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ABSTRACT

The document comprises of the Tennessee Board of Regents' (TBR) third annual report card and a press release about the report card. The report card evaluates student learning, academic program, faculty productivity, and financial accountability. Each report card provides outcome data on 15 different performance indicators, which are compared to regional and national reports where data are available. Examples of indicators in the report card include the following: the percentage of TBR students who passed professional licensure exams on the first attempt; student employment within three months of graduation in jobs related to their degree; and a measurement of the quality of academic programs at TBR institutions (i.e., national accreditation and peer review results). Eighty-one percent of TBR undergraduate program evaluated by external review teams met at least 90% of the established standards. During the 9-month school year, each TBR university and 2-year college faculty member provides on average 475 hours of student instruction. On average, TBR spends about 75 cents on every dollar in academic and student related functions, compared to 62 percent nationally.

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## Tennessee Board of Regents Annual Report Card December 1999

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NASHVILLE - The Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) released this morning its third annual report card that reveals both successes and areas upon which its institutions can improve. The Tennessee Board of Regents system is the governing body for the six universities, 14 two-year institutions, and the twenty-six technology centers under the State University and Community College system of Tennessee.

"The report card shows a continued commitment to being responsive to the lay public and political and business leaders for more accountability in post-secondary education," said the Chancellor of the Tennessee Board of Regents, Charles E. Smith.

"With the debate over the need for an infusion of dollars into higher education, we believe that the report is responsive to the concerns of the public of how well we are doing with the resources we have. There are some areas that our institutions are indeed doing an excellent job with the resources provided. There are some areas that institutions can, with a little help from additional resources, provide an even higher level of quality expected by the public and the students the institutions serve. Resources needed to attract and retain the best faculty will result, I believe, in an improvement in overall student performance and in improving the already respectable percentage of students passing national licensure exams."

The report card accountability package includes a report card for the TBR system as a whole and a report card for each of the 46 campuses. Each report card provides outcome data on 15 different performance indicators which are compared to regional and national reports where data are available. The report card can also be found on the TBR's website under the Data and Statistics link at "[www.tbr.state.tn.us](http://www.tbr.state.tn.us)".

Examples of indicators in the report card include:

- the percentage of TBR students who passed professional licensure exams on the first attempt (i.e., over 8 out of every 10 university and community college students, and 96 of every 100 technology center students);

- more -

- how well TBR institutions prepare students for the job market - (i.e., 92 percent of the career program graduates of two-year institutions were employed within three months of graduation in jobs related to their degree and 86 percent of the technology center graduates were placed in related employment);
- the number of credentials awarded in 1998-99 school year - (i.e., close to 23,400 credentials were awarded in the system as a whole - the largest number of awards in TBR's 27 year history);
- a measurement of the quality of academic programs at TBR institutions (i.e., national accreditation and peer review results);
- the fees and tuition paid by students at TBR institutions (i.e., although fees for students attending universities and two-year institutions are still lower than the national average, the per cent of increase in fees during recent years has been at or above the national average increase);
- where TBR institutions place their resources (i.e., on average, TBR spends about 75 cents on every dollar in academic and student related functions compared to 62% nationally);
- the average amount of private giving at TBR institutions over the past five years;
- the number of students receiving financial aid (e.g., over 47% of all TBR students receive financial aid totaling over one-third of a billion dollars).

It is still too early to identify patterns over the three years that the report card has been released. For example, the graduation rate for the universities as a whole has increased by a percentage point over the past year, but more data in future years will be needed to see if this is a trend.

Some cautions should be noted when interpreting institutional data for each indicator. For example, graduation rates are based only on students graduating from public institutions. We are unable to track students transferring to and graduating from private institutions and out-of-state institutions. Before drawing conclusions, it is recommended that the individual campus be contacted.

- 85% of 2,629 university students and 88% of 1,779 two-year students who took exams for first professional license passed on the first attempt.
- 96% of 1,276 Tennessee Technology Center students who took exams for licensure passed on the first attempt.

- 86% of alumni surveyed after completion at a public four-year institution within six years of enrolling.

- Spends on average some 100 hours advising students and performing other assigned duties.

During the 9 month school year, each TBR university faculty:

- Conduct some \$34 million in externally funded research and perform some \$17 million in services to local communities and the state.

During the 12 month school year, each TTC faculty member:

- Provides on average 1,296 hours of student instruction;
- Spends on average 350 hours grading student work and preparing for classes.



Projected from 1998-99.


