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ABSTRACT

This profile of independent colleges emphasizes how diverse, affordable, personal, involved, and flexible such institutions are, and how they contribute to the success of their students. The 1,600 independent colleges and universities in the United States enroll 2.9 million students, and their variety ensures that students have choices in the educational experiences that will best serve their needs and interests. Private colleges and universities are more affordable than many people realize. Eighty percent of students at private institutions received some form of financial aid in 1995-1996. Much of this aid comes from the institutions' own resources, but federal and state financial assistance funds are also available. Education at a private institution is a highly personal experience, and students at private colleges and universities enjoy a lower student-to-faculty ratio than those at state colleges and universities. Independent colleges and universities are involved in their communities in many ways, as employers, sources of volunteers, and leaders in research. Private institutions are both flexible and convenient, meeting the needs of virtually everyone pursuing a higher education. A major characteristic of Independent colleges and universities is that they are successful in helping students achieve their goals. Students attending private colleges are more likely to complete their degrees in 4 years than those at public institutions, and this advantage is apparent for all ethnic groups. Students from private colleges and universities are also more likely to pursue graduate and professional education. (SLD)

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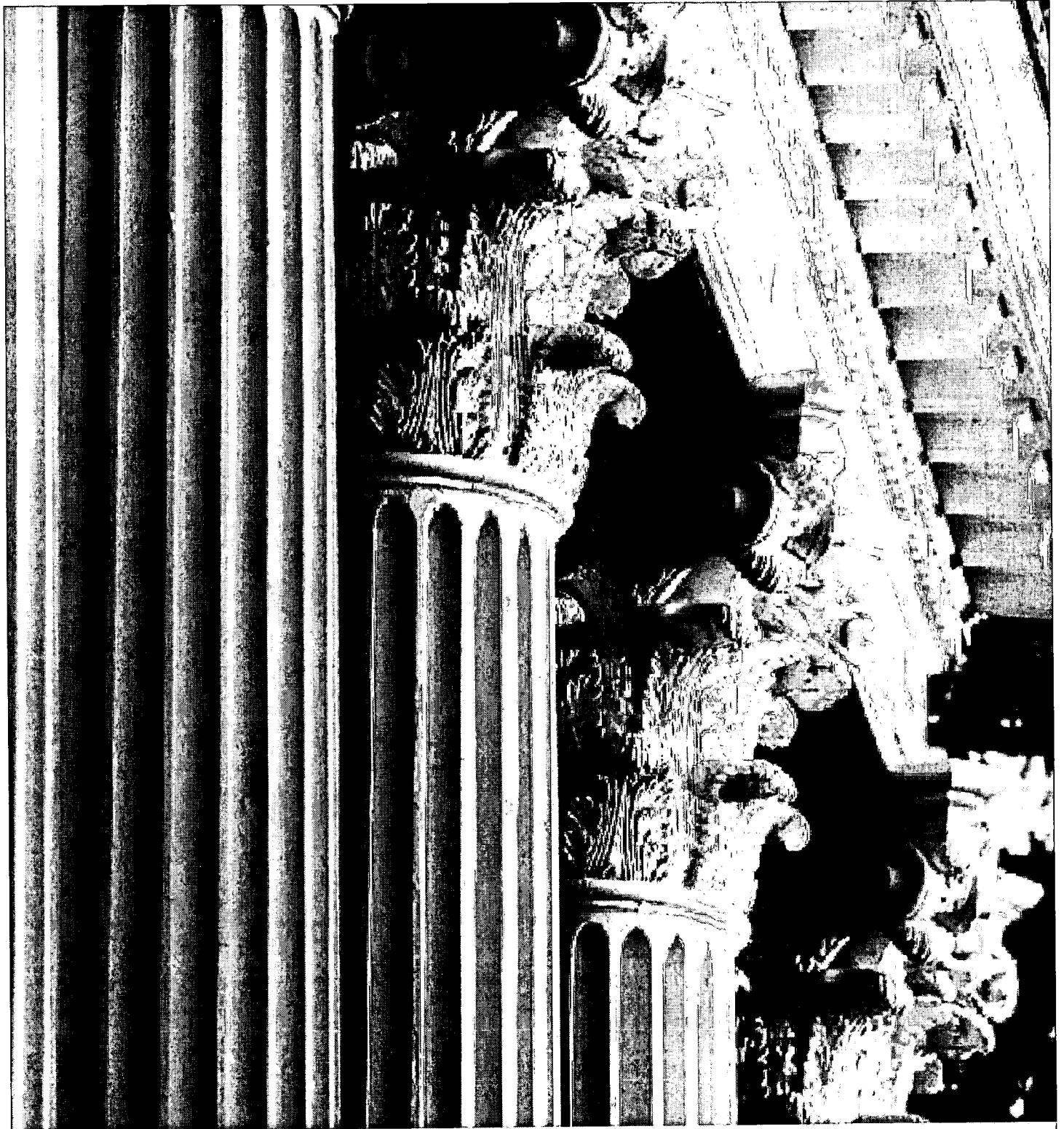

A private college education is a highly **personal** experience. It is marked by faculty who care about students as individuals, a wide array of counseling and guidance services, and a warm community of students, faculty, and staff who respect and support each other.

Independent colleges and universities are **involved** in the world beyond the classroom and campus in countless ways — as major employers, sources of a ready pool of volunteers, and leaders in research to benefit all of society. Today, many private colleges and universities also have joined with their neighbors beyond campus in innovative and ambitious partnerships to revitalize the local community.

