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ABSTRACT

This report details the 27th annual study to examine the attitudes of student leaders in U.S. high schools. Participating in the survey were 3,370 adolescents, primarily 16- and 17-year-olds, who had been featured in the 1996 edition of "Who's Who Among American High School Students." The report presents demographic information on the survey participants and provides tables of the survey findings, including breakdowns by sex, race, type of school attended, and type of community. The findings are organized in the following sections: education; school uniforms; prayer in school; high school experiences; school violence; weapons; cheating in school; sexual behavior and attitudes; sexual harassment, assault, and date rape; cigarettes, alcohol, and drugs; peer pressure; tattoos/body piercing; future plans; personal finances; confidence in institutions; important influences; home life; happiness/depression; suicide; popularity; lifestyles; the nation's and their generation's greatest crisis; aspirations; media/technology; prejudice; ethnic diversity and immigration; and abortion. A summary section highlights overall findings, which indicated unexpected levels of stress, depression, and thoughts of suicide. Sexual issues were worrisome to many of these students, and three-quarters admitted to cheating in school to get ahead. Most students studied 7 hours or less per week, and spent at least 8 hours or more per week on social activities, athletics, extracurricular activities, and watching television. (KB)

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Introduction

This survey was conducted by *Who's Who Among American High School Students*, Lake Forest, Illinois, during the spring of 1996 for the purpose of determining the attitudes of student leaders in our nation's high schools. It is the largest independent sampling of this segment of the student population taken annually and this year marks its 27th anniversary. *Who's Who* believes that, in these rapidly changing times, it is important for the nation to be aware of students' opinions and attitudes. Today's teens are an important segment of the present voting population. Hopefully, as the data from this 27th national survey is circulated and studied, significant trends will be uncovered.

We regard this survey as an educational experiment. We are in no way attempting to promote or negate any political, moral or social philosophy, organization, firm or individual. Because of our contact with student leaders, we believe we are in a position to gather important facts and meaningful information and, therefore, have a corporate responsibility to conduct this survey.

Although we of *Who's Who* feel that some of the questions and answers are of a private and controversial nature, we do not hesitate to take the responsibility for the project in order to achieve our objective of identifying and measuring students' attitudes. We apologize to anyone offended by any of the material presented herein.

Though by no means a reflection of today's "average" student because it is dealing with the opinions of student leaders and high achievers, we feel this survey does give

insights into the thoughts of those leaders who set standards and behavior patterns for others to follow.

Of the 751,929 high achievers featured in the 1996 edition of *Who's Who Among American High School Students*, 7,500 students were sent the survey and 3,370 completed questionnaires were returned.

These 3,370 responses form the base of the survey. All students surveyed were members of the junior or senior class during the 1995-96 academic year. They were selected for recognition in *Who's Who* by their principals or guidance counselors, other faculty members, national youth organizations or the publishing company because of their high achievement in academics, activities, community service, athletics or their performance in national scholarship or award contests.

The students listed in the 30th Annual Edition of *Who's Who* represent just over 5 percent of the 14,000,000 students who were in high school during the 1995-96 academic year. They represent approximately 18,000 of the 22,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the nation.

This survey was tabulated by computer. Questions were tabulated by total response. Breakdowns by sex, race, type of school attended and type of community are also included. On questions calling for write-in answers, results are shown of the most frequently mentioned answers.

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IT'S LONELY AT THE TOP

Life In the Fast Lane Causes High-Achieving Teens To Consider Suicide

Top Teens Worry and Work Their Childhood Away in World Full of Guns and Gangs, Date Rape, Rampant Cheating, Rising College Costs and Drugs

LAKE FOREST, IL — Citing concerns about the dangerous and fast-paced adult world in which they live, more than 26 percent of high-achieving teens surveyed by *Who's Who Among American High School Students* say they have considered suicide as the answer to a myriad of difficult problems. Their answers to the *Who's Who Among American High School Students' 27th Annual Survey of High Achievers* reveal startling levels of stress, teen depression, and thoughts of suicide. The main cause of their distress? Teens today are dealing with the pressures of growing up too fast.

