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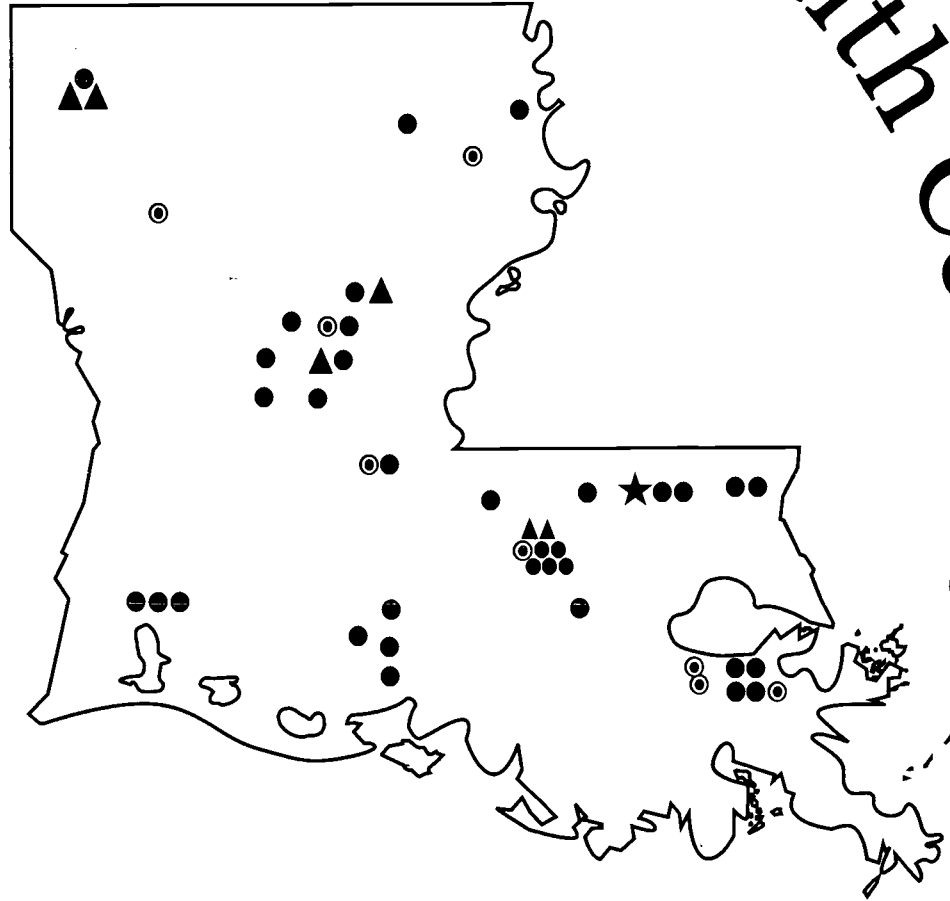
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ABSTRACT

Louisiana's initiative to assist local communities to develop and operate school-based health centers (SBHCs) is a nationally recognized model. This annual report illustrates the vital work being done in SBHCs in Louisiana to assist families in ensuring their children's health and well-being. Section 1 of the report details the continuous expansion of school-based health care since the passage of the Adolescent School Health Initiative Act in 1991. The section also compares Louisiana's SBHCs with other SBHCs nationally, and highlights programs and partnerships contributing to Louisiana's success, including the Continuous Quality Improvement Program. Section 2 summarizes the leading reasons children visit SBHCs, demonstrates the wide variety of services available, and reveals the critical role that health centers fill in the lives of the students and the schools they serve. Section 3 features profiles of each of Louisiana's operating school health centers, illustrating the strong links between the SBHCs and the communities they serve. The report's three appendices include definitions of the categories of conditions by which SBHC data are coded, the text of the state law that created the program, and the 1999-2000 financial statement.

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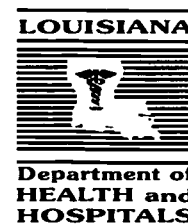

Dear Citizens of Louisiana:

I am pleased to provide you with a copy of the 1999-2000 Louisiana School-Based Health Centers' (SBHCs) Annual Service Report. Assuring access to primary and preventive health and mental health services for the children of Louisiana is a top priority of the Department of Health and Hospitals, and school-based health centers are an effective and efficient means of providing these services.


Parents and communities, clinicians, business leaders and policy makers alike have all embraced school-based health centers in Louisiana. In 1999-2000, the Children's Cabinet recommended SBHC expansion as a top priority to the Governor. A special issue of the Journal of the Louisiana State Medical Society (December 1999) was dedicated entirely to school-based health. Recently the Council for a Better Louisiana published a document endorsing SBHCs and recommending that at least one SBHC be in each parish by 2010.

The community's support for school health is evident in the remarkable expansion that has occurred since the passage of the Adolescent School Health Initiative Act in 1991. At that time, there were only 4 SBHCs throughout the state. In 1999-2000, there were 40 SBHCs in 17 parishes serving 64 public schools and providing access to care to nearly 39,000 students.

The growth continues. The State Legislature has appropriated an additional \$1.6 million for 2000-2001 for SBHC expansion. With this additional funding, 47 SBHCs will be in operation by the end of 2000-2001.

July 29, 2001 will mark the 10th anniversary of the passage of the Adolescent School Health Initiative Act. As we look to our future and the future of our state, let us continue to work together to provide our children with the necessary health and mental health services and health information to make wise choices and thus live prosperous and healthy lives.

Executive Summary

The nine-year history of the Adolescent School Health Initiative in Louisiana is a success story of collaboration and partnership. Starting with the basic premise that students must be healthy in order to be educated and must be educated in order to remain healthy, Louisiana has seen the impressive growth of SBHCs from 4 sites in 1991 to an impressive 40 SBHCs in 1999-2000.

Integral to the SBHC movement are dedicated individuals, from health care providers to policy makers, parents to community volunteers, all of whom are committed to assuring the health and academic success of Louisiana's children. SBHCs provide access to medical and mental health care that many Louisiana students would not otherwise be able to obtain. This report illustrates the vital work being done by SBHCs in Louisiana to assist families in assuring their children's health and well being.

Section One - Program Highlights & Overview, details the continuous expansion of school-based health care that has occurred since the passage of the ASHI Act in 1991. On page 6, the reader is provided a glimpse of how Louisiana compares nationally to other SBHCs. This section also highlights programs and partnerships that have made SBHCs a success, including the Continuous Quality Improvement program. It is through these efforts and partnerships that recognition and strong support have been built for school-based health care in Louisiana.

Section Two - Who Visits SBHCs and Why, summarizes the leading reasons children visit SBHCs. It demonstrates the wide variety of services available at the health centers including primary and preventive health care, psychosocial services and health education. The data reveal the critical role that health centers fill in the lives of the students and the schools they serve.

Section Three - Louisiana SBHC Profiles, features each of Louisiana's operating school health centers. The community's involvement and commitment is integral to the operation and mission of SBHCs. Review of the community advisory boards and partner organizations evinces the strong link between the community and the health center.

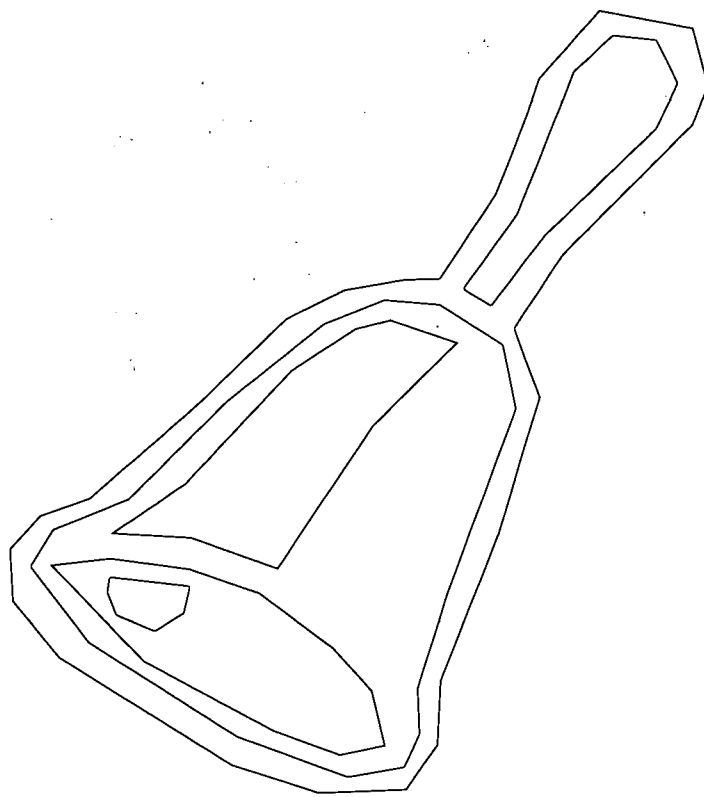

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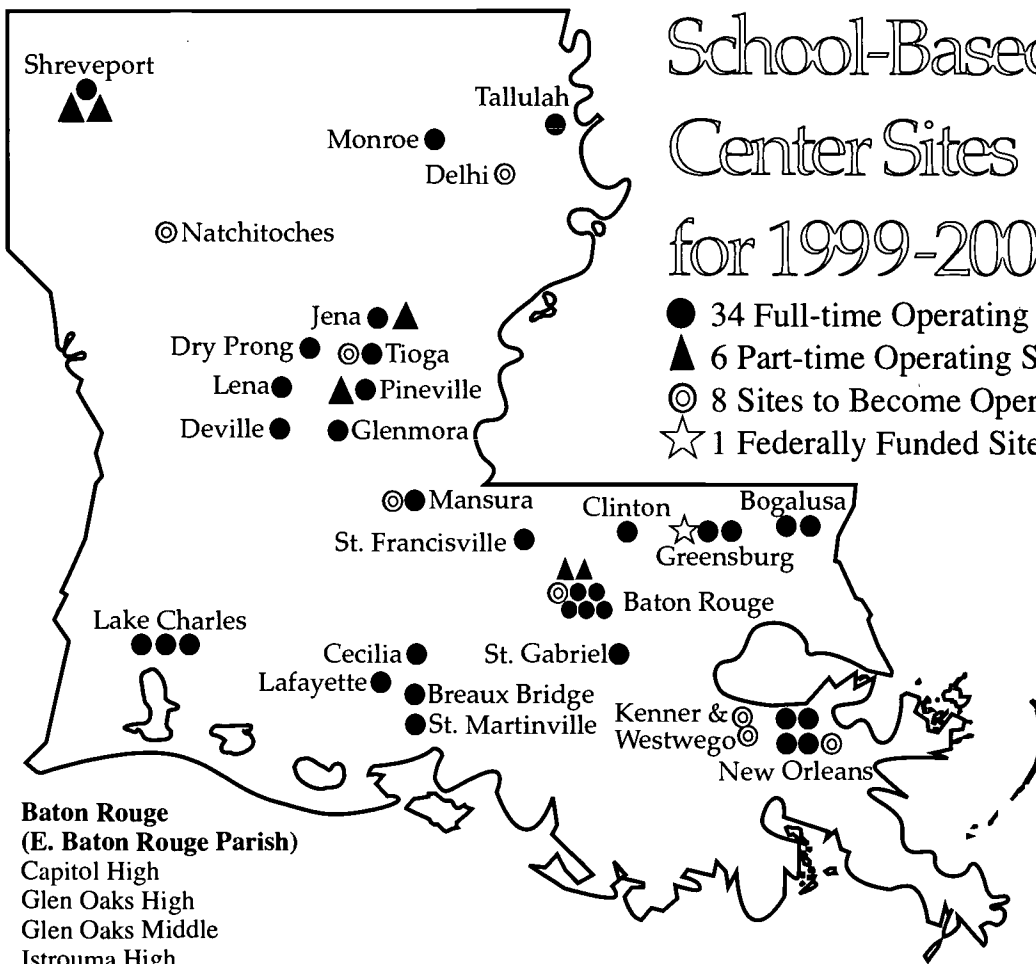

