisiana Child Health Insurance Program (LaCHIP) to be administered by DHH through Medicaid.

The Department of Health and Hospitals wishes all of our citizens a healthy and successful 1998-99.

As the SBHCs serve ever increasing numbers of Louisiana's youth, the service providers, center sponsors and central office staff continue to improve the quality of the services as well as the number of ways to serve students, their families and their communities.

Delivering physical and mental health services to adolescents in a changing health care environment is ever more compelling, challenging and educational. Every day we learn better ways to improve the quality, not only of our services, but also of how we portray what we do through our communications among ourselves and with others. Our goal in publishing this report is to educate community leaders, service providers and the general public at the local, state and national levels on the variety of roles SBHCs perform and the immense contribution they make to the health and well-being of our youth.

*Section One, Program Highlights & Overview*, details the history of the program and how it has expanded from 5 sites in 1993 to 30 sites this year that serve 65 schools in 14 parishes. 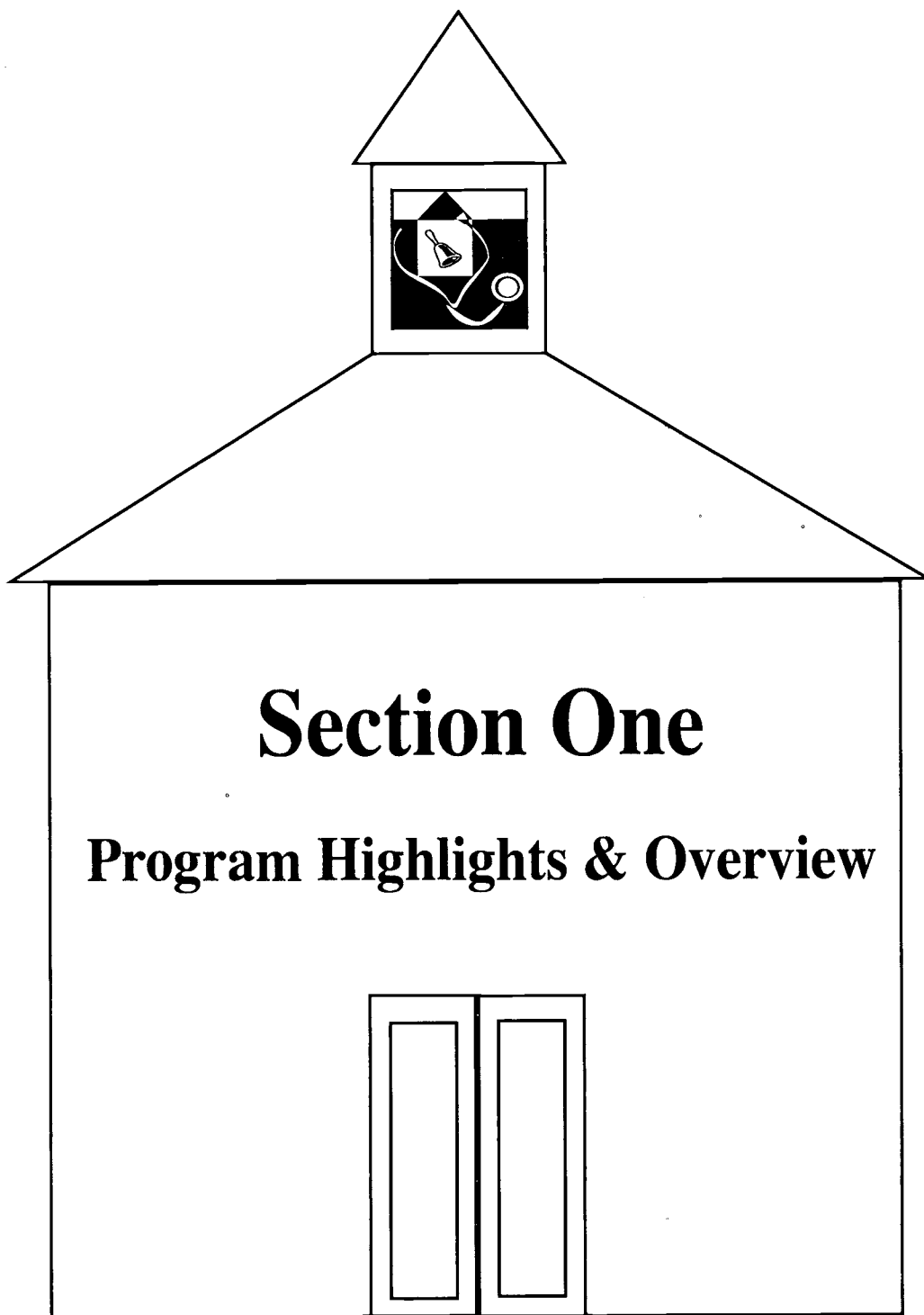

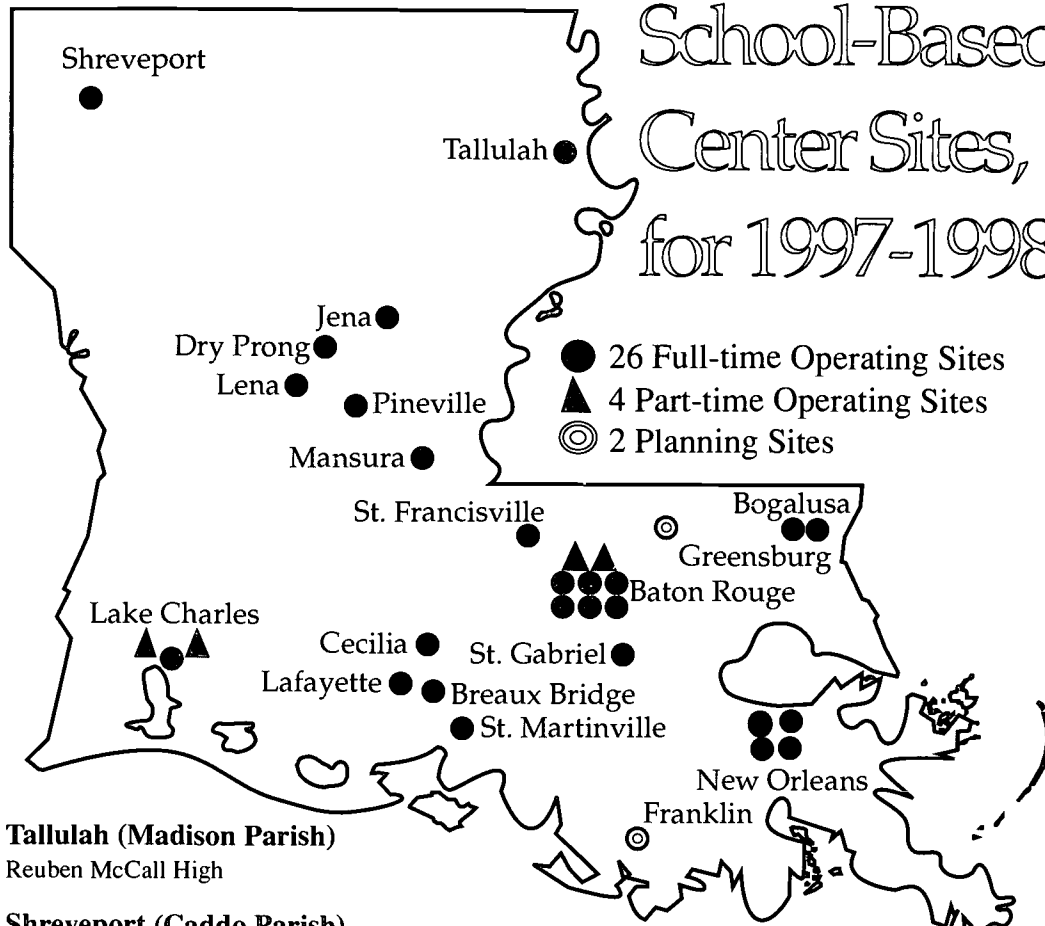

## Highlights of 1997-98

Along with its extensive expansion of sites in 1997-98, the school-based health centers emphasized improved services and accountability.

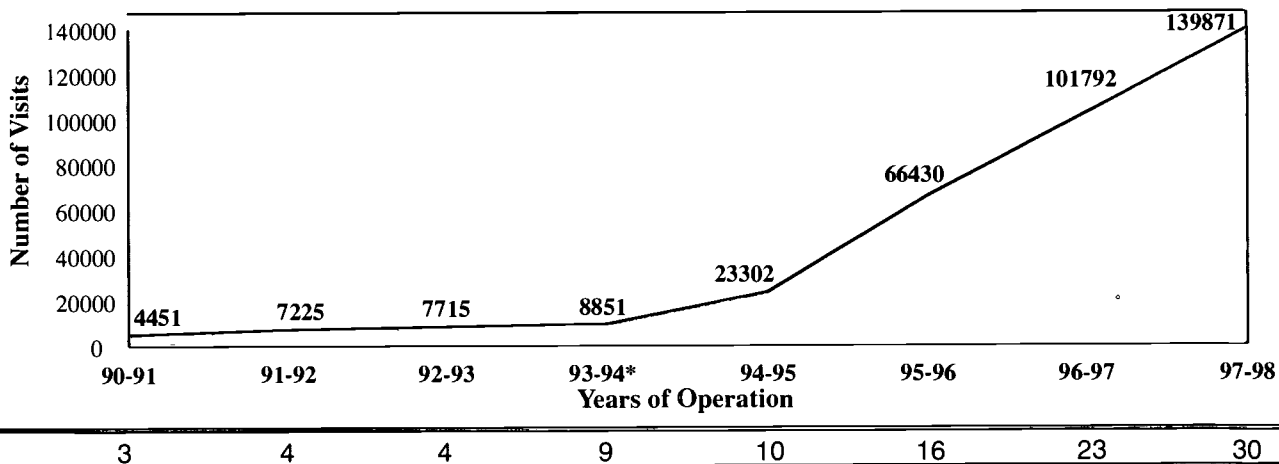
- **Program Expansion:** New sites opened in Baton Rouge, Bogalusa, Lake Charles and Jena bringing the total number of health centers in Louisiana schools to 30 sites serving 65 schools located in 14 parishes.
- **Student Enrollment:** The purpose of SBHCs is to afford health care access to under-served school children. The data in this report shows that 71% of students enrolled in schools with health centers obtained parental consent and registered for services, and 74% of registrants received services at school health centers.
- **Improving Services Offered and Delivered:** SBHC Network initiated a new encounter reporting system to develop data that will enable the centers to better address the needs of its student population and to receive reimbursement for eligible visits. The program anticipates that the expansion of Child Health Insurance under LaCHIP will facilitate reimbursement for services to Medicaid-enrolled students.
- **Implementing Continuous Quality Improvement:** Implementation of the Continuous Quality Improvement Program began in East Baton Rouge and St. Martin Parish SBHCs where a total of seven sites were reviewed. Follow-up on recommendations of the site visit team, composed of physicians, nurse practitioners, mental health professionals and administrators, is the responsibility of OPH program staff. - **Increased Funding from Legislature:** The high point of the year occurred when the Legislature approved an increase in state appropriation for the program. The new funds will allow six new sites to open centers in 1998-99, and give operating sites the means to hire additional medical, nursing and mental health staff, purchase health education materials and provide transportation.
- **Psychosocial Counseling Services made possible through Intergovernmental Coordinating Council:** Collaboration among the Offices of Public Health, Mental Health and Alcohol and Substance Abuse through the Intergovernmental Coordinating Council has resulted in joint funding of a mental health professional position at Lawless SBHC in Region I, New Orleans. Successful implementation of this pilot has the potential to be replicated in other regions. (See Intergovernmental Coordinating Council, page 13.)
- **Cadre of Trainers organized in collaboration with Southeastern Louisiana University:** To enhance school health and school health services, highly skilled instructors have been identified and will provide in-service training to teachers on educational programs shown to reduce risky behaviors among youth. (See Collaboration with Southeastern Louisiana University, page 16.)

School-based health centers, their sponsoring agencies and community partners are to be congratulated for conducting programs that not only respond to students' needs, but also make positive contributions to the health of their communities.

## Louisiana Standards for School-Based Health Centers

### Primary Goal

To provide convenient access to primary and preventive care for students who might otherwise have limited or no access to health care. To meet the physical and emotional health needs of adolescents at their school site.

### Community Participation

All health centers must originate as a community initiative. State funding is dependent upon evidence of broad community participation in the planning process and on the center's Community Advisory Committee, including parents, students, civic, business and religious leaders.

### Sponsoring Agency

The sponsoring agency shall be a non-profit public or private institution locally suited and fiscally viable to administer and operate a health center serving the needs of adolescents (i.e., health center, hospital, medical school, health department, youth serving agency, school or school system). Non-medical agencies must contract the medical component with a qualified medical provider; the medical providing agency must have a formal agreement with the host school district. The preparation of the physical site and provision of cost of continued utilities and maintenance of the site is the responsibility of the School Board. The contractor must maintain compliance with the state's reporting requirements. The agency must also provide information to the school system regarding liability issues and other recurring cost obligations. Every recipient communi-

ty is required to provide a 20% financial match of the OPH grant award. The sponsoring agency shall work toward financial self-sufficiency, in the most cost effective manner possible. Finally, applicants for funds must demonstrate that the services to be provided do not duplicate existing services available and are accessible to the students they intend to serve.

### Services

Services provided should include, but need not be limited to primary and preventive health care and medical screenings; treatment for common illnesses and minor injuries; referral and follow-up for serious illnesses and emergencies; on-site care and consultation as well as referral and follow-up for pregnancy, chronic diseases and disorders, and emotional and mental problems; on-site referral and care for drug and alcohol abuse and sexually transmitted diseases; sports and employment physicals; immunizations; laboratory testing; and preventive services to reduce high-risk behaviors that lead to sexually transmitted diseases, drug and alcohol abuse, violence and injuries.

### Operating Policies

Centers must be open to meet students' needs for services. Centers must function as an integral component of a school's comprehensive health program and work cooperatively with school nurses, counselors, classroom teachers, coaches, principals and physical, speech and occupational therapists. It is the policy of School-Based Health Centers to promote



abstinence as the method for preventing pregnancy and diseases. Centers are prohibited by State law from distributing contraceptives or abortifacient drugs or devices, and from counseling or advocating abortion, or referring any student to an organization for counseling or advocating abortion. A clear statement of these prohibitions of School-Based Health Centers must be posted in the center. The staff shall be required to sign documents pledging to comply with all policies and procedures of the School-Based Health Center. In addition, the center must be certified as a Medicaid provider.

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### Parental Consent

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A parent or guardian must sign a written consent form, approved by school authorities, for a student to receive health center services. Parents may indicate which services they do or do not wish their children to receive at the center.

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### Staffing

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Health care providers at each center should include, at a minimum, a nurse practitioner, registered nurse or physician assistant with experience in caring for adolescents; one or more part-time physicians; and a Master's level social worker or mental health professional at least half-time. The health center staff should also include an administrator and a medical office assistant. The school nurse should work with School-Based Health Center personnel.

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### Selection Criteria

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Criteria for awarding State funds to local health center initiatives include socioeconomic need of the community, lack of access to health services by the

adolescent student population, community support, working relationship between the health and education agencies, and likelihood of health center sponsors fulfilling service goals and objectives.

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### Continuum of Care

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Centers must execute cooperative agreements with community health care providers to link students to support and specialist services not provided at the school site. Centers must arrange 24-hour coverage insuring that students have access to services during non-operating hours, i.e. nights, weekends, holidays, etc.

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### Evaluation & Performance Improvement

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Every center is required to (1) submit and adhere to annual objectives and a plan for monitoring and evaluation of such objectives; (2) participate in the School Health Care On-Line data collection system; (3) submit monthly and quarterly progress reports; (4) develop and maintain financial mechanisms; (5) abide by written policies and procedures; (6) participate in the Louisiana School-Based Health Center Network in its efforts to maintain and improve quality of care; (7) successfully complete the Program Effectiveness Review Tool (quality assurance) and develop three quality improvement and programs annually; (8) post the telephone number of the entity to which violations of compliance or other complaints can be reported. Compliance audits shall be conducted at regular intervals, and documentation and evaluation of compliance shall be available for review at each center and at the Office of Public Health.

## Continuous Quality Improvement Program

The Adolescent School Health Initiative quality assurance program is built around the principles of:

- identifying best practices in school-based health center care;
- identifying problems and ensuring they are adequately corrected;
- recommending interventions and improvements;
- verifying continuous high quality school-based health center care; and
- ensuring compliance with program standards

The continuous quality improvement process assures that an acceptable quality of care for medical, psychosocial and educational health interventions is delivered in accordance with current best practices.

