Don't forget that many items such as appliances, unwanted clothes, and other household items can be given to local charities or thrift stores to be used by others.

Paper Vs. Plastic?

The best choice, of course, for carrying your groceries and other purchases is reusable cloth bags, fiber baskets, or reusable mesh bags. These bags can easily be used over and over without wear and only use 1/10 of the energy it takes to make 100 plastic or paper bags.

Paper Bags

- Made from renewable resources
 - Bio-degradable
 - Don't create long lasting litter
 - Breakdown can be composted
 - Can be used for brown paper wrapping
- Are rigid making them easier to pack and transport groceries in your car
Contain 25% recycled materials
Can be recycled into other products
Can be used to hold other items
- Recycling tip:** Most curbside recycling programs accept paper bags along with your newspapers. Local newspaper recycling bins at schools or stores will also accept paper bags.

Plastic Bags

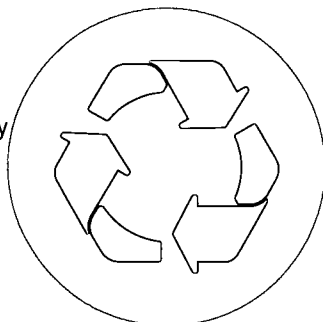
- Less expensive than paper bags
 - Manufacturing consumes 20 to 40 percent less energy
 - Takes up 74 to 80 percent less space than paper bags
 - 1,000 plastic bags weigh 16 lbs. (4 inches high)
 - 1,000 paper bags weigh 140 lbs. (46 inches high)
 - Can be recycled into other products
 - Waterproof and handy in a rainstorm
 - Can be used over many times
 - Can kill marine animals and seabirds as well as pollute waterways and highways
- Recycling tip:** The following stores have recycling bins for plastic bags: Albertson's, Dan's, Fred Meyer, Harmon's, Macey's, Shopko, Smith's, and Wal-Mart. The bags are collected and recycled into new shopping bags and plastic lumber.

Again, consider using cloth bags, fiber baskets, or reusable mesh bags. It just takes a little forethought to remember to carry your bag with you when shopping!

Watch for these Symbols

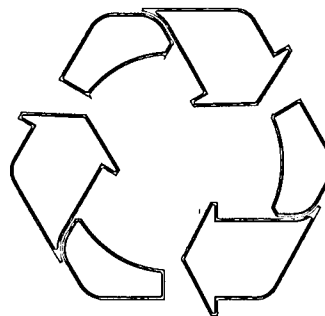
This symbol means Recycled. It indicates:

1. A product is made entirely or predominantly from recycled materials.
2. A magazine, newspaper, or other publication is printed on recycled paper.










This symbol means Recyclable. It indicates:

1. Products or packages made from other materials which after use can be turned in for recycling.



Understanding Plastic Recycling

Currently there are only three kinds of plastic containers recycled in Utah #1, #2 and #6. You will find these numbers molded into the plastic container. To prepare items for recycling; remove all paper that is not attached and rinse well. (Clean is good for recycling!)

Experiments That Will Show You How To Use Less Stuff!

You or your kids might want to try these activities to see how you can help save the Earth by using less.

Too Much Trash

Try this experiment. Instead of throwing trash into various garbage bins, just for one day put the trash into one bag. You'll be surprised at how heavy the bag is by the end of the day. Weigh the bag and figure out how many pounds of garbage you or your family throw away per year if you continue to consume at the same rate. Then, after examining the contents, ask yourself and/or the family the following:

- What can I (we) do without if I (we) bought items with less packaging?
- How much food waste could be put into a compost pile or worm bin?
- Did I (we) need to buy some of the stuff in the first place?
- If we bought in bulk would it save on packaging?
- How much is recyclable?

Once you've analyzed your own trash you'll be able to make some earth-altering decisions. It's all part of reduce, reuse, recycle and rethinking the way you live.

Stop The Smog

Do you know how much carbon dioxide is given off by your family car(s)? Try this experiment. Record the miles your car travels in a day or week. This number is about equal to the pounds of carbon dioxide your car releases into the environment. Have everyone in the family do the same. At a family meeting perhaps you could find ways to reduce emissions by carpooling, walking, or taking public transportation. Consider riding a bike on short errands close to home or telecommute to work one day a week. Walking and bike-riding are good for your health and the planet!

Slow The Flow

This is a great experiment to see if you're a wasteful water user. Before you get into the shower, plug the drain. (Be careful not to use too much soap because it can make the tub slippery.) After your shower, mark the water line using a crayon. Next time, take a shower half as long. Compare the water level to the crayon mark and notice how much water you saved.

Tip: Save water and \$\$ by investing in a low-flow shower head - they can reduce water use by as much as 50%.