Highlights of 1999-2000

Building Strong Support:

Children's Cabinet Recommendation Leads To Program Expansion: State Agency heads, recognizing that School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs) are the best solution for providing children access to comprehensive health services, recommend expansion as a top priority to the Governor. In 1999-2000, the total number of SBHCs in the state increases by five. Forty-seven SBHCs will be in operation by the end of 2000-2001.

Louisiana's Medical Society Journal Devoted To School-Based Health: The December 1999 issue was dedicated entirely to SBHCs in Louisiana and their success in addressing child and adolescent health concerns. Some of the topics included comprehensive approaches to risk behaviors and the prevention of medical and mental health problems. All articles emphasized how SBHC services improve the health of Louisiana's children.

National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) Met in New Orleans on School Health: State legislators and public health officials from five states, including Louisiana, met in New Orleans in the fall of 1999 to dialogue about school health and its positive effects on the health outcomes of youth. The meeting provided the opportunity for participants to visit local SBHCs.

Improving Access

Program Expands; Adds New Sites: SBHCs expand into three new parishes in 1999-2000. The following new sites open: Clinton Middle in East

Feliciana Parish; Central Elementary in St. Helena Parish; McCall Junior/Senior High in Madison Parish; Carroll Junior/Senior High in Ouachita Parish; Glenmora High and Buckeye High in Rapides Parish. Two sites become full-time, Jessie D. Clifton Elementary and Ray D. Molo Middle both in Calcasieu Parish. The total number of SBHCs increases from 35 to 40 serving 64 public schools in 17 parishes.

Additional \$1.6 million for SBHCs: The Louisiana State Legislature appropriates \$1 million for SBHC expansion in 1999-2000 and an additional \$1.6 million for SBHC expansion in 2000-2001.

Assuring Quality of Care

Prevention Training A Success: The Department of Health & Hospitals held a one-day training course for all SBHC personnel. Led by Gary Hidalgo, the State Coordinator for the Prevention and Management of Aggressive Behavior, SBHC staff learned communication skills to de-escalate a potentially violent situation in the school setting.

Continuous Quality Improvement; First Cycle Complete: The first three-year cycle of the SBHC Continuous Quality Improvement review process is complete. This process assures compliance with OPH contract requirements and the *Principles, Standards, and Guidelines for School-Based Health Centers in Louisiana*. Every three years a SBHC sponsor receives a site visit to determine certification. A new cycle will begin in the fall of 2000.

A Look at Louisiana's Children

Poverty and Children

- 34% of Louisiana's children under age 5 lived in poverty in 1996
- 14% of children were considered to live in extreme poverty (income below 50% of poverty level) in 1997
- 58% of the 756,579 pre-k through twelfth grade students enrolled in Louisiana's public school system qualified for and received the free/reduced lunch program in 1999-2000
- 59.4% of all Louisiana Medicaid enrolled individuals were under age 21 in 1998

- 4.2% of the 1,533 public schools are served by the SBHCs throughout Louisiana
- 5.2% of the 756,579 pre-k through twelfth grade students attending public schools in Louisiana have *access* to SBHCs
- 4.2% of the 756,579 pre-k through twelfth grade students attending public schools in Louisiana are *enrolled* in SBHCs
- 3% of the pre-k through twelfth grade students attending public schools in Louisiana are *receiving services* from SBHCs

- 32% death by motor vehicle

11 cases of AIDS were reported in the 13- to 19-year age group in Louisiana in 1999

The Case for Prevention

Louisiana youth engage in risky behaviors and make unhealthy choices that can impact their short and long term health and academic success. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has identified the major health risk behaviors among adolescents that account for the majority of death, disease, and disability in this age group: unintentional and intentional injuries, risky sexual behaviors, tobacco use, alcohol and other drugs, physical inactivity and poor nutritional choices.

School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs) address these risky behaviors and unhealthy choices by providing students the knowledge and skills necessary to adopt healthy lifestyles and thereby prevent disease. In addition, with access to nurses, doctors and mental health professionals, physical ailments and behavioral health issues of students can be identified early and addressed before they become lifelong problems.

Access to Health Care

CHALLENGE:

Adolescents are the least likely to be insured and least likely to seek clinical care of any age group. Research finds minors may delay, or not seek health care if it is not confidential.

SBHC RESPONSE:

SBHCs provide easy access to comprehensive health services to students at their schools. Caring staff help students feel comfortable discussing their health issues and concerns and parents are reassured knowing their children's health care needs are being met.

A student with Cystic Fibrosis at the Buckeye High School had missed a considerable amount of school due to illness. In addition, the student's mother had missed a great deal of work as a result of caring for her child. After one particular hospitalization, doctors ordered a week of antibiotic treatments. The SBHC and the student's mother formulated a plan to allow the student to attend school and receive the necessary intravenous antibiotics on campus. She did not miss any school, attending all of her classes that week and her mom was able to continue to work. Both the student and mother were grateful to the SBHC staff.

Unintentional Injuries

CHALLENGE:

32% of all deaths of Louisiana children ages 10-19 resulted from motor vehicle accidents making it the LEADING cause of death among this age group. (1999, OPH Vital Statistics)

24% of Louisiana high school students reported rarely or never wearing seat belts. (1997, Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS))

46% of Louisiana high school students reported that they recently rode with a driver who had been drinking alcohol. (1997, YRBS)

36% of Louisiana high school students do not wear bicycle helmets. (1997, YRBS)

SBHC RESPONSE:

SBHCs are innovative in their approach to injury prevention. For example, several sites assist their schools in hosting a mock crash to educate students on the dangers of reckless driving particularly when under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. In addition, the McCall Jr./Sr. High SBHC invites a Louisiana State Police officer to come to the school to discuss seatbelt safety.

During the 1999-2000 school year, Mansura Middle School lost a student in an accident in which the student's go-cart collided with an automobile. The student body of the school was in a state of shock. The social worker from the Mansura SBHC worked with the administration in offering grief counseling to any student who wanted it. The SBHC, with the cooperation of school administrators and the Louisiana State Police, held an assembly on the safe use of go-carts, all terrain vehicles (ATVs) and bicycles. A state trooper explained the laws concerning these off-road bicycles and the students were given a chance to ask questions. The students left the assembly with a better understanding of how to prevent such accidents from happening and how precious their lives are to their school, families, and communities.

Violence/Suicide

CHALLENGE:

63 Louisiana children ages 10-19 died as a result of homicide, making it the 2nd leading cause of death among Louisiana youth. (1999, OPH Vital Statistics)

39 Louisiana children ages 10-19 died as a result of suicide, making it the 3rd leading cause of death among Louisiana youth. (1999, OPH Vital Statistics)

75% of homicides and 70% of suicides of Louisiana children ages 10-19 are by firearms and explosives. (1999, OPH Vital Statistics)

SBHC RESPONSE:

Several different violence prevention programs are utilized across the state in SBHCs. For example, the Lawless SBHC in New Orleans conducts groups for at-risk boys. The Dry Prong Jr. High SBHC in Grant Parish has a peer mediation program to help students deal with violence and fighting.

A student suicide pact was averted at one of the SBHCs as a result of the quick response of the SBHC and school staff. Students who heard about the suicide pact confided in the SBHC social worker whom immediately intervened.

Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs)/HIV/Pregnancy

CHALLENGE:

Every 43 minutes a baby is born to a Louisiana teen mother. (1999, OPH Vital Statistics)

Adolescents have the highest rates of chlamydia and gonorrhea in the state. (1999, OPH STD Program)

11 cases of AIDS were reported in the 13- to 19-year age group in Louisiana. (1999, OPH HIV Program)

SBHC RESPONSE:

Louisiana SBHCs deal with these risky sexual behaviors in a number of ways. In New Orleans, the Lawless SBHC staff implemented a Diamond Club that builds self-esteem. Bogalusa SBHCs have an abstinence program. They also, however, provide prenatal classes for pregnant students and home visits so that these teen mothers will be ready to return to school within six weeks. The Family Service Center in St. Francisville has a teen parenting group. At the McCall Jr./Sr. High SBHC, the Red Cross provides *The Choice is Yours* Program on HIV/AIDS prevention. Finally, the *Baby Think It Over* Program is used in several SBHCs across Louisiana.

Tobacco, Alcohol, and Other Drug Use

CHALLENGE:

83% of Louisiana high school students reported drinking alcohol in their lifetime and 33% reported episodic heavy drinking on one or more of the previous 30 days. (1997, YRBS)

44% of Louisiana high school students reported using marijuana in their lifetime and 24% reported current use. (1997, YRBS)

SBHC RESPONSE:

In addition to individually assessing students' risk for substance abuse, SBHCs educate and provide group activities to discourage tobacco, alcohol and other drug use. For example, SBHC staff at Northside High in Lafayette Parish, McCall Jr./Sr. High in Madison Parish, and Bogalusa Jr./Sr. High in Washington Parish all participate in pre-prom and graduation activities to educate students on the dangers of drinking and driving. Several central Louisiana sites provide tobacco cessation classes.

