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ABSTRACT

This report presents the results of a survey of the 1998 graduates of Westchester Community College. The 464 graduates responding to the survey have fared quite well since graduating. The mean salary of those employed full-time is \$29,755. Two-thirds reported being employed, which is slightly less than last year's graduating class. Of those employed, however, slightly more reported being employed full-time than the previous year. A review of the demographic characteristics such as gender, ethnic background, and age of the entire Class of 1998 reveals several changes from previous graduating classes. For example, there are fewer female and more Hispanic students, and the percentage transferring to a four-year college remained nearly constant. The report presents results of those attending college full-time, degree aspirations, and factors facilitating transfer. The study reports on satisfaction with jobs and location of employment. Respondents continue to give high marks to the college on several broad questions (overall college experience, courses in major, and availability of courses). Respondents were also asked to rate their satisfaction with 20 of the college's services. Library services, computer services, tutorial services, and reading and math skills facilities received the highest percentage of very satisfied responses from students. A large percentage of respondents indicated that their goals (employment, transfer, academic, and personal) had been met by their college degree. 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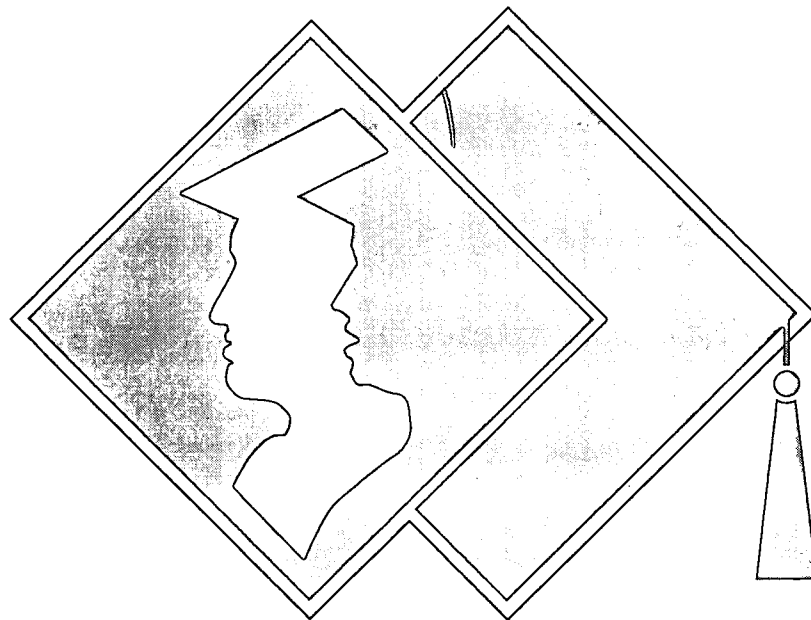

We are pleased to present this report about our 1998 graduating class. The 1,040 students who received a degree were drawn from all six cities and twenty-one towns in Westchester county and reflect closely the demographic characteristics of Westchester county in terms of gender and ethnic background.


Our graduates are continuing their education at 66 colleges throughout the United States. In total, almost three-fifths (58.4%) of the respondents transferred to a four-year college, and three-fourths (74.9%) of those are attending full-time.


Two-thirds (67.5%) of the respondents also are employed either full-time or part-time. Those working full-time are employed at 101 different companies in Westchester county; another 36 companies in New York state, outside the county; and an additional 9 firms located in other states. The mean salary for full-time jobs taken within a year of graduation was \$29,755.

It is gratifying to know that their evaluation of the College and the services it provides continues to remain high. In evaluating WCC's *Overall Quality of Instruction*, 95.4% were either *very satisfied* (63.4%) or *satisfied* (32.0%). With regard to their *Overall WCC Experience*, 95.6% were either *very satisfied* (69.1%) or *satisfied* (26.5%).

The accomplishments of our graduates are a great source of pride to us. We believe you will share these feelings as you read this report.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Based on a number of indicators, the 1998 Westchester Community College graduates responding to the 1998 survey have fared quite well since graduating. The mean salary of those employed full-time is \$29,755. Two-thirds (67.5%) reported being employed, which is slightly less than last year's graduating class (70.5%). Of those employed, however, slightly more reported being employed full-time (67.5%) than the previous year (64.3%).

Demographic Characteristics: A review of the demographic characteristics of the *entire Class of 1998* reveals several changes from previous graduating classes.

Gender: The percentage of female graduates (56.6%) remains higher than the males (43.4%). This figure, however, represents a slight increase in males over last year's class (41.9%) and breaks a declining trend over the previous five years.

Ethnic Background: The percentage of Blacks (15.0%) remained almost the same as last year's class (14.6%), while the percentage of Hispanics continues to increase from 11.1% in 1997 to 13.3% in 1998.

