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ABSTRACT

The Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges, in compliance with the State Legislature's requirements, issues a yearly report detailing executive compensation in the community colleges. There are three major organizational configurations in the state: (1) 20 multi-college districts administered by chancellors; (2) 56 colleges in multi-college districts administered by presidents; and (3) 52 single colleges in single-college districts administered by superintendent/presidents as chief executive officers. In the multi-college districts, the highest total compensation for a chancellor is \$220,063 in the Peralta Community College District, while the lowest in the area is \$122,100 in the Yosemite Community College District; the average is \$164,818. The highest compensation for a president in a multi-college district is \$167,284 at Los Angeles Southwest College, while the lowest is \$89,000 at San Diego City College; the average is \$124,872. The highest compensation for a superintendent/president of a single-college district is \$211,586 at the San Francisco Community College District, while the lowest is \$108,000 at Feather River College; the average salary is \$137, 905. This report looked at 72 districts and 108 accredited colleges in the compilation of its data. (NB)

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Preface

The California Postsecondary Education Commission (CPEC) is required by the Legislature to annually produce a report entitled, *Executive Compensation in California's Public Higher Education*, which has information on the compensation earned by the chief executives in the California State University and the University of California. The report also includes the salaries of the executive staffs of the two systems. The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office asked that CPEC include information on chancellors and presidents in the community college system, as well as the salaries of the chancellor's executive staff.

The information in this report was developed from surveys sent on *March 3, 2001*, to chancellors and presidents within the California Community Colleges. It is important to remember that there are at any time some interim positions and some new hires in which contracts are re-negotiated. This report is shared with the Board of Governors, CPEC, local trustees, chief executive officers, and any other interested parties who may have a need for the information. It displays three years' worth of data for chief executive officers of the California Community Colleges and for the Chancellor's Office executive staff.

Compensation of Chief Executives in the California Community Colleges

2000-01

The information on executive compensation was collected from surveys sent directly to chancellors and presidents of the California Community Colleges. The total compensation of these chief executives include their annual base salaries and a stipend possession of a doctoral degree.

Among the community colleges are found three main organizational arrangements. The complexity and breadth of responsibility for the chief executive officers varies between these different organizational structures. The three major organizational configurations are:

- 20 multi-college districts administered by chancellors;
- 56 colleges in multi-college districts administered by presidents; and,
- 52 single colleges in single-college districts administered by superintendent/presidents as chief executive officers.

Because of the differences in organizational structure among the community colleges and the variations in the chief executives' responsibilities, the information is presented for three groups of chief executives (corresponding to the three organizational arrangements found among the community colleges). We looked at 72 districts and 108 accredited colleges.

Chancellors of Multi-College Districts: The highest total compensation for a chancellor of a multi-college district is \$220,063 in the Peralta Community College District. The lowest compensation for a chancellor in this area is \$122,100 in the Yosemite Community College District. The average compensation for the 20 chancellors of multi-college districts is \$164,818.

College Presidents in Multi-College Districts: The total compensation of the 56 presidents of individual colleges within multi-college districts range from \$89,000 at San Diego City College to \$167,284 at Los Angeles Southwest College. The 56 college presidents average total compensation is \$124,872.

Superintendents/Presidents of Single-College Districts: The highest compensation received by a superintendent/president is \$211,586 at the San Francisco Community College District. The lowest compensation of \$108,000 is received by the superintendent/presidents at Feather River College. The average compensation for the 52 superintendent/presidents is \$137,905.
