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ABSTRACT

This report presents the 1998 statistical findings of the annual survey to determine the attitudes of national high school student leaders. Questionnaires were completed by 3,123 high school juniors and seniors, all of whom were selected for recognition in "Who's Who among American High School Students." In addition to demographic information, the report details responses regarding the following areas of student life and contemporary issues: (1) education; (2) school violence; (3) weapons and violence; (4) Clinton-Lewinsky affair; (5) attitudes toward media; (6) sexual harassment and assault; (7) cheating/misconduct; (8) sexual behavior and attitudes; (9) condom distribution in school; (10) abortion; (11) cigarettes, alcohol and drugs; (12) peer pressure; (13) teen trends; (14) parental involvement; (15) future/aspirations; (16) important influences; (17) family meal time; (18) happiness; (19) suicide; (20) internet usage; (21) extracurricular activities; (22) generation's greatest crisis; (23) prejudice; (24) sexual orientation; and (25) affirmative action. 

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Introduction

This survey was conducted by *Who's Who Among American High School Students*, Lake Forest, Illinois, during the spring of 1998 for the purpose of determining the attitudes of student leaders in our nation's high schools. It is the largest independent sampling of this segment of the student population taken annually and this year marks its 29th anniversary. *Who's Who* believes that, in these rapidly changing times, it is important for the nation to be aware of students' opinions and attitudes. Today's teens are an important segment of the present and future voting population. Hopefully, as the data from this 29th national survey is circulated and studied, significant trends will be uncovered.

We regard this survey as an educational experiment. We are in no way attempting to promote or negate any political, moral or social philosophy, organization, firm or individual. Because of our contact with student leaders, we believe we are in a position to gather important facts and meaningful information and, therefore, have a corporate responsibility to conduct this survey.

Although we of *Who's Who* feel that some of the questions and answers are of a private and controversial nature, we do not hesitate to take the responsibility for the project in order to achieve our objective of identifying and measuring students' attitudes. We apologize to anyone offended by any of the material presented herein.

Though by no means a reflection of today's "average" student because it is dealing with the opinions of student

leaders and high achievers, we feel this survey does give insights into the thoughts of those leaders who set standards and behavior patterns for others to follow.

Of the 734,834 high achievers featured in the 32nd Annual Edition of *Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1997-98*, 7,500 students were sent the survey and 3,123 completed questionnaires were returned.

These 3,123 responses form the base of the survey. All students surveyed were members of the junior or senior class during the 1997-98 academic year. They were selected for recognition in *Who's Who* by their principals or guidance counselors, other faculty members, national youth organizations or the publishing company because of their high achievement in academics, activities, community service, athletics or their performance in national scholarship or award contests.

The students listed in the 32nd Annual Edition of *Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1997-98* represent just over 5 percent of the 14,000,000 students who were in high school during the 1997-98 academic year. They represent approximately 20,000 of the 24,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the nation.

This survey was tabulated by computer. Questions were tabulated by total response. Breakdowns by sex, race, type of school attended and type of community are also included. On questions calling for write-in answers, results are shown of the most frequently mentioned answers.

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CHEATING AND SUCCEEDING: RECORD NUMBERS OF TOP HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TAKE ETHICAL SHORTCUTS

*Who's Who Finds Troubling Trends, Some Good News
in 29th Annual Survey of High Achievers*

Prejudice, Cheating, Birth Control Use on the Rise; Drinking and Driving Decline

LAKE FOREST, IL – Four out of five teens at the top of their classes say they got there the easy way, according to this year's poll of students honored in *Who's Who Among American High School Students*. A full 80 percent admit to having cheated during their impressive academic careers, the highest percentage in the 29-year history of the survey. Most students seem blasé about their own ethical slips (53 percent say it was "no big deal") and virtually all (95%) avoided getting caught. Even so, nearly two times as many students this year than last year (46% versus 25%) point to "declining social and moral values" as the biggest problem facing their generation today. Crime and violence came in a distant second place, cited by 15 percent.

"In all likelihood, when these kids look at the examples now being set by traditional role models – the president, business leaders, Hollywood stars, even the clergy – they have an easier time excusing their own behavior," said Joe Krouse, associate publisher of *Who's Who Among American High School Students*.

The increase in cheating – a four percent jump from last year's survey – was one of the findings of the 29th Annual Survey of High Achievers. Among other disturbing results: large leaps in levels of prejudice against homosexuals (up 19 percent from last year) and against African Americans and Hispanics (both more than doubled, from 7 to 15 percent). The news on other fronts was more cheering, including a sharp drop in those who mix their own driving with drinking (from 10 down to 4 percent) and a plunge in the number who have ridden with a driver who had been drinking – from 24 down to 9 percent.