Physical Inactivity/Poor Nutritional Choices

CHALLENGE:

The prevalence of obesity among youth ages 6-17 years in the United States has more than doubled in the past 30 years. (February 1997, Morbidity & Mortality Weekly Report)

61% of Louisiana high school students reported being enrolled in a physical education class but less than half reported attending the class daily. (1997, YRBS)

Only 19% of Louisiana high school students reported eating five or more servings of fruits and vegetables during the previous day. (1997, YRBS)

SBHC RESPONSE:

Louisiana SBHCs play an important role in motivating and encouraging all students to make wise nutritional choices and become more physically active. Many SBHCs have nutrition and exercise programs that benefit adolescents. The Linwood SBHC in Shreveport participates in the *Energy 2 Burn* Program that highlights the importance of physical activity for a healthy lifestyle. The Bogalusa SBHCs use the *Fitness for Life* Program and have been able to purchase a treadmill and exercise bike for students in the weight management program through matching grants from Entergy and Wal-Mart. The Sneaker Club at Northeast Elementary in Baton Rouge awards beads to participants to thread in their shoelaces for laps they have completed. In addition, they have produced a healthy recipe book with recipes provided by students.

“St. Martin Parish School-Based Health Centers and the University of Louisiana at Lafayette conducted their annual health fairs for 8th graders. The students received a health report card that addressed medical and behavioral screens. The results of the health fairs have been used to address the nutritional and physical activity level of the students. “

Louisiana Standards for School-Based Health Centers

Primary Goal

- ¥ To provide convenient access to primary and preventive health services for students who might otherwise have limited or no access to health care
- ¥ To meet the physical and emotional health needs of adolescents at their school sites.

The sponsoring agency is responsible for all administrative operations, including compliance with the State reporting requirements and financial management. (See section on Evaluation and Improvement.) The sponsor is expected to work towards program financial self-sufficiency to the extent possible.

Community Participation

All health centers must originate as a community initiative. State funding is dependent upon evidence of broad community participation in the planning process and on the center's Community Advisory Committee, whose members should be representatives of the general and school communities, including parents, students, school officials, and civic, business and religious leaders.

The host school should agree to work cooperatively with its health center, particularly in developing and implementing a full-scale coordinated school health program. The school should recognize that the health center and its staff are resources for its school nurse, counselors, classroom teachers, coaches, and special therapists. The school district must agree to bear the cost of site preparation as well as the utilities and maintenance expenses associated with operation. School board approval is a pre-requisite for a grant of state funds for planning or operation.

Sponsoring Agency — Qualifications and Responsibilities

The sponsoring agency must be either a public or a private non-profit institution locally suited and fiscally viable to administer and operate a health center serving the needs of adolescents (i.e., health center, hospital, medical school, health department, youth serving agency, school or school system). Non-medical agencies must contract with a qualified medical provider for health services.

In the planning phase, the sponsoring agency is responsible for building community support and identifying and convening leaders from the general and school communities to serve on its Community Advisory Committee. The agency must oversee the preparation of a needs assessment to which the SBHC services will respond as well as demonstrate that the health services to be provided will not duplicate existing available services accessible to the student population. The agency must also identify and develop sources of local funding and in-kind contributions to meet the minimum 20% local match requirement.

Services

A SBHC must offer comprehensive primary and preventive health services that address the physical, emotional, and educational needs of its student population. At a minimum, each center should offer: medical screenings; treatment for common illnesses and minor injuries; referral and follow-up for serious illnesses and emergencies; on-site care and consultation as well as referral and follow-up for pregnancy, chronic diseases and disorders, and emotional and mental problems; on-site referral and care for drug and alcohol abuse and sexually transmitted diseases; sports and employment physicals; immunizations; laboratory testing; and preventive services to reduce high-risk behaviors that lead to sexually transmitted diseases, drug and alcohol abuse, violence and injuries.

Operating Policies

The hours of operation should ensure that students have easy access to the center's services. In general, a SBHC should have both before- and after-school hours and should operate for some period of time during the summer to provide for physical exams required for sports participation. Every SBHC must have a plan that ensures students have access to care when the center is closed. (See section on Continuum of Care.)

Every school-based health center is required to promote abstinence as the method for preventing pregnancy and diseases. Centers are prohibited by State law from distributing contraceptives or abortifacient drugs or devices, and from counseling or advocating abortion, or referring any student to an organization for counseling or advocating abortion. A notice of this policy and the counseling prohibition must be posted in each health center. SBHC staff is required to sign a pledge to comply with the policies and procedures of the SBHC program.

All SBHCs must be certified as Medicaid providers. In addition, SBHCs should be enrollment sites for the expanded insurance program for Louisiana's children (LaCHIP).

Parental Consent

A parent or guardian must sign a written consent form, approved by school authorities, for a student to receive health center services. Parents may indicate which services they do or do not wish their children to receive at the center.

Staffing

Health care providers at each center should include, at a minimum, a nurse practitioner, registered nurse or physician assistant with experience in caring for adolescents; one or more part-time physicians; and a Master's level social worker or mental health professional at least half-time. The health center staff should also include an administrator and a medical office assistant. The school nurse should work with SBHC personnel.

Selection Criteria

The Adolescent School Health Initiative seeks to provide services to young people with limited or no access to health care providers. Grants are made through a competitive call for proposals process with decisions based upon the socioeconomic and health needs of the student population to be served, the health services available in the community, the level of community support, the likelihood of success in developing and operating a SBHC that will fulfill its service objectives, and the working relationship between the school and health care communities.

Continuum of Care

Centers must execute cooperative agreements with community health care providers to link students to support and specialty services not provided at the school site. Centers must arrange 24-hour coverage ensuring that students have access to services during non-operating hours, including nights, weekends, holidays, and summer vacation.

Evaluation & Performance Improvement

The OPH program office maintains a rigorous reporting and review process designed to ensure SBHC compliance with all policies and operating requirements and to promote continuous improvement in the delivery of services. Thus, every SBHC is required to (1) annually develop a plan articulating its performance objectives and methods for monitoring and evaluating achievements of its objectives; (2) participate in the *Clinical Fusion - Primary Health Care On-Line* data collection system; (3) submit periodic progress reports; (4) develop and maintain a financial management system; (5) participate in the Louisiana School-Based Health Center Network, especially the efforts to maintain and improve quality of care and services delivery; (6) complete the Program Effectiveness Review Tool (quality assurance) and develop three quality improvement programs annually; (7) post the telephone number for reporting violations of policies or submitting complaints.

Continuous Quality Improvement Program

The Adolescent School Health Initiative's (ASHI) Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) Program is designed to assure that quality medical, psychological and educational health services are delivered to all children seen at Louisiana School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs).

The CQI Program has five goals:

1. To continuously monitor operations to improve the quality of child health care
2. To identify best practices for Louisiana school-based health care
3. To observe Louisiana SBHCs in order to identify problems
4. To measure Louisiana SBHC performance
5. To develop plans to improve the quality of care

The CQI program consists of four steps:

Self-Evaluation

Each SBHC annually performs a self-evaluation using the Louisiana Peer Effectiveness Review Tool (LAPERT), which includes an evaluation of the center's compliance with Louisiana's Principles, Standards and Guidelines for SBHCs.

On-Site Review

A comprehensive CQI monitoring review of each SBHC sponsor is conducted at least once every three years. The CQI peer review team consists of health care providers from other SBHCs, representatives from other state agencies, and ASHI program staff. The team conducts an on-site visit of the SBHC to observe, measure and validate the self-reported information provided in the LAPERT.

Quality Improvement Recommendations

The CQI peer review team provides technical assistance to SBHC staff on how to improve the quality, efficiency and effectiveness of school-based child health care and to certify SBHCs for continued OPH funding.

Ongoing Monitoring

The OPH program office monitors SBHC annual preparation of the LAPERT, self-improvement efforts, and compliance with the recommendations of the peer review team.

The first three-year cycle of reviews was completed in 1999-2000. A total of thirteen SBHC sponsors underwent the on-site review process during this three-year cycle.

SBHCs Encourage Collaboration

Southeastern Louisiana University's (SLU) Excellence in Health and Education Project (EHEP) as Coordinator/Collaborator: EHEP's goal is to provide leadership and advocacy in order to guarantee quality health and educational learning opportunities in Louisiana. EHEP meets this goal through coordination and collaboration with a multitude of agencies and groups including: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Louisiana Department of Education, Office of Public Health, New Orleans Public Schools, Association of State and Territorial Health Officials, American Cancer Society, Frost Foundation, Area Health Education Centers, and the Louisiana School Nurse Association.

In 1999-2000, EHEP held its third annual Summer Institute Training with 267 participants attending. EHEP also conducted training sessions throughout the year for the Department of Education's Cadre of Trainers and established a website, in conjunction with SLU, that serves as a health education resource for the state.

Louisiana Assembly on School-Based Health Care: The Louisiana Assembly on School-Based Health Care was formed in 1994. Its mission is to serve as the state chapter of the National Assembly on SBHC, provide advocacy, support and coordinate activities set by the state membership, and seek support for expansion of SBHCs. This year the Assembly produced a Technical Support Manual for new sites and presented it at a one-day technical assistance workshop in November. In addition, they sponsored a two-day statewide conference for SBHC personnel and other child advocates. They also established mentoring relationships to enable new grantees to obtain ongoing guidance from experienced providers.

SBHCs Magnet for Collaboration among Health and Educational Professionals: SBHCs are an ideal place for educators and health professionals to use their expertise for the common good of healthy children and adolescents. By reinforcing messages and lessons about healthy choices and avoidance of risk behaviors, potential problems can be identified so as to avoid serious consequences.

Matching Funds or In-Kind Services Lead to Diverse Contributors: All SBHCs provide a minimum of 20 percent of the amount received from OPH in matching funds or in-kind services. These local resources are not only critical to SBHC operation, but also allow for additional activities. Some of these contributors include: local hospitals, government agencies, foundations, non-profit organizations, community clinics and coalitions, private industry and school boards.

Intergovernmental Coordinating Council

By Louisiana law (R.S. 40:31.3), the Intergovernmental Coordinating Council must be "composed of representatives from the departments of education, social services, health and hospitals, and other governmental entities or programs related to health services to assist in the implementation, oversight, and funding of health centers in schools." These representatives coordinate intergovernmental policies for school-based health services; examine resource options for providing health care to public school children; promote plans for expanding health care to uninsured school children; analyze the potential of public insurance resources, such as Kidmed and Medicaid; identify available local resources; and encourage business leaders to enhance primary health care expansion within the environments which school children live, learn and socialize.

