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ABSTRACT

This 8-page booklet is a survey instrument that was sent to randomly selected college and university senior administrators nationwide by the Higher Education Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention. The 29-item questionnaire is designed to learn more about alcohol and other drug prevention efforts taking place on college campuses. Information requested on school prevention efforts includes demographic data (school characteristics, number of undergraduate students enrolled, and location); alcohol and other drug (AOD) policies (how effective the AOD policies are in addressing each of 15 issues); AOD policy enforcement methods; AOD prevention programs and activities; and persons involved in AOD programs and activities (e.g. committees, task forces, students, faculty members, and community members).
