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ABSTRACT

This Kids Count factbook details statewide trends in the well-being of Wyoming's children. The 1997 report has been expanded to include detailed information on the status of children by categories of welfare, health, and education. The first part of the factbook documents trends by county for 15 indicators: (1) poverty and population; (2) education; (3) births; (4) early prenatal care; (5) percent of mothers who smoked during pregnancy; (6) percent of low birth weight babies; (7) births to teens; (8) infant deaths; (9) children with developmental disabilities; (10) certified day care facilities; (11) child deaths; (12) teen violent deaths; (13) teen motor vehicle deaths; (14) teen suicides; and (15) juvenile arrests for violent crime. The statistical findings include the following: in 1993, 14.9 percent of Wyoming children were living in poverty; the number of births in Wyoming had declined since 1990; on average, 22 percent of Wyoming's mothers smoked during pregnancy; Wyoming continues to exceed the national average of low birth-weight babies; the percent of babies born to teen mothers has increased slightly since 1990; and teen violent deaths and teen motor vehicle deaths have increased since 1990. The next part of the factbook presents the child care providers compensation study, which include the following findings: child care teachers in for-profit centers receive lower wages than in non-profit/non-government centers; teachers' average starting salary was \$16,057; home providers earn an average of \$6,400 per year, working 11 1/2 hours per day, 5 days a week, closing only 15 days per year. The remainder of the factbook presents state and county profiles for the indicators listed above. A directory of legislators concludes the document. (HTH)

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


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

OVERVIEW

The 1997 WY KIDS COUNT Factbook is the fourth annual profile of the well-being of children in Wyoming. The annual Factbook is an important tool for planning and action by community leaders, policy makers, and individuals working to improve the quality of life for all of Wyoming's children.

The 1997 Factbook has been expanded to include detailed information on the status of children by categories of welfare, health, and education.

Welfare & Education & Child Care: Changing Times in Wyoming

Welfare reform has been in place since 1996. The federal welfare payment program is now called TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families). Wyoming has elected to call this program POWER. Client eligibility and responsibilities include time limited receipt of payments (5 years), and "pay for performance" requiring able bodied clients to work or go to school and work. The impacts on families and children under welfare reform are unknown. Data are being collected but little analysis by policy makers has been conducted.

- ❖ **Education reform** – Wyoming's legislature is currently working on restructuring the K-12 education finance system to provide an adequate and equitable education for all of Wyoming's children.
- ❖ **Day care licensure** is currently being debated by state government, parents, child care providers, and other interested citizens. The 1998 legislative session will also review licensure and consider recommendations to keep licensure with state government, move it to a certified board of directors to manage, and other options.

The 1998 legislative session begins February 9, 1998.

Population and Poverty


It is estimated that 136,273 children lived in Wyoming during 1995, accounting for 28% of the state's population.

In 1993, 14.9% of our children lived in poverty as did 11.9% of all people in Wyoming.

8,584 children were receiving AFDC benefits during June, 1996.

27.4% of enrolled students qualified for Free and Reduced Lunch school program during the 1996-97 school year. This totals to 27,075 children.

Education

The legislature is currently reforming K - 12 grade funding. During the 1996-97 school year nearly 99,000 students were enrolled in Wyoming's public schools.

27.4% of the students qualified for the Free or Reduced Lunch Program.

11.8% of enrolled students are classified as "special education students". These children have a learning, behavior or physical disability.

During the '95-'96 school year 1,806 students dropped out of grades 7 through 12. Wyoming's drop out rate for the '95-'96 school year was 3.73 percent. Note: When there is more than one school district in a county a range of drop out rates is provided.



Early Prenatal Care

Women who delay receiving early prenatal care, (care in the first trimester of pregnancy), are at greater health risk for both themselves and their baby.

Timely and comprehensive prenatal care provides an opportunity to screen for and intervene with medical and non-medical conditions. Early detection of medical conditions allows for treatment while non-medical health conditions such as smoking, substance abuse, and nutritional deficiencies can be intervened providing a healthier environmental for the developing child.


Births by Mothers Who Smoked During Pregnancy

On average over the past 7 years 22% of Wyoming's mothers smoked during pregnancy. Smoking during pregnancy has been strongly associated with the incidence of low birth-weight babies.

In 1996, 20.2% of Wyoming's babies were born to mothers who smoked during pregnancy.

Low Birth-Weight Babies

Wyoming continues to exceed the national average of low birth-weight babies. In 1996, 8.4% of Wyoming's babies were born at weights under 5½ pounds. This compares to 7.4% nationally.

Low birth weight infants are at greater risk to experience long-term disabilities or to die during the first year of life than are babies of normal birth weight.

