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## ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to examine the need and feasibility of creating a unique evaluation Web site to support the needs of districts and schools recently funded under the Comprehensive School Reform Demonstration Program (CSRD). The federal requirement that CSRD funded schools and districts carry out comprehensive evaluation of their reform programs has created some concerns about the readiness and ability of local personnel to do so without additional support and assistance. The availability and use of more than 20 Web sites that currently provide CSRD information were studied, and information about the need and purpose of such a site was obtained from other regional educational laboratories and the Office of Educational Research and Development. Findings indicate that there already appears to be an ample infrastructure in place for providing educators in CSRD schools and districts with evaluation resources. Adding more links could make this infrastructure an even more effective information dissemination tool. The CRSDweb.net site already in place provides opportunities for educators concerned with evaluation to interact with one another and evaluation experts. It appears that creating a new CSRD evaluation site would not be prudent at this time. (SLD)

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## KEY FINDINGS

*There already appears to be an ample Internet infrastructure in place for providing educators in CSRD schools and districts with evaluation resources. By adding more links among the existing CSRD sites this infrastructure could be an even more effective dissemination tool. Similarly, the CSRDweb.net site already in place provides ample opportunities for educators concerned with CSR evaluation to interact with one another and with evaluation experts. Thus, based upon this examination of existing sites and discussions among program leaders at the regional laboratories, it appears that creating a new CSRD evaluation site would not be prudent at this time.*

## BACKGROUND

This study, which examines the need and feasibility of creating a unique evaluation web site to support the needs of districts and schools recently funded under the Comprehensive School Reform Demonstration Program (CSRD), was conducted at the request of OERI. The request was based on the assumption that the federal requirement that CSRD funded districts and schools carry out a comprehensive evaluation of their reform programs has created some concerns about the readiness and ability of local personnel to do so without additional support and assistance.

While evaluation technical assistance is sometimes available to schools and districts through consultants or written materials, it is more often the case that consultants are not readily accessible nor always appropriately grounded in K-12 education reform, and written evaluation materials are not available in a format and language useful to K-12 educators who may not have expertise in evaluation methods.

The initial focus of the study was to determine the need for an additional CSRD evaluation web site by

- examining the extent to which CSRD evaluation information is currently available electronically,
- determining the extent to which this information is accessed and used, and
- obtaining input from staff at other regional laboratories and OERI about the need and purpose of the proposed CSRD evaluation site.

## EXISTING CSRD-RELATED WEB SITES

Aside from the model developer Web sites which feature individual models that might be used in local comprehensive school reform programs, McREL identified more than 20 sites supporting the federal CSRD initiative. These sites are listed and briefly described below.

While each of these organizational sites tend to feature their own efforts and products related to the CSRD initiative, they often reference other sites and materials developed outside their organizations. When it comes to evaluation information, however, the availability of guidance is less visible or consistent across sites. While some sites, like McREL and NWREL, post evaluation materials, in general, there seem to be few resources available to guide local CSRD evaluation activities. Two of these sites, NCCSR and CSRDweb.net, appear to provide a solid foundation for compiling on-line information and interactive discussion forums related to CSRD evaluation.

### USE OF CSRD RELATED SITES

Dr. Zoe Barley, McREL's director of evaluation, serves as the moderator of CSRWeb.NET's interactive forum on evaluation and data collection. In this role, she monitors the activity on the site and has found that the evaluation forum has yet to attract much use. In speaking with educators from CSRD-award sites in the region, McREL has found that people often say they are too busy to spend much time on the site, or the Internet in general. In other cases, they say they are not yet concerned with evaluation issues. If the present lack of activity on the evaluation forum on the CSRweb.net site is any indication, it seems that if McREL were to create yet another online forum for CSRD evaluation information, it would likely not generate enough activity to warrant the resources devoted to its creation.

### INPUT FROM STAFF AT OTHER REGIONAL LABORATORIES

During a recent meeting of regional laboratory program leaders, the group determined that creating a stand-alone CSRD evaluation web site would duplicate existing sites, some of which, as noted earlier, are not yet heavily trafficked. Thus, the group suggested it would a better use of resources to encourage laboratories and other organizations to add more links to evaluation tools and publications to their existing CSRD sites. It was also decided that with additional contributions from the RELs, the National Clearinghouse and CSRweb.net sites could serve as even more effective tools for disseminating CSR-related evaluation information. Carol Chelemer of OERI was present for this discussion and concurred with the decision not to develop another CSRD site.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

In summary, McREL has determined that a) there is an abundance of CSRD-related web sites currently on the Internet; b) most CSRD sites do not contain a wide array of evaluation resources; and c) existing sites, in particular, the CSRWeb.NET site are not generating an inordinately high level of activity. In light of these findings, we offer the following recommendations.

**RELs should encourage the use of the NCCSR and CSRweb.net sites as evaluation resources.** Given the large number of CSRD-related sites already on the Internet, it does not appear necessary to add yet another site. The NCCSR site already

serves as a “one-stop-shopping” resource for CSRD information and contains the beginnings of a collection of CSR evaluation tools. Thus, it makes sense for RELs to continue to support the site in this capacity. Meanwhile, the CSRdweb.net site already provides an interactive element which some educators might find helpful as they go about planning and conducting CSR evaluations. Again, it seems unnecessary to duplicate this feature in yet another site.

**RELs should encourage existing sites to provide more links to the NCCSR and CSRdweb.net sites.** In examining 19 CSRD Web sites (excluding the NCCSR and CSRdweb.net sites), it was found that only nine link to the NCCSR site and only three link to the CSRdweb.net site. Encouraging more links to these sites, especially from sites hosted by federally funded service providers, would most likely foster greater use of the materials placed on them.

**Encourage existing sites to offer more resources on evaluation.** It was also found that only three of the 19 sites examined (McREL, NWREL, and the Region X CC) currently provide CSR-related evaluation tools. Again, an effective, yet relatively simple way to encourage greater use of CSR evaluation resources would be to encourage more CSRD-related Web sites, especially those hosted by federally funded service providers, to offer links to existing resources, such as McREL’s “Evaluating for Success” guidebook and NWREL /Region X’s “Evaluating Whole-School Reform Efforts” guidebook, and to add new resources as they are created.



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
