#### **ABSTRACT**

This report details the impact of the changing health environment on children's health and access to health care in New York state. The report links key measures of child health with recent policy changes, such as expansions in health insurance coverage, Medicaid managed care, and welfare reform. Data from 1997 are used as a baseline measure for future efforts to track the impact of public policy on child health. The report contains state and national data for indicators of child health in four areas: (1) economics, including poverty rates and public assistance receipt; (2) insurance status, including Medicaid and state health insurance program enrollment; (3) access and use of medical care services such as prenatal care and immunizations; and (4) health and behavioral indicators, including asthma hospitalizations, binge drinking, smoking, and infant mortality rates. Highlights are provided for some indicators comparing county, New York City, and state data. Included is the Web address for a Web-based component providing county and regional comparisons for selected indicators. (KB)

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

# Child Health 2000: Report Card for New York State, Regions and Counties

This report card is designed to monitor the impact of the changing health care environment on children's health and access to health care in New York State. It links key measures of child health with recent policy changes, such as expansions in health insurance coverage (i.e. New York's Child Health Plus (CHP) and separate state insurance programs nationwide), Medicaid managed care, and welfare reform. In most cases, 1997 data are the most recent available and will serve as a baseline measure for future efforts to track the impact of public policy on child health.

In order to capture the breadth of underlying factors and barriers that contribute to child health or ill health, this report includes poverty rates, and behavioral public assistance status When available, information is indicators. reported for subsets of children by income or race/ethnicity. Data are presented at the state and national level, with the Healthy People 2010 objectives identified where available. Indicators were selected based upon criteria including the reliability of the source, as well as their availability at county, state, and national levels.

For each indicator below, the three counties with the highest (#1) and lowest (#62) rankings are provided. A full ranking of New York State counties and a ranking by region are available at www.nyam.org.

Please note that the rankings serve as a general guide to relative differences between counties. Statistics that are based on a small number of vital events are subject to a large degree of variability and inferences should be drawn with care. For counties that have fewer than 50 people in the denominator, actual numbers are included. Unless otherwise stated, 1997 was used as the baseline year for all indicators. Indicators were chosen by availability of data at the county level from the New York State Department of Health.