Each SBHC is required to do an annual internal self-evaluation using the Program Effectiveness Review Tool (PERT), which reflects the Louisiana Principles, Standards and Guidelines for SBHCs. Then, an external peer review team conducts a day long site visit at the SBHC to observe, measure and validate the information provided by the PERT. The peer review team consists of physicians, nurses, nurse practitioners and mental health professionals from other school based health centers, as well as representatives of the Offices of Public Health, Alcohol and Drug Abuse, and Mental Health.

The external peer review team provides technical assistance to the SBHC staff regarding best practice standards for measuring the degree that their health and psychosocial services address their students' health conditions. A wide array of external standards and accreditation options are also utilized, such as those of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO), the Guidelines for Adolescent Preventive Services (GAPS) of the American Medical Association and/or Bright Futures of the American Academy of Pediatrics. In this process, emphasis is placed on accountability through compliance with legislation,

contract specifications, external audits of data and external reviews of health care practices.

The peer review team visits each center on a three-year cycle and recommends to the Office of Public Health whether or not

the site merits a certificate to operate. Any recommendations of the team for change or improvement are monitored by OPH staff for compliance.

Since development of the Continuous Quality Improvement program, seven Baton Rouge centers and three St. Martin Parish centers have been reviewed and granted certification. In 1998-99, 11 centers have been scheduled for site visits by a peer review team.

## Intergovernmental Coordinating Council

The Council is comprised of government agency and department heads, or their designated representatives, who have a defined interest in the health, education and welfare of children. By law the council is “composed of representatives from the departments of education, social services, health and hospitals, and other governmental entities or programs related to health services to assist in implementation, oversight, and funding assistance for health centers in schools.”

The Council serves as the coordinating body for developing policies for the institutionalization of school health centers in Louisiana. The duties of the Council include examining existing and potential State resources for providing school-based health services; promoting a role for school health centers in any plan for providing health care to publicly insured and uninsured school-aged children; analyzing the full potential for Medicaid payment for services provided to eligible children and adolescents; assisting in identifying local resources that may be available to centers and encouraging involvement by local offices of member agencies or departments; and developing strategies and a plan for long-term funding arrangements for school health centers.

One such strategy for long-term funding that came to fruition in 1997-98 was the collaborative effort of Assistant Secretaries from the Offices of Public Health, Mental Health and Alcohol and Substance Abuse through the Intergovernmental Coordinating Council to implement financing policies which enabled these state agencies to pool resources. Their combined funding will support a full time experienced professional to provide coordinated psychosocial services in a school-based health center in one region beginning in the fall of 1998. Given the need to create psychosocially healthy school environments and the need for crisis counseling, prevention and early intervention services related to the multiple risks of adolescence, this enhanced primary prevention model is designed to teach behavioral competency skills that protect students from harm.

## Key Elements of Coordinated School Health Programs

**L**earning and health go hand in hand. An unhealthy child cannot learn. A child who can not learn is unhealthy. A coordinated approach to school health can improve the health and educational achievement of students. "Schools offer the most systematic and efficient means available to improve the health of youth and enable young people to avoid health risks..."

– *Healthy People 2000, U.S. Public Health Service.*

Benefits of coordinated school health programs identified by administrators, teachers, and parents include: reduced absenteeism and fewer behavioral problems; improved classroom performance and more positive attitudes among students and staff; teaching skills students can use rather than rote knowledge; and a focus for better community and parent involvement.

The following are working descriptions of the eight components of a coordinated school health program that are recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC):

**Health Education/Health Instruction:** A documented, planned, sequential, K-12 curriculum that addresses the physical, mental, emotional, and social dimensions of health. The curriculum is designed to motivate and assist students to maintain and improve their health, prevent disease, and reduce health-related risk behaviors. It allows students to develop and demonstrate increasingly sophisticated health-related knowledge, attitudes, skills, and practices. The curriculum is comprehensive and includes a variety of topics such as personal health, family health, community health, consumer health, environ-

mental health, family life, mental and emotional health, injury prevention and safety, nutrition, prevention and control of disease, and substance use and abuse. Health education should be taught by qualified teachers who have been trained to teach the subject.

**Health Services:** Services provided for students to appraise, protect, and promote health. These services can be provided through a school-based health center or through a method designed to: insure access or referral to primary health care services, prevent and control communicable disease and other health problems, provide emergency care for illness or injury, promote and provide optimum for a safe school facility, and provide educational counseling opportunities for the promotion of individual, family, and community health. Services are provided by qualified professionals such as physicians, nurses, dentists, health educators, and other allied health personnel.

**Healthful School Environment:** Physical and aesthetic surroundings, and a psycho-social climate and culture in a school that maximizes the health of students and staff. Factors that influence the physical environment might include the school building and the area surrounding it, any biological or chemical agents that might be detrimental to health, and physical conditions such as temperature, noise, and lighting. The psychological environment includes interrelated physical, emotional, and social conditions that affect the well-being and productivity of the students and staff such as physical and psychological safety, positive interpersonal relationships, recognition of the needs and success of the individual, and support for building self-esteem in students and staff.

## **Coordinated School Health Continued**

**School Food Service:** School nutrition services provided that promote the health and education of students through access to a variety of nutritious and appealing meals. Programs respond to the health and nutrition needs of all students. School nutrition programs should reflect the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans and other quality criteria to achieve nutrition integrity. The school program should offer an opportunity for students to experience a learning laboratory for classroom nutrition and health education, and serve as a resource for linkages with nutrition-related community services. Services are provided by qualified child nutrition professionals.

**School-Based Worksite Health Promotion:** Programs for school staff that provide health assessments, health education, and health-related fitness activities. Such programs encourage and motivate school staff to pursue a healthy lifestyle, thus promoting better health, improved morale, and a greater personal commitment to the school's overall comprehensive health program. This personal commitment may translate into greater commitment to the health of students and create positive role modeling. Health promotion programs can improve productivity, decrease absenteeism, and reduce health insurance costs.

**Counseling and Psychological Services:** Services provided that include broad-based individual and group assessments, prevention, intervention and referrals which attend to the mental, emotional, and social health of students. Organizational assessment and consultation skills of counselors and psychologists contribute to the

overall health of students, and the health of the school environment. Services are provided by professionals such as certified school counselors, psychologists, and social workers.

**Physical Education:** A planned, sequential, K-12 curriculum that provides cognitive content and learning experiences in a variety of activity areas such as: basic movement skills; physical fitness; cardiovascular fitness; rhythms and dance; games; team, dual, and individual sports; gymnastics; and aquatics. Quality physical education should promote, through a variety of planned physical activities, each student's optimum physical, mental, emotional, and social development, and should promote activities and sports which all students enjoy and can pursue throughout their lives. Physical education is taught by qualified teachers who have been trained to teach the subject.

**Parent/Community Involvement:** An integrated school, parent and community approach that establishes a dynamic partnership to enhance the health and well-being of students. School health advisory councils, coalitions, and broadly-based constituencies for school health can provide a means to effectively build support for school health programs efforts. Schools should be encouraged to actively solicit parent involvement and engage community resources and services to respond more effectively to the health-related needs of students.

## Collaboration with Southeastern Louisiana University

The Louisiana Office of Public Health's (OPH) Adolescent School Health Initiative (ASHI) launched a collaborative agreement with the State Department of Education (DOE) to fund Southeastern Louisiana University's (SLU) Excellence in Health and Education Project (EHEP) in 1996-97. The goals of the collaboration include providing training for health educators, teachers, school social workers and nutritionists; advocating for coordinated school health (CSH); conducting research and evaluating services pertaining to CSH; and establishing a clearinghouse of resources on CSH.

Even though this collaborative effort is still in its infancy, many objectives have been achieved. First, EHEP has begun to build an infrastructure for training in-service and pre-service health education professionals throughout Louisiana. This infrastructure enables faculty and staff at SLU to develop and conduct workshops and seminars. Over the past year this collaboration has produced many successful workshops on nationally recognized health curricula including the *Michigan Model*, *Get Real About AIDS* and *Know Your Body* as well as a large variety of HIV/AIDS educational curricula which target specific populations.

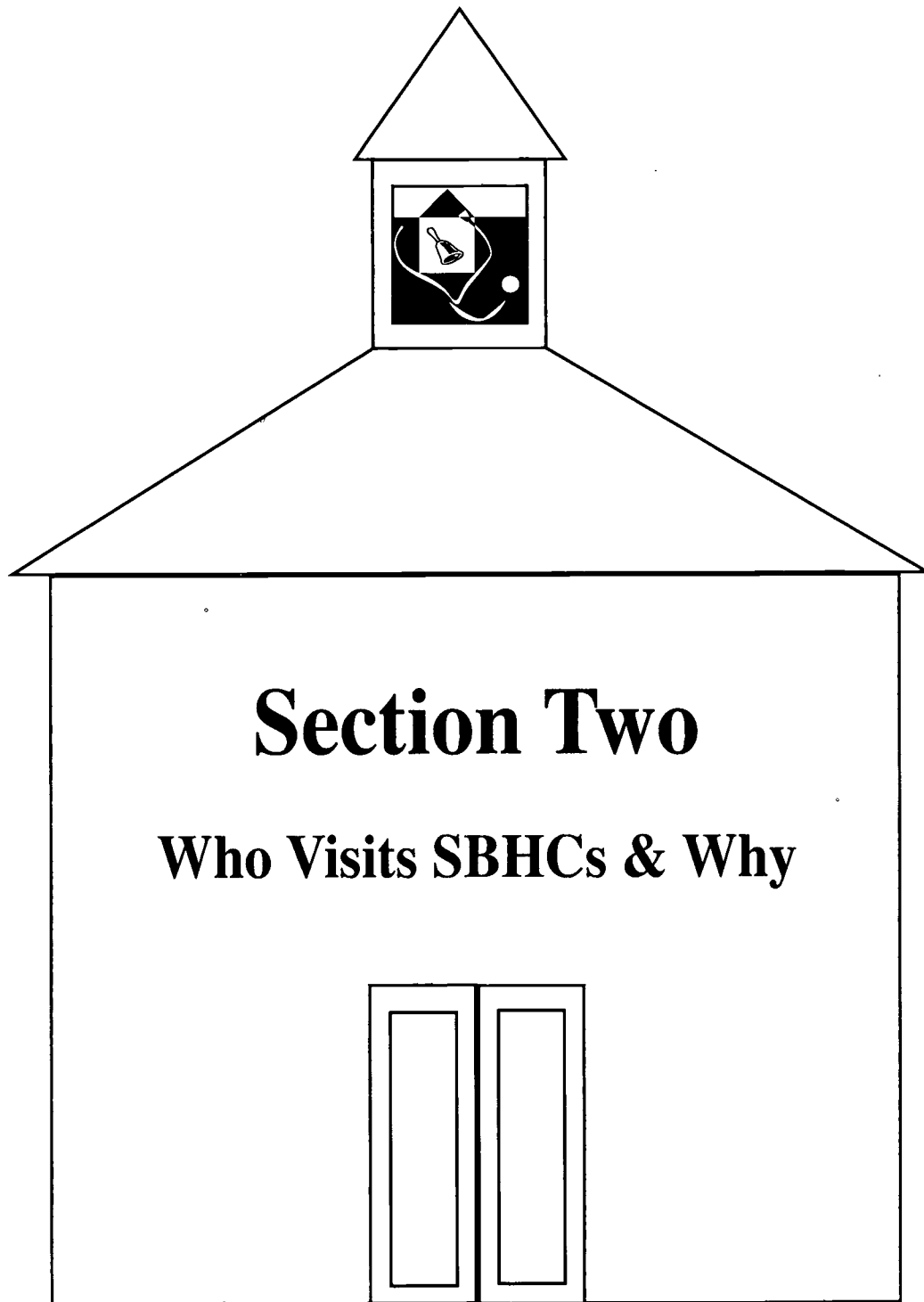
Second, EHEP has identified a Cadre of Trainers made up of community and school health educators. The Cadre is a group of highly skilled trainers, recognized in Louisiana for conducting quality, interactive professional development activities. These trainers work to increase connections between health education and the other CSH components. (See pages 14 for a description of the components of CSH.) They also work to improve the coordination between health instruction and community resources.

Third, EHEP held its first Summer Institute for CSH in 1998. It offered training to health educators on skills and research-based curricula with an emphasis on HIV/AIDS prevention. The 1999 Summer Institute will focus on incorporating Team Nutrition into CSH. This is made possible from a grant from the United States Department of Agriculture to evaluate and improve nutrition education in Louisiana.

Lastly, EHEP staff assisted Tulane University School of Public Health & Tropical Medicine, OPH, and the Louisiana State University Medical School to investigate the effect of SBHCs on a cohort of students. Students were assessed on the following variables: academic performance, school attendance, and health-related knowledge, attitudes, and practices. While the study failed to show a statistically significant difference in these variables between students at schools with SBHCs and students without access to SBHCs, researchers felt that the results were inconclusive for two reasons. The follow-up time was too brief for the variables chosen and the attrition rate in both groups of students was high. Future studies should include analyses of user versus non-user in case schools only, additional analysis by level of SBHC use, and qualitative research regarding access to health care and other aspects of the SBHC. EHEP will continue to participate in future evaluation efforts.