Age: The percentage of students graduating under the age of twenty-two (25.5%), remained almost the same as the previous year's class (24.9%), continuing the reversal of the downward trend apparent in previous years.

Education: The percentage transferring to a four-year college remained nearly constant, with 58.4% of the graduates reporting they had transferred to a four-year college as opposed to 58.8% of the 1997 graduates.

Attending College Full-Time: Of the respondents who reported continuing their education, three-fourths (74.9%) reported attending college *full-time*. This is an increase of 2.2% from last year's class (72.7%).

Degree Aspirations: As in previous years, a large percentage (78.9%) of respondents intend to obtain a bachelor's degree. This percentage is a slight drop (3.6%) from the previous year (82.5%).

Factors Facilitating Transfer: Responses to a set of questions exploring factors important to facilitating student transfers showed that the factors considered *very important* by the largest percentage of respondents were: *Availability of Program Desired* (72.4%), *Access*, including location and cost (68.7%), *Reputation of College* (66.8%), and *Ease of Transfer* (59.8%).

Employment: There is also positive news about how the graduates feel about their jobs.

Satisfaction with Job: Over four-fifths (81.1%) of the graduates who responded, report being *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their jobs, and well over two-thirds (72.2%) were either *very satisfied* or *somewhat satisfied* with their opportunity to advance. Over three-fourths (76.8%) of the respondents felt that their WCC education prepared them for their current job either *to a great degree* or *to a slight degree*.

Location of Employment: Over two-thirds (69.2%) of the graduates who reported the location of their employment, found employment in Westchester county. Another one-fourth (24.7%) of the graduates were employed outside of Westchester, but inside New York state. Thus, a full 93.9% of the 1998 graduates who reported the location of their employment, reported being employed in New York state.

Evaluation of College Experience: The respondents in the 1998 survey continue to give high marks to Westchester Community College on several broad questions concerning the College and the experience they had while attending.

Overall College Experience: As in previous years, over 95.6% of the 1998 graduates gave a *very satisfied* or *satisfied* rating when asked about their *Overall WCC Experience*. With regard to the *Quality of Instruction*, 95.4% of the 1998 graduates reported being either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*.

Courses in Major: In evaluating courses in their major, a large percentage (95.7%) were either *very satisfied* or *satisfied*. This percentage is almost the same as the previous year.

Availability of Courses: Almost the same percentage of 1998 graduates (89.5%) expressed satisfaction with the *Availability of Courses*, as last year's graduating class (90.1%).

Evaluation of Student Services: In another series of questions, respondents were asked to rate their satisfaction with twenty of the College's services. The services that received the highest percentage of *very satisfied* responses from students who used the service were, *Library Services* (62.7%), *Computer Services* (60.0%), *Tutorial Services* (58.0%), and *Reading and Math Skills Facilities* (55.7%).

Effectiveness of WCC in Helping to Achieve Goals of Respondents: A large percentage of the respondents (86.0%) indicated that their goals had been met by their college degree.

Employment Goals: Over one-half (52.2%) of the graduates indicated a major reason for attending Westchester Community College was to *Increase their Chances for a Job*. Of the six questions exploring their job-related goals, over eighty percent of the respondents consistently indicated that WCC had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve these goals.

Transfer Goals: Of the graduates who cited *Transferring to a Four-year Institution* as a major goal, 94.2% indicated that WCC had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve this goal.

Academic Goals: The 1998 graduates also were asked a series of questions about their academic goals. Of the students who cited *Increased Knowledge and Understanding* as a goal, 70.7% rated WCC *very effective* and another 27.8% rated it *somewhat effective* for a total of 98.5% with a positive rating. Well over two-thirds (69.8%) rated WCC *very effective* in helping to achieve their goal of *Increased Desire and Ability to Learn* with another 27.7% rating it *somewhat effective* for a total of 97.5%.

Personal Goals: Over three-fourths of the students consistently considered *achieving personal growth* as a part of their reason for attending WCC. Of the eight sub-goals listed, 94.2% felt WCC had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in *Developing Interest in New Ideas*, and 90.5% in *Improving Self-confidence*.

In closing, it should be kept in mind that the results of the survey are based on the responses of the 464 graduates who took the time to return the survey, 44.6% of the entire graduating class of 1,040 students. We are grateful to these students for their cooperation. We also know from past experience that those who return the surveys are likely to be the ones who feel most successful. To the extent that this has occurred, a bias is built in to the results and should be kept in mind. On the other hand, it is clear from those who did respond that a very large percentage have an unusually high opinion of the College and the benefits they received from attending this institution.

THE GRADUATES OF 1998

The *1998 Study of Graduates* of Westchester Community College provides information about the 1998 graduating class in three ways. First, it profiles the demographic, educational, and work-related characteristics of these graduates. Second, it compares these graduates to graduates in previous years to identify trends existing among our recent graduates.

