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## ABSTRACT

This KIDS COUNT data book examines trends in the well-being of New York's children. The statistical portrait is based on six general areas of children's well-being: (1) economic security; (2) physical and emotional health; (3) education; (4) citizenship; (5) family; and (6) community. Following an introductory section which describes the features and functionality of touchstone goals and objectives, the first section provides data for each of the following individual indicators: (1) child poverty; (2) children in families receiving food stamps; (3) children in families receiving public assistance; (4) children in families receiving supplemental security income; (5) births to teens; (6) prenatal care; (7) child death; (8) hospitalization due to asthma; (9) hospitalization due to self-inflicted injury; (10) hospitalization due to unintentional injuries; (11) infant mortality; (12) low birth weight rates; (13) sexually transmitted diseases; (14) dropout rates; (15) intent to enroll in college; (16) recipients of Regent's diplomas; (17) pupil evaluation program test scores; (18) students with limited English proficiency; (19) arrests for property or violent crimes; (20) arrests for drug use; (21) DWI arrests and accidents; (22) hospitalizations resulting from assault; (23) juveniles in need of supervision; (24) children in foster care; (25) child abuse reports; (26) births to women without insurance; (27) firearm related crime; (28) property and violent index crimes; and (29) resident civilian unemployment. The second section of the data book provides profiles of New York State, New York City, and the state's counties. The data book concludes with a section of technical notes and references. (SD)

Dear Friends:

The dawning of the new millennium has been an exciting time for all of us. As we weathered the uncertainties of entering the Year 2000, we have taken the time to examine the work we have done and look forward to the paths we must take to ensure that every child is healthy and equipped with the knowledge, skills and resources to succeed in a dynamic society.

There is much good news for children and families in New York State: violent and property crimes have decreased by 35 percent, since 1994; hospitalizations of children for self-inflicted and unintentional injuries have decreased; infant mortality continues to decline; and there are fewer teens becoming pregnant. The New York State Council on Children and Families and its 13 member agencies have worked together to develop a common vision, as well as comprehensive approaches that focus on prevention and build on the strengths of children, youth, families and communities. There is a role for every level of government, and for schools, business and community members alike, in providing opportunities for children to grow and flourish. 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# INTRODUCTION

The NYS Council on Children and Families and its thirteen member agencies have established a set of goals and objectives for children, youth and families in six major life areas: Economic Security, Physical and Emotional Health, Education, Citizenship, Families and Communities. To measure results in these areas, the Council has also adopted a set of core outcome measures or indicators that will help guide the State's health, education and human services agencies in setting both interagency and single agency agendas. This common set of goals, objectives and indicators for improving outcomes for children and families is New York State Touchstones.

The New York State Touchstones/KIDS COUNT 2000 Data Book presents the Touchstones goals and objectives with health and well-being indicators regarding the status of children and families. The indicators are presented by major life areas rather than by specific objectives. This was done, in part, because some indicators may be associated with more than one objective and some objectives do not have an indicator currently available. It should be noted that, in an effort to keep the book at a manageable size, this book contains about three-quarters of the Touchstones indicators. The indicators that are not presented in this book are reported routinely through the New York State Department of Health's Maternal, Child and Adolescent Health Profile and in the New York State Education Department's A Report to the Governor and the Legislature on the Educational Status of the State's Schools.

There are two main sections in the book. First, Part 1 data are presented by life areas, with current and base period data for each indicator. Each indicator displays data for counties as well as the State as a whole, New York City and Rest of State (New York State minus New York City). This section also provides descriptive text outlining the definition and significance of the indicator and major findings within New York State. Part 2 of the book presents individual county, New York State, New York City and Rest of State profiles. Each profile includes current and base period data for each indicator, as well as the current New York State rate (current period refers to the most recent data available at the time of production). This format allows the user to obtain a succinct overview of a particular county and to draw comparisons to other counties or the State as a whole.

Several criteria were used in selecting the indicators for this data book:

- › the indicator had to focus on the characteristics of children, not on the characteristics of programs or services;
- › the indicator had to be population-based, (i.e., it had to reflect the status or experience of all children and youth, not just those of a particular program);
- › the data for the indicator had to be available annually for counties; and
- › the indicator had to be reliable.

The last KIDS COUNT data book for New York State was produced in 1998. The contents of the Touchstones/KIDS COUNT 2000 Data Book include most of the indicators that

appeared in the 1998 Data Book. In addition, significant features have been added to this edition in order to provide a clearer picture of the status of New York State's children, youth and families. These features include:

#### 1) Race/Ethnicity Data:

This feature identifies the race/ethnicity breakdown within New York State, New York City, Rest of State and individual counties, as estimated by the Population Estimates Program of the U.S. Census Bureau for 1997. This feature has been added to the County Profiles, Part 2.

#### 2) Standardized Reporting of Data Sources:

This feature answers the following questions:

- a. Which agency supplied the reported data?
- b. Which agency originally compiled the data and what file/certificate/record was used to identify the numerator data?
- c. What source was used to estimate the total population who could experience the occurrence (the denominator data) in order to calculate the percent/rate?
- d. When were the data compiled?
- e. What additional information helps explain the indicator's data?

This feature has been added to the Touchstones Data, Part 1.

#### 3) Age Data:

This feature identifies the age distribution of the counties, New York State, New York City and Rest of State, as estimated by the Population Estimates Program of the U.S. Census Bureau for 1997. This feature has been added to the County Profiles, Part 2.

#### 4) New York State Statistics:

This feature organizes and summarizes New York State's county data in order to help describe the attributes of children, youth and families in New York State. This feature has been added to the Touchstones Data, Part 1.

#### 5) Features and Functionality of NYS Touchstones/KIDS COUNT:

Features and Functionality of New York State Touchstones/KIDS COUNT data helps interpret and use the data by reviewing mathematical terms, explaining the sources of the data, identifying appropriate uses for the data and increasing awareness of data limitations. This feature has been added to the Introduction.

All of these features help to assess, interpret and use data in a responsible fashion to establish effective and efficient policies and programs to improve the health and well-being of New York State's children, youth, families and communities. It is hoped that the presentation of these data will encourage all New Yorkers to work together toward achieving the Touchstones goals and objectives for improving the quality of life for children and families throughout the State.



# FEATURES AND FUNCTIONALITY OF TOUCHSTONES/KIDS COUNT 2000 DATA BOOK

New York State Touchstones is a tool to help guide State and local efforts to improve results for children and families. Its goals and objectives represent expectations for the future status of children and families. As a means to reach those expectations, Touchstones data can help focus planning and decision-making by providing an overview of the well-being of children, youth and families; comparing their current status to that of the past; and describing changes over time. Comprehensive strategies to improve the health and well-being of children and families can be developed by recognizing the interrelationships among the indicators and integrating the indicators into State and local decision-making processes, including: policy development, program and services planning, training and evaluation. This information is designed for a broad audience, including State and local policy makers, planners, providers, advocates, civic and religious leaders, the business community, the media, parents and youth. The discussions generated by Touchstones/KIDS COUNT will help in the identification and promotion of opportunities that are necessary for positive youth development and strong, nurturing families in all communities throughout New York State.

This section provides a resource for indicator data users to help interpret and use the data by reviewing mathematical terms, explaining the sources of the data, identifying appropriate uses for the data and increasing awareness of data limitations. In addition, this section describes the following new features of the 2000 Data Book:

- 1) NYS Statistics;
- 2) Standardized Reporting of "Sources of Data for Table/Methodology";
- 3) Demographics Breakdowns – Age and Race/Ethnicity Breakdowns; and
- 4) Free/Reduced Lunch Data

## TERMS and USES

**Number:** The number is the count of occurrences within a defined geographic area during a specified period of time. Numbers are used to determine the size of an occurrence in a particular location. Numbers, however, do not take the size of the population who could experience the occurrence into account. Therefore, numbers cannot show the probability of this occurring in the population. While numbers can compare the size of an occurrence within the same population group, numbers generally should not be used for comparisons, especially when comparison groups have differing population size or composition.

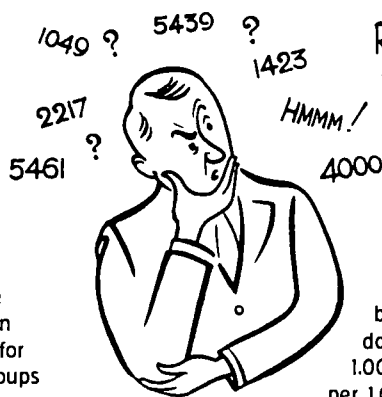
**Period of Time – Base and Current:** The time frame for the majority of indicators in this Data Book is the annual calendar year, January 1 through December 31. For example, the current year data for Births to Women Receiving Early (1st Trimester) Prenatal Care will be

presented as 1997, which references the calendar year January 1 through December 31, 1997. However, there are two exceptions:

- 1) The State Education Department generally collects data for the school year, July 1 through June 30. For example, the current year data for Pupil Evaluation Program (PEP) Test Scores will be presented as 1997/98, which references the school year July 1, 1997 through June 30, 1998.
- 2) For indicators with relatively rare events in many counties, rates are presented as three-year averages (see technical notes for methods used to calculate three year averages). This is necessary to improve the reliability (or stability) of the data. The following indicators will be depicted as three year averages:
  - › Five Leading Causes of Death;
  - › Hospitalizations Resulting from Assault;
  - › Hospitalizations Resulting from Asthma;
  - › Hospitalizations Resulting from Self-Inflicted Injuries;
  - › Infant Mortality; and
  - › Sexually Transmitted Diseases.

For example, the current data for Five Leading Causes of Death will be presented as 1995-1997, which references the three calendar years 1995, 1996 and 1997. This edition has increased the number of indicators being presented as three-year-averages as compared to the 1998 data book.

**Percent:** To compute a percent, divide the number of occurrences (the numerator) by the total population who could experience the occurrence (the denominator) and multiply by 100. A percent reflects the occurrence per 100 of the population and can be expressed in other formats (e.g., 25% can also be expressed as 25 in 100 or 1 in 4).



**Rate:** Rates provide a standardized means of comparing the prevalence of an indicator over time and across different geographical areas (e.g., counties, states). Therefore, rates provide an excellent way to measure progress towards meeting goals and standards. To compute a rate, first divide the number of occurrences (the numerator) by the total population who could experience the occurrence (the denominator), then multiply by a standardizing multiplier. Indicators in this data book utilize the following multipliers: 1,000; 10,000; or 100,000 and are reported as per 1,000; per 10,000; and per 100,000, respectively. However, rates calculated in this manner

are called crude rates and have not taken into consideration possible differences in population characteristics. In order to interpret comparisons, population characteristics (e.g., age, sex, race, education, income and/or birth weight) may need to be considered.



# NEW FEATURES AND FUNCTIONALITY OF TOUCHSTONES/KIDS COUNT 2000 DATA BOOK

**Percent or Rate Difference:** By accessing base and current period data, the user is able to determine the difference between the two periods of time. A difference is calculated by subtracting the base rate from the current rate. The difference between the rates can show an increase (positive number) or decrease (negative number) and, depending on the indicator, can depict a negative or positive trend.

**Percent Change:** By accessing base and current period data, the user is able to determine the percent of change between the two periods of time. To calculate a percent change, find the difference between the current year rate and base year rate [subtract the base rate from the current rate], then divide the difference by the base year and multiply by a standardized multiplier (100 is used as the multiplier to present the change as a percent). The difference between the rates can show an increase (positive number) or decrease (negative number) and depending on the indicator, can depict a negative or positive change. For example, New York State's current and base rates for Hospitalizations Resulting from Self-Inflicted Injuries (Three Year Average) per 100,000 youth ages 10-14 years shows a difference in the rate of -11.9 (1997 current rate of 26.1/100,000 youth ages 10-14 years minus 1995 base rate of 38.0 = -11.9). This difference reflects a 31% decrease (difference of -11.9/base year of 38.0 =  $0.31 \times 100 = 31\%$  decrease) in hospitalizations resulting from self-inflicted injuries for youth ages 10-14 years between 1995 and 1997 in New York State – Good News! Similarly, the positive 3.8% difference for New York State's High School Graduates Receiving Regents Diplomas between the school years 1995/96 and 1997/98 reflects good news, since it represents a 10% increase in high school graduates receiving regents diplomas ( $43.4\% - 39.6\% = 3.8$ ;  $3.8/39.6 = 0.10 \times 100 = 10\%$ ).

**Rate Ratio:** Rate ratios are used to compare rates, e.g., comparing rates between different age groups, different sexes, different time periods and different causes of an event. To compute a rate ratio, divide a rate by the rate you would like to compare. For example, to compare New York State's Hospitalizations Resulting from Asthma 1996-1998 (Three Year Average) rate per 10,000 children ages 0-4 years to children/youth ages 5-14 years, calculate the following:  $79.0/31.5 = 2.5$ . In other words, children ages 0-4 years were 2.5 times as likely to be hospitalized from asthma as children/youth ages 5-14 years in 1996-1998. This comparison can be reversed. To compare New York State's rate of children/youth 5-14 years to children ages 0-4 years, calculate the following:  $31.5/79.0 = 0.399$ . This means that children/youth 5-14 years are 0.4 times as likely (less than half the rate) than children ages 0-4 years to be hospitalized from asthma during 1996-1998.



This 2000 Data Book contains some new features including:

- NYS Statistics;
- Standardized Reporting of "Sources of Data";
- Demographics—Race/Ethnicity Breakdowns;
- Age Breakdowns; and
- Free/Reduced Lunch Data.



## NYS Statistics:

New York State Statistics organize and summarize New York State's county data. While the New York State percent/rate divides the number of occurrences in the State (the numerator) by the total population who could experience the occurrence (the denominator) and multiplies by a standardizing multiplier, the following New York State statistics are representative of the counties' percents/rates. However, if New York City Counties' data are not available, the statistics reflect only Rest of State counties.

The following statistics have been included in the data book:

**Median:** The median, a measure of central tendency, is the value of the middle item when the data are arranged from lowest to highest. Since New York State has an even number of counties (62), the median is computed by averaging the two middle observations, points 31 and 32. If New York City Counties' data are not available, the median is the middle observation, point 29 of the range. While the median is not sensitive to outliers and guarantees that 50 percent of the values fall on either side of the value, it may not be representative of all county percents/rates.

**Minimum:** The minimum identifies the smallest value within the range of county percents/rates.

**Maximum:** The maximum identifies the largest value within the range of county percents/rates.

**Standard Deviation:** The standard deviation measures the spread of the distribution of county percents/rates. It is the positive square root of the average of the squared difference of county percents/rates from their mean.

# NEW FEATURES AND FUNCTIONALITY OF TOUCHSTONES/KIDS COUNT 2000 DATA BOOK

## Sources of Data:

**S**ources of Data for Table/Methodology identifies the who, what, when, where and how the data were collected. The following standardized reporting of data collection has been included for each indicator:

### Agency Source:

Which agency supplied the reported data?

### Data Source:

Which agency originally compiled the data and what file/certificate/record was used to compile the data (the numerator data)? The data source often determines the definition of an event. Different definitions and methods used to identify an event can affect rates. If the number of occurrences (the numerator) reflects vital statistics (e.g., related to births, deaths and marriages), the numerator depends on the definition of an event, reporting practices and methods employed to identify occurrence. For example, New York State pregnancy rates are calculated by combining the reported number of live births, induced abortions and spontaneous fetal deaths per 1,000 women in the specified age category in the calendar year in which the birth or fetal loss occurred. However, using vital statistics does not ensure comparability across geographic regions. For example, while NYS pregnancy rates are based on vital records of events to NYS residents, national pregnancy rates are based on estimates.

If the number of occurrences (the numerator) reflects social or administrative data, the numerator depends on many external factors, including:

- the definition of an event;
- policy shifts;
- resource fluctuations;
- reporting practices; and
- methods employed to identify an occurrence.

For example, if a county or state initiates a program targeting teenage drinking and driving, the Driving While Intoxicated [DWI] Arrests may increase from previous years or vary substantially from a county or state without the same focus. Varying teenage driving restrictions and blood alcohol content (BAC) allowances may also affect rates.

### Population Source:

What source was used to estimate the total population who could experience the occurrence (the denominator data) in order to calculate the percent/rate? Numerous sources provide population estimates. The agencies supplying data for this data book have used:

- NYS Department of Health, Bureau of Biometrics;
- NYS Department of Labor, Division of Research and Statistics, Bureau of Labor Market Information;
- NYS Education Department;
- U.S. Census Bureau; and
- Woods and Poole Economics, Inc.

Different population estimates can affect rates.

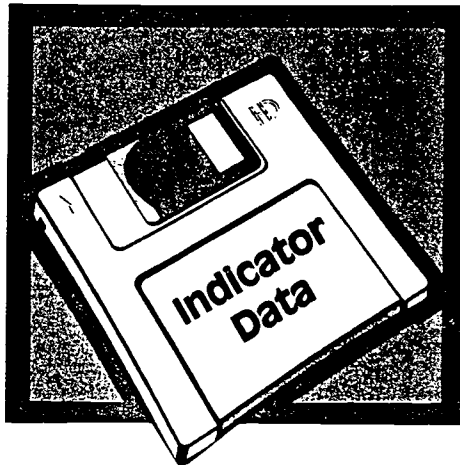
### Date Compiled:

When were the data compiled? Since data for some indicators are continuously updated (e.g., SPARCS hospital data), the numbers and rates accessed at different dates may reflect different findings.

