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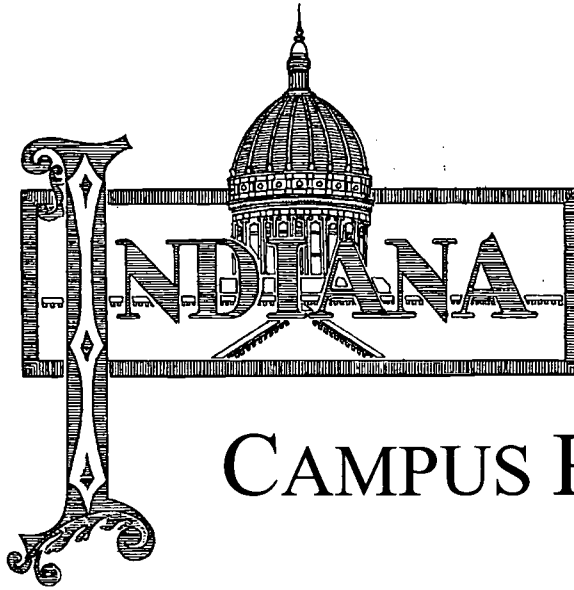
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ABSTRACT

This report includes descriptions of the following Indiana public institutions: Indiana University, Purdue University, Ball State University, Indiana State University, University of Southern Indiana, Vincennes University, and Ivy Tech State College. For each institution, the following information is available: mission, enrollment breakdown, cost and financial aid data, freshman profile, retention and graduation rates, largest program areas, productivity profile, and quality indicators such as Gourman ratings, mean GRE scores, licensure pass rates, and nationally ranked/accredited programs. Data about the overall higher education system in Indiana are also presented, including the following: (1) there are 5 public, four-year institutions; 2 public, two-year colleges; 30 private, four-year institutions; and 2 private, two-year colleges; (2) there were 260,695 students enrolled in Indiana higher education, 78% of whom attend a public college or university; (3) minorities comprise 11.5% of the enrollment at the public colleges and universities; (4) the state appropriation for higher education in Indiana was \$1.25 billion for the academic year 1997-98; and (5) the average in-state tuition and fees for 1997-98 ranged from \$2,057 at the public two-year colleges to \$14,387 at the private four-year colleges and universities. The Commission consists of twelve lay citizens who are each appointed by the Governor for terms of four years. Each Congressional district must be represented and no member, while serving his or her term, may be an employee of or serve on the governing board of any educational institution in the State of Indiana. Furthermore, members may not be employees or officials of the State of Indiana or any political subdivision thereof. In addition, the 1990 legislature added a student and a faculty representative who are appointed by the Governor for terms of two years. The Commission meets in public session approximately ten times a year, often over a two-day period.

COMMISSION STAFF

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INDIANA COMMISSION FOR HIGHER EDUCATION - HISTORY

Created in 1971 by an act of the General Assembly and signed into law by then Governor Edgar Whitcomb, the Commission is now in its third decade of service to the State of Indiana.

PURPOSES

The general purposes assigned by law to the Commission are:

- (1) to plan and to coordinate Indiana's state-supported system of post-high school education, taking into account the plans and interests of independent colleges and universities;*
- (2) to define the educational missions of public colleges and universities;*
- (3) to review both operating budget and capital budget appropriation requests from public institutions;*
- (4) to approve or disapprove for public institutions the establishment of any new branches, campuses, extension centers, colleges or schools;*
- (5) to approve or disapprove for public institutions the offering of any additional associate, baccalaureate or graduate degree, or certificate program of two semesters or more in duration;*
- (6) to review all programs of public institutions and make recommendations to the governing board of the institution, the Governor, and the General Assembly concerning the funding and the disposition of these programs; and,*
- (7) to review the budget requests of the State Student Assistance Commission.*

PRIMARY CONSTITUENCIES

The primary constituencies of the Commission are: *The Offices of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, The General Assembly, including individual members, with special reference to education and money committees, legislative leaders, and Legislative Services, and State Fiscal Authorities, including the State Budget Agency and the State Budget Committee.*

RELATIONSHIPS

The Commission is a coordinating agency, not a governing board. By law, the Commission has no powers or authority relating to the management or operation of Indiana's public or independent colleges and universities. These responsibilities remain exclusively vested in institutional governing boards.

Since its inception, the Commission has worked closely with Indiana's public and independent colleges. Without the ongoing substantive and substantial assistance and cooperation provided by Indiana's colleges and universities, the Commission would be unable to fulfill its statutory responsibilities.

There are strong working relationships between the Commission and the following agencies: *Independent Colleges of Indiana, the Indiana Commission on Proprietary Education, the Department of Workforce Development, the Department of Education and the State Student Assistance Commission.*

- 3. Cost/Financial Aid:** Tuition/fees are from *Postsecondary Education Tuition/Fee Rates in Indiana; An Update*, July 29, 1997. Room and Board costs are from *Student Residence Hall Room and Board Rates: 1987-88 through 1997-98*, published September 12, 1997. Data on undergraduate financial aid is from 1995-96 SIS. 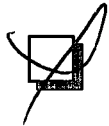
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