These and other survey highlights:

- **SHAKY VALUES:** Almost half (46%) named a decline in social and moral values as the biggest problem facing their generation today; crime and violence came next (15%).
- **CHEATING:** Four out of five (80%) admit to cheating on school work, up 4 percentage points from last year; a majority (53%) said the transgression was no big deal.
- **SEX:** Nearly one in five students (18%) has had sexual intercourse – the majority of them (84%) when they were 16 years old or younger.
- **CONDOMS AT SCHOOL:** Almost two-thirds of all sexually active students (64%) say they would be more likely to use condoms every time if the school distributed them.
- **PREJUDICE:** Tolerance is shrinking among the brightest teens: 48 percent say they are prejudiced against homosexuals – up 19 percent from last year; and 15 percent are prejudiced against African Americans and Hispanics – each up 8 percent.
- **DRINKING:** Nearly one-half of the brightest teens (47%) say they have consumed alcohol, despite being underage; more than three-quarters (78%) say obtaining alcohol is easy or not very difficult.
- **VIOLENCE:** Sixteen percent of teens report gang fights occurring at their schools, and 22 percent say students have attacked teachers.

Cheaters DO Prosper

In high school, apparently even the academic elite take a ho-hum attitude toward cheating. Eighty-three percent say cheating is common at their schools, and this is one lapse they don't try to pin on the other guy: a full 80 percent say they have done it themselves. More than one-half (57%) say it would be easy or not very difficult to obtain test questions and answers at their schools.

Perhaps lax enforcement of the rules is partly to blame: 95 percent of the cheaters were never caught. Silence might be another culprit: over one-third of top students (34%) have never heard anything from their parents about cheating. Parents seem unaware that cheating might be an issue their children are grappling with. In fact, in a 1997 survey of parents of *Who's Who* kids, 63 percent stated flatly that their children had never cheated; another 11 percent admitted they had no idea whether their youngsters had bent the rules.

"With such a casual attitude toward cheating on the part of so many parents and school authorities, it's no wonder more than half of the cheaters just shrug it off, saying 'it didn't seem like a big deal,'" said Krouse. "If the folks in charge of moral guidance don't make a bigger fuss about ethical behavior, it *won't be* a big deal."

Resisting Temptation

While talk of sex permeates the airwaves, the vast majority (81%) of students surveyed say they remain chaste. And the overwhelming majority of *Who's Who* teens who are having sex start when they are age 16 or younger (84 percent).

Pregnancy tops the list of worries about the consequences of sexual intercourse for sexually active teens. Forty-two percent cited pregnancy as their chief concern, trailed by AIDS at 25 percent (up from 17% last year), and sexually transmitted diseases and "losing virginity" -- both named by 22 percent. The dual concerns about conception and disease help explain the increased use of birth control, especially condoms -- used "always" by 64 percent of sexually active males. This is up from last year, when 55 percent of sexually active male students reported always using condoms. Birth control pill usage remained the same this year, with 23 percent of sexually active females using the preventive measure. Asked to speculate how distribution of condoms in school would affect their behavior, 64 percent of sexually active students say they would be more likely to use condoms all the time.

"What's interesting this year is that as the use of birth control is increasing, discussions about birth control at home are in a steep decline," said Krouse. "In this year's survey, 53 percent say they have never talked about birth control with their parents, up 12 percent from last year. But wherever they're getting their information, the message is having an effect." In fact, fewer students say they learned about sex from their parents (59 percent) than from their friends (73 percent).

Those who choose to wait to have sex do so because of several factors: 34 percent prefer to wait for marriage (down from 48% in 1997); 17 percent say they aren't ready yet; 11 percent say their religion discourages it; while 13 percent say the fear of disease and pregnancy is responsible.

Alcohol and Drug Use

A startling number of high-achieving teens are not just bending the rules, they're breaking the law. Close to half of them (47%) say they drink alcohol even though they are underage. Almost four in five of the students (78%) say it is easy or not very difficult for them and their friends to obtain alcohol, and an even greater number (81%) say drinking is common at parties.

"With drinking so widespread at such tender ages, it's not surprising that teens are seeing alcohol causing problems," said Krouse. "The younger you are, the less likely you are to be able to handle this potent substance."

Many teens can't. Fifty-three percent of students feel that some of their friends have a problem with alcohol, while 47 percent say driving under the influence is common. It's no wonder that this year's survey also revealed an increase (26% this year versus 19% in 1997) in the number of students who feel that drugs and alcohol are the most serious problem facing their school.

Despite their worries about their friends' alcohol problems, fewer teens in this year's survey say they, personally, have driven a car after drinking: 4 percent of students say they have mixed driving with drinking, down from 10 percent last year, while 9 percent say they have been passengers in a car whose driver had been drinking, down from 24 percent in 1997.

Drugs, although not as prevalent as alcohol, remain a persistent part of the landscape for the nation's top teen achievers. More than half of *Who's Who* students (54%) say that there is a lot of drug use among students in their schools. Forty-one percent of these teens say that drugs are very common at parties, and an equivalent number (42%) say their own friends have a problem with drugs.