The nation's 1,600 independent colleges and universities are **flexible** enough in their programs and convenient enough in their locations to meet the needs of virtually everyone pursuing higher education — whether coming directly out of high school, returning as an older degree student, or improving career skills part-time while continuing to work. Students can select a private college close to home, or get away to the kind of campus setting they prefer — whether urban, suburban, or rural. The flexibility at private colleges also extends to their hours and their offerings, as well as to the creation of satellite campuses close to where students live or work.

Whatever the expectations and needs of individual students, the real measure of a college education is how **successful** those students become. That means more than salaries and status. The greatest success for private college graduates may lie in the social, ethical, and reasoning skills they acquire through the caring and supportive environment they find on campus. In learning to think critically and communicate effectively, and by appreciating learning as a lifelong journey, private college students develop the abilities that will serve them well wherever life may take them.

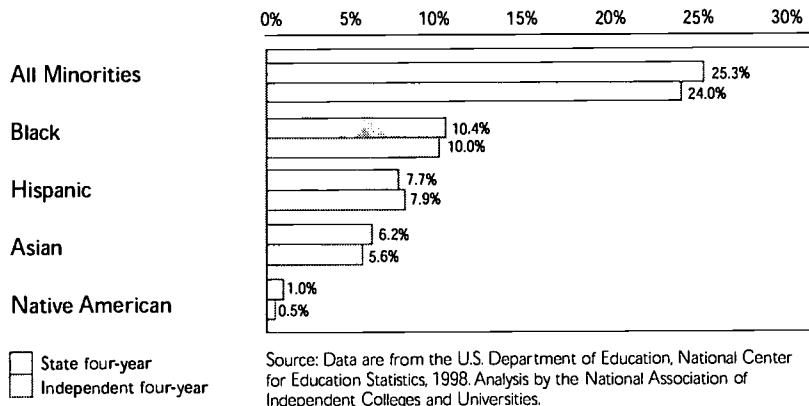
DIVERSE

Independent colleges and universities are as diverse as the nation itself. They include traditional liberal arts colleges, major research universities, church- and faith-related institutions, historically black colleges and universities, women's colleges, two-year colleges, and schools of law, medicine, engineering, art, business, and other professions.

The 1,600 independent colleges and universities in the United States enroll 2.9 million students. The number of students at these institutions ranges from fewer than 100 to more than 30,000, averaging 1,851.

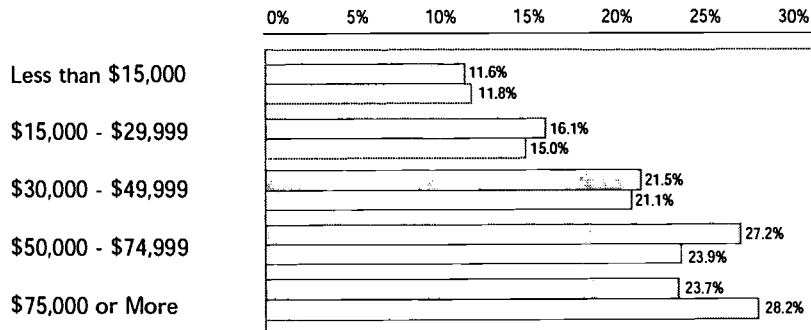

As a result, the students attending independent colleges and universities come from a broad array of family backgrounds, ethnicities and age groups, and have a wide-ranging set of academic and career interests.

In the U.S. Congress, 46 percent received their undergraduate degrees and 36 percent received their graduate or professional degrees from an independent college or university.

