

Conference on Information Technology Features Sophisticated Technology and **Self-Directed Learning**

the 1999 CIT will be held in Chicago, Illinois, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel on October 20-23. Moraine Valley Community College hosts this year's conference with support from City Colleges of Chicago, College of DuPage, and Oakton Community College. Because CIT focuses beyond technology per se to how information technology is used to improve all aspects of community college education—teaching and learning, student services, organizational management, partnerships—it attracts individuals serving in diverse college roles and has become a major event in community college education. The 1999 CIT promises a wide range of learning options

including hands-on computer labs, nearly 500 breakout sessions, and an exhibition of resources and services from over 100 corporate partners.

High Profile Speakers. The 1999 conference offers special sessions featuring key national leaders and keynotes by engaging speakers such as Judy Estrin, Chief Technology Officer, Cisco Systems, Inc.; Jorge Klor de Alva, President, University of Phoenix; Mark Milliron, Executive Director, Programs and Development, Oracle Education Initiatives; and Steven W. Gilbert, President, The Teaching, Learning, and Technology Group. All of these presentations are supported by

sophisticated technology, including accessibility, video Internet projection, multiplatform computing, and multimedia presentational software. Much of this state-of-the-art conference infrastructure is provided by the over 100 corporate partners slated to exhibit at this year's conference.

Program Tracks. More than 1,000 hundreds practitioners from community colleges throughout the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom, and around the world will offer their experience and ideas in forums and roundtables in seven program tracks: Applying Technology to Teaching and Learning; Distance and Asynchronous Learning; Innovations in Information Technology Infrastructures; Leadership, Technology. and Change; Student Services in the Information Age; Technology and Partnerships; and Vendor Solutions and Demonstrations.

League/PLATO on the Internet Developmental Research Project Update

he League and TRO Learning, the developer of computer-based PLATO products and services, are cosponsoring an exploratory research program on the successful integration of Internet-based instruction with local area networks and other college-based resources in developmental mathematics programs.

Participants in the *PLATO* on the *Internet* project met in June in New Orleans during the League's *Innovations 1999* conference and included representatives of **Delta** College, Eastfield College, Kapi'olani Community College, Kirkwood Community College, Moraine Valley Community College, Miami-Dade Community College District, Santa Fe Community College, Central Florida Community College, and Sinclair Community College.

Representatives viewed comprehensive math curriculum models and explored the system's instructional management functions. In addition to the hands-on-training, Delta College staff shared insights and "lessons learned" from their years of practical experience with PLATO curriculum and implementation in developmental courses.

A trial implementation session was conducted at most sites during the summer 1999 session, during which TRO Learning provided participating institutions with free access to *PLATO on the Internet* and technical support, with the League providing project leadership and support. Full implementation of *PLATO on the Internet* will take place during fall 1999, with students from each college completing their individualized programs by December 31, 1999. The League and TRO Learning will present preliminary study findings at the 1999 Conference on Information Technology. Final reports including student outcomes and other results from each site are scheduled to be disseminated by February 1, 2000, in a printed report titled, *Critical Success Factors for Internet-Based Learning in Developmental Mathematics*, as well as on the League and TRO Learning Web sites.

Alliance+ National Internet-in-Education Progress Report

his fall marks the second year of the five-year, \$9.3 million, U.S. Department of Education-funded Technology Innovation Challenge Grant to the League and its partners for the Alliance+ project. Alliance+ is designed to prepare teachers to integrate technology into the curriculum in innovative ways that enhance student learning and support higher levels of achievement. Faculty from Maricopa, Cuyahoga, and Miami-Dade Community Colleges participate in special institutes that prepare them to train mentor teachers from their corresponding local school districts. These mentor teachers, in turn, use project resources to provide training for colleagues in their home schools. Alliance+ will impact over 9,000 K-12 classroom teachers and over a quarter of a million students.

The Alliance+ Web site has been selected by the U.S. Department of Education's Eisenhower National Clearinghouse as one of its "Digital Dozen" outstanding math and science Internet Web sites. In addition, the Technology Museum of Innovation in San Jose, CA, has named the Web site as one of its "Tech 10" picks. The announcement noted that, "We think that your site is one of the 10 best technology and science Web sites we've found for middle-school and above students, teachers, and parents."