Third, it provides the results of an evaluation by the graduates of the services and resources offered at WCC, along with an evaluation by the graduates of how effective WCC has been in helping them to achieve their goals. These evaluations are used by the faculty and administrators of the College for planning and assessment purposes.

METHODOLOGY

In Fall 1998, a survey (see Appendix 13) was sent to students who graduated from Westchester Community College either in the late summer of 1997, the fall of 1997, or the spring of 1998, otherwise considered the graduating class of 1998.

The initial mailing was followed with a reminder letter several weeks later. This, in turn, was followed by a third reminder and personal phone calls to all of the remaining non-responding graduates. Of the 1,040 students who graduated in the Class of 1998, 957 with degrees and 83 with certificates, a total of 464 returned a completed, usable survey. This yields a sample size of 44.6%.

A comparison of the respondents to the known demographic characteristics of the entire 1998 graduating class shows that the percentages are similar with regard to ethnic background and gender. For example, 66.4% of the respondents are white, while in actuality white students comprise 65.2% of the graduating class; 12.7% of the respondents are Black compared with 15.0% of the graduating class; and 13.8% of the respondents are Hispanic compared with 13.3% of the graduating class. With regard to gender, 41.4% of the respondents are male, while in actuality males comprise 43.4% of the entire 1998 graduating class.

In certain instances the total number of respondents to a question does not add up to the total number who returned the survey (464). This is due to the fact that some respondents failed to answer a question or responded to a question that was not applicable to their current status. In these cases we have used the actual number of respondents.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF ENTIRE CLASS OF 1998

Gender: Well over half (56.6%) of the graduating class of 1998 is female, as shown in Table I. This marks a slight decrease (1.5%) from the previous year, and continues a gradual decline in the percentage of females graduating.

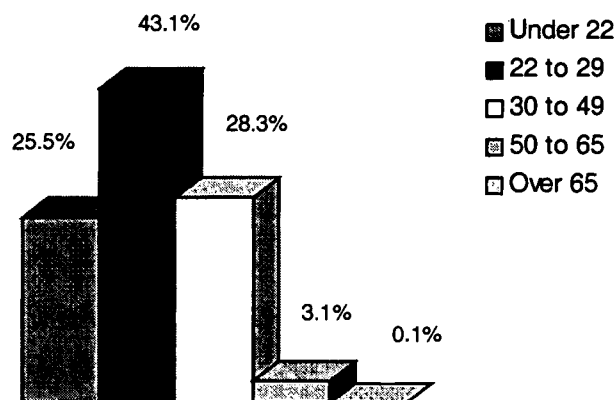
Age: The percentage of graduates under twenty-two years of age at the time of graduation remained almost constant. One-fourth (25.5%) of the 1998 graduates were under twenty-two, compared to 24.9% in 1997, as shown in Table I. The percentage of students graduating between the ages of twenty-two and twenty-nine (43.1%) also remained constant (43.1% in 1997).

1998 GRADUATES BY AGE

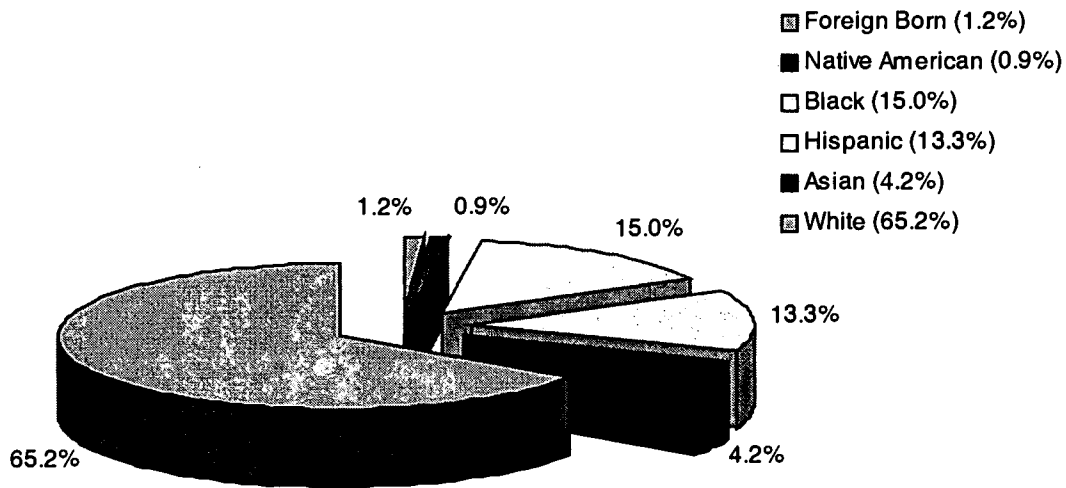


Ethnic Background: Approximately two-thirds of the graduates are white (65.2%), as shown in Table II. Close to one-sixth of the students are Black (15.0%), and over one-tenth are Hispanic (13.3%), a slight increase over the previous year. Pacific/Asian students constitute 4.2% of the graduating class. The percentage of graduates who are Native American or foreign born is negligible.