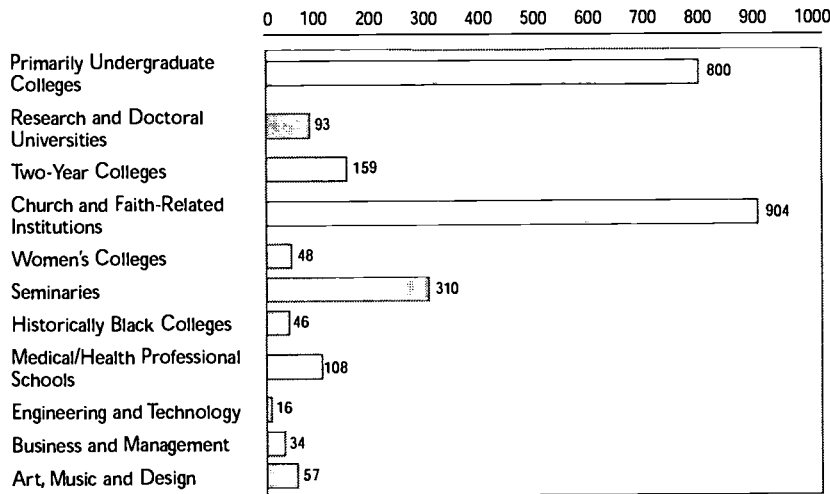
**Independent Colleges and Universities

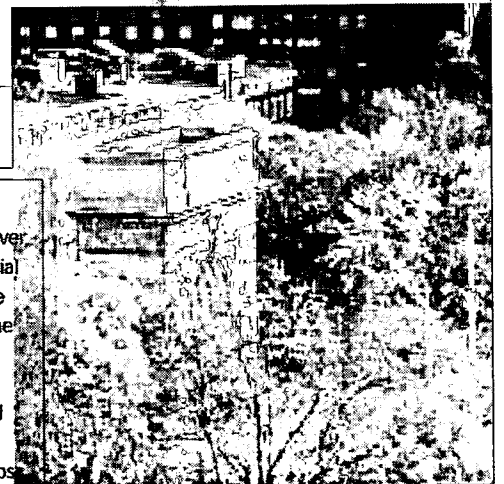

AFFORDABLE

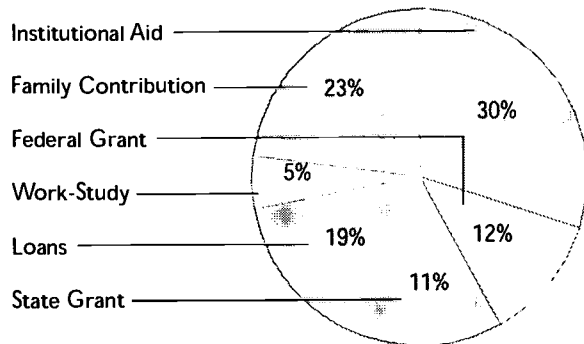
A quality education at an independent college or university is affordable to students of all family incomes. Eighty percent of dependent full-time undergraduate students at private institutions received some form of financial aid in 1995-96, averaging \$10,794.

Much of the aid to students comes from the institutions' own resources. In 1999-2000, independent colleges and universities provided nearly \$8 billion in financial assistance, mostly in the form of grants, compared with \$1.4 billion in 1984-85.

Tuition and fees at four-year independent colleges and universities averaged \$13,688 in 2000-01, ranging from zero (no tuition charges) to \$26,700.

Undergraduate students who receive grant aid pay an average of 61 percent of the published tuition at independent institutions. The amount varies

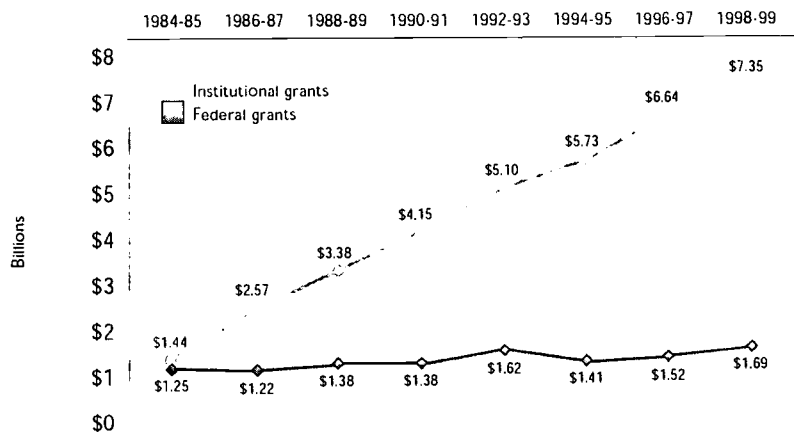


The average debt of students leaving public four-year and private four-year colleges is similar — \$12,000 and \$14,300, respectively in 1995-96.

according to each student's financial resources. Families who demonstrate the greatest financial need pay an average of 26 percent of the published tuition.

The actual cost of providing education — buildings, books, computers, laboratory equipment, services — is similar at comparable public and private colleges and universities. However, the price charged by public and private institutions is different because states subsidize the tuition of all students at public institutions — an average of \$6,300 per student in 1997-98.

