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ABSTRACT

This report contains 22 tables and 25 figures showing student characteristics and enrollment trends from 1995 to 1999 for Cuesta College. Section 1 presents five-year student characteristics and enrollment trends; Section 2 outlines enrollment by Cuesta College educational region, 1998-99. Both sections contain data on enrollment status, course load, units and degrees completed, gender, ethnicity, age, disabilities, geographic region, educational objectives, and students from local high schools. Highlights include: (1) enrollment at Cuesta College is at an all-time high of 9,229 students and continues to increase; (2) the proportion of students carrying fewer than six units has decreased (31.3%), and the proportion of students carrying more than 15 units has increased (6.4%); (3) there is a continual increase in the number of students with disabilities; (4) the San Luis campus is divided almost equally between male and female students, while the North County campus boasts a female enrollment of 67.7% of the student body; and (5) the percentage of historically underrepresented ethnic minority students increased at each campus in 1999. Appendices include: (1) Enrollment history, 1965-99; (2) Local residency of students at all sites, 1998-99; (3) Local residency of students at San Luis Obispo campus, 1999; (4) Local residency of students at North County campus, 1999; (5) Local residency of students at South County campus 1999; and (6) Regional enrollment comparisons, 1999. 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EXECUTIVE BRIEF

FIVE -YEAR STUDENT CHARACTERISTICS AND ENROLLMENT TRENDS (1995-1999)

Table 1 (and Appendix I) shows that enrollment at Cuesta College continues to increase—although more gradually than in previous years—and is now at an all-time high of 9,229 students. Continuing students continue to be in the majority constituting just above 51 percent of the student body, indicating that nearly half of the enrollment is new to Cuesta this semester.

Table 2 indicates relative stability in the proportion of students taking only day classes (41.8% in 1999). However, the proportion of students enrolled in both day and evening classes has increased from 35.1% in 1998 to 36.3% in 1999. Accordingly, the proportion of students enrolled only in evening classes has fallen by 1.2 percentage points to 22.0% in 1999.

Table 3 indicates stability of student course load within the 6.1 to 15 units categories. The proportion of students carrying fewer than 6 units has decreased (31.3%) as the proportion of students carrying more than 15 units has increased (6.4%).

Table 4 shows student enrollment by number of units/degrees completed. While stability is also apparent, it can be seen that the percentage of students who have earned fewer than 30 units has been slowly decreasing during the last five years from 70.5 percent in 1995, down to 66.6 percent in 1998. Simultaneously, the percentages of students having completed either an AA/AS or BA/BS degree(s) have increased from 6.2 percent in 1995 to 7.3 percent in 1999 and from 2.7 percent in 1995 to 4.7 percent in 1999 respectively.

Table 5 shows the gender distribution of the Cuesta student body. As in prior years, female students constitute 54.7 percent of the enrollment and males constitute only 45.3 percent, representing a 1.4 percentage point gain from a year ago in the proportion of females.

Table 6 shows the ethnic configuration of Cuesta's students. The percentage of white students has decreased from 1998 to 75.2 percent in 1999. This decrease is redistributed as an increase in the proportion of Hispanic students (13.4%). The remainder of the ethnic categories remained essentially unchanged from 1998.

Table 7 shows the age distribution of Cuesta students. Again, the relative percentages have remained stable over time in all but two categories. The proportion of 19-year-old students has decreased by 1.2 percentage points as the 41-50 category has increased by a like amount. The median age of the overall student body is 22 while the mean age is 26.

Table 8 shows a continual increase in the number of students with disabilities. Note particularly that the "learning disabled" category reflects the increasing number of high school graduates with a learning disability. Also note that the "other" category reflects increased identification of students with an "attention-deficit disorder."

Table 9 indicates that 58.5 percent of Cuesta's first-time students have been residents of San Luis Obispo County for at least one year. The remaining 41.5 percent relocated to San Luis Obispo County from out of the area to attend Cuesta. The proportion of "local" students increased by 4.4 percentage points in 1999.

Table 10 shows first-time students from local high schools attending Cuesta. The proportions of first-time students coming from Atascadero and San Luis Obispo have fallen by a combined 4.7 percentage points, while the proportions from Paso Robles, Templeton and Arroyo Grande have risen by a combined 6.4 percentage points from 1998 figures.

Table 11 shows the educational objective for attending Cuesta College as stated by students. The information regarding goals and objectives is obtained from the student's original application for admission to Cuesta. Naturally, these objectives can change as a student gains college experience and receives counseling. In 1999, 58.2 percent entered Cuesta with the stated objective of transferring to a four-year college—down 1.5 percentage points from a year ago.