Degrees: Nearly half of the graduates (47.4%) graduated with an AAS degree, as shown in Table III. Another fifth (19.0%) received an AS degree, and over a fifth (25.6%) graduated with an AA degree. The smallest percentage (8.0%) graduated with a Certificate. These percentages have fluctuated little in the past five years.

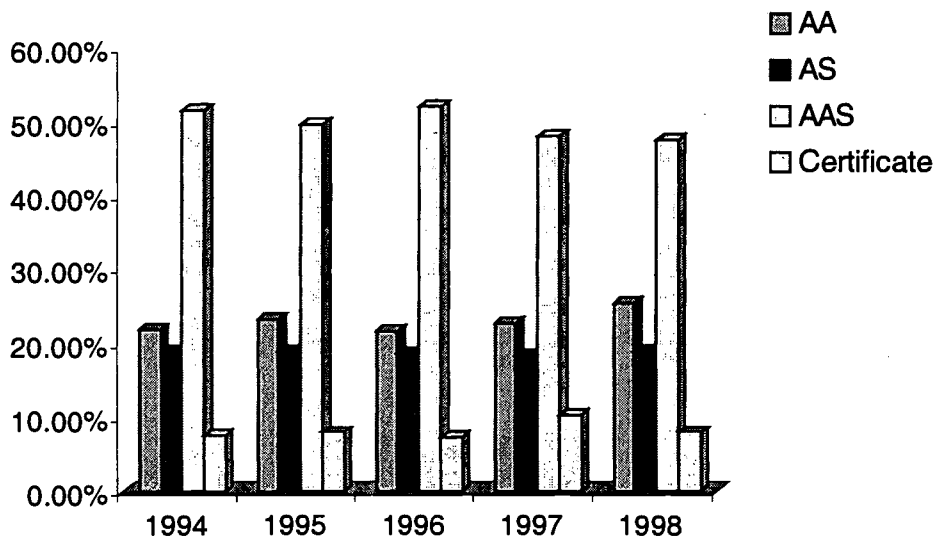
GPA: Over half of the graduates (53.7%) graduated with a GPA (grade point average) above 3.00, and 46.2% had a GPA between 2.00 and 2.99, as shown in Table III.

GRADUATES BY DEGREE: 1994-1998



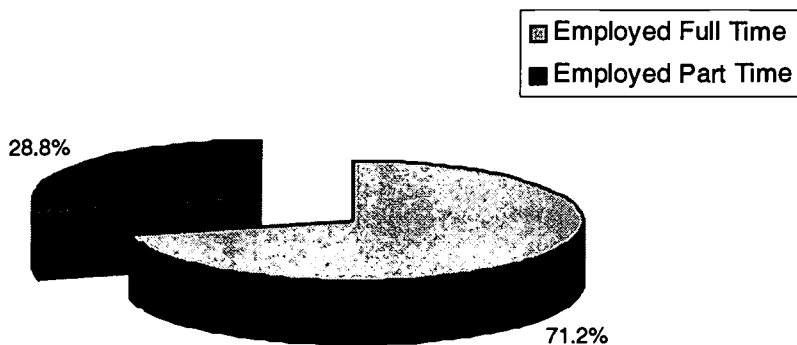
EMPLOYMENT STATUS

Class of 1998: Two-thirds (67.5%) of the 1998 graduates who responded reported being employed, as shown in Table IV. Of these employed respondents, well over two-thirds (71.2%) reported being employed full time.

Location of employment: Of the 146 respondents who reported the location of their full-time employment, over two-thirds (69.2% or 101 graduates) reported working in Westchester county. Another one-fourth (24.7% or 36 graduates) reported working in New York state, but outside Westchester county, bringing the total of those working in New York state to 93.9%. Another 6.2% or 9 graduates reported working outside the state.

Salary: The *mean salary (average)* for 1998 graduates employed full time in a new job was **\$29,755**. The *median salary* for the 1998 graduates employed full time was **\$30,000**. Over three-fifths of these graduates (61.3%) reported being either *very satisfied* (15.4%) or *somewhat satisfied* (45.9%) with their salary, as shown in Table V. Almost one-fifth (19.5%), however, reported being *somewhat dissatisfied*, and another 19.2% were *very dissatisfied*.