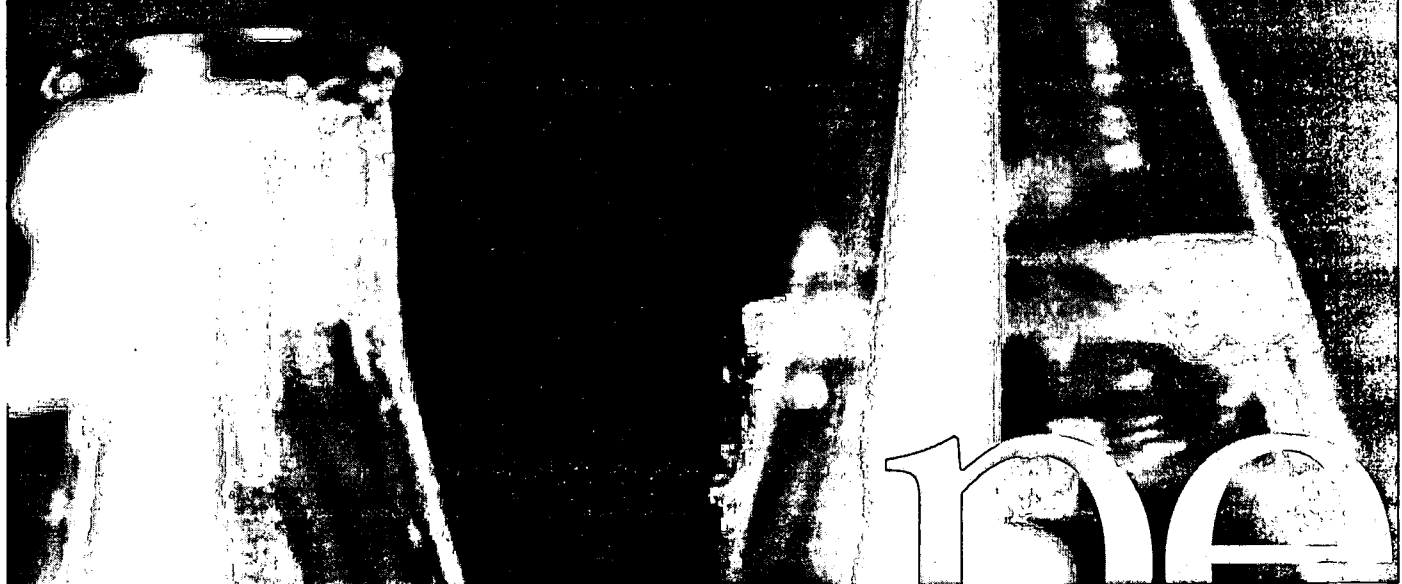

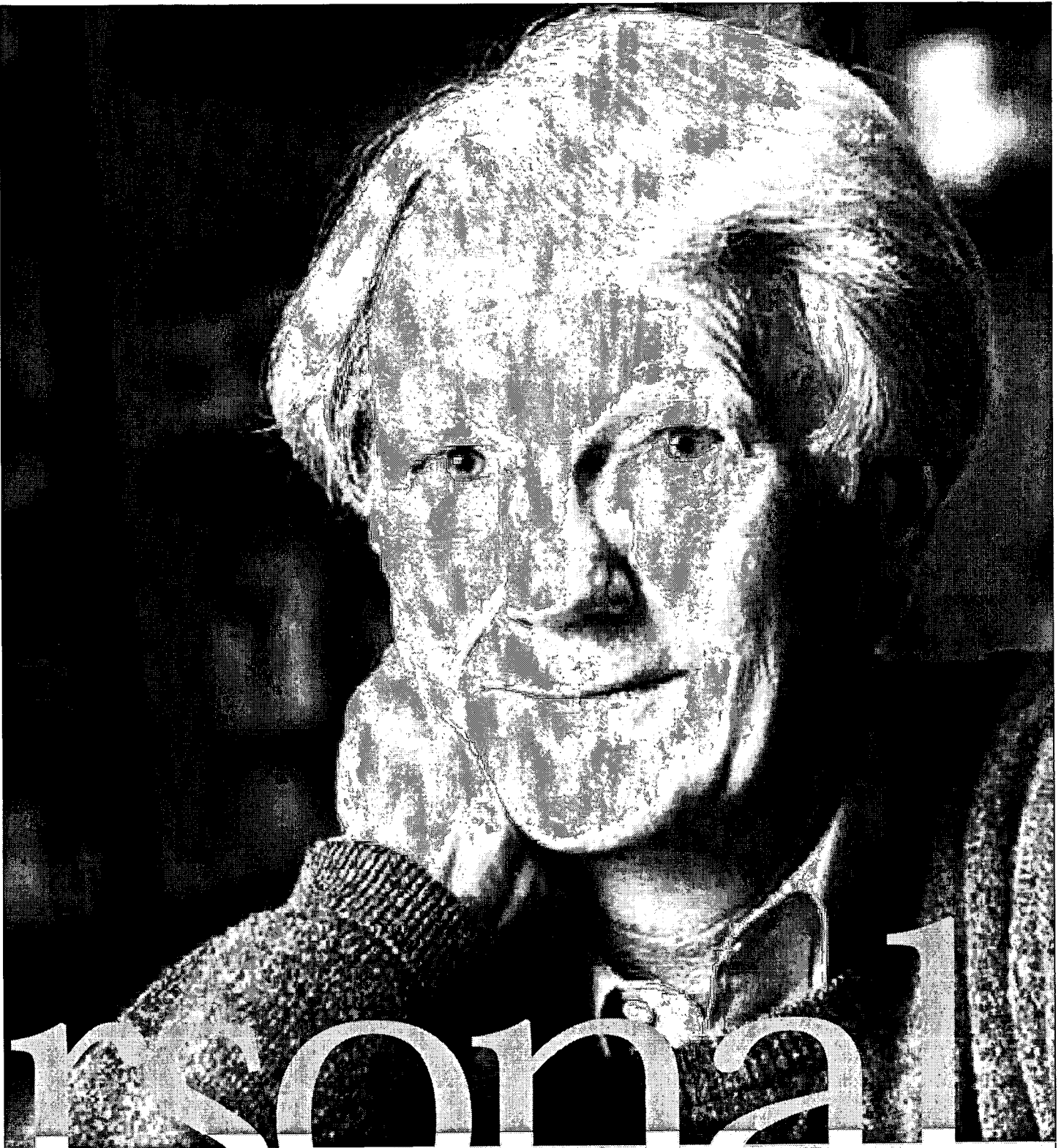

"This is a blessed occupation. I love these kids. Their parents have invested 18 years of very hard work, and then we get to work with these luminous children. They make my life a lot richer."

