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## ABSTRACT

This Read\*Write\*Now! activity poster presents, on one side, a colorful image of Arthur the Aardvark encouraging adults and children to share the fun of reading and writing, and, on the other side, 5 fun and challenging activities for reading time. The activities are designed to expand a child's interest in and enthusiasm for reading and writing while also helping to improve these skills. In addition to the activities, there is a brief description of the America Reads Challenge, a monthly calendar of events, and a certificate that can be presented to readers who have reached their reading and writing goals. 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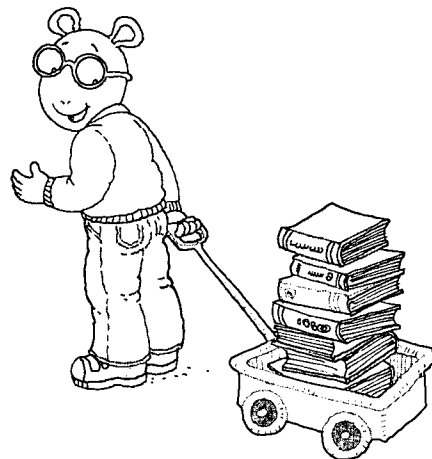
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Dear READ\*WRITE\*NOW! Friend,

We all know that kids who read succeed. We also know it is very important that they read, or be read to, every day. In fact, the research shows that reading with or to a child significantly increases his or her reading ability. The READ\*WRITE\*NOW! materials were designed to help do just that. Launched by Secretary Riley in 1995, READ\*WRITE\*NOW! suggests three easy steps to help improve children's reading and writing skills: 1) read or write 30 minutes a day five days a week; 2) learn one new vocabulary word every day; and 3) sign up for and use a library card. In addition, at least one day a week, children should read or write with a learning partner.

This year Arthur, created by Marc Brown, and his family of dedicated readers are here to help children and learning partners. Arthur and his family are shown reading together on the reverse side of this poster. Hang this poster where it will remind you how important it is for families to read together. The poster also provides fun and challenging ideas for your reading time. The activities are designed to expand children's interest in and enthusiasm for reading and writing, while helping them improve these skills.