Job Satisfaction: Over four-fifths (81.1%) of the respondents (344) reported being either *very satisfied* (32.3%) or *somewhat satisfied* (48.8%) with their jobs, as shown in Table V. Over one-tenth (13.4%) of the respondents, however, reported being *somewhat dissatisfied* and another 5.5% reported being *very dissatisfied*.

Opportunity to Advance: Almost three-fourths (72.2%) of the respondents (349) were either *very satisfied* (32.7%) or *somewhat satisfied* (39.5%) with their *opportunity to advance*. However, close to one-third (27.8%) were either *somewhat dissatisfied* (18.3%) or *very dissatisfied* (9.5%), as shown in Table V.

WCC's Impact on Employment: Well over two-fifths (46.0%) of the 341 graduates who responded felt that finishing their degree had been important to getting their current job. Nearly two-fifths (39.2%) of those reporting employment also felt that their *specific program of study* was important to getting their current job.

Over two-fifths (41.8%) of the 354 graduates indicated that their current occupation was *highly related* to their program of study at WCC, and over one-fourth (27.7%) indicated that it was *slightly related*. Almost one-third (30.5%), however, stated their current job was *not related* to their program of study at WCC.

Three-fourths (75.2%) of the respondents felt that their WCC education prepared them for their current job either to a *great degree* (41.0%) or to a *slight degree* (35.8%). Almost one-fourth, however, (23.2%) responded that it had *not helped them at all*.

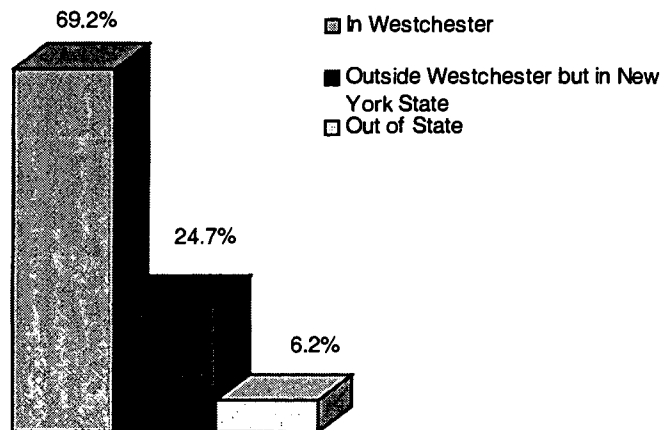
Class of 1998 Employment Status Compared to Previous Classes: When the respondents of the graduating class of 1998 are compared to the four previous graduating classes, a noticeable trend is the gradual increase in the mean beginning salary of employed graduates, going from \$27,071 in 1994 to \$29,755 in 1998, as shown in Table VI. The high 1996 mean salary of \$32,492 appears to have been an exception. The median salary has grown, as well, from \$25,000 for 1994 graduates to \$30,000 for 1998 graduates. The mean salary of the 1998 graduates (\$29,755) remained almost the same as the previous year (\$29,955). Since 1994, however, it has risen by almost \$3,000.

The percentage of respondents working in Westchester county continues to hover around two-thirds. Prior to 1995, however, this percentage exceeded seventy percent.

LOCATION OF EMPLOYMENT: 1998

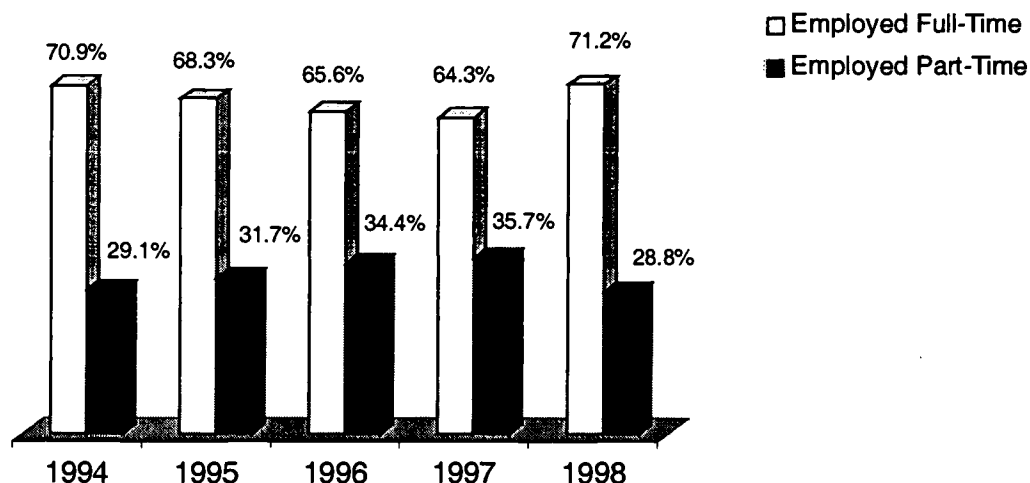


The Class of 1998 shows a slight decrease over last year in percentage employed. As shown in Table VII, 67.5% of the 1998 graduates reported being employed, compared to 70.5% in the previous year. The percentage of the 1998 graduates who reported working full-time, however, rose slightly from 64.3% in 1997 to 71.2% in 1998. The percentage employed part-time decreased from 35.7% to 28.8%, and the percentage still seeking employment also decreased slightly from 9.1% to 8.6%.

