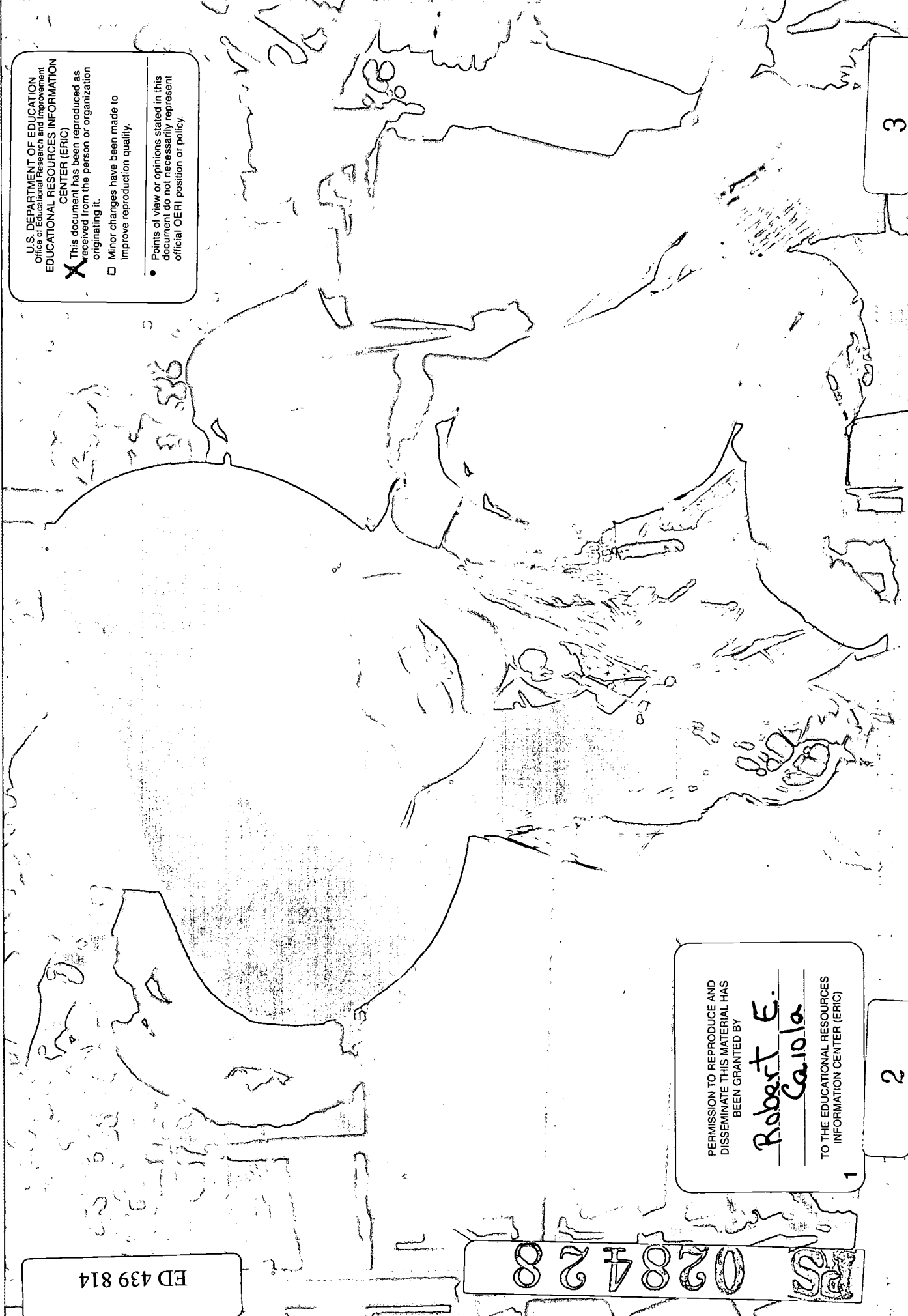

ABSTRACT

This Kids Count factbook details statewide trends in the well-being of Wyoming's children. Following an overview of key indicators and data sources, the factbook documents trends by county for 20 indicators, including the following: (1) poverty and population; (2) welfare reform; (3) certified day care facilities; (4) births; (5) infant deaths; (6) early prenatal care; (7) percent of low birth weight babies; (8) children with developmental disabilities; (9) births to mothers who smoked during pregnancy; (10) births to teens; (11) births to unmarried mothers; (12) teenage motor vehicle deaths; (13) teenage suicides; (14) teen violent deaths; (15) juvenile arrests; and (16) dropout rates. The remainder of the factbook presents state and county profiles based on the above listed indicators. The statistical findings show the following: a decrease in the trends of child population, teenage birth rate, the number of children receiving economic assistance, teen violent deaths, and infant mortality; an increase in the trends in the number of dropouts, poverty, percent of low birth weight babies, and babies born to unwed mothers. The factbook concludes with information on Wyoming Children's Action Alliance Partnership, how adults can advocate for children, and members of Wyoming's 55th legislature. (HTH)