According to the survey, today's high-achieving teens worry about their personal safety in the halls at school, report a staggering increase in the drug problem among their peers, are forced to confront sexual time bombs such as date rape, abortion and pregnancy, and worry about their precarious financial and educational futures.

"The most devastating thing we've learned is that too many of these kids see suicide as the only way out of a morass of problems," said Paul Krouse, publisher of *Who's Who Among American High School Students*. "Too many adults often dismiss the notion that being a teenager is hard. After all, what could young people possibly have to worry about? Well, when we asked them, we found out that much like adults, today's teens have a lot weighing on their minds — affording college, crime and drugs, sexual violence, their economic futures, not to mention their family life."

SUICIDE . . .

- **SUICIDE:** One-quarter (26%) have considered committing suicide, and 4 percent have tried to commit suicide.
- **PARENTAL INFLUENCE:** Students say their family problems — a fight with parents (40%) and divorce/family problems (20%) — are among the reasons why they have considered suicide.
- **DIVORCE:** Students with divorced parents were more likely to have considered suicide (32% vs. 24%) or tried to commit suicide (7% vs. 3%) than those with married parents.
- **SEX:** Those who have had sex were more likely to have considered suicide (38% vs. 23%) or tried to commit suicide (10% vs. 3%) than abstainers.
- **RAPE:** 31 percent of those who have been forced to have sex by a friend or acquaintance — and 19 percent of those who have been forced by a date — have tried to commit suicide.
- **STRESS AND DEPRESSION:** More than half of the students (51%) say they often or always feel stressed out, and 15 percent say they often or always feel depressed.

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DRUGS . . .

- **DRUGS IN SCHOOL:** One in three students (33%) believe drugs and alcohol are the most serious problem facing their high schools (more than double the 16% found in last year's survey).
- **AVAILABILITY:** Almost one-half of the students (45%) report drug dealing at their schools.
- **DRUGS AND VIOLENCE:** One-fifth (20%) of the students blame drugs for the level of violence in their schools.

... SEX, VIOLENCE AND COMPETING IN A GROWN-UP WORLD

- **DATE RAPE:** One in ten (10%) females have been forced to have sexual intercourse against their will.
- **ABORTION:** 52 percent of females know someone at school who has had an abortion.
- **PREMARITAL SEX:** 46 percent of the sexually active students say they worry about unwanted pregnancy.
- **BIRTH CONTROL:** More than one-third (37%) of those who've had sex admit they would have sex even if a condom were not available.
- **GANG VIOLENCE:** Almost one in five (19%) report gangs at their schools.
- **SCHOOL SAFETY:** 12 percent of students feel unsafe at schools.
- **CHEATING:** Almost nine in ten (88%) say cheating is common at their school.
- **FINANCIAL CONCERNS:** College is the number one reason (42%) students save money — a distant second is clothes (19%).

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH KIDS TODAY?

Depression, Pressure, and Suicide

Considering the dangerous, pressure-filled environment in which they live, it's no wonder today's teens are not as happy and carefree as many television sitcoms suggest. More than half of the *Who's Who* students (51%) say they often or always feel stressed out, 31 percent often or always feel frustrated, 26 percent say they often or always feel moody, and 15 percent say they often or always feel depressed.

Many of these moods may not seem serious at first glance, but consider this: more than one quarter (26%) have considered committing suicide, and 4 percent have tried to commit suicide. "If any adult thinks for one second that these teens are just being melodramatic about their feelings," Krouse explained, "they should quickly dismiss the thought once they realize how many have actually considered taking their own lives."

Explanations for suicide attempts range from general depression (68%) to school pressures (45%) to the break-up of a relationship (19%). And nowhere does the psychological impact of date rape show up so clearly: 31 percent of those who have been forced to have sexual intercourse by a friend or acquaintance — and 19 percent of those who have been forced by a date — have tried to commit suicide (compared to 4 percent of all students).