Table 12 is the last table in this section of the report. This table shows the number and percentage of graduates from each of the local feeder high schools who are awarded Associate of Arts (A.A.) or Associate of Science degrees (A.S.) by Cuesta. The 1999 figures show that roughly 23 percent of the A.A./A.S. degrees awarded to local high school graduates were Atascadero alumni. These figures are mainly a function of high school graduation rates and subsequent attendance rates at Cuesta two to three years prior. These figures should be tempered by the knowledge that a student may choose to transfer to a four-year college without choosing to obtain either an A.A. or A. S. degree.





EXECUTIVE BRIEF CONTINUED

STUDENT CHARACTERISTICS AND ENROLLMENT TRENDS BY EDUCATIONAL REGION (1998-1999)

Table 13 shows the enrollment status of students for each of Cuesta's three educational regions over the last two years. The new North County campus opened with 1,293 students last fall. For 1999 enrollment at the North County campus shows an impressive 20.2 percent increase to a new high of 1,554. Conversely, the San Luis Obispo campus lost 54 students from last year. The South County center increased its enrollment by 12 students to a new high of 384 in 1999.

Table 14 shows day/evening status of students by site. The San Luis Obispo campus continues to exhibit the greatest percentage of day only students (47.8% in 1999). Both North and South County students continue to enroll in more evening courses, which is due primarily to when the majority of courses are scheduled at each site. Roughly 47 percent of North County and 93 percent of South County students are evening-only students. Reflective, however, of North County course expansion, the number of day-only students increased by approximately 12 percentage points at the North County campus.

Table 15 shows student course load by site. The pattern of course loads by region has remained fairly stable over the last two years. The San Luis Obispo campus continues to attract more full-time students (12 or more units)—nearly 50% in 1999. By comparison, the North and South County campuses attract less full-time students—29 percent and 39 percent respectively in 1999.

Table 16 shows the number of units completed by students by site. The vast majority of students have completed less than 30 units—regardless of educational site.

Table 17 shows student gender by site. While the San Luis campus is divided roughly equally between male and female students (47.4% vs. 52.6% in 1999), the North County campus boasts a female enrollment of greater than two-thirds (67.7%) of the student body. South County falls in the middle with roughly 60 percent female enrollment in 1999.

Table 18 shows the ethnic configuration of the students at each campus. The percentage of historically underrepresented ethnic minority students increased at each campus in 1999. The increases were most prominent at the South and North County campus. South county enrollment of ethnic minorities increased by 4.5 percentage points to nearly 28 percent in 1999. Similarly, ethnic minority students now comprise just over 27 percent (compared to roughly 24 percent in 1998) of the total student population at the North County campus. The bulk of this increase at the North County (and elsewhere) was brought about by increases in Hispanic enrollments.

Table 19 shows the age distribution of students by site. The age distributions at each campus have remained stable over the last two years. The median ages of students in 1999 by educational region are as follows: San Luis Obispo -21; North County -25; South County -22. As is clear from the median ages, the North County continues to attract an older student body than the other two regions.

Table 20 is a new table for 1999, which explores the number and percentage of local and out-of-area first-time students by educational region. The San Luis Obispo campus attracts the greatest percentage of out-of-area first-time students (roughly 53 percent). The North and South county, on the other hand, serve greater proportions of local students (82% and 89% respectively).

Table 21 shows high school of origin for first-time students by educational region. Each local high school continues to contribute students to a campus in direct proportion to its proximity to that campus.

Table 22 shows student educational objective by campus. Again in 1999, the North County campus has a substantially higher proportion of its students (20.1%) seeking vocational goals than the other campuses (roughly 13%). The San Luis campus continues to lead in the percentage of students indicating transfer as their educational objective (61.7% in 1999).

APPENDICES

Appendix I shows a complete (1965 – 1999) enrollment history of Cuesta College—from 1,670 to 9,229 students.

Appendices II through V depict, overall and by educational region, the number and percent of students residing in the various parts of San Luis Obispo County. Notwithstanding the San Luis Obispo campus, the overwhelming majority of students lives in close proximity to the campuses they are attending. Specifically, just below 46 percent of students enrolled at the San Luis Obispo campus reside in San Luis Obispo, whereas 96 percent of North County students and 83 percent of South County students reside in close proximity to their respective campuses.

Appendix VI explores—in Venn diagram form—the number of students attending each individual (or a combination of) Cuesta campus.







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










GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ACQUIRED BRAIN IMPAIRMENT (ABI): A verified deficit in brain functioning which results in a total or partial loss of cognitive, communicative, motor, psycho-social and/or sensory-perceptual abilities.

