



The Ohio Association of Private College Admission Counselors believe in the dignity, worth, and potential of all human beings and work to eliminate any type of bias from the college admission and financial aid processes.

We believe in the importance of ethical practices in the admission and financial aid processes by all post-secondary institutions. We endorse the basic philosophy of the National Association of College Admission Counselors (NACAC), their Code of Ethics, and their Statement of Principles of Good Practice.

Be it resolved, therefore, that all Ohio colleges and universities not require candidates for admission and financial aid to indicate the order of their college or university preferences, except under early decision plans.

Be it resolved, therefore, that candidates for admission and financial aid be permitted to choose without financial penalty among offers of admission and financial aid until they have heard from all colleges and universities to which they have applied, or until May 1, whichever is earlier.

Be it resolved, therefore, that all Ohio colleges and universities state clearly in their letter of acceptance to full-time candidates for admission that they subscribe to the NACAC Statement of Students' Rights and Responsibilities, and to the NACAC Statement of Principles of Good Practice.






Degrees Awarded by Private Colleges, 1998–99







When comparing the tuitions of different colleges and universities, a student may hesitate to apply to an institution of his/her choice for fear of not being able to afford its price. As students consider a college education, they should keep in mind the following points.

--

WHY THERE IS A DIFFERENCE IN PRICE BETWEEN PUBLIC AND PRIVATE COLLEGES

The cost of providing a higher education is generally the same at independent colleges and universities as at public universities. For example, both types of institutions incur costs associated with building and maintaining classrooms, residence halls, computer facilities, and libraries; paying faculty salaries; and providing career and counseling services. However, private institutions charge a higher price, or tuition, because they are not subsidized by the state.

APPLY TO COLLEGES THAT BEST FIT PERSONAL NEEDS - REGARDLESS OF PRICE

The ability to pay for a college education is likely to be an important factor in selecting a college or university. However, the price of a particular institution should not prevent a student from applying to the school of his/her choice. A student should apply to a college that best suits his/her academic, social and personal needs, regardless of the price, because financial aid can make it more affordable for a student to attend.

A VARIETY OF FINANCIAL AID IS AVAILABLE

College financial aid programs assist families in meeting the costs of education that exist beyond their demonstrated ability to pay. Institutional need-based and non-need-based (scholarship, merit, athletic, leadership awards, etc.) financial aid, combined with any state and federal scholarships, grants, loans and work study programs, comprise a financial aid package and help defray the costs of attending college. The college will try to make every effort to compile a suitable financial aid package for the student and family so that the price of a college education does not become an overriding factor in choosing a desired institution.

COMPLETE THE FAFSA

Ohio's private colleges and universities require prospective students to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). In order to qualify for some state and federal grant and loan programs, students should complete the FAFSA as soon after January 1 as possible. Forms can be obtained by contacting a college financial aid office, or it can be completed on-line at http://www.fafsa.ed.gov. Some colleges and universities also require a supplemental or institutional financial aid form. Students should contact the college financial aid office to learn which financial aid forms are required and the deadlines for submission.




SAMPLE FINANCIAL AID PACKAGES



OHIO FINANCIAL AID PROGRAMS

The following financial aid programs are administered by the Ohio Board of Regents State Grants and Scholarships Department. Call toll free at 1-888-833-1133 for more information about these programs.

OHIO STUDENT CHOICE GRANT PROGRAM

The Ohio Student Choice Grant provides financial assistance to full-time students enrolled in baccalaureate programs at Ohio private nonprofit colleges and universities. Recipients must be Ohio residents. Eligibility for the Student Choice Grant is not based on need or academic merit. The amount of the Student Choice Grant for the 2000-2001 academic year is \$1,062. No application is required. Students should contact the private college financial aid office for more information.