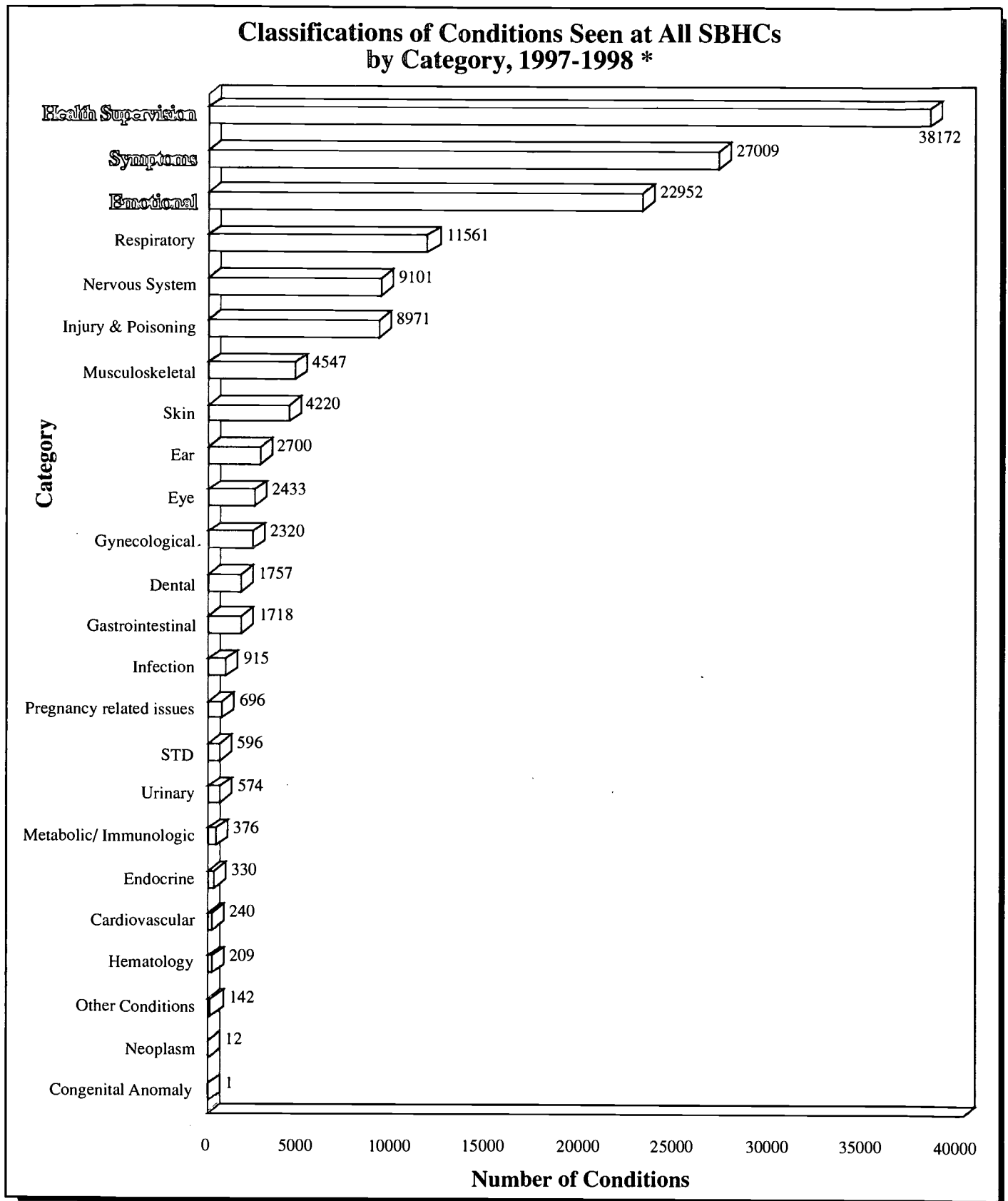
The future is bright for EHEP. In addition to the 1999 Summer Institute, EHEP will continue to support the Cadre of Trainers and curricula training in school districts. Major projects that will take place in the upcoming year include the Louisiana Youth Congress on Health. Additional efforts will be made to improve pre-service training related to CSH within the College of Education at SLU. Finally, definitive steps have been taken with OPH to secure federal grant funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to enhance school health programs for cardiovascular disease prevention in Louisiana. 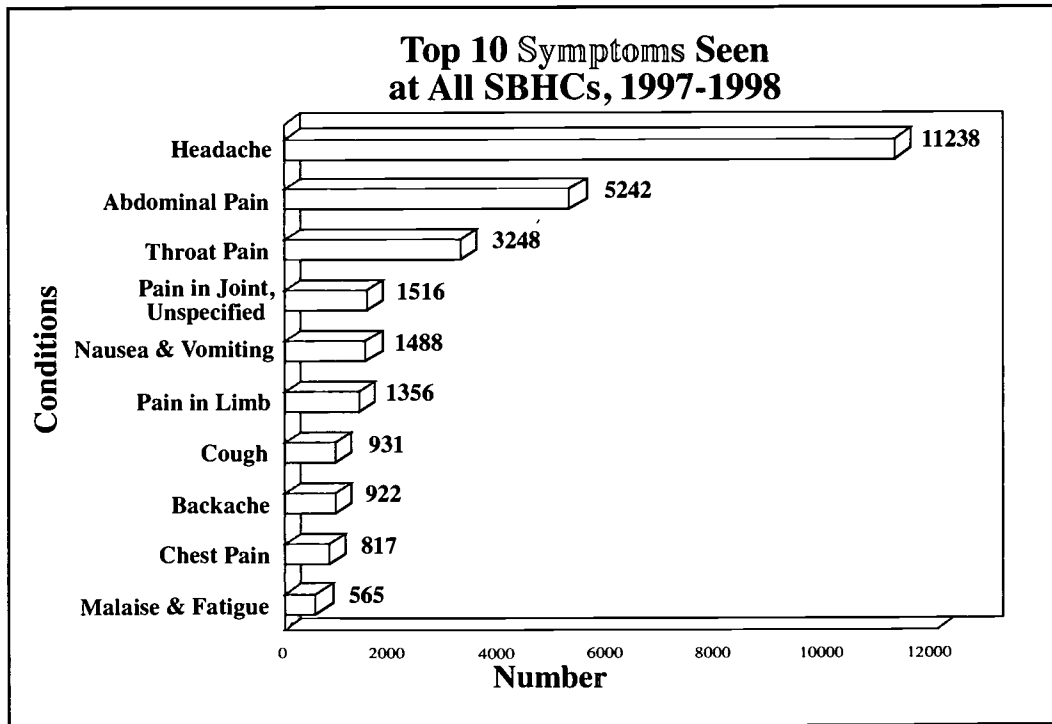
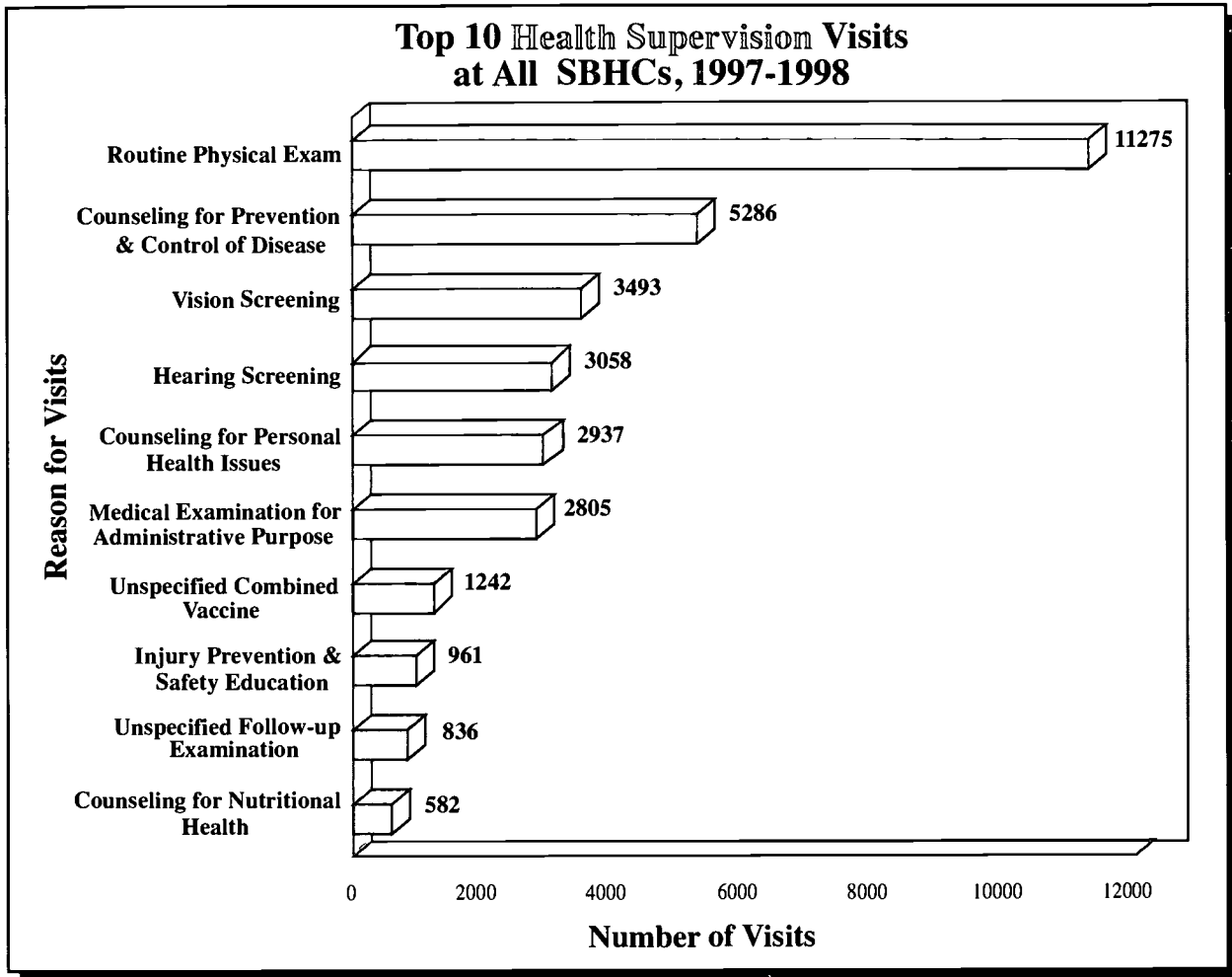

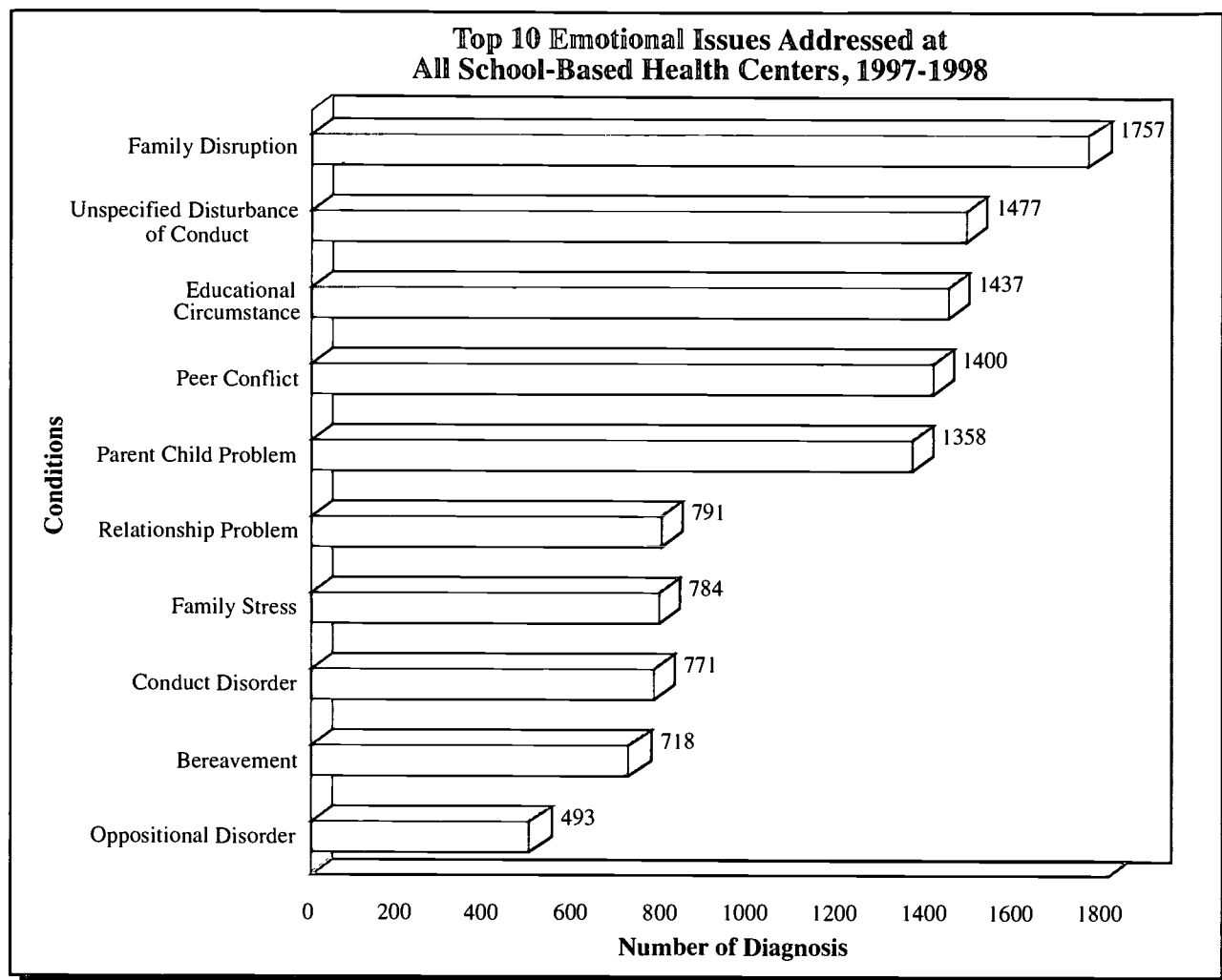
### Who Visits SBHCs & Why

(Medications are administered to students for chronic conditions such as attention deficit disorder, allergies, acne and asthma as well as for acute illnesses.)

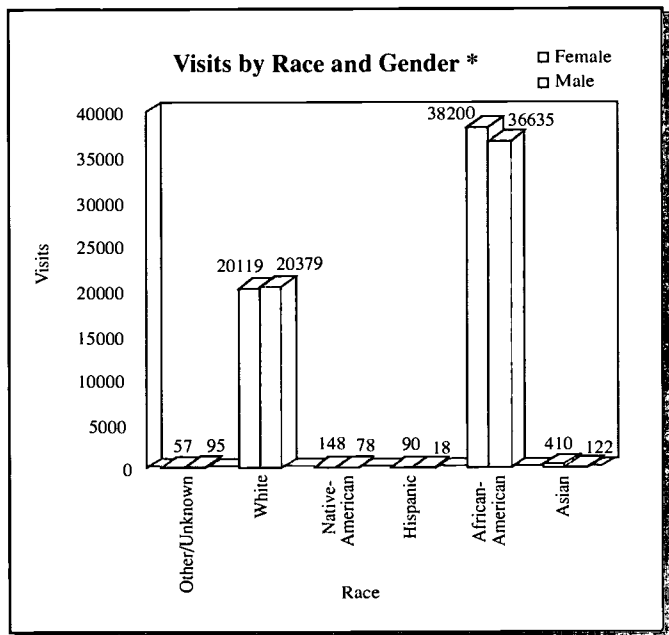
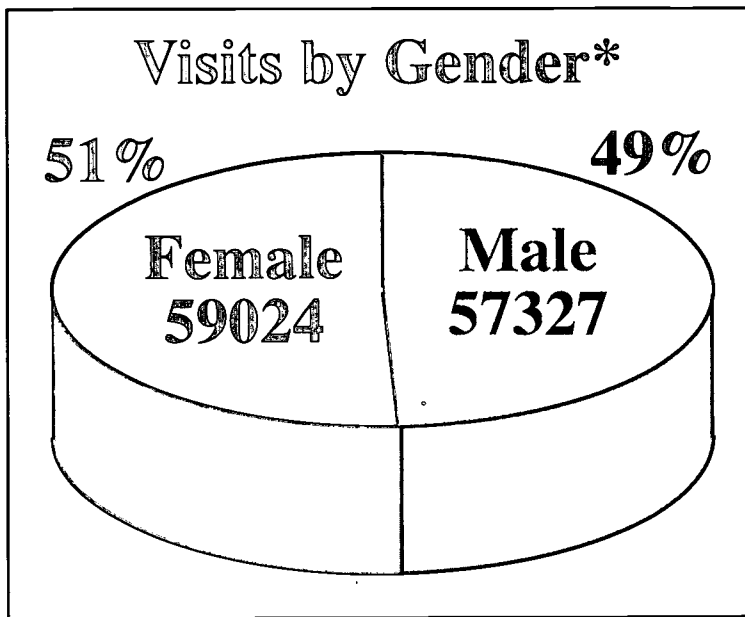
- **Health Education**

- **Immunization**

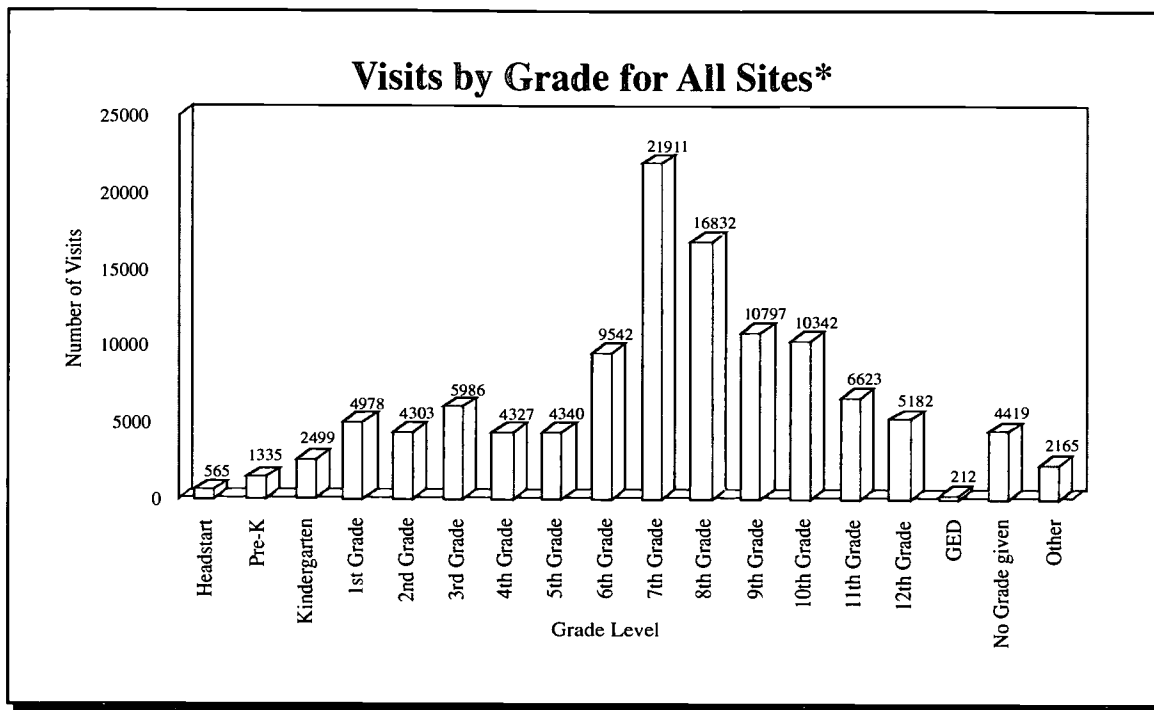

SBHCs in Louisiana serve both male and females in equal numbers.