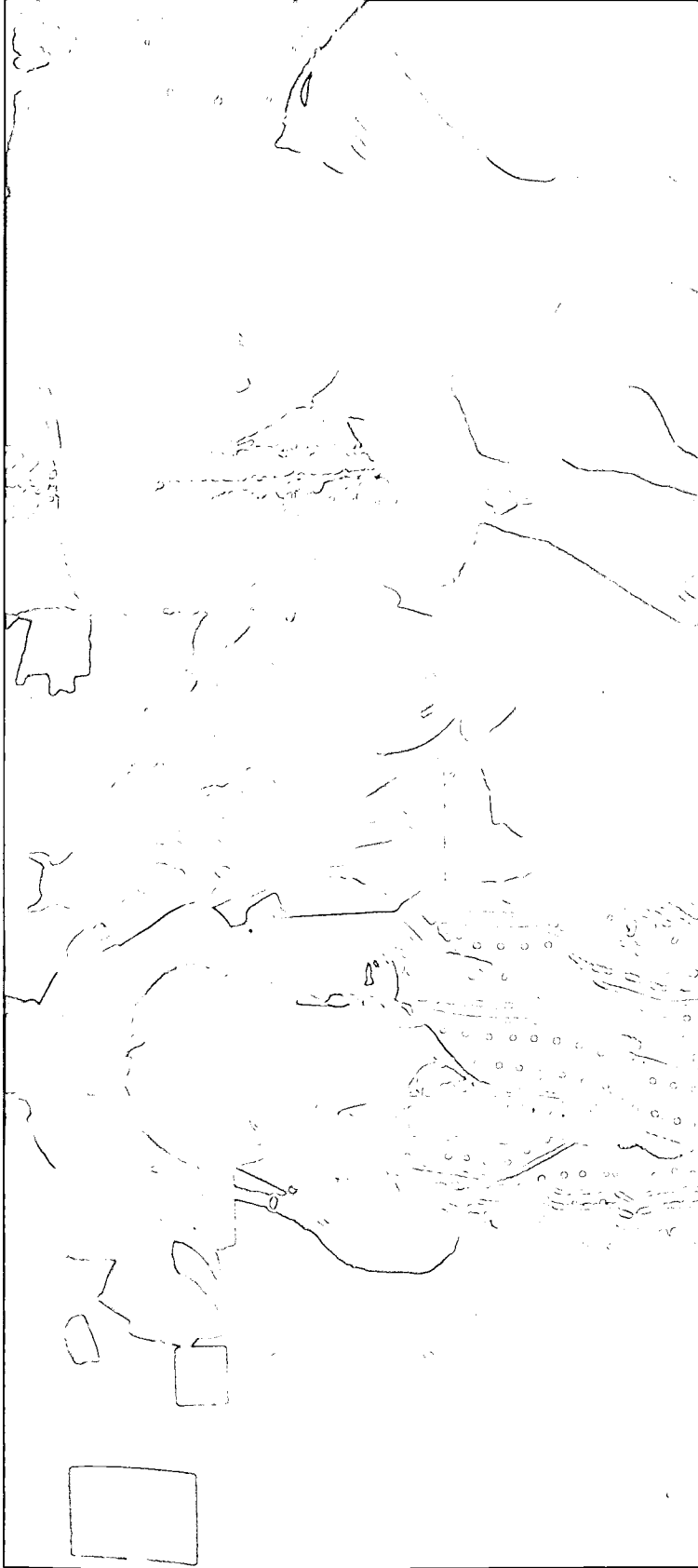

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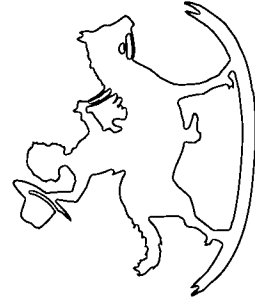
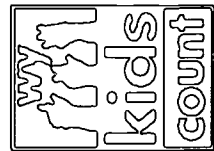

From the Executive Director

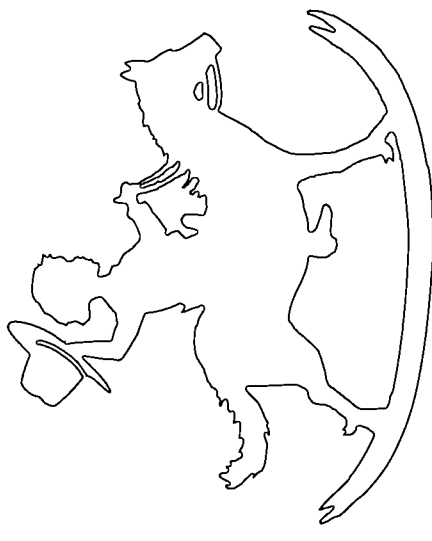

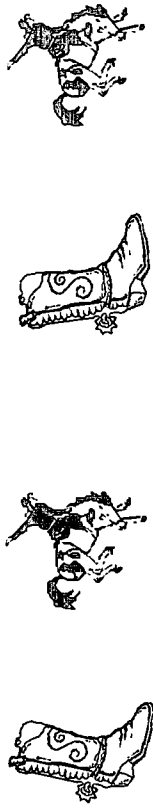

Overview of Key Indicators

The **1999 WY KIDS COUNT in Wyoming Factbook** contains extensive data describing the trends of Wyoming's Children. This edition has been expanded to include data on public schools K-12, population, health and crime characteristics. The following are key highlights and definitions.

Child Population – Estimates

In 1997 there were 140,088 children under the age of 19 in Wyoming. Since 1990 the child population has declined statewide by 2 percent. Around the state this trend varies significantly by county. For example, Teton county has experienced a 15% increase while Carbon county has seen a 13% decline. Natrona and Laramie counties have realized declines of 4% and 2% respectively.

Child Population – Age Distribution

The age distribution trend of the child population has shown dramatic changes in the number of children by year of age since 1990. In 1997 it was estimated that there were 13% fewer children in their first year of life than in 1990, while there were 24% more at the age of 18 years. These trends are particularly important when considering public school planning.

Poverty

In 1995 the Bureau of the Census estimated that 15.7% of Wyoming's children under the age of 18 lived in poverty. This estimate is an increase from 1993 when 14.9% of our children lived in poverty. Welfare reform has decreased the number of children eligible for benefits. In June 1996 8,584 children were receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) benefits; while in June 1998 only 2,051 were receiving benefits under the POWER program (formerly AFDC). It is not known if the well being of children has been affected by the new POWER program. Wyoming has not conducted a reliable qualitative or quantitative analysis of welfare reform. Other indicators of poverty have not shown comparative improvement. Food Stamp cases remain at relatively the same level as pre-POWER days. 26,401 students (28%) qualified for the Free and Reduced Lunch school program during the 1998-99 school year.