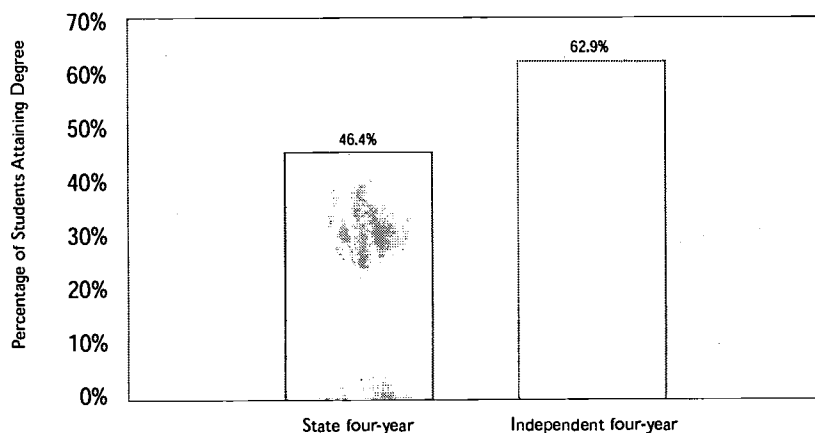

PERSONAL

Education at a private institution is a highly personal experience. It is marked by teachers who care about students as individuals, a wide array of counseling services, and a warm community of students, faculty, and staff who respect and support each other.

Students at private colleges and universities enjoy a lower student-to-faculty ratio than at state colleges and universities. They are also more likely to participate in study groups, talk with faculty outside of class, meet with advisors, and attend lectures, conventions, or field trips than their peers at public institutions.

First-Generation Students Succeed at Independent Colleges and Universities



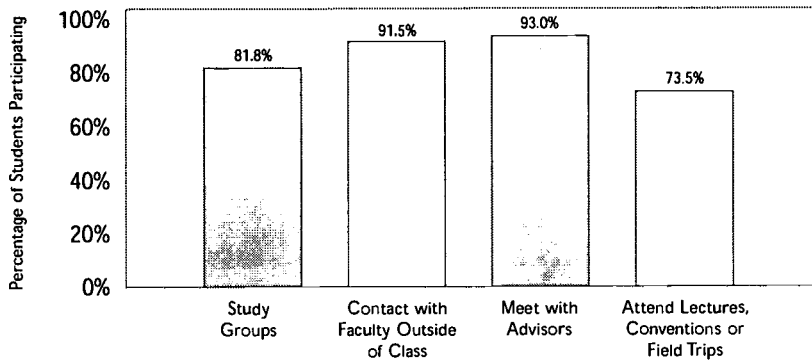

According to a 1996 Standard and Poor's survey of 70,000 leading executives, 50 percent of respondents received their undergraduate degree from an independent college or university. Of those with graduate degrees, 62 percent received them at an independent institution.

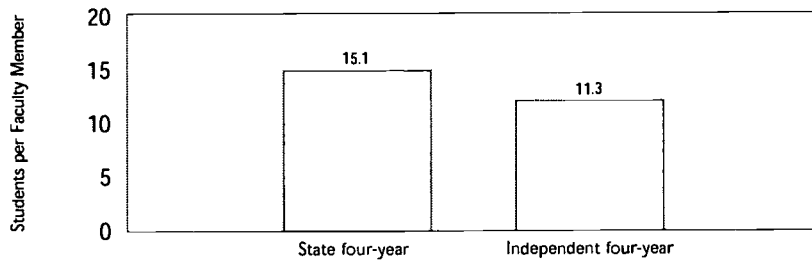
This personal attention benefits all students, resulting in higher degree completion rates. For example, nearly 63 percent of students who are the first in their families to attend college completed their bachelor's degree within five years at an independent college, compared to 46 percent at a public four-year institution.