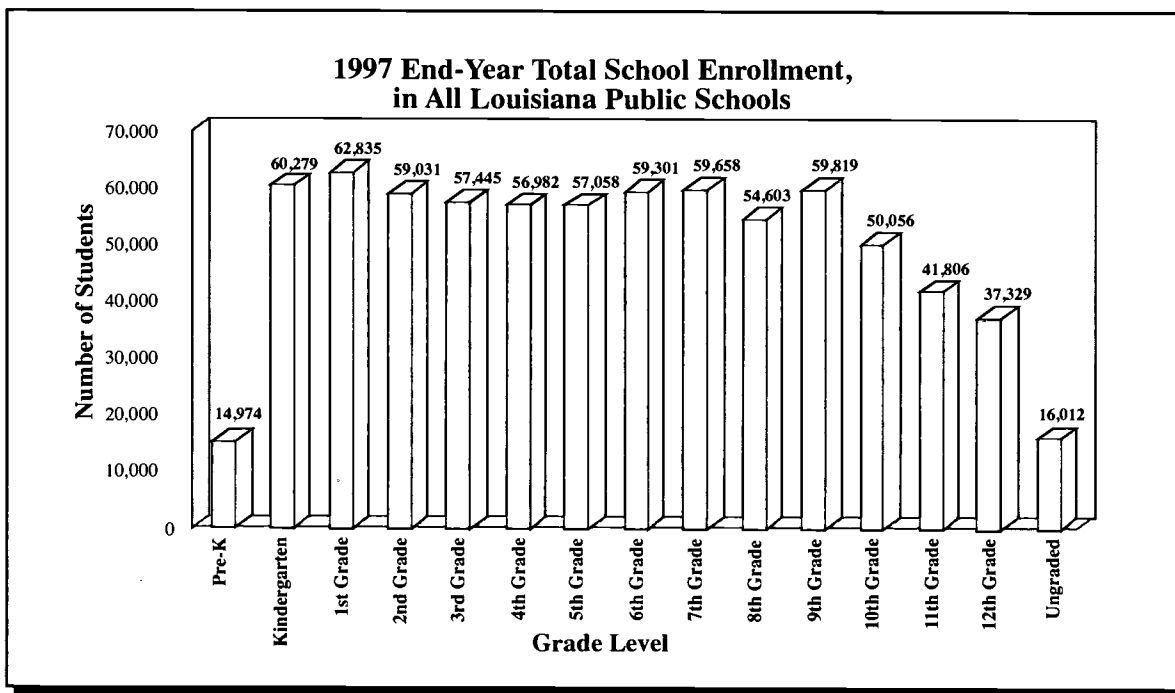


In the 1997-98 school year, great strides were made to reach out to more students of all races. With increases in total visits to SBHCs in 1997-98, all races noticed increases. African-American females were most likely to use the SBHC.

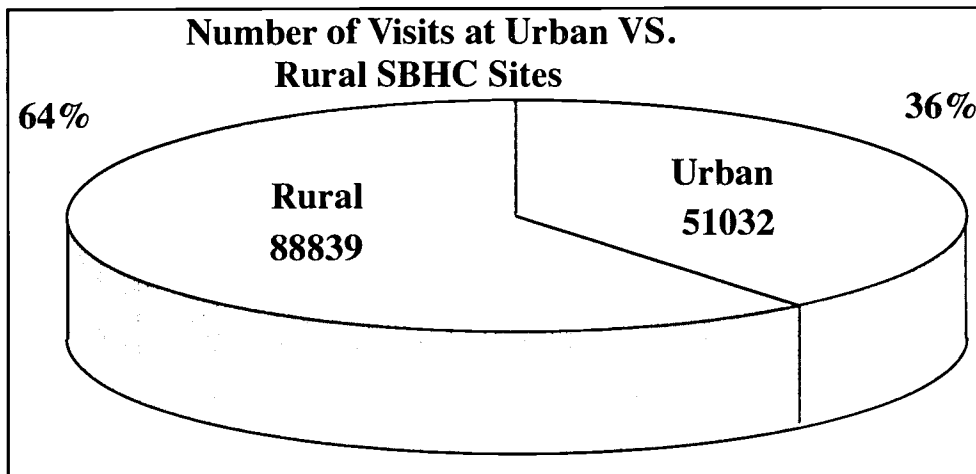

The bottom graph shows the noticeable decline in the statewide enrollment of all public school students in the upper grade levels. The decline in SBHC visits by upper grade level students (seen in top graph) is consistent with the decline in total Louisiana school enrollment (seen in bottom graph).

**Comparison View of Rural versus Urban Sites**

The ASHI began in urban schools with high concentrations of economically disadvantaged and uninsured students. Immediately after its inception, however, rural communities recognized the value of health centers in their schools, which could provide services to adolescents lacking access to health care. As of 1997-98, the number of health care centers is evenly divided between urban and rural areas. While adolescents all experience similar physical and mental health challenges, both the obvious and subtle differences can be addressed by the health center because it remains a community-based initiative. The following information and the SBHC profiles in Section Three illustrate both the similarities and differences among the centers.



Although there are 15 urban and 15 rural SBHCs, the majority of visits has shifted over the life of the program to greater usage in rural areas.

**Urban SBHC** include any SBHC located in a city identified by the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) as being metropolitan. These cities include Alexandria, Baton Rouge, Houma, Lafayette, Lake Charles, Monroe, New Orleans, and Shreveport-Bossier City.

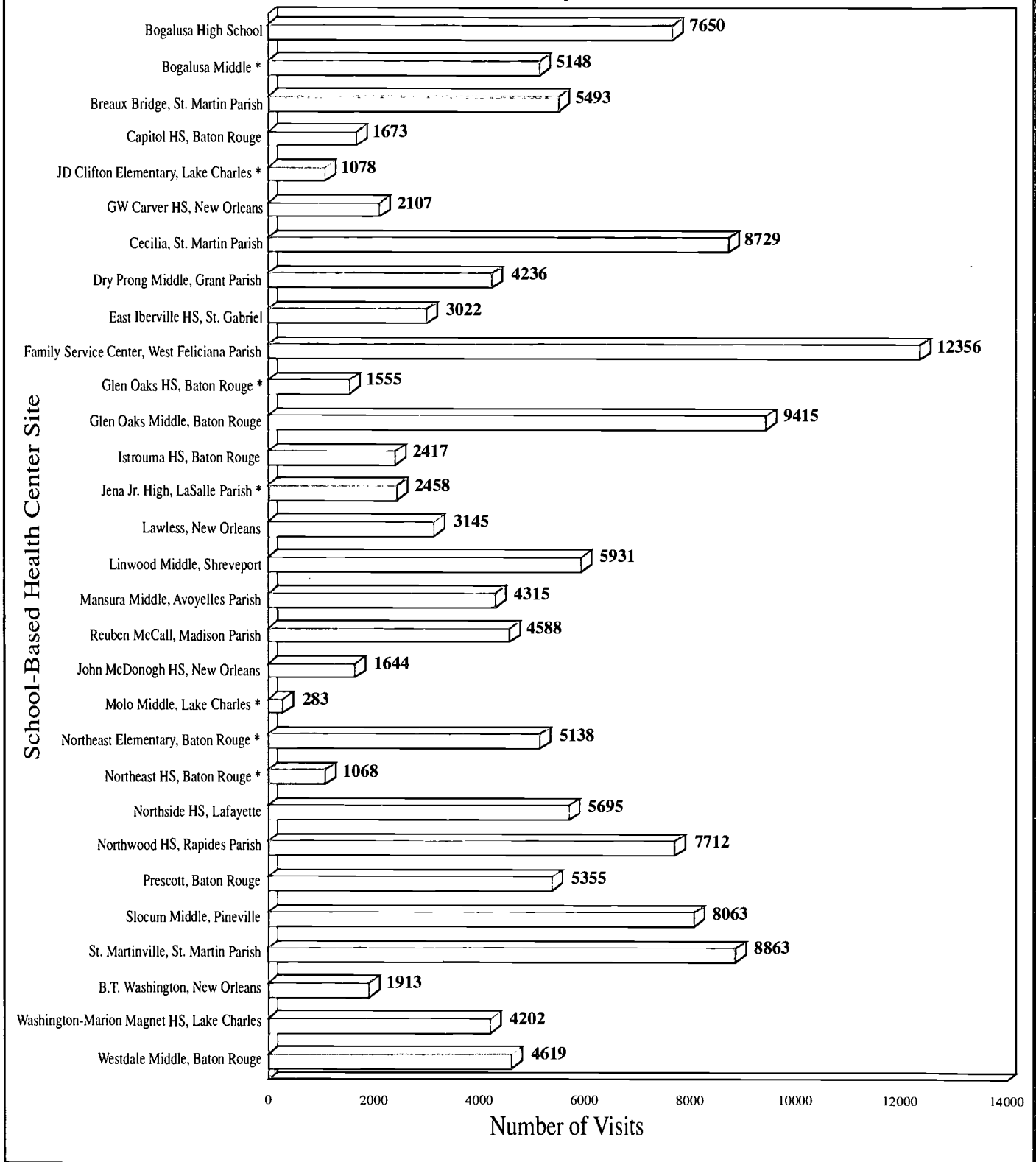
**Rural SBHC** include any SBHC that is located in a city that has not been identified as metropolitan by the MSA.

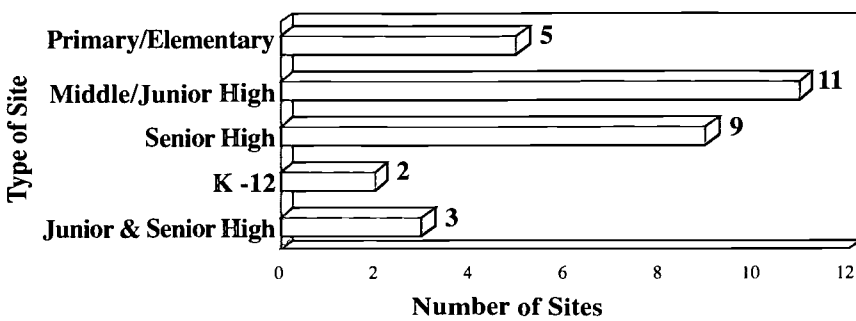

 SBHCs in RED are considered Urban sites.

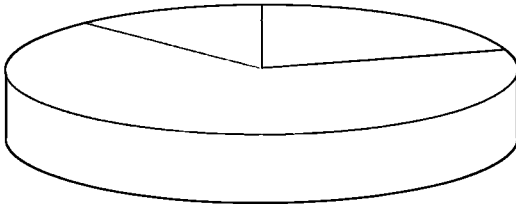
**Type of SBHC Site**

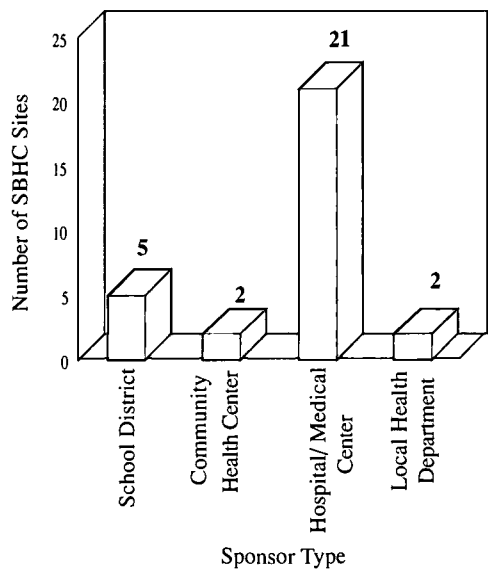

There has been a noticeable shift from school district to hospital sponsorship. It is most beneficial for SBHCs to have a strong medical sponsor or partnership (below).

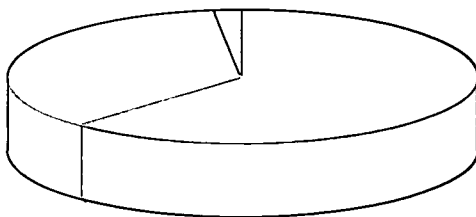
**Type of Sponsor for SBHCs**

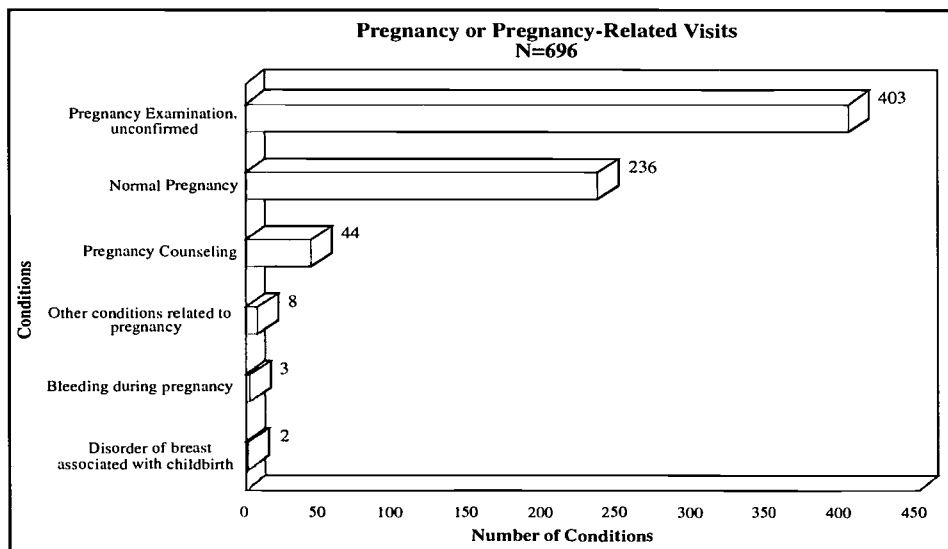
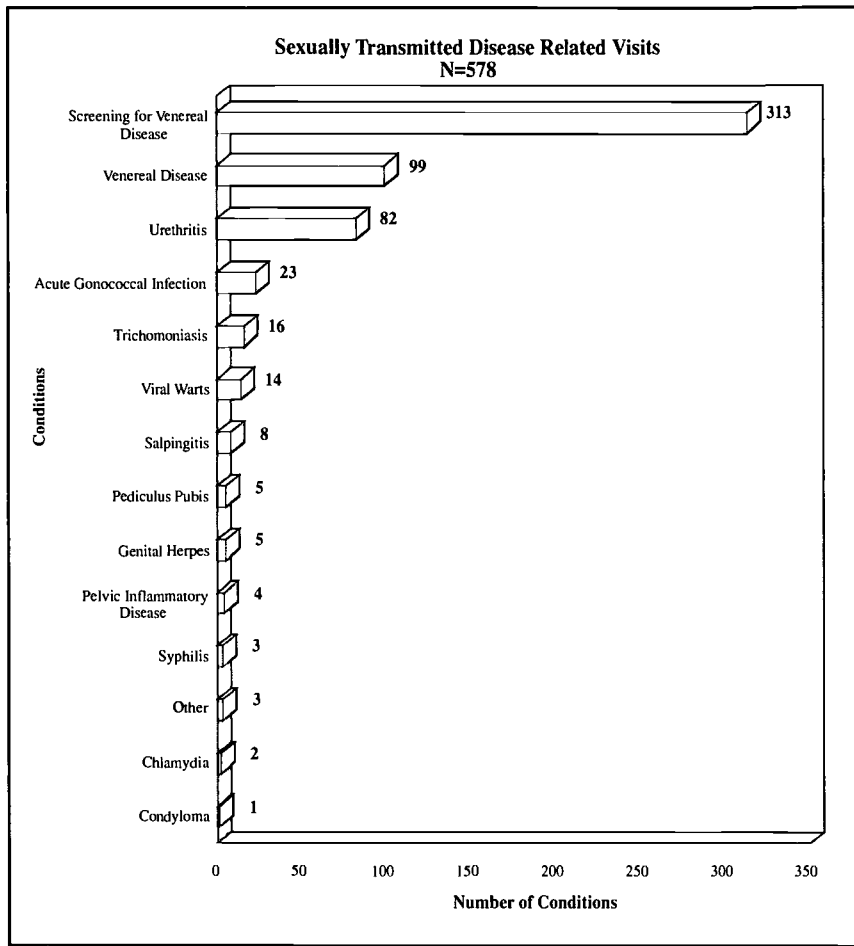

(Above) While the local match requirement is 20% of the OPH grant, communities have exceeded this figure, indicating that for every \$2 in state funds, communities provide more than \$1 in local support. Because Medicaid does not reimburse for all services provided at SBHCs (i.e., preventive mental health, daily medication administration) and, because Medicaid does not cover adolescents through age 18, this potential funding source provides minimal revenue to the program. It is expected that CHIP implementation will improve Medicaid revenue beginning FY 1999.