The date compiled can affect rates.

### Notes:

What additional information helps explain this indicator's data? One or more notes under various indicators help explain additional factors that may affect interpretation or use of the data.



## Demographics:

**D**emographics identify the race/ethnicity and age breakdown within New York State, New York City, Rest of State and individual counties, as estimated by the Population Estimates Program of the U.S. Census Bureau for 1997. The Population Estimates Program produces total population estimates and county estimates by age, sex, race and Hispanic origin for each year.

## Race/Ethnicity Breakdown:

This data book includes the following four race categories, as reported by the U.S. Census Bureau: White; Black; American Indian and Alaska Native; Asian and Pacific Islander and two ethnicity categories: Hispanic and non-Hispanic. The Census Bureau defines each of the categories used in the race/ethnicity tables and explains how they relate to one another, as follows:

### White Hispanic:

This category includes the Hispanic portion of the White population or the White portion of the Hispanic population. Subtracting this group from TOTAL HISPANIC gives the total number of Hispanics who are Black, American Indian or Alaska Native, or Asian or Pacific Islander.

### White Non-Hispanic:

This category includes Whites who are not of Hispanic origin. Subtracting this group from TOTAL gives the total of all individuals who are Hispanic and/or a member of a race group other than White.

### Total White:

This category includes the sum of WHITE HISPANIC and WHITE NON-HISPANIC.  
This total has not been included in this report.

### Black:

This category includes all individuals who are Black, regardless of Hispanic origin.

### American Indian:

This category includes all individuals who are American Indian or Alaska Native (a category which includes Eskimos and Aleuts), regardless of Hispanic origin.

### Asian and Pacific Islander:

This category includes all individuals who are Asian or Pacific Islander, regardless of Hispanic origin.

### TOTAL:

This category includes all individuals in the population. This is equal to the sum of the TOTAL WHITE, BLACK, AMERICAN INDIAN and ASIAN & PACIFIC ISLANDER categories.

### Total Hispanic [Hispanic (of any race)]:

This category includes all Hispanics in the population, regardless of race. This category cannot be derived from any of the other categories, but it can be subtracted from TOTAL to get the total number of non-Hispanics.

## Age Breakdowns:

Age Breakdowns identify the age distribution of the counties, New York State, New York City and Rest of State, as estimated by the Population Estimates Program of the U.S. Census Bureau for 1997.

While the Census Bureau breaks down ages into single year, 5 year increments up to age 85+ years and selected age groups, this data book presents the age breakdown in the following increments: 0-4 years; 5-9 years; 10-14 years; 15-19 years; 20-64 years; and 65+ years.

## Children Receiving Free/Reduced School Lunch - Public Schools:

Free/Reduced Lunch participation identifies the number and percent of public school students in full-day kindergarten through sixth grade participating in one of New York State's school nutrition programs. The School Lunch Program ensures that children have access to the nutrition they need to learn, play, grow and develop, as well as to promote learning readiness and healthy eating habits. The percent is computed by dividing the number of students participating in the program by the total enrollment for those public school grades and multiplying by 100 for the school year 1998/99. Eligibility is determined by family income and size. For example, during the 1998/99 school year, the income eligibility guidelines for free and reduced lunch for a family of three were \$17,745 and \$25,253, respectively. For a family of four, the corresponding guidelines were \$21,385 and \$30,433.

Since the Free/Reduced Lunch Program eligibility requirements are based on the family's income and size, the percent of students enrolled in the program can be used as a proxy for the percent of children living in poverty. However, not all school districts participate in the program, and the percentage of eligible students who apply varies across participating districts. Therefore, the reported statistics may underestimate the number of students eligible. While this indicator is used as a proxy for children living in poverty, the percent of children participating in this lunch program is generally greater than the percent of children living in poverty. Children receiving free/reduced lunch do not have as rigid criteria for inclusion and represent a subset of children in the age group of students in full-day kindergarten through grade 6.

New York State's Free/Reduced Lunch Program is part of the National School Lunch Program, a program authorized by the National School Lunch Act (1946) under which participating schools operate a non-profit lunch service following the required federal meal pattern guidelines and in accordance with federal regulations (7 CFR Part 210). Cash and donated food assistance are made available to schools participating in this program. All schools participating in the federally-assisted National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program, Special Milk Program or Commodity School Program must make meals or milk available to all students in attendance who wish to participate in the program(s).

## Some Other Considerations:

**Aggregate Data:** The data presented in this Data Book are in aggregate form. The total number of occurrences within a geographic area are depicted, not individual data. Drawing individual-level conclusions based on area-level analyses run the risk of being erroneous. However, aggregate data can stimulate discussion and provide information to help generate hypotheses for further investigation.

**Confidence Intervals:** A confidence interval provides an estimate of the range of values that is likely to include an unknown population parameter for a given set of sample data. A confidence interval is based on the following three elements: a value of a statistic (e.g., the mean); the standard error (SE) of the measure; and the chosen width of the confidence interval (e.g., the 95% confidence interval). For example, when reporting a

95% confidence interval. 95 times out of 100 the true value will fall within the confidence interval (95% confidence intervals are most frequently used, but other confidence intervals may be selected, e.g., 90%, 99%, 99.9%). Confidence intervals provide an estimate of the amount of error involved in the data and the precision of the statistical estimates. In addition, it relates to the concept of the power. The larger the confidence interval the less power a study has to detect differences. Confidence limits are the highest and lowest values of the interval. Some of the narratives within this data book refer to confidence intervals. Since the construction and interpretation of confidence intervals depends on numerous factors (e.g., sample size and distribution), please consult a statistics resource for further details, if necessary.

**Confidentiality:** All of the data in this data book are presented in aggregate form. Therefore, it is unlikely that individuals would be identified. However, data users need to be aware of the confidentiality issues related to using health and well-being indicator data and respect and protect the privacy of individuals.

**Determining Cause:** While data may help describe factors of an event (e.g., who, what, when and where of an occurrence), data alone usually cannot demonstrate why an event occurs. For instance, two indicators that are associated or correlated (e.g., age of mother at birth and low birth weight), does not demonstrate that one causes the other. Further examination is necessary to determine if other factors (e.g., lack of prenatal care, poverty or poor nutrition) could be associated with the indicators, as well as whether or not chance influences the finding.

**Determining Comparability:** In order to confidently compare two or more percents/rates, the numerators and denominators need to be compatible. Use data that have been collected with scientific rigor and consistency to ensure the integrity of the data. In addition, here are some other factors to consider:

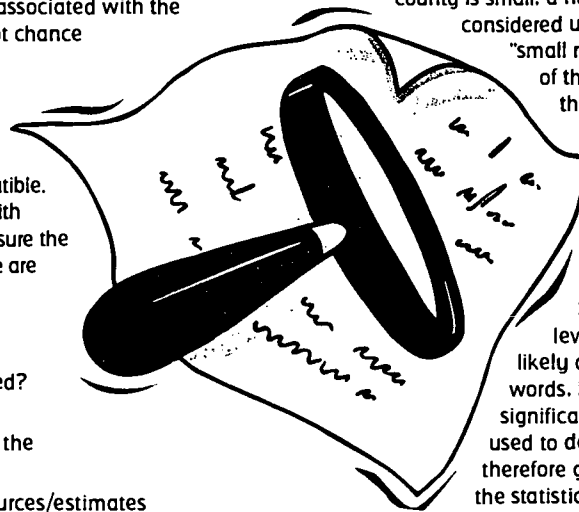
- › Who collected the data?
- › Why were the data collected?
- › Were similar methods and definitions used to identify the occurrences (numerator)?
- › Were similar population sources/estimates (denominator) used to compute rates?
- › Are the rates crude or adjusted?
- › If the rates are crude, what population characteristics need to be considered?
- › Are the numbers large enough to portray reliable data (see small number size)?
- › What time periods are being compared?
- › Have policy shifts occurred that could influence the findings?
- › Have resources targeting the indicator fluctuated?

**Indirect Measures:** Community indicators are not necessarily direct measures of the population's behavior, but may be measures of the community service systems. Policy shifts, resource fluctuations, degree of centralization and standardization, local reporting practices and local service delivery differences affect indicator data. Other factors in the community – including availability, affordability and quality of service – may also affect indicator data. Local qualitative information regarding the role of the indicator in the context of its service setting must be obtained and applied when interpreting the results of indicator-based studies. For example, the youth arrest rate for driving while intoxicated is a direct measure of a law enforcement response to youth alcohol and other drug (AOD) use and is an indirect measure of youth AOD use in the population.

**Small Number Size:** Rates are sensitive to variations in the size of both the numerator (the number of occurrences) and the denominator (the estimated population who could experience the occurrence). For example, in small counties, a variation of only a few cases in the numerator can cause a relatively large change in a percent/rate. The same variation in a large county may cause no change in the rate. Similarly, a small change in the population estimate of a small county may cause a substantial change in the percent/rate in that county. Again, the same variation in a large county may cause no change in the rate. Whether or not the county is small, a numerator with few occurrences is considered unreliable. However, the definition of

"small numbers" varies according to the source of the data. This data book reminds users that rates and percents based on fewer than 20 occurrences may be unreliable and may exhibit significant variation from one year to the next. This variation from year to year is often referred to as "not stable" or "statistically not reliable."

**Statistical Significance:** Significance levels provide a mechanism to show how likely a result is due to chance. In other words, it shows how reliable the data is. The significance level (most commonly 95%) is used to determine if something is true and therefore good enough to be believed. However, the statistical significance value is generally depicted as the percent of chance that the finding is not true (e.g., 0.05 statistical significance reflects a 95% chance of being true). While significant findings mean that the finding is probably true (not due to chance), it does not always imply that the finding is important. Conversely, when statistical significance is greater than the generally accepted 0.05, it does not necessarily imply that the finding is not important. Some of the narratives within this data book refer to statistical significance. Since the construction and interpretation of statistical significance depends on numerous factors (e.g., sample size and distribution), please consult a statistics resource for further details, if necessary.



It is hoped that the presentation of these features will help to assess, interpret and use data in a responsible fashion to establish effective and efficient policies and programs to improve the health and well-being of New York State's children, youth, families and communities.



## Future of Touchstones:

The Council on Children and Families, in conjunction with the Center for Technology in Government and Cornell University's College of Human Ecology, was awarded a Department of Health and Human Services' grant to advance the use of children's health and well-being indicators as tools for policy development, planning and accountability. The primary goal for this project is to expand on the extensive indicator work already conducted through Touchstones. The focus is to bring existing data and supportive resources together to expand both the kinds of data available and its usefulness for state, county and community organizations. This will be accomplished through the development of a well-organized, data-rich web-based clearinghouse, the Kids' Well-being Indicators Clearinghouse (KWIC). This highly accessible, interactive electronic system will enhance data collection and dissemination efforts and provide more timely access to information and other supportive resources. As a result, users will have an enhanced tool to gather and use indicator data to assess needs, design and improve programs, and sharpen their focus on outcomes.

KWIC is built around the well-defined needs and preferences of key stakeholders. Three half-day working meetings were held across the state to elicit and prioritize the needs and preferences of data users and data producers for gathering, finding and using child health and well-being indicator data. In addition, an advisory committee was established to help ensure that this project meets the needs and preferences of users. The committee was drawn from State agencies, State and local governments, community-based organizations, research institutions, educational institutions, advocacy groups, foundations and others with an interest in children's health and well-being. KWIC will be piloted during the fall of 2000. KWIC is expected to become publicly accessible during the winter of 2000-01.

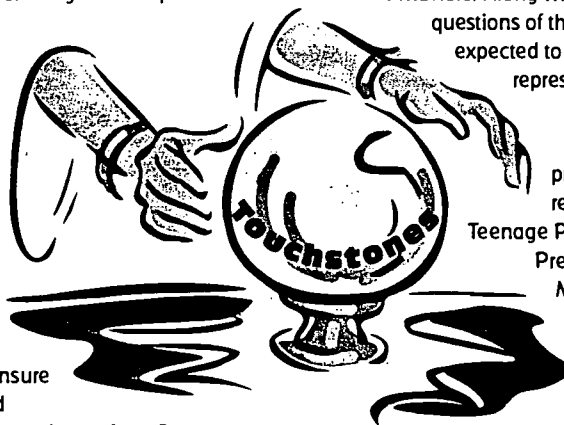
The Council and its member agencies are not only working to improve the accessibility of health and well-being data, but are also working on expanding the types of data that will be available. Currently, the data provided in this data book and KWIC represent traditional indicators – measures of disease, dysfunction or at-risk behaviors and conditions. Traditional indicators, phrased in positive terms (e.g., percent employed) or negative terms (e.g., percent unemployed), have been used to identify problems and needs, as well as to identify solutions for

those concerns. However, traditional indicators provide a limited picture of the health and well-being of children, youth, families and communities. To provide a more balanced perspective, promotional indicators are needed to assess, promote and monitor the positive, protective attributes of children, youth, families and communities. Such indicators are not simply an absence of disease, dysfunction or at-risk behaviors and conditions. Instead, promotional indicators measure the functioning or development of children, youth, families and communities that reflects their capacity to successfully address challenges (e.g., percentage of parent/care givers who possess and practice adequate child rearing skills). While in its infancy, work continues to identify and incorporate promotional indicators at the local, state, national and international levels.

In addition, an expanded New York State Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) is being developed by an interagency team in order to enhance data collection about youth attitudes, assets and risk behaviors. Along with expanding the number and type of questions of the YRBS, the sample size is also expected to increase, making the data more representative at the county level.

A series of Touchstones/KIDS COUNT Special Reports have been prepared and are in the final stages for release, including the following topics: Teenage Pregnancy and Birth; New York State's Prevention Risk Indicator Services Monitoring System (PRISMS); and Parental Involvement in the Juvenile Delinquency Diversion Process. Work has also begun on a Child Health and Safety Report.

The Touchstones framework will be continually reassessed and refined to ensure it is the best tool available for focusing efforts toward improving outcomes for children and families and charting progress over time. The member agencies of the Council on Children and Families will continue to integrate Touchstones within State operations. In addition, through initiatives such as Integrated County Planning (ICP) Initiative, Assets Coming Together for Youth (ACT for Youth), State Incentive Cooperative Agreement (SICA), the Task Force on School/Community Collaboration and Partners for Children, State agencies will work in partnership with communities to link the Touchstones indicators to local planning processes and efforts to measure progress towards improving outcomes for children and families. At the same time, agencies will continue to examine ways to improve the collection and dissemination of useful data to counties and communities throughout New York State.

# Economic Security

## CHILDREN AND YOUTH LIVING BELOW POVERTY: number and percent children/youth ages birth-17 years

### Definition:

Children are considered to be living in poverty if their family income, before taxes, falls below the poverty thresholds set by the federal government for families of different sizes. Non-cash benefits such as public housing, food stamps and Medicaid are not counted in determining whether family income is below the poverty threshold, nor are work-related or other expenses. The thresholds do not vary geographically, but they are updated each year for inflation using the Consumer Price Index. The federal poverty line for a family of three was \$12,158 in 1995 and \$11,522 in 1993; for a family of four, the corresponding thresholds were \$15,569 and \$14,763, respectively.

The table shows the estimated number of children and youth under 18 years of age living in poverty by county, as well as the poverty rate for each county. The numbers in the table are model-based estimates produced by the Bureau of the Census for the years following the last official census. The models are based on a combination of census data, sample data from the Current Population Survey and administrative data such as federal tax returns and food stamp information. As such, the estimates are subject to uncertainty (see NOTE for further details concerning how to judge the statistical precision of changes over time or differences between counties in the rate of poverty).

### Significance:

Children who experience economic deprivation in childhood are at risk for a wide-range of negative social, health, educational and future employment outcomes, including inadequate nutrition, parental stress and depression, developmental disabilities, exposure to infectious diseases, school failure and low earnings as adults.

### NOTE:

The poverty estimates provided are from the Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates Program, Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, January 1998. The estimates are based on statistical models developed for estimating poverty in small areas (counties and states) during the years between the decennial census.

Because counties undergo economic and demographic changes over time that may differ from one county to the other, annual estimates using statistical models may better represent current differences in poverty rates across counties than data reflected in the 1990 Census. In addition, annual estimates can

be used to track changes in county poverty rates during the years between the decennial census. However, it should be understood that while such estimates are more current than the decennial census, annual poverty rates generated using such models are less statistically precise than the decennial census. For example, the 90 percent confidence interval for the 1995 Bronx estimate (48.9%) is from 40.0 percent to 57.9 percent. For Allegany, the estimate of 23.9 percent has a corresponding confidence interval of 19.1 percent to 28.8 percent. However, for the State as a whole, the 90% confidence interval is quite narrow, 24.3 percent to 26.4 percent in 1995. ### NYS Findings:

- In 1995, there were an estimated 1,177,720 children living in poverty in New York State, or 25.4 percent of all children, down from an estimate of 1,226,505 children in 1993, or 26.7 percent of all children. The estimate for the number of children living in poverty declined in both New York City and in Rest of State.
- In 1995, the poverty rate in New York City (40.0%) was more than two and a half times the rate in Rest of State (15.8%). The poverty rate for children living in the Bronx (48.9%), Kings (46.4%) and New York (44.7%) Counties were the highest in the State, more than twice the rate of Rest of State counties with large urban centers, such as Erie (22.0%), Monroe (20.5%) and Onondaga (18.6%) Counties.
- The lowest poverty rates were found in Putnam (4.8%), Nassau (7.7%), Saratoga (9.9%), Suffolk (10.5%) and Dutchess (11.0%) Counties. Such low rates probably reflect the largely suburban nature of these counties, as well as the absence of a large urban center.
- Many rural counties in Rest of State had relatively high poverty rates, in many cases equal to or higher than Rest of State counties with large urban centers. For example, the child poverty rate was 24.5 percent in Chautauqua, 23.9 percent in Allegany and 23.5 percent in Franklin Counties.