The Council is committed to integrating common school-based health care objectives; progressively coordinating school-based medical, mental and addictive disorder services with community-based primary care services; and expanding existing school-based services into a seamless statewide network of comprehensive child health care. For example, with the collaborative efforts of the Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH) Assistant Secretaries from the Office for Addictive Disorders, Office of Mental Health and Office of Public Health, the Council developed a long-term interdepartmental plan for providing preventive and primary health care to school children who are without financial means, without primary care providers, and without access to any alternative source of primary health care. The DHH collaborative initiative enabled the three agencies to reduce duplication of school-based services; pool resources; and expand seamless child health care networks at the local school district level.




In support of Coordinated School Health Programs, we hereby affirm the following:

- ♦ Health and educational achievement are integrally linked. *"Students must be healthy in order to be educated, and they must be educated in order to remain healthy."* — Committee on Comprehensive School Health Programs, Institute of Medicine
- ♦ The risky behaviors in which youth engage are the main threats to their health and academic success. *These behaviors, which frequently are interrelated, include those behaviors that lead to unintentional and intentional injury; tobacco, alcohol, and drug use; sexual behaviors that contribute to unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases; unhealthy dietary behaviors; and physical inactivity.*
- ♦ Health promotion and education efforts held or conducted in and around schools should focus on all children. *Risky behaviors often are established during youth and extend into adulthood. Schools provide a unique opportunity to reach the majority of children early.*
- ♦ School health programs must address all aspects of health: physical, mental, as well as social well being. *Components of a coordinated school health program include health education, health services, healthy school environment, physical education, counseling, psychological and social services, nutritional services, integrated school and community, and worksite health promotion for faculty and staff.*
- ♦ Effective school health programs involve families and communities and build on the assets of their communities. *Parents are the single most important influence on children. Communities should have the resources to support effective School Health Programs.*
- ♦ School health programs work and are cost-effective. *The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that for every \$1.00 spent on school health, there is a \$13.00 savings on health care costs. School failure, underachievement, and poor health exact immense human and monetary costs to our state that we cannot afford to ignore.*

We call upon all citizens of Louisiana to take a role in creating safe, nurturing environments for our youth where their emotional, social, and physical health can be fostered and where they can grow to be successful adults.