## GYNECOLOGICAL & REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH VISITS

Of 139,871 visits in 1997-1998, 1274, less than 1%, were for conditions related to sexual activity. These visits were associated with routine gynecological health, treatment for sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy care in centers that provide prenatal care. It is the policy of SBHCs in Louisiana, in compliance with the laws of the State on sexuality education, counseling, services and referral, to promote and encourage abstinence from premarital sexual activity. SBHCs serve to reinforce lessons and messages embodied in the school's health education curriculum that abstinence is the most effective way to prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Abstinence is also emphasized for teens seeking treatment for diseases resulting from sexual activity.



The above statistics are a result of combining all levels of diagnoses made during these visits.

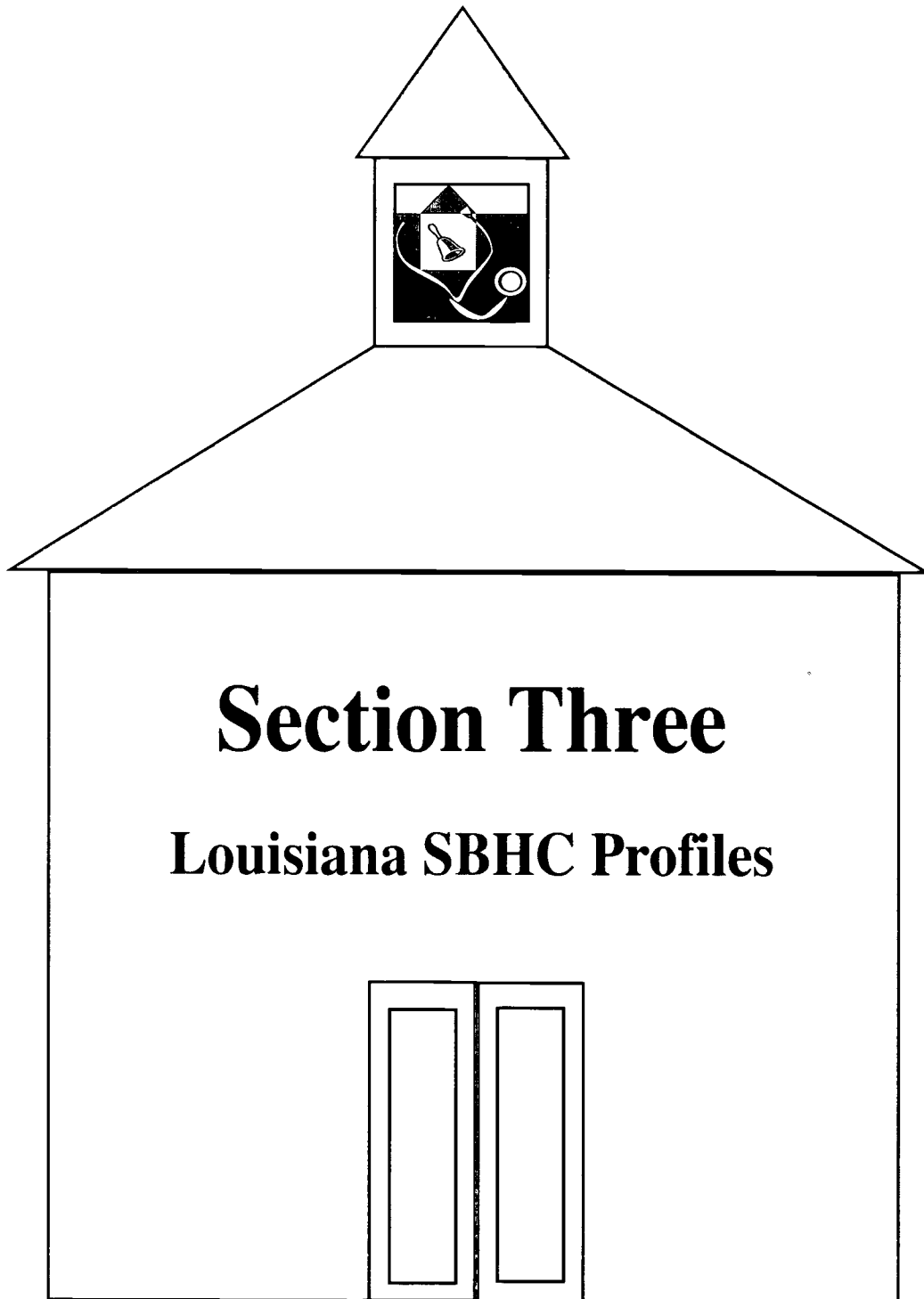


### STD School-Based Testing and Treatment

Among the initiatives included in School-Based Health Center programs, one is a STD screening and treatment service program. This program is determining whether or not repeated school-based screening and treatment for chlamydia and gonorrhea will decrease the prevalence of these infections among high school students. Dr. Deborah Cohen, an Associate Professor at LSUMC, is responsible for coordinating this health service project and the sponsors are the Office of Public Health, the Centers for Disease Control, the National Institutes of Health, and Louisiana State University Medical Center.

Students in New Orleans' four school-based health centers were given the opportunity to be tested for chlamydia and gonorrhea. Annually, with parental consent, 52%-65% of all enrolled students participated. Among those enrolled in schools for at least two years, 83.4% of students were tested at least once. All students were provided with education about chlamydia and gonorrhea. Infected students were counseled and treated with oral, single-dose antibiotic therapy.

At first test in 1996, 12.2% of girls and 5.9% of boys tested in grades 9-12 were infected with chlamydia and 3.0% of girls and 1.6% of boys had gonorrhea. Over 90% of infections were asymptomatic. With repeated testing in 1997, chlamydia prevalence among boys dropped to half the 1996 initial rate. Among girls, chlamydia prevalence declined from 12.2% in 1996 to 10.3% in 1997, and gonorrhea prevalence dropped by nearly 50% in 1997. Results from this service program indicated that repeated education coupled with screening and treatment are associated with declines in disease prevalence.

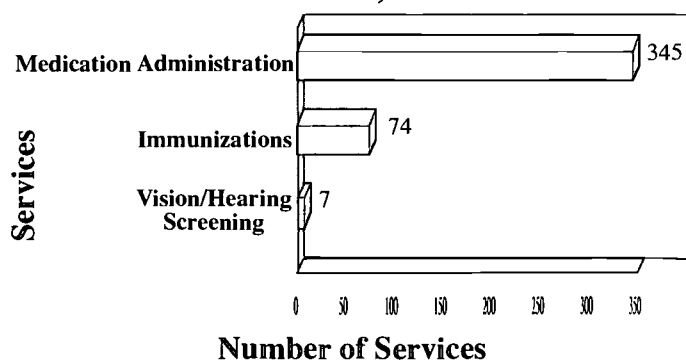
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

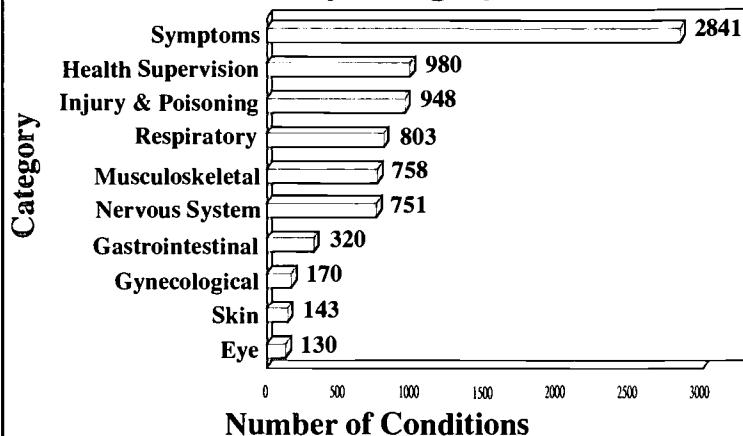

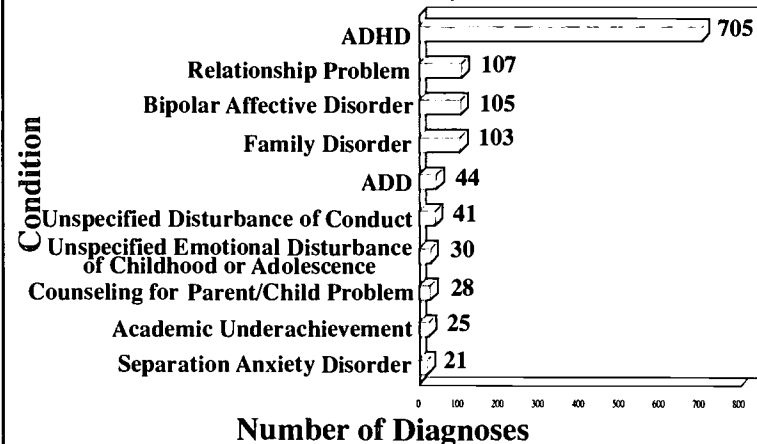

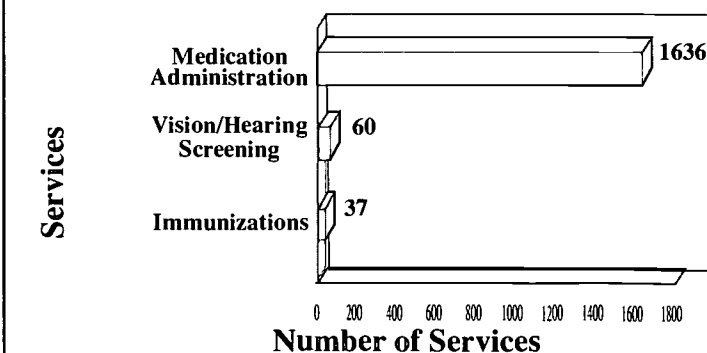
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

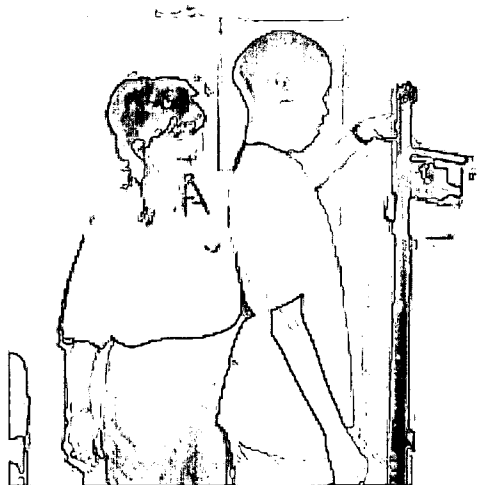
## Highlights

Bogalusa High School completed its third year of operation June 30, 1998 with plans to expand health education to the remaining schools in our school system. This is possible by expanding our staff to include a health educator who will float between the two health centers to assist with community health efforts.

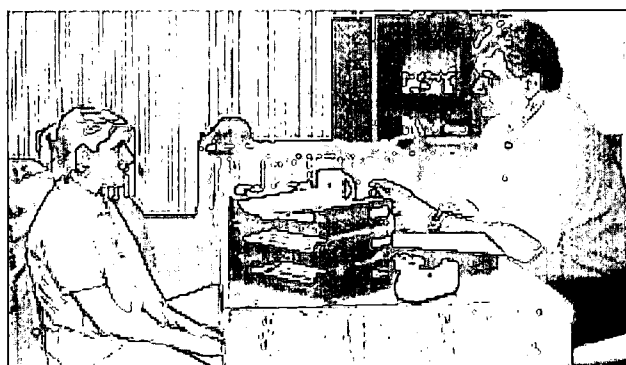
Both health centers have taken an aim at violence prevention through peer mediation programs and choices training. "Adolescent students have a tendency to over react" according to James Raborn, Principal, Bogalusa High School. "Many times the situations do not warrant their responses. We feel very fortunate to have a health center located on our campus where students can learn important life skills."

Classes for students interested in health -related careers are also offered through the health center. An "Introduction to Health Occupations" class for students in grades 10-12 is offered and a Certified Nursing Assistant class is presented to graduating seniors through a community partnership with the Bogalusa Community Medical Center, Louisiana Technical College, and the city school board.

Detective David Pittman of the Juvenile Division, Washington Parish Sheriff's Office commented that "The health centers have been invaluable to my office as a resource for counseling. In many cases your services are the only source to which these students have access."

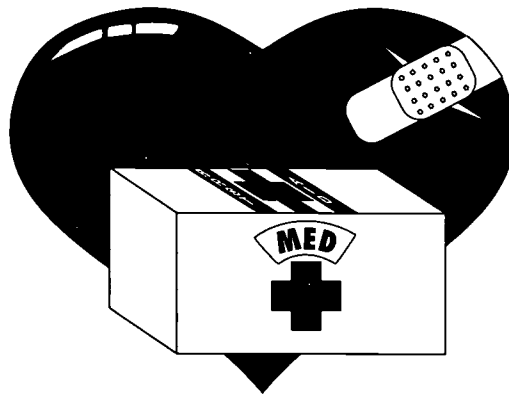

Bogalusa Junior High School Health Center completed the first year of operation June 30, 1998. Enrollment (95%) was tremendous for our first year.

The Center was commended by School Superintendent, Richard Cothorn, for the prompt and professional manner in which an alleged "suicide pact" situation was handled. After receiving information from students, our Social Services Manager reacted by first interviewing all students involved, and then contacting the guidance counselor. Parents were notified to come to the school. School administration immediately notified the police and Child Protective Services. Parents expressed appreciation for all services provided by the center staff. Lena Carroll, School Guidance Counselor stated, "The health center has been a major asset to Bogalusa Jr. High School. I feel that the need for health services has been fulfilled and that social services have been a tremendous help. We are very appreciative of the center."

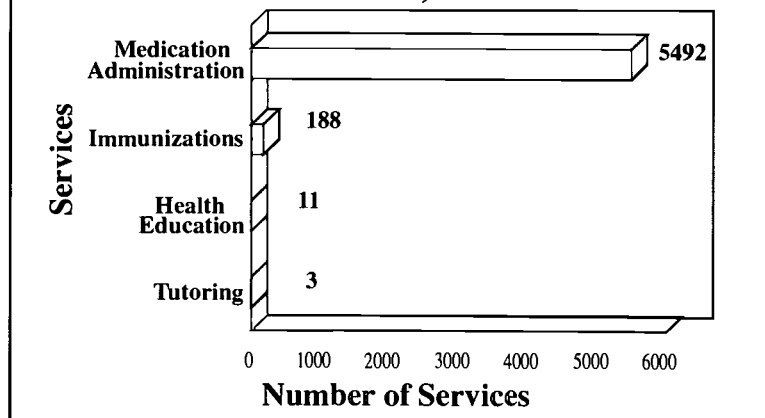
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

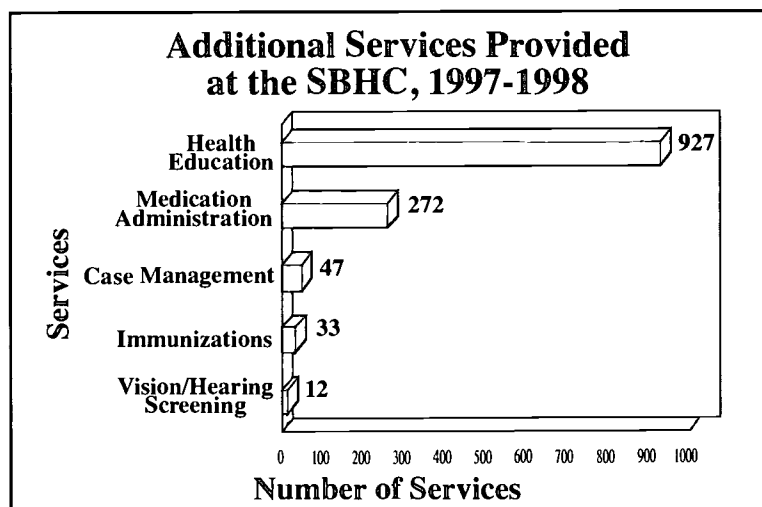
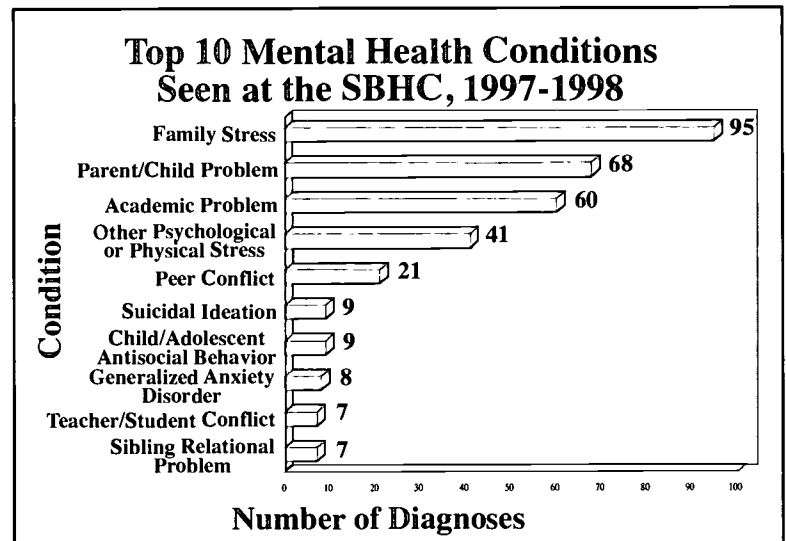
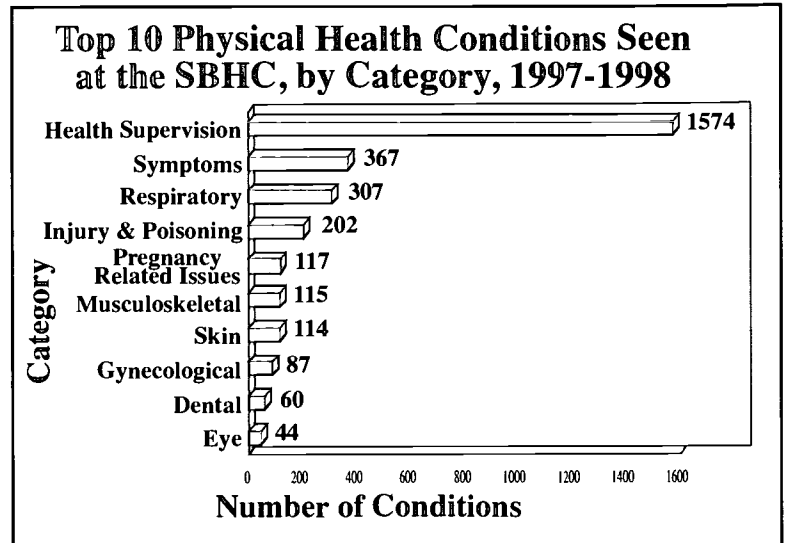

Planning for this program began in 1995 through a collaboration between the Department of Social Services, the Office of Public Health and sponsoring agencies. This collaboration used Child Care and Development Block Grant funds to expand child care for high school students registered at the School-Based Health Centers.

