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ABSTRACT

This report provides information on Georgia's state-funded tuition assistance programs for postsecondary students. It notes that state-funded tuition assistance is available to students attending public and private postsecondary educational institutions, both in and outside of Georgia. Aid is provided either by awarding scholarships or by waiving tuition. Estimates indicate that in fiscal year 1997, more than 190,000 students received more than \$262 million in state-funded tuition assistance. The report also answers specific questions regarding Board of Regents or Department of Technical and Adult Education programs not previously reviewed in the Program Evaluation of Educational Incentive Programs, and defines which dependents of University System of Geogia and Department of Technical and Adult Education employees are eligible to receive free tuition. Two large tables provide detail concerning each of the 19 state-funded tuition assistance award programs and the 15 tuition waiver programs (separated into out-of-state and in-state tuition waivers). Additional tables appended provide data on award dollars and numbers of students, by individual institutions in the state university system, individual technical institutes, or private and out-of-state institutions. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Special Report State Funded Post-Secondary Tuition Assistance

This report was developed to provide answers to questions regarding state funded scholarships and other tuition assistance which were raised by members of the Budgetary Responsibility Oversight Committee (BROC) at the Committee's July 29, 1998 meeting. State funded tuition assistance is available to students attending public and private post-secondary educational institutions both in Georgia and outside of Georgia. As shown in the table below, students can obtain such assistance by either receiving scholarships or by having their tuition "waived". Based on the best available information, the evaluation team estimated that, in fiscal year 1997, more than 190,000 students received more than \$262 million in state funded tuition assistance. More detailed information on these programs is provided in the text of the report and in the supporting appendices.

Report Purpose

This report was developed to provide answers to questions which were raised by members of the Budgetary Responsibility Oversight Committee (BROC) (at the July 29, 1998 meeting) regarding state funded scholarships and other tuition assistance. Committee members expressed a particular interest in determining if children of Department of Technical and Adult Education (DTAE) and University System employees could get free tuition to DTAE and University System institutions.

Report Scope and Methodology

In conducting research for this report, the evaluation team identified programs which use state funds to provide tuition assistance to students attending post-secondary educational institutions. The evaluation team identified these programs by:

- Reviewing financial aid information available on both the Georgia Career Information Center's database and individual post-secondary educational institutions' internet websites.
- Interviewing representatives of the Board of Regents (BOR), the Department of Technical and Adult Education, the Georgia Student Finance Commission, and the Department of Human Resources.
- Analyzing the fiscal year 1997 unaudited annual financial reports of individual University System institutions and the Georgia Student Finance Commission's fiscal year 1997 scholarship expenditure reports. (Fiscal year 1998 reports will not be available until after January 1999.)

This project was conducted in accordance with generally accepted governmental auditing standards and included interviews with program personnel, as well as reviews of policies, procedures, administrative records, and financial records. The entire report was discussed with appropriate program personnel at the Georgia Student Finance Commission, the Board



of Regents, the Department of Technical and Adult Education, and the Department of Human Resources.

Summary of Tuition Assistance Programs

Tuition assistance is available to students attending public and private post-secondary educational institutions both in Georgia and outside of Georgia. Students can obtain such assistance by either receiving awards such as scholarships or by having their out-of-state and/or in-state tuition "waived." Based on the best available information, the evaluation team estimated that, in fiscal year 1997, more than 190,000 students received more than \$262 million in state funded tuition assistance.

The tuition assistance programs detailed in **Exhibit 1** (on page 6) include 19 award programs (scholarship, forgivable loan, and grant programs) identified by the evaluation team that are funded by the state and administered by either the Georgia Student Finance Commission, the Board of Regents, or by the Department of Human Resources. In fiscal year 1997, these award programs provided about \$199 million in awards to almost 174,000 students. **Appendices A, C and E** show the amount of state funded tuition assistance awarded by institution for each program. **Appendices B, D and F** show the number of students receiving such assistance by institution for each program. Other tuition assistance award programs such as Vocational Rehabilitation, New Connections To Work, and the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) Program were also found to be available to students attending DTAE and Regents institutions; however, these programs are largely federally funded and were, therefore, not included in our report.