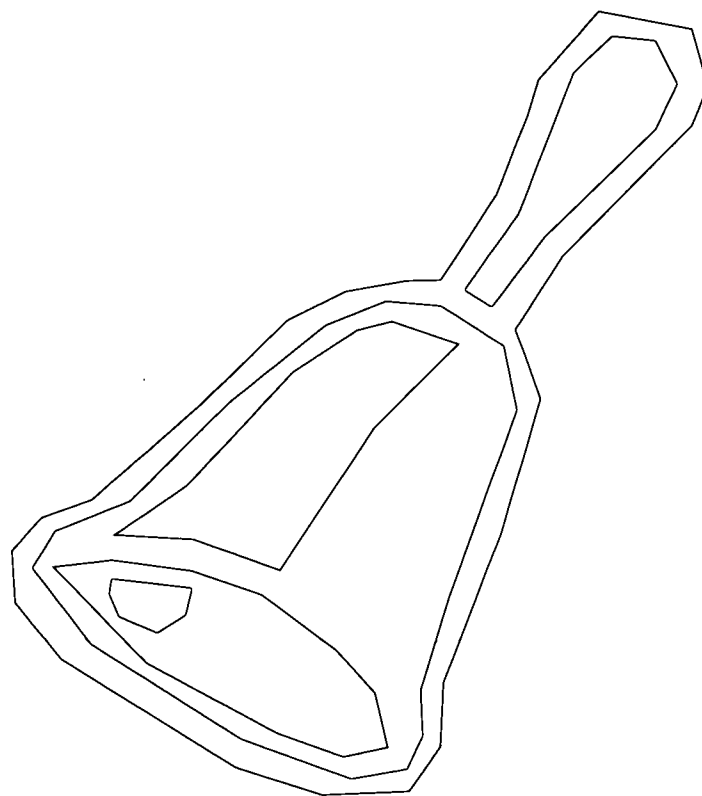

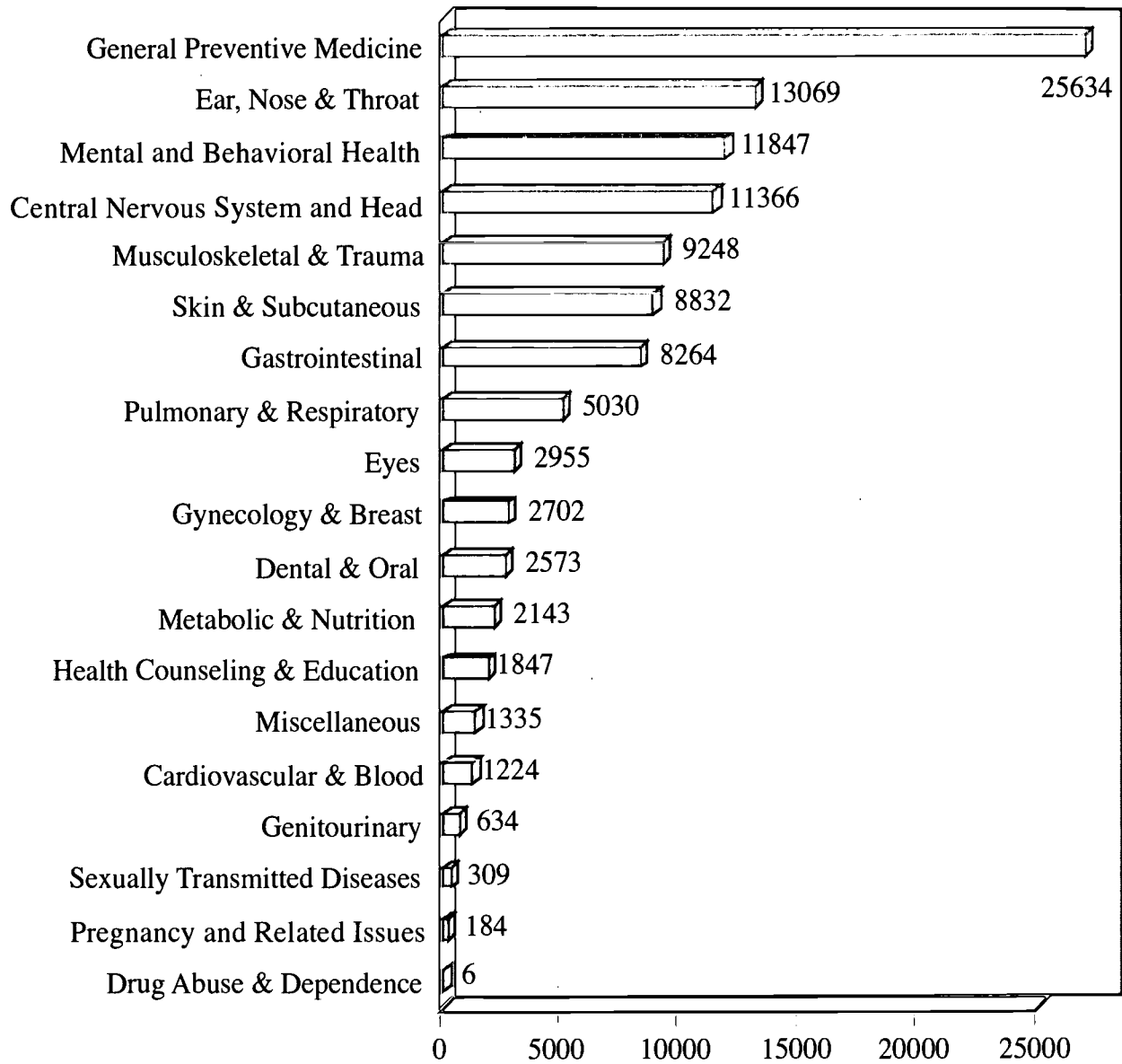

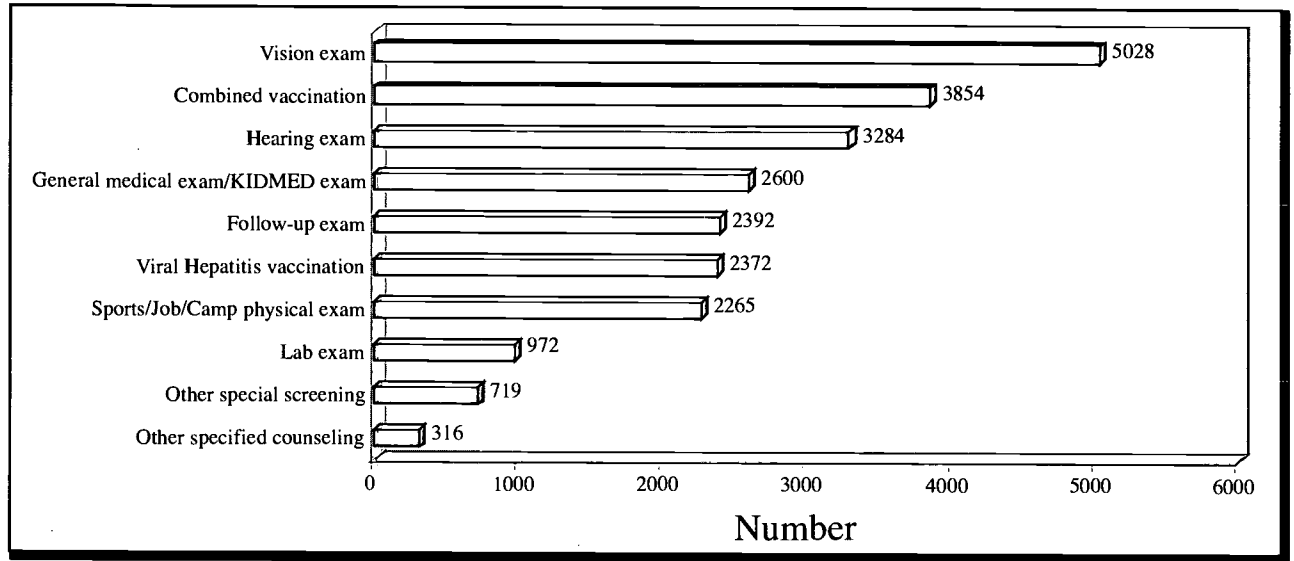


Who Visits SBHCs & Why

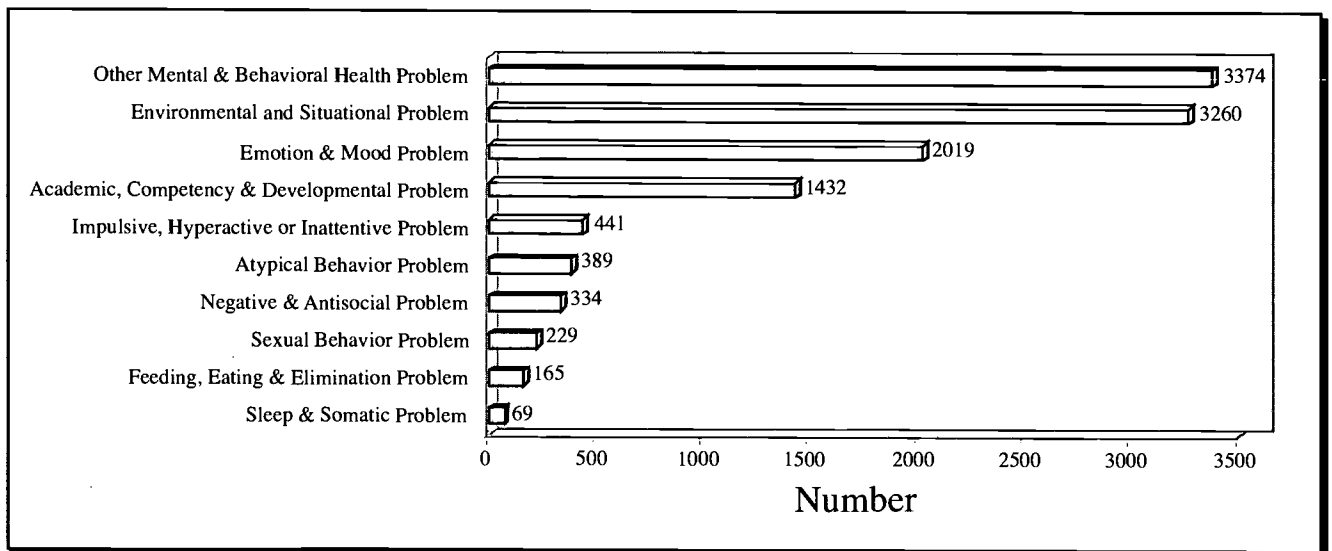
Number of Conditions Seen at SBHCs, by Category



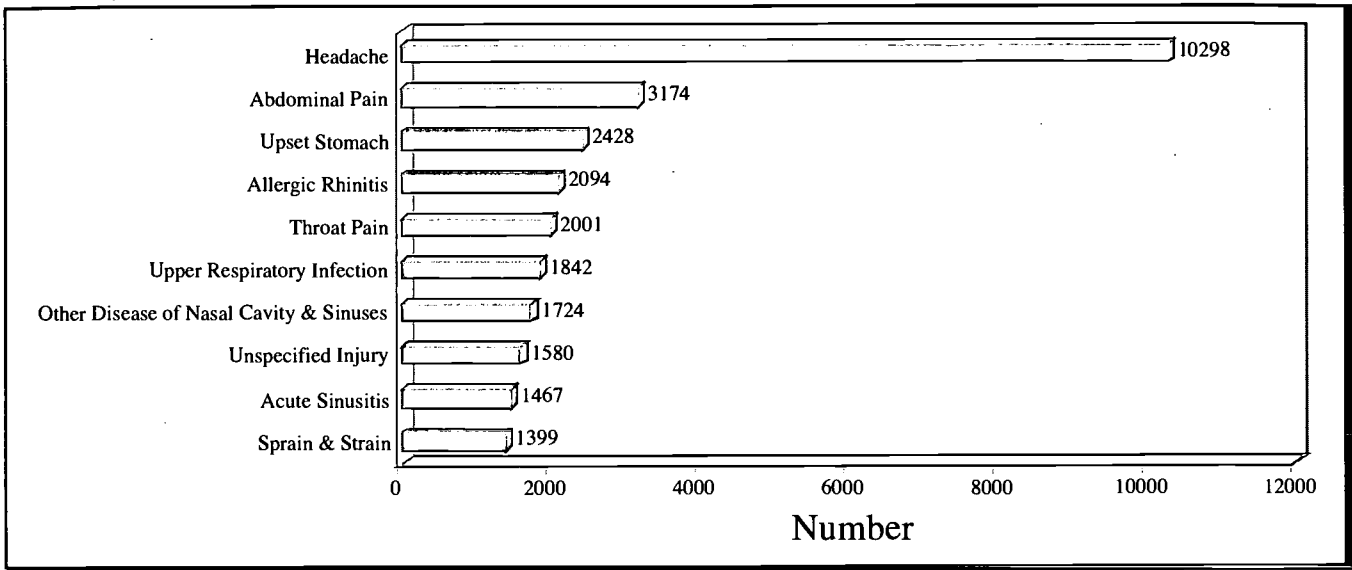
Leading Reasons for General Preventive Medicine Visits



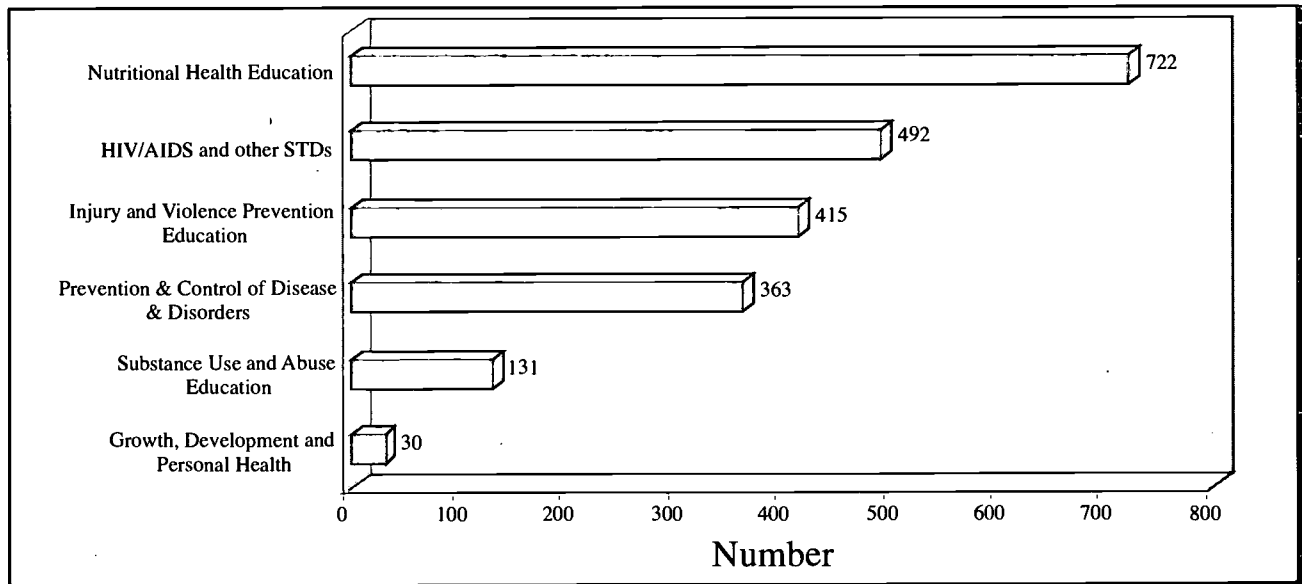
Leading Mental & Behavioral Health Issues Addressed, by Category