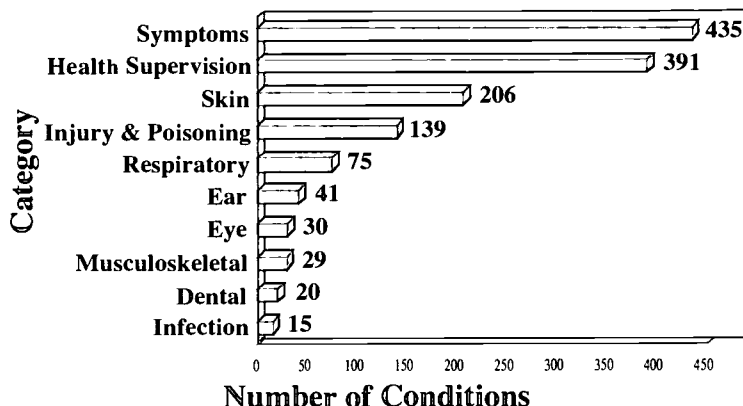

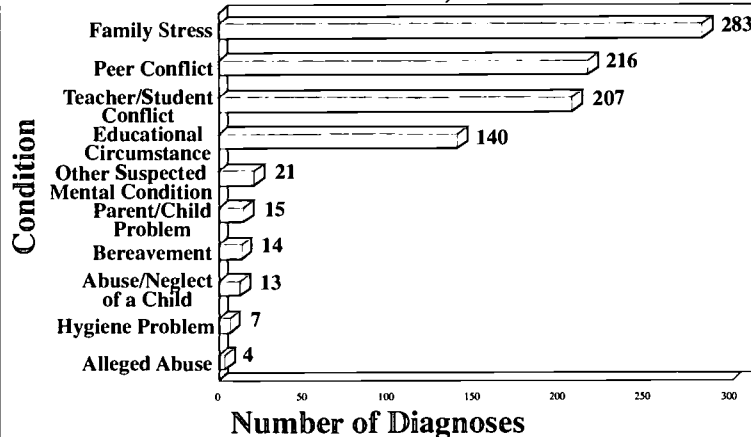

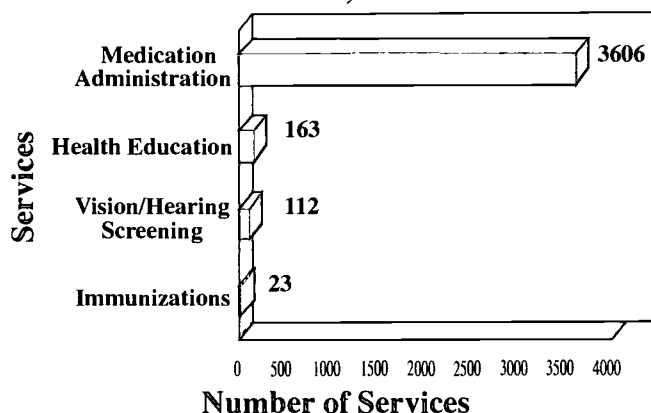
**Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998**

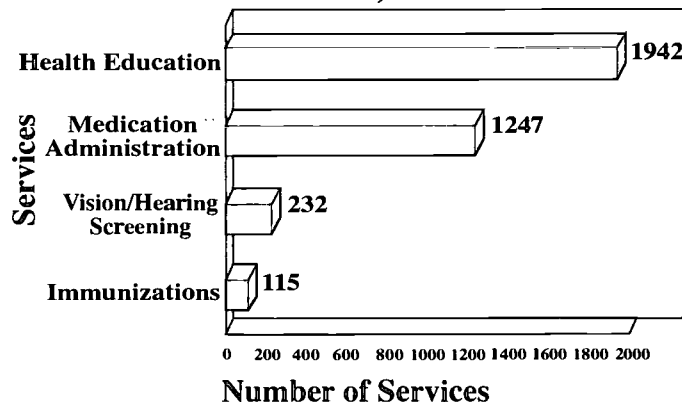
**Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998**

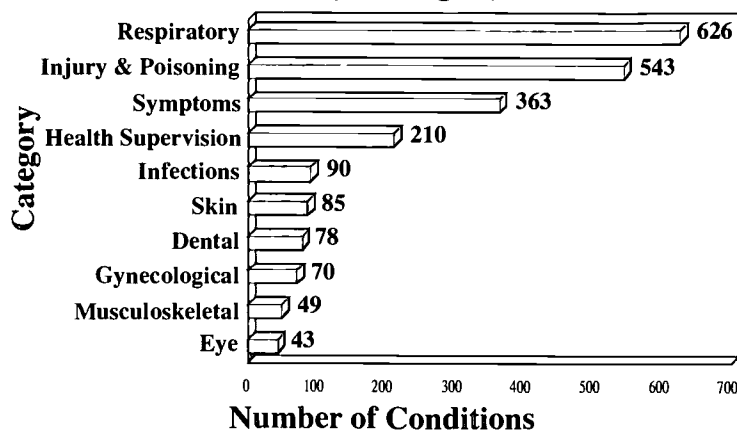

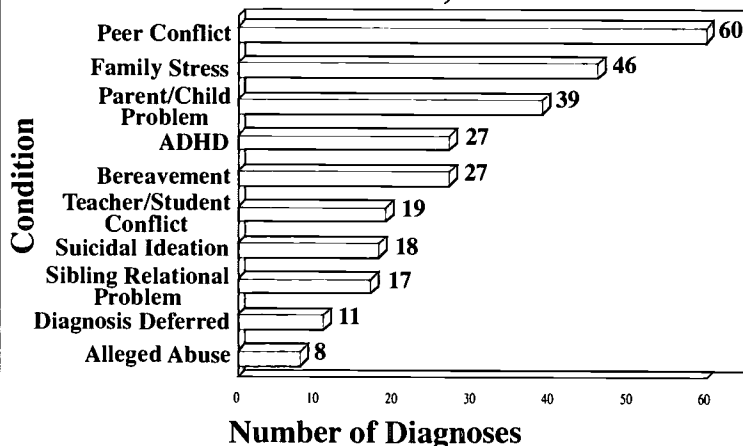

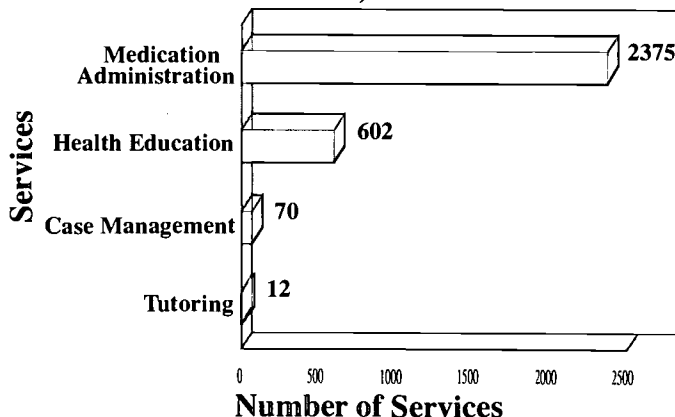
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

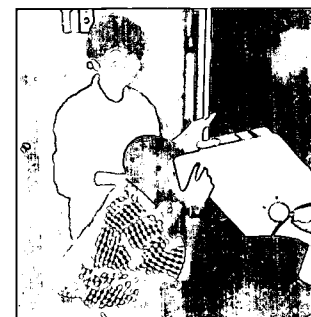

### Highlights of the Baton Rouge HCCS

The social worker led a group focusing on behavior issues and social skills. She also worked with several students on positive behavior support contracts focusing on improving grades and behavior issues at school. In addition, she participated in a school wide health fair with other health professionals for the staff and faculty at the school.

The SBHC nurse and the East Baton Rouge Parish school nurse presented menstruation education to girls in the fourth and fifth grades. Many incoming students enrolling for kindergarten were given required vaccinations. Southeastern University nursing students assisted the nurse in checking students for head lice. Many cases of head lice, scabies, and insect stings were reported. Since temperatures were in the upper 90's during field day, the nurse supplied teachers and the principal with information on preventing heat exhaustion.

The social worker lead a group focusing on positive self-image and peer relations. Our social worker was also involved in planning activities for the Natural Helpers Group. In addition, she participated in a school wide health fair with other health professionals for the staff and faculty at the school.

Education on sexually transmitted disease prevention was presented to ninth grade students by nurses from the SBHC and from the East Baton Rouge Parish school nursing department. Self- breast exam instruction was presented to tenth grade girls. The SBHC provided services for students requesting STD testing and updated immunizations for several students. The spring months also seemed to stimulate episodes of asthma and outbreaks of scabies.

The SBHC nurse completed all seventh grade vision screenings and half of the special education classes had vision and hearing screenings for their IEPs. In addition, students have been involved in ongoing nutritional counseling, including students who need weight management as well as students who skip breakfast and lunch. These sessions have resulted in a decreased number of students coming to the SBHC complaining of headaches and stomachaches. Asthma education is another ongoing component of the SBHC. This has helped students with anxiety related to their asthma. It has also helped them to be in control by doing the breathing exercises they have been taught.

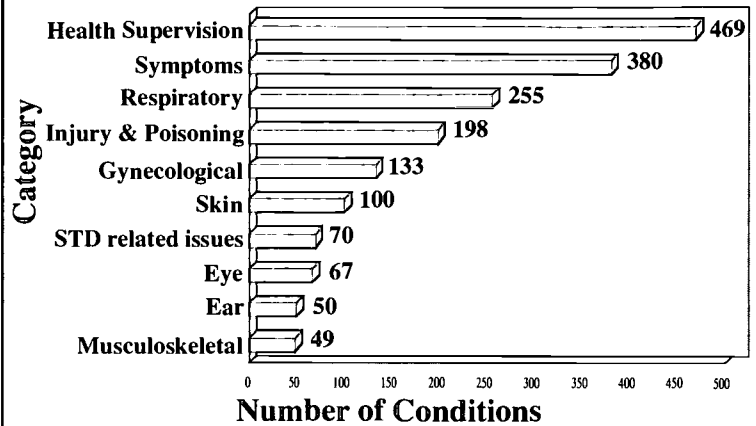

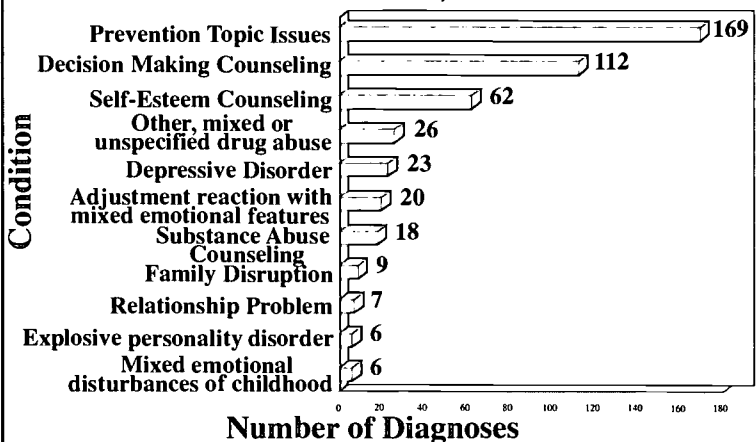

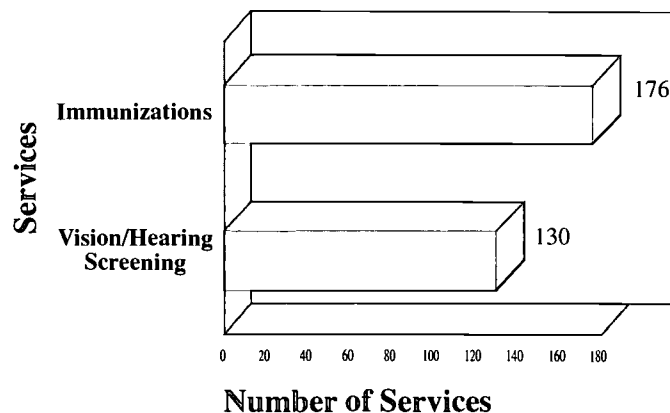
**Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998**

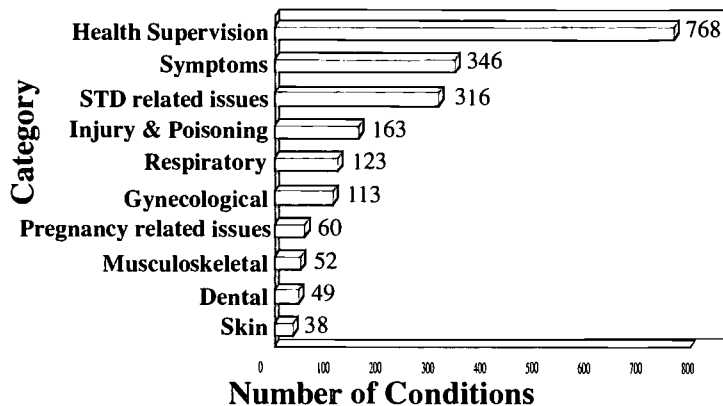

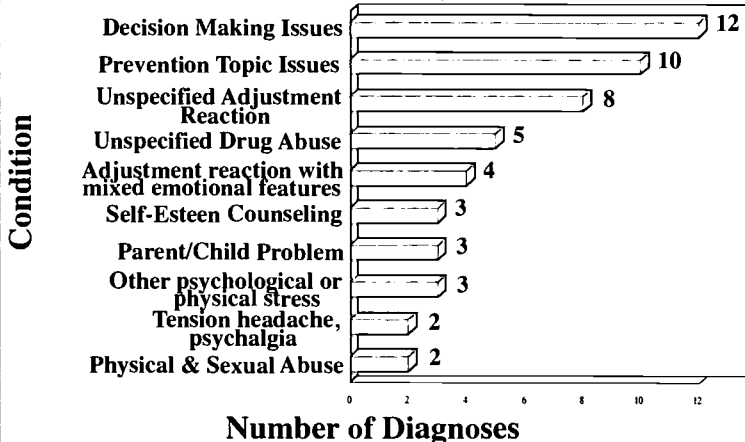

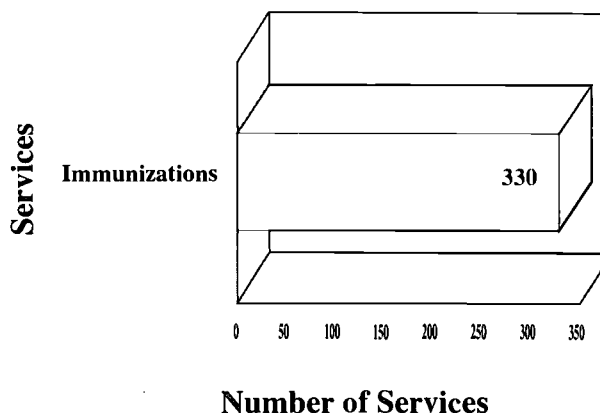
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