EDUCATION STATUS

Class of 1998: Nearly three-fifths of the respondents (58.4%) or 271 graduates reported attending a college, university, or training program, as shown in Table VIII. Moreover, three-fourths (74.9%) of these students reported attending full-time.

Demographic Characteristics of Those Attending College: Of the graduates who report continuing their education, 53.1% are female; 66.8% are white; over a tenth are Black (12.2%); and 14.4% are Hispanic, as shown in Table IX.

Similar to last year's class, a larger percentage of women (53.2%) than men (46.8%) are attending a four-year college full time. The majority of the graduates attending (57.9%) are under the age of twenty-two.

WCC's Contribution to Achieving Transfer: Based on the responses, the 1998 graduates consider WCC to have been very effective in assisting them to transfer. Of those respondents who indicated *transferring* was a goal, 94.2% reported that WCC was either *very effective* (69.6%) or *somewhat effective* (24.6%) in helping them to achieve their goal of transferring to a four-year institution. Only 5.7% felt that WCC was *not effective*. Almost one-fifth (18.1%) of the respondents indicated that transferring was not a goal.

When graduates were asked how well WCC prepared them for further study, nearly two-thirds (65.4%) indicated that they felt *well prepared*, and another 32.3% responded *somewhat prepared*. Only 2.3% responded that they felt *not at all prepared*.

A large percentage reported being in a field of study either *highly related* (59.6%) or *slightly related* (29.3%) to their program of study at WCC. Over one-tenth (11.1%), however, reported being in a field of study *not related or applicable* to their program of study at WCC.

Four-Year College's Contribution to Affecting Transfer: The 1998 respondents were asked to rate the most important factors affecting their decision to transfer to a four-year college. The three factors with the highest percentage of respondents rating them *very important* were: *Availability of Program* (72.4%), *Location and Cost* (68.7%), and *Reputation of College* (66.8%). The least important factor was *Recruitment by College* (22.6%), as shown in Table X.

Future Educational Goals: A slightly smaller percentage (78.9%) of the respondents who are continuing their education expect to earn a bachelor's degree at the completion of their studies, than in the two previous years, as shown in Table XI.

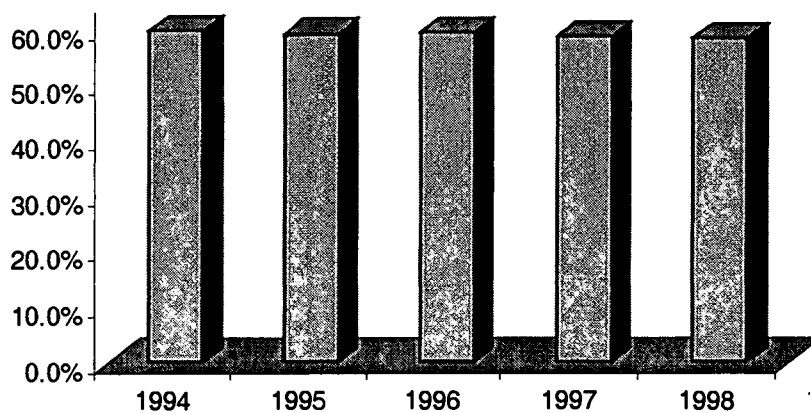
Of those respondents currently not attending college (193), three-fourths (74.6%) indicated that they do plan to continue their education in the future. One-fourth (25.4%), however, indicated that they had no plans at this time.

Class of 1998 Higher Education Status Compared to Previous Classes: A comparison of the 1998 graduates to the four previous classes with regard to continuing their education shows that the percentage who are continuing their education (58.4%) has stayed relatively constant. The percentage of those attending full time increased from 72.7% last year to 74.9% this year.

STUDENT EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC EXPERIENCES

Overall Evaluation: For the last five years, the graduates responding to this survey have given high marks in their overall evaluation of the College, the faculty, and the courses they took in their major, as shown in Table XII. A full 96% gave a *very satisfied* or *satisfied* response to their *Overall WCC Experience*. Ninety-five percent gave a *satisfied* or better response to the *Overall Quality of Instruction*, and 96% also were *satisfied* or *very satisfied* with *Courses Taken in their Major*.