Leading Reasons for Health Counseling and Education Visits



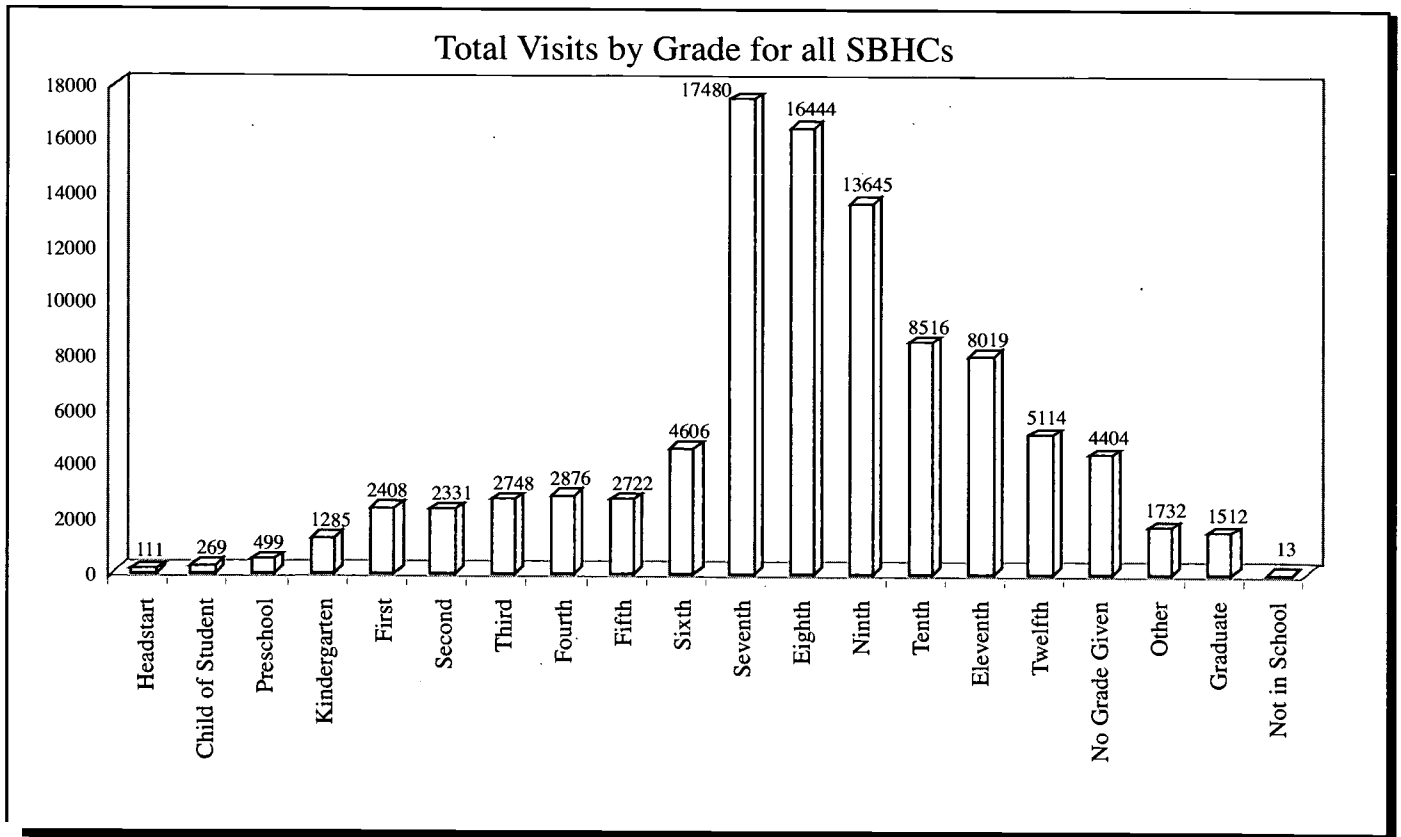
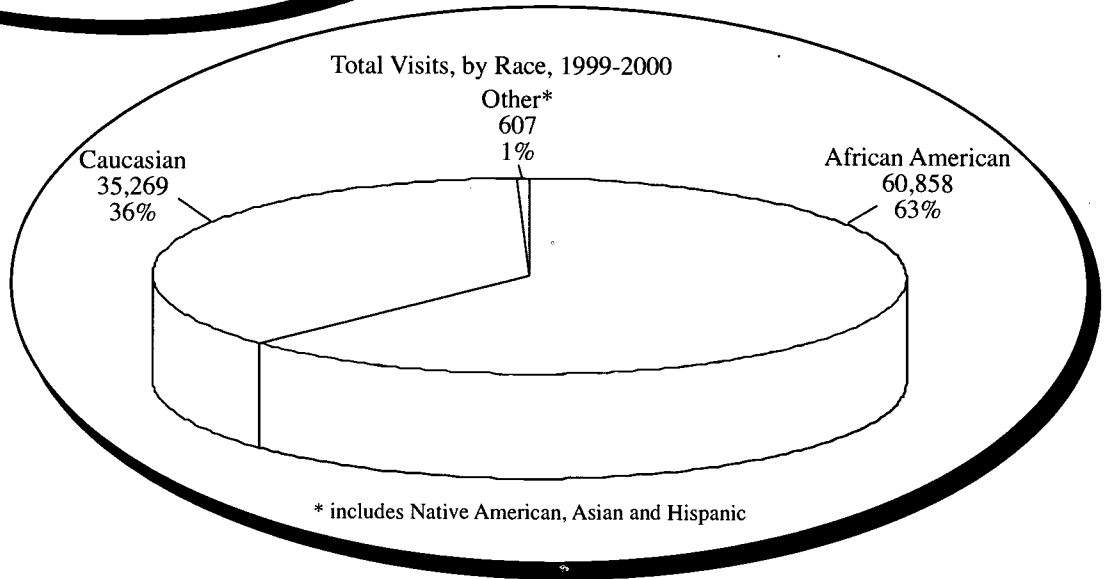
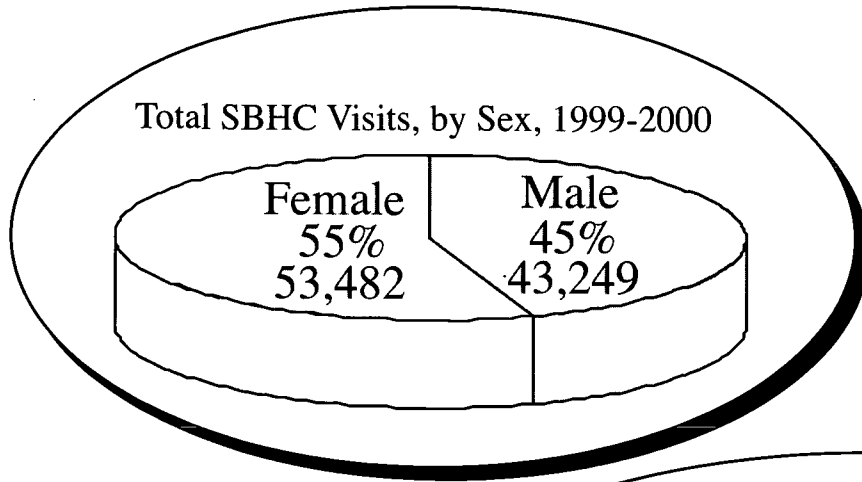
Additional Services provided at SBHCs:

Group Services

In addition to the above health, mental health and education services for individuals, SBHC staff offer small group health education and group therapeutic and support counseling to students. In 1999-2000, there were nearly 1800 such groups with over 38,000 participants.

Medication Administration

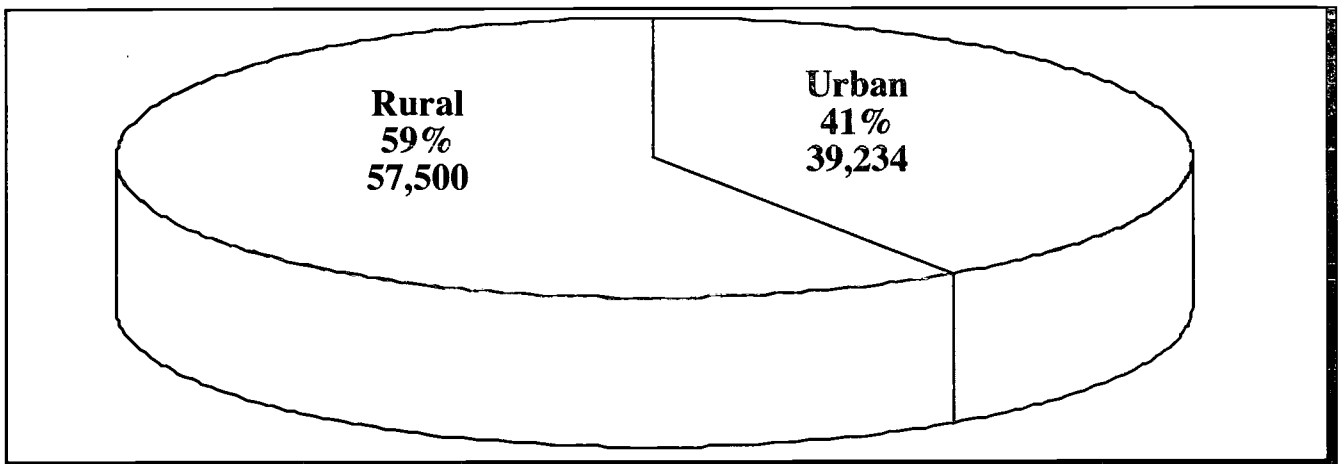
Medications are administered to students for chronic conditions such as attention deficit disorder, allergies, acne, and asthma as well as for acute illnesses.



Comparison View of Rural versus Urban Sites

The ASHI began in urban schools with high concentrations of economically disadvantaged and uninsured students. Immediately after its inception, however, rural communities recognized the value of health centers in their schools, which could provide services to adolescents lacking access to health care. While adolescents all experience similar physical and mental health challenges, both the obvious and subtle differences can be addressed by the health center because it remains a community-based initiative. The following information and the SBHC profiles in Section Three illustrate both the similarities and differences among the centers.

Urban SBHC include any SBHC located in a city identified by the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) as being metropolitan. These cities include Alexandria, Baton Rouge, Houma, Lafayette, Lake Charles, Monroe, New Orleans, and Shreveport-Bossier City.

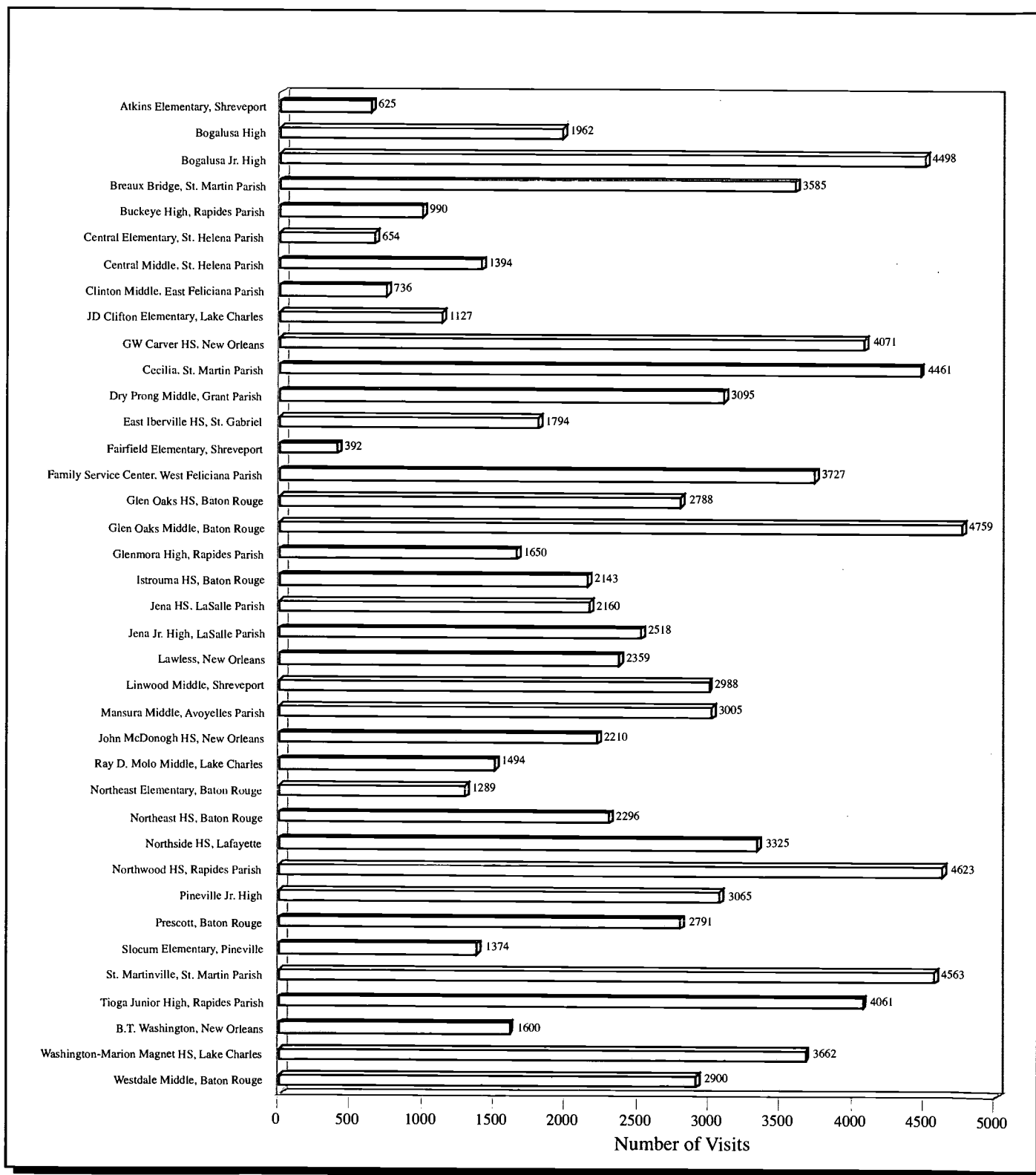
Rural SBHC include any SBHC that is located in a city that has not been identified as metropolitan by the MSA.