Births

There were 6,372 births in Wyoming during 1997, a decrease of 8.6% when compared to 1990. However, births in 1997 exceeded 1996 by 1.3 percent.

Early Prenatal Care

Women who delay receiving early prenatal care, care in the first trimester of pregnancy, are at greater health risk for both themselves and their baby. Timely and comprehensive prenatal care provides an opportunity to screen for, and intervene in, medical and nonmedical conditions. Early detection of medical conditions allows for treatment. Nonmedical health conditions such as smoking, substance abuse, and nutritional deficiencies can be intervened upon therefore providing a healthier environment for the developing child. 82.2 percent of all births in Wyoming received prenatal care in the first trimester of pregnancy in 1997.

Infant Deaths

In 1997, 37 infants, babies under the age of one, died in Wyoming. Over the past 6 years 282 infants have died, producing an infant mortality rate of 7.3 for every 1,000 live births over the period of 1992 – 1997.

Child Deaths

In 1997 there were 31 deaths of children ages 1 – 14 recorded in Wyoming. 252 children have died during the period of 1990 through 1997. Most child deaths are from motor vehicle related and other unintentional injuries.

Low Birth-Weight Babies

Wyoming continues to exceed the national average of low birth-weight babies. In 1997 9% of Wyoming's babies were born at weights under 5 pounds; compared to 7.5% nationally. The rate of low birth-weight babies in Wyoming is alarming and has increased each year since 1995. Low birth weight infants are at greater risk to experience long-term disabilities, or to die during the first year of life, than are babies of normal birth weight. Prevention of low birth-weight is linked to comprehensive prenatal care, smoking cessation, adequate nutrition and adequate maternal weight gain.

Births to Mothers Who Smoked During Pregnancy

Over the past 8 years an average of 22% of Wyoming's mothers smoked during pregnancy. Smoking during pregnancy has been strongly associated with the incidence of low birth-weight babies. In 1997 20.4% of Wyoming's babies were born to mothers who smoked during pregnancy.

Teen Births

Number of Babies Born

Teen Birth Rate

In 1997 there were 298 babies born to females 15-17 years of age. The teenage birth rate dropped to 23 per 1,000 females age 15-17 years in 1997. This is a positive trend from 1996 when the teen birth rate was estimated at 25 births per 1,000 females age 15-17 years. Teen pregnancy is a complicated issue threatening the development of teens and their babies. According to the Children's Defense

Fund, children born to teenagers are more likely to suffer poor health, live in poverty, have learning and behavior problems and eventually become teen parents themselves. In addition, on average 3 out of 5 teen mothers drop out of school.

In 1997 eight babies were born to mothers under the age of 15 years. Since 1990, 67 babies have been born to girls under the age of 15 years.

Percentage of All Births

In 1997 there were 1,748 babies born to unmarried mothers accounting for 27.4% of all births. In 1990 there were 1,381 babies born to unmarried mothers accounting for 19.8% of all births that year. Babies born into one-parent households have an increased risk of living in poverty than children in two-parent households. Many single mothers do not complete secondary or post secondary education which further limits their levels of income.

Children Affected by Divorce

2,768 children under the age of 18 were affected by divorce in 1997. Divorce has affected nearly 3,200 children per year since 1990. It is important to understand the magnitude of this issue as it effects the economies and well being of many families and children. Divorce also underscores the importance of child support payments and the State's effort to collect unmet payments.

Certified Day Care Facilities

Since 1996 there has been a decline in the number of certified day care facilities. This decline limits the number of openings for children requiring care while parents/guardians are working or attending school. In March 1999 there were 893 certified day care facilities in the state supplying care for up to 16,902 children. There has been a significant decline since 1996 when 1,073 certified facilities supplied care for up to 18,244 children. Day care facility licensure has been a very active policy issue over the past few years. Providers and parents have participated in discussions with the Department of Family Services and the legislature through a citizen task-force. Licensure will most likely continue to be a key issue for parents, providers and the legislature.

Children with Developmental Disabilities

During 1999 over 1,932 children in Wyoming (ages birth to five years of age) with a developmental disability were served by regional developmental programs through contracts with the Wyoming Department of Health, Division of Developmental Disabilities.

Education

The legislature is currently reforming K – 12 public school funding. In October 1998 there were 94,420 students enrolled in public schools. 28% of the students qualified for the Free or Reduced Lunch program. 12.7 % of enrolled students are classified as “special education students”. Special education students have learning, behavioral or physical disabilities. During the 97–98 school year 2,039 students dropped out of grades 7 through 12 (dropout rate was 4.21).

By County

Average Daily Membership (ADM) has been declining since school year 1993/94. During school year 1997/98 the ADM count was reported to be 91,971. Average Daily Membership is a very important element when calculating K-12 school funding. The decline in youth population will further reduce the ADM count in the future.

Drop Out Incidence; By Gender by School District; By Gender by County; Drop Out Rates by School District

The incidence of students dropping out of grades 7 through 12 has been increasing over the past few years while the total number of students has declined. During school year 1997/98 there were 2,039 dropouts consisting of 1,131 boys (55%) and 908 girls (45%). Overall, the drop out rate for 1997/98 is reported at 4.2 percent. Teens who drop out of school are at a significant disadvantage as they head into adulthood. Their lack of basic skills, disconnection to community, and job market placement put them at greater risk for teen parenting, poverty and involvement with crime. School-to-Work programs have been nationally recognized as being helpful to students at risk of dropping out with positive effects on school attendance and drop out rates.

Juvenile Arrests

All Crime

Violent Crime

In 1997 there were 8,637 juvenile arrests for all crime types, representing an increase of 66% since 1990. The increase in juvenile arrests were largely made up by increases in drug, weapon and alcohol law violations. In 1997 83 Juveniles were arrested for crimes of a violent nature including homicide, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault. 1997 data indicates one juvenile was arrested for homicide, 4 for forcible rape, 12 for robbery and 67 for aggravated assault.