# Economic Security

## CHILDREN AND YOUTH RECEIVING FOOD STAMPS number and percent children/youth ages birth-17 years

### Definition:

The Food Stamp program is a federally funded entitlement program designed to increase the food purchasing power of low income households to a level which allows such households to purchase a low cost but nutritionally adequate diet. Generally, households are expected to devote 30 percent of their countable income to food, including households whose only income is from public assistance. The Food Stamp Program then provides the difference between that amount and the maximum benefit. Maximum benefits are set at the amount needed to purchase the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Thrifty Food Plan.

The table shows the number and percent of children and youth less than 18 years of age who received food stamps in New York State at the end of 1994 and the end of 1998 (December 1994 and December 1998, respectively).

### Significance:

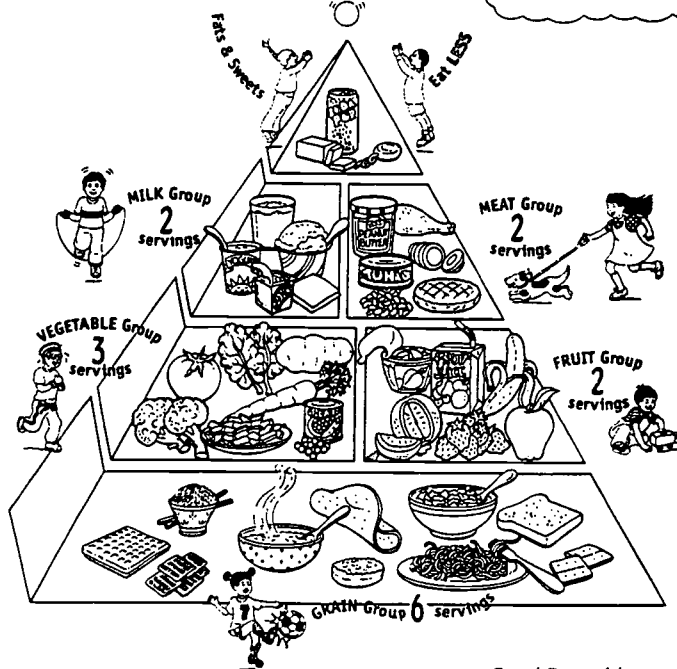
Income and resource limits in the Food Stamp Program are somewhat higher than in public assistance programs, making more households eligible for food stamps than are eligible for public assistance. Consequently, more children in New York State can receive food stamps than receive public assistance.

### NYS Findings:

- The number and percent of children receiving food stamps declined between December 1994 and December 1998. However, the decline was less than the decline during the same period in public assistance receipt among New York State children. At the end of 1994, 994,570 children (22.1% of all children) received food stamps. At the close of 1998, 723,278 children (16.1% of all children) were in households receiving food stamps, a one-quarter decline since 1994 in the percent of children receiving food stamps. The decline in the percent of children receiving food stamps was slightly higher in New York City than Rest of State.
- The rate of food stamp receipt among children varied greatly across the State. In 1998, the rate of food stamp receipt among children was two and a half times higher in New York City than in Rest of State (24.9% versus 10.0%). Among Rest of State counties, rates of public assistance receipt ranged from a high of 18.0 percent to a low of 1.1 percent. The lowest rates of participation were found in the largely suburban counties of Putnam, Nassau, Saratoga and Suffolk. The highest rates were found in largely urban counties such as Monroe, Erie and Onondaga.

# Economic Security

## CHILDREN AND YOUTH RECEIVING PUBLIC ASSISTANCE: number and percent children/youth ages birth-17 years

### Definition:

**P**ublic assistance programs provide cash and in-kind aid to meet the basic support needs of individuals and families. To be eligible for public assistance, family countable income and resources must fall below certain limits. Families receive the difference between countable income and a standard of need based on their family size and the housing costs for their district (either New York City or one of Rest of State counties).

The table shows the number and percent of children and youth less than 18 years of age who received public assistance in New York State at the end of 1994 and the end of 1998 (December 1994 and December 1998, respectively).

A child was counted as receiving public assistance at the end of 1998 if they received aid under the State's Family Assistance (FA) program or the State's Safety Net (SN) program. A federally subsidized program, FA is the State's primary public assistance program for families with children. SN, a state funded general assistance program, provides public assistance for single adults, childless couples and a relatively small number of families with children who are not eligible for aid under FA. In 1994, children were counted as receiving public assistance if they received aid under either the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program or the Home Relief (HR) program. The FA and SN programs discussed above later replaced these public assistance programs.

### Significance:

The number and percent of children receiving public assistance is primarily a measure of the extent to which New York State children are dependent on government aid to meet their basic economic needs.

In addition, the percent of children receiving public assistance can be used to supplement the poverty rate as a measure of the relative economic well being of children across the State. The county child poverty rate is estimated by the Bureau of the Census from the statistical modeling of information related to child poverty at the county level, not from actual counts of families falling below poverty in each county. Such county-by-county poverty counts occur only every ten years, during the census. In contrast, the numbers of children receiving public assistance provides an actual count of children participating in such programs for each county and can therefore serve as a supplemental measure of the economic well being of children.

### NYS Findings:

- The number and percent of children receiving public assistance declined dramatically between December 1994 and December 1998. At the end of 1994, 827,879 children (18.4% of all children) received public assistance. By the close of 1998, 544,354 children (12.1% of all children) received public assistance, a one-third decline since 1998 in the percent of children receiving public assistance. A similar decline in the percent of children receiving public assistance – about a third – occurred in both New York City and Rest of State.
- The rate of public assistance receipt among children varied greatly across the State. In December 1998, the percent of children receiving public assistance was over three times higher in New York City (20.6%) than in Rest of State (6.3%). Among Rest of State counties, rates of public assistance receipt ranged from a high of 14.1 percent to a low of 0.5 percent. The highest rates of participation were in Monroe (14.1%) and Erie (12.5%), counties with large urban centers. The lowest rates were in Putnam (0.5%) and Saratoga (0.7%), counties with largely suburban populations.

# Economic Security

CHILDREN AND YOUTH RECEIVING SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME  
number and percent children/youth ages birth-19 years

## Definition:

The Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program provides monthly cash benefits to aged, blind and disabled persons with income and resources below certain limits. Unlike state-administered public assistance programs, SSI is administered by the Social Security Administration according to uniform national standards. Children in New York State receive SSI if they meet the blindness or disability criteria, and in addition, meet the income and resource requirements for eligibility. Although SSI income and resource standards are low, they are generally higher than those for public assistance. Moreover, cash benefits paid on behalf of the child are significantly higher than public assistance benefits received for children.

The table shows the number and percent of children and youth less than 20 years of age who received SSI in New York State as of May 1995 and January 1999. Note that a disabled child receiving SSI in a family that receives public assistance (either Family Assistance or Safety Net assistance) is counted among children receiving SSI and will not appear in the counts of children receiving public assistance for the same time period. However, many of the children that receive SSI are part of households that receive food stamps and are therefore counted among children receiving food stamps for the same period.

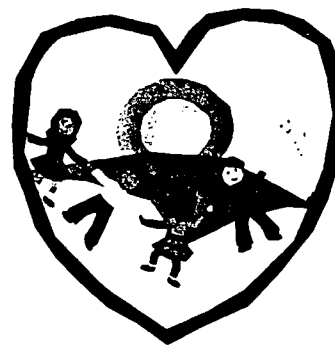
The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 changed the disability test for children, requiring a more stringent test than required under previous law. This change was applied to new applicants as well as those receiving SSI at the time and can alone account for some of the decline shown in the tables. However, it should be noted that a child losing SSI benefits during the period may have begun receiving public assistance and if so would be counted in the previous table. This would occur if others in the family were receiving public assistance when SSI benefits were lost, or if the family applied for and qualified for public assistance subsequent to the loss of the child's SSI benefit.

## Significance:

SSI benefits are intended to meet the basic economic needs of the child, not to provide special services that may be required by children with disabilities. Therefore, the number and percent of children receiving SSI due to blindness or disability serves primarily to count the additional children, other than those receiving public assistance, that are dependent on the government for their basic support needs.

## NYS Findings:

- The number and percent of children receiving SSI in New York State declined between May of 1995 and December of 1998. In May of 1995, 80,995 children and youth less than 20 years of age received SSI (or 1.8% of such individuals). At the close of 1998, 73,103 children and youth received SSI (or 1.6% of those less than 20). Declines occurred in virtually all counties, with similar rates of decline in both New York City and Rest of State. The widespread nature of the decline and its uniformity across the State was probably due, at least in part, to the more stringent eligibility tests enacted in 1996.
- In December 1998, 2.2 percent of the children and youth in New York City received SSI compared to 1.2 percent in Rest of State. Among Rest of State counties, rates ranged from 0.3 percent in Putnam to 2.2 percent in Fulton. There appeared to be no clear pattern in the types of counties with high versus low rates of SSI receipt among children and youth.

# Physical and Emotional Health

## Goal # } 3

Children and youth will have optimal physical and emotional health.

### Objectives:

- ▶ Children and youth will be born healthy.
- ▶ Children and youth will be free from preventable disease and injury.
- ▶ Children and youth will have nutritious diets.
- ▶ Children and youth will be physically fit.
- ▶ Children and youth will be emotionally healthy.
- ▶ Children and youth will be free from health risk behaviors (e.g., smoking, drinking, substance abuse, unsafe sexual activity).
- ▶ Children and youth will have access to timely and appropriate preventive and primary health care.
- ▶ Children with special health care needs will experience an optimal quality of life.
- ▶ Children and youth with service needs due to mental illness, developmental disabilities and/or substance abuse problems will have access to timely and appropriate services.





# Physical and Emotional Health

## ADOLESCENT PREGNANCIES BY MATERNAL AGE, number and rate per 1,000 females ages 10-19 years

### Definition:

Pregnancies are the sum of the number of live births, reported induced terminations of pregnancies and reported fetal deaths of all gestations. The adolescent pregnancy rate is the number of pregnancies per 1,000 females in the stated age group. Rates are presented for adolescents ages 10 through 14, 15 through 17 and 15 through 19 years.

### Significance:

Assuming the responsibilities of parenting before one is financially, socially or emotionally prepared carries increased risks of later difficulties for the parent, the child and the community. Adolescent mothers are less likely than their non-parenting peers to complete high school and marry. They are more likely to have large families and live in poverty. Their children are at greater risk of infant mortality, poor health, lower cognitive development, worse educational outcomes, higher rates of behavior problems and higher rates of adolescent childbearing themselves. Adolescent childbearing also places a greater financial burden on society in terms of the increased supports required to assist these families (Kirby, 1997).

The New York Public Health Council has identified adolescent sexual activity as a priority area for public health action. As such, it has set an objective to reduce, by 2006, the adolescent pregnancy rate to no more than 2 per 1,000 girls aged 10 through 14 and to no more than 50 per 1,000 girls aged 15 through 17 (New York State Public Health Council, September 1996).

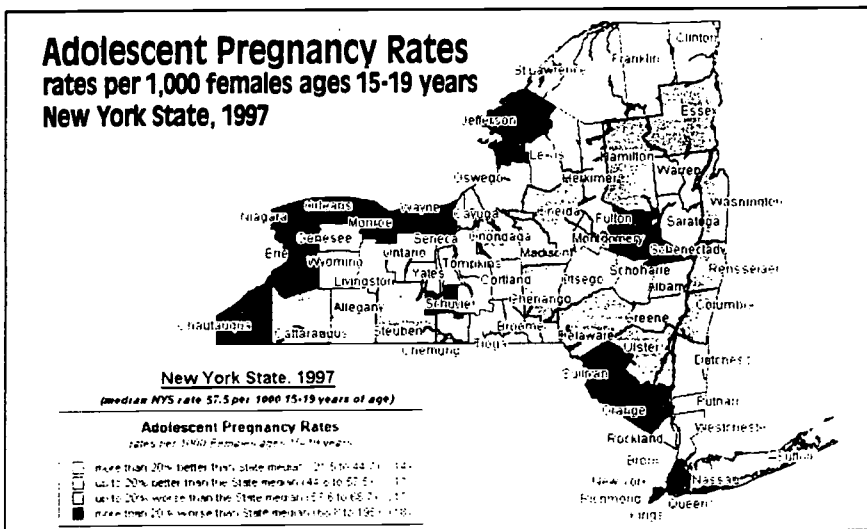
### NYS Findings:

- In 1997, there were 50,571 pregnancies to young women ages 15 through 19 in New York State. The pregnancy rate for this age group was 87.8 per 1,000, a decline from the 1995 rate of 90.1.
- The decline in the adolescent pregnancy rate in New York State is primarily a reflection of the decline in pregnancies among young women in counties outside New York City. The rate of pregnancies for these women declined from 61.5 per 1,000 women ages 15 through 19 in 1995 to 57.3 per 1,000 in 1997. Adolescent pregnancy rates in New York City remained virtually the same between 1995 and 1997 (134.9 and 134.4, respectively).
- In 1997, pregnancy rates for New York State's youngest teens remained fairly low at just over 2 per 1,000 girls aged 10 through 14. Pregnancy among young women aged 15 through 17 declined slightly from 60.0 per 1,000 in 1995 to 56.6 in 1997.

# Physical and Emotional Health

## BIRTHS TO WOMEN RECEIVING EARLY (1<sup>ST</sup> TRIMESTER) PRENATAL CARE number and percent of live births

### Definition:

**E**arly prenatal care is defined as pregnancy-related health care received by the mother in the first three months (first trimester) of her pregnancy. The percent of early prenatal care births is calculated by dividing the number of births that benefited from early prenatal care by the total number of births where the first month of prenatal care was known.

### Significance:

Early, high-quality prenatal care can help to prevent poor birth outcomes by enabling early identification and, where possible, treatment of health problems. Such care can also provide an opportunity to educate or counsel pregnant women about the adverse effects of behaviors such as alcohol, tobacco or other drug use that increase their risk of poor outcomes for their baby. Such preventive measures as nutrition counseling and HIV testing can have important long-term effects on the health and well-being of the baby (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, January 2000).

Healthy People 2000 objectives seek to increase the proportion of all pregnant women who receive prenatal care in the first trimester of pregnancy to at least 90 percent (National Center for Health Statistics, 1996).



### NYS Findings:

- In 1997, 73.1 percent of all New York State births were to women who had prenatal care in their first trimester of pregnancy. This represents a steady improvement over the percentage with early prenatal care in previous years (67.3% in 1993, 69.4% in 1995, and 70.4% in 1996) (New York State Department of Health, 1999).
- In 1997, a smaller proportion of babies born to women living in New York City received early prenatal care (64.9%) than babies born to women living in Rest of State (79.2%).

# Physical and Emotional Health

FIVE LEADING CAUSES OF DEATH BY AGE GROUP (THREE-YEAR AVERAGE)  
number and percent children/youth ages birth-19 years

## Definition:

This category summarizes the five leading causes of death among New York State children and the percentage they represent of all deaths within each age group. Since the number of deaths to children and youth is very low in many counties, the five leading causes of death are presented as three-year averages for New York State, New York City and Rest of State. Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data where slight variations in the numbers can result in large fluctuations in the annual rates.

## Significance:

One important way to identify threats to the health of children and youth is to examine causes of their death. Causes of death vary according to age group. Since the number of child deaths is relatively small, information on cause of death is not reliable for individual counties and is, therefore, presented by State and region (i.e., New York City, Rest of State).

## NYS Findings:

### Infants less than one year old

- The average number of deaths to children under one year of age in New York State declined by 20 percent between 1992-94 and 1995-97 (from 2,332 to 1,873, respectively).
- "Conditions Originating in the Perinatal Period" was the most frequent reason for infant death in both 1992-94 and 1995-97 (52.9% and 54.8%, respectively). Congenital anomalies consistently accounted for 21 percent of the infant deaths in New York State.

### Children ages 1 through 4 years

- Between 1992-94 and 1995-97, the average number of deaths for children aged one through four declined by 17 percent (432 to 358) in New York State. In both time periods non-motor vehicle injury was the leading cause of death (18.1% and 15.6%, respectively).
- The most frequently occurring reason why children between the ages of one and four years died varied considerably by where in the State they lived. In both 1992-94 and 1995-97, "AIDS and AIDS Related Conditions" was the leading cause of death among these children (20.8% and 19.2%, respectively) in New York City while children residing in Rest of State were most frequently victims of non-motor vehicle injury (25.2% and 19.4%, respectively).
- Congenital anomalies remained the second leading cause of death among children aged one through four years in all areas of New York State.