Prevention of low birth-weight is dependent upon comprehensive prenatal care, smoking cessation, adequate nutrition and adequate maternal weight gain.

Births to Teens

The percentage of babies born to teens is calculated in this table by dividing the number of babies born to teenage girls, age 15-19, by the total number of births. Data are by county of residence.

During 1996 14% of all babies born were born to teenage mothers. Also during this year, 3 babies were born to children under the age of 15.

Teen pregnancy is a very complicated issue which threatens the development of teens and of their babies. According to the Children's Defense Fund, children born to teenagers are more likely to suffer poor health, live in poverty, have learning and behavior problems and eventually become teen parents themselves. On average, 3 out of 5 teen mothers drop out of school.

Infant Deaths

In 1996, 40 infants, (babies under the age of one), died in Wyoming. Over the past 5 years 245 infants have died, producing an infant mortality rate of 7.6 for every 1,000 live births over the period of 1992-1996.

Infant mortality rates per 1,000 live births in Wyoming have been as follows:

1993: 7.9
1994: 6.7
1995: 7.7
1996: 6.4





Certified Day Care Facilities

In total, Wyoming has seen an increase in the number of certified day care facilities over the past few years; however, this is not true for all counties. Some counties have fewer available day care spots than existed in 1994.

Day care licensure is currently being debated by state government, parents, child care providers, and other interested citizens. The 1998 legislative session will also review licensure and consider recommendations to keep licensure with state government, move it to a certified board of directors to manage, and other options.


Child Deaths






Teen Suicides


Juvenile Arrests for Violent Crime

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Wyoming Child Care Center and Home Child Care Provider Compensation, Retention and Preparedness Survey Results

April 1997

Executive Summary

Wyoming PARENT funded through a Child Care & Development Block grant surveyed child care centers and licensed home child care providers in April 1997 to examine the status of the child care profession in Wyoming. The study was designed to capture information that would assist in the factual discussion regarding child care provision issues that affect children, parents and providers. This study should allow policy makers, professional associations and parents the ability to direct the development of positive change to support child care providers and our children.

Non-profit/non government centers report higher earnings of \$7.30 per hour to start and \$8.47 per hour for the highest paid wage. Still government funded or subsidized centers pay the best reporting a starting wage of \$8.78 per hour and the average highest paid teachers earning \$11.35 per hour. The government funded centers contain developmental child care centers and employ therapists which consequently inflate the average wages significantly.

- Thirty two percent of the teachers held a bachelor's degree while 52.4% had completed an associates degree.
- There is a positive relationship between education attainment and wages paid; meaning the higher education the higher the wage. The following table demonstrates wage advancement by education credential.

Highlights of Major Findings

Child Care Center Teaching Staff

- Child care teachers earn average hourly starting wage of \$7.72 up an average of the highest wage of \$9.53. For those teachers in for-profit centers the wages are much lower, \$5.75 per hour to start and \$6.25 per hour as the average highest paid wage.



Home Child Care Providers

- Licensed providers earn an average of \$6,400 per year.
- Providers work an average of $11\frac{1}{2}$ hours per day, 5 days per week.
- 82% are open all year and 16% follow the public school schedule. Providers typically close for 15 days per year for holidays and vacations.
- 89% participate in the USDA Child and Adult Care Food Program. The average monthly check received is \$340.
- 43.5% have substitutes on call and pay an average of \$5.45 per hour.
- 19% have paid regular assistants at an average wage of \$4.70 per hour. Assistants usually work 16 hours per week and 57% of the assistants are family members.
- 46.1% offer transportation, mostly for field trips or emergencies.
- Benefits for child care center staff are minimal in Wyoming. Only 20% of teachers are offered health insurance, 43% retirement, 77% sick leave, 43% Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA) and 34% merit raises. For teaching assistants only 13% are offered health insurance, 54% retirement, 80% sick leave, 46% merit raises. Government sponsored or funded centers contributed more benefits to staff and held the largest share of teaching assistants.
- Turnover rates for teaching staff averaged 27% and 41% for teaching assistants across all programs. For profit centers reported turnover rates for teachers of 70% and 79% for teaching assistants. Non profit centers reported turnover rates for teachers of 18% and 33% for teaching assistants.

- 46% carry day care liability insurance.
- 61% have health insurance.
- 19% have a retirement account such as an IRA, SEP or Keogh fund.
- Average age of the home provider is 38.7 years.
- Providers have been operating as a business for an average of 7.4 years ranging from just a few months to 30 years.
- Full time fees for infant care average \$290 per month and \$272 per month for children older than infant age.