Teen Violent Deaths

In 1997 thirty-nine teens died violently. Teenage violent death includes death by homicide, suicide and accidents for ages 15 to 19. 51% of these deaths in 1997 were due to injuries suffered in motor vehicle accidents. 15% of teen violent deaths were due to suicide. Data are recorded by place of residence not place of death.

Teenage Motor Vehicle Deaths

During 1997 twenty teenagers died from motor vehicle injuries. 170 teenagers have died from injuries suffered from motor vehicle collisions during the years 1990 through 1997. Fremont county lost 20 teenagers during this period. Data are recorded by county of residence not place of death.

Teen Suicides

In 1997 six teenagers ended their lives. Teenage suicide tragically affects not only the teen; parents, family members, classmates and the community are also impacted. Wyoming has lost 76 teens to suicide from 1990 through 1997. During this period the annual number of suicides has fluctuated between 7 and 13 teenagers.

Average Cost of Child Care

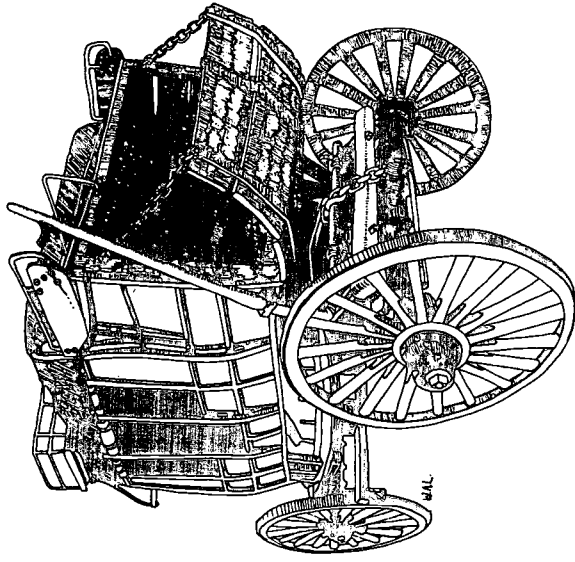
The cost of child care significantly impacts both child care providers and parent consumers. During welfare reform child care availability and affordability is of immediate concern. In response, the Department of Family Services has increased the subsidy rate for child care effective August 1, 1999. The new subsidy rate will be a maximum of \$450 per child. The average cost for all types of child care in Wyoming is \$350. These figures are based on the 75th percentile of the Market Rate Survey conducted in Spring 1999.

Welfare Reform

In January 1997 welfare reform changes were instituted in Wyoming. Public assistance, specifically POWER caseloads, have declined by 73% when comparing June 1996 to June 1998 data. During the same period applications for economic assistance remained unchanged, food stamp cases declined by only 24%, Medicaid cases declined by 9%, while use of child care supplied by the Department of Family Services through assistance payments increased by only 8%.

Cheyenne Frontier Days™ Old West Museum

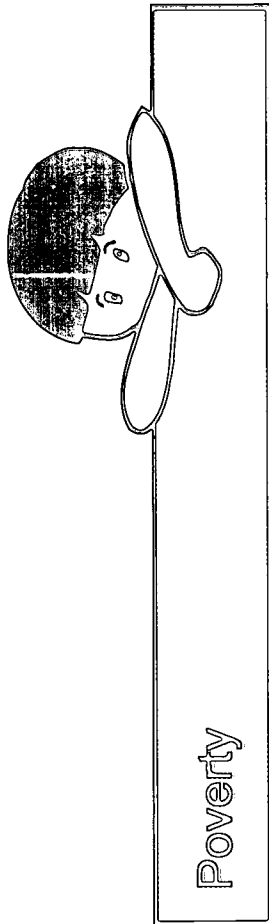

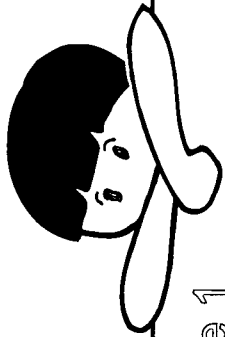
- * The **"HOLE IN THE WALL"** Kids Room provides an interactive learning center designed to give young people a taste of our Western culture.