In addition, the project provided two training sessions for principals this summer in Miami and Cleveland, who commented that they found the training sessions to be eye-opening experiences that will cause them to follow up much more with their teachers.

Project leaders recently reviewed and discussed the teacher training curriculum with the teacher education department leaders at Florida International University, Florida International University, and Barry University. The department leaders determined the curriculum to be of great interest and discussed having all full-time faculty complete introductory sessions in the fall.

(Continued from page 1) engages conference participants in active and asynchronous learning. The most powerful active learning component of the conference is a series of ten computer labs called, "Hands-On Alley." Companies like Apple, CBT Systems, IBM, Lotus, PLATO/TRO Learning. Gateway, Microsoft, Macromedia, and Sun Microsystems provide hardware. software, and training that allow participants to "learn by doing." Hands-On Alley is designed for more selfdirected looks at some of the best technology available for community college instruction and administration. Another learning experience available at the conference is The Learning Center. The Learning Center offers courses to supplement the conference program through in-depth coverage of current topics in information technology provided by recognized leaders in the focus areas. These courses are conducted in an extended three-hour and full-day format and augment the conference by providing in-depth exposure to specific topics and linking conference attendees with a community of learners who share common interests. In addition to Hands-On Alley and The Learning Center, the conference features a 24-hour E-mail and Internet access lab.

"Best," "First," "Most," and "Only" on the National Scene

Monique Amerman, president, Mountain View College, was recently elected to serve on the board of the American Association of Community Colleges.

Paul Hunter, professor of thetoric in the English department of North Lake College, was selected as the first visiting fellow to Technical and Further Education (TAFE) colleges in Australia. Hunter, along with Tom Morton who teaches mortgage banking at North Lake College, delivered the keynote address at the annual conference of TAFE managers.

Miami-Dade Community College is the top associate degree producer in the country, according to U.S. Department of Education data reported in Community College Week's annual ranking of the "100 Top Associate Degree Producers." M-DCC led the nation with 5,533 degrees conferred in all disciplines, including ranking as #1 for associate degrees to minorities.

The comprehensive global education program at St. Louis Community College at Forest Park was selected to receive the 1999 International Intercultural Achievement Award from the American Council on International Intercultural Education. The award recognizes the English as a Second Language program for international students, international and intercultural presentations involving non-native students, and the Global Camp for area sixth-grade students.

Gina Kranitz, acting president of Paradise Valley Community College, has been elected incoming chair of the National Association of College and University Business Officers, marking the first time that a community college business officer has occupied this leadership chair.

Charles Zappia has become the first community college historian in the nation

elected to the four-person Professional Division of the 114-year-old American Historical Association. This San Diego Mesa College history professor was nominated based on his ongoing effort with the Organization of American Historians to elevate the community college teaching profession among all historians.

George Sehi, dean of engineering and industrial technologies at Sinclair Community College, has been selected to receive the 1999 American Society for Engineering Education's Frederick J. Berger National Award, one of the most prestigious awards that engineering technology educators can receive.

Out of more than 250 international submissions from college, university, and art institute students, 35 posters were selected for exhibition at the Association for Computing Machinery Special Interest Group on Computer Graphics conference. Twelve of the 35 winning posters were designed by Johnson County Community College students in the Communication Systems class taught by Stephanie Sabato, communication design instructor. JCCC students who designed these 12 posters are Jennifer Bailey, Mollie Reimer. Jennifer L. Combs. Daniel Ash. Susan Collins, Tara Lindsey, Jason Lytle, Angie Mahin, Karen Mountain, and Greg Welker. The exhibit curator said. "It is unprecendented for one school to have so many accepted works. The consistent quality of the entries from JCCC was outstanding."

J. William Wenrich, chancellor of the Dallas County Community College District, was named the 1999 winner of the National Council for Learning Resources' Administrative Leadership Award for his contribution to the support and development of library or learning resources programs in community colleges.

Patricia Bodell, director of the dance program at Scottsdale Community

College, is one of only seven in the U.S. and abroad to earn certification through the Dance Notation Bureau in New York to teach the subject.