The Big Flush

Each time a toilet is flushed, up to 5 gallons of water is used. For just one person, flushing pollutes as much as 7,500 gallons of fresh water each year to move just 165 gallons of body waste. So with all that flushing, why not soak the label off a bottle and fill with water. Place the capped bottle in the water tank. If you need to weigh the bottle down a bit add some rocks until it no longer floats. You may want to try adding more bottles to displace additional water. Experiment with bottle sizes, as different toilets require different amounts of water to flush properly.

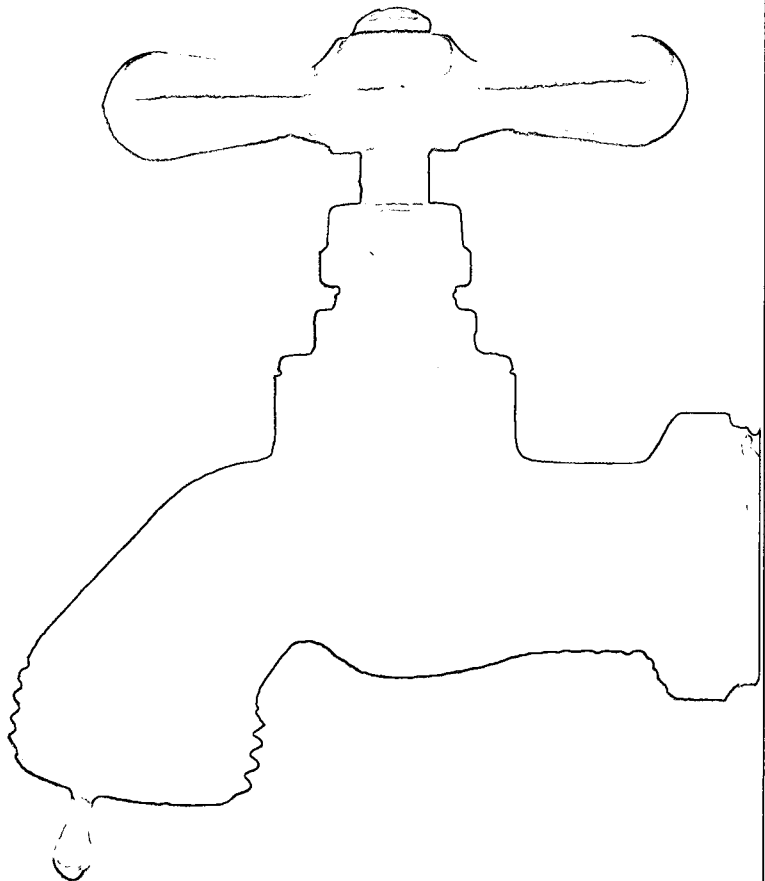
All Washed Up

Check for toilet leaks by adding a few drops of food coloring to the water tank. If colored water shows up in the bowl within a few minutes, there is a leak. Most leaks are fairly simple and inexpensive to fix. Should you need to replace your toilet, consider purchasing a new water-efficient model that uses only 1.6 gallons of water per flush.

An Illuminating Idea

Did you know that compact fluorescent light bulbs use about one-fourth to one-third of the energy used by an incandescent bulb? They last longer too. Even though compact fluorescent bulbs cost more initially, over the life of the bulb, you'll save money in energy costs and help the environment. Note: Lighting accounts for about one-fifth of all electricity consumed in the U.S.

See if your question is among the top 5 questions asked on the Department of Environmental Quality hotline.

Q. I am doing some remodeling and might have asbestos in my home. What should I do? Are there precautions I should take?

A. If you have hired a contractor to do the work, it is his/her responsibility to have an inspection before disturbing the site to determine if asbestos is present. If you are doing the remodeling yourself, contact the Utah Division of Air Quality's asbestos program before beginning and discuss with a staff member the necessary procedures and precautions. Also, a free brochure is available which outlines steps to take for respiratory protection and control mechanisms. Finally, if you suspect an asbestos problem in your building, contact the Division and arrange for an inspection. The number is (801) 536-4000.

Q. Where Can I Get Emissions Testing For My Car Or Truck?

A. Check your yellow page listing under "Car Inspection" for the nearest location.

Q. Where Can I Get Hazardous Waste Training?

A. There are three hazardous waste training programs at local colleges: Salt Lake Community College (801) 957-4942, Utah Valley State College (801) 222-8677, and the Rocky Mountain Center at the University of Utah (801) 581-4800. Environmental consultants can train your company employees. Check the yellow pages under "Environmental & Ecological Services."

Q. My Neighbors Have Trash All Over Their Yard. Who Do I Call To Complain?

A. Contact your local health department. Check the white pages in the "blue pages" section.

Q. How Do I Recycle My Used Oil?

A. If you change a small amount of oil at a time (up to 5 gallons) there are over 260 used oil collection centers around the state where you can dispose of your oil for free. If you are a farmer or otherwise involved in agriculture, you can recycle up to 25 gallons a month of used oil at collection centers which accept larger quantities for free.