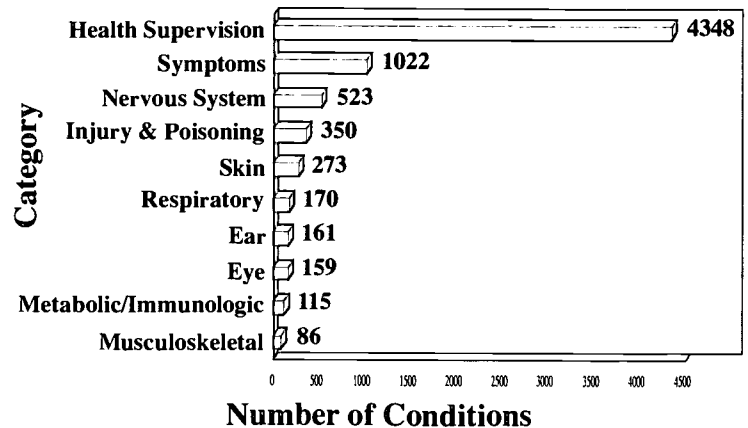

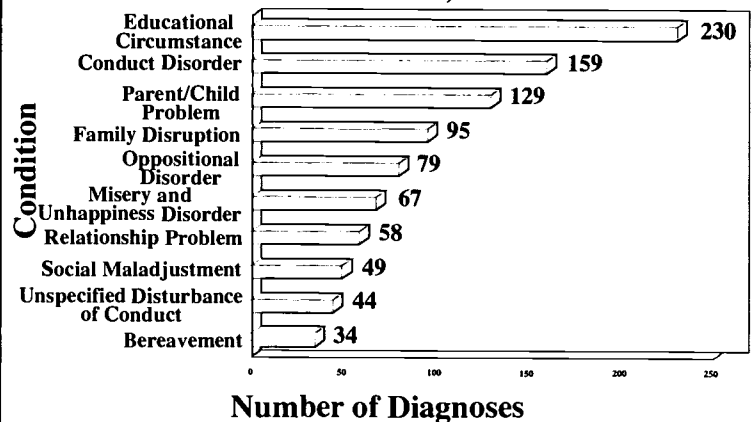

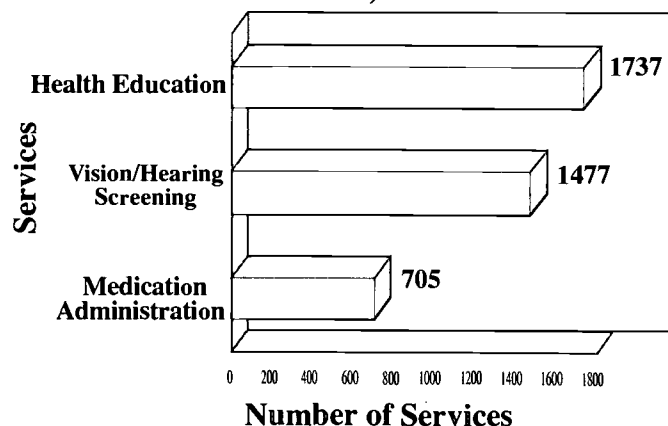
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

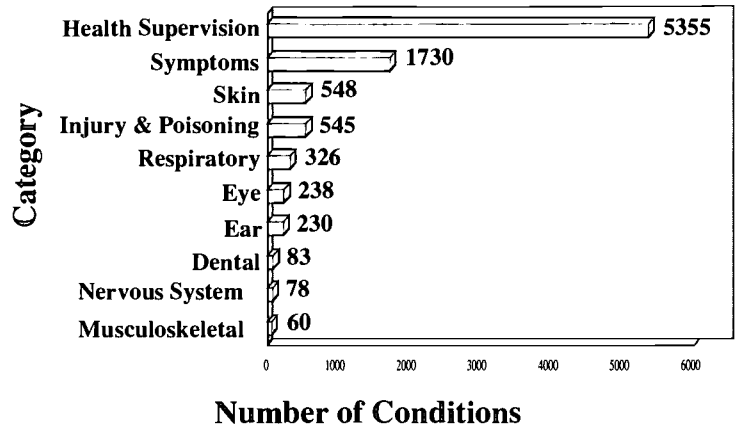

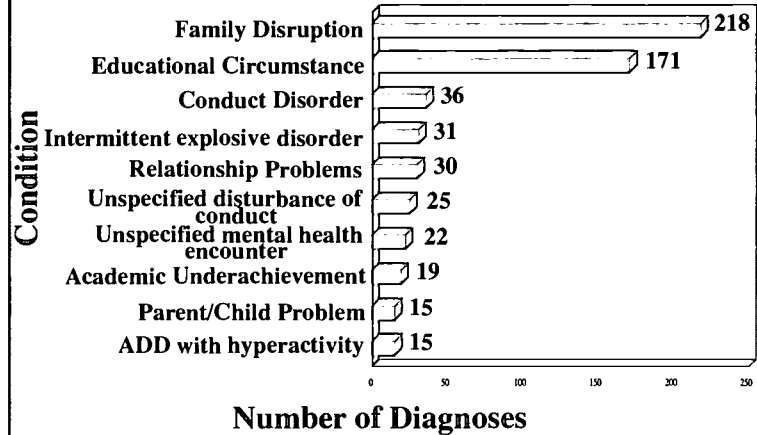

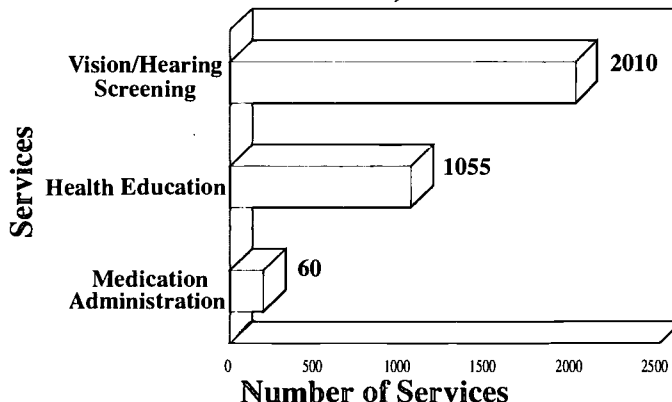
**Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998**

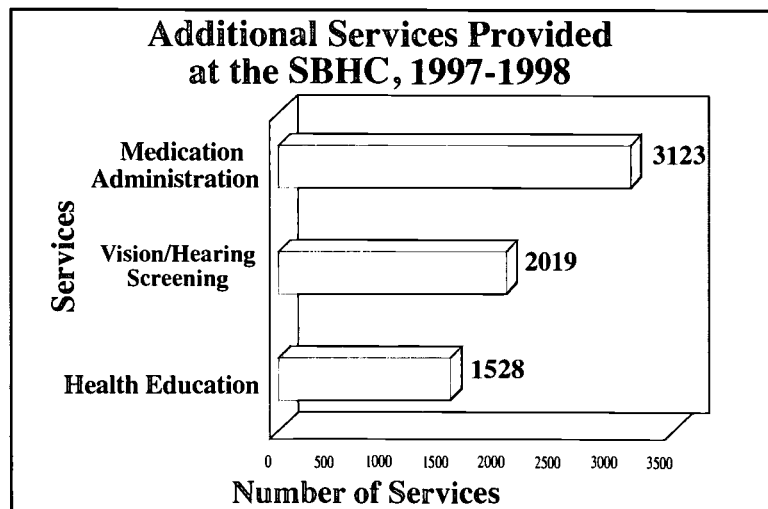
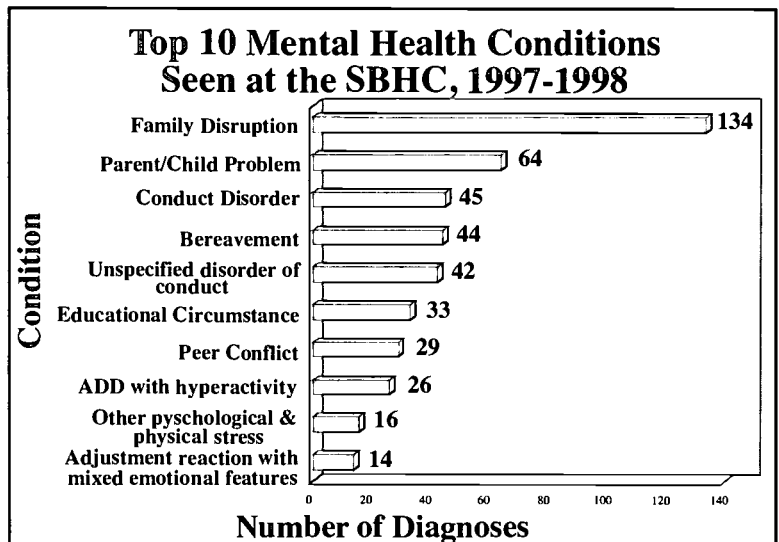
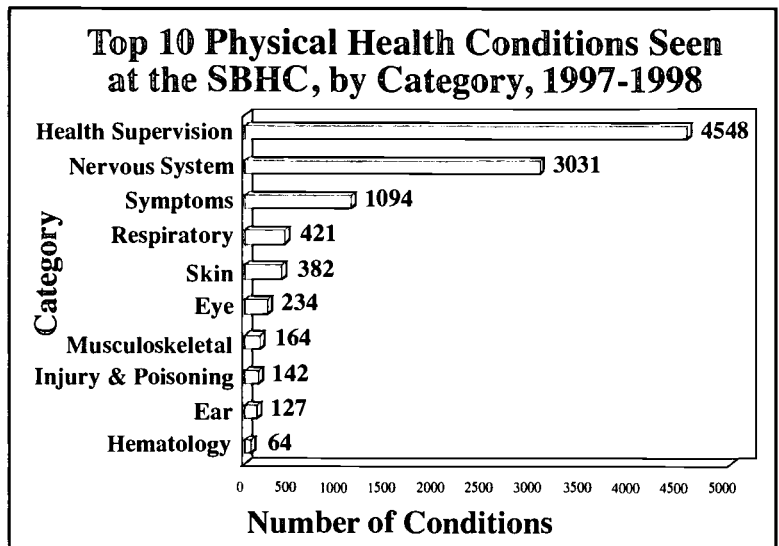

## Highlights

The social worker worked with an 11-year old female referred for poor academic performance, attendance, and rebelliousness. The fifth grader is being reared by the paternal grandparents. The youth has frequent contact with the father and none with the mother. An appointment with the nurse practitioner yielded an asthma diagnosis. Grandma and the youth worked with the social worker in individual and conjoint sessions. The youth has been able to forge a relationship with the legal guardians, the grandparents, and has recently started to communicate with her natural mother. A follow-up visit indicated that the student's medical condition is under control and attendance and grades have improved.



A 15-year old female diabetic presented with symptoms of hyperglycemia and hives to the upper extremities. A CBG was done and the results were high. Her mother and primary care physician were immediately notified. She was continuously monitored through the collaborative efforts of the health center nurse and school nurse until she was transported to a Lafayette Hospital. She was admitted to intensive care and released a few days later. The health center staff assisted her transition in returning to school by developing an emergency plan and staff orientation.



A 17-year old presented to the health center complaining of left ear pain and decreased hearing. The nurse was unable to view the ear drum due to blockage. A small amount of debris was removed. Ear drops were prescribed. The student returned several days later complaining of a buzzing in this ear. The hearing results had slightly improved from his last visit and he reported that he was applying ear drops as prescribed. The nurse irrigated the left ear again and a large foreign object was removed. After the removal of the gauze-like substance, the student passed his hearing test with no apparent difficulty. The student had no recollection of a foreign object placed in this ear but reported to the nurse "I can hear out of my left ear again".

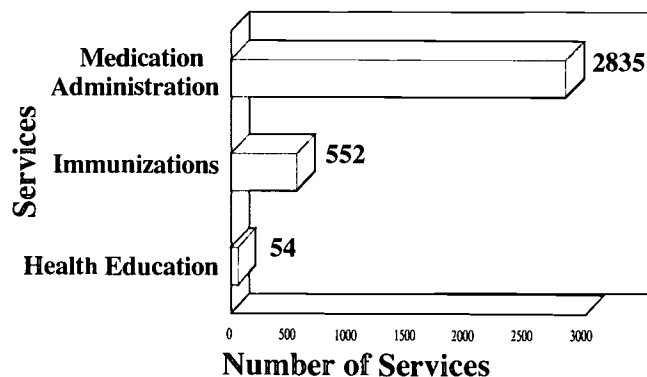
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

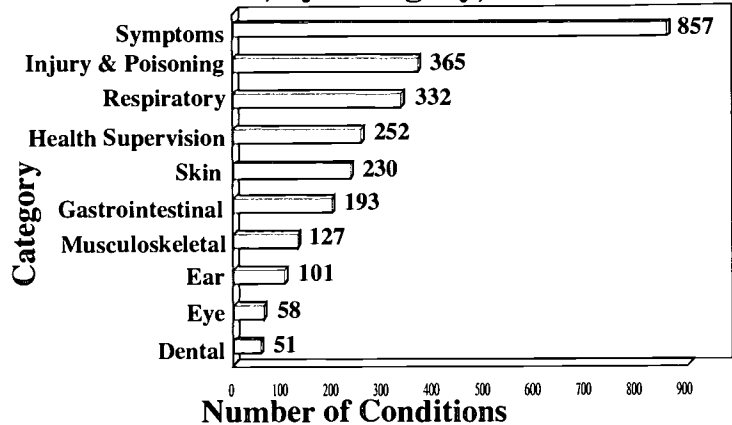

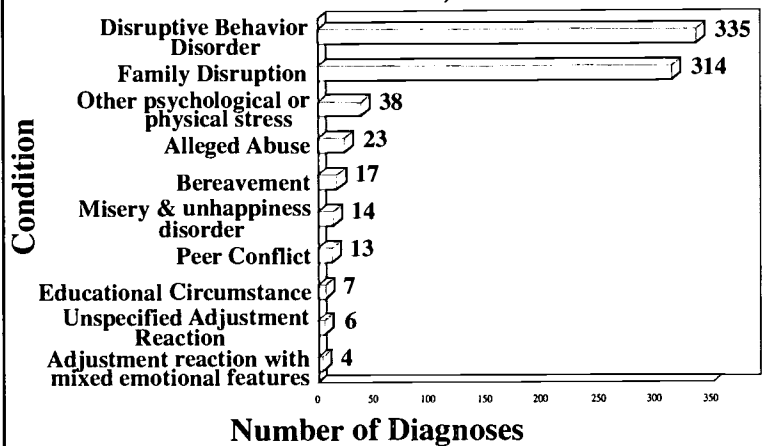

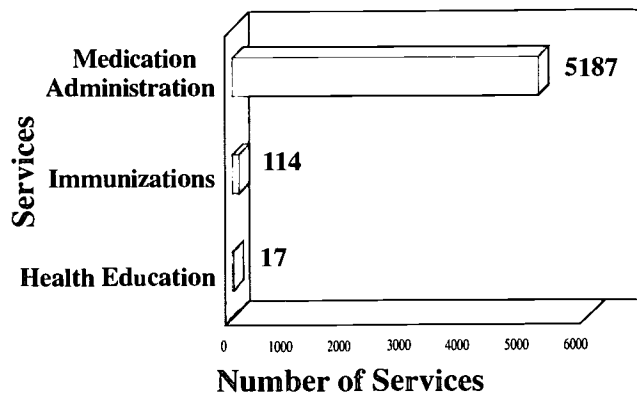
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

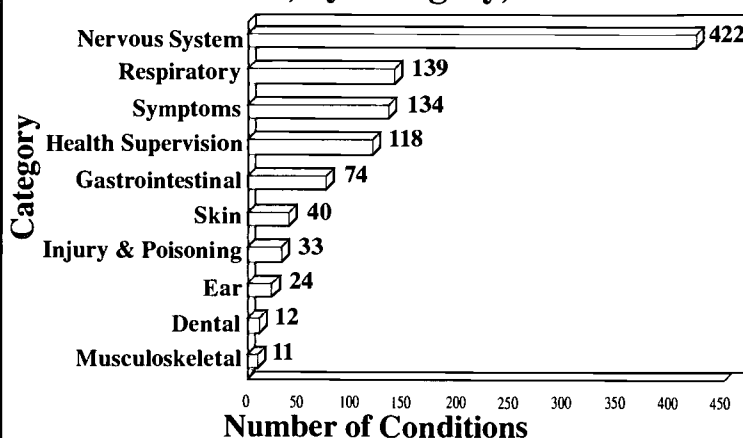

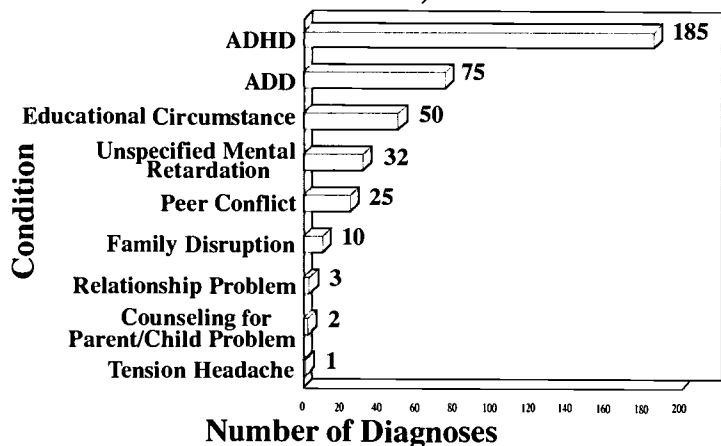

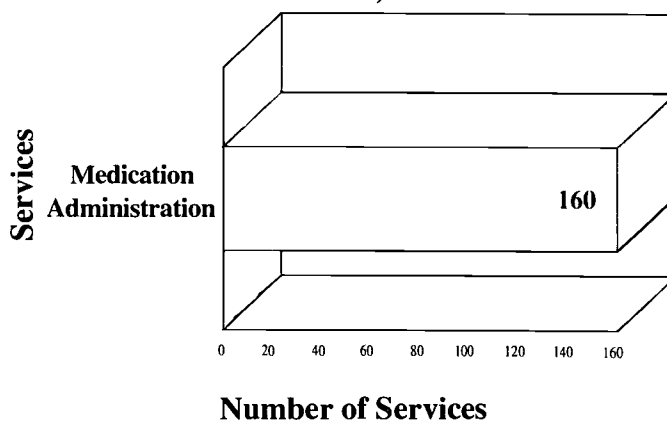
**Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998**

### Highlights

A frantic mother called one morning stating that she recently discovered that her first grade daughter had been sexually molested by a friend of the family. The girl had already been examined by a hospital medical staff member. The perpetrator, a male, was also known to another family, whose children had witnessed some of the abuse. All children involved were students at the school. As is typical of these cases, the perpetrator had silenced all of the children with threats of harm.