Some of life's other difficulties cause similar reactions: students with divorced parents were more likely to have considered suicide (32% vs. 24%) or tried to commit suicide (7% vs. 3%) than those students with married parents. And, the decision to have sex also seems to have some serious implications. Those who have engaged in sexual intercourse were more likely to have considered suicide (38% vs. 23%) or tried to commit suicide (10% vs. 3%) than those students who have chosen to abstain.

- MORE -

Contrary to popular belief, famed rocker Kurt Cobain and other celebrities who have either attempted or committed suicide aren't the only ones who serve as examples to America's impressionable youth. One in five of today's teens (18%) know someone their own age who has committed suicide, and two in five (41%) know people their own age who have tried to kill themselves.

JUST DON'T DO IT

The '96 campaign season was ripe with references to an increased drug problem among our nation's youth. Well, there's some truth in politics. Almost one-half of the *Who's Who* students (45%) report drug dealing at their schools, half of the students (50%) say it is easy or not very difficult to obtain drugs at their schools, one in three (33%) believe drugs and alcohol are the most serious problem facing their high schools, roughly one in six (14%) feel drugs are the most serious problem confronting their generation, and one-fifth (20%) blame drugs for the level of violence in their schools. Today's high-achievers are doing drugs too: the number of students who have tried marijuana has doubled since 1993 (up from 7% to 14%).

It's also clear from these students' responses that drugs and alcohol have rocked their lives. Close to half (41%) think some of their friends have a problem with alcohol, and almost two in five (36%) say the same about drugs. Almost four in five (79%) of the students say it is easy or not very difficult for them and their friends to obtain alcohol, and an equal number (77%) say it is very common at parties. This familiarity with alcohol has some dangerous consequences: 10 percent of students say they have driven a car after drinking, and more than double that number (22%) say they have been passengers in a car whose driver had been drinking.

DODGE CITY HIGH SCHOOL

"Unfortunately, alcohol and drugs aren't the only dangers lurking in school halls," Krouse said. "To hear these students describe it, you would think that our nation's classrooms have become war zones, and our students the targets." A startling number of the students (29%) know someone who has brought a weapon to school, almost one-fifth (19%) report gangs at school, and roughly one-half (49%) have witnessed frequent fistfights between students. In this embattled environment, it's not surprising that roughly one in eight (12%) admit they feel unsafe at school. When asked about the greatest crises facing our nation today, more than one-quarter of these students chose "crime on our streets" (27%) – a close second only to "decline of moral and social values" (30%).

Another political truism borne out by these students: our nation's private schools are safer than their public counterparts. Today's private school students are less likely to feel unsafe at school (3% vs. 15%), to report drug dealing (26% vs. 49%) or alcohol availability (63% vs. 83%), and to report gangs at their schools (5% vs. 23%). Don't believe everything you read about the declining quality of our nation's public schools, however — roughly four out of five (81%) of all *Who's Who* students, both public and private, give their schools an 'A' or 'B' for their quality of education.

THE BIRDS, THE BEES, STDs, AND DATE RAPE

Sex weighs heavily on the worry list for these top teens. The one in five students who have had sex (19%) worry about everything from pregnancy (46%) and AIDS/STDs (28%/26%) to their reputations (8%), and their parents' reaction (13%). It's no wonder that many more students fear pregnancy than AIDS when you consider that almost half (45%) know someone who has had an abortion.

- MORE -

Those who choose to wait to have sex do so because of several factors: nearly half (47%) prefer to wait for marriage, 17 percent say they aren't ready yet, 16 percent claim they have not met the right person yet, while the remaining 20 percent abstain because of their fear of disease and pregnancy or because their religion discourages it.

