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ABSTRACT

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This report provides various facts about Austin Community College (ACC) (Texas). It addresses general school information, budget and finance, credit programs, college credit student profile, credit degrees and awards, campus demographics, alternative credit and adult education, faculty and staff, and facilities and instructional sites. The college was established in December 1972 by voters of the Austin Independent School District. Presently, the college maintains six full-time campuses in addition to the Highland Business Center, which houses the administration offices and a business training center. ACC receives its funds from three primary sources of revenues: state funding, property taxes, and student tuition and fees. ACC's tuition is among the highest of any community college in Texas. Unlike state reimbursement, tuition and fee income may be spent for any college purpose, including retirement of revenue bonds which could be used for limited construction purposes. ACC's educational programs include workforce programs and academic/ transfer courses. The college offers 16 Associate of Arts programs and 12 Associate of Science programs. In fall 1998, 39.0% of the students were between 16 and 21 years of age and 36.3% were between 22 and 30. Contains numerous charts and tables. (JA)

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
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GENERAL INFORMATION



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Historical Profile

Austin Community College was established in December 1972 by voters of the Austin Independent School District. In the fall of 1973, ACC registered 2,363 students. Classes began on September 17, 1973. The AISD Board of Trustees served as ACC's Board of Trustees, and the College shared the district's boundaries.

In December 1978, ACC was fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) as a public, two-year community college. ACC's enrollment had increased to 13,481.

On March 1, 1982, the Board, following the guidelines of the Texas Education Code, established its own governing Board of Trustees, consisting of nine members. ACC received reaccreditation by SACS in 1983 and again in 1993.

With its purchase of the Austin Country Club in January 1983, ACC acquired its first real estate. Situated at 5712 East Riverside Drive, the property is now ACC's Riverside Campus. ACC's Board of Trustees held its first election in the spring of that year.

On November 5, 1985, 83 percent of the citizens of the Leander Independent School District voted to become part of the ACC district.

Following the passage of the 1985 Legislative Appropriations Bill, which stated, "It is the intent of the Legislature that all public junior colleges receiving state appropriations shall initiate procedures necessary to secure ad valorem revenues sufficient to supplement the funding of the district by August 31, 1987," ACC held a successful tax base election. The measure approved a maximum of 5 cents per \$100 assessed property valuation.

On November 3, 1998, 70 percent of Manor Independent School District citizens voted to join the ACC district.

Presently, the College maintains six full-time campuses in addition to the Highland Business Center, which houses the administration offices and a business training center. The campuses are Cypress Creek (1991), Eastview (1999), Northridge (1989), Pinnacle (1990), Rio Grande (1975) and Riverside (1984).

- Such other purposes as may be prescribed by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or local governing boards, in the best interest of postsecondary education in Texas

The Austin Community College Board of Trustees adopted this policy on February 13, 1973, and amended it on March 4, 1974, September 2, 1975, January 18, 1982, September 24, 1984, and February 3, 1997.

Hunter Ellinger was elected to the Board of Trustees in 1992 and currently serves as Secretary of the Board. Mr. Ellinger is chief scientist at Scientific Measurement Systems, a public company that supplies industrial computer equipment and services. He is experienced in financial planning and reporting from many years of work with non-profit community groups and businesses. His 40-plus years in Austin include involvement in progressive politics as early as the civil rights movement. He also served in the Peace Corps and worked on the technical staff in the UT-Austin Physics Department.

Dr. John Worley - (2000)

Dr. John Worley was elected to the Board of Trustees in 1994. Dr. Worley, who earned his law degree from UT-Austin, also holds a Ph.D. in philosophy. He has taught at UT-Austin, Texas Technological University, San Antonio College, and ACC. He has extensive experience in trial court and appellate litigation in state and federal court and currently is an assistant attorney general for the state of Texas. Dr. Worley also serves on the board of the Austin Area Urban League.