Students at Independent Colleges and Universities Benefit Beyond the Classroom



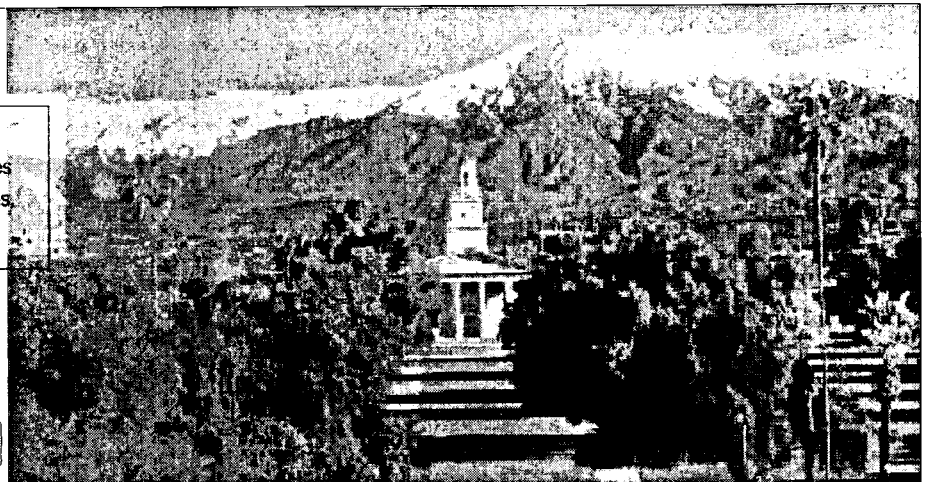

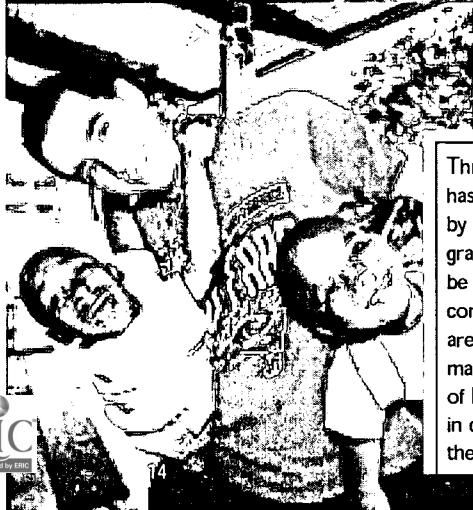

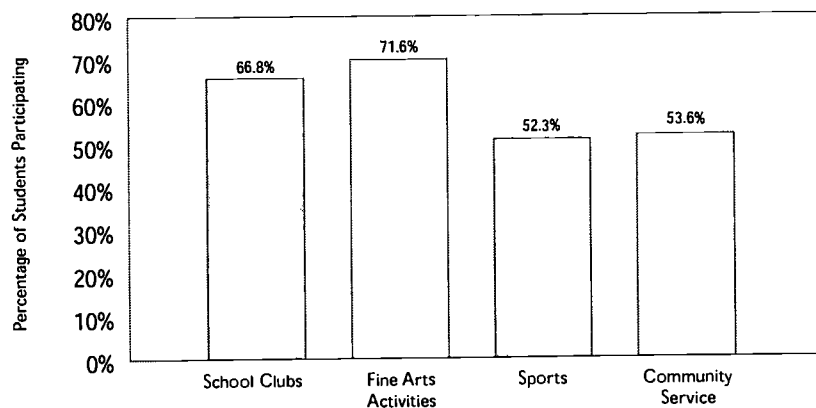
INVOLVED

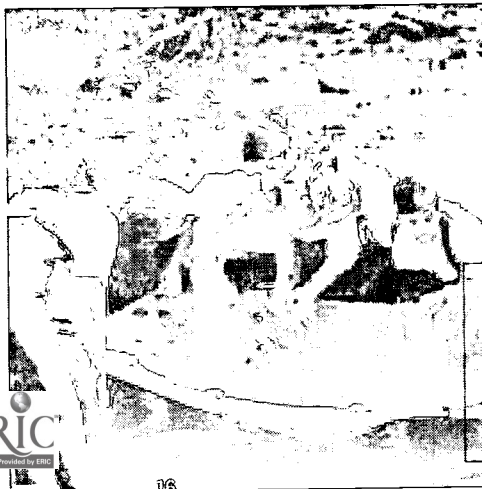
Independent institutions employ three-quarters of a million people nationwide, and are frequently the single largest private employers in their areas. In 2000, independent colleges and universities had estimated revenues of \$87 billion. As these dollars work their way through local economies, their effect is multiplied into a cumulative economic impact exceeding \$215 billion.

More than half of students attending private institutions participate in volunteer and community service activities, averaging eight hours per week.

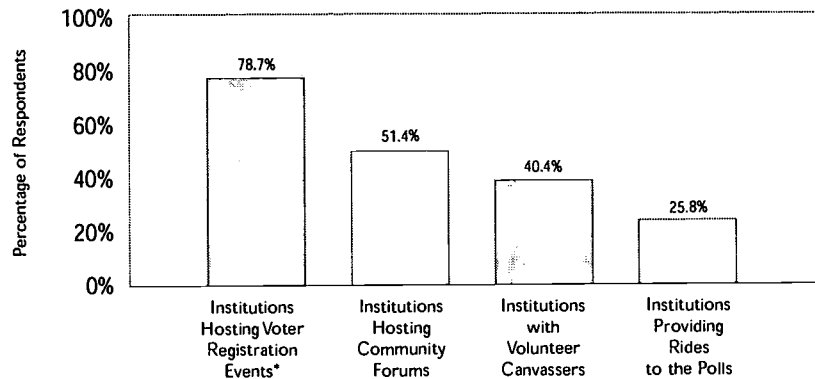


Between 1901 and 2000, 75 percent of U.S. winners of the Nobel Prize who were affiliated with institutions of higher education were at private colleges and universities.

On the cutting edge of scientific discovery, independent colleges and universities annually attract more than \$10 billion of federal research funding while developing ways to help save lives, improve the quality of life, and keep the U. S. globally competitive.

Private higher education has long partnered with elementary and secondary schools, most commonly to prepare teachers, support at-risk students, and prepare and motivate students to attend college. In recent years, many independent institutions are also closely involved in projects to improve local economies and enhance communities.



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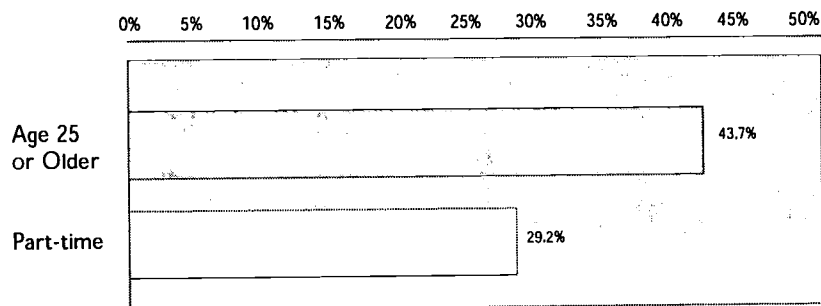