Delta College's softball squad won the Fastpitch National Championship this summer. Team pitcher Sarah Smith, a first team All-America selection, was named the tourney's Most Valuable Player and set a tournament record with 35 strikeouts.

"Writing for Animation," the first workshop of its kind in Canada, was offered this summer by the Humber School for Writers, Humber College, and the School of Animation, Arts, and Design, Sheridan College. The workshop, taught by noted Emmy Award-winning writers and filmmakers was offered on Humber's North Campus.

Joann L. Ordinachev, president of the St. Louis Community College Board of Trustees, recently received the first Trustee of the Year Award from the American Association for Women in Community Colleges (AAWCC). She received this award based on her promotion of issues concerning women in community colleges; participation in AAWCC local, state, and national activities; and encouragement of institutional support of AAWCC.

The Hispanic Caucus of the American Association for Higher Education has named a leadership award in honor of Alfredo G. de los Santos Jr., vice chancellor of educational and student development for Maricopa Community Colleges. The Alfredo G. de los Santos Jr. Distinguished Leadership in Higher Education Award was created to recognize de los Santos as a leader, faculty member. mentor, and champion in higher education.



Linda Burns, Mary Helen Gennett, Cindy Johnston, and Bobby Sutton have been named as recipients of Central Piedmont Community College's Innovation of the Year award for a field-initiated study funded by the U.S. Department of Education. The study was designed to measure the effectiveness of using community networks and the Internet to provide basic skills instruction to adults needing a high school credential.

Cuyahoga Community College has selected "Students Meet the Artist, A Virtual Ensemble" as the Innovation of the Year. The program, managed by Phyllis Quail, Douglas Fox, and Robert Bryan, provides an opportunity for K-12 high school music students in three school districts to engage in interactive online distance learning.

Dallas County Community College District's Innovation of the Year award recognizes Brookhaven College's Nita Drescher for her creation of the research study, "The Effects of Attendance Monitoring and Student Services Intervention on the Retention of Developmental Reading and Writing Students." The study yielded statistical and anecdotal information about patterns of attendance and individual student's reasons for dropping courses.

The Innovation of the Year award has been presented to Elizabeth Dewey and Jane Speer of Delta College for enhancing the college's two-level peer mentoring and tutoring program. Over a four-year span Dewey and Speer have helped over 100 peer mentors, tutors, and leaders through training and certification efforts.

Mark Anderson received the Innovation of the Year award for the Foothill-DeAnza Community College District. Anderson developed the Commercial Music Vocational Program that incorporates MIDI (sound

manipulation) and recording arts (studio recording). He has written and revised 16 courses, secured funding for a record studio, and obtained a donation from the Dig Design Corporation for recording equipment.

Humber College of Applied Arts and Technology's Innovation of the Year, Part Models for Drafting Courses, developed by Slobodan Urdarevik, has given students the ability to transform three dimensional objects to two dimensional drawings and vice versa. Urdarevik noted that his students were having difficulty learning engineering graphics and introduced the teaching of mechanical drafting using innovative models of orthographic projection that he designed. Students using this method have developed a higher level of these essential skills as a result.

The Educational Technology Center Staff were selected as recipients

of the Innovation of the Year award at Johnson County Community College. They developed the Web-O-Matic Online Course which features suggested guidelines, sample learning activities, essential course elements, design and implementation tips, and an electronic list for discussing distance education trends and issues.

Kern Community College District has selected Paul Meyers, Matt Hightower, Lori Olivera, and Ronda Williams as the recipients of the Innovation of the Year award. The fourmember team created Cerro Coso Online that offered 48 courses and 100 selections to an unduplicated headcount of 2,000 students.

Kay Forest, Bonnie Cackoski, Ryan Shultz, Dixie Mercer, Ben Balvanz, and Randy Knight are the winners of Kirkwood Community College's Innovation of the Year award for the development and coordination of Kirkwood's Instructional Technology Institute. The Institute is a weeklong, hands-on technology workshop that provides faculty members an opportunity to move their classes from instructor-led lecture to instructor-as-facilitator by

introducing technology into the curriculum. Participants work as a cohesive unit on individual projects throughout the course. Instruction is offered on creating multimedia/computer generated material for classroom presentation and developing a World Wide Web presence to enhance classroom lectures.