### Children ages 5 through 9 years

- Children in New York State between the ages of five and nine years have a relatively low risk of death. In New York State, an average 226 children in this age group died annually between 1995-97. This was down slightly from the 239 average deaths in this age group in 1992-94. The most frequent causes of death for children in this age group were malignant neoplasm, AIDS and a motor vehicle injury.
- In 1995-97, motor vehicle injury was the leading cause of death among children ages five through nine (19.3%) in counties outside New York City. "AIDS and AIDS Related Conditions" was the most frequently occurring cause of death in this age group in New York City (24.8%).

### Youth ages 10 through 14 years

- The risk of death among New York State youth aged 10 through 14 years is relatively low when compared with infants, very young children and older adolescents. In 1995-97 an average 242 youth in this age group died annually – down from 253 in 1992-94.
- In both 1992-94 and 1995-97, injuries were the leading causes of death among youth aged 10 through 14 years in New York State. Motor vehicle injuries accounted for 18.6 percent of the deaths in 1992-94 and 17.8 percent of the deaths in 1995-97. Non-motor vehicle injuries were responsible for 15.0 percent and 13.2 percent of the deaths, respectively.
- The leading cause of death among youth ages 10 through 14 years in the State is driven primarily by a relatively high proportion of deaths due to motor vehicle injuries in counties outside New York City (24% in both 1992-94 and 1995-97). "AIDS and AIDS Related Conditions" was the leading cause of death in New York City in 1995-97 accounting for 17.6 percent of the deaths to youth in this age group.

### Youth ages 15 through 19 years

- Next to infancy, youth between the ages of 15 and 19 years are at the greatest risk of premature death – primarily from violent causes. A 45 percent decline in the number of homicides between 1992-94 and 1995-97 has been primarily responsible for a substantial reduction in the number of deaths to youth in this age group (825 vs. 663, respectively).
- Although homicides remained the leading cause of death among adolescents aged 15 through 19 years in New York City, there were on average nearly half as many homicides in New York City in 1995-97 (124) as there were in 1992-94 (241).
- In counties outside New York City, the top two leading causes of death among adolescents aged 15 through 19 years in 1992-94 and 1995-97 were consistently motor vehicle injuries and suicide.

## HOSPITALIZATIONS RESULTING FROM ASTHMA (THREE-YEAR AVERAGE) number and rate per 10,000 children ages birth-14 years

### Definition:

The asthma hospitalization rate is based on the number of hospitalizations for asthma per 10,000 population in each of the following age groups: 0-4 and 5-14 years. Because the number of children hospitalized for asthma is very low in many counties, the asthma hospitalization rates are presented here as three-year averages. Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data in counties with small populations where slight variations in the number of children hospitalized for asthma can result in large fluctuations in their annual rates.

### Significance:

Asthma is one of the most common chronic diseases in childhood. Without effective management, asthma can have serious negative consequences for the health and functioning of involved children. Effective management includes control of exposure to environmental factors that trigger exacerbations, adequate pharmacological treatment, continual monitoring of the disease and patient (or parent) education (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, January 2000).

Traditionally, high asthma hospitalization rates have been an indication of problems with access to or utilization of primary health care that provide such management.

The New York Public Health Council has identified access to primary health care as a priority area for public health action. By increasing access to primary health care, it seeks to reduce the number of hospitalizations for asthma for children aged 0-14 years to no more than 29.0 per 10,000 by the year 2006 (New York State Public Health Council, September 1996).

### NYS Findings:

- In New York State, infants and preschool children (ages 0-4 years) are hospitalized for asthma at over twice the rate of children in the 5-14 age group. Recently however, asthma-related hospitalizations have declined for both age groups – from 87.5 per 10,000 children age 0-4 in 1993-95 to 79.0 in 1996-98 and from 36.7 per 10,000 children 5-14 in 1993-95 to 31.5 in 1996-98.
- Children living in New York City are substantially more likely to be hospitalized for asthma than are children living in Rest of State. In 1996-98, hospitalizations for children aged 0-4 were 135.8 per 10,000 in New York City compared with 37.3 in Rest of State. Among children aged 5-14 years, the rate varied from 59.6 in New York City to 13.5 in Rest of State.

## HOSPITALIZATIONS RESULTING FROM SELF-INFLICTED INJURIES (THREE-YEAR AVERAGE) number and rate per 100,000 children ages 10-19 years

### Definition:

The hospitalizations resulting from self-inflicted injury rate is based on the number of hospitalizations for self-inflicted injuries per 100,000 youth ages 10 through 14 years and 15 through 19 years. Since hospitalizations resulting from self-inflicted injuries are relatively rare events in many counties, the numbers and rates are presented as three-year averages. Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data in counties with small populations where slight variations in the number of children hospitalized for self-inflicted injuries can result in large fluctuations in their annual rates.

### Significance:

In New York State, suicide is the third leading cause of death for youth ages 15 through 19 years. Self-inflicted injury hospitalizations is an important indicator of suicide "attempts" and mental health status.

### NYS Findings:

- New York State youth ages 15 through 19 years are hospitalized for self-inflicted injuries four times more frequently than youth ages 10-14 years.
- In New York State, the average number and rate of hospitalizations resulting from self-inflicted injuries among youth in both age groups has declined in recent years. These hospitalizations declined among youth ages 15-19 years from 1,573 (134.8 per 100,000 youth ages 15-19 years) in 1993-95 to 1,362 (115.7 per 100,000) in 1996-98. Among youth ages 10-14 years, self-inflicted hospitalizations declined from 446 (38.0 per 100,000 youth ages 10-14 years) in 1993-95 to 330 (26.1 per 100,000) in 1996-98.
- In 1996-98, youth ages 15 through 19 years living in counties outside New York City were somewhat more likely to be hospitalized with self-inflicted injuries (120.7 per 100,000) than were youth living in New York City (107.8 per 100,000). In contrast, self-inflicted injury hospitalizations among youth ages 10 through 14 years were more prevalent in New York City (28.9 per 100,000) than in Rest of State (24.3 per 100,000).

## HOSPITALIZATIONS RESULTING FROM UNINTENTIONAL INJURIES number and rate per 100,000 children/youth ages birth-19 years

### Definition:

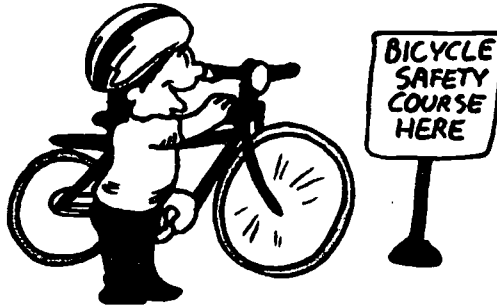
The unintentional injury rate is based on the number of hospitalizations for unintentional injuries per 100,000 children and youth ages birth through 19 years. This includes injuries caused by such occurrences as motor vehicle crashes, drowning, fires and falls.

### Significance:

Injuries that are so serious as to cause hospitalization may result in temporary or permanent disability. They are among the leading causes of death for children and youth and are one of the most preventable.

### NYS Findings:

- In 1997, there were 16,774 hospitalizations for unintentional injuries among New York State children ages birth through 19 years. This represents a 15 percent decline in the number of such hospitalizations in 1995 (19,771).
- In New York State, the rate of hospitalizations for unintentional injuries declined from 393.6 per 100,000 children and youth ages birth through 19 years in 1995 to 329.9 in 1997.
- Children and youth ages birth through 19 years living in New York City compared to their peers in Rest of State were more likely to be hospitalized for an unintentional injury in 1997 (386.0 per 100,000 children aged 0-19 vs. 292.7 per 100,000 children, respectively).

# Physical and Emotional Health

## INFANT MORTALITY (THREE YEAR AVERAGE) number and rate per 1,000 live births

### Definition:

**I**nfant mortality is the number of deaths to infants under one year of age. The annual number of these deaths per 1,000 live births occurring during the year is the infant mortality rate. Because infant deaths are relatively rare events in many counties, the infant mortality rates are presented here as three-year averages. This is necessary to improve the reliability (or stability) of the data. For example, in a small county, a serious tragedy such as a fatal fire or an automobile accident may cause the infant mortality rate to fluctuate greatly from one year to another.

### Significance:

Infant mortality is one of the most widely used indicators of the health and welfare of a population as it reflects the general state of maternal health and the effectiveness of primary health care systems. Infant mortality rates have declined steadily since the 1970s, primarily due to advances in neonatal care (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, January 2000). However, as of 1994, the United States ranked 25th among industrialized countries that report these rates to the World Health Organization (National Center for Health Statistics, August 1998).

Low birthweight is the most important predictor of infant mortality. In 1996, 64 percent of all infant deaths in the United States occurred to the 7.4 percent of infants born at low birthweight (<2500 grams). Other factors associated with higher rates of infant mortality include: maternal age (either mothers in their teens or older than 40), low maternal education, maternal smoking, low socioeconomic status, multiple birth and fourth or higher birth order (NCHS, August 1998).

National health objectives called for a reduction in the infant mortality rate to no more than 7 per 1,000 live births by the year 2000 (NCHS, 1996). Objectives for 2010 aim for a reduction in infant mortality to no more than 4.5 per 1,000 live births (DHHS, January 2000).

### NYS Findings:

- The infant mortality rate in New York State has declined steadily since 1970. An average of 1,873 infants died each year between 1995-97 at a rate of 7.1 deaths per 1,000 live births. This was a 14 percent decline over the 1992-94 rate of 8.3.
- New York State met the year 2000 national health objectives for infant mortality rate in both 1996 (6.9 infant deaths per 1,000 births) and 1997 (6.7) (NYS Department of Health, Bureau of Biometrics, 1999).
- Although New York City consistently has an infant mortality rate that is higher than Rest of State, the gap appears to be closing. In 1992-94, New York City's infant mortality rate was 9.6 per 1,000 live births compared to 7.1 in Rest of State. By 1995-97, the New York City rate had dropped to 7.8 and Rest of State to 6.5.

# Physical and Emotional Health

**LOW BIRTHWEIGHT BIRTHS (LESS THAN 2,500 GRAMS),  
number and percent of live births:**

## Definition:

Infants weighing less than 2,500 grams (5.5 pounds) at birth are considered to be low birthweight. The low birthweight rate is the number of low birthweight births per 100 live births for which a birthweight is known. This rate is presented as a percent.

## Significance:

Low birthweight is a major cause of infant mortality and compromised health and development in surviving infants (Paneth, Spring 1995). Low birthweight is associated with increased incidence of cerebral palsy, hydrocephalus, microcephaly, blindness, deafness, chronic lung disease and seizures. While most low birthweight infants have normal outcomes, as a group they have higher rates of illness, neurodevelopmental problems and subnormal growth. As the birthweight decreases, children have a greater likelihood of these outcomes. (Hack, M.; Klein, N.; & Taylor, H. G., Spring 1995). Ten percent of all health costs for children can be attributed to low birthweight (Lewit, E.; Baker, L. S.; Corman, H.; Shiono, P. H., Spring 1995).

Pre-term delivery underlies most low birthweight. While the etiology of pre-term birth remains unknown, several factors are associated with pre-term and low birthweight births. Lifestyle behaviors such as cigarette smoking, insufficient weight gain or nutritional intake during pregnancy and use of other drugs are known risk factors. Socioeconomic disadvantage is also closely related to low birthweight. Mothers who are young, have less than a high school education and are not married are at the greatest risk of low socioeconomic status and delivering low birthweight babies (Chomitz, V.R.; Cheung, L.W.Y.; and Lieberman, Spring 1995).

Healthy People 2000 objectives call for a national reduction in the incidence of low birthweight to no more than 5 percent of live births by year 2000 (National Center for Health Statistics, 1996). The New York State Public Health Council has identified healthy births as a priority area for public health action and has set an objective to reduce low birthweight births to no more than 5.5 percent by 2006 (New York State Public Health Council, September 1996).

## NYS Findings:

- The percent of low birthweight births in New York State has remained very consistent over the past ten years. In 1997, 20,145 babies born in New York State weighed less than 2,500 grams (7.8% of all births with a known weight). This percentage falls short of the state and national objectives.
- In 1997, low birthweight birth rates were higher in New York City (8.8%) than in Rest of State (7.0%).

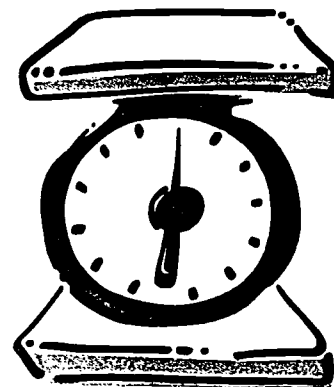

# Physical and Emotional Health

## SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASES (THREE-YEAR AVERAGE), number and rate per 100,000 youth ages 15-19 years

### Definition:

**S**yphilis is an infection caused by the spirochete *Treponema pallidum*, which penetrates broken skin or mucous membranes during sexual contact. Early syphilis includes any of the first three stages of syphilis – primary, secondary or early latent (of less than one year's duration).

Gonorrhea (*Neisseria gonorrhoeae*) is an infection that grows and multiplies quickly in moist, warm areas of the body including the urethra, the throat and the rectum. In women, the cervix is often the site of infection.

The incidence rates for early syphilis and gonorrhea are based on the number of reported cases of each sexually transmitted disease (STD) per 100,000 teens ages 15 through 19 years. Because the incidence of early syphilis and gonorrhea is a relatively rare event in many counties, both the counts and rates presented here are based on three-year averages.

### Significance:

Sexually transmissible diseases, frequently yielding no or mild symptoms, are a major cause of morbidity among adolescents. Untreated, they are readily spread among sexually active youth and can produce serious long-term consequences, including:

- › pelvic inflammatory disease, ectopic pregnancy, infertility and chronic pelvic pain;
- › transmission of serious or fatal infection to the fetus or newborn which can permanently damage the brain, spinal cord, eyes, auditory nerves, respiratory or immune system; and
- › increased risk of spontaneous abortion, stillbirth or pre-term delivery (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, January 2000).

Healthy People 2000 objectives seek to reduce the rate of gonorrhea infection among adolescents ages 15 through 19 years to no more than 375 per 100,000 youth in that population group.

### NYS Findings:

- ➔ In 1995-97, an average 6.121 New York State youth ages 15 through 19 years were reported as having gonorrhea for a rate of 523.1 per 100,000. This represents a decline from the 1992-94 rate of 616.2/100,000.
- ➔ Youth living in New York City in 1995-97, were more than twice as likely to be infected with gonorrhea (782.5/100,000 youth ages 15-19 years) than were youth living in Rest of State (358.9).
- ➔ The rate of early syphilis among New York State youth ages 15 through 19 years has declined substantially over the 1990's – down from an average of 24.8 per 100,000 in 1992-94 to 5.3 per 100,000 in 1995-97. New York City showed the greatest decline reducing its adolescent rate for early syphilis from 51.6 in 1992-94 to 10.4 in 1995-97.

# Goal # 4

Children will leave school prepared to live, learn and work in a community as contributing members of society

## Objectives:

- Children will come to school ready to learn.
- Students will meet or exceed high standards for academic performance and demonstrate knowledge and skills required for lifelong learning and self-sufficiency in a dynamic world.
- Students will be educated in a safe, supportive, drug free and nurturing environment.
- Students will stay in school until successful completion.



# Education

## ANNUAL DROPOUTS — PUBLIC SCHOOLS, number and percent of students enrolled in grades 9-12.

### Definition:

In New York State, the annual dropout rate refers to the proportion of students in grades 9 through 12 who left school prior to graduation for any reason, except death and did not enter another school or high school equivalency preparation program. Annual high school dropout percents are calculated by dividing the number of students who drop out during a single year by the grade 9 through 12 enrollment for that year and multiplying by 100.

### Significance:

Beyond its inherent message of failure for students who drop out, young people who do not complete high school are at a great disadvantage in today's society. Dropouts have far higher unemployment rates than high school graduates. When employed, they earn less, are more likely to be in semi-skilled manual jobs and work at jobs with poorer working conditions. The social, economic and personal costs include foregone tax revenues, decreased productivity, increased demand for and reliance on social services, increased probability of criminal activity, reduced political participation and generally poorer health.

### NOTE:

Annual dropout rates are not readily calculable for the boroughs (counties) of New York City, since so many students cross borough lines to attend school.

### NYS Findings:

- In 1996/97, 5.3 percent of New York City public school students left school prior to graduation. The other large city school districts (Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse and Yonkers) had a combined dropout rate of 4.6 percent, which was more than twice the dropout rate of 2.2 percent for all public schools in Rest of State.
- While the percent of students dropping out in the State remained fairly stable at about 4 percent from 1990/91 through 1994/95, the 3.4 percent of dropouts in New York State in 1996/97 reflects a 33 percent decrease since 1985/86 (5.1%).
- In 1996/97, 59.9 percent of students who dropped out of school attended New York City public schools.
- The counties outside New York City in which the highest percentages of students dropping out of school were: Montgomery (4.2%); Cortland (4.2%); Oswego (4.2%); and Chemung (4.1%).

## HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES INTENDING TO ENROLL COLLEGE – PUBLIC SCHOOLS number and percent of graduating seniors

### Definition:

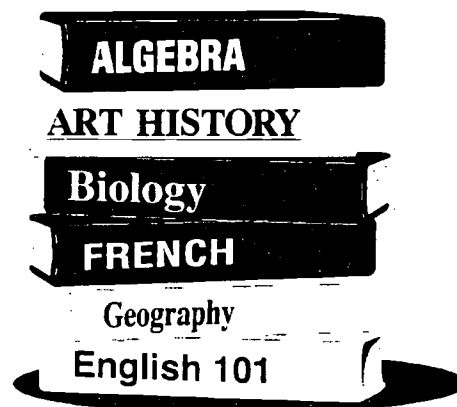
The rate of college bound New York State high school graduates is based on secondary school reports of the number of seniors who intend to enroll in four-year and two-year postsecondary institutions as well as other post-secondary education programs divided by the total number of graduating seniors.

### Significance:

Educational attainment is strongly related to future earnings. An educated workforce is essential to a healthy State economy.

### NYS Findings:

- The statewide rate of college bound high school graduates, both public and non-public schools combined, in 1997 (84.3%) was substantially higher than in 1975 (67.3%), but has not changed significantly since 1991 (82.0%).
- More than 8 in 10 high school graduates planned to pursue some form of postsecondary education in 1997. More than half planned to attend a four-year college.
- A greater percentage of non-public than public school graduates intended to continue their education, 92.0 percent compared to 82.7 percent, respectively.
- Non-public school students were much more likely (73.0%) than public school students (53.2%) to plan to attend four-year institutions.
- The percent of college bound New York City public high school graduates (85.7%) is slightly higher than the percent of college-bound Rest of State public high school graduates (81.6%).

## HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES RECEIVING REGENTS DIPLOMAS—PUBLIC SCHOOLS number and percent of graduates

### Definition:

Regents diplomas are awarded to students who have both passed a series of Regents examinations, demonstrating a certain level of achievement and passed the prescribed coursework.

### Significance:

In New York State, a Regents diploma signifies rigorous effort and excellent accomplishment. The State minimum requirements for a Regents-endorsed diploma are more rigorous than those for a local high school diploma. The percentage of students receiving Regents diplomas each year is an indicator of attainment for the educational system.

To implement new, higher standards for all students, the less rigorous Regents Competency Tests (RCTs) are being phased out. This process was begun with students first entering grade 9 in 1996 and will be almost completed in 1999. Incoming freshmen will be required to earn passing marks on Regents examinations in all four core subject areas to receive a high school diploma.

### NYS Findings:

- In 1997/98, three-quarters of public and non-public secondary schools statewide awarded Regents diplomas, including 93 percent of public schools and 40 percent of non-public schools.
- In 1997/98, 43.4 percent of New York State's public high school graduates received Regents diplomas. This figure represents a slow but steady increase since 1993/94.
- In 1997/98, 22.3 percent of public high school graduates in New York City received a Regents diploma compared to 51.8 percent in Rest of State. This disparity in the percent of regents diplomas being awarded between New York City and Rest of State has remained fairly constant since 1989/90.
- In 1997/98, public high schools in Ontario (61.4%), Saratoga (59.3%), Nassau (58.8%) and Montgomery (58.5%) Counties had the highest percentages of students graduating with Regents diplomas. While graduates in New York City counties earned the lowest percentages of Regents diplomas in New York State, graduates in Westchester (38.2%), Greene (42.2%) and Delaware (42.3%) Counties earned the lowest percentages of Regents diplomas among counties outside of New York City.

## PUPIL EVALUATION PROGRAM (PEP) TEST SCORES — Public Schools number and percent at or above State Reference Point (SRP) or Quality Point (QP)

### Definition:

In the elementary grades, Pupil Evaluation Program (PEP) Tests have been the primary State measures of student performance. Students have taken criterion-referenced PEP reading and mathematics tests at the end of grades 3 and 6 and a writing test at the end of grade 5.

### Significance:

Students scoring at or above the State Reference Point (SRP) are considered to be making adequate progress in developing the basic skills of reading comprehension, mathematics and writing. Students who score at or above the Quality Point (QP) are considered to have achieved mastery of State content standards in that area. All pupils scoring below the designated SRP are required by regulation to be provided remediation.

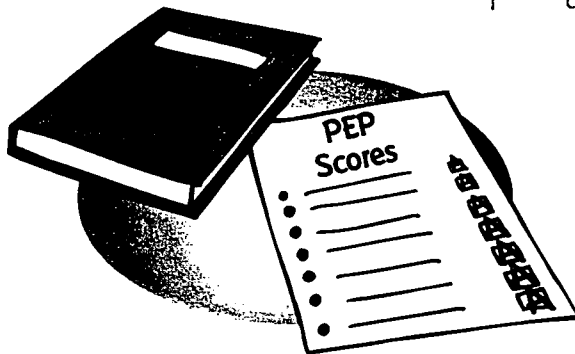
The 1997/98 school year is the last year PEP Tests were administered. New assessments in English language and mathematics will be administered to grades 4 and 8 beginning in the 1998/99 school year. For more information, visit the State Education Website at: [www.nysed.gov](http://www.nysed.gov).

### NOTE:

Test scores are not available by county for non-public school students. With the exception of data on students in limited English proficiency programs, the data presented in this report refer to public school students only. ### NYS Findings:

- In 1997/98, 83.7 percent of New York State's public school students scored at or above the SRP in third grade reading and 95.7 percent scored at or above the SRP in third grade mathematics. While mathematics scores remained steady, this reflects a 6 percent increase in reading scores since 1995/96. This reflects a 10 percent increase in third grade reading scores and a one percent increase in mathematics scores in New York City between 1995/96 and 1997/98.
- Grade 6 reading scores in New York State increased slightly in 1997/98, with 83.4 percent of all public school students scoring at or above the SRP compared to 82.2 percent in 1995/96.
- In 1997/98, New York City shows a 10 percent increase in public school third grade students scoring at or above the third grade reading SRP. However, New York City continues to show a smaller percentage of public school third grade students scoring at or above the third grade reading SRP (64.9%) versus Rest of State public schools (94.0%). Similar differences are demonstrated in sixth grade reading, 63.2 percent in New York City versus 93.1 percent in Rest of State score at or above the SRP. Smaller but significant scoring differences are shown for public school third grade mathematics, 89.3 percent versus 99.2 percent and sixth grade mathematics, 90.7 percent versus 98.9 percent, respectively.
- In 1997/98, 48.0 percent of New York State's public school students scored at or above the mastery level in sixth grade reading. In New York City, 25.2 percent of the students scored above the mastery level in sixth grade reading compared to 58.8 percent in Rest of State.

## STUDENTS WITH LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY—PUBLIC AND NON-PUBLIC SCHOOLS number and percent of students in pre-K-grade 12

### Definition:

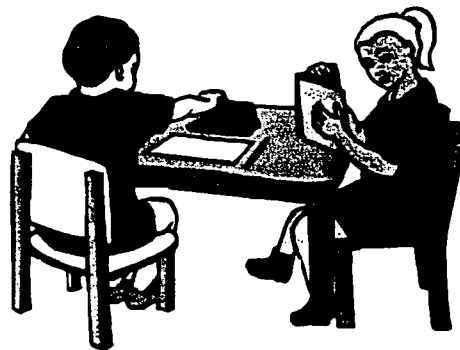
Limited English Proficiency (LEP) students in pre-Kindergarten through grade 12 come from a home where a language other than English is spoken and score at or below the 40th percentile on an English language assessment instrument.

### Significance:

Limited proficiency in English may hinder children's abilities to benefit from their educational experience and achieve high standards. Identified students are entitled to special instruction and assessment services to assist them in learning English and achieving objectives in other academic areas. These services are of two general types: 1) Bilingual Education Programs – implemented in school districts which have an enrollment of 20 or more LEP students of the same grade level assigned to the same building and all of whom have the same native language, which is other than English. 2) Free Standing English as a Second Language – implemented in school districts which have fewer than 20 LEP pupils at the same grade level assigned to a building who speak the same language other than English.

### NYS Findings:

- One hundred thirty-five languages were spoken by over 247,060 LEP students in New York State in 1997/98. Five languages account for the majority of LEP students. Those languages were Spanish, Chinese, Russian, Haitian-Creole and Urdu.
- In 1997/98, the number of LEP students served by public and non-public schools was 247,060. This represented 7.3 percent of the students in New York State.
- LEP students were concentrated in New York City, where public and non-public schools enrolled 79 percent of all identified LEP students in the State. In 1997/98, 14.3 percent of New York City's students were identified as being limited English proficient, five and a half times the percentage (2.6%) in Rest of State.
- The percentage of LEP students in New York City in public and non-public schools decreased from 17.2 percent in 1995/96 to 14.3 percent in 1997/98.

# Citizenship

## Goal #



Children and youth will demonstrate good citizenship as law-abiding, contributing members of their families, schools and communities.

### Objectives:

- ▣ Children and youth will assume personal responsibility for their behavior.

## ADOLESCENT ARRESTS FOR PROPERTY AND VIOLENT CRIMES number and rate per 1,000 youth ages 10-19 years

### Definition:

New York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) violent index crimes include murder, non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Property index crimes include burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. An arrest is counted on each separate occasion a person is taken into custody, notified or cited by a law enforcement official. An arrest is recorded in the jurisdiction where it occurs (this jurisdiction is not necessarily where the crime occurred), and only the most serious offense that was committed during a crime incident or multiple crime incidents is recorded. It is important to note that many persons who commit crimes are never arrested, a single arrest can involve multiple crime incidents, and more than one person can be arrested for the same crime incident. The adolescent arrest rates are calculated by dividing the number of reported adolescent arrests for violent and property index crimes (or, for adolescents who are not treated as adults, for acts which would constitute violent and property index crimes if committed by an adult) by an estimate of the population of youth in the appropriate age category.

### Significance:

The reasons why adolescents misbehave or commit crimes are very complex. Most adolescent behaviors simply represent limit-testing and experimentation with adult activities. Some engage in more serious acts of delinquency or crime that may bring them to the attention of the juvenile or criminal justice systems. In these cases, there is cause for concern that adolescents are not preparing to assume responsible adult roles. Still others commit serious criminal acts, including acts of violence, that indelibly mark their lives as well as the lives of their victims.

Arrests of adolescents are handled by different parts of the justice system, as determined by the age of the youth and the type of offense. In general, arrests for youth ages 15 years and under are handled by the juvenile justice or family court system. Arrests for youth ages 16 years and older are prosecuted in the criminal court system. The majority of other states see youth up through the age of 17 years in the family or juvenile court system. Under New York's laws governing juvenile offenders, youth ages 13 through 15 years can be prosecuted in the criminal court system for specified serious offenses.

The numbers of arrests in the New York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) for violent and property index offenses are primarily a gauge of law enforcement's response to crime. These numbers are the best official indicator of the relative level of criminal activity among youth throughout New York State. A distinction is made between violent and property offenses because the arrest trends for these two categories generally differ. Number of arrests may reflect level of police activity rather than level of crime. Number of arrests may reflect multiple arrests of an individual. Arrests may not equate to convictions or adjudications.

### NYS Findings:

- There were 60,282 arrests for violent and property index crimes in New York State during 1997 involving youth 10 through 19 years of age. Thirty-four percent of these arrests were for violent crimes.
- In 1997, 74 percent of the arrests for violent index crimes involving youth ages 10 through 19 years occurred in New York City, despite the fact that about 40 percent of the State's youth in this age range lived there. In contrast, New York City accounted for only 30 percent of the State's adolescent arrests for property index crimes.
- Compared to 1995, arrest rates per 1,000 youth (in respective age categories) in 1997 for violent index crimes were 10 percent lower for youths ages 16 through 19 years and 19 percent lower for youths ages 13 through 15 years. Violent index arrest rates for youth ages 10 through 12 years were 31 percent lower. Arrest rates for property index crimes were 1 percent higher for youths ages 16 through 19 years, 7 percent lower for youths ages 13 through 15 years and 10 percent lower for youths ages 10 through 12 years.
- In New York City, three in five of the 1997 arrests for index offenses involving youths ages 10 through 19 years were for violent index offenses. Outside New York City, only one in five of the youths in this age group arrested for index crimes was charged with a violent index offense.

## ARRESTS FOR DRUG USE/POSSESSION/SALE/DUI number and rate per 10,000 youth ages 10-20 years

### Definition:

The youth drug arrest rate is based on the number of arrests for the use, possession or sale of drugs, public narcotic intoxication or driving under the influence (DUI) of drugs, per 10,000 youth 10 through 20 years of age.

### Significance:

Regular use of controlled substances is strongly related to health, mental health, educational attainment and other social problems for youth. For example, a landmark longitudinal study, funded by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, examined the causes and relationships between drug abuse and urban delinquency (Huizinga, Loeber and Thornberry, 1994). The study found that while controlling for age, gender and ethnic group, the greater a youth's involvement in drug use, the more serious his or her delinquency, and vice versa. The evidence is growing that preventing early-aged drug use can reduce serious delinquency, alcohol problems and drug addiction in older adolescents and young adults.

### NOTE:

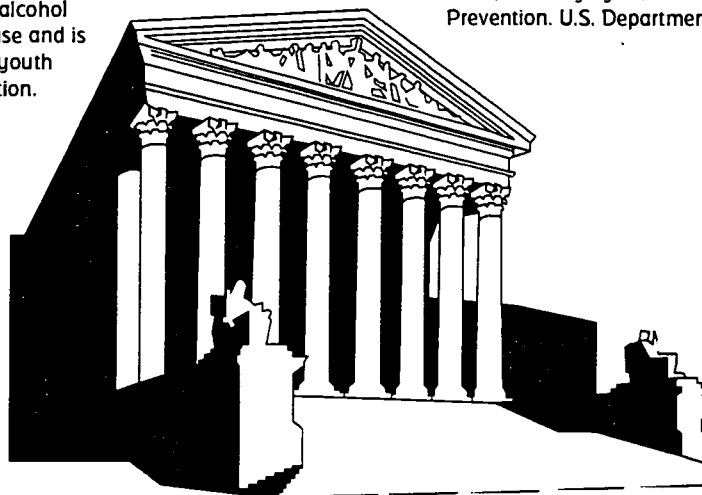
Community indicators are not direct measures of the population's behavior, but are instead measures of the performance of the community service systems that generate them. Indicator data produced by public service or social control agencies are affected by policy shifts, resource fluctuations, degree of centralization and standardization, local reporting practices and local service delivery differences. Local qualitative information regarding the "role" of the indicator in the context of its service setting must be obtained and applied when interpreting the results of indicator-based studies. The rate of youth drug arrests is a direct measure of law enforcement response to youth and alcohol and other drug (AOD) use and is an indirect measure of youth AOD use in the population.

### NYS Findings:

- The drug arrest rate of New York State youth ages 10 through 20 years increased 16 percent from 1995 to 1997, with New York City accounting for 61 percent of this increase.
- About 38 percent of New York State youth ages 10 through 20 years reside in New York City, however, 61 percent of drug arrests within this age group were in New York City in 1997.
- The percentage increase in youth drug arrests has not risen as dramatically between 1995 to 1997 (16%) compared to the percentage increase between 1993 to 1995 (55%). New York City youth account for a larger percentage of drug arrests in 1997 (61%) than in 1995 (57%).
- The youth drug arrest rate in upstate New York in 1997, was about 40 percent of the New York City drug arrest rate. However, drug arrests among youth is not just a large urban problem. Of the five upstate New York counties with the highest rate of youth drug arrests in 1997, only Albany County encompasses a city with a population greater than 100,000. Greene, Wyoming and Ulster Counties are rural counties and Orange County is mostly suburban.

## DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED ARRESTS AND INTOXICATED YOUTH INVOLVED IN A FEDERAL ACCIDENT number and rate per 10,000 youth ages 16-20 years

### Definition:

**Y**outh arrest rate for driving while intoxicated (DWI) is defined as the number of arrests for driving while intoxicated, per 10,000 youth ages 16 through 20 years. Youth involved in auto accidents while intoxicated is defined as the number of youth who were intoxicated and involved in an automobile accident (as a driver, passenger or pedestrian), per 10,000 youth ages 16 through 20 years.

### Significance:

The use of alcohol impairs vision, cognitive judgement, coordination and motor skills and can inhibit short term memory and the ability to concentrate. At a very low blood alcohol content (BAC) (e.g., .02-.03), alcohol also impairs the ability to attend and respond to complex stimuli, such as road and traffic conditions, speed, traffic control devices, lane position, pedestrians, other vehicles, roadway signs, etc. (Brick, 1996). Youth have less driving experience than adults which compounded with alcohol puts youth at an increased risk of auto accidents, injury and death.

### NOTE:

New York City and Rest of State have varying driving privileges for people learning to drive and for drivers under 18 years of age. While Long Island Counties and Rest of State have restrictions for junior license drivers, under no circumstances can drivers with a junior license drive in New York City. However, upon completion of a state-approved high school or college driver education course, a driver 17 years of age is eligible for a regular license (Class D), enabling them to drive in New York City.