County of Residence



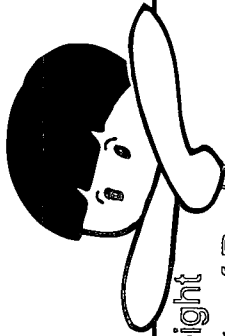

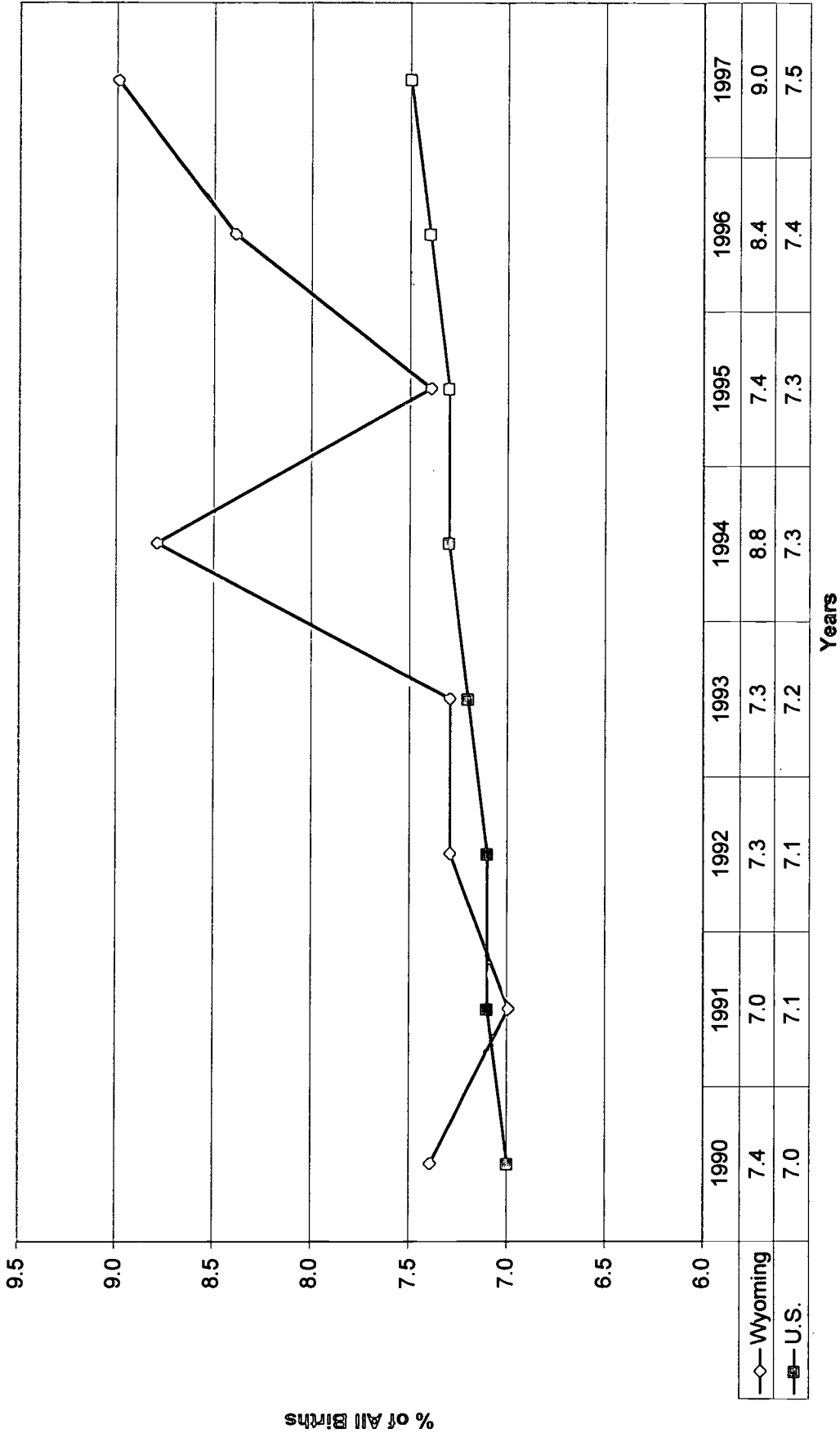


Percentage of Low Birth-Weight Babies of All Births by County of Residence



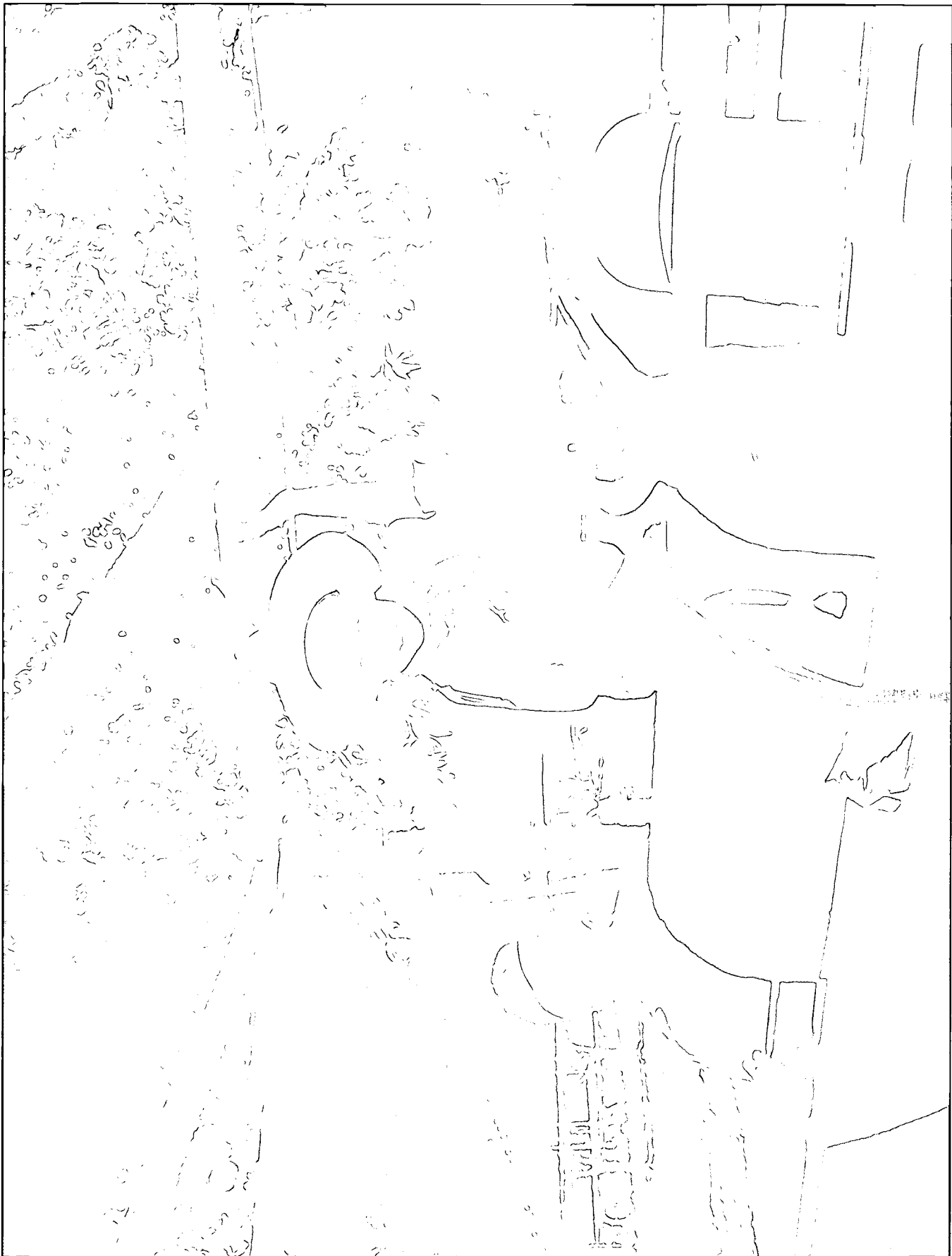

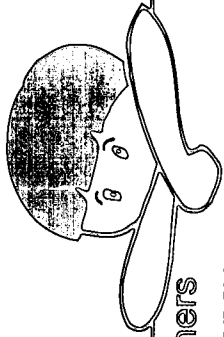


Births to Mothers Who Smoked During Pregnancy

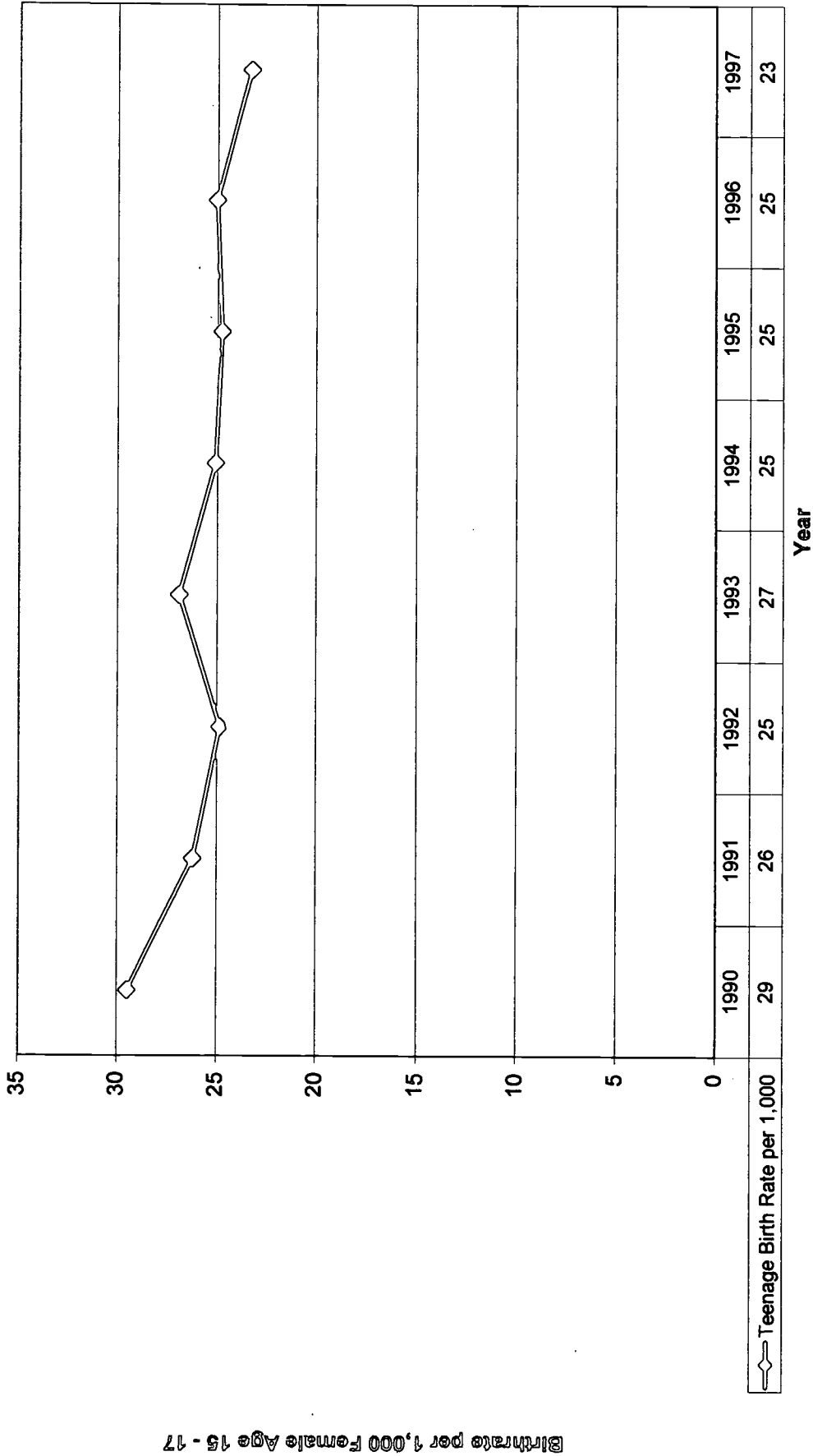

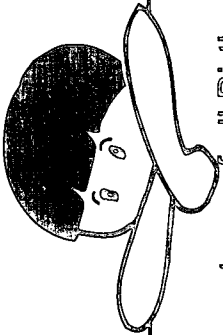

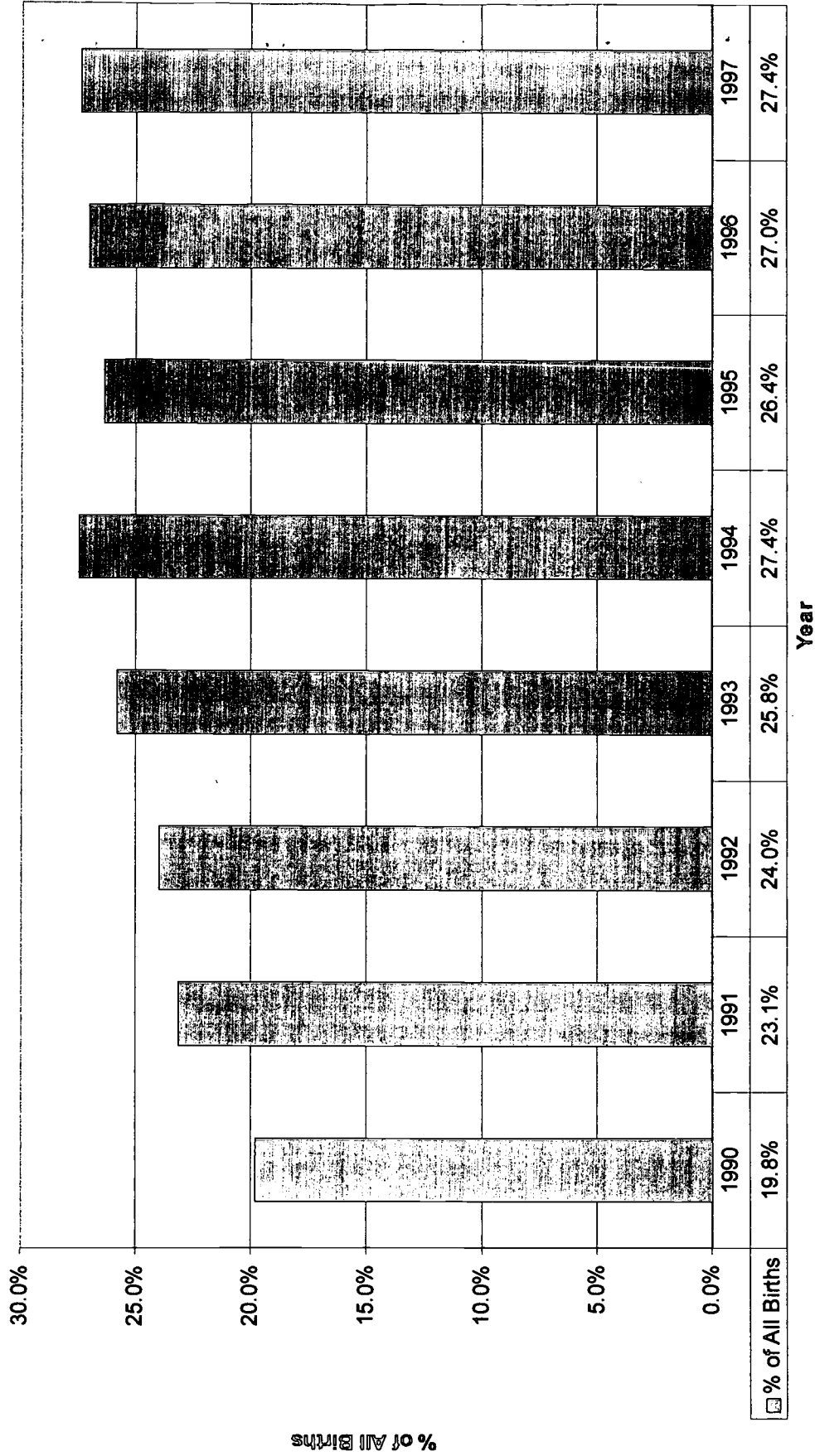

Affected by Divorce by County of Residence**