Lane Community College has selected the Guided Studies Program as the Innovation of the Year (no photo available). The program is designed for students whose reading placement test scores indicate the need to strengthen academic skills before entering collegecourses and involves the collaboration of multiple units of the college—counseling, testing, advising, study skills, adult basic and secondary education, financial aid, as well as the support of academic and technical departments. Team members include: Mason Davis, Linda DeWitt, Phyllis Geyer, Edna Grass, Gail Hemsoth, Dan Hodges, Pat John, Cheryl Kempner, Ellen Lacey, Carolyn Litty, Carol Lynn Morse, Leigh Alice Petty, Elaine Pray, Leslie Rasor, Alice Whitenack, Tom Wiedeman, John Winquist, and Linda Wong.

Maricopa Community Colleges recognizes the Refugee Targeted Assistance Program directed by Ron Belisle, Marie Olsen, and Stanley J. Grossman as Innovation of the Year. The program is a partnership between two Maricopa Community Colleges campuses and three community agencies to smooth the transition for recently arrived refugees who have fled their homelands. The program provides assistance to refugees so they learn a new language, new skills, and the American work ethic.

Miami-Dade Community College's Innovation of the Year, the Odyssey Project, has been one of the most intense, broadly-applied projects the college has ever undertaken. The project, coordinated by the Odyssey Oversight Committee, involved replacing all of the college's software systems and converting 12 million student files to provide online application and registration.

Monroe Community College's Innovation of the Year, the Liberal Arts Advisor/Advisee Mentor Program developed by Kathy O'Shea and Holly Wynn, is a collaborative effort between student and academic services. The program provides an opportunity for

faculty and students to develop important ongoing connections in and out of the classroom. This effort was designed to encourage and support developmental advising, a process that encourages students to discuss academic concerns and conduct long-range planning prior to course selection.

Valley Community Moraine College's Innovation of the Year award recognizes the development of "Cutting Edge," a Web-board assisted program created by Sharon Potacki and Marlee Roth. The program provides students with the opportunity to learn online research techniques, teamwork within organization, e-mail communication, online conference protocols, and chat box experience in the realm of their everyday business homework assignments.

St. Louis Community College's Innovation of the Year award recognizes The Work Link Program, a collaborative program involving three principal partners, St. Louis Community College, Better Family Life, Inc., and the East-West Gateway Coordinating Council. The program is a component of the college's response to national and statewide welfare reform legislation and provides work

readiness training, job placement, and job retention support to chronically unemployed people. The program was the innovation of Malik Ahmed, Blair Forlaw, and Jack Quigley.

San Diego Community College District has selected the Continuing Education's New Media Center as Innovation of the Year. The program designed by Karen Owen is the response to the multimedia and information technology training needs of the community and local businesses by establishing short-term classes and certificates. As a result, the Multimedia Certificate is a model being adopted by colleges throughout the country.

Santa Fe Community College has selected the Open Campus Faculty and Staff Initiative as the Innovation of the Year. Participating faculty members revised their courses in order to build elements that would foster the creation of virtual learning communities and learned how to best use tools available to create academically rigorous yet student-friendly online course environments. Pew Grant Awarded to League

Recognizing the increasing importance of community colleges in the country's higher education system, The Pew Charitable Trusts have awarded a \$204,000 planning grant for a national project to establish new standards for the community college sector.

Earlier this year the League convened presidents from a dozen colleges to explore the prospects of identifying a common set of abilities and assessment strategies that would bring new standards to community colleges. They agreed to lead an effort to define which key abilities would form the core of their degrees and which performance standards they would use to award their certificates and degrees.

This grant supports the first phase of the project to be completed in April 2000 which will 1) develop a consensus among the selected community colleges about the focus and specifics of the necessary crosscutting abilities needed to function in the 21s century; 2) create an inventory of current practices in the participating colleges regarding teaching assessment of these skills; and 3) develop a national survey to provide baseline information about the extent to which performance-based standards have taken hold in community colleges. From these League data the will develop recommendations and a proposal for a more extensive project.