Independent Colleges and Universities Serve a Variety of Students

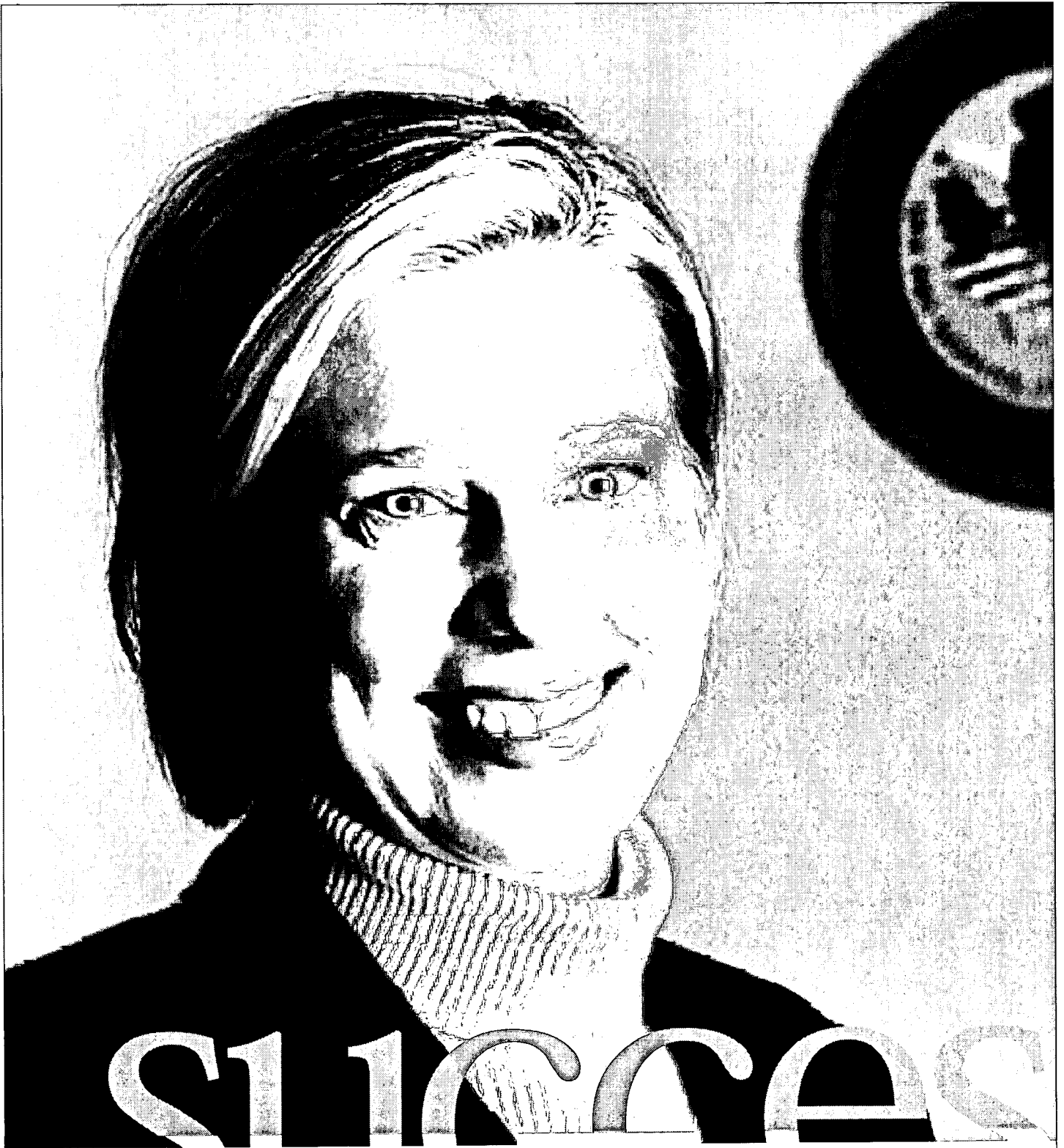

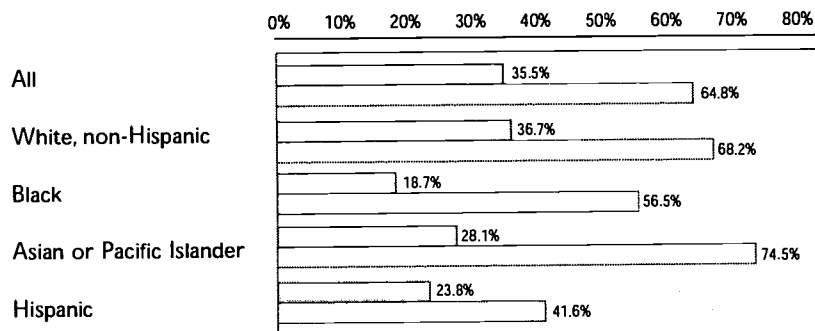


SUCCESSFUL

Independent colleges and universities are successful in helping students achieve their goals. Students who completed their undergraduate degrees at private colleges were more likely to do so in four years than students at public institutions. Sixty-five percent of students who received a bachelor's degree from an independent college or university were able to complete their degrees in four years or less, compared with 34 percent of graduates of four-year state institutions. The advantage to students attending independent colleges and universities is evident for all ethnic groups.

Successfully completing their undergraduate degrees on time and entering the workforce also helps graduates of independent colleges reduce the effective price of their education compared to their counterparts at state institutions.