OHIO INSTRUCTIONAL GRANT (OIG) PROGRAM

The OIG is need-based aid for full-time undergraduate students who meet family income eligibility requirements. Recipients must be Ohio residents. Award amounts are based on family income, number of dependents in the family, and the type of Ohio college or university attending. The maximum award for the 2000-2001 academic year is \$4,872. Students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

PART-TIME STUDENT INSTRUCTIONAL GRANT PROGRAM

This program is need-based aid for Ohio residents who are enrolled part time in undergraduate programs at eligible Ohio public and private colleges and universities. Institutions select the recipients and determine the amount of each award within guidelines established by the Ohio Board of Regents. Contact the college financial aid office for more information.

OHIO ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Ohio Academic Scholarship is a competitive, merit-based scholarship for outstanding high school students who enroll as full-time undergraduates in Ohio colleges. Each year, an Ohio Academic Scholarship is awarded to at least one student from each chartered high school in Ohio. Eligibility is determined by a selection formula which considers high school grade-point average and ACT scores. The scholarship amount is \$2,000 each year for up to four years of study. Complete an application through the high school guidance office.

OHIO SAFETY OFFICERS COLLEGE MEMORIAL FUND

This program provides tuition assistance to the children and spouses of Ohio peace officers, fire fighters and certain other safety officers who are killed in the line of duty. Recipients may enroll for full- or part-time study at any participating Ohio post-secondary institution. Interested students should contact a college financial aid office or the Ohio Board of Regents/State Grants and Scholarships Department.

OHIO WAR ORPHANS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Ohio War Orphans Scholarship is tuition assistance for children of deceased or severely disabled Ohio veterans who served in the armed forces during a period of declared war or conflict. A student must be enrolled for full-time undergraduate study at an eligible Ohio college or university and be an Ohio resident under the age of 21. Applications are available from the Ohio Board Regents/State Grants and Scholarships Department, high school guidance offices, veterans services offices, and college financial aid offices. The application deadline is July 1.



OHIO 12TH GRADE PROFICIENCY TEST SCHOLARSHIP


This is a one-time \$500 scholarship to Ohio high school seniors who pass all five sections of the 12th Grade Proficiency Tests. Students can use the scholarship for any educational expense at an Ohio institution of higher education. Eligible students will receive a voucher to take to the colleges/universities in which they are enrolling.

NURSE EDUCATION ASSISTANCE LOAN PROGRAM (NEALP)

The NEALP provides need-based aid to Ohio students enrolled at least half time in an approved Ohio nurse education program. The maximum award is \$3,000 per year for up to four years of study. If the recipient conducts clinical practice in Ohio upon graduation, he/she may be eligible for a loan cancellation rate of 20% per year. The NEALP application deadline is June 1. Applications are available from the Ohio Board of Regents/State Grants and Scholarships Department, high school guidance counselors or colleges.

ROBERT C. BYRD HONORS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

This program awards scholarships to students who demonstrate outstanding academic achievement in high school. Recipients are selected on the basis of class rank, high school grades, test scores and participation in leadership activities. At least one scholarship is awarded in each of Ohio's congressional districts. Scholarships are renewable for up to four years. Applications are available from high school guidance counselors; applications should be completed during the senior year of high school, prior to the second Friday in March.

OTHER FINANCIAL AID OPPORTUNITIES

OHIO SUPPLEMENTAL STUDENT LOAN

This loan is available to any credit-worthy student, parent or other individual wishing to assist a student who is attending an eligible Ohio school, or to an Ohio resident attending an eligible out-of-state school. An individual can borrow up to the cost of education, not to exceed \$45,000 for undergraduate study. The program offers low interest rates with a choice of fixed or variable rate, in-school deferments, and flexible repayment options. A loan application can be completed at a participating bank. For more information, contact Student Loan Funding at 1-800-930-SSLF (for students), or 1-800-677-SLFC (for counselors).