Microsoft Student Technology Winners Announced

Tohn Thomas Reed, a student at El Centro College, received the Microsoft Student Technology Champion Award, as announced at the Innovations 1999 conference in June in New Orleans. This award, created in 1998 by Microsoft Corporation in tribute to the League for Innovation's 30th anniversary,

provides a \$10,000 cash gift and copies of Microsoft software and will assist Reed in advancing his career in technology. In addition, Microsoft announced a special second place cash award of \$3,000, along with Microsoft software, presented to Benjamin Scott Kennedy, a student at Delta College. We congratulate the winners.

Final Tech-Prep Student Success Guidelines Issued

Guidelines for Building Student Success into Tech-Prep, the final report of a three-year grant from FIPSE, was published and distributed to all participants at the Innovations 1999 conference. The

guidelines were developed through site visits to exemplary tech-prep consortia in selected states throughout the country. C. Fran Holm, Santa Fe Community College, served as project coordinator.

Conference on Information Technology a Success

1999 Conference \he on Information Technology (CIT) held October 20-23 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Chicago brought together close to 4,000 participants to exchange ideas and experience how information technology is used to improve all aspects of community college education. A state-ofthe-art technical infrastructure included more than 600 fully networked computers, high-speed a Internet connection, and 10 hands-on computer labs, was in place largely due to the efforts of host Moraine Valley Community, College, conference chair Diane Grund: and many of the 100+ corporate partners that exhibited at the conference. More than 400 MVCC volunteers supported the conference, including the superb technical team of staff and students that designed and helped install the fiberoptic network now in permanent position at the Hyatt Hotel. One of the most popular spots at the conference was a wireless Internet and E-mail lab that was open to participants-24 hours a day.

The conference featured keynotes by engaging speakers such as Christine Hemrick, Cisco Systems, Inc.; Jorge Klor de Alva, University of Phoenix; Mark D. Milliron, Oracle-Corporation; and Steven W. Gilbert, The Teaching, Learning, and Technology Group. (Highlights of the keynote addresses are available via the League's Web site at www.league.org.) All presentations were supported by sophisticated technology, including Internet accessibility, video-data projection, multiplatform computing, and multimedia presentational software.

League partners such as Apple Computer, Cisco Systems, Compaq Computer Corporation, Dell Computer, Microsoft, Oracle, and SCT contributed in major ways to conference programming. In addition, partnerships were an integral part of the Sloan/League Asynchronous Learning Networks Summit; Teaching, Learning, and Technology Roundtable Learning Center courses; and keynote addresses, as well as Learning Center courses featuring the Microsoft Office User Specialist (MOUS) and World Association of Webmasters certification programs.

In addition to high-tech presentations, the 1999 CIT engaged participants in active and asynchronous learning. The most powerful learning component of the conference was a series of ten computer labs called Hands-On Alley. Companies such as Apple, CBT Systems, Datatel, Dell. IBM, Lotus, Microsoft, Macromedia, and Sun Microsystems provided hardware, software, and training that allowed participants to learn by doing with some of the best technology available for community college instruction and ádministration.

More than 650 conference attendees participated in Eearning Center courses that provided detailed exploration of high-interest subjects such as ToolBook II, E-commerce, Adobe Photoshop, teaching online, Web authoring, developing a virtual campus, and the roles of learning resource and chief information officers in community colleges.

In recognition of Terry O'Banion's contribution to community colleges and his retirement from the position of president and CEO of the League for Innovation, Microsoft announced establishment of the Terry O'Banion Student Technology Awards. The awards are to be presented annually to two deserving students dedicated to careers in technology. One of the two awards will be presented to a student with a career focus on software development.

The League released monograph on Web-based learning (see page 4) and findings from the 1999 Campus Computing Survey conducted by Kenneth C. Green, director of the Campus Computing Project. This year's study again indicates that the most pressing concerns facing colleges and universities revolve around the infusion of information technology into instruction and providing quality technology support services to faculty and staff. The 2000 CIT is scheduled November 15-18 in Anaheim and will be hosted by Foothill-De Anza Community College District and Coast Community College District.