Allen Kaplan - (2000)

Allen Kaplan was elected to the Board of Trustees in 1994 and currently serves as Vice-Chair of the Board. A public and community affairs consultant, Mr. Kaplan has more than 25 years experience working with government agencies and officials at all levels. He represents various development interests with a concentration on downtown and master planned developments. A principal in Austin Analysis, a public policy news and research company, Mr. Kaplan has served on numerous community and professional boards including Capital Metro and the Downtown Austin Alliance. He received his BA in Political Science from Brooklyn College.



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Austin Community College Service Area Demographic Projections





Education and General Fund Fiscal Year 1999





Review of Austin Community College Revenue and Expenditures

Austin Community College receives its funds from three primary sources of revenue: state funding, property taxes, and student tuition and fees. Federal grants account for a small percentage of revenue, and those funds can only be used for specific purposes as spelled out in the grant guidelines. Approximately one half of College funds come from state reimbursement based on the contact hours generated by the College.

Tuition and fees are set by the local governing board. ACC's tuition is among the highest of any community college in Texas. Unlike state reimbursement, tuition and fee income may be spent for any College purpose, including retirement of revenue bonds, which could be used for limited construction purposes.

The College budgets according to these categories:

- General Administration and Student Services—government of the institution; executive direction and control; business and fiscal management; admissions and registration; other student services, including counseling, placement services, and student financial aid.
- General Institutional Expense—expenses of a general nature that benefit the entire institution and are not related solely to any specific program or division (cost of catalogs, bulletins, convocations, lectures, etc.).
- Staff Benefits--costs toward benefit programs for employees, such as insurance programs, workers compensation, and unemployment compensation.
- Resident Instruction--these are two classifications: General Academic Courses and Vocational-Technical Courses; cost include faculty salaries, departmental operating expenses, instructional administration, salaries, wages, supplies, travel, equipment, and operating expenses.
- Learning Resource Services--costs for salaries, wages, other operating costs, books, periodicals, binding costs and equipment of separately organized libraries.
- Extension and Public Service--all costs of activities designed to serve the general public to include community service programs, instructional salaries and wages, supplies, equipment and departmental operating expenses.
- Physical Plant Maintenance and Operations--cost of operating expenses to carry out the
 duties of physical plant administration, planning and general services must be funded from
 local funds; includes salaries and wages, custodial and maintenance personnel, cost of
 utilities, cost of supplies and equipment for custodial and maintenance personnel, minor
 repairs and renovations, parking areas and security.

- Special Items--cost of items not included in any other elements such as reserve accounts, contact hour adjustments, tuition shortfall, and reserve for contingency, retirement of Bond Debt.
- Major Repairs and Rehabilitation of Buildings--expenses to provide major repairs, rehabilitation, and renovations of existing buildings and facilities: includes salaries, wages and costs materials for such items.





Contact Hours by Area Fall 1998








Fall Credit Student Headcount 1973 - 1998





Student Characteristics Headcount by Gender Fall 1998





Student Characteristics Headcount by Day/Evening Classification Fall 1998














Alternative Credit



Adult Education

Austin Community College has served as the prime sponsor of the Adult Education Program of Travis County Co-op since September 1973. The program is funded annually and evaluated by the Texas Education Agency (TEA). The federal portion of the funding is provided by the U.S. Department of Education through TEA. The state portion of the funding is provided by the State of Texas. Local funding is also provided by Austin Community College. A coordinating committee, comprised of public school superintendents and their representatives, human service agency representatives, members of the business community, and student representatives, serves as an advisory committee in accordance with TEA guidelines.

Programs

The Adult Education Program includes the following components.

- 1. Adult Basic Education (ABE) programs for the adult whose reading, writing, and arithmetic skills are below the ninth-grade level. These classes, which consist of both self-paced and group instruction, are also part of the entry component of adult secondary or GED preparation.
- General Education Development (GED) classes are for the adult whose high school education was interrupted. These classes cover five areas: writing, social studies, science, reading, and math. GED classes are designed to assist students to prepare for the GED Test and offer life and job readiness skills.
- 3. English-as-a-Second Language (ESL) classes are for the adult who wants to speak and write English.