Table XIII further breaks down the evaluations for the Class of 1998 into the more specific responses of *very satisfied*, *somewhat satisfied*, *somewhat dissatisfied*, and *very dissatisfied*. Well over two-thirds (69.1%) of the respondents gave a *very satisfied* response to their *Overall WCC Experience*. Two-thirds of the respondents also were *very satisfied* (66.7%) with the *Quality of Courses in their Major*.

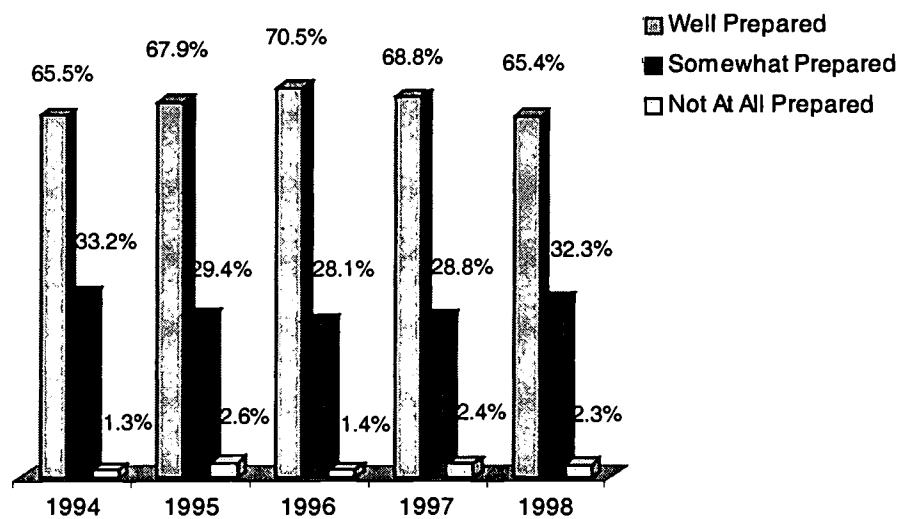
One aspect of the college experience with which the 1998 respondents did express substantial dissatisfaction concerned *Availability of Courses of Interest*. As shown in Table XIII, 10.5% indicated they were either *somewhat dissatisfied* or *very dissatisfied*.

Degree of Preparation for Further Study: Table XIV shows that, of the respondents who evaluated the extent to which WCC had prepared them for further study, nearly two-thirds (65.4%) felt they were *well prepared*.

EVALUATION OF COLLEGE SERVICES

In addition to evaluating the College academically, the graduates were asked to evaluate student services. Table XV is a breakdown of the results in descending order of the percentage who were *very satisfied*. Students who did not use the services were excluded in calculating percentages.

The evaluation by students of college service shows that the graduates were particularly positive about the library. It received the highest percentage of *very satisfied* responses (62.7%) and the highest combined *very satisfied* and *satisfied* percentage of 97.6%.

Computer Services (60.0%), Tutorial Services (58.0%), and Reading and Math Skills Facilities (55.7%) also received high percentages of *very satisfied* responses. Financial Aid services (10.4%) and Cafeteria Food Services (7.8%) received the largest percentages of *very dissatisfied* responses.

In terms of usage, the services most frequently used are Registration (91.6%), Library Services (89.4%), Access to Advisors and Admissions Services (84.9%). The least used services are Health Services (32.3%), Job/Career Services (47.0%), and Financial Aid (51.7%).

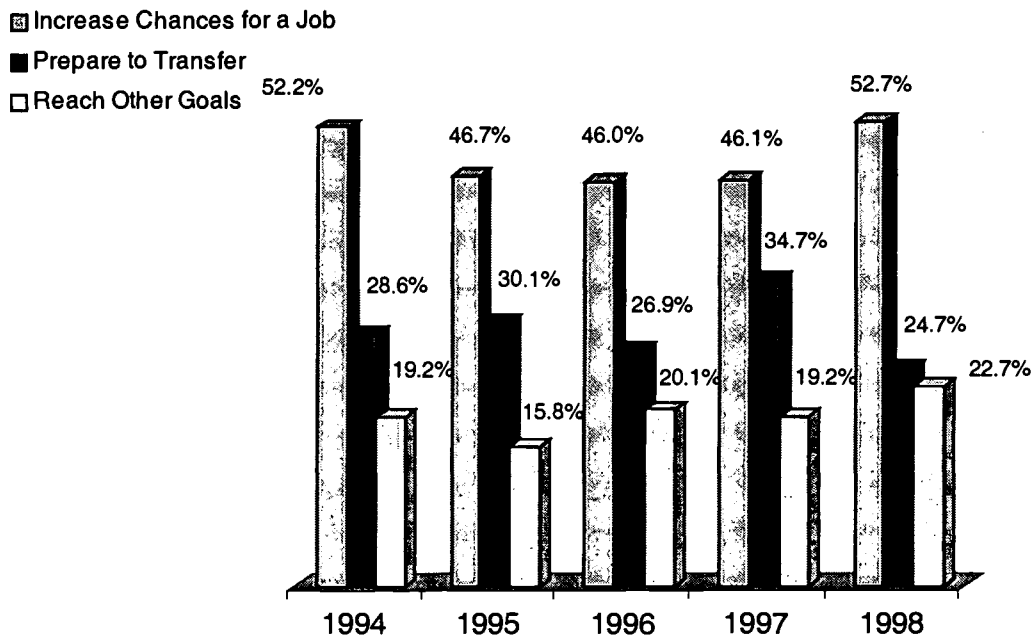
EFFECTIVENESS IN STUDENT GOAL ATTAINMENT