### NYS Findings:

- › Youth DWI arrests in New York State are on the increase. Although youth DWI arrests declined dramatically both nationwide and in New York State through the first half of the 1990's, DWI arrest rate among youth in New York State increased 17 percent from 1995 to 1997.
- › A great majority of New York State youth DWI arrests occur outside New York City (96% in 1997). However, a greater percent of youths 16 and 17 years of age living outside of New York City have drivers licenses (for youths 16 years of age, ROS vs. NYC: 31.4% vs. 3.7%; for youths 17 years of age, ROS vs. NYC: 62.7% vs. 13.6%).
- › The number of alcohol-related traffic accidents involving youth between the ages of 16 through 20 years has increased 7 percent in New York State from 1995 to 1997.
- › Five percent of Rest of State youth ages 17 through 18 years and 10 percent of Rest of State youth ages 19 through 20 years reported that they have driven while intoxicated in the past month (OASAS Youth Alcohol Survey, 1996). If these results were representative of all youth ages 17 through 20 years outside New York City, approximately 50,000 youth would have driven while intoxicated in one month in 1996.
- › One quarter of Rest of State youth ages 16 through 20 years reported they were a passenger in a motor vehicle operated by an alcohol-impaired driver in the past month (OASAS Youth Alcohol Survey, 1996). If these results were representative of all youth 16 through 20 years outside New York City, approximately 195,000 youth would have been a passenger of an alcohol-impaired driver in one month in 1996.

## HOSPITALIZATIONS RESULTING FROM ASSAULT (THREE-YEAR AVERAGES) number and rate per 100,000 youth ages 10-19 years

### Definition:

The assault hospitalization rate is based on the number of discharges for hospitalizations resulting from an assault among youth ages 10 through 19 years per 100,000 population in this age group. Because the number of children hospitalized for assault injuries is very low in many counties in New York State, the assault hospitalization rates are presented here as three-year averages. Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data in counties with small populations where slight variations in the numbers of children hospitalized for assault injuries can result in large fluctuations in their annual rates. The mid-year population estimate is used as the denominator in calculating the rate.

### Significance:

The rate of hospitalizations resulting from an assault is an important indicator of the relative safety of the home and community environments in which children are being raised.

Promoting safe communities by reducing violent and abusive behavior has been identified as a priority area by both the national Healthy People 2000 and Communities Working Together for a Healthier New York (NYS Public Health Council, September 1996).

### NYS Findings:

- In New York State, an average 2,404 youth between the ages of 10 and 19 years were hospitalized due to an assault during the years 1993-95 for an average annual rate of 102.7 hospitalizations per 100,000 youth ages 10 through 19 years. During 1996-98, both the number and rate of such hospitalizations declined to 1,684 and 68.9, respectively.
- In both 1993-95 and 1996-98, most (73%) of New York State's hospitalizations due to assaults occurred among youth living in New York City. In 1996-98, an average 129.1 per 100,000 New York City youth ages 10 through 19 years were hospitalized as a result of an assault compared to 30.5 per 100,000 youth in Rest of State.

# Citizenship

## PERSONS IN NEED OF SUPERVISION (PINS) CASES OPENED FOR SERVICES, number and rate per 1,000 youth ages 10-15 years

### Definition:

Persons in Need of Supervision (PINS) are juveniles less than 16 years of age for whom complaints were filed with local probation departments because of non-criminal misconduct, such as truancy from school, incorrigibility, ungovernability or habitual disobedience. Complainants in these cases are generally parents or school officials who are seeking the formal intervention of the family court to control a juvenile's misconduct. PINS cases are recorded in the county in which a PINS complaint is filed. Only the aggregate number of cases is reported by local probation departments to the State, making it impossible to present frequencies and rates by age categories. The rate for PINS cases is calculated by dividing the number of PINS cases opened by an estimate of youth 10 through 15 years of age; the population of youth less than 10 years of age was excluded, because few PINS complaints are filed for juveniles in this lower age category.



### Significance:

The number of PINS cases opened by local probation departments is the best official indicator of the level of non-criminal misconduct among youth that is perceived as sufficiently serious by parents, school officials or other authorities to warrant the family court's intervention.

### NYS Findings:

- There were 21,758 persons in need of supervision (PINS) cases reported opened by local probation departments in New York State during 1997. Twenty-five percent of these cases were opened in New York City.
- Compared to 1995, there was a 14 percent increase statewide in the number of PINS cases opened in 1997. Regionally, the number of PINS cases opened increased by 6 percent in New York City. Rest of State saw a 17 percent increase.
- The number of PINS cases opened in 1997 per 1,000 children 10 through 15 years of age was substantially lower in New York City than in Rest of State (rate of 9.8 vs. 18.3).
- Within New York City, rates for PINS cases opened were substantially higher in Bronx County (17.0) compared to the other four counties: Kings (8.1), New York (8.3), Queens (8.3) and Richmond (7.6).
- PINS case rates for three of the four surrounding suburban New York City counties were similarly low: Nassau County (8.7), Suffolk County (8.2), Rockland (8.2) and Westchester County (15.2).
- Among the 53 remaining counties, 8 counties have PINS case rates less than 15 per 1,000 children 10 through 15 years of age, 10 counties have rates that range from 15.0 to 20.0, and 35 counties have rates exceeding 20.0.

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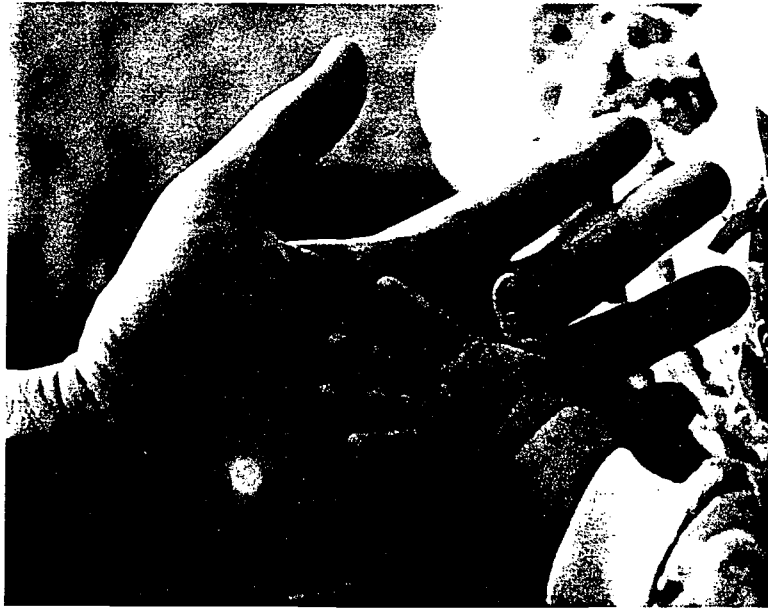

# Goal # 6

Families will provide children with safe, stable and nurturing environments.

## Objectives:

- ▶▶▶ Parents/caregivers will provide children with a stable family relationship.
- ▶▶▶ Parents/caregivers will possess and practice adequate child rearing skills.
- ▶▶▶ Parents will be literate.
- ▶▶▶ Parents/caregivers will be positively involved in their children's learning.
- ▶▶▶ Parents/caregivers will have the knowledge and ability to access support services for their children.
- ▶▶▶ Parents/caregivers will provide their children with households free from physical and emotional abuse, neglect and domestic violence.
- ▶▶▶ Parents/caregivers will provide their children with households free from alcohol and other substance abuse.



# Family

## CHILDREN AND YOUTH IN FOSTER CARE

### Definition:

Children in foster care are those children and youth who are in the care and custody of the Commissioner of the local Department of Social Services. The rate of foster care is calculated by dividing the number of children in placement on December 31 of a given year by the population of children and youth from birth through 17 years of age during that year and multiplying by 1,000.

### Significance:

Children are placed into foster care for a wide variety of reasons including: safety issues, their families are at least temporarily unable to care for them, specialized care or treatment is needed or behavioral problems have led to a placement. Since children in foster care make up over 80 percent of those in out-of-home care in New York State, this measure also provides insight into the extent to which children are removed from their homes and placed in out-of-home care in New York State.

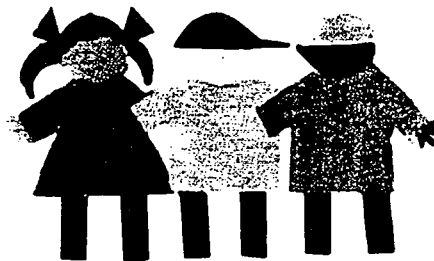
### NYS Findings:

- In 1998, the foster care rate in New York State was 11.5 per 1,000 children birth through 17 years of age. This reflects a decrease from 12 per 1,000 children/youth in 1996.
- Children in New York City experience foster care placement much more frequently than children in Rest of State. The placement rate for New York City in 1998, is 22 children per 1,000, while in Rest of State it is only 5 per 1,000. This pattern is consistent with that found in 1996, when 23 children per 1,000 were in foster care in New York City, and only 5 per 1,000 children and youth in Rest of State were placed in foster care.

# Family

## INDICATED REPORTS OF CHILD ABUSE AND MALTREATMENT number and rate per 1,000 families

### Definition:

The State Central Register receives reports concerning alleged incidents of abuse and neglect in families and certain publicly licensed settings. A report becomes "indicated" when there is some credible evidence that a child has experienced abuse or neglect. The rate of child abuse and maltreatment is determined by dividing the total number of indicated reports in a given year by the total number of families in that same year and multiplying by 1,000.

### Significance:

Victims of child abuse and neglect can suffer long-term social and psychological consequences. Disproportionate numbers of runaway and homeless youth, youth in residential placements in the juvenile justice system and adults incarcerated in the criminal justice system have histories of being abused as children. Abused and neglected children are at higher risk of abusing their own children when they become parents.

Children may suffer from child abuse and neglect regardless of their socioeconomic status and racial or ethnic background. Incidents of abuse and neglect most frequently occur in the victim's own home and are perpetrated by someone they know.

The number of indicated reports of child abuse and neglect is an important measure of the incidence of child abuse and neglect in New York State. It should be noted, however, that the rate of indicated reports among families is affected by a number of factors other than the actual incidence of abuse and neglect. Therefore, some caution is required in drawing conclusions concerning the overall prevalence of abuse and neglect or differences between counties. First, some cases of abuse and neglect are never reported. Second, some incidents are reported more than once and several reports may relate to a single family. Third, reports tend to rise for reasons unrelated to the actual prevalence of abuse and neglect, such as a highly publicized case, a public awareness campaign or an addition to the list of those required to report suspected abuse and neglect (i.e., mandated reporters). Finally, sufficient evidence may not be available to "indicate" the report. The high rates of indicated abuse or neglect reports in some counties may reflect better reporting or reliance on lower standards of evidence to indicate cases. Conversely, low rates may be the result of low reporting or stricter standards of evidence.

### NYS Findings:

- In 1996, 19.5 families per 1,000 families in New York State had an indicated report of child abuse or neglect. By 1998, this figure had risen to almost 23 per 1,000 families.
- The rate at which families have an indicated report of child abuse or neglect in 1998 is somewhat higher in New York City (25 per 1,000 families) than in Rest of State (21 per 1,000 families). This pattern is consistent with that found in 1996 (21 per 1,000 families in New York City vs. 19 per 1,000 families in Rest of State).
- In 1998, high rates of indicated child abuse and neglect cases were found in both urban and rural counties. Chemung (60.5/1000) had the highest rate, followed by Cortland (38.4/1000), Albany (37/1000) and Cattaraugus (36.9/1000).
- At the same time low rates were also found in both urban and rural counties, e.g., Westchester 14.1/1,000 and Ulster 15.8/1,000, respectively.

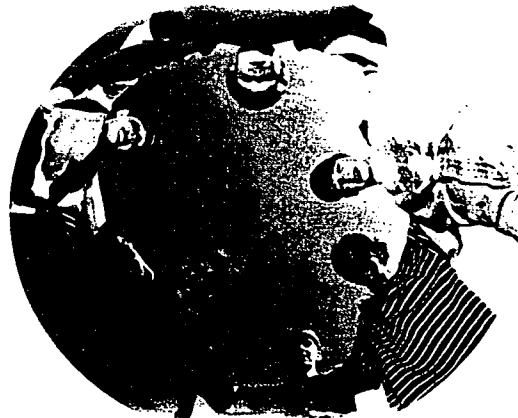

# Goal # 7

New York State communities will provide children, youth and families with healthy, safe and thriving environments.

## Objectives:

- Communities will be economically sound.
- The environment will be free of pollutants (e.g., air and water quality will meet healthful standards).

# Goal # 8

New York State communities will provide children, youth and their families with opportunities to help them meet their needs for physical, social, moral and emotional growth.

# Community

## BIRTHS TO WOMEN WITH PRIMARY FINANCIAL COVERAGE OF MEDICAID OR SELF-PAY number and percent of live births:

### Definition:

The percent of Medicaid or self-pay births is the number of all live births to women whose primary financial coverage for delivery was recorded as either self-pay or Medicaid on the birth certificate in relation to all live births for which the financial coverage is known in a given year. The source of primary financial coverage for delivery is recorded on the birth certificate at the time of birth.

### Significance:

This indicator is used as a measure of socioeconomic status for an area when the census data become outdated and other data are unavailable. If the age distribution of a community is known, it is useful as a proxy for estimation of the number of poor and near poor in a community.

In addition, a parent's employment-related insurance coverage and eligibility for Child Health Plus (Child Health Plus A, formerly Medicaid, and Child Health Plus B, the current Child Health Plus) are the most important factors in determining whether children have health insurance. Lack of insurance coverage is the single most significant financial barrier to health care. When a parent's employer does not offer health insurance benefits and a parent is unable to afford the cost of family health insurance, children may not receive the primary and preventive care that improves health outcomes.

New York State has taken steps to overcome this barrier. New York State's Child Health Plus is designed to provide access to comprehensive health coverage for all children through the age of 18 years (see below for contact information).

### NYS Findings:

- In 1997, 41.8 percent of all births to New York State residents were either paid by Medicaid or by the mother herself. This represents a slight decline from the 1995 rate of 43.5 percent.
- During 1997, births in New York City were more than twice as likely to be paid by Medicaid/self-pay than were births in Rest of State (57.7% vs. 27.9%, respectively).

## FIREARM RELATED INDEX CRIMES, number and rate per 1,000 general population:

### Definition:

**N**ew York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Index Crimes track whether a firearm was present during the commission of a murder, forcible rape, robbery or aggravated assault. A reported crime is recorded in the jurisdiction where it occurs, and only the most serious offense that was committed during a criminal incident is recorded. The firearm-related crime rate is the number of reported UCR crimes of murder, forcible rape, robbery or aggravated assault where a firearm was present divided by an estimate of the population of persons of all ages in the general population and multiplied by 1,000.

### Significance:

The number of violent index crimes involving guns that are known to the police is the best official indicator of the frequency with which deadly weapons are used to commit serious violent crimes.

### NYS Findings:

- There were 19,454 firearm-related index crimes reported to the police in New York State during 1997 compared to 31,204 in 1995. This difference represents a 38 percent decline in the number of firearm-related index crimes.
- In New York City, the percentage of the violent index crimes reported to the police that involved a firearm dropped from 22 percent in 1995 to 15 percent in 1997. Outside New York City, this percentage dropped from 17 percent in 1995 to 16 percent in 1997.
- In 1997, 73 percent of the firearm-related index crimes reported statewide occurred in New York City, despite the fact that about 40 percent of the total State population lived there. In 1995, New York City accounted for 79 percent of these crimes.
- Compared to 1995, New York City's 1997 rate per 1,000 persons of firearm-related index crimes decreased 44 percent, dropping from 3.4 to 1.9 crimes per 1,000 persons. This rate showed a smaller decline of 17 percent for Rest of State, dropping from 0.6 to 0.5 crimes per 1,000 persons outside New York City.



## Governor Pataki Signs Legislation to Combat Gun Violence . . .

On August 9, 2000, Governor George E. Pataki signed into law comprehensive legislation to combat gun violence, including a provision that makes New York the first State to close the so-called gun show loophole by requiring background checks on prospective purchasers for all sales at all gun shows.

The law also requires that firearms be sold with child safety locks; imposes a State ban on assault weapons; raises the minimum age to obtain a permit to purchase a handgun to 21 years old; implements a DNA for Handguns Program; establishes a Gun Trafficking Interdiction Program; and, directs a study to be conducted on "smart gun" technology.

*"This important legislation will help make our streets safer by reducing gun violence in communities across our State," Governor Pataki said. "These common-sense measures will help keep guns out of the hands of criminals and away from children."*

*"While New York State leads the nation with a 39 percent drop in violent crime since 1994, we still have too much gun violence in our communities," the Governor said. "Each year more New Yorkers are killed by guns than die in car crashes—and that must change. This new law will help."*

## PROPERTY AND VIOLENT INDEX CRIMES KNOWN TO THE POLICE number and rate per 1,000 persons in general population

### Definition:

New York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Index Crimes include serious violent and property crimes reported or otherwise known to the police. Violent index crimes include murder, non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Property index crimes include burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. A reported crime is recorded in the jurisdiction where it occurs, and only the most serious offense that was committed during a criminal incident is recorded. The crime rate is the number of reported UCR index crimes divided by an estimate of the general population and multiplied by 1,000.

### Significance:

There are no county-level victimization measures. This is not a measure of victimization, because some crimes are not reported or otherwise known by the police. The number of violent and property UCR index offenses reported or otherwise known to the police are the best official indicators of the relative level of criminal activity throughout New York State. A distinction is made between violent and property offenses, because crime trends for these two categories generally differ.