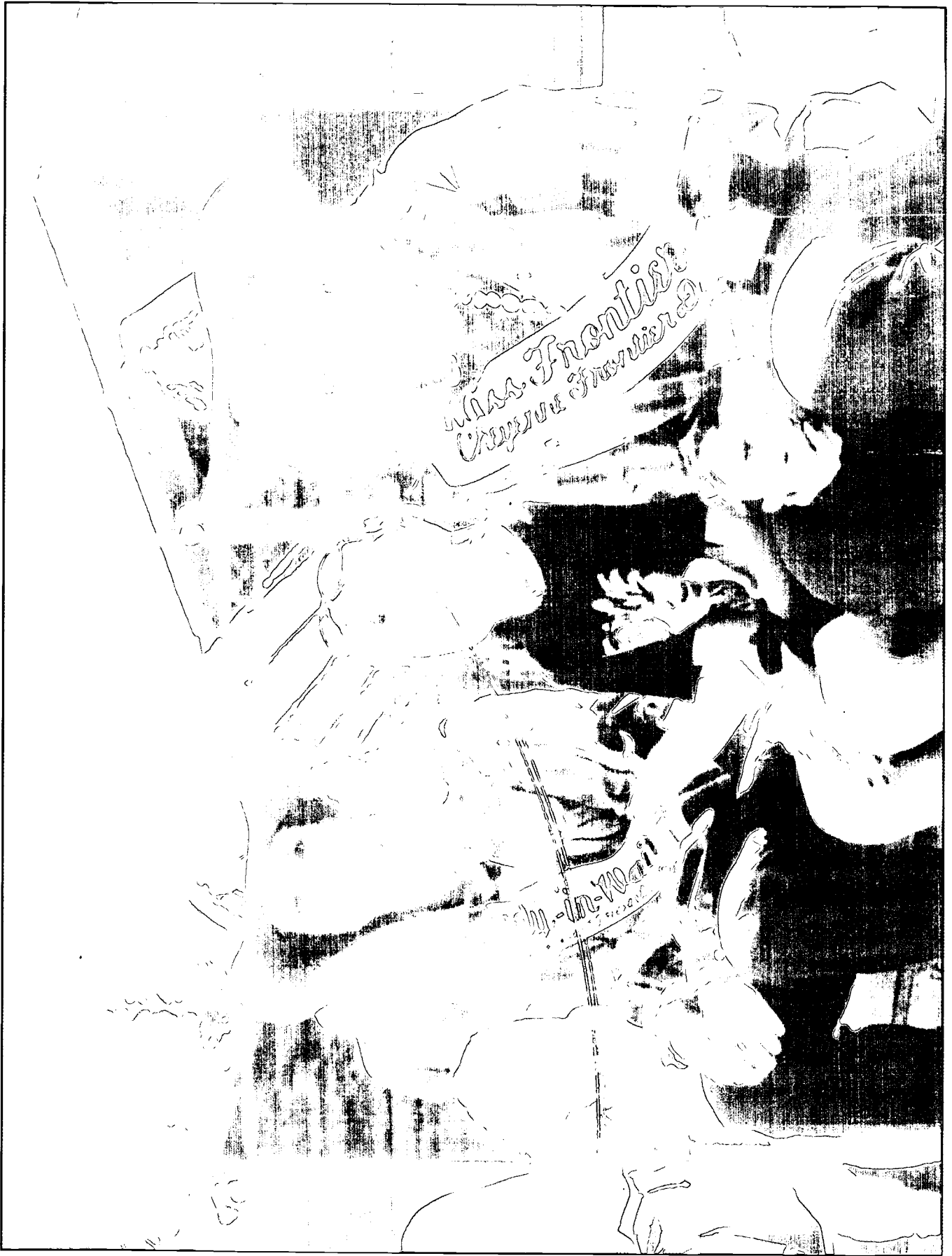

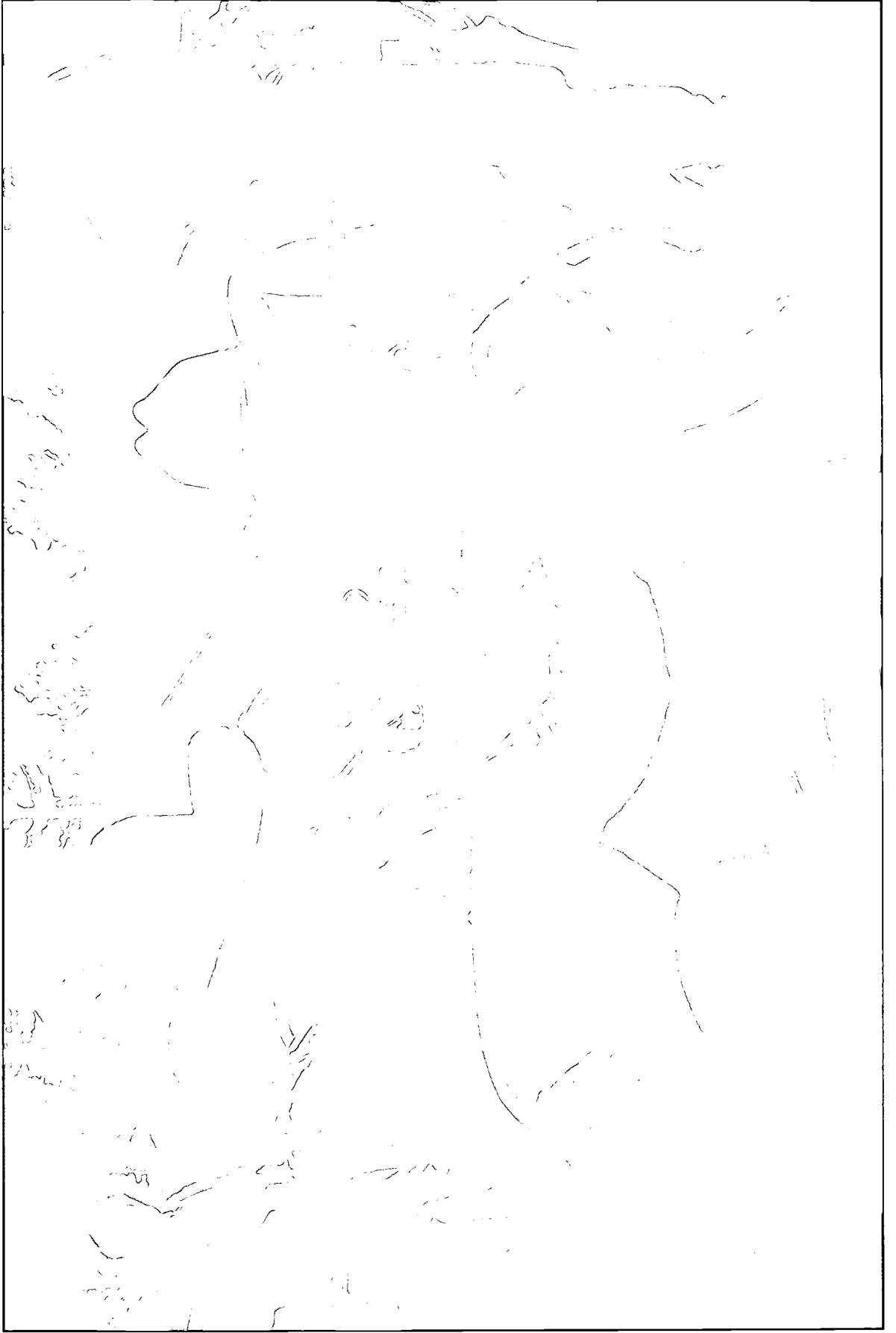


Drop-Out Count By County and Gender

What is Advocacy?

When we

- * speak up or write in support of a cause
- * educate others
- * mobilize people/ groups around an issue

we are advocating

Anyone can be an advocate.

All you have to do is be willing to challenge systems when they don't work and support laws and policies that do work. Most importantly, you need to be a voice for those who can't speak for themselves -- **children.**

Why advocate for children?

Because

- * children do not vote, their voices too often go unheard
- * children and youth have rights which must be honored
- * children and youth deserve to have government programs work in their best interest

Working with policy makers...

Gaining the support of policy makers is an important and valuable strategy for citizens and non-profit organizations. Often, this can be done by educating them. **Letter writing** is one way to inform, educate and/ or influence decision-makers. Another way is **meeting with** policy makers--members of the City Council, Mayor's office, senior government officials, etc. Finally, **phone** decision makers to discuss upcoming issues that influence the lives of children. Please use the information on the upcoming pages to contact those who make decisions about children and let your voice be heard. They are counting on you to keep them informed.