Tuition assistance is also available to certain students attending University System of Georgia institutions through the waiving of out-of-state and/or instate tuition. (By having their out-of-state tuition waived, non-residents of Georgia can attend University System of Georgia institutions for the same cost as residents of Georgia.) As shown in **Exhibit 2** (on page 7) there are approximately 15 categories of University System students who are eligible to receive tuition waivers. Included among these categories are University



System employees and their dependents, graduate assistants, citizens of foreign countries and military personnel. In fiscal year 1997, University System institutions waived over \$48 million in out-of-state tuition for approximately 9,500 (estimated) full-time equivalent (FTE) students. **Exhibit 2** also shows that in fiscal year 1997, over \$15 million of in-state tuition was waived at University System institutions for approximately 7,100 (estimated) FTE students. **Appendix G** of this report provides more detailed information on the amount of both out-of-state and in-state tuition waivers awarded by institution, while **Appendix H** provides more detailed information on the number of students receiving tuition waivers by institution.

It should be noted that in May 1996, the Board of Regents approved the practice of waiving or reimbursing in-state tuition for its full-time employees. While the number of institutions which actually waived in-state tuition for employees in fiscal year 1997 is not known, only one University System institution reported waiving employees' in-state tuition in fiscal year 1997. The Board of Regents will require all University System institutions to report the amount of in-state tuition waived for employees in FY 1998.

Tuition waivers are also available to certain students attending DTAE institutes. DTAE policies provide for the waiving of out-of-state tuition for a limited number of international students and certain students who reside in counties bordering on Georgia and for the waiving of in-state tuition for students who are senior citizens. Representatives from the Department of Technical and Adult Education indicated that the only way to obtain information on the amount of tuition waived in fiscal year 1997 was to survey all DTAE technical institutes. Because system-wide information was not readily available, the data on tuition waived at DTAE technical institutes is not included in this report.

Specific Questions and Answers

The following paragraphs cover specific questions raised by members of the Budgetary Responsibility Oversight Committee during the July 29, 1998 Committee meeting.



Are there other scholarship programs provided by DTAE or the Board of Regents which were not reviewed in the Program Evaluation of Educational Incentive Programs?

Of the 19 state funded tuition assistance award programs described in **Exhibit 1** (on page 6) the eight programs shown below were previously identified in the Program Evaluation on Educational Incentive Programs.

Regents' Opportunity Scholarship

Of the 19 tuition assistance award programs identified in this report, only three (Regents' Opportunity Scholarship, Regents' Scholarship, and the SMEB Physician Scholarship) are administered by the Board of Regents. The Department of Technical and Adult Education does not provide their students with any internally administered state funded tuition assistance award



programs. The remaining state funded tuition assistance award programs are administered by either the Georgia Student Finance Commission or the Department of Human Resources.

In addition to these scholarship type programs, University System institutions and DTAE institutes also utilize tuition waiver programs to provide their students with state funded tuition assistance. Tuition waiver programs available to students attending University System institutions are described in **Exhibit 2** (on page 7). Because information on the total amount of tuition waived at DTAE technical institutes was not available, tuition waiver programs available to DTAE students are not included in the exhibit.

Do dependents of University System of Georgia and Department of Technical and Adult Education employees get free tuition?

The evaluation team identified only one state funded program that provides "free tuition" to dependents of University System employees. Board of Regents policies provide for the waiving of out-of-state tuition for non-residents of Georgia who are dependents of full-time employees of University System institutions. (Dependents of University System employees are still required to pay the in-state portion of their tuition.) As shown in the last category of out-of-state tuition waivers in **Exhibit 2** on page 7, in fiscal year 1997, \$708,221 of out-of-state tuition was waived for approximately 150 (estimated) FTE students attending University System institutions that were either University System employees or dependents of University System employees. University System records do not separate the amount of out-of-state tuition waived for dependents from the amount waived for employees. No tuition waiver provisions were reported to exist for dependents of DTAE employees.