AMERICAN INDIAN: Ethnic category that includes indigenous tribes of the continental U.S. and Alaska.

ASIAN AND PACIFIC RIM: Ethnic category which includes sub-groups of Asians (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Cambodian, Vietnamese, East Indian and other Asians) and subgroups of Pacific Rim cultures (Guamanian, Hawaiian, Samoan and other Pacific Islanders).

ASSOCIATE DEGREE: TRANSFER TO FOUR-YEAR COLLEGE: These students intend to complete the A.A./A.S. degree requirements in addition to those general education requirements of a four-year college necessary for transfer.

ATTENTION DEFICIT/HYPERACTIVITY DISORDER: A persistent pattern of inattention and/or hyperactivity/impulsivity that is more frequent and severe than is typically observed in others of the same age.

CONTINUATION HIGH SCHOOLS: These schools include: Atascadero Adult, Liberty, Lopez, Oak Hills, Pacific Beach and San Luis Adult Evening.

CONTINUING STUDENTS: Students who were enrolled at Cuesta College the previous semester.

DAY AND EVENING STUDENTS: Students enrolled in both day and evening classes.

DAY STUDENTS: Students enrolled in classes that begin prior to 4:00 p.m.

DEVELOPMENTALLY DELAYED LEARNER (DDL): Students with below-average intellectual functioning.

EVENING STUDENTS: Students enrolled only in classes that begin at or after 4:00 p.m.

FIRST-TIME STUDENTS: Students who have never attended college-usually recent high school graduates, who can be local or out-of-area students.

HEARING IMPAIRMENT: A total or partial loss of hearing function, which impedes the communication process essential to language usage.

HISPANIC: Ethnic category that includes Mexican-Chicano, Mexican-American, Central American, South American and other Hispanic groups.

LEARNING DISABILITY: Students with average to above-average intellectual ability, but with a severe information processing deficit.

MOBILITY IMPAIRMENT: A serious limitation in locomotion or motor function.

NEW LOCAL STUDENT: Any new student who reported living in San Luis Obispo County for a year or more.

NEW OUT-OF-AREA STUDENT: Any new student who reported living outside of San Luis Obispo County during the previous year.

NEW TRANSFER STUDENT: Student who has attended or is attending another college.

NORTH COUNTY CAMPUS: Comprises classes taught at the following locations: North County campus (at Paso Robles), Paso Robles High School and Mid-State Fairground.

OTHER DISABILITY: Includes students with disabilities who do not fall into any of the categories described and who indicate a need for support services or instruction. Students with attention deficit/hyperactivity disorders and students with a previously identified learning disability are also included.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

OTHER HIGH SCHOOLS: Central Coast Christian, Grace Christian of Paso Robles, North County Christian, Paso Robles School for Boys and San Luis Christian Academy.

OCCUPATIONAL CERTIFICATES: Certificates of Completion for specific vocational skills and Certificates of Proficiency for completion of a wider area of vocational study.

OCCUPATIONAL MAJOR: Usually a major field of study which terminates with the completion of an A.A./A.S. degree (e.g. Automotive Technology, Library Technology).

PERSONAL INTEREST: Courses taken for personal growth and enjoyment.

PHYSICAL DISABILITY (MOBILITY/VISUAL): Student who is visually impaired (e.g., blind, or has a serious limitation in locomotion or motor function requiring wheelchair or crutches).

PSYCHOLOGICAL DISABILITY: Student who has a persistent psychological or psychiatric emotional or mental illness.

RETURNING STUDENT: Student who has previously attended Cuesta College, but not during the last semester.

RETURNING TRANSFER STUDENT: Student who has attended another college since leaving Cuesta College.

SAN LUIS OBISPO CAMPUS: Comprises courses taught at the following locations: Cuesta College main on Highway 1, Cal Poly, Atascadero State Hospital, Cambria, Sierra Vista Hospital, and El Paso de Robles Boys School.

SOUTH COUNTY SITE: Comprises courses taught at Arroyo Grande High School.

SPEECH AND LANGUAGE IMPAIRMENT: One or more speech/language disorders of voice, articulation, rhythm, and/or the receptive, and expressive processes of language.

TRANSFER SUBTOTAL: In Table 11, the sum of all students with a transfer objective (including those with an objective to obtain an A.A./A.S. Degree and those without such an objective).

TRANSFER TO FOUR-YEAR COLLEGE, NO A.A./A.S.: This term refers to students who are not planning to complete requirements for an A.A./A.S. degree, but intend to complete the general education requirements for transfer to a four-year college.

VISUAL IMPAIRMENT: A total or partial loss of sight.

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
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