League Awarded \$1.1 Million to Create Learning Colleges

he League for Innovation will direct a new \$1.1 million, three-year Learning College Project to assist ten community colleges intensify their efforts to become Learning Colleges. The ten participating community colleges will be selected on a competitive basis from the United States and Canada.

PBS Adult Learning Service will be a key partner in this project, assisting the League with the dissemination of project activities and results to community colleges. It is anticipated that other League corporate partners will also participate in the project.

Jerry Moskus, president of Lane Community College and 1999 chair of the League's board, observed that "the project could not be more timely. A Learning Revolution is spreading throughout higher education, and the League, through its Learning Initiative, has been laying the groundwork to help community colleges become more learning centered. With this new project, the League heightens its campaign to support community college participation in the Learning Revolution."

The project will begin in January 2000 when announcements inviting community colleges to apply for one of ten Vanguard College positions in the Learning College Project will be sent to all community colleges in the United States and Canada.

ACCI "What Do CEOs Want to Know About..." Survey Results

esults from the survey, "What Do CEOs Want to Know About E-Mail Communications Management?" were mailed recently to members of the Alliance for Community College Innovation. CEO respondents ranked e-mail as their second most common mode of business-related communication, following face-to-face communication. Most presidents said they spend up to 12 hours per week reading and responding to e-mail, and more than half reported that they use no organizing system for managing their e-mail.

Results from the survey, "What Do CEOs Want to Know About Their Physical Health?" were also recently mailed. Approximately 60 percent of ACCI presidents receive an annual executive physical checkup as a college benefit.

Half of the presidents sleep between five and six hours a night and the other half between seven and eight hours; none sleep longer. Twenty-one percent spend less than two hours a week



exercising while 31 percent spend five or more hours a week exercising. More than 40 percent of the CEOs cite exercise as their most successful strategy for managing stress, and over 50 percent choose walking as their major form of exercise.



2000 Conference on Information Technology Planning Underway

reliminary planning has begun on the 2000 CIT to be held in Anaheim, California, at the Anaheim Convention Center and the Hilton Anaheim and Towers, November 15-18. The Foothill-De Anza Community College District and the Coast Community College District will host this year's conference, led by Jon Ohberg and Ted Boehler, respectively. The 2000 CIT will once again provide a wide range of learning options including hands-on computer labs, general sessions featuring key national leaders and engaging speakers, approximately 1,000 breakout sessions, and an exhibition of resources and services from corporate partners. The 100-plus corporations slated to exhibit at this year's conference will provide much of the state-of-the-art conference infrastructure. As with last year's conference, the 2000 CIT will engage conference participants in active and asynchronous learning through a series of computer labs called "Hands-On Alley," designed to allow for more self-directed looks at some of the best technology available for community college instruction and administration. Another learning experience that will be available at the conference is the Learning Center, which provides courses to supplement the conference program through in-depth coverage of current topics in information technology provided by recognized leaders in the focus areas. In addition, the conference provides an Internet and E-Mail Lab that will be open to participants 24 hours a day.

A new feature for the Conference on Information Technology that will be available this year will be the opportunity for colleges with technology-related job vacancies to connect with individuals seeking technology-related employment. The primary goal of the 2000 CIT Job Fair will be to create an affordable way for employers to meet face-to-face with highly qualified candidates to fill vacant positions.

The study titled, *Critical Success Factors for Internet-Based Learning in Developmental Mathematics*, was designed to explore critical success factors for computer-based distance learning in developmental math programs during a summer trial implementation session and a full fall semester term.

Participants from League member colleges included: Delta College; Eastfield College; Kapi'olani Community College; Kirkwood Community College; Moraine Valley Community College; Miami-Dade Community College District; Santa Fe Community College; and Sinclair Community College.

The League and TRO presented the study findings at *Innovations 2000* via a CD-ROM, marking the first time the League has distributed information using this format. In addition, the League will publish a monograph, containing the CD-ROM, about student outcomes and other results from each site. Alliance+ Project in Year Three

veral accomplishments have been realized by the Alliance+ project in recent months. The project to prepare teachers in Cleveland, Phoenix, and Miami to integrate technology into the curriculum in innovative ways has entered into partnerships that have strengthened and expanded training and learning opportunities. Alliance+ is linked with E-Pals, an organization that arranges Webbased collaborative projects involving 60,000 teachers throughout the world; Schools Online, an organization that provides equipment to needy schools; and the Joyce Foundation, that is providing \$286,000 to strengthen the Alliance Cuyahoga Community program at College.