WCC graduates were asked what best describes their most important reason for earning a college degree. Table XVI shows that over one-half of the 1998 graduates (52.7%) selected *To Increase Their Chances of Job Placement or Advancement*. Almost one-fourth (24.7%), however, chose *To Prepare to Transfer to a Four-Year College*. Another 22.7% selected *To Reach Other Goals such as Self-Fulfillment*.

Transfer Goals: Table XVII shows that of the graduates who indicated that *Transferring to a Four-Year College* was a goal (75.2%), an exceptionally high percentage (94.2%) felt that WCC had been either *very effective* (69.6%) or *somewhat effective* (24.6%) in helping them achieve this goal.

These graduates also were asked how effective WCC had been in helping them to achieve their goal of *Meeting Professional or Graduate School Requirements*. Almost two-thirds (65.7%) identified this as a goal, and of those who did, over one-half (55.1%) felt WCC had been *very effective*, as shown in Table XVII.

Employment Goals: Table XVIII consists of six questions exploring the effectiveness of WCC in accomplishing the graduates' job-related goals. Taken collectively, over eighty percent of the respondents consistently indicated that WCC had been either *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in helping them to achieve these goals. This is very similar to the responses given by graduates in the previous year.

In terms of *very effective* responses, the highest marks were given to *Attaining Required Degree for a Job* (58.7%) and *Developing Idea of Career Goals* (50.1%). The lowest was given to *Developing a New Career* (45.3%).

The graduates also were asked to evaluate how effective WCC has been in helping them to reach goals in three other areas: (1) Academic Goals, (2) Personal Goals, and (3) Social/Cultural Goals. The following is a synopsis of the results in each area.

Academic Goals

Goal of Increased Knowledge: Table XIX shows that on each of the six questions exploring WCC's success in helping graduates to achieve *increased knowledge*, over eighty-five percent indicated that WCC had been *very effective* or *somewhat effective* in doing so, roughly the same as with previous graduating classes.

With regard to specific skills, almost one-half (48.5%) responded that the College had been *very effective* in developing *Oral Expression Skills*. Almost the same percentage (47.7%) felt WCC had been *very effective* in developing *Writing Skills*, and 44.8% felt that WCC had been *very effective* in *Improving Reading Skills*.

Personal Goals

Personal Growth: Over three-fourths of the students consistently considered *achieving personal growth* as a part of their reason for attending WCC. Of the eight sub-goals listed in Table XX, the largest percentage considered *Developing Interest in New Ideas* (94.2%), *Increasing Desire and Ability to Learn* (90.9%) and *Improving Self-Confidence* (90.5%) to be the most important.

Table XX also shows that *Developing a Sense of Responsibility* (59.7%), *Improving Self-Confidence* (58.6%), and *Developing Interest in New Ideas* (56.5%), were the three personal growth questions to which the respondents gave the highest percentage of *very effective* responses. *Improving Leadership Skills* and *Learning to Participate Effectively in a Community* both received the lowest percentage of *very effective* responses (22.8% each).

Social and Cultural Goals

A smaller percentage of graduates considered social and cultural goals to have been an important part of their reason for attending WCC. Approximately three-fourths (74.1%) considered *Increasing Appreciation of Art, Architecture, and other Visual Arts* to be a goal, as shown in Table XXI. The goal of *Involvement in Social Activities* was nearly the same (72.8%).

Nearly two-thirds (65.1%) considered *Increasing their Appreciation of the Theater* or their *Appreciation of Musical Performances* (62.5%) as a goal for attending. Another 55.2% considered *Involvement in Political Activities* to be a goal.

Of the graduates who included cultural and social enrichment as goals for attending WCC, more than one-fourth felt WCC had been *very effective* in helping to achieve their goals in *Appreciation of Art and Theater* and *Involvement in Social Activities*. The exceptions were in *Involvement in Political Activities* (19.5%) and *Appreciation of Musical Performance* (18.3%).