### NYS Findings:

- There were 709,447 violent and property index crimes reported to the police in New York State during 1997. Eighteen percent of these crimes involved violent index offenses.
- In 1997, 74 percent of the reported statewide violent index crimes and 45 percent of property index crimes occurred in New York City, despite the fact that about 40 percent of the State's population resides in New York City.
- Compared to 1995, New York City's 1997 rates for reported index crime per 1,000 persons decreased 19 percent for violent index offenses (from 15.6 to 12.6) and 20 percent for property index offenses (from 44.8 to 35.7). In contrast, Rest of State saw violent index offense rates per 1,000 persons decrease 14 percent (from 3.5 to 3.0) and property index offense rates drop 8 percent (from 32.0 to 29.6).
- In New York City, one in four of the index crimes reported to police in 1997 involved a violent index offense. Outside New York City, only one in ten reported crimes involved a violent index offense.

## RESIDENT CIVILIAN UNEMPLOYMENT number and rate per 100 persons 16 years of age and older in the labor force

### Definition:

Civilian unemployment is defined as adults 16 years of age and older who were not employed but were able, available and actively looking for work during the week including the 12th of the month. Individuals who were waiting to be recalled from a layoff individuals waiting to report to a new job within 30 days were also considered unemployed. The unemployment rate is the number of unemployed per 100 persons in the labor force (the sum of employed and unemployed). Rates represent the annual average.

### Significance:

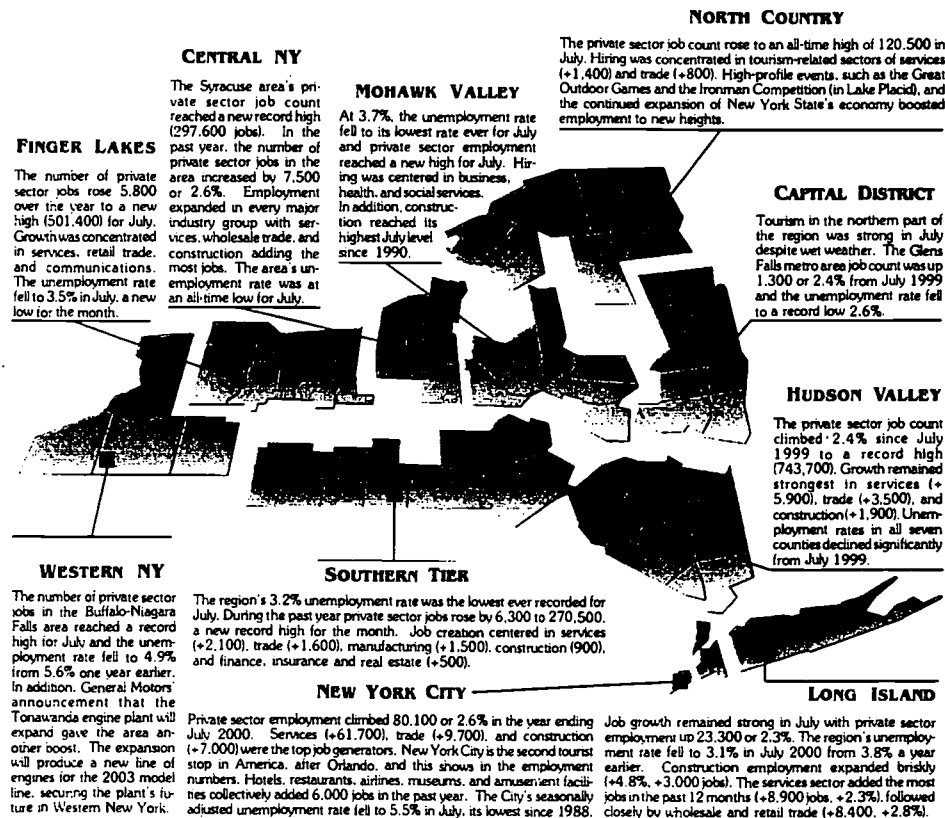
The rate of unemployment in an area is one indication of the state of the economy of that area and the opportunities for gainful employment.

### NYS Findings:

- In 1998, approximately 498,000 or 5.6 percent of all New York State resident civilians in the labor force were unemployed. This is an improvement over the 1996 unemployment rate of 6.2 percent.
- The resident civilian unemployment rate in New York State in 1998 was nearly twice as high in New York City (8.0%) as in Rest of State (4.1%).

# TECHNICAL NOTES

## Adolescent Arrests for Property and Violent Crimes:

New York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) violent index crimes include murder, non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Property index crimes include burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. An arrest is counted on each separate occasion a person is taken into custody, notified or cited by a law enforcement official. An arrest is recorded in the jurisdiction where it occurs (this jurisdiction is not necessarily where the crime occurred), and only the most serious offense that was committed during a crime incident or multiple crime incidents is recorded. It is important to note that many persons who commit crimes are never arrested, a single arrest can involve multiple crime incidents, and more than one person can be arrested for the same crime incident. The adolescent arrest rates are calculated by dividing the number of reported adolescent arrests for violent and property index crimes (or, for adolescents who are not treated as adults, for acts which would constitute violent and property index crimes if committed by an adult) by an estimate of the population of youth in the appropriate age category.

## Adolescent Pregnancies by Maternal Age (10-14, 15-17, and 15-19 years):

Pregnancies are the sum of the number of live births, reported induced terminations of pregnancies and reported fetal deaths of all gestations. Although counts of pregnancies are relatively complete, spontaneous fetal deaths under 20 weeks of gestation are underreported. Some pregnancy records are missing age of mother or county of residence. These pregnancies were omitted from the calculations. The adolescent pregnancy rate is the number of pregnancies per 1,000 females in the stated age groups. Rates are presented for females ages 10-14, 15-17 and 15-19 years.

## Age Breakdowns:

Age breakdowns identify the age distribution of the counties, New York State, New York City, and Rest of State, as estimated by the Population Estimates Program of the U.S. Census Bureau for 1997. While the Census Bureau breaks down ages into single year, 5 year increments up to age 85+years and selected age groups, this data book reports the age break down in the following increments: 0-4 years; 5-9 years; 10-14 years; 15-19 years; 20-64 years; and 65+years. The estimates are produced by a method which is still in a developmental stage. These figures should be used with caution.

## Agency Source:

The agency source identifies the agency that supplied the data.

## Annual Dropouts:

In New York State, the annual dropout rate refers to the proportion of public school students in grades 9-12 who left school prior to graduation for any reason except death, between July 1 and June 30, and did not enter another school or program leading to a GED. Annual high school dropout percents are calculated by dividing the number of students who drop out during a single year by the grade 9-12 enrollment for that year and multiplying by 100.

## Arrests for Drug Use/Possession/Sale/DUI:

Youth drug arrest rates are based on the number of arrests for use, possession or sale of drugs, public narcotic intoxication or Driving Under the Influence (DUI) of drugs per 10,000 youth ages 10-20 years.

## Births to Women Receiving Early (1st Trimester) Prenatal Care:

Early prenatal care is defined as pregnancy-related health care received by the mother in the first three months (first trimester) of her pregnancy. The percent of early prenatal care births is calculated by dividing the number of births that benefited from early prenatal care by the total number of births where the first month of prenatal care was known and multiplying by 100. This information is extracted from birth certificates.

## Births to Women with Primary Financial Coverage of Medicaid or Self-Pay:

The percent of Medicaid or self-pay births is the number of all live births to women whose primary financial coverage for delivery was recorded as either self-pay or Medicaid on the birth certificate in relation to all live births for which the financial coverage is known in a given year. The source of primary financial coverage for delivery is recorded on the birth certificate at the time of birth.



# TECHNICAL NOTES

## Congenital Anomalies:

Congenital anomalies are defects existing at and usually before birth regardless of causation.

## Children and Youth in Foster Care:

The number of children and youth in foster care include children and youth ages birth to 21 years in the care and custody of the local Commissioners of Social Services. The count is taken as of December 31st of each year. The rate of foster care placement is calculated by dividing the total number of children and youth in foster care by an estimate (taken from Woods and Poole) of the total number of children and youth from birth through 17 years of age during that year and multiplying by 1,000.

## Children and Youth Living Below Poverty:

Children are considered to be living in poverty if their family income, before taxes, falls below the poverty thresholds set by the federal government for families of different sizes. Non-cash benefits such as public housing, food stamps and Medicaid are not counted in determining whether family income is below the poverty threshold, nor are work-related or other expenses. The thresholds do not vary geographically, but they are updated each year for inflation using the Consumer Price Index. The federal poverty line for a family of three was \$12,158 in 1995 and \$11,522 in 1993; for a family of four, the corresponding thresholds were \$15,569 and \$14,763, respectively.

The poverty estimates provided are from the Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates Program, Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, January 1998. The estimates are based on statistical models developed for estimating poverty in small areas (counties and states) during the years between the decennial census.

Because counties undergo economic and demographic changes over time that may differ from one county to the other, annual estimates using statistical models may better represent current differences in poverty rates across counties than data reflected in the 1990 Census. In addition, annual estimates can be used to track changes in county poverty rates during the years between the decennial census. However, it should be understood that while such estimates are more current than the decennial census, annual poverty rates generated using such models are less statistically precise than the decennial census. For example, the 90 percent confidence interval for the 1995 Bronx estimate (48.9%) is from 40.0 percent to 57.9 percent. For Allegany, the estimate of 23.9 percent has a corresponding confidence interval of 19.1 percent to 28.8 percent. However, for the State as a whole, the 90% confidence interval is quite narrow, 24.3 percent to 26.4 percent in 1995. ## Children and Youth Receiving Food Stamps:

The Food Stamp Program is a federally funded entitlement program designed to increase the food purchasing power of low income households to a level which allows such households to purchase a low cost but nutritionally adequate diet. Generally, households are expected to devote 30 percent of their countable income to food, including households whose only income is from public assistance. The Food Stamp Program then provides the difference between that amount and the maximum benefit. Maximum benefits are set at the amount needed to purchase the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Thrifty Food Plan. The table shows the number and percent of children and youth less than 18 years of age who received food stamps in New York State at the end of 1994 and the end of 1998 (December 1994 and December 1998, respectively).

## Children and Youth Receiving Public Assistance:

Public assistance programs provide cash and in-kind aid to meet the basic support needs of individuals and families. To be eligible for public assistance, family countable income and resources must fall below certain limits. Families receive the difference between countable income and a standard of need based on their family size and the housing costs for their district (either New York City or one of Rest of State counties).

The table shows the number and percent of children and youth less than 18 years of age who received public assistance in New York State at the end of 1994 and the end of 1998 (December 1994 and December 1998, respectively).



# TECHNICAL NOTES

A child was counted as receiving public assistance at the end of 1998 if they received aid under the State's Family Assistance (FA) Program or the State's Safety Net (SN) Program. A federally subsidized program. FA is the State's primary public assistance program for families with children. SN, a State funded general assistance program, provides public assistance for single adults, childless couples, and a relatively small number of families with children who are not eligible for aid under FA. In 1994, children were counted as receiving public assistance if they received aid under either the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) Program or the Home Relief (HR) Program. The FA and SN Programs discussed above later replaced these public assistance programs.

## Children and Youth Receiving Supplemental Security Income:

The Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Program provides monthly cash benefits to aged, blind and disabled persons with income and resources below certain limits. Unlike state-administered public assistance programs, SSI is administered by the Social Security Administration according to uniform national standards. Children in New York State receive SSI if they meet the blindness or disability criteria, and in addition, meet the income and resource requirements for eligibility. Although SSI income and resource standards are low, they are generally higher than those for public assistance. Moreover, cash benefits paid on behalf of the child are significantly higher than public assistance benefits received for children.

The table shows the number and percent of children and youth less than 20 years of age who received SSI in New York State as of May 1995 and January 1999. Note that a disabled child receiving SSI in a family that receives public assistance (either Family Assistance or Safety Net assistance) is counted among children receiving SSI and will not appear in the counts of children receiving public assistance for the same time period. However, many of the children that receive SSI are part of households that receive food stamps and are therefore counted among children receiving food stamps for the same period.

The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 changed the disability test for children, requiring a more stringent test than required under previous law. This change was applied to new applicants as well as those receiving SSI at the time, and can alone account for some of the decline shown in the tables. However, it should be noted that a child losing SSI benefits during the period may have begun receiving public assistance and if so would be counted in the previous table. This would occur if others in the family were receiving public assistance when SSI benefits were lost, or if the family applied for and qualified for public assistance subsequent to the loss of the child's SSI benefit.

## Children Receiving Free/Reduced School Lunch:

Free/Reduced Lunch participation identifies the number and percent of public school students in full-day kindergarten through sixth grade participating in one of New York State's school nutrition programs. The School Lunch Program ensures that children have access to the nutrition they need to learn, play, grow and develop, as well as to promote learning readiness and healthy eating habits. The percent is computed by dividing the number of students participating in the program by the total enrollment for those public school grades and multiplying by 100 for the school year 1998/99. Eligibility is determined by family income and size. For example, during the 1998/99 school year, the income eligibility guidelines for free and reduced lunch for a family of three were \$17,745 and \$25,253, respectively. For a family of four, the corresponding guidelines were \$21,385 and \$30,433.

Since the Free/Reduced Lunch Program eligibility requirements are based on the family's income and size, the percent of students enrolled in the program can be used as a proxy for the percent of children living in poverty. However, not all school districts participate in the program, and the percentage of eligible students who apply varies across participating districts. Therefore, the reported statistics may underestimate the number of students eligible. While this indicator is used as a proxy for children living in poverty, the percent of children participating in this lunch program is generally greater than the percent of children living in poverty. Children receiving free/reduced lunch do not have as rigid criteria for inclusion and represent a subset of children in the age group of students in full-day kindergarten through grade 6. Additional information may be obtained in "Chapter II: School Contextual Factors" of the Statewide Profile of the Educational System.

## Data Source:

The data source identifies the agency that originally compiled the data and the file, certificate, or record used to compile the data (the numerator data).

## Date Compiled:

The date compiled identifies the time the data were accessed and calculated. Since data for some indicators are continuously updated (e.g., SPARCS data), the numbers and rates accessed at different dates may reflect different findings.

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# TECHNICAL NOTES

## Demographics:

Demographics identify the Race/Ethnicity and Age breakdown within New York State, New York City, Rest of State and individual counties, as estimated by the Population Estimates Program of the U.S. Census Bureau for 1997. The Population Estimates Program produces total population estimates and county estimates by age, sex, race, and Hispanic origin for each year. For more information, visit the Census web site at: [www.census.gov/population/estimates/rho.txt](http://www.census.gov/population/estimates/rho.txt). The estimates are produced by a method which is still in a developmental stage. These figures should be used with caution.

## Driving While Intoxicated Arrests:

Youth arrest rate for driving while intoxicated (DWI) is defined as the number of arrests for driving while intoxicated per 10,000 youth ages 16 through 20 years.

## Firearm-Related Crimes Known to the Police:

New York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Index Crimes track whether a firearm was present during the commission of a murder, forcible rape, robbery or aggravated assault. A reported crime is recorded in the jurisdiction where it occurs, and only the most serious criminal offense that occurred during the commission of the crime is recorded. The firearm crime rate is the number of reported UCR crimes of murder, forcible rape, robbery or aggravated assault where a firearm was present divided by an estimate of the population of persons of all ages in the general population and multiplied by 1,000.

## Five Leading Causes of Death (Three Year Average):

This category summarizes the five leading causes of death among New York State children and youth and the percentage they represent of all deaths within each of the following five age groups: infants less than one year old; children ages 1-4 years; children ages 5-9 years; youth ages 10-14 years; and youth ages 15-19 years. Since the number of deaths to children and youth is very low in many counties, the five leading causes of death are presented as three-year averages for New York State, New York City and Rest of State. Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data where slight variations in the numbers can result in large fluctuations in the annual rates.

## High School Graduates Intending to Enroll in College:

The rate of college bound New York State public high school graduates is based on secondary school reports of the number of seniors who intend to enroll in four-year, and two-year, post-secondary institutions as well as other post-secondary education programs divided by the total number of graduating seniors and multiplied by 100.

## High School Graduates Receiving Regents Diplomas:

Regents diplomas are awarded to students who have both passed a series of Regents examinations, demonstrating a certain level of achievement, and have passed the prescribed coursework. The percent of high school graduates receiving regents diplomas is based on the number of graduates receiving regents diplomas divided by the total number of graduates and multiplied by 100.

## Hospitalization-based Rates:

Data on hospitalizations are collected through the hospital inpatient discharge data system. Statewide Planning and Research Cooperative System (SPARCS). Thus, data are not available on events that did not result in a hospitalization, including cases that were treated in hospital emergency rooms. Each hospitalization receives an ICD-9 code at discharge which indicates the primary reason for the hospitalization. The following are the ICD-9 codes included in the hospitalization-based rates in this publication: asthma hospitalizations primary diagnosis (E493), assault hospitalizations (E960-E968), unintentional injury hospitalizations (E800-E877, E880-E928), and self-inflicted injury hospitalizations (E950-E958). The rates are calculated by dividing the number of hospitalizations by an estimate of the number of persons in a specific age group and multiplying by a standardized multiplier. For more information about the data system, see SPARCS.