In addition, the project received special recognition in the October 29, 1999, issue of The Chronicle of Higher Education in an article titled, "A University (Stevens Institute of Technology) Offers On-Line Science Lesson for Middle-School Students Worldwide." The article highlights the project's International Boiling Point activities, which were also reviewed by Science NetLinks' Board of Reviewing Editors and are now featured as a recommended resource on a homepage for science educators created by the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

In an effort to promote the model and to find possible sites for replication, Alliance+ participants and League staff have made presentations at a variety of national conferences. League staff are meeting with administrators from various community colleges with interest in joining the project.

Production has started on a CD-ROM to be used for sharing the Alliance+ project model with schools and colleges interested in adopting the model, as well as for orienting new mentor and mentee teachers in the Savvy Cyber Teacher training program. The CD-ROM will capture classroom applications of Savvy Cyber Teacher training, testimonials from successful mentor/mentee teachers, and

National winners of both competitions will be selected by the judges in April and announced in the fall edition of *Innovator*. Catalogs of the winning works will be distributed in the fall.



12 Vanguard Learning Colleges Selected for Learning College Project


The League was delighted with the response to its latest program, the Learning College Project. Expecting 40 applications from community colleges wanting to be selected as one of the ten Vanguard Learning Colleges, the League received 94 applications. Because the number and quality of the applications was most impressive, the League has decided to fund two additional Vanguard Learning Colleges, increasing the number of project participants to 12.

The selected Vanguard Learning Colleges include Cascadia Community College (WA), Community College of Baltimore County (MD), Community College of Denver (CO), Humber College of Applied Arts and Technology (ON), Kirkwood Community College (IA), Lane Community College (OR), Madison Area Technical College (WI), Moraine Valley Community College (IL), Palomar College (CA), Richland

College (TX), Sinclair Community College (OH), and Valencia Community College (FL). These colleges will become incubators and catalysts as they share models and practices to transform community colleges into more learning-centered institutions. They will share innovative practices with educational institutions around the world.

The League has also expanded the project by inviting the 82 other applicants to join the project as Learning College Champions. Learning College Champions will participate in the project through connections to project activities in every appropriate way, including sharing publications, assessment tools, Web sites, and other resources at no cost to the colleges.

Teams from the 12 Vanguard Learning Colleges will meet for an Initial Seminar June 17-21 in Scottsdale, AZ. At the seminar, the teams will meet with a number of the Advisory Committee members and

Conference on Information Technology to Offer Range of Learning Options and Exciting Features

Preparations are under way for the 2000 CIT to be held in Anaheim, California, at the newly renovated Anaheim Convention Center, November 15-18. Cerritos College, Coast Community College District, Foothill-De Anza Community College District, North Orange County Community College District, and San Diego Community College District will cohost this 16th annual conference. In 2000, CIT will once again provide a wide range of learning options, including hands-on computer labs, hundreds of breakout sessions, an exhibition of resources and services from corporate partners, and key national spokespersons. Confirmed keynote speakers include Don Tapscott, chair, Alliance for Converging Technologies and author of Growing Up Digital; Bill Hill, Microsoft Chief E-Book Developer, and Kenneth C. Green, founder/director of The Campus Computing Project and visiting scholar at The Center for Educational Studies of Claremont Graduate University in Claremont, CA. A new feature for this year's conference will be a technology job fair that will provide the opportunity for colleges with technology-related vacancies to connect with individuals seeking technology-related employment. Eduardo J. Padrón, president of Miami-Dade Community College District, was named one of the "20th Century Presidents Who Have Influenced the Higher Education Landscape" by Black Issues in Higher Education magazine. The December issue honored "the bold presidents whose leadership helped shape 100 years."

Linda B. Rosenthal, 20-year member of the Maricopa Community Colleges' District Governing Board, has been awarded the prestigious Trustee of the Year Award by the American Association of Community Women in Colleges (AAWCC), for her consistent commitment to the mission of community colleges and to the principles of equity and equality espoused by AAWCC. "She is a role model for trustees everywhere," said the organization.