## December

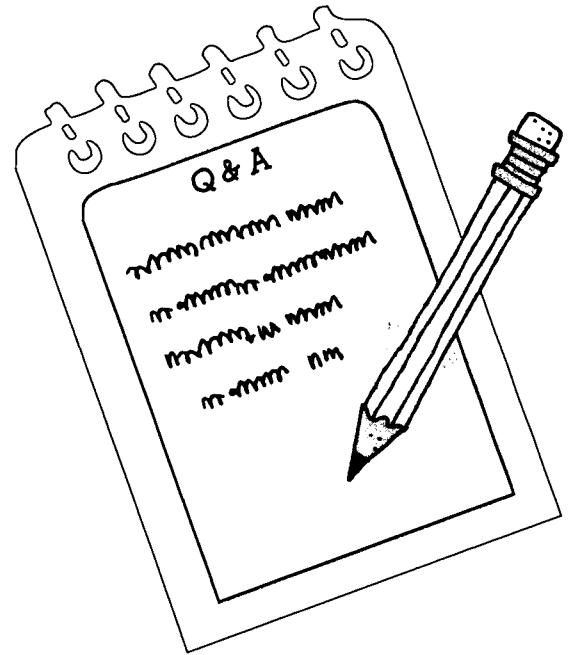
### **Celebrate the holidays!**

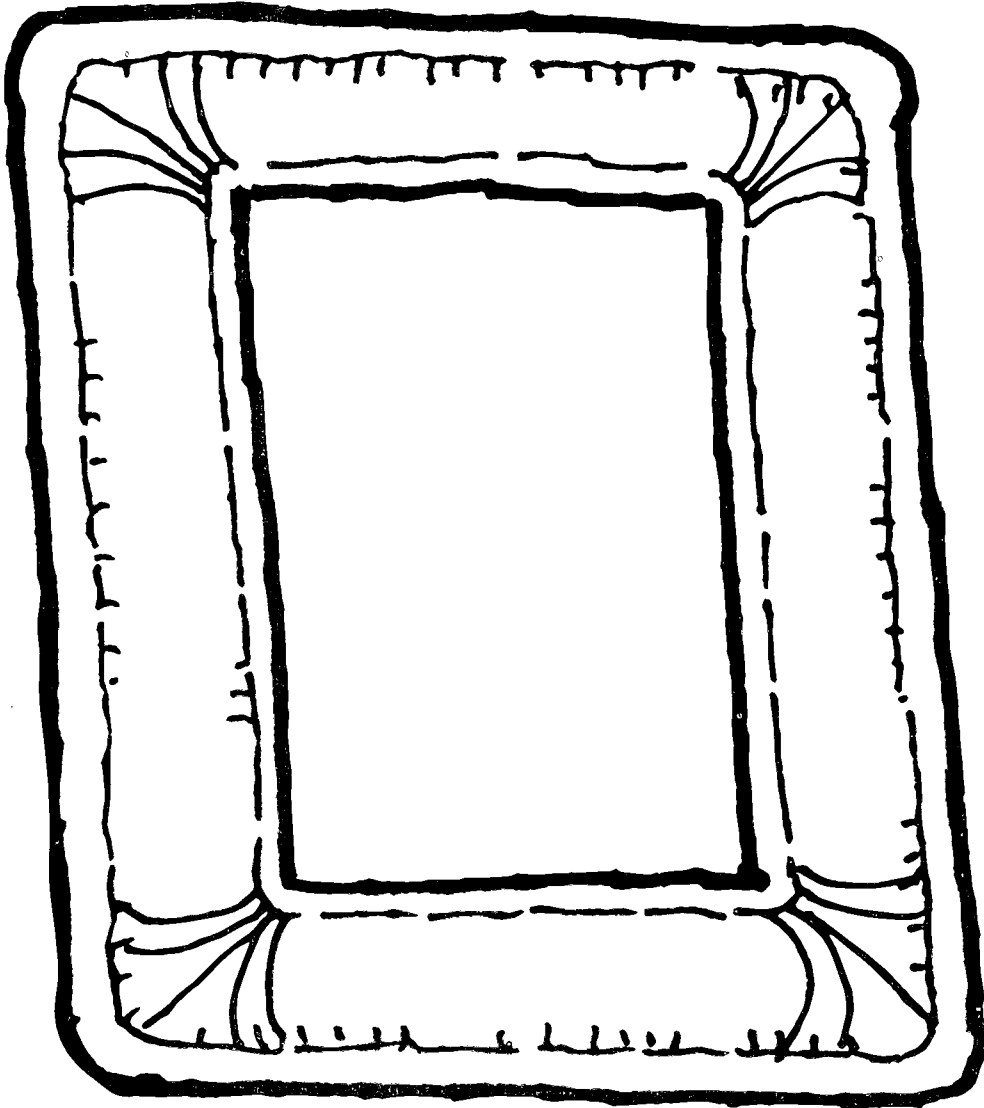
1. What is your name?

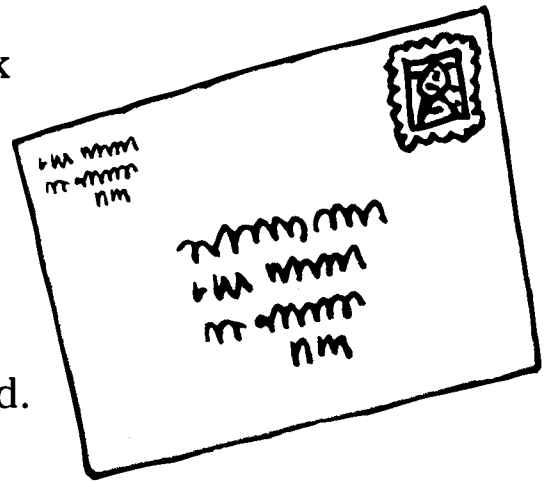