JUMP START STAFFORD LOAN

The Jump Start Stafford Loan is a federally guaranteed student loan offering eligible students an interest rate reduction of up to 1.5% off the federal rate, immediately when the loan enters repayment. Students attending Ohio schools and Ohio residents attending out-of-state schools are eligible to receive the Jump Start interest rate reductions. These reductions include a 1.25% rate reduction for making on-time monthly payments and an additional .25% interest rate reduction for having loan payments automatically deducted from the borrower's checking account every month. OTTA COLLEGE SAVINGS PROGRAMS

The Ohio Tuition Trust Authority (OTTA) is a state agency created by the Ohio General Assembly in 1989 to promote savings for higher education. The Tuition Trust currently offers the Ohio Prepaid Tuition Program. Starting fall 2000, the Tuition Trust will offer three additional college savings funds, for a total of four college savings options. The four funds are: 1) the current prepaid tuition credit plan; 2) age-based funds with investments weighted more towards equities during a child's younger years and gradually becoming more conservative as the child approaches college age; 3) a balanced fund with investments more equally weighted in both equities and fixed income, and 4) a growth fund with investments primarily in equities. Families can choose to participate in all four funds. Investments may be applied at any accredited college or university. Call 1-800-AFFORD-IT for more information, or visit OTTA's web site at www.ohiocollegesavings.org.

Additionally, beginning January 1, 2000, individuals may deduct on their Ohio income tax returns contributions made to any of the four savings programs. Up to \$2,000 per year, per child, may be deducted. Contributions above \$2,000 may be carried forward to future years until fully deducted.

OHIO NATIONAL GUARD SCHOLARSHIP

Ohio residents who enlist with the Ohio Army or Air National Guard and meet eligibility criteria may qualify for this program. The scholarship will help pay up to 100% of tuition at an Ohio college or university and is in addition to GI Bill benefits. Contact the Ohio Army National Guard at 1-888-644-8273, or the Ohio Air National Guard at 1-800-708-4068.

ROTC SCHOLARSHIP

These are competitive scholarships offered by the U.S. armed forces. The scholarship amount varies, but can cover full college tuition plus a monthly allowance. Students should apply as soon as possible before December 1 of their senior year. Contact the headquarters of the armed forces for more information: Air Force 1-800-423-USAF; Army 1-800-USA ROTC; Navy 1-800-USA NAVY.



FEDERAL FINANCIAL AID PROGRAMS

To determine your eligibility for the following federal student aid programs, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA); be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen; have a valid Social Security Number; have financial need (except for some loan programs); have a high school diploma or GED; be at least a half-time student; demonstrate satisfactory academic progress; register with the selective service, if required; sign a statement of educational purpose and a certification statement on overpayment and default (both found on the FAFSA). For more information about these federal programs, or to receive a free copy of *The Student Guide*, a financial aid guidebook published by the U.S. Department of Education, call the Department of Education's toll free student information hotline at 1-800-4 FED-AID.

FEDERAL PELL GRANT

The amount of this need-based award depends on an undergraduate student's Expected Family Contribution (EFC), cost of attendance, and whether the student is attending full or part time. The maximum Pell Grant for the 2000-2001 academic year is \$3,300.

FEDERAL SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATION OPPORTUNITY GRANT

The FSEOG is for undergraduates with exceptional financial need who also receive the Pell Grant. The grant may be up to \$4,000 depending on when the student applies and the level of financial need.

FEDERAL WORK STUDY PROGRAM

This program provides jobs for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need. It encourages community service work and work related to a student's course of study. The salary is at least the current federal minimum wage.

FEDERAL PERKINS LOAN

The Perkins Loan is a low-interest (5 percent) loan for undergraduate and graduate students with exceptional financial need. The loan is made with government and institutional funds. The college or university is the lender, and the loan is repaid to the institution. An undergraduate may borrow up to \$4,000 a year.

FEDERAL UNSUBSIDIZED/SUBSIDIZED STAFFORD LOAN

To receive a **Federal Subsidized Stafford Loan**, the student must have financial need. Under this program, the federal government pays the interest on the loan during the time the student is attending school and during the six-month grace period following graduation. Under the **Unsubsidized Stafford Loan** program, the student is responsible for paying the interest accrued on the loan. The student may pay the interest as it comes due, or defer payment of the interest, which will be capitalized, until graduation. Under the Federal Stafford Loan program, a dependent student may withdraw up to \$2,625 for his/her first year of study. Both loans have a variable interest rate not exceed 8.25 percent. Complete a loan application through a participating student loan lending institution; some banks participating in the program can be found throughout this guide. If the college or university participates in the Federal Direct Lending program, a bank loan application is not necessary.