The social worker conducted initial crisis and post-trauma counseling with the abused child and her mother and also with the second family involved. Referrals were given to both families for ongoing individual and family counseling. The mother of the abused child called after the first few days to tell us how appreciative she and the other parent were of the initial intervention. The social worker continued to see the children on a weekly basis. SBHC team consultations were held on the student's behalf with parents, principal, and the Office of Community Services. During the weeks that followed, the mother contacted us with updates and to tell us how much better her daughter was doing and to thank us for our help.

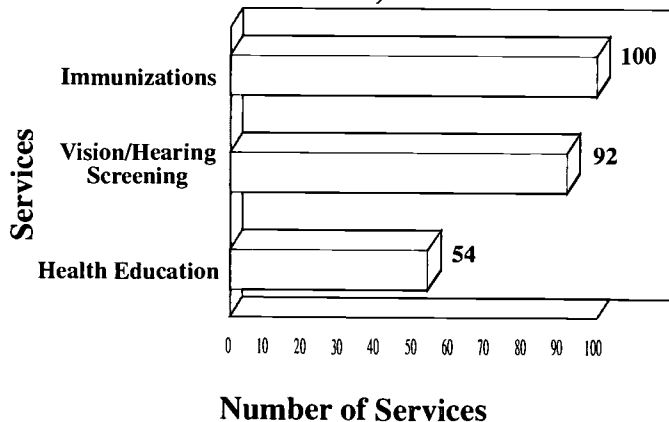
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

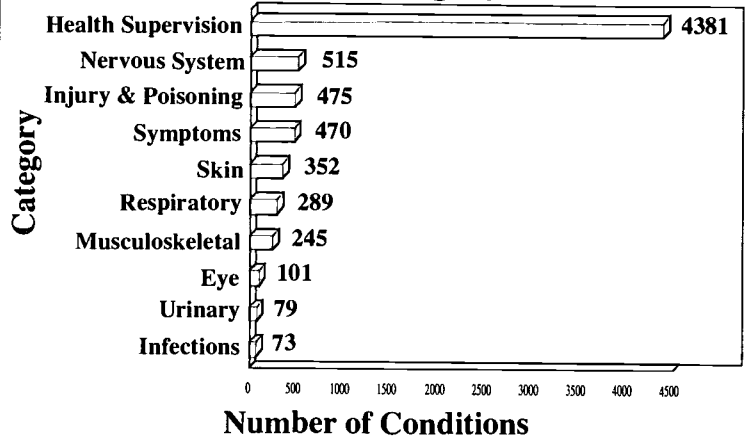

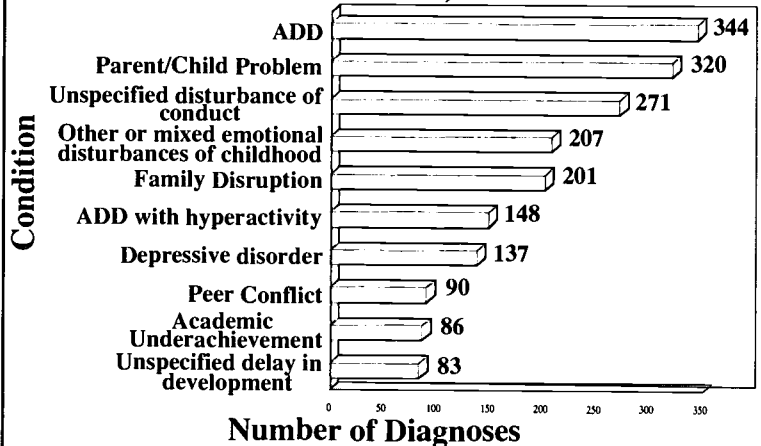

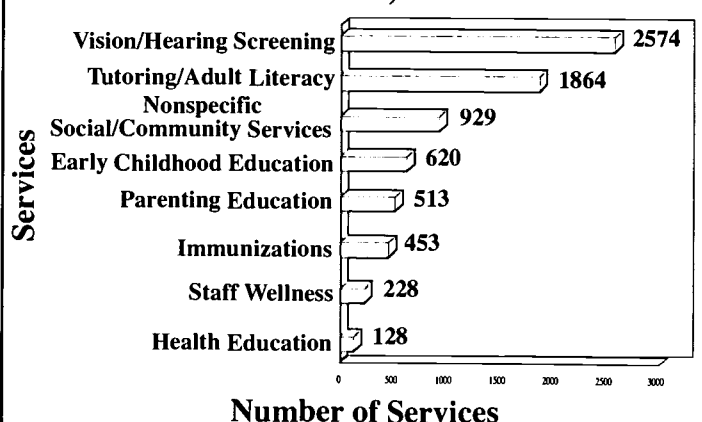
### Top 10 Physical Health Conditions Seen at the SBHC, by Category, 1997-1998

## Highlights

Recognizing that the health of the child is affected by the competence and well-being of the family, the BellSouth Foundation awarded the Family Service Center a three year grant as part of the Linking Health with Education initiative. These funds are being used to help parents improve their vocational and employability skills.

Following is one family's experience of the benefit of wrap-around and support services.

Mrs. Smith (not her real name), a single mother of two young children, with very low literacy skills and no work experience enrolled with her family in the FSC Even Start Family Literacy Program. She made significant gains in her academic levels, and is now able to help her children with their homework. She completed the child care vocational training and was recruited by an early childhood program as an aide. One of her young children was referred for counseling due to academic and behavior problems. Mrs. Smith and her child worked with the FSC counselor and the FSC parenting educator to resolve these issues. Her son is now achieving academic success and she is more confident in her parenting skills. Along the way, both children have been seen by the FSC physicians and nurses for various health concerns. Additionally, Mrs. Smith has benefited from the health education embedded in her literacy training, maintaining a higher level of wellness for both herself and her children. According to Dr. Pat Schneider, medical director for the FSC, a child's health is just as dependent on the parent's ability to provide for the family, to read and follow medical directions and to provide a positive role model as it is dependent on doctors and medicine. All these supports, working together, are making a difference for the families in this community.

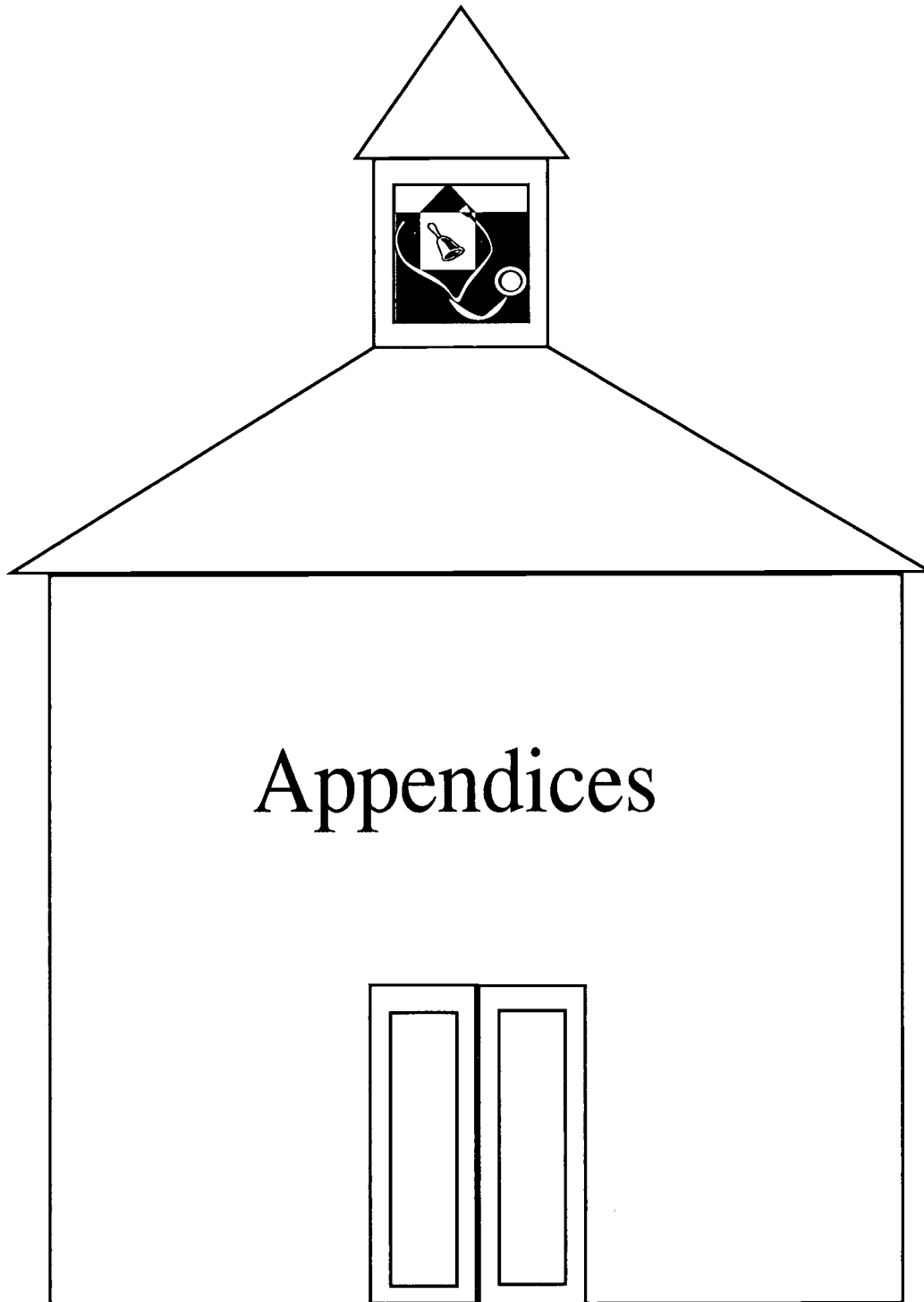

*Appendix A*

***CATEGORY DEFINITIONS OF CONDITIONS SEEN  
AT LOUISIANA SBHCs***

**International Classification of Disease, Version 9 (ICD-9) codes are grouped into general categories. A definition of categories follows:**

**Cardiovascular:** elevated blood pressure, hypertension and hypotension

**Congenital Anomaly:** any condition or malformation the child is born with including, but not limited to, certain heart conditions, spina bifida and all chromosomal abnormalities

**Dental:** dental caries and diseases of teeth and gums

**Ear:** ear infections and wax build-up

**Emotional:** includes all mental health service provisions such as individual counseling, family counseling, group counseling, case management and diagnoses such as adjustment disorder with depressed mood, conduct disorder, parent-child problem, academic problem, bereavement and attention deficit disorders

**Endocrine:** diabetes mellitus and thyroid disease

**Eye:** diagnoses related to eyes and vision such as vision problems, conjunctivitis, injury to the eye and nearsightedness

**Gastrointestinal:** diarrhea, irritable bowel syndrome, constipation, gastroenteritis and other digestive disorders

**Gynecological:** dysmenorrhea (painful menstruation), irregular menses and other gynecological disorders

**Health Supervision:** includes but is not limited to, routine health checks, physical exams, immunizations, lab test follow-ups, dietary surveillance and counseling



**Hematology:** anemia and blood disorders

**Infections:** chicken pox, influenza, hepatitis, viral infections and exposure to communicable disease

**Injuries & Poisonings:** superficial injuries or contusions, sprains, strains, allergies and burns

**Metabolic/Immunologic:** obesity and dehydration

**Musculoskeletal:** joint pain, joint swelling, tendonitis, scoliosis and any bone, cartilage, or muscle disorders

**Neoplasm:** any abnormal growth including both benign and cancerous tumors

**Nervous System:** seizure disorder and cerebral palsy

**No Diagnosis:** to include, but not limited to those visits in which a medical diagnosis could not or was not given such as mental health encounter where further evaluation was required

**Pregnancy & Related Issues:** suspected pregnancy, pregnancy counseling, prenatal care, post partum care and bleeding in pregnancy

**Respiratory:** acute upper respiratory infections, asthma, sinusitis and other respiratory disorders

**Sexually Transmitted Diseases:** chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, genital warts and genital herpes

**Skin:** diagnoses related to skin disorders such as acne, warts, psoriasis, scabies, head lice, ringworm, athlete's foot, contact dermatitis and ingrown nail

**Symptoms:** headache, cold, fever, abdominal pain, throat pain, backache, nausea and vomiting

**Urinary:** urinary tract infection and urethritis

**Appendix B**

**ADOLESCENT SCHOOL HEALTH INITIATIVE ACT  
R.S. 40:31.3**

To enact R.S. 40:31.3, relative to adolescent school health; to require the Office of Public Health, Department of Health and Hospitals, to establish an adolescent school health initiative; and to provide for related matters.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

Section 1. R.S. 40:31.3 is hereby enacted to read as follows:

31.3. Adolescent school health initiative; health centers in schools

A. The Office of Public Health, Department of Health and Hospitals, shall establish an adolescent school health initiative to facilitate and encourage development of comprehensive health centers in public middle and secondary schools in Louisiana which shall provide preventive health services, counseling, acute health services, and appropriate referral for acute health services. Such initiative shall be subject to the approval of the local school systems.

B. The Office of Public Health shall:

(1) Coordinate efforts to facilitate and encourage establishment of health centers in schools by providing information, technical assistance, direction, and, to the extent appropriate, funds to locally based entities for the establishment and operation of health centers in middle and secondary schools.

(2) Convene and participate in an intergovernmental coordinating council which shall be composed of representatives from the department of education, social services, health and hospitals, and other governmental entities or programs related to health services to assist in implementation, oversight, and funding assistance for health centers in schools.

(3) Apply for and assist local efforts to apply for all available public and private funds to establish and operate health centers in schools.

(4) Establish procedures for allocation of funds appropriated or otherwise available to the program in a manner which prioritizes funding according to the urgency and degree of health care needs among the various middle and secondary school populations.

(5) Establish criteria to be considered in selection of locations or placement of health centers in schools.

C. Health centers in schools are prohibited from:

(1) Counseling or advocating abortion in any way or referring any student to any organization for counseling or advocating abortion.

(2) Distributing at any public school any contraceptive or abortifacient drug, device, or other similar product.

D. The provisions of this Section shall be applicable only to the extent that funds are made available for this purpose from public or private sources.

Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature by the governor, as provided in Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana.