The San Diego Community College District has been selected by Microsoft as one of eight community college districts to receive a cash grant to develop and implement technology training programs that directly address the workforce needs of local communities. The colleges are known as the "Working Connections Class of 2002" and are part of a five-year, \$7 million philanthropic program aimed at helping disadvantaged people prepare for information technology jobs.

The Johnson County Community College (JCCC) Council of Directors chair team has received the annual leadership award from the Chair Academy. The team, Denny Kurogi, Clarissa Craig, Bill Osborn, Jonathan Bacon, and Joe Gadberry, was recognized for their significant contribution to the quality of the group process and the improvement of programs and practices at JCCC.

Central Piedmont, Cuyahoga, Dallas County, Delta, University of Hawai'i, Johnson County, Kirkwood, and Moraine Valley Community Colleges are among 40 two-year colleges in the nation to develop ACT, Inc.'s network of computerized testing and training centers that will use state-of-the-art technology to deliver services to businesses and individuals. The centers will offer training in adult literacy and employability skills, computer and information technology, industrial safety and technical skills, management leadership and small business operation, and professional and personal development, along with computerized education and career guidance programs, computer-delivered certification licensure tests for the trades and professions, and distance learning.

The Johnson County Community College Gallery of Art has been named one of 29 museums in the United States and abroad to receive gifts of contemporary artwork from the collection of Peter and Eileen Norton. The Nortons are donating nearly 1,000 pieces of art valued at more than \$2 million to museums, primarily to college and university art galleries outside the largest cities to bring works of younger artists to the attention of a broader public. The JCCC collection is called the "Year of Tibet Portfolio" because prints by the featured artists were part of a Tibetan relief benefit.

Richland College was honored at the Futures Assembly in Orlando with the Honor Roll: Best in Class for the 2000 PACESETTER award, sponsored by the University of Florida Insitute for Higher Education, Datatel, and the Continuous Quality Improvement Network. Richland received the award for having demonstrated significant commitment to continual improvement of learning opportunities for students and employees.

The American Society of Travel Agents and the Institute of Certified Travel Agents has selected the Travel and Tourism program at Sinclair Community College as its first approved national Travel Agent Proficiency test site. The test measures the entry-level knowledge of travel agent professionals and serves as a first step toward professional recognition.

Miami-Dade Community College (M-DCC) was nominated for the prestigious Computerworld Smithsonian Innovation Award for its work in helping develop and test the Florida Academic Counseling and Tracking for Students Network, which links the computer networks of the state's 28 community colleges and 10 universities via the Internet. M-DCC subsequently was selected to be the sole test site in the U.S. for SAGA Software. Inc.'s major new software product, Sagavista. The Computerworld Smithsonian Program brings together the leaders of 100 top IT companies worldwide to help document the Information Age.

National City Corporation and Cuyahoga Community College (CCC) have created a first of its kind in the nation public/private partnership to address future trends in technology and the regional labor market. The organizations will develop a series of technology super camps at all three CCC campuses this summer to train 350 students in computer technology. create a pipeline for job opportunities for students, use CCC's pioneering method of measuring both behavioral and technical competence to predict employee success and match it with corporate culture, and work with area high schools to prepare students for higher education and the techology job market.

County Community **John**son College (JCCC) was one of three colleges to win a 2000 American Council on International Intercultural Education Achievement Award for outstanding international education. JCCC recognized for its initiatives in three areas: student programs, including international service-learning projects, the intercultural semesters, and an international corps: educational partnerships with students and faculty in China, Russia, and the United Kingdom; and promotional materials in support of international programs.

eague for Innovation Alliance CEOs were recently surveyed about key Itrends in the community college field. Survey findings indicated that CEOs strongly believe that in the next three to five years options for learning will increase; information technology literacy will become a requirement in most academic programs; e-commerce expectations by students, employees, and community members will increase; faculty training in the use of information technology will be an essential part of staff development; legislators will call accountability: workforce training/development offerings will expand; developing and maintaining partnerships with local corporations will become even more essential; and aligning with K-12 and universities will be increasingly important.