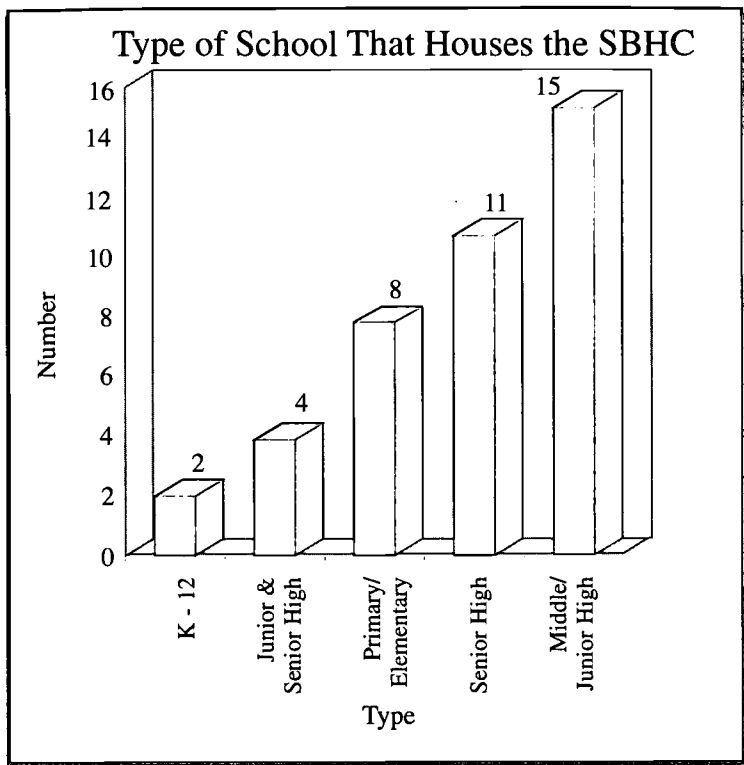

Number of Visits by Site, 1999-2000, N = 96,734

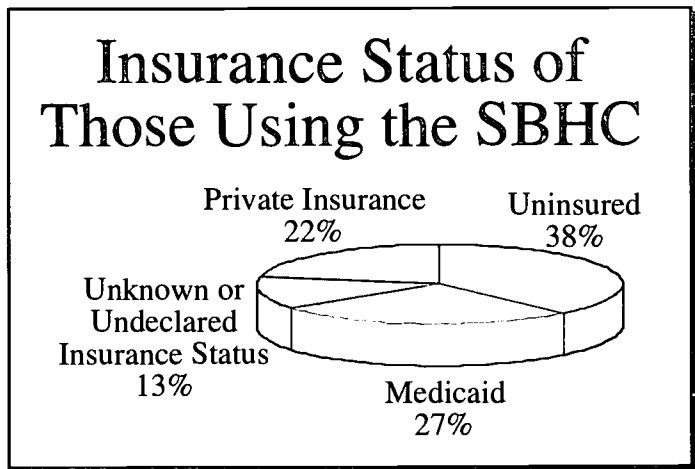
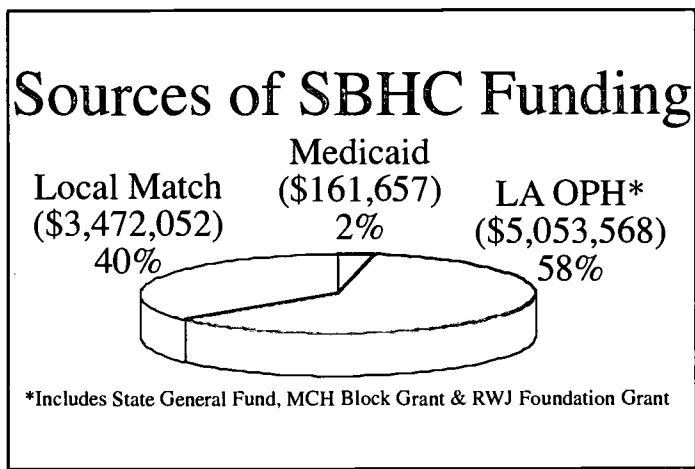

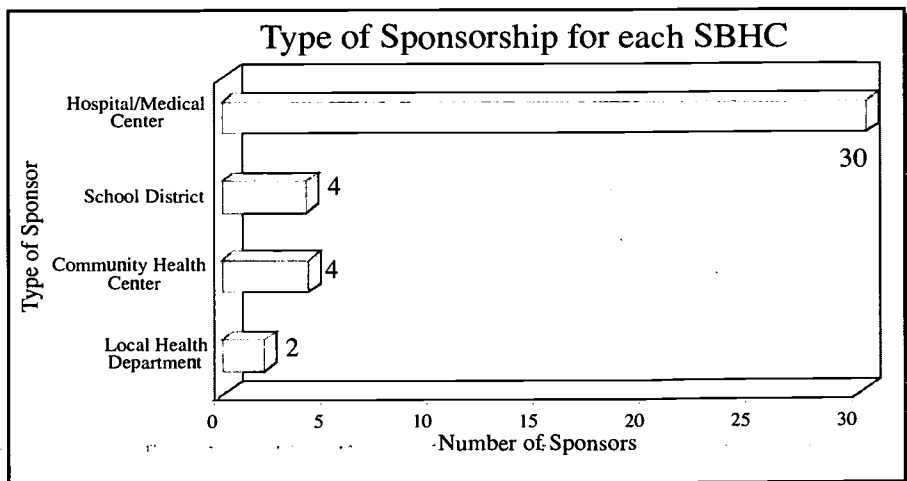


Although the program is mandated to serve middle and high school students, children in primary and elementary grades at “feeder” schools are also served (see Visits by Grade on page 24). In some areas, centers were located on primary or elementary school campuses when no space was available at the nearby middle or high school (left).

The primary reasons OPH funds centers are demonstrated need for and lack of access to care. Student insurance status, as reported by the centers from parental consent forms, indicates that over half of patients served are either uninsured, have not declared or do not know their status (below).

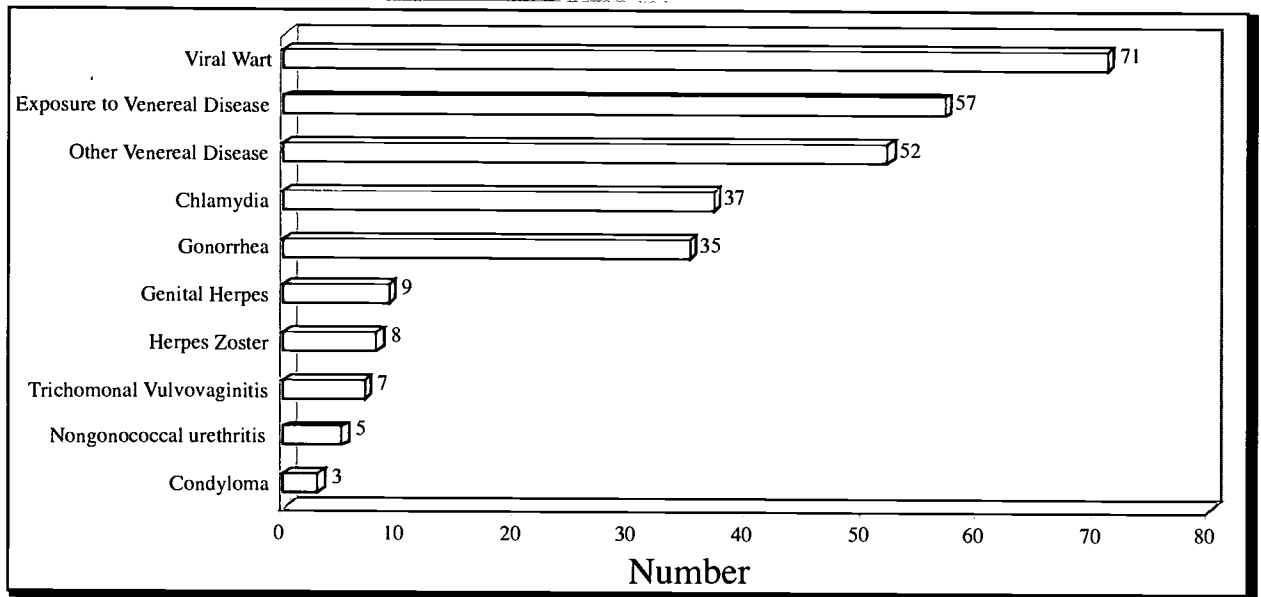


While the local match requirement is 20% of the OPH grant, communities have exceeded this figure, indicating that for every dollar in state funds, communities provide another 69 cents in local support (above). Medicaid does not reimburse for all services provided at SBHCs (particularly mental health services). This potential funding source, therefore, remains limited, despite expansion of eligibility under LaCHIP (above).



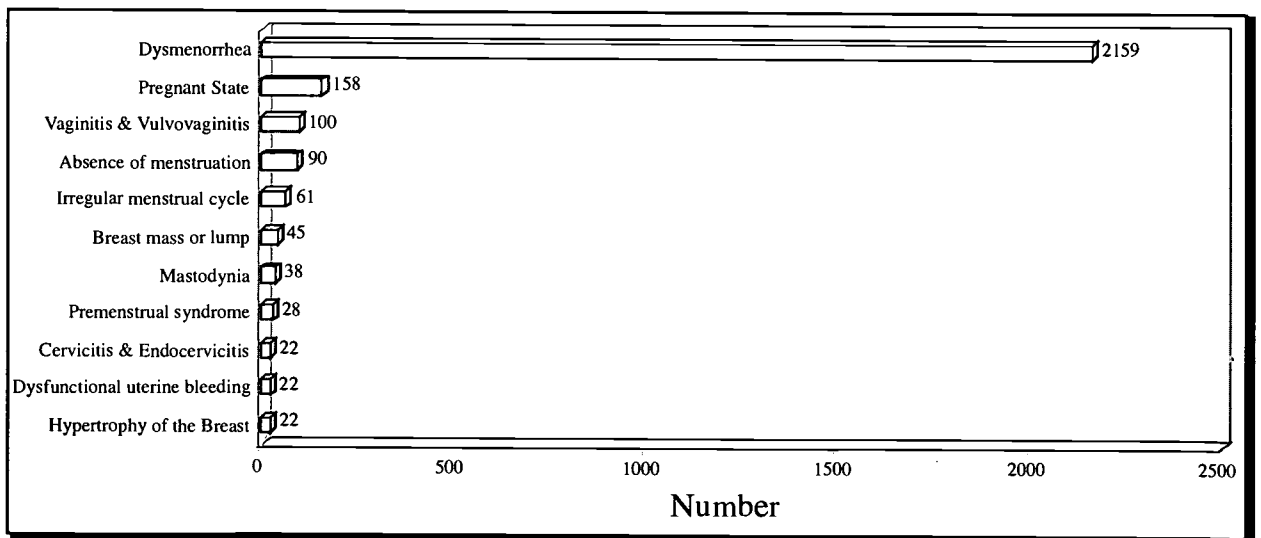
Gynecological and Reproductive Health Visits