While it's clear that the *Who's Who* students think a lot about whether to have sex, those who have taken the plunge decided to for a variety of reasons: 55 percent did so because they were in love with their partner, 22 percent first had sex because they were curious, 12 percent because they were pressured by their partners, 4 percent because they were under the influence of drugs or alcohol, 4 percent because they wanted to lose their virginity, and 3 percent because they felt peer pressure to do so.

And, while these teens may worry about getting pregnant or contracting AIDS, far too many fail to take the necessary precautions. Only slightly more than half (53%) say they or their partner always uses condoms, and roughly one-fifth (22%) say they or their partner always take birth control pills. More than one-third (37%) also admit they would have sex even if a condom were not available.

Consensual sex is not the only danger these students are familiar with. Sexual violence permeates the lives of too many. More than one-quarter (28%) know someone who has been a victim of date rape, while an astonishing 10 percent of the female students have been victims themselves.

"While this survey reveals a whole host of evils facing today's teens," Krouse said, "none is more disturbing than the alarming number of females who have been victims of date rape. As far as I'm concerned, this hostile environment in which our young women live should be declared a national state of emergency."

GUESS WHAT? CHEATERS DO PROSPER

With all the hazards on the road to success, today's high achievers are concerned about getting into college and succeeding in work. But they have become cynical about their responsibilities as students. Three-quarters of these top teens (76%) admit to cheating to get ahead; and most (67%) say it "didn't seem like a big deal." It's no wonder they're not afraid of the consequences when almost nine in ten (88%) say cheating is common at their schools, roughly an equal number (92%) of those who have cheated say they were never caught, and more than a half (59%) say it would be easy or not very difficult to obtain test questions/answers at their schools.

TODAY'S SUPERTEENS: ALL SCHOOL, WORK AND PLAY

"Well, we certainly refer to these students as high achievers for a reason," Krouse said. "Today's *Who's Who* teens take their futures very seriously." So much so that roughly nine in ten (92%) choose "preparation so I can go to the college of my choice" as the one thing they want most from their high school experience, a choice that beat out gaining employable skills (5%) and making friends (2%).

And, while they may not be very committed to their studies – 53 percent spend seven hours or less per week studying – they manage to keep busy. Today's high achievers spend eight or more hours per week on their social lives (46%), on athletics (40%), on extracurricular activities (36%), and on watching TV (23%).

- MORE -

Despite all of these commitments, today's top teens still find time for part-time jobs. The majority (53%) say they currently get most of their money from their jobs. Perhaps so many of them work because they are worried about financing their college education: an overwhelming number (42%) report they are saving money for college – a distant second is clothes (19%). And, more than half (54%) think affording an education will be more difficult for them than it was for their parents. In fact, students seem so worried about the rising cost of college that one in five (20%) say the one thing they want most from their parents is financial support.

PARENTS ARE A TEEN'S BEST FRIEND?

Many of today's parents must be doing something right because their teens have given them the greatest compliment ever – almost seven in ten (67%) say they would raise their own children the same way they were raised. And, three in five (59%) report that they live in happy homes.

While many adults answer the question "Are you stressed?" with a resounding "Yes!" they may dismiss teens as over-emotional and naïve when they seem unhappy or overwhelmed. Well, according to the survey, parents are actually part of the problem. Roughly one in three students (30%) say their parents have the biggest impact on their moods – tied only with friends and roughly double the effect of grades (18%) and girlfriends or boyfriends (15%). Even further proof: students name "a fight with parents" (40%) and divorce/family problems (20%) as two of the most important reasons they have considered killing themselves.

"There's no question that parents can be part of the problem," Krouse said. "But, they are also part of the solution to teen stress and suicide. Teens have always looked to their parents for love, guidance, and acceptance. And, now more than ever, parents must be sure not to look away."

The *Who's Who* annual survey was conducted among 3,370 high-achieving 16- to 18-year-old students, all of whom have an "A" or "B" average, and 98% of whom plan to attend college after high school graduation. The survey asked about school life, sexual activity, social issues, study habits, drug and alcohol use, and teen suicide.