Racial Biases

Tolerance of diversity is one of the values that seems to be waning among the brightest students. Fifteen percent say they are prejudiced against African Americans and Hispanics – more than double (7%) last year's responses. When asked why they are prejudiced against these groups, the top response given was "they feel uncomfortable around them." These high-achieving teens also tell us they are skeptical of affirmative action: nearly half (47%) say affirmative action would make it harder for them to get the job they want, and 45 percent say it would make it more difficult for them to get into the college of their choice.

According to Leonard Steinhorn, co-author of the forthcoming book *By the Color of Our Skin: The Illusion of Integration and the Reality of Race* and Assistant Professor of Communications at American University, "These results are fully consistent with a society in which kids largely live in separate neighborhoods, attend separate schools, socialize separately, go to separate churches, follow separate media, and increasingly gravitate toward separate sports."

Almost half of the students, 48 percent, admit they are prejudiced against gays, up 19 percentage points from last year's survey. When asked to explain their intolerance, 28 percent say homosexuality goes against their moral/religious convictions and 17 percent say they feel uncomfortable around gay people. Despite their personal feelings, 75 percent of teens believe homosexuals should be allowed to join the military, and 71 percent think they should be permitted to teach school. Objections arise, though, over homosexuals as clergy (47 percent opposed). Two-thirds of these top teens (66%) find the depiction of homosexual relationships on television and in the movies offensive.

"It's surprising to see that so many young people who are so capable have such closed minds," said Krouse. "Clearly we're falling down on the job of teaching tolerance to the next generation."

Clear and Present Danger

This year's school ground massacres were a sobering reminder of the danger that lurks around our nation's schools. Teens today know from personal observation just how nearby violence can be, not just on the streets but in the supposedly safe haven of the classroom. More than one in five (22%) *Who's Who* teens knows of a

student attacking a teacher, 16 percent have had gang fights occur at their school, 11 percent know of a rape or sexual assault on school grounds, and 9 percent say a teacher has struck a student. Thirteen percent say it would be easy or not very difficult to obtain weapons along with an education.

Although few top teens (one percent) think violence is the most serious problem facing their schools, they still have firm convictions about the best ways to fight back. Nearly three-fourths (73%) of high achievers endorse the implementation of stricter gun control laws as the way to curb violence. One in three (36%) say gun purchases should be delayed in order to check the police record of the prospective buyer. Another third (33%) think that handgun sales should not be permitted at all. Two-thirds (67%) believe increasing the number of police officers on the streets would be an effective way to combat violence, and 45 percent say reducing violence on TV, in movies, and in music would be an effective remedy.

The Cyber Generation

Virtually unknown a decade ago, the virtual world has become commonplace for the nation's high-achieving teens. Almost all of them (93%) now have access to the Internet, most through school (71 percent). Public school students have an easier time reaching cyberspace than their private school counterparts – 75 percent and 54 percent respectively can link up at school.

Although X-rated web sites seem to arouse the greatest concern among parents, they don't seem to be luring the young. A mere 5 percent of *Who's Who* teens say they use the Internet to find pornography, while three-quarters (77%) use it for research for school papers; 58 percent search for information about news, hobbies, and leisure topics; 36 percent use chat rooms; and 43 percent just "surf randomly."

"This survey tells us that parents and legislators can probably relax a little about the moral menace lurking on the Web," said Krouse. "Teens seem to be using it as a huge library – something we should all celebrate."

And Now for the Good News

- ◆ ***Untroubled Teens:*** Eighty-two percent of *Who's Who* teens say they are happy most of the time, and another 11 percent say they are always happy.
- ◆ ***True to Their Schools:*** Eighty percent of high achievers give their schools an "A" or "B" for quality of education, and 87 percent say their schools are very or somewhat challenging.
- ◆ ***Family Ties:*** Although 62 percent fear they will have a more difficult time raising children and staying married than their parents, 41 percent still say that a family is what they most want out of life.

WHO'S WHO TOP TIPS FOR PARENTS

Drawing from *Who's Who* research, and in response to studies conducted by the U.S. Department of Education and several education groups, *Who's Who Among American High School Students* has developed the following checklist for parents to use to become a stronger influence in their teens' lives:

1. **Talk with your child:** If parents do not supply their kids with information about sex, drugs, alcohol, cheating, etc., children can be easily swayed by peers with misinformation. While some parents may find such conversations embarrassing, not holding them could have tragic consequences.
2. **Set a good example for your child:** Parents who smoke, drink, use drugs or watch television excessively, may find their child rejecting their warnings against these behaviors as hypocritical. But if parents demonstrate that reading and education are important to them, it will become important for their children.
3. **Maintain an adult presence in your child's life:** Parents should not allow peer pressure to set their child's values but instead have regularly scheduled family time.
4. **Communicate tough, but fair and consistent rules:** Explain to your child the purpose behind the rule and let him or her know when the rule is no longer necessary. Ensure that your child earns privileges instead of being automatically given them.
5. **Work with your child's teachers:** Make sure your child knows that any inappropriate behavior at school will have consequences at home because of the importance of acquiring a good education.