FEDERAL PARENT LOAN FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS (PLUS)

The PLUS loan is a financial aid resource available to all families regardless of their income. The loan is made directly to the parents and permits them to borrow up to the cost of attendance minus any financial aid received. The interest rate is not to exceed 9 percent. Repayment usually begins within 60 days after receipt of the funds. Contact a lending institution for an application.

FEDERAL TAX BREAKS FOR EDUCATION

Contact the Internal Revenue Service at 1-800-TAX-FORM to receive a copy of Publication 970 (February 1998), Tax Benefits for Higher Education, which explains the following benefits and rules in detail.

Tuition and fees paid with tax-free grants, scholarships, and employer education assistance are not eligible for either of the following two tax credits; expenses paid with loans are eligible. The credits are reduced for joint filers with an adjusted gross income (AGI) above \$80,000 and for single filers who have an AGI of more than \$40,000. The credits are completely phased out when incomes reach \$100,000 for married couples and \$50,000 for individuals.

HOPE SCHOLARSHIP TAX CREDIT

Parents of dependent students, or independent students, may claim a tax credit equal to 100% of the first \$1,000 of tuition and fees (less grants, scholarships, and tax-free tuition benefits) paid and 50% of the second \$1,000 paid in tuition and fees. The maximum credit of \$1,500 will increase for inflation after 2001. The credit is available only for the first two years of college and the student must be enrolled at least half time. A taxpayer may claim this credit for each student meeting the qualifications.

LIFETIME LEARNING TAX CREDIT

This credit applies to tuition and fees paid for undergraduate, graduate, and continuing education classes. A family may claim a tax credit of 20% for the first \$5,000 in tuition and fees (less grants, scholarships, and tax-free tuition benefits). By 2003, the amount of eligible educational expenses will increase to \$10,000, resulting in a maximum tax credit of \$2,000. This credit is available on a tax return basis, regardless of the number of students enrolled in post-secondary course work. The tax filer may not claim both the Hope Scholarship Tax Credit and Lifetime Learning Tax Credit during the same academic year for the same student.

INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNTS (IRAs)

Education IRA - Taxpayers may invest, after taxes, up to \$500 per year per child under the age of 18 into an Education IRA. Earnings accumulate tax free and no taxes will be due upon withdrawal if the money is used for higher education expenses. A tax-free distribution from an Education IRA may not be taken in a year when a taxpayer claims either the Hope Scholarship Tax Credit or Lifetime Learning Tax Credit.

Roth IRA - An after-tax savings option, a single taxpayer may contribute a maximum of \$2,000 per year and joint filers may contribute up to \$4,000 per year to a Roth IRA. (These maximums are reduced by amounts contributed to a deductible IRA.) Earnings accumulate tax free and contributions can continue beyond age 70-1/2. Withdrawals for educational expenses are tax free if the distributions are made at least five years after the Roth IRA was established and the taxpayer is age 59-1/2 or older.

Penalty-Free IRA Withdrawals - Taxpayers may withdraw funds from an IRA, without penalty, for their own higher education expenses or those of a spouse, child, or grandchild. Withdrawals can be used to pay for tuition, fees, books, and room and board if the student is enrolled at least half time.

STUDENT LOAN INTEREST DEDUCTION

A student or parent may take a tax deduction for interest paid during the first 60 months of repayment on student loans. The deduction is available even if the taxpayer does not itemize other deductions. The maximum deduction is \$2,000 in 2000, and \$2,500 thereafter. It is phased out for joint filers with an adjusted gross income between \$60,000 and \$75,000 and single filers with an adjusted gross income between \$40,000 and \$50,000.