## Hospitalizations Resulting from Assault (Three Year Average):

The assault hospitalization rate is based on the number of discharges for hospitalizations resulting from an assault among youth ages 10 through 19 years per 100,000 children and youth in this age group. Because the number of children hospitalized for assault injuries is very low in many counties in New York State, the assault hospitalization rates are presented as three-year averages.



Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data in counties with small populations where slight variations in the numbers of children hospitalized for assault injuries can result in large fluctuations in their annual rates. The mid-year population estimate is used as the denominator in calculating the rate. (Also, see hospitalization-based rates.)

## Hospitalizations Resulting from Asthma (Three Year Average):

The asthma hospitalization rate is based on the number of hospitalizations for asthma per 10,000 children and youth in each of the following age groups: birth through 4 years and 5 through 14 years. Because the number of children hospitalized for asthma is very low in many counties, the asthma hospitalization rates are presented as three-year averages. Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data in counties with small populations where slight variations in the numbers of children hospitalized for asthma can result in large fluctuations in their annual rates. (Also, see hospitalization-based rates.)

## Hospitalizations Resulting from Self-Inflicted Injuries (Three Year Average):

The self-inflicted injury hospitalization rate is based on the number of hospitalizations for self-inflicted injuries per 100,000 youth in each of the following age groups: ages 10 through 14 and 15 through 19 years. Because the number of children hospitalized for self-inflicted injuries is very low in many counties in New York State, the self-inflicted injury hospitalization rates are presented here as three-year averages. Three-year averaging improves the reliability of the data in counties with small populations where slight variations in the numbers of children hospitalized for self-inflicted injuries can result in large fluctuations in their annual rates. (Also, see hospitalization-based rates.)

## Hospitalizations Resulting from Unintentional Injuries:

The unintentional injury rate is based on the number of hospitalizations for unintentional injuries per 100,000 children and youth ages birth through 19 years. This includes injuries caused by such occurrences as motor vehicle crashes, drowning, fires, and falls. (Also, see hospitalization-based rates.)

## Indicated Reports of Child Abuse and Maltreatment:

Indicated reports of abuse and maltreatment are those reports in which there was some credible evidence that abuse or maltreatment occurred. For some of the reports received in 1998, that determination had not yet been made. To estimate the rate of indication of reports which were not yet determined, the resolution of undetermined reports from earlier years was applied to these cases.

The number of families in 1996 and 1998 is based on the following estimation method: the number of children age 0 to 17 years per families-with-children is calculated for the 1990 census using Tables 140 and 141; estimates for 1996 and 1998 of the number of children age 0 to 17 years (taken from Woods and Poole) are divided by this 1990 children-per-family ratio to arrive at estimates of the number of families in 1996 and 1998. The indicated reports of abuse and maltreatment are then divided by the estimates of the number of families.

## Infant Mortality (Three Year Average):

Infant mortality is the number of deaths to infants under one year of age. The annual number of these deaths per 1,000 live births occurring during the year is the infant mortality rate. Because infant deaths are relatively rare events in many counties, the infant mortality rates are presented here as three-year averages. This is necessary to improve the reliability (or stability) of the data. For example, in a small county, a serious tragedy such as a fatal fire or an automobile accident may cause the infant mortality rate to fluctuate greatly from one year to another.

## Intoxicated Youth Involved in Auto Accidents:

Youth involved in automobile accidents while intoxicated is defined as the number of youth who were intoxicated and involved in an automobile accident (as a driver, passenger or pedestrian) per 10,000 youth 16-20 years of age.

## Legal Intervention:

Legal intervention includes legal execution and injuries inflicted by the police or other law-enforcing agents, including military on duty in the course of arresting or attempting to arrest law breakers, suppressing disturbances, maintaining order and other legal action.

# TECHNICAL NOTES

## Low Birthweight Births:

Infants weighing less than 2,500 grams (5.5 pounds) at birth are considered to be low birthweight. The low birthweight rates is the number of low birthweight births per 100 live births for which a birthweight is known. The rate is presented as a percent.

## Maximum:

The maximum identifies the largest value within the range of county percents or rates.

## Median:

The median, a measure of central tendency, is the value of the middle item when the data are arranged from lowest to highest. Since New York State has an even number of counties (62), the median is computed by averaging the two middle observations, point 31 and 32. If New York City Counties' data are not available, the median is the middle observation, point 29 of the range. While the median is not sensitive to outliers and guarantees that 50 percent of the values fall on either side of the value, it may not be representative of all county percents or rates.

## Minimum:

The minimum identifies the smallest value within the range of county percents or rates.

## Number:

The number is the count of occurrences within a defined geographic area during a specified period of time. Numbers are used to determine the size of an occurrence in a particular location. Numbers, however, do not take the size of the population who could experience the occurrence into account. Therefore, numbers cannot show the probability of this occurring in the population. While numbers can compare the size of an occurrence within the same population group, numbers generally should not be used for comparisons, especially when comparison groups have differing population size or composition.

## Percent:

To compute a percent, divide the number of occurrences (the numerator) by the total population who could experience the occurrence (the denominator) and multiply by 100. A percent reflects the occurrence per 100 of the population and can be expressed in other formats (e.g., 25% can also be expressed as 25 in 100 or 1 in 4).

## Persons in Need of Supervision:

Persons in Need of Supervision (PINS) are juveniles less than 16 years of age for whom complaints were filed by local probation departments because of non-criminal misconduct such as truancy from school, incorrigibility, ungovernability, or habitual disobedience. Complainants in these cases are generally parents or school officials who are seeking the formal intervention of the family court to control a juvenile's misconduct. PINS cases are recorded in the county in which the PINS complaint is filed. Only the aggregate number of cases is reported by local probation departments to the State, making it impossible to present counts and rates by age categories. The rate for PINS cases is calculated by dividing the number of PINS cases opened by an estimate of the population of juveniles 10 to 15 years of age and multiplied by 1,000; the population of juveniles less than 10 years of age was excluded because there are few PINS complaints filed for juveniles in this lower age category.

## Population Source:

The population source identifies the source used to estimate the total population who could experience the occurrence, frequently referred to as "population at risk" for traditional indicators (the denominator data), in order to calculate the percent or rate.

## Property Index Crimes Known to the Police:

New York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Index Crimes include serious violent and property crimes reported or otherwise known to police. Violent index crimes include murder, non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Property index crimes include burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. This is not a measure of victimization because some crimes are not reported or

otherwise known to police. A reported crime is recorded in the jurisdiction where it occurs, and only the most serious criminal offense that occurred during the commission of the crime is recorded. The property index crime rate is the number of reported UCR property index crimes divided by an estimate of the population of persons of all ages in the general population and multiplied by 1,000.

## Pupil Evaluation Program (PEP) Test Scores:

In the elementary grades, Pupil Evaluation Program (PEP) tests have been the primary State measures of student performance. Students have taken criterion-referenced PEP reading and mathematics tests at the end of grades 3 and 6 and a writing test at the end of grade 5. Students scoring at or above the State Reference Point (SRP) are considered to be making adequate progress in developing the basic skills of reading comprehension, mathematics and writing. Students who score at or above the Quality Point (QP) are considered to have achieved mastery of State content standards in that area. All pupils scoring below the designated SRP are required by regulation to be provided remediation.

The 1997/98 school year is the last year PEP tests were administered. New assessments in English language and mathematics will be administered to grades 4 and 8 beginning in the 1998/99 school year. For more information, visit the State Education web site at: [www.nysed.gov](http://www.nysed.gov).

## Race/Ethnicity Breakdown:

For 1997, the U.S. Census Bureau reports the following four race categories: White; Black; American Indian and Alaska Native; Asian and Pacific Islander, and two ethnicity categories: Hispanic and non-Hispanic. The Census Bureau defines each of the categories used in the Race/Ethnicity tables and explains how they relate to one another. The Census Bureau's Population Estimates Program produces total population estimates and county estimates by age, sex, race, and Hispanic origin for each year. For more race/ethnicity information, visit the census web site at: [www.census.gov/population/estimates/rho.txt](http://www.census.gov/population/estimates/rho.txt). The estimates are produced by a method which is still in a developmental stage. These figures should be used with caution.

## Rate:

Rates provide a standardized means of comparing the prevalence of an indicator over time and across different geographical areas (e.g., counties, states). Therefore, rates provide an excellent way to measure progress towards meeting goals and standards. To compute a rate, first divide the number of occurrences (the numerator) by the total population who could experience the occurrence (the denominator), then multiply by a standardizing multiplier. Indicators in this data book utilize the following multipliers: 1,000; 10,000; or 100,000 and are reported as per 1,000; per 10,000; and per 100,000, respectively. However, rates calculated in this manner are called crude rates and have not taken into consideration possible differences in population characteristics. In order to interpret comparisons, population characteristics (e.g., age, sex, race, education, income and birth weight) may need to be considered.

## Reported Cases of Early Syphilis (Three Year Average):

Syphilis is an infection caused by the spirochete *Treponema pallidum*, which penetrates broken skin or mucous membranes during sexual contact. Early syphilis includes any of the first three stages of syphilis – primary, secondary or early latent (of less than one year's duration). The incidence rates for early syphilis are based on the number of reported cases of early syphilis per 100,000 teenagers ages 15 through 19 years. Because the incidence of early syphilis is a relatively rare event in many counties, both the counts and rates are based on three-year averages.

## Reported Cases of Gonorrhea (Three Year Average):

Gonorrhea (*Neisseria gonorrhoeae*) is an infection that grows and multiplies quickly in moist, warm areas of the body including the urethra, the throat and the rectum. In women, the cervix is often the site of infection. The incidence rates for gonorrhea are based on the number of reported cases of gonorrhea per 100,000 teenagers ages 15 through 19 years. Because the incidence of gonorrhea is a relatively rare event in many counties, both the counts and rates are based on three-year averages.



# TECHNICAL NOTES

## Resident Civilian Unemployment:

Civilian unemployment is defined as adults 16 years of age and older who were not employed but were able, available and actively looking for work during the week including the 12th of the month. Individuals who were waiting to be recalled from a layoff, and individuals waiting to report to a new job within 30 days were also considered unemployed. The unemployment rate is the number of unemployed per 100 persons in the labor force (the sum of employed and unemployed). Rates represent the annual average.

## Sexually Transmitted Diseases (Three Year Average):

Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) incidence rates are based on the number of reported cases of STDs. STDs are underreported by percentages that vary from county to county. Therefore, the New York State and county figures underestimate the overall incidence of these diseases. Because of the differences in the extent of reporting, county comparisons should not be made unless there is reason to believe that rates of underreporting are similar. The rates are calculated by dividing the number of reported cases of each STD by an estimate of the number of persons aged 15-19 years of age and then multiplying by 100,000. Because in many counties the number of cases of early syphilis and gonorrhea is small, the numbers and rates presented in this report are three-year averages.

## Standard Deviation:

The standard deviation measures the spread of the distribution of county percents or rates. It is the positive square root of the average of the squared difference of county percents or rates from their mean.

## Statewide Planning and Research Cooperative System (SPARCS):

SPARCS is a comprehensive patient data system established in 1979 as a result of cooperation between the health care industry and government. In April 1983 and June 1985, the State Hospital Review and Planning Council adopted additional regulations regarding the reporting of ambulatory surgery data to the New York State Department of Health. All aspects of the Statewide Planning and Research Cooperative System, including submission timetables and data requirements, are described in detail in the SPARCS Regulations. ## Students with Limited English Proficiency:

Public and non-public school students (in pre-Kindergarten through grade 12) with limited English proficiency (LEP) are identified as students from a home where a language other than English is spoken who score at or below the 40th percentile on an English language assessment instrument.

## Three Year Averaging:

For indicators with relatively rare events in many counties, rates are presented as three-year averages. This is necessary to improve the reliability (or stability) of the data because rates are sensitive to variations in the size of both the numerator (the number of occurrences) and the denominator (the estimated population who could experience the occurrence) in small counties. The number is determined by adding the three years number and dividing by three. The mid-year estimate is used as the denominator in calculating rates.

## Timeframe:

The timeframe for the majority of indicators in this data book is the annual calendar year, January 1 through December 31. However, there are two exceptions: (1) the State Education Department generally collects data for the school year, July 1 through June 30 and (2) the rates for indicators with relatively rare events in many counties are presented as three-year averages. Three-year averaging is necessary to improve the reliability (or stability) of the data.

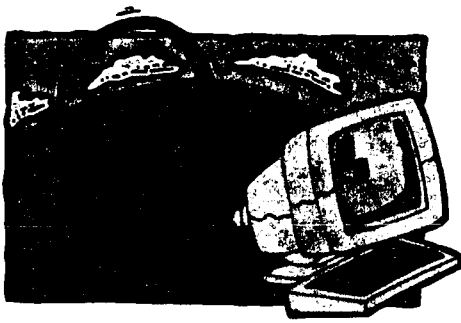
## Violent Index Crimes Known to the Police:

New York State Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Index Crimes include serious violent and property crimes reported or otherwise known to police. Violent index crimes include murder, non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Property index crimes include burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. This is not a measure of victimization because some crimes are not reported or otherwise known to police. A reported crime is recorded in the jurisdiction where it occurs, and only the most serious criminal offense that occurred during the commission of the crime is recorded. The violent index crime rate is the number of reported UCR violent index crimes divided by an estimate of the population of persons of all ages in the general population and multiplied by 1,000.

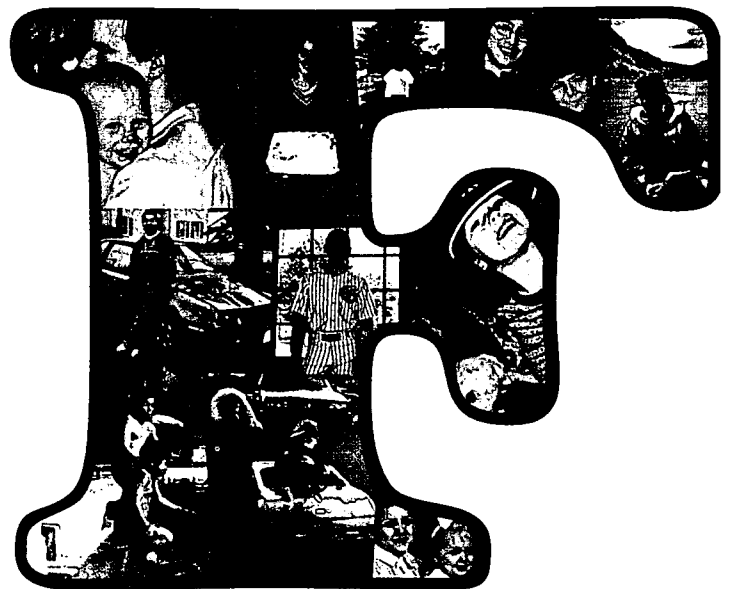
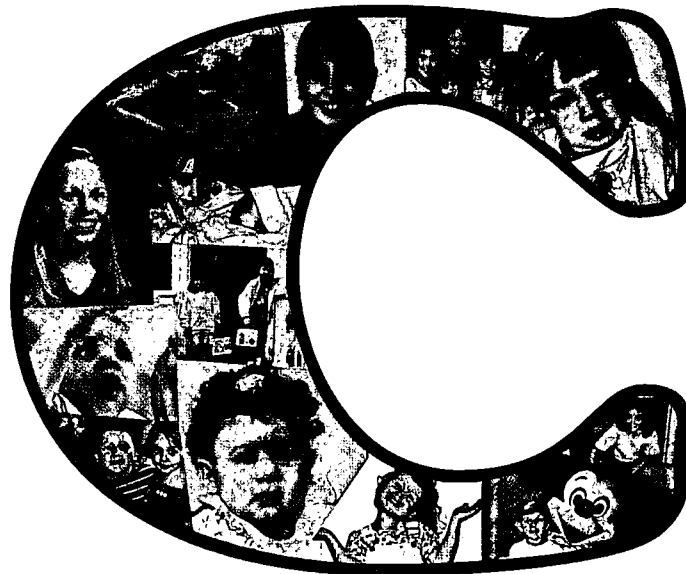
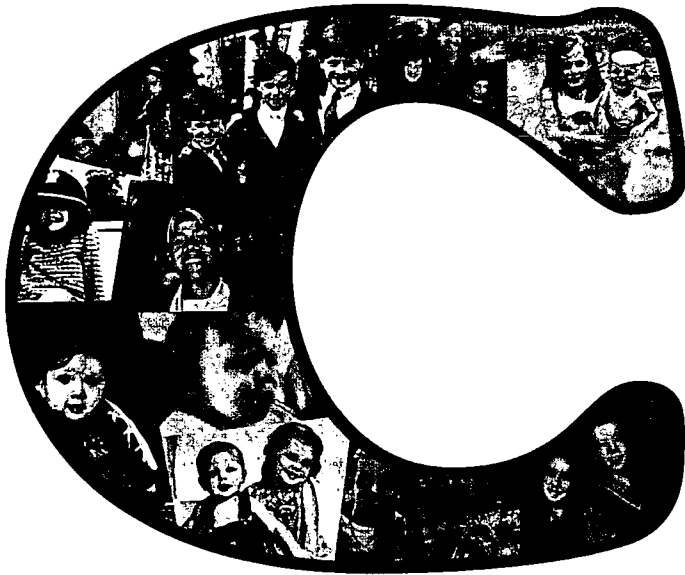