 Independent four-year

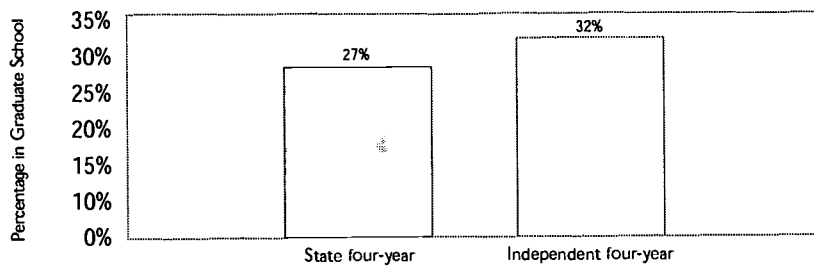

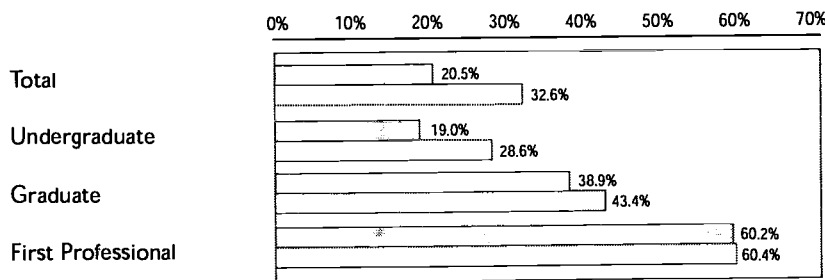

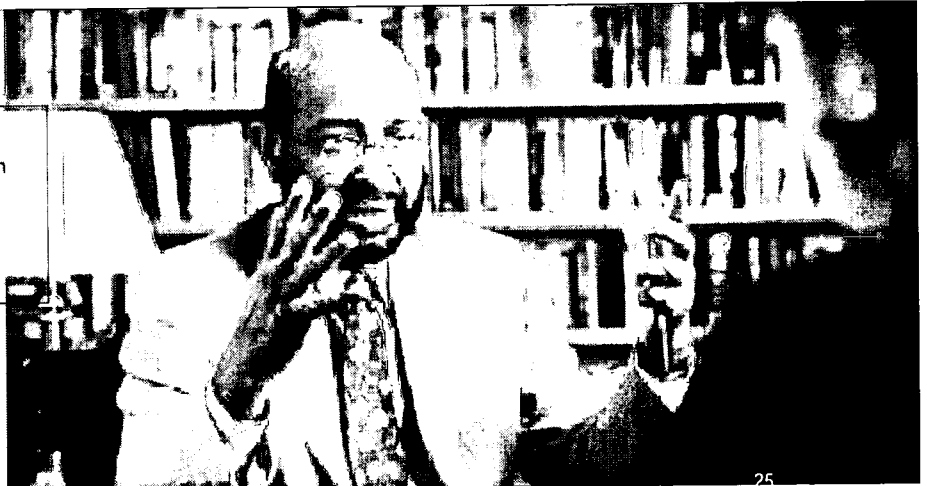
Independent Colleges and Universities Confer One-Third of All Degrees

SUMMARY

Independent colleges and universities are

diverse

- The 1,600 independent colleges and universities in the United States enroll 2.9 million students. The number of students at these institutions ranges from fewer than 100 to more than 30,000, averaging 1,851.
- The proportion of minority students enrolled at independent and state four-year institutions is similar — 24 percent at independent and 25 percent at state colleges and universities.
- Independent institutions enroll about the same proportion of students from families earning less than \$30,000 a year as from families earning more than \$75,000 a year.

affordable

- Eighty percent of dependent, full-time undergraduates in independent higher education received some form of financial assistance in 1995-96, averaging \$10,794.
- Much of the aid to students comes from the institutions' own resources — nearly \$8 billion in 1999-2000. Students at independent colleges and universities receive more than four times as much grant aid from institutional sources as comes from federal sources.
- If states were to assume the responsibility for educating students who now attend independent colleges and universities, the additional annual cost to taxpayers would total \$13 billion.

personal

- Student-faculty ratios are lower at independent colleges and universities than at state institutions. The majority of expenditures at independent institutions goes for instruction, student services, and scholarships.
- Nearly 63 percent of students who are the first in their families to attend college completed their bachelor's degrees within five years at an independent college, compared to 46 percent at a public institution.

involved

- Independent colleges and universities employ three-quarters of a million people nationwide, and had estimated revenues of \$87 billion in 1999-2000. As these dollars work their way through local economies, their effect is multiplied into a cumulative economic impact exceeding \$215 billion.
- More than half of students attending private institutions participate in volunteer and community service activities, averaging eight hours per week. Nearly 80 percent of independent institutions hosted voter registration events in the 2000 election.

flexible

- Independent colleges and universities meet a variety of students' needs. Forty-four percent of students are 25 or older, and 30 percent attend part-time.
- Independent institutions offer degrees in more than 760 fields of study.
- Approximately 80 percent of the U.S. population lives within 50 miles of an independent college or university.

successful

- While enrolling 21 percent of all students, independent colleges and universities award one-third of all degrees: 29 percent of undergraduate degrees, 43 percent of graduate degrees, and 60 percent of first professional degrees in fields such as law, medicine, engineering, and business.
- Sixty-five percent of students who received a bachelor's degree from an independent college or university were able to complete their degrees in four years or less, compared with 34 percent of graduates of state institutions. Private college graduates are also more likely to pursue advanced study than their public sector counterparts.
- Fifty percent of senior corporate executives received their undergraduate degree from an independent college or university. Of those with graduate degrees, 62 percent received them at an independent institution.

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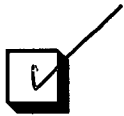


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