Leading Sexually Transmitted Disease Related Visits



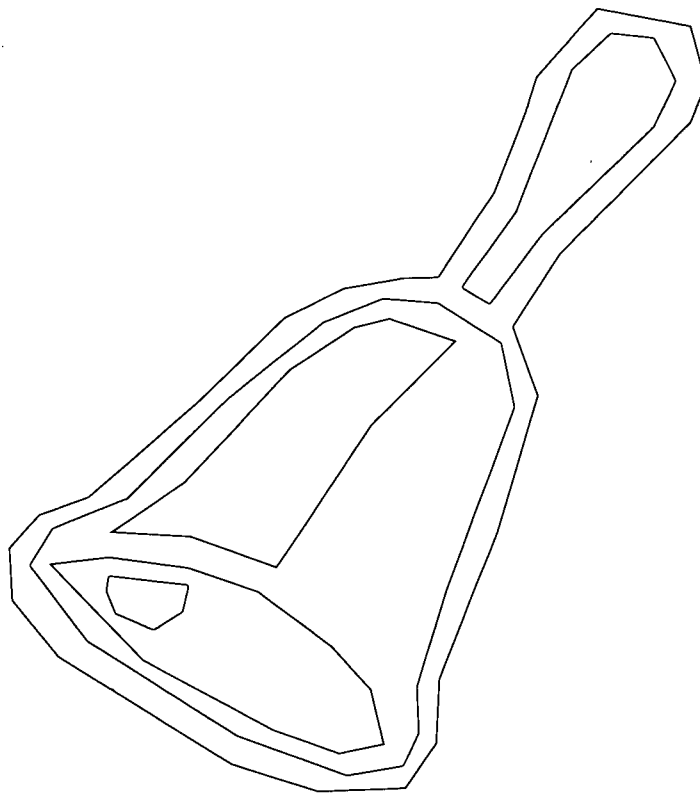
Of 96,734 visits in 1999-2000, 2,886, less than 3%, were for conditions related to gynecological and reproductive health issues. These visits were associated with routine gynecological health, treatment for sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy care in centers that provide prenatal care. It is the policy of SBHCs in Louisiana, in compliance with the laws of the State on sexuality education, counseling, services and referral, to promote and encourage abstinence from premarital sexual activity. SBHCs serve to reinforce lessons and messages embodied in the school's health education curriculum that abstinence is the most effective way to prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Abstinence is also emphasized for teens seeking treatment for diseases resulting from sexual activity.

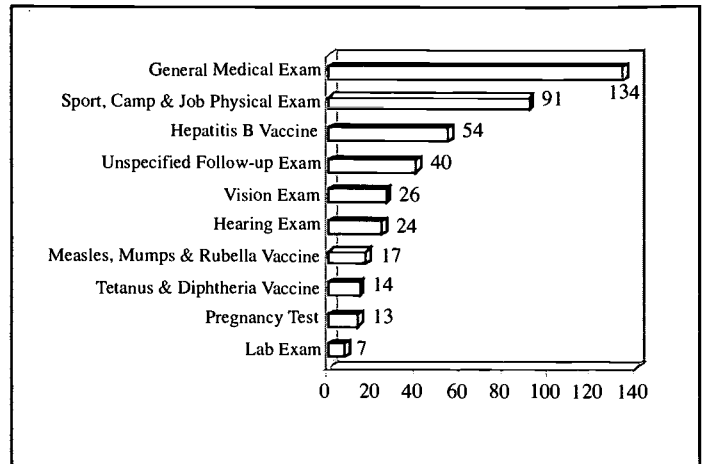

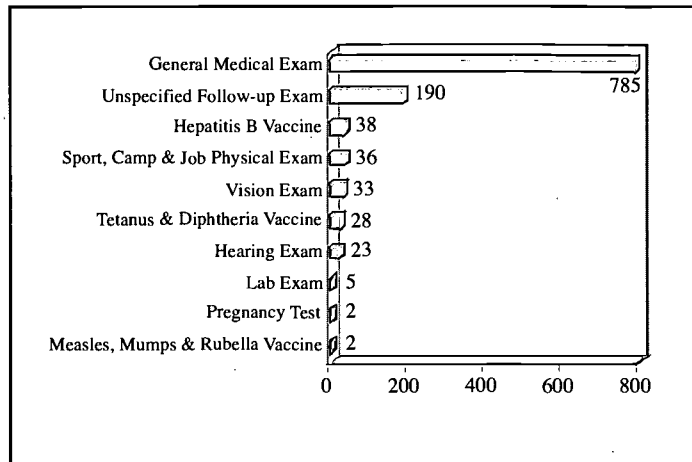

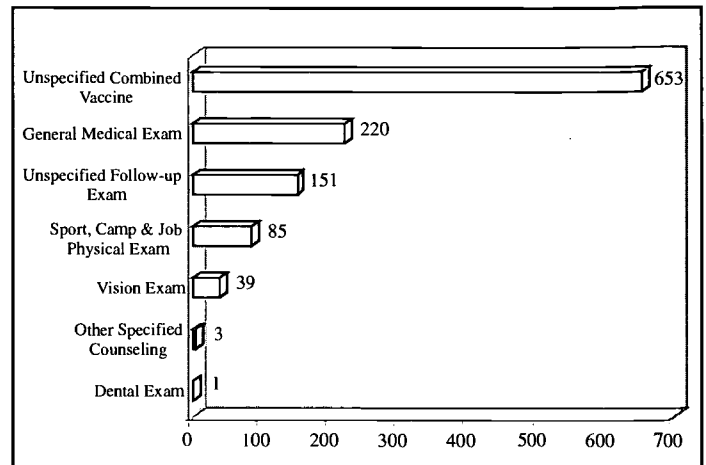
Top 10 Conditions for Injury & Illness Related Visits During 1999-2000

Appendix A

CATEGORY DEFINITIONS OF CONDITIONS SEEN AT LOUISIANA SBHCs

International Classification of Disease, Version 9 (ICD-9) codes are grouped into general categories. A definition of categories follows:

Cardiovascular & Blood: elevated blood pressure, hypertension, hypotension, and blood disorders

Central Nervous System and Head: Epilepsy, concussions, headaches, seizure disorder, cerebral palsy and syncope

Dental & Oral: dental caries and other diseases of teeth and gums

Drug Abuse and Dependence: diagnosis related to alcohol abuse, cannabis abuse and tobacco use

Ear, Nose & Throat: diagnosis related to conditions of the ear, such as ear infections and wax build-up; the nose, such as nose bleeds and diseases of the nasal cavity and sinuses; and the throat, such as pharyngitis and strep throat

Eyes: diagnoses related to eyes and vision such as vision problems, conjunctivitis, injury to the eye and near-sightedness

Gastrointestinal: diarrhea, irritable bowel syndrome, constipation, gastroenteritis and other digestive disorders

General Preventive Medicine: immunizations, physical exams, and special screenings

Genitourinary: urinary tract infection

Gynecology & Breast: dysmenorrhea (painful menstruation), irregular menses & other gynecological disorders

Health Counseling & Education: not limited to, but includes dissemination of information on personal health, consumer health, nutritional health, substance use and abuse, HIV/AIDS, and injury prevention and safety

Mental and Behavioral Health: includes all mental health service provisions such as individual counseling, case management and diagnoses such as adjustment disorder with depressed mood, conduct disorder, parent-child problem, academic problem, bereavement and attention deficit disorders. This category does include group counseling.

Metabolic & Nutrition: obesity and dehydration

Miscellaneous: reported conditions not related to a specific diagnosis category such as abnormal results of blood tests, malaise & fatigue, and administrative procedures

Musculoskeletal & Trauma: joint pain, joint swelling, tendonitis, scoliosis and any bone, cartilage, or muscle disorders; includes injuries

Pregnancy & Related Issues: suspected pregnancy, pregnancy counseling, prenatal care, postpartum care and bleeding in pregnancy

Pulmonary & Respiratory: acute lower respiratory infections, asthma, and other respiratory disorders

Sexually Transmitted Diseases: chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, genital warts and genital herpes

Skin and Subcutaneous: diagnoses related to skin disorders such as acne, warts, psoriasis, scabies, head lice, ringworm, athlete's foot, contact dermatitis and ingrown nail

Appendix B

**ADOLESCENT SCHOOL HEALTH INITIATIVE ACT
R.S. 40:31.3**

To enact R.S. 40:31.3, relative to adolescent school health; to require the Office of Public Health, Department of Health and Hospitals, to establish an adolescent school health initiative; and to provide for related matters.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

Section 1. R.S. 40:31.3 is hereby enacted to read as follows:

31.3. Adolescent school health initiative; health centers in schools

A. The Office of Public Health, Department of Health and Hospitals, shall establish an adolescent school health initiative to facilitate and encourage development of comprehensive health centers in public middle and secondary schools in Louisiana which shall provide preventive health services, counseling, acute health services, and appropriate referral for acute health services. Such initiative shall be subject to the approval of the local school systems.

B. The Office of Public Health shall:

(1) Coordinate efforts to facilitate and encourage establishment of health centers in schools by providing information, technical assistance, direction, and, to the extent appropriate, funds to locally based entities for the establishment and operation of health centers in middle and secondary schools.

(2) Convene and participate in an intergovernmental coordinating council which shall be composed of representatives from the department of education, social services, health and hospitals, and other governmental entities or programs related to health services to assist in implementation, oversight, and funding assistance for health centers in schools.

(3) Apply for and assist local efforts to apply for all available public and private funds to establish and operate health centers in schools.

(4) Establish procedures for allocation of funds appropriated or otherwise available to the program in a manner which prioritizes funding according to the urgency and degree of health care needs among the various middle and secondary school populations.

(5) Establish criteria to be considered in selection of locations or placement of health centers in schools.

C. Health centers in schools are prohibited from:

(1) Counseling or advocating abortion in any way or referring any student to any organization for counseling or advocating abortion.

(2) Distributing at any public school any contraceptive or abortifacient drug, device, or other similar product.

D. The provisions of this Section shall be applicable only to the extent that funds are made available for this purpose from public or private sources.

Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature by the governor, as provided in Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana.