The following programs are specially funded through adult education and are designed for special populations.


- 1. *The Homeless Program* is for persons who have been displaced without shelter and in need of social and education services.
- The Adult Basic Education program at Austin Community College provides adult education to TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) CHOICES recipients referred by the Texas Workforce Commission.
- 3. The Adult Education for Correctional Institutions program provides adult basic education and GED preparation classes for inmates of city and county correctional facilities.






Number of Personnel by Classification 1983 - 1998




Number of Credit Teaching Faculty Fall 1994 - 1998





Full-time Faculty by Dean Area Fall 1998







GLOSSARY (



ADMINISTRATIVE PERSONNEL includes staffing table employees that can not receive overtime, are paid on a monthly basis, and are considered upper-management.

ADJUNCT FACULTY includes those instructors in college credit and certificate programs, who are appointed on a course-by-course basis, for a term not to exceed one semester per contract period.

ALTERNATIVE CREDIT courses are non-college credit courses (Continuing Education and Professional Development and Training) awarded with a certificate.

ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE DEGREE (AAS) is awarded to students who complete a two-year program of technical-vocational work.

ASSOCIATE OF ARTS DEGREE (AA) is awarded to students who complete a two-year program to transfer to a Bachelor of Arts degree.

ASSOCIATE OF SCIENCE (AS) is awarded to students who complete a two-year program to transfer to a Bachelor of Science degree.

CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS are awarded to students who complete a specified course or program of less than two years.

CERTIFIED DATA is verified by ACC as an accurate reflection of student, course and/or faculty information and is reported to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL includes staffing table employees that can receive overtime and are paid on a bi-weekly basis.

COLLEGE CREDIT COURSES are courses for which college credits can be earned that apply toward a community college degree and that may be transferred to other institutions of higher education. All college credit courses are approved by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

CONTACT HOURS is an instructional hour in which a student has contact with an instructor; this includes both lecture and laboratory hours.

CBM REPORTS are Coordinating Board Management reports that are mandatorily submitted to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board in order to get state reimbursement for ACC.

DAY AND EVENING STUDENTS are students enrolled in courses that begin both before and after 5:30 p.m.

DAY ONLY STUDENTS are students enrolled in courses that begin before 5:30 p.m.

DUPLICATED ENROLLMENT occurs when a person is counted more than one time; for instance, a student who attends several courses at one campus and one or more courses at a second campus is counted twice, once at each campus.

EVENING ONLY STUDENTS are those students enrolled only in courses that begin after 5:30 p.m.



FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT is total semester semester hours divided by 12, which is considered to be a full-time course load.

FULL-TIME FACULTY includes instructors in college credit and certificate programs as well as counselors and librarians who are employed by the college and are included in the staffing table.

A **FULL-TIME STUDENT** is a college credit student who is enrolled in 12 or more semester credit hours in the fall or spring semesters.

GRANT POSITION includes college employees whose salaries are funded by government or private agency grants and contracts.

HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT is the total number of persons enrolled.

LEARNING RESOURCE SERVICES (LRS) comprises three divisions: Learning Resource Centers (libraries), Media Services, and Computer Based Instruction. The LRS operates Learning Resource Centers at all campuses and many evening site operations.

PART-TIME STUDENT is a student who is enrolled for less than 12 semester credit hours in a fall or spring semester.

PROFESSIONAL/TECHNICAL PERSONNEL includes staffing table employees that can not receive overtime and are paid on a monthly basis.

STAFFING TABLE includes non-grant employees who are eligible for benefits and accrue leave.

THECB, Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, is a statutory 18-member board appointed by the Governor. It is responsible for statewide planning and policy-making to assure quality and efficiency in Texas higher education. The Board's primary areas of responsibility are financial planning, senior colleges and universities, community colleges and continuing education, health affairs, student services, and campus planning.
